## No Speed Limit

If an Idaho Supreme Court ruling stands, the state's posted speed limits on highways will be null and void. A decision has been asked by the state attorney general which in effect holds that speeds are dictated by what is "reasonable and prudent." The decision came as a result of an appeal filed on behalf of a Boise driver who was arrested for driving 50 miles per hour in a 60-mile zone.

The state attorney general, however, contended that the 75-mile-an-hour speed was "reasonable and prudent" and a reversal of the conviction would open a Pandora's box of lawsuits for "finding" a "reasonable" speed in a host of cases.

All state highways would enter the picture. For instance, the owner of a new, heavy automobile equipped with all known safety accessories and special tires might be driving 75 miles an hour on a road with a posted speed of 50 miles an hour.

In the meantime, Idaho drivers would be well advised to observe posted speeds in spite of the Supreme Court decision. There's nothing to prevent police from beating a speeding charge in the light of the recent ruling, it could be a hollow victory.

# TO EACH HIS OWN Common Grammatical Pitfalls Are Explained

I try to bestir  
My mind to infer  
From how you imply  
Just what you imply.

In this article and the one to follow, you shall cover quite a few of the most common grammatical errors. The preceding articles on grammar should have made clear that common sense and good grammar are inseparable. For that reason, we have no need to dwell on each of the remaining rules in great detail.

The first rule we shall cover is concerned with the very real difference between infer and imply. These words may not be used interchangeably. Infer means the mental activity of reasoning. To imply means to verbalize or express, or to state what is implied in the mind.

From a number of past happenings you (your mind) may infer that I am stupid. In subsequent conversations you may not use my inference because the inference took place internally (in your mind), and I was not witness to that operation. You imply externally what I infer internally. Consult our attitude implied, etc., is correct.

From the way you talk, I imply you don't trust me. Wrong. From what you say, I infer (my mind judges) that you don't trust me is correct.

**IRREGARDLESS**  
No such word. Irregardless is a double negative; in fact, the prefix ir (originally in-) is a negator, the suffix, less, is also a negative. Say only regardless.

**ENTHUSE-ENTHUSED**  
Again, no such word. It is in formal writing or speech. It is tolerated in informal (colloquial) conversation. Use enthruse.

**UNIQUE**  
Never try to strengthen this word by very, most or the like. Unique means "the only one of its kind" and very or most does not add anything to the meaning. This book is unique is as strong a statement as you can make. The words unique and unique-ahness shows you don't know the meaning of unique. Let unique stand unmodified.

**EITHER AND NEITHER**  
Either means (which-then) "one of two." It means "one" and therefore makes it singular. It means "one of two" and therefore may use it when talking only of two persons, places or things. The same applies to its negative neither. Watch the following correct sentences with the definition of either and neither in mind.

Neither of these three pies deserve the prize. There are three mistakes here. First, there are three pies, so you may not use "neither." Secondly, "neither" is singular (equivalent to "neither one"), so we may not say "Neither deserve the prize." We must say, "Neither deserves the prize." The whole sentence should read "None of the three pies deserves the prize."

"Any one of you two is eligible." Wrong. Since we are talking about "one of two," we must say, "Either of you two is eligible." We may not say "Either of you three . . ." We should say, "Any of you three . . ."

### Idaho Laws Permit State Car Pool

BY RICHARD CHARNOCK  
BOISE (UPI)—State Auditor Joe H. Williams' dream of a state car pool possibly can become a reality under existing Idaho laws.

Although the Legislature has refused to enact special legislation to create such an entity, a study of present Idaho statutes indicates there may be sufficient authority already to get one started.

It would require, however, considerable cooperation among the state's executive agencies—possibly through an inter-agency committee appointed by the governor.

Legal sources indicate a 1939 law defining powers and duties of the state purchasing agent may contain enough authority to create the motor pool, buy state cars and maintain them.

Another law, pertaining to one of the duties of the state auditor, possibly contains broad enough power to set up an inter-agency billing system to finance the car pool without additional appropriations.

Section 67-1602 of the Idaho Code says one of the duties of the purchasing agent is to provide and supply such motor vehicles and motor vehicle equipment and supplies as shall be needed by the offices, departments, bureaus and institutions of the state.

Another law, Section 67-3018, gives the auditor authority to prescribe and enforce a system of accounting and bookkeeping.
