

## Area Man Killed When Train Hits Concrete Truck

A 4-year-old Hollister man died at 10:20 a.m. Tuesday when the Sumner Sand and Gravel Co. Concrete mixer truck he was driving was struck by a north-bound Union Pacific freight train at the old stockyard crossing near the U.S. 20 Curry-Crossing. Two and one-half miles west of Twin Falls. According to state police, the dead man, Tillman A. (Buck) Lytle, was driving the 1958 Mack concrete mixer truck east on the old stockyard road and apparently failed to see the approaching train. Harold R. Anderson, Pocatello, engineer of the train, said he saw the truck approach the crossing and slow down, but went onto the tracks where it hit his broadside by the engine.

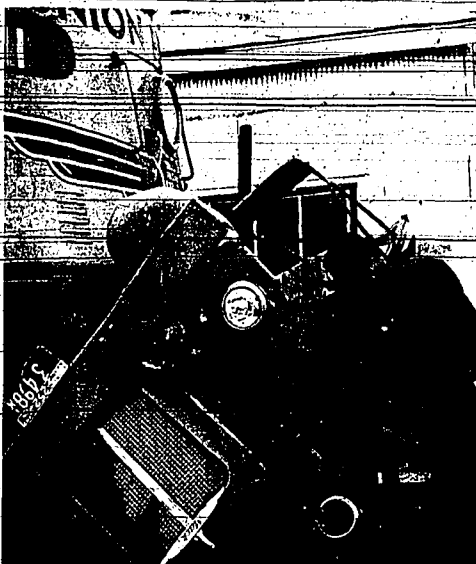

## Soviets May Hurt China's U.N. Chances

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—Delegates speculated today that the Soviet Union's intransigent opposition to support for the annual proposal to seat Red China in the United Nations did Beijing's chances more harm than good.

In a 12-minute speech at the end of Monday's opening round of the China debate, Soviet Ambassador Nikolai T. Fedorenko made a token appeal for admitting the Red Chinese. He accused the United States of trying by "hook or crook" to keep China from the world to come.

U.S. sources said Ambassador Arthur J. Goldberg noted that it was one of the briefest speeches Russia had delivered on the subject it once championed and that it apparently was delivered "just for the record."

Since the ideological dispute between Moscow and Peking-Soviet support for Red China has become "notable" public each year in the permanent debate.

To take such a step, said Goldberg, would only encourage the U.S. to keep on its "present path of violence."

## Rally Shows Support for Red Dismissal

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP)—A rally of more than 15,000 persons today supported a resolution demanding that Communist be dismissed from President Sukarno's cabinet.

The resolution also asked that martial law be declared throughout Indonesia to help the army's crackdown on the Communists. Martial law already has been declared in Jakarta and in parts of central Java.

The demands were presented at the rally to Second Deputy Premier Johannes Lemmonyo, who said he would pass them to Sukarno, Lemaena spoke to the crowd in Sukarno's name.

It was the first time since a high number of Sukarno's critics had spoken to an anti-Communist rally since the army carried its campaign against the Communist Oct. 1.

Sukarno has resisted pressure to ban the Indonesian Communist Party, but Sunday he is considering such a step.

## 58 Killed in Jet Airliner Crash Near Cincinnati

CINCINNATI, Ohio (AP)—A jet airliner within landing sight of the runway crashed and exploded during a lightning-laced thunderstorm Monday night, killing 58 of the 76 persons aboard. Three persons were killed in the exploding wreckage. One student, a high school senior, was in very critical condition. The American Airlines three-engine Boeing 727 jet crashed near the top of a 300-foot wooded hillside a mile and a half from the Greater Cincinnati Airport.

The wreckage flashed flames into the night sky for 30 minutes. Witnesses reported that the jet plunged into the hillside and burst into flames before beginning the gruesome search for bodies early today.

The Civil Aeronautics Board investigators flew to Cincinnati to begin probing the wreckage to learn why the plane had plunged fatally, but minutes from a safe landing after a flight from New York City.

The plane was barely visible in the downpour with sparks of lightning, said Mrs. Ralph Sprague, who lives nearby.

"We know what the end of that runway is just over the top of the hill," she said, "and the plane banked like it was heading for a landing, but was very low and dropping fast."

"I knew it was going into that hill, and I started screaming before it hit the hill," she said. "It crashed like a clap of thunder," said Mrs. Gilbert Dolwick, "in a minute we could hear people calling for help."

John Roper, president of Lanes farm where the plane crashed, raced to the wreckage to find a man and woman, both wearing airline uniforms, on the ground.

"We just didn't make it, we didn't see the hill," Dolwick said. The man and his muffled beeping were the only survivors.

The pilot and his first officer were taken to a hospital. The pilot, Capt. Dan J. O'Neill, 46, had 20 years of experience as a pilot and was a superintendent of flying at New York's La Guardia Airport.

His first officer, Capt. William J. O'Neill, 33, had been with American 14 years after flying 10,000 hours.

It was American's first jet crash since March 1, 1962, when a Boeing 707 jet crashed into the water shortly after taking off from New York.

## Paratroopers Kill 391 Red Troops

SALON, South Viet Nam (AP)—U.S. paratroopers fighting Communist forces in a battle north of Saigon killed 391 Communist troops, a U.S. spokesman reported today.

The spokesman said American casualties in the day-long battle Monday were moderate.

The 11th Airborne Brigade had suffered its heaviest casualties since it came to Viet Nam in 1965.

Losses were attributed to air attacks, heavy artillery and automatic weapons.

The battle occurred about 30 miles northeast of Saigon when a U.S. company encountered an estimated battalion—about 600 men—of the enemy. Within an hour a battalion of paratroopers was fighting.

The spokesman said that in one air artillery barrage killed 20 Viet Cong. Communist strippers all the bodies, apparently to prevent identification.

Unofficial sources said fighting continued during the night. U.S. Air Force B52s from Guam were used to drop napalm on a 10-mile D Zone 10 miles to the west, but a spokesman said the raid was directed only to the paratrooper operation.

## Missile Shot to Eniwetok Lagoon

VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP)—The Air Force today launched a missile from the West Coast's space center today to a target area about 4,500 miles across the Pacific Ocean, an Air Force spokesman said.

The intercontinental ballistic missile was launched by the Air Force industry team. The Air Force said it was the third test of an American long-range missile in a minimum 11 from Vandenberg.

### Small Towns Fight to Keep Doctors

ENON, Ohio (AP) — This village is fighting to keep its only medical doctor from being drafted as an overgrowth of the war in Viet Nam.

Townpeople carried the ballot to his draft board, only to find a second round had opened. The town's only dentist may be drafted, too.

Joel Vandergras, 32, Enon's physician, and Dr. James T. McMillin, 26, a dentist, have been ordered to undergo physical examinations, but neither knows yet whether he will be sent to Vietnam.

Residents sent petitions to Dr. Vandergras' draft board in Uniontown, Pa., his hometown, telling of the need in Enon for a doctor. The petitions were mailed Oct. 29, the day Dr. McMillin got his order to report for examination.

The draft board has not responded to the petitions, which Dr. Vandergras did not circulate.

"I don't know how much the service needs him," said Joe Young, who works at nearby Wright-Patterson Air Force Base like many of the 3,500 residents of Enon, "but he's the only medical doctor in this area."

Until Dr. Vandergras returns, residents went to doctors in Springfield or Hamilton, both about 100 miles away.

"That's not much good in case of an emergency," said Mayor Lawrence T. Davis.

Mayor Davis is providing for night or weekend calls.

"Dr. Vandergras is real fine about coming out at night," said Mrs. Charles Wade.

### Work Starts on Damaged Hiawatha Canal Headgates

HAILEY — Work to repair hundred yards upstream, but damaged the Hiawatha Canal headgates, spillway and feed channel from Big Wood River in last spring's flood was started this week. The headgates are located about five miles northwest of Hailey on the Josephine-Price property.

C-14-w-s-n Construction Co., Twin Falls, has the contract. The Soil Conservation Service is supplying technical assistance and the work is being done under an engineering agreement with the ASC, Rex Brattinwhite of the Blaine County office said.

"It was made possible by the Agricultural Conservation program. The headgates will be raised two feet. A 34-foot long open span spillway will have an outlet along the feed channel. A wing will extend downstream from the old headgate to the present one. The entire structure will extend eight feet below the channel and six feet above it.

First obstacle to be overcome is the elimination of water. All water was directed down the feed channel at the point of diversion from the river several

es irrigation water for some 25 ranches in the Hailey area. The ordinary flow into the feed channel is about one-fifth the river flow, with all excess over canal user's decrees being directed back into the river.

During last Spring's flood the river spread over an area of more than a half-mile in width for some distance above and below the "Hiawatha" headgates, and was running several feet over the top of the headgate wheels.

It was planned to have the work completed by Dec. 1. While water is turned on to the some five miles of canal, directors of the company are having it cleaned of all debris.

### Nothing Is Solved in Canada Vote

TORONTO (AP) — It was an election that Canadians wanted and it solved nothing.

That was the net result today of Prime Minister Lester B. Pearson's unsuccessful effort to win a majority in the House of Commons and a clearer mandate to carry his program.

Pearson thought he had such a victory within his grasp. He thought that Canadians were in for "Liberal prosperity" and "big" pay checks, were bound to come to the aid of his party.

So he called Monday's election. It cost Canada \$10 million. It cost Pearson a measure of prestige and left his Liberals still in power but with only 128 seats — short of a majority in the 265-seat House. That was just one seat more than the Liberals had when Pearson called the election.

The surprise to many was the strength shown by John G. Diefenbaker's Progressive Conservative Party. It won 99 seats, 7 more than it had and refurbished Diefenbaker's vote-getting prestige. The result looked like a reward for the hard-hitting campaign that Tory leader had fought.

A third party, the New Democrats, also increased its standing from 17 to 21 seats. These and the Conservatives' gains were largely at the expense of the Small Social Credit and Progressive parties.

One possibility out of all this is that Pearson will call another election. This seems unlikely because Canadians are tired of voting — they have had five elections in eight years.

### Device May Solve Water Pollution

LAS CRUCES, N.M. (UPI) — Engineers at New Mexico State University at Las Cruces have come up with a refrigerated device which may in time solve the nagging problem of water pollution.

It is an automatic monitor which gauges the amount of oxygen needed in sewage to prevent a polluting biological imbalance in water.

The method is akin to measuring the amount of oxygen in water. When scientists know how much oxygen is needed, they can treat sewage to keep it from fouling water.

The monitor was developed by Prof. John Clark of the University's engineering department in 1960. Now, with a three-year \$44,500 grant from U.S. Public Health Service experimentation in slitting into high gear.

It is a statistical fact that radiologists expose patients to relatively low doses have a higher death rate than their fellows who do not.

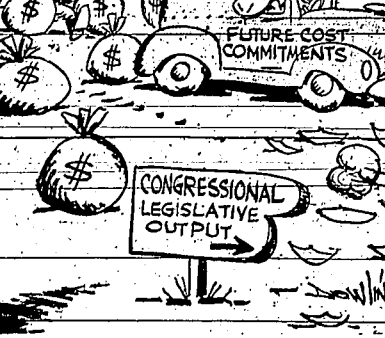

Sugar Bill Extension Becomes Law

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (AP)—President Johnson has signed into law a five-year extension of the sugar-bill that sets new foreign quotas and boosts the U.S. share of the market by \$50,000,000.

The provision to increase the domestic share of the sugar market was written into the bill after producers, claimed they were unable to unload huge warehouse surpluses.

The bill, signed Monday, had passed a congressional battle over foreign quotas after the House Agriculture Committee dropped the administration formula for allowing the market to be opened to foreign producers and wrote its own. Foreign producers were allotted about 40 percent of the U.S. sugar market with the rest filled by U.S. beet and cane growers.

Some House members contended that there were links between Washington lobbyists hired by foreign countries and the countries' share of the sugar quota.

Rep. Paul Findley, R-Ill., at one stage offered an amendment that would have cut a country's quota to zero if a U.S. lobbyist, Findley's proposal was defeated.

Quotas are valuable to foreign sugar producers because the U.S. price is set about \$10 a ton over the world price to give the American producers a chance to compete with lower foreign labor costs. The U.S. sugar market is about 10 million pounds a year.

# Orbiting Nuclear Missile Idea Rejected

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. officials have rejected the idea of orbiting nuclear missiles, saying the concept is too costly and too risky.

The idea, which has been proposed by several defense officials, would involve launching nuclear missiles into orbit around the earth. The missiles would be launched from a submarine and would remain in orbit until they were needed to be launched against a target.

U.S. officials said that the cost of launching and maintaining such missiles would be too high. They also said that the risk of a nuclear missile being launched accidentally would be too great.

By and large, the U.S. experts regard an orbiting nuclear missile as a psychological rather than a real military value.

These views, which have been expressed in the Pentagon for quite some time, were underscored by U.S. authorities after the Soviets paraded in Moscow a missile which they claimed can orbit the earth with a nuclear warhead.

American sources said the concept of putting an orbiting nuclear missile in orbit is no more difficult than orbiting any space vehicle. The missile would be launched by a submarine and would remain in orbit until it was needed to be launched against a target.

Such a weapon would be fired by radio command from the earth's surface — another technique that is well within the state of the art.

The problem of intercepting a missile fired on a trajectory from several thousand miles away is much more difficult than intercepting a vehicle in orbit.

As Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara said some years ago: "Earth-based missiles are only a minor part of this country's enormous retaliatory capability as represented by its more than 500 bombers, 500 Minuteman missiles, 500 Atlas missiles, and nearly 500 Polaris missiles in the tubes of submerged submarines."

McNamara has estimated that the United States has a 31 of edge in ICBMs alone. This country is believed well ahead in submarine-launched missiles. The United States has set up a minimum antissatellite defense in the form of two missile complexes in the Pacific.



- 2 1/2 cup sugar
- 2 slightly beaten eggs
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup cold water

- 2 yeast cakes
- 2 cups flour

In a large mixing bowl combine shortening and boiling water. Stir shortening until dissolved. In another bowl combine eggs, sugar, salt and cold water. Stir well.

Combine these two mixtures. Add yeast cakes which have been dissolved in lukewarm water.

Stir and beat in sifted flour (dough will not be nearly as stiff as kneaded dough) and stir divide dough in equal parts and place one-half amount in each mixing bowl. Cover and place in refrigerator to chill about three hours.

When dough has almost tripled in size, turn out on a lightly floured board. Roll to one-half inch thickness. Cut into circles about two and one-half inches in diameter. Brush with melted butter. Let rise to double in size. Bake in 425 degree for 25 minutes.

This dough may be used for cinnamon rolls, coffee cake, butterbuns, etc. It will keep for a week in the refrigerator.

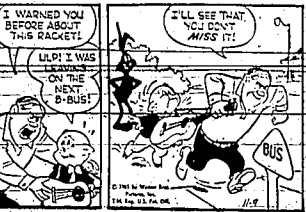

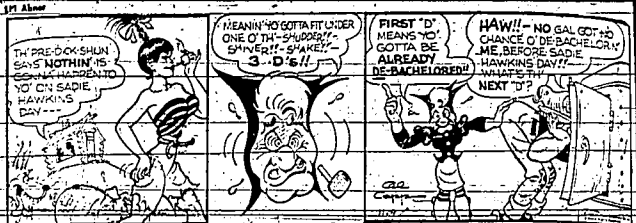

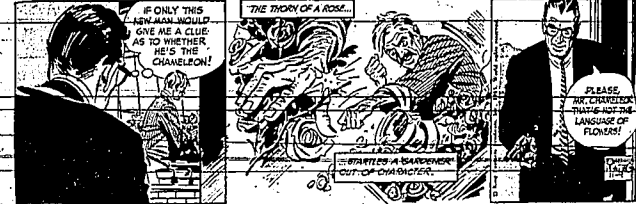

The feeling here is that the reports were prompted by news that the Pope would be in Rome in the next few days.

### Paralyzed Soldiers to Be Treated

NEWBURGH, N.Y. (AP)—Fifty-six South Vietnamese soldiers—all paralyzed from the waist down by battle injuries, arrived here today for medical treatment and rehabilitation ordered personally by President Johnson.

The soldiers were flown to Stewart Air Force Base from Saigon in a jet-engine jet used for personnel evaluation.

Looking bewildered and even a bit frightened, the paraplegics were carried from the huge plane on litters, covered with Army blankets and held securely with wide canvas straps.

They were put on buses and driven to Castle Point Veterans Hospital—a few miles away, where they will undergo medical treatment and rehabilitation.

They were accompanied by 14 Vietnamese doctors, nurses and medical corpsmen.

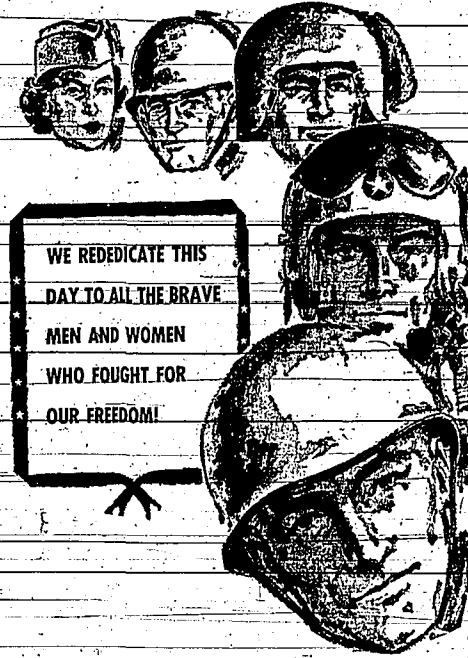
