

I.F. Woman Hurt as Car Hits Bridge

HAILEY — Mrs. Arthur Larsen, Idaho Falls, was released Thursday morning from Blaine County Hospital here, after being injured Wednesday afternoon when her car hit a bridge over Silver Creek east of Hailey, about 10 miles west of Pocatello on Highway 24.

State Patrolman Larry Plotz, who investigated, and Mrs. Larsen, who is secretary for the Soil Conservation Service, said John Larsen, 21, was driving a pickup, a car which ran in front of her 1965 Plymouth.

She missed the car, but the car struck the bridge. Mrs. Larsen was using a seat belt and this probably saved her from more serious injury, he said.

Her clothes and arms were cut and bruised.

Damages were estimated at \$700 to the front end of the car. She was en route to Hailey for a SCS meeting.

Three Youths Sentenced for Beating Death

LARAMIE, Wyo. (AP)—District Attorney Vernon Denney sentenced three Laramie youths to 18-23 months in the State Penitentiary Wednesday following conviction of manslaughter.

The three youths, condemned on charges they beat up Scott Lyle Nelson of Idaho Falls, Idaho, in a dance in Laramie last August, Nelson later died.

The three sentenced were Raymond Julian, 18; Nicholas Raymond, 18, and Edward H. Charles Borresco. They were originally charged with second degree murder, but District Court judges found them guilty of manslaughter in separate trials.

Indians Urged To Avoid Rights Demonstrations

SCOTTSDALE, Ariz. (AP)—America's Indians have been urged to avoid civil rights demonstrations, and "Those who come to you from the outside try to make you do things you don't want to do."

"Live a respectable life, and you will be accepted," oil executive W. W. Keller told the National Congress of American Indians.

Keller, a part-Cherokee from Bartlesville, Okla., said discrimination against Indians will end when Indians "conduct themselves in such a manner that those around them will take notice."



TO EACH HIS OWN Common Grammatical Pitfalls Are Explained

BY THE READING LABORATORY, INC.

I try to better
my mind to infer
Explain how you reply
Just what you imply.

In this article and the one to follow we shall concern ourselves with some of the most common grammatical errors. In proceeding articles on grammar should have made clear that common sense articles on grammar are inseparable. For that reason we may need to diverge a bit.

The first rule we shall cover is concerned with the very real difference between **infer** and **imply**. These words may not be used interchangeably. **infer** means the mental activity of what is judging; **imply** means the verbal expression of what is inferred. **infer** means "you understand"; **imply** "Consult our hymnals at the top of the article."

Frequently one of past happenings your (with me) may infer that I am stupid. In subsequent conversation I resent your implication, not your inference because the inference took place internally (in my mind), and I was not witness to that operation. You imply externally—your inference.

"From what you say, I infer (my mind judges) that you don't think me" is correct.

IRREGARDLESS

No such word. Irregardless is a double negative; in fact, the prefix ir- (originally in-) is a negativizer, the suffix less, is also negative. Say only regardless.

ENTHUSE—ENTHUSIAST

Again—no such word at least in formal writing or speech. It is tolerated in informal (colloquial) conversation. Use enthusiast.

UNIQUE

Never try to strengthen this word by very, most or the like. Unique means "the only one of its kind" and very or most does not add anything to the meaning—"This book is unique" is as strong a statement as you can make. "Willie May's is a most unique athlete" shows you don't know the meaning of unique. Let unique stand alone.

EITHER AND NEITHER

Either means (watch what!) "one of two." It means "one" if and the makes it singular. It means "one of two," and therefore may use it when talking only of two persons, places or things. The same applies to its negative neither. Watch the following correct sentences with the definition of either and neither in parentheses.

"Neither of these three pies deserve the prize." There are two mistakes here. First, there are three pies, so you may not use "neither." Second, "neither" is singular (either is plural). We may not say "Neither of them is eligible." We must say, "Neither of the two is eligible." The whole sentence should read "Neither of the three pies deserves the prize."

"Any one of you two is eligible." Wrong. Since we are talking about "one of two" we must say, "Either of you two is eligible." We may not say "Either of you three . . . " We should say, "Any of you three . . . "





