## Producers Of Metal Concede

WASHINGTON (AP) — One of the nation's four major aluminum producers has backed down today in the wake of stern Johnson administration opposition and canceled price increases as government had called discriminatory.

The Aluminum Co. of America has agreed to withdraw its price increases announced Monday. Reynolds Metals followed two hours later. Kaiser Aluminum and Chemalloy Corp., that biggest joined in, after being informed that form called the price "restorations" and said its own followed "several cancellations" by other major produ-

cers.

On Oct. 30, Reynolds and the one big idea at the time, Alaska's decision to cancel the price increases was announced. A day later, it called night press conference by Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara. He said it as a "patriotic act" and a defense measure also as the government agreed to an immediate resumption of negotiations for the orderly dismantling of a surplus of 4 million tons of aluminum now held in strategic stockpiles.

McNamara said he believed a government would be able to limit the amount of aluminum imports of foreign countries, especially Soviet Russia and West Germany, and reduce disruption of

surplus materials from the USSR.

On Saturday, when federal officials descended on the city, they also were told that the agency was considering reducing 200,000 tons from the surplus.

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## Students Hear Air Force General on Veterans Day

"It would be a disservice to those men and women fighting in Viet Nam, to let the actions of an infinitely small group of draft card burners and demonstators speak for the people of our nation," Lt. Col. Dean LeBally, director of information, to the students of Twin Falls High School, at a special Veterans Day assembly held at 11 a.m. Thursday in the school gymnasium. LeBally

went on to comment, "It would be an even greater mistake for any who would be aggressor to think that this small minority represents the true determination of the United States."

## Army Notes Urgent Need For Nurses

Sgt. I.C. Gordon, 1, Snapp, local Army recruiter, announced this week the Army has sent out an urgent call for registered nurses.

According to Sgt. Snapp, the need is greatest for nurses at this time.

He said the Army offers many advantages in qualified registered nurses.

"The registered nurse who volunteers for service at this time can't be replaced," said Sgt. Snapp. Nurses are offered choices of assignments, hospitals in which to serve and, in some cases, selection of which overseas assignment they desire.

Nurses are offered their choice of serving in one of 13 major Army hospitals in the United States or one of three foreign countries, Germany, Korea, Japan or France.

Each year, the service offers a choice of four assignments, Sgt. Snapp said. Qualified registered nurses will be given their choice of training in specialized fields such as, operating rooms, obstetrics, internal and child health and neuro-psychiatry.

He emphasized the pay of the Army nurse is fair compared to civilian pay. \$105 per month for entry into the Army for a nurse entering the Army for the first time. Nurses are commissioned officers, which going on active duty and receive pay, benefits and prestige of an officer in the Army.

## Business Mirror

NEW YORK (AP) — The price of aluminum may have peaked, but the administration is still pushing ahead with its program to increase communication between the Johnson administration and the aluminum industry.

Bill Gardner, chairman of the Council of Economic Advisors, told the Senate yesterday that some business firms have an unwarrented indifference to free operation of the market.

In the view of the administration, the guidelines are routine fare to the Great Society. As some business firms view it, the aluminum industry in an attempt to raise prices, should exceed the economy's average productivity increase of about 12 per cent.

They are but one of several major industries, for example, that have been asked to restrict voluntarily overseas investments to maintain the stability of the dollar.

The guidelines are not based on legislation. Rather they are endorsed positively by a call to patriotism or the national interest in which manufacturers ignore—and negatively by the ominous threat of hard legislation.

In the case of aluminum, enforcement of the guidelines has been added indirectly by the fact that the federal government is the industry's biggest customer and competitor.

Some labor leaders as well as

businessmen have criticized the guidelines as "unworkable" and "of little value." It is noted that it is not the high cost to the nation of the forces of the market place that blunted the over-regulation

## KNOW PREFIXES, SUFFIXES

### Another Way to Increase Vocabulary Is Outlined

Learn syllables which stand before: They're prefixes like pre, post, fore.

Complete the picture, as you should: Learn suffixes like ness, y, hood...

Remembering them is easy, too: You can remember—1) put old knowledge to work and derive old words from words you already know; 2) find clues to the meaning of a strange word in the surrounding words and sentences. The third way to develop your vocabulary is to come to all new reading prepared with a knowledge of the meanings of prefixes and suffixes.

First of all, there are not very many of them; secondly, they occur very great frequency; thirdly, they occur in such short words that there is little effort to memorize their meanings. Here again, fall back on your old knowledge and make it work for you. Suppose we do just that.

Autobiography, automobile, automatic, autonomous. The common prefix in all these words is what does it mean? Simply find the element that is common to all the meanings of those four words. In the case of these words, that element is self. The suffix governs.

Forewarning, foreground, automation, foreboding, forewarning. You have the common prefix fore; you need the meaning. What element is common to the meaning of each word? Before—in advance? Now you know the meaning of another prefix.

Intercon, international, interstate, intersect. The prefix inter, you know, means "between" among."

Inside, insideout, insatiable, insatiable, insatiable, insatiable, inside. The prefix in—means "inside" within."

We do the same for such prefixes as circum, ante, ante, sub, ad, post, ad, trans and whatever few others there are, and you will come to new words prepared at least with a knowledge of their prefixes. Suppose we try this method now with words you know.

Boyhood, examine, examine, examine, examine, boyhood, examine. The common suffix is hood. Examine what each word means to you. "the condition of being a boy"; "the condition, or state, of being a boy"; "the condition, or state, of being a mother"; "the condition, or state, of being a knight"; "the suffix hood, when you encounter it in a new word, will mean what you have just now discovered for yourself: "the condition, or state of being."

Tasteless, faultless, spiritless, meanless. The common prefix is less, and the common element in the meaning of each word is "without, lacking."

There is no point in beating a dead horse. Other suffixes—able, ible, ness, ible, y, ful, etc.—may also be learned the same way. Add this additional purpose to your reading: be on the lookout for prefixes and suffixes and derive the meaning of these prefixes in your memory of words, and the richer the storehouse from which you may continue to draw new meanings from old knowledge.

One obvious caution should be mentioned here. Many words have double meanings, some words, perhaps, only or suffix only; many words have more than one prefix or suffix. Use all three methods where the situation allows; where none of these will work for you—see tomorrow's article.
