

# Refugee Quota Agreement OK'd By U.S. and Cuba

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (AP)—The United States and Communist Cuba sealed Saturday an agreement allowing 3,000 to 4,000 Cubans a month to find refuge in this country. The starting deadline is Dec. 1 and the 18-month cutoff date. The emphasis will be on reuniting thousands of families. Official U.S. predictions on how many Cubans may leave their homeland under the new pact but the total is expected to run beyond 100,000. The present estimate is for 100,000.

## Governors Tour Delta, Sea Coast

HANH LONG, Viet-Nam (AP)—U.S. governors touring South Viet Nam split up Saturday for flights that took some 250 miles. The tour included others to the South China sea coast. Three saw a military engagement. U. S. fighter bombers were pounding a Viet Cong camp in the Delta as Philip Hoffmann, Governor of the State of Montana and Harold E. Hughes of Iowa passed by on their way to Vinh Long, 75 miles west of Saigon. White smoke swirled up from the target.

The "three went on a model hamlet of 2,000 persons. Hamlets created there enthusiastically and gave them Vietnamese art works. Three others—John H. Reed of Maine, Carl Sanders of Georgia, and John Charles of Rhode Island—visited 15 miles of shanty towns with hundreds of refugees. Romney of Michigan, Clifford P. Hansen of Wyoming, Henry Bellmon of Oklahoma and John A. Burns of Idaho toured the Phan Thiet coastal area 100 miles east of Saigon. The governors came to Viet Nam Friday after attending the annual U.S. Intelligence Officers Conference in Japan.

# U.S. Satellite Is Circling Earth on Map-Making Try

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—A map-making satellite named Geos-1 which soared into orbit Saturday to take Earth's measurements is an experiment that could produce the world's most accurate maps, better pinpoint long-range missile targets and establish guidelines for tracking men to the moon. The 28-pound satellite explorer rode into space into a towering Delta rocket that rifled away from Cape Kennedy in a rainstorm at 1:23 p.m. The National Aeronautics and Space Administration reported half an hour later that the "payload" was circling the globe at about 17,000 miles an hour.

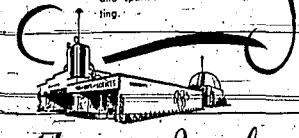

WASHINGTON—Defense Secretary Robert McNamara—who prefers "little logic" with his International politics, has been overruled in an attempt to transfer 500 American troops from Europe to Viet Nam, those who State Department types say they would be bestial to our NATO allies.

## PERFECT HINDSIGHT

No one should blame Mr. Goldwater for calling attention to the fact developments in this area. This "hold-you-so" approach is human and if Mr. Goldwater doesn't call attention to his validated stand, few others are likely to give him credit.

His present proposal for strategic bombing is not a look-quit good-bye coming from now in the light of current developments. However, the situation is a little different. Instead of being a candidate running for the nation's highest office, Mr. Goldwater is now a private citizen who is free to suggest and criticize, remaining free of responsibility.

Some politicians will declare that the former candidate enjoys a somewhat free hand in making suggestions and criticisms from any citizen are in the best traditions of the nation and its cornerstone of freedom of speech. After all, look at the peace demonstrators who are against American participation in the Viet Nam war. Perhaps there were ulterior purposes behind some of the demonstrations, yet who can deny that participants were exercising their right of freedom of speech.

Although a majority of American voters bought the theory a year ago that Mr. Goldwater was trigger-happy, a little more attention to his words today. After all, there's no substitute for 20-20 hindsight.

### Economists Concede Concern on Employment Affecting Prices

WASHINGTON (AP) — More of the unemployed without forcing up prices. Nevertheless, the government's own figures show consumer prices are rising this year at an annual rate of about 1.6 per cent compared with an annual rate of about 1.2 per cent the previous five years.

More than half the drop in the jobless rate since 1962 occurred in the past year.

A White House source said, "There is no doubt at all that as the economy becomes more prosperous, and the people at the bottom are getting more out of it we are going to find more cases where companies are going to be able to make price increases stick."

Winn Clague, now an advisor to Wirtz after 18 years as commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, gave this summation of the situation: "In a high employment economy like we've got now and an unbalanced labor force with a shortage of highly skilled people, a higher rate of increase in prices would be likely to continue."

Ross agreed the problems of "hoor shortages and price inflation" are not new. "But until danger signals begin showing up in the economy," he said, "we are not in a position to know just how far down it (unemployment) can be driven," Ross said.

Now that the nation is striking distance of the administration's long-sought interim goal of a 4 per cent jobless rate, government experts on wages and prices are casting an eye on the signs of inflation.

"This is something we have to watch," said one.

But this is not to suggest any panic. In fact, the interim goal of a 4 per cent jobless rate is being pushed by a variety of job training programs.

The unemployment rate dropped last month to 4.3 per cent — or 2.8 million persons — the lowest level in eight years.

Arthur Ross, associate commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, said, "My personal view is that it will be in the national interest to keep it going below 4 per cent."

Ross said getting the jobless rate down from 5 per cent in 1962 to 4 per cent in 1965 has been no easy task.

Forcing the rate below 4 per cent will be even tougher.

"The lower down you get, the closer you get down to normal turnover plus the greater which are difficult to employ," Ross said.

By full employment, the administration does not mean reducing the jobless rate to zero. It means providing jobs for everyone willing and able to work.

Thus reducing the jobless rate to 2.5 or 3 per cent of the nation's civilian labor force — now totaling nearly 60 million — would, in effect, achieve Johnson's goal of full employment.

What has all this to do with prices?

Some government economists believe the drive toward full employment will create a highly competitive labor market, bidding up wages and thus raising prices.

Others, however, say the rapid expansion in the economy can provide many more jobs at current wage levels and absorb

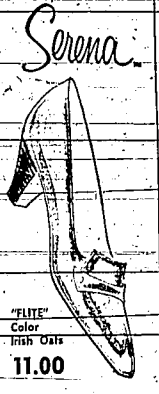

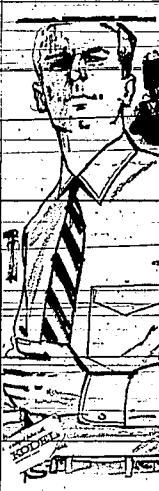

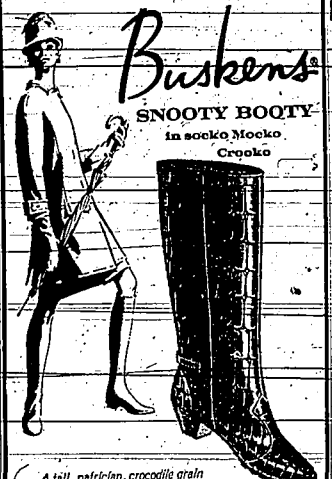

### Court to Hear Claim on Voting Law

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court has agreed to hear South Carolina's claim that the 1963 voting rights law is unconstitutional.

It has invited other states which may want to fight the law side by side with South Carolina to get their requests in.

This action, announced after the justices had concluded their customary Friday conference, means an early judgment on the claims by Southern officials that the law is an unconstitutional usurpation of states' rights to oversee elections.

The court's decision to take the case directly also means that South Carolina will be the only state to carry its battle through lower federal courts.

Mississippi, South Carolina is seeking an immediate halt to the dispatch of federal registrars to the state. The quickest way to do so is the federal government and have the case heard by the court's highest court.

Thus South Carolina asked the Supreme Court Sept. 22 to accept filing of an original suit in its favor. That is what the court granted.

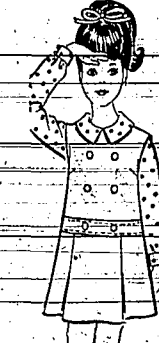

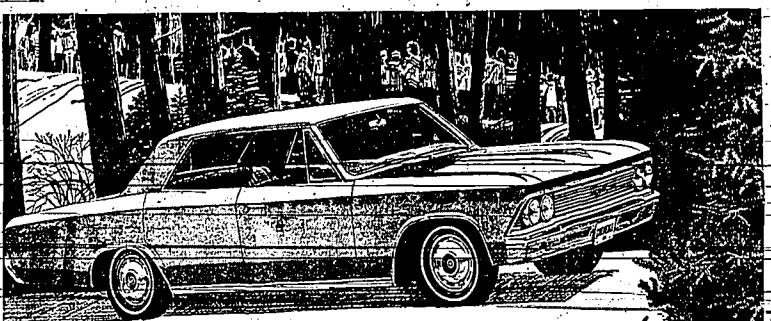

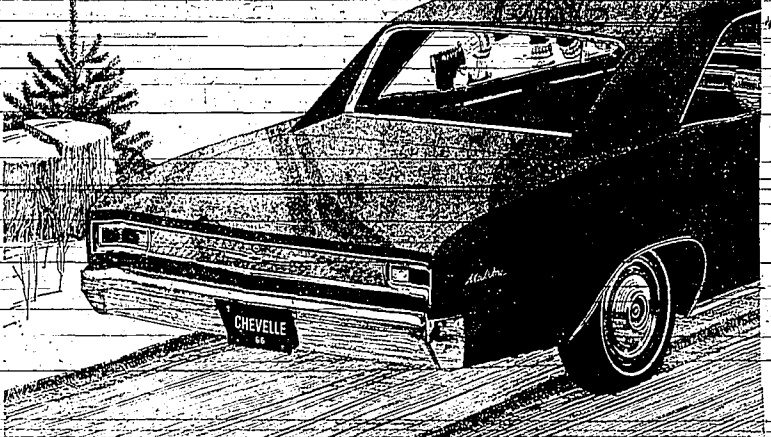

The triumph, before 50,565 fans, gave Minnesota a 4-1 record in the Big Ten and kept the Gophers in the conference title race while Northwestern sank to a 2-3 mark.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon says the Republican party has a good chance to win 30 to 40 seats in the U.S. House of Representatives in 1966.  
Nixon told the Western-Great Lakes Republican Conference Friday night that the party also should make gains in the U.S. Senate and state-governors' races.

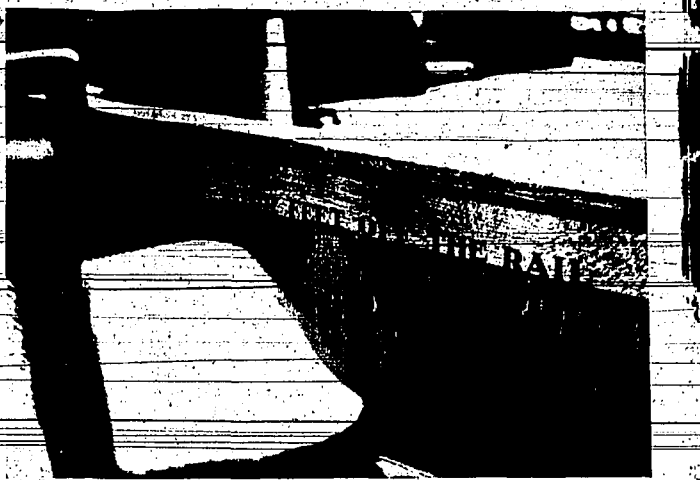

## Smiling Baby Girl Spends Entire Life Near Death as Result of Defect

Tina Miller's 11 months of life have been spent hovering near death. She has spent more time in a hospital than she has at home.

The smiling baby has clung to life as a direct result of massive amounts of blood furnished by the Red Cross. To make the situation more difficult is the fact that Tina's blood is a rare type found in only about a dozen people in the entire state of Idaho.

The little girl, a daughter of Mrs. Patricia Miller, Twin Falls, was born with an esophageal-vein dilatation and when this ruptures it causes bleeding in her digestive tract.

Mrs. Miller first noticed her daughter's difficulty when the baby was between two and three weeks old. A return to the hospital at that time was the first of many she has made since, including a four-week period spent in the LDS Hospital in Salt Lake City.

The "miraculous" was made by placing with the baby in the mother's lap and a friend holding the blood transfusion bottle. Extra bottles of the rare blood were taken along.

On another trip to the hospital in Twin Falls her heart stopped and she was revived by two local doctors utilizing external cardiac massage.

The girl now weighs 20 pounds and three ounces. She is scheduled for surgery in Salt Lake City early in January, the first of three planned operations.

Medical people say it is difficult to know just how long hospitalization will be required as how much blood will be needed.

Her mother told Red Cross officials that "it's a comfort to know there will be enough blood of the proper type available should Tina need it."

The blood is furnished by the Red Cross at no charge.

Tina has a brother, Terry, 5, and a sister, Cathy, 4. During her well moments she obviously enjoys their company.

But even as this story is being written, death is once more close to the smiling baby. Tina again is bleeding internally and her recovery outlook is not promising.

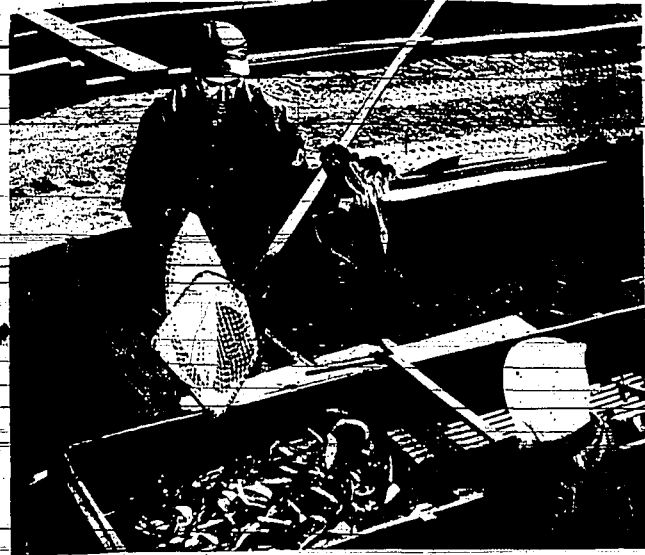

# The Green Thumb

**PRESERVING LEAF COL- less for eating from the hand, ars: Here's a good trick passed along by one of my readers—**

**"If you want to preserve leafy greens—spinach, kale, and other leafy greens—here's a trick that will keep them fresh for a long time. Pick a bunch of greens, wash them thoroughly, and press it over the top of a plastic bag. The bag should be padded in front, resting on a padded board. This dries the greens, and the plastic bag then presses the top sides of the leaves.**

**CANDLES FOR CENTER- PIECES.** Quite often a home owner has access to candles from seedlings or other functions. Save these spent candles because they can be melted and used for making your own brand of holiday candles for centerpieces. If you can't get hold of wax, a paraffin used for sealing jelly glasses.

You can use these home made candles in a pumpkin, a big tin can or vase, for table decorations. Snip off some twigs of your evergreens for filler, tuck in a few live sprigs of holly, hawthorn or berries and you'll have a centerpiece that will cost you but a few cents.

With the holiday season coming, I'd like to remind our friends to gather all the pine needles, holly leaves, and other evergreen material that you can get. Treat it to burn different colors in your fireplace.

**FIRE-RESISTANT Candles.** If you are making candles for the holidays, or treating cones for the fireplace? Send me a self-addressed stamped envelope and ask for my guide, making candles for centerpieces. It's full of good tips on candle-making and treating cones for colored flames. Have more fun during the holidays and get your copy of my guide.

**CUT ASPARAGUS TOPS?** Should you cut the tops off your asparagus in fall or spring? I think it makes much difference when you do it. Those who like to do the job in spring do for these reasons: For leaves trap snow and moisture and thus serve as a mulch in winter. Also by spring all the plant food has been transferred from top to the roots where it is stored, waiting to push up sprouts when warm weather comes.

Those who like to cut the tops in fall feel it makes the bed more prevent weeding from popping up wherever the red berries droop. We've cut the tops back in late fall and in late spring, to see if it made any difference. I can't see where it has.

Shows a good time to add limestone and fertilizer to the asparagus patch. Add eight pounds of limestone (ground) per 100 sq. ft., and about three pounds of a complete plant food (such as 5-10-10) per 100 sq. ft. If you prefer to liquid feed the young plants in spring, wait until the spears show through and then water with a sprinkling can, using a handful to a 12 quart sprinkler. It's ideal to feed again in early July of next year.

**PEACH PROBLEMS:** A good many gardeners grow peaches, but many are having trouble with an abundance of it. Some of the fruit is hard and rubbery and I've been asked if anything can be added to the trees in fall or spring to improve the peach fruit.

The answer is "no. In a nutshell, there are two classes of peach varieties: Those with "melting" flesh, grown mainly in the East and West (include Elberta, Golden Jubilee, etc.) to name a couple. The other type is the "cling" peach, characterized by a very firm rubbery flesh, and pits do not separate from the flesh. Canned peaches from the grocery shelf are usually of this type.

The external appearance, all things considered, will affect your mouth water, being generally more beautiful than varieties with melting flesh. However, they are practically worthless for eating from the hand, being potentially useful only as processed, canned products.

If you're growing a canner cling type peach in your back yard, you can do a few things to pull it up and plant a branch with beautifully colored leaves. terpretations, and some laws have been discarded.

But the judge, in some trials and the jury in others is still "boss." Decisions in one case show more than in another, are forgotten as attention is focused to other cases.

It is operation of the old law of supply and demand. There is still a bottleneck because the court workload is excessive. But if you wait long enough justice will be served.

Scores of guilty or innocent persons have been sentenced to court sessions down through the years. Hundreds of people have been called to serve jurors. A relatively few men have served as judges.

Behind it all is the concept that justice is blind and will not be swayed from the purpose at hand regardless of the location or place of the courtroom.

The Twin Falls courthouse fits both concepts. Justice is there to be had. The room in which it is meted out reminds everyone that it, too, has been there for a long time and has back when the nation began.

## "Air Power" Technology Is Promoted

**SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—**Imagine an air-powered type of automobile that runs with no moving parts or a missile guided not by an electric circuit but a system of air tubing.

A new technology, called fluidic engineering, could make these things possible, say researchers at the University of Utah.

Dr. Fox, who heads the Fluidics Research Laboratory set up by the Imperial Eastman Corp. in Salt Lake City, says the technology is in the early stages of development. Fox compares fluidic devices to transistors because both amplify small changes in pressure, flow or current for voltage in the other.

What makes the field so promising, Fox said, is the existence of thousands of machines which operate on mechanical and hydraulic power. Using this power for controls would make separate electrical or mechanical control hookups unnecessary.

Imperial Eastman, which manufactures pipe and tubing, hooked a simple fluidic device to a tapping machine which cuts threads inside brass nuts. The machine previously had been electrically controlled.

The company said it will use automatic control, output was tripled, the number of broken dies was greatly reduced and break-downs were virtually eliminated.

The key to the fluidic control was a tiny stream of air directed onto the work area. Variations in resistance to the air stream would alter the path of air through a switch and cause the machine to go into a different cycle.

"Sequence control operations are natural for fluidics," Fox said. "The machine would be the mechanism which causes an automatic tapping machine to go from wash to rinse and so on."

With water pressure necessary for operation of the machine, wouldn't it be more practical to have this power source control the machine instead of an entirely separate electrical circuit?

Fox opened his desk drawer and picked up a handful of fluidic switches. Most had four or five tube fittings, connected by internal channels—in a ceramic body.

"As missile control systems, fluidics offer the advantage of being immune to electronic counter measures," he said. "Unlike electronic circuits they would not be affected by radiation or shock caused by nearby nuclear blasts."

"The Air Force is interested in fluidics to control jet engines," he continued. "At present there are numerous electronic control loops in jet engines. For instance one might sense electrical temperature changes, feed the information through an electronic device which in turn would trip a solenoid to alter the fuel mixture."

"A simple electronic device would be more efficient and respond more rapidly," he said.

"A conservative estimate is that fluidics will be a \$250 million industry by 1970," Fox said.
