Idaho Girl Learns of Silk Production While in Japan

(Editor's note: Carol Hussie is a resident of Cascade, Idaho, and is now in Japan as an International Farm Trainee.)

TOKYO—When you see a silk shirt, do you realize how much work some farmer has put in to grow the raw cotton? Well, I do now because I have been learning about the silk farm in Japan. It is about 80 miles east of Tokyo.

The climate is good for mulberry trees and many farmers have sericultural farms in the area. The worms were stored in a small room and kept damp with towels. They were then taken to the silkworms as food.

The worms have their own room in the center of the barn, where they rest on flat, damp leaves and trees and leaves. At the end of the month, more trees were needed until they occupied all the upper stories of the building.

I arrived about half an inch long—but in three weeks they grew to about three inches because they eat constantly. Fed mulberry leaves three times a day, they make a lot of silk.

The worms eat the mulberry leaves with their chomping. The head of the worm goes back and forth in an arc as they eat rapidly.

We went in the morning to gather mulberry leaves. When we got to the field, we found the tiny tender leaves. As they grew larger, we picked all the leaves, and later whole branches.

If my host brother and I did not collect leaves, we took the garden tractor and trailer. If my mother had driven, she would have walked, because she did not have a license to drive. Either silk that is then sent to a factory way, we took baskets for the fiber weaving.

Wheat Consumption for Coming Year Expected to Exceed Production Again

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The feed compares with 70 million bushels in 1964-45.

The department said wheat production during the 1955-66 marketing year is expected to exceed production for the fifth consecutive year. The average wheat carryover in 1955-62 was 17.5 million bushels.

The department said wheat consumption during the 1955-66 marketing year is expected to exceed production for the fifth consecutive year. The average wheat carryover in 1955-62 was 17.5 million bushels.

The decline from last year is due mainly to reduced crops in Red China and Russia, two of the world's three largest producers.

The export figures could change considerably—especially if the wheatshock Soviet Union buys large quantities from the United States.

Commercial exports to other countries already have shown a sharp increase in the first three months of the 1955-66 marketing year and overseas sales throughout the year might be above the estimate even without sales to the Soviet Union.

Commercial wheat production in the Soviet Union is expected to increase in 1955-66 because farm-wheat prices are closer to feed grain prices than they were last year.

This is especially true of soft wheat prices. The estimate of 10 million bushels going into

European Communist nations are continuing.

Since June 30, the Soviet Union has bought about 350 million bushels of overseas wheat, the department said.

The department estimated the supply of rye in 1955-66 at 453 million bushels, 12 per cent above last year and 3 per cent above the 1955-62 average.

The beginning carryover of

12.5-million bushels on July 1 was more than double that of a year earlier and the largest since 1955-56. The 1955-66 crop of 32.8 million bushels—exactly matching estimated consumption—would result in a carryover next July 1 of about 13.5 million bushels.

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
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

New University Dairy Science Center To Be Displayed for Industry Confab

MOSCOW—The University of Idaho's new Dairy Science Center includes facilities that will make possible a vastly expanded research program. Dr. W. C. Ross, extension coordinator for the Agriculture Department, says the center will be dedicated for Nov. 17-19.

For the Idaho Dairymen's association convention proceedings will include dedication of the \$473,000 center.

The Dairy Science Center was completed late this summer and is used for the first time by the University dairymen who now occupy the old University dairy which crowds the western edge of the campus.

The new center blends facilities for practical dairy production and research. Dr. Ross points out. In addition, it will frequently serve as a classroom for students in the College of Agriculture.

As a dairy operation, it houses the university's dairy herd—about 100 head of registered Holstein and Jersey cattle, including a milking herd of 100 Holsteins and 25 Jerseys. The milk they produce is processed in the University Creamery and used by students in the dormitories.

As a research farm, the center

includes facilities that will then be converted to the field.

At present, there is a 72 x 88 foot research and maternity barn which is equipped with 18 stanchions for individual feeding trials, a digestion stall-room, box-stall facilities for lactating cows, and other facilities for dairy nutrition research.

The milking parlor is a double, four-stall unit. Cows are washed and fed automatically as they enter the preparatory stall. After washing, they are led into the milking stalls according to their milk production.

Milk from each cow is weighed automatically before it is piped into the 50-gallon bulk milk tank can be washed in place, Dr. Ross explained.

A year's supply of whole grain feed for the herd will be stored in the grain tanks at the center. Grain is moved from the storage bins by sugar to a dry roller mill, then elevated to storage bins in the mixing room where the various feed mixtures are prepared.


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Election Set

Schools Advised To Teach Use Of Insecticides

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Dr. W. C. Ross, pesticides coordinator for the Agriculture Department, believes that instruction on the safe and efficient use of pesticides should be offered in schools.

Shaw said that in this era of increasing chemical use, education about the nature of pesticides and their proper handling and application should begin in elementary schools and be intensified in high schools.

He added that "in relation to upgrading our educational courses on agriculture, chemistry, physiology, biochemistry, toxicology, and ecology are badly needed."

Shaw told the Soil Science of America that a considerable amount must be spent to protect man, his food and fiber supplies and his environment from the ravages of pests."

He called public entities some 10,000 species of insects, 600 types of weeds, 1,500 plant diseases, and 1,000 species of nematodes.

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

Chemical Use Is Urged for Weed Control

WATERTON—A new weed control technology spearheaded by selective, efficient and safe chemical weapons integrated with non-chemical methods was demonstrated by Dr. W. C. Shaw, pesticides coordinator for the Department of Agriculture.

Some 600 species of weeds, he said, compete with crops for water, nutrients, mineral elements, light, space and other growth requirements. Some also are poisonous to man and animals.

Dr. Shaw noted the increasing use and advantages of herbicides, or "weed-destroying" agents. Less expensive than most other weed control methods, they have the advantage of being more than crop protectants or particides in that they reduce man and machine hours needed on the farm.

Herbicides, combined with cultural practices, are now used on more than 85 million agricultural acres, or about 35 per cent of the national crop area, he reported.
