

Pilot Tells Investigators Of Jet Crash

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The pilot's version of what happened when a jet airliner went down in the mountains of 91 persons aboard last Thursday night was given to investigators behind closed doors Sunday morning.

The spokesman for the Civil Aeronautics Board said the information from Capt. G.C. Kehmeier, 45, of Denver, would probably be made public at a hearing next week.

It was the third crash of a Boeing 727 since last August and the second within a week.

In Washington, Capt. Kehmeier said he was saving it had reason to believe the three crashes were related.
