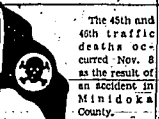

## 2 Men Killed in Auto Mishap at Construction Site

HEVUBURN — Two Warren, Pa., men died early Monday morning when the car they were riding in sped for a highway barricade and smashed into an excavation for a bridge foundation near here. Minidoka County Sheriff Theo Johnson identified the two dead men as Richard A. Dunn, and Robert James Coffins, both about 25. Sheriff Johnson said the 1963 Studebaker the men were riding in was impaled by steel pilings in the excavation area for use in making the foundation. The car overturned and split in half. Dunn was believed to be the driver, the car as Coffins held the passenger's seat by a seat belt, Sheriff Johnson said. Both men are believed to have been killed.

## Wilson Wants Another Talk With Smith

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Harold Wilson has proposed another meeting with President Lyndon B. Johnson for an attempt to solve the new crisis over Smith's drive for independence. The two men suggested that the two meet on the Mediterranean island of Malta. There was an immediate indication that Smith's response would be to accept the offer. The two leaders, meeting in the British capital of Salisbury, agreed Oct. 30 to let a three-man royal commission try to seek a way out of the independence deadlock. During the weekend the agreement began to fall apart. The Rhodesian leader declared a state of emergency in the central African colony, causing fears in London that Smith was preparing to declare unilateral independence to preserve white rule.

Most of his opponents and many followers of Diefenbaker's Conservative party concede him only the scantiest chance to win the seat of prime minister. Eight news agencies broadcast groups predicting Diefenbaker's defeat.

Diefenbaker, however, has foreseen his defeat as the Conservative party's last stand. He has now and a majority in the House of Commons.

Diefenbaker has made a vigorous campaign and has said nothing publicly about retiring. He is 70 and already has lost one election to the Liberals.

**Gins to G.I.s May Down Pentagon**

WASHINGTON (AP)—An surge of popular reaction to the Pentagon is threatening to curtail the flow of books and other things for U.S. servicemen in the war zone.

The generosity is welcomed in the Pentagon which views it as a profession of support for U.S. policies.

The unsolicited offers from the unaffiliated organizations, business firms and school groups is creating a logistics problem — how to move the stuff, and what to do with it once it arrives in Viet Nam.

Defense officials have been working with the problem for days.

They don't want to offend the givers. And yet they would like to channel the generosity in some way.

One proposal, endorsed by the U.S. command in Viet Nam, would have committees in the United States adopt some unit in Viet Nam.

Leaders of the community would contact members of the unit, find out what the men really wanted, and attempt to supply their wants. It would be a kind of gift exchange.

Some offers do something for the boys began pouring into the Pentagon about two weeks ago. Officials said the citizens who wrote in, telegraphed and telephoned obviously were reacting against war-related business and others demonstrating openly against U.S. involvement.

Literally tons of cookies, hundreds of cases of beer, thousands of books and other items have been offered.

There should be some a tremendous logistics problem," one official said.

It's primarily a matter of transportation — not only to Viet Nam but distributing the stuff once it gets there.

Officials stressed that in-country movement of supplies in South Viet Nam is not easy because road travel is perilous and the country's one railroad line has been cut.

Thus, supplies generally move by air. There is not much space for mass gifts.

Some commentators have suggested to the Pentagon that Air National Guardsmen and air reservists might be bought on some of the gift offerings to Southeast Asia. This is not likely to happen.

### Industry Sources Believe Aluminum Prices Will Stick

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Industry sources believe the aluminum price-hikes will stick, despite the Johnson administration's threat to unload 200,000 tons of the metal from government stockpiles.

No one was underestimating the President's ability to put up a stiff fight if he really set his mind on making the aluminum industry do an about-face.

But industry sources doubted the administration could maintain the same powerful weapon—the 100,000 tons of aluminum stockpile—Kennedy used in 1962 to make the steel industry "back" down from its plans for a price increase.

In announcing plans to release 200,000 tons of aluminum from government stockpiles, Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara said Saturday that defense production would require between 150,000 and 200,000 tons more in 1966 than this year.

If the steel in Viet Nam is going to eat up aluminum at

fast as the government unloads it, then there should be no stockpiling in demand for what the producers are turning out, one company source said. And if demand holds up, then there should be no downward pressure on prices, he added.

Other sources predicted the government would have a hard time getting aluminum users to take stockpile aluminum, much of which is impure by today's standards and requires additional refining.

Some are likening the events of the past week to the showdown between President Kennedy and the steel industry in 1962. At a news conference Saturday, Gardner Ackley, chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisors, called the aluminum price increases "inflationary" and unjustified in the light of the industry's profits, wages and productivity.

But in 1962, Kennedy had a key weapon—the Johnson stockpile of the market refused to go along with the rest of the industry in raising prices.

Since the steel industry was operating well below capacity, these companies could have taken away business from the others. Fear of losing markets was one of the reasons why the price-risers finally backed down.

### Sen. Kennedy Plans Tour of Latin America

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N. Y., is planning a three-week tour of Latin America, starting Wednesday on an unofficial "man-in-the-street" mission.

Kennedy and his wife, Ethel, will leave for Lima, Peru, from Los Angeles. They also plan to visit Chile, Argentina, Brazil and Venezuela.

Kennedy will talk with student groups and with inhabitants of some of Latin America's teeming slums.

# Arfons Survives Crash To Set Land Speed Mark Of 576 Miles Per Hour

BONNEVILLE SALT FLATS, Utah (AP)—Art Arfons boosted the world land speed record to 576 miles per hour Sunday, surviving a collision with a steel post which damaged his car and ripped a tire from a rear wheel. 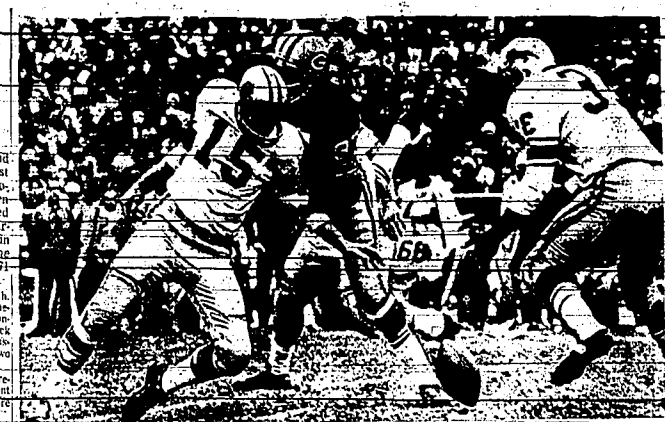

## Tunney, Schmeling Ask Boxing Cleanup

BERLIN (AP)—Former world heavyweight champion Gene Tunney said Sunday that professional boxing in the United States should be cleaned up or outlawed.

Tunney, on a brief visit to West Berlin, favors the appointment of a federal boxing commissioner to "get the sport back to what it was in the early 1920s."

He was the crown from Jack Dempsey on Sept. 23, 1926.

Tunney addressed a news conference at Tempelhof Airport together with former champion Max Schmeling, ex-champion Hans Henning and West German boxing promoter Hans-Joachim Wiese.

The two differed somewhat on whether the Nov. 22 title fight between Tunney and Schmeling should be a "clean" fight, with no "padding" or "padding" as Tunney called it.

### Britain Ends Capital Punishment

LONDON (AP)—The abolition of capital punishment for murder came into force in Britain today.

As the first full parliamentary session under Prime Minister Harold Wilson's Labor government opened at 3 p.m., the abolition bill and two other pieces of legislation were signed into law by a commission acting for Queen Elizabeth II.

The other measures make the treatment of racial violence a crime and set up a nationwide procedure for fixing fair rents. These three bills had been held over the summer recess because of objections on some details by the House of Lords. Parliamentary action was completed last week.

The second session of Parliament opens Tuesday with a speech by the queen outlining her government's second legislative program.

### Burning Crosses, Services Head Weekend Klan Rallies in 4 States

Burning crosses and memorial services for the Klan will be held over the weekend in four states.

Klan members, speculators and some hoodlums turned out in clashing Sun. Md.; Chesapeake, Va.; Lebanon, Ohio; and Austin, Tex.

The rally at Rising Sun, the first in Maryland in more than 40 years, drew a crowd Saturday night that newsmen estimated at about 2,000. However, Valon Nalinster, acting head of the state klavern, said there were at least 3,000 cars lined up before the counter "got tired and quit."

The Maryland rally featured memorial services for Daniel Buras, a New York Klan leader who killed himself when his Jewish background was disclosed, and Matt Murphy Jr., a Klan attorney from Birmingham, Ala., who was killed in an auto crash.

Last Friday, Georgia Grand Dragon Calvin Craig said a congressional investigation has produced new interest and "a million dollars' worth of publicity" for the KKK.

The Texas match, called a success by Exalted Cyclops Royce McPhail of Crockett, was marked by taunts and jeers from spectators as the Klansmen walked five blocks to the steps of the state Capitol Sunday. Five men identified as members of the American Nazi party walked with the Klan group.

A group of students, including several Negroes, marched beside the robed men at one point and sang the civil rights song, "We Shall Overcome."

When McPhail attempted to read a speech at the Capitol, students began an impromptu pop rally.

The Ohio rally Saturday night came after authorities in Hillsboro, Ind., prohibited a gathering in their state with a court order. James R. Venable of Stone Mountain, Ga., imperator of the White Night of the Klux Klan, denounced newsmen.

### Jordan Hits Resource Extremists

BOISE (AP)—Extremists in natural resource development Idaho Sen. Len B. Jordan said Sunday, are more detrimental to Idaho than extremists of the Left or Right.

Jordan, a Republican, mentioned no names but one natural resource issue in the state is proposed wild-scare bill sponsored by Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho.

Jordan opposes immediate inclusion of Idaho's Salmon and Clearwater rivers in the bill directed to progressive rivers in the natural state by prohibiting dams and other projects on them.

KAMPALA, Uganda (AP)—Communism has become an issue in a backstage fight, that threatens to divide the ruling Uganda People's Congress.

Two opposition parties are whipping up an anti-Communist campaign with warnings of assassination plots and subversion.

They have called on the government for an assurance that the threat of communism to Uganda is being exaggerated.

The left wing has hit back, charging the existence of anti-Communist hysteria designed to oust Prime Minister Milton Obote, by force if necessary.

A Communist core is active in Uganda, but even opposition leaders agree privately that the Red threat is being exaggerated for political motives. They contend Obote and some of his Cabinet colleagues have been reluctant to order a crackdown on Communist activities.

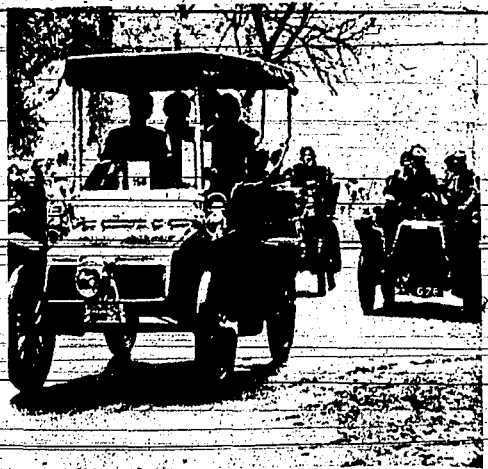

The purpose of the test on Amchitka Island in Alaska's Aleutian chain was to see if remote stations could detect the difference between an underground nuclear explosion. There have been less.

been no reports from official sources on the results of the tests.

R. D. Russell, of the University of British Columbia Physics Department, who was present on Amchitka during the test, said in his opinion it would be "very hard not to be able to tell" the difference between a nuclear blast and an earthquake.

RESCUE CHINESE—KITAKYUSHU, Japan (UPI)—A Japanese fishing boat Sunday rescued 20 Chinese aboard two drifting junks about 200 miles north of Shanghai. The Japanese Maritime Safety Agency said the junks had been damaged and were drifting helplessly.
