





### Jurors Are Sought for Red Trial

WASHINGTON (AP)—Trial of the U.S. Communist Party was further delayed today as court officials tried to find in the federal city 23 potential jurors who have never worked for the U.S. government.

Judge William B. Jones has ruled that no past or present federal employees may sit on the panel that will decide whether the party is guilty of failure to register as an agent of the Soviet Union.

Once the panel is selected, its members will listen to a long list of questions aimed at determining unacceptable jurors.

Judge Jones decided it would be wrong to ask a potential juror only whether he is a member of the Communist Party. The question has to be phrased in more general terms. As a result, no members of the party, including its leaders, veterans of World War II, American Legion, Ku Klux Klan, American Nazi party, or American Citizens for Action will survive the questioning.

Any of those called for possible jury service who are not in the county jail will be interviewed by the court to determine whether any of its members belong to these organizations, will not be required to identify the organizations to which they belong.

This way, Jones said, no Communists who may be among the prospective jurors will interfere themselves or subject themselves to prosecution by admitting party membership.

### Social Welfare Meet Focuses on Adoption

Idaho adoption laws are in need of updating to prevent irreparable emotional harm to many children, the president of the Idaho Conference on Social Welfare declared Wednesday.

Mrs. Ruth Bondurant, Kimberly, said she hopes the organization's annual meeting, scheduled for Thursday and Friday in Twin Falls, will focus attention on the question of reforming the state's adoption procedures. The meeting will be headed by a panel discussion on adoptions.

Featured speakers during the two-day conclave will be Dr. Ernest W. Hartung, president of the University of Idaho, Moscow, and Dr. John A. Pennock, professor of sociology at Utah State University.

Dr. Hartung was appointed president of the University of Idaho in August of 1963. He was formerly vice president of the University of Rhode Island. He holds a master and doctoral degree from Harvard University and an honorary doctor of laws degree from University of Rhode Island.

Dr. Pennock is currently completing a project for the California Probation Department in preparing a series of training tapes as an in-service training program.

Howard W. Smith, chief of Clayton County police in Jonesboro, Ga., told the House Committee on Un-American Activities that the building in Jonesboro was owned by the Clayton Civic Club. He identified the club as a kavern of the Klan.

Committee Chairman Edwin E. Willis, D-La., observed that the use of a cover name by the Klan could "hoodwink" some people.

Agreeing, Rep. Charles L. McNair, R-Ind., said he would like to see the Klan's activities investigated.

**Johnson Wants Electoral College System Tightened**  
WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson has passed the word he wants Congress to act on his proposal for a constitutional amendment aimed at tightening up the Electoral College system.  
The failure of more than 100 previous attempts to Capitol Hill to change the method by which presidents and vice-presidents are elected, Johnson said today, has led to the mood to act.


Johnson proposed last January that the Constitution be amended to abolish the Electoral College and to permit state officials to transmit to Congress the name of electoral college cast for the presidential and vice-presidential candidates receiving the highest popular vote in their state.  
This would close a loophole under which electors have the legal right to vote for some individual other than the winner of the popular vote majority in his state.  
The 1968 Alabama election refused to vote for Adlai E. Stevenson and cast his ballot for Walter S. Jones. In 1957 Sen. Harry S. Byrd, D-Va., got the electoral vote of an Oklahoma Republican, plus eight unpledged Mississippi delegates.  
Johnson has made clear he is opposed to splitting a state's electoral vote between major candidates in proportion to their popular vote. He said in a message earlier this year that the

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Justice Department has questioned an Internal Revenue Service ruling that permits arrest of violators of triple-damage penalties for income taxes.

A congressional study committee, making public the differing views, recommends that the provision be amended by law, at least until there are more actual convictions of anti-trust law violators.

The Justice Department did not dispute the ruling, but it stands, but Ally Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach said it is "not necessary to do only one which this department would have reached had it been changed with the responsibility."

In a letter dated last Feb. 7, appended to the committee study, Katzenbach said the consequences of an anti-trust violation should not be made "so light that potential violators would be justified in treating them as a business risk."

He conceded that legal cases under the law tend to control laws tended to support the revenue service's ruling, but added:

"We would have been prepared to defend in court a rule of civil penalties. According to the revenue service ruled in July 1964 that the same rule applies to business expenses and therefore deductibility. According to firms recover nearly all the damages in savings on their income tax."

The revenue loss to the government can run to many millions of dollars in cases like those of electrical companies found to have conspired in restraint of trade.

### Pentagon Is Looking at 17-Year-Olds

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Pentagon is taking a closer look at 17-year-old service men who are being drafted into the Vietnam War.

The Pentagon's new policy may be to assign duty in Viet Nam or elsewhere overseas.

The only exception is in the case of youths who volunteer for the draft to go to the front lines of the war. These youths will be held back from overseas duty until they reach 18.

The Pentagon is considering a new policy of giving up use of 17-year-olds in Viet Nam, the Defense Department spokesman said in a study now under way on this general subject. No decision has been announced.

The study is being carried out by officials who set manpower policies for all the armed services.

"We don't know exactly how many 17-year-olds there are in Viet Nam," Pentagon authorities said.

According to official statistics, 1.2 per cent of the enlisted men service-wide are 17. This includes young men still in basic training.

The official said odds are slight that many youths of that age are in the war zone, since under the law, no member of the armed forces, regardless of age, may be shipped overseas until he has finished at least four months of basic training or its equivalent.

Analysts' authorities noted that 17-year-olds are allowed to enlist only with the consent of their parents.

It is assumed, these officials said, that such parents realize their sons may be subject to duty overseas, including being shipped to the front lines.

### Bill Brown Given NFL Player Honor


