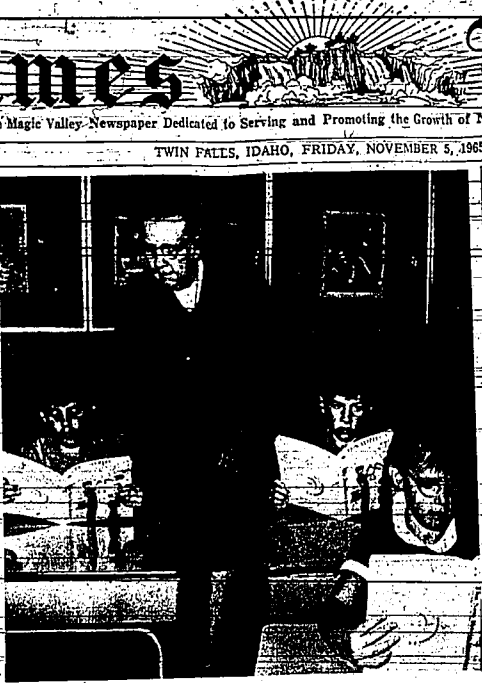

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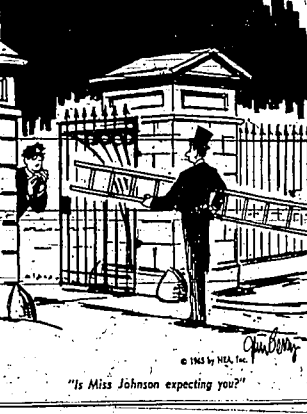

# Live Grenade Taken From Man's Back

SAIGON, South Viet. Nam (AP) — Working through a small hole in U.S. surgeons successfully removed a live grenade from a Vietnamese farmer's back today.

"It's in the back," said Lt. James W. Humphreys Jr. about the operation. "The grenade was in a wooden case half filled with sand after pulling it from the back of frail, Nguyen Tran.

The operation in a stock behind a Saigon hospital took less than four minutes.

Chinh became a walking explosive Sunday when a Vietcong — a human grenade — hit his back. The missile is 6 inches long and 2 inches wide lodged in his lower back between his ribs.

Humphreys, a chest surgeon from Richmond, Va., was assisted by another chest surgeon, Dr. John A. Penneck, professor of surgery at the University of Colorado, Daniel Campbell of Inlet Beach, Fla., a British anesthetist, Dr. Tony Brown, a local anesthesiologist, and a U.S. Army nurse. The U.S. Army attached to the U.S. military.

The doctors, who volunteered for the job, operated from behind a 10-foot-high stack of sandbags. They wore lead aprons to protect their instruments through an opening below a large pane of bulletproof glass. They made an incision with a scalpel attached to a 6-foot-long steel arm.

Humphreys poked out the grenade with a 6-foot pair of tweezers and placed it gently in the box of sand. It was about 10 feet from the wound in the back.

"If I had dropped it, the whole town would have been over," Humphreys said.

Belong the operation, Chinh, a tall man with a wavy beard, showed the newsman the bulge where the grenade had lodged.

He described how it got there. "I was standing outside my house early in the morning when a man shouted through the darkness, 'hands up.'"

"Just as I did so, he fired at me and I was thumped to the ground. My family took care of me until daylight when I was taken to the district headquarters and brought into Saigon."

The impact of the grenade did not break any bones, and after several days Chinh wanted to go home.

"But we couldn't allow that," Humphreys said. "The joys of a taxi or even of his own walking could trigger that sensitive fuse on the grenade and he might blow up, taking a dozen passers-by with him."

# Gifts Pour In for Negro Man, Family

RUTLEDGE, Ga. (AP) — "This showed us that white folks don't hate Negroes," said Lamar Thomas, a Negro tenant farmer, as tears of gratitude trickled down his face.

"Nearly \$2,000 and other gifts of clothes, furniture and food have poured in from over the nation to the Thomas family after fire destroyed their small frame home and took the life of a 4-year-old daughter."

Mrs. Thomas said today many of the donations came from white persons.

"The Lord giveth and the Lord taketh," she said, of the gifts and of the death of little Christion.

"It is not for the first time these things, I don't know what we would have done."

One week ago, Thomas and a white furniture salesman, Frank McRee of nearby Madison, Ga., were taking a picnic in the field when the salesman saw the home in flames.

Thomas, who is almost blind, cried, "Oh, my God, my children are in there."

McRee sprinted to the house, kicked in a window, encased in flames, grabbed 10-month-old Lamar Jr. and tossed him out to Thomas.

McRee, blinded by smoke and flames, could not locate the other child. McRee leaped out the window when the roof began to fall. The little girl later was found dead under a bed.

# Bus Driver Discloses He Is KKK Head

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP) — A Baltimore Transit Co. bus driver disclosed today he is the acting head of the Maryland klavern of the "Ku Klux Klan."

Vernon Natusser of suburban Essex said in an interview that he has been offered the title of grand dragon of the Maryland klavern "but I haven't accepted it because I'm not really sure that I want this position or not."

Ralph E. Pryor Jr., Delaware grand dragon of the KKK, said last month on a recruiting trip to Maryland's Eastern Shore that Maryland already had a grand dragon working "secretly who would soon emerge to lead the Klan on the Western Shore of the Chesapeake Bay."

"He hasn't come out publicly, but I believe it will be in the next month or so," Pryor said.

Today, Natusser said he had none become publicly known but without fanfare. He said the Klan recruit he decided to drop his anonymity was because of a Klan rally scheduled in Rising Sun Saturday night.

"I felt it was only proper that we have a rally to let people

# Know what the Klan stands for and give them an opportunity to join," he said.

Robert Shelton, grand dragon of the United Klans of America is slated to be the principal rally speaker. Pryor is due to be on hand as is Roy Frankhauser, Pennsylvania's grand dragon.

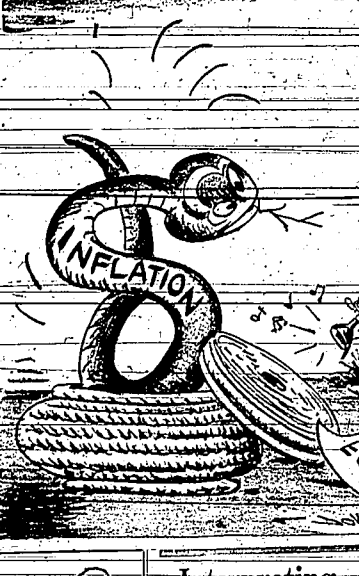

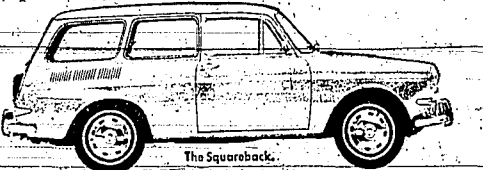

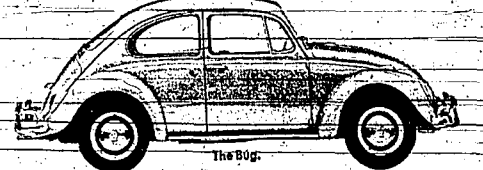

## Wheat Consumption for Coming Year Expected to Exceed Production Again

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Agriculture Department Thursday estimated the wheat surplus next July 1 at 750 million bushels, down about 70 million from the mid-year carry-over in 1965.

The department said wheat consumption during the 1965-66 marketing year is expected to exceed production for the fifth consecutive year. The average wheat carryover in 1965-66 was 8.3 billion bushels.

The supply situation for the current marketing year consists of a carryover this year of 819 million bushels, a 1966 crop of 1,354 billion bushels and imports of 2 million bushels. Consumption for the same period was expected to be 510 million bushels for food, 65 million for seed, 100 million for stock and 750 million for export.

The export figure could change considerably, especially if the wheat-short Soviet Union buys large quantities from the United States.

Commercial export to other countries already have shown a substantial gain in the first three months of the 1965-66 marketing year and overseas sales throughout the year might be above the estimate even without sales to the Soviet Union.

The feeding of wheat to livestock is expected to increase 10 percent or because farm-gate prices are closer to feed grain prices than they were last year. This is especially true of soft wheat prices. The estimate of 100 million bushels going into

125 million bushels on July 1 was more than double that of a year earlier and the largest since 1961.

The 1965 crop of 123 million bushels—exactly matching estimated consumption—would result in a carryover next July 1 of about 12.5 million bushels.

Since June 30, the Soviet Union has bought about 200 million bushels of overseas wheat, the department said.

The department estimated the supply of rice in 1965-66 at 48.3 million bushels, 12 percent above last year and 3 percent above the 1965-62 average.

The beginning carryover of four during 1965-66 is expected to approach the record of 2.1 billion bushels in 1964-65. In 1964-65, it totaled about 1.8 billion bushels.

Free World trade probably will remain near the level of 1964-65, about 1.5 billion bushels. Imports by Communist countries will be responsible for most of the increase in world trade, the department indicated.

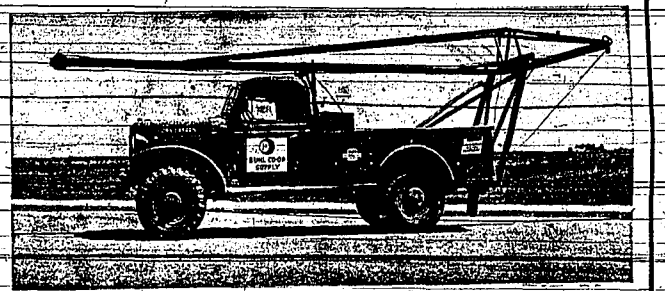

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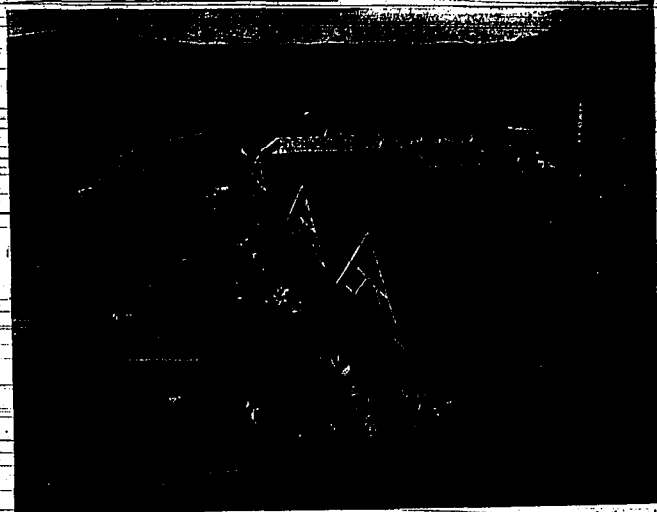

## New University Dairy Science Center To Be Displayed for Industry Confab

MOSCOW—The University of Idaho's new Dairy Science Center will be on display Nov. 17-19 for the Idaho Dairyman's Association's annual convention in Moscow. Convention proceedings will include dedication of the \$1,500,000 center.

The Dairy Science Center was completed late this summer and used for the first time in September. It replaces the old University dairy which crowds the western edge of the campus.

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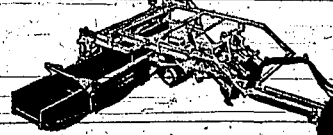

Shaw told the Soil Science of America that a constant battle must be waged to protect man, his food and fiber supplies and his forests from the ravages of pests.

He classed as public enemies some 10,000 species of insects, 600 types of weeds, 1,500 plant nematodes.

**Price Index For State Is Unchanged**

## "Meter" Fruit Crop Reported up Slightly

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Agricultural Research Service has developed a gadget called a "difference meter" which can determine rapidly and accurately the ripeness of fresh fruits and vegetables and reveal hidden internal defects.  
 The meter can be used on apples, cherries, oranges, peaches, peanits and tomatoes. It also can detect mold damage in corn, degree of milling rice, smut content of wheat, water core in apples and hollow heart and black spot in potatoes.  
 ARS' "differ" meter sends a light beam through the sample being tested and determines its condition by measuring the minute amount of light that goes through, without destroying the samples.

## Record Raisin Pack Recorded

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The Foreign Agriculture Service has estimated tentatively the 1965 world raisin pack at 678,000 tons, the largest on record. This is 100,000 tons larger than the 1964 pack and about 140,000 tons above the 1953-63 average.  
 The U. S. pack—all in California—accounted for about 269,000 tons. This is the largest since 1957 and 36,000 tons above the 1964 pack.

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**Dairy Surplus Reported Down**

WASHINGTON — During the first half of the 1965 marketing year—April through September—the nation's dairy surplus was smaller than a year earlier and prices received by farmers for milk and butterfat averaged higher, the U. S. Department of Agriculture reported.  
 Compared with a year ago the quantity of butter reported under the government support program, including payment-in-kind shipments, was down from 192 to 151 million pounds, checked from 87 to 71 million pounds and nonfat dry milk down from 641 to 610 million pounds.  
 Production of butter and nonfat dry milk was below last year in every month. Production of cheese was above last year until September, when it also dropped from a year earlier. Milk production neared its seasonal low, two per cent less than in September, 1964.

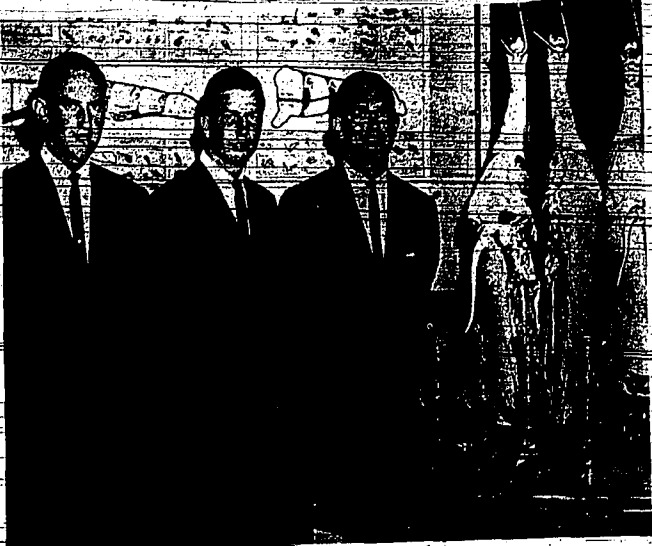

# Sales Tax Regulations Applicable to Farmers, Livestock Raisers Noted

**BOISE**—The office of the State tax collector announced this week the sales and use tax rules and regulations applicable to farmers and livestock raisers.

A "production exemption" is available for the sale of machinery and equipment used in farming operations (livestock being included in the definition of farming) and in the production process, property which becomes an ingredient or component part of property which is produced in Idaho. All raw material is sold by the producer tax exempt. The property used or consumed in the production process is also tax exempt.

Machinery and equipment which is primarily and directly used in the actual production process is also exempt as its material value is not for the purpose of replacing exempt machinery or equipment. Thus, the tractor, combine, plow and harrow are exempt from the sales tax as they are used directly in the production process. If property, machinery or equipment is an indirect or incidental relation to the process of production the machinery is taxable.

For example, a welding machine used by a farmer would be taxable. The welding tool which he uses to repair a combine becomes part of the machine which is used to produce a crop and would be exempt from tax.

The welding tool is used only incidentally to the production process and is not a part of that process. Tools are not a direct part of the production process and are taxable.

Without regard to their use, certain items are declared taxable by the Sales Tax Act. These items are:

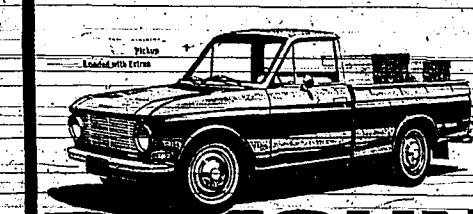
- (a) Janitorial equipment and supplies.
- (b) Hand tools with a unit purchase price not in excess of \$100.
- (c) Motor vehicles required to be licensed by the laws of this state.
- (d) Office equipment and supplies.
- (e) Equipment and supplies used in selling and distribution.
- (f) Equipment and supplies used in research.
- (g) Equipment and supplies used in transportation activities.
- (h) Warehouse buildings, such as a tool shed, barn and silo, is essential to the production process and the protection provided by the building, nonetheless, the building is only incidental to the process.
- (i) Accordingly, lumber, concrete, hardware, paint and electrical fixtures (all material) used in the construction of buildings are taxable as they are purchased.
- (j) Tax exemption certificates cannot be issued for the sale of materials used in the construction of a building.

- The report noted that all hand tools with a purchase price over \$100 are taxable regardless of the use to which they are put.
- That the purchase of a shovel for irrigation purposes would be taxable or repair of socket wrenches used to set a tractor would be taxable.
- taxable items include:

- Automobiles, balling guns, balling cradles, bale wrap, drum cradles, branding irons, brushes used to clean equipment and building material.
- Cattle guards, cleaning chemicals, clothing, dehorning, desk file cabinet, typewriter and office equipment, fire extinguishers, food, fence and footwear.
- Garbage cans, gloves, hand tools, hand trucks, squares, stiles, horses, shot ball batteries, identification tags, irrigation brushes, law towels, lumber, motorcycles (except for use on tax exempt machinery).

# Wool Prices Expected to Be Firm for Coming Year

**WASHINGTON (UPI)**—The Agriculture Department said Tuesday prices received by U.S. producers for sheep wool and average about the same as in 1964.

This firmness is expected to result from a high level of competition by U.S. mills in 1965. Higher wool prices and mill capacity abroad, and smaller domestic and world production in 1966, the department said in a review of the wool situation.

The 1965 average shorn wool price received by producers is expected to be a round five cents to six cents lower than the 1964 price of 56¢ per pound, grease basis, received during 1964.

Wool production in the United States in 1965 is expected to be slightly below 1964 because of a probable continued decline in

sheep numbers, the department said.

The Jan. 1, 1965, sheep and lamb inventory is expected to be about 25 million head, down slightly from the 24.7 million head a year earlier.

The decline in sheep numbers is expected to result in a shorn wool production for 1965 of about 212 million pounds, grease basis. This compares with an estimated 210 million pounds in 1964. The department said this would be the lowest production since the late 1950s.

The department said U.S. wool production in 1965 is expected to total about 205 million pounds, scouring same as in 1964.

# USDA Concludes Beef Purchases

**WASHINGTON (UPI)**—The Agriculture Department has ended its purchase program of frozen ground beef for the National School Lunch program.

Since July 19 the department purchased 46,300,000 pounds of frozen ground beef for about \$20,664,000.

The amount bought represents about 17 servings per child for the 18 million school children who take part in the program.

The purchase program was ended because the price of beef has risen above 1963 prices, the department said.

World production of wool in 1965-66 likely will total 5.7 billion pounds, the department said. This would be one per cent below the previous year but the same as in 1964-65.
