NEW YORK (AP)—Lights flashed on in New York City today and transportation systems began to move, signaling the end to a massive and frightening blackout that crippled the teeming Northeast after 10 hours of worried waiting, the high came back on at 7:45 a.m. (EST) in the heart of Manhattan—one of the last areas still affected by the nation's worst power failure.

U.S. Casualties Highest Last Week

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—American casualties in the first week of November were the highest so far in the Viet Nam war—70 killed and 237 wounded, a spokesman reported today. Most of the Americans were killed in actions around the Special Forces camp at Plei Me, in the central highlands. The week before there were 42 American dead. The figures released today did not include the major battle Monday in the D Zone north of Saigon.

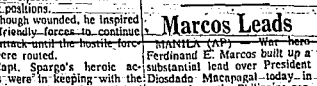

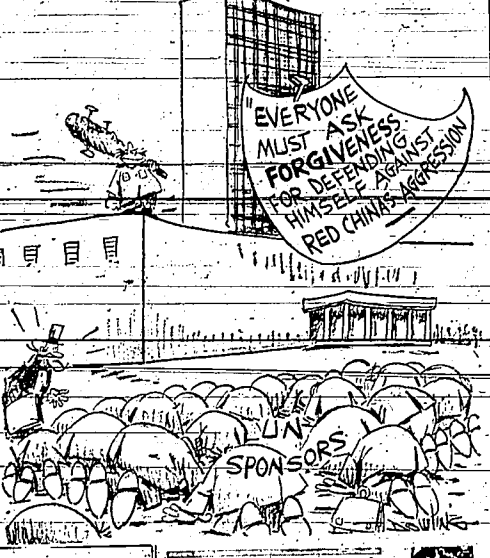

Portland Man Talks on Fish Problem

STANLEY — Kenneth Gates, representing the Columbia River Fish Producers Association, gave facts on the salmon run from the lower Columbia to the tributary rivers at a dinner meeting Saturday night at the Rod and Gun Club at the Rod and Gun Club.

He said that in the main 1962 run was between April 29 and May 20 about 107,850 of the 1962 salmon in the lower Columbia were taken by commercial fishermen.

Indians that year took only 3,514 fish. About 10 per cent of the river are lost in the still waters created by the dams in the river which the fish lose their sense of direction.

His group also feels, the speaker said, that the three states involved should have legislation to settle the matter.

Jim Decker, Stanley Chamber of Commerce president and Oregon administrator, introduced the speaker, Stanley, who told of the damage that closing of salmon fishing by the Fish and Game Department had done to the Idaho businessmen.

It was pointed out that all states will suffer if the fish cannot reach their natural spawning grounds and the young fish cannot find their way to the ocean.

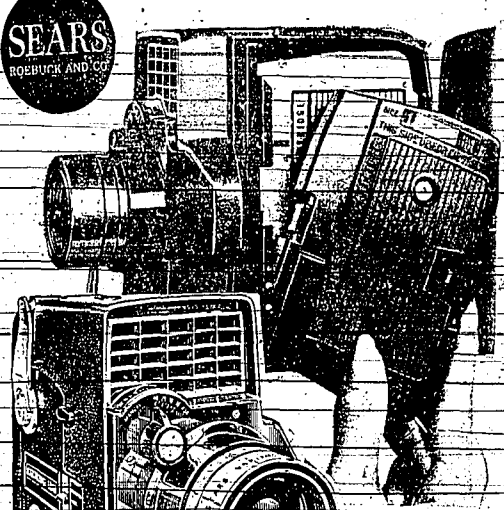

Council OK's New Roles For Laymen

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Vatican Ecumenical Council finished its first draft decree today, laying final approval of unprecedented new roles for Catholic laymen in their church's drive for reform.

The document proposes that for the first time in the church's 2,000-year history, a Vatican secretary be established to plan and encourage a wider role for nonordained Catholics in putting Christian principles to work in everyday life.

Approval of the document, which is titled the apostolate of the laity, was almost unanimous—the council fathers accepted it by a vote of 2,012-1.

This election was for the formal promulgation of the document as a council decree by Pope Paul VI and the council at a public session Nov. 16.

So far in the three-year-old council 10 decrees have been promulgated.

A document on divine revelation has also been completed and will be promulgated Nov. 18. The council's declaration on religious liberty is also expected to be ready by that date.

The other three uncompleted documents—on modern war, problems, missions and the papacy—will be scheduled for completion in time for promulgation at a public session Dec. 7. The council will close the following day.

The laity document is the first document ever produced by an ecumenical council that deals exclusively with the laity. As such, it symbolizes the aim of the church to make itself more a living part of the churchgoer's daily life.

Indians Try To Educate White Man

SANTA FE, N.M. (UPI) — Southwest Indians are trying a reverse twist in their old problem of education. They are bent on educating the white man.

That's because these Indians get a little testy when they see tourists buying fake Indian souvenirs in curio shops. It's easy to understand why.

In brochures and in person, laws which say any person who offers to sell or display Indian Products had better have the real thing. Fines can be levied up to \$2,000, and imprisonment can be invoked up to six months.

On top of that, the Indians are trying to point out to tourists who travel "New Mexico and Arizona the differences between authentic Indian products and factory produced souvenirs.

When buying jewelry, Southwest Indian jewelry falls into two general classes: silver-smithing and turquoise gem work.

Silver-smithing is associated generally with Navajos, Hopis and some Pueblo Indians along the Rio Grande in New Mexico. The Zuni Indians produce the finest turquoise work.

Aside from jewelry, Indian blankets are the second most copied craft of the Southwest artisans. But the Navajos have the best solution to the quandary of how to distinguish the real from the fake.

Navajos, they say, don't make blankets. They make rugs. In other words, if the material is light weight, don't buy it. Rugs made by Indians were intended for use on the floors of homes. They are heavy, rugged, and have even scratch bars along the bottom edge.

The quickest way to spot the genuine item, one Pueblo Indian in Santa Fe said, is by taking a good look at the sel and the price of the item. They built "look cheap" probably what they are.

Roof Being Put on New 4-H Camp Near Ketchum

HAILY—The 120 by 34-foot lodge at the Central Idaho 4-H Campsite in the Sawtooth National Forest is about to be put under cover.

Jack Mack and Wright-Duggan of Duggan and Sons, Hagerman, contractors, and William Sherwood-McCall cabin builder, who are doing the work, expect to have the A-frame rafters up and the roof on by the end of this week.

The lodge, which will serve as a campsite for 4-H'ers from Gooding, Elmore, Blaine, Cassia, Jerome, Twin Falls, Lincoln, Camas and Blaine counties, is up Quadrant Gulch, not far from Russian John ranger station. It is set amidst the pines and is truly a product of the forest.

The lodge is a seasonal ponderosa pine, milled to exact scale, gables are rustic cedar, roofing is two by six tongue and groove and the roof shakes are split cedar. The 5 by 10 inch rafters are Douglas fir cut in the vicinity of the campsite.

The building meets Forest Service specifications, with rafters five feet apart, secured with five inch tension bolts. One or two 1 1/2 inch metal six by eight inch gussets fastened with 3/4 inch bolts secure the joints.

A 7/8 inch section bar extends down from the top of each A-frame to the center of each frame beam for added strength.

Close by the back door of the lodge a well is being driven by Alan Devoe. Saturday they were down 60 feet and had a good flow of water.

Jim Eakin, Blaine County agricultural agent, who is supervising the work, said the campsite, with its lodge and 17 cabins, will require a flow of 30 gallons a minute. He said building is bringing up sand and gravel and after the drill had passed through a hard rock for up where they are," said Mack. mation some mud was encountered.

Williams Denies He'll Step Down

BOISE (UPI)—Idaho's dean of public officials has repeatedly turned down the secretary of state job. Denial was made by Arnold Williams, who said there was no truth in press reports (not by the way) that he would step down after the first of the year following appointment of another Democrat to the office.

The reports said Democratic Party officials had urged Williams to resign and succeed him. Williams would have incumbency to aid his 1966 election effort.

But Williams denied he had been asked to step down. In fact, he said, the "rumor" hadn't even occurred to him.

"It's merely a rumor," Williams said.

Secretary angrily arose and left the 67-year-old Williams' office last summer. He has since returned to work and said he intends to stay in office "as long as my health is good."

"After the first of the year if my health is good and the doctor thinks it's advisable, I may run for another term," Williams said.

A former legislator, lieutenant governor and governor, Williams is serving his second term as secretary of state.

Gov. William E. Drew, a Democrat serving as governor during Gov. Robert E. Smith's absence from Idaho, said he hadn't heard talk of Williams resigning within his party. He said the subject was mentioned to him, however, by Drew.

Drew would not comment on the political issue involved in the speculation.

"I think the secretary of state is capable of doing his own thing," Drew said.

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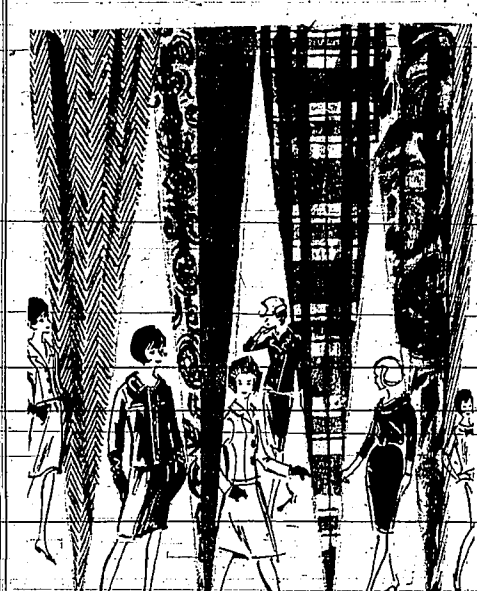

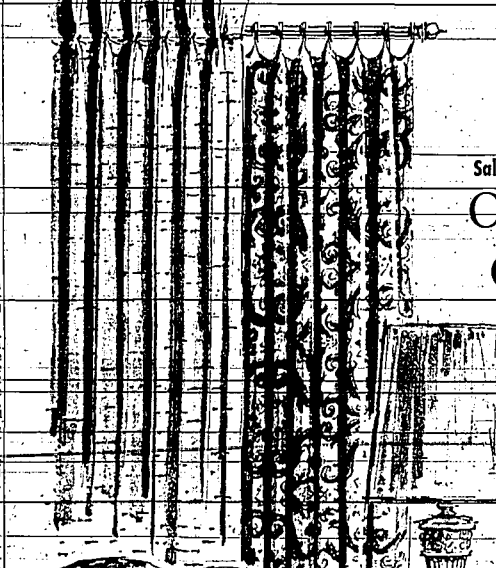

Emergency generating systems at big strategic Air, Army and Navy installations in the affected area were cut into operation almost instantly as emergency from commercial centers cut off.

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Guard, CAP Report on Field Work
