Integration Plan Is Hit By 2 Groups

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two organizations seeking to promote more effective school desegregation said today the government's program was not the result of "paper compliance and continued segregation."

The American Friends Service Committee and the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund made the statement today in a memorandum to Secretary of Welfare John W. Gardner in which they made recommendations.

They said their experience supported the Southern Regional Council's finding that "fewer than six per cent of the 'Deep South's Negro pupils are in desegregated situations. This is not just a statistic. This is a human tragedy."

They said the government workers and American citizens are concerned about the potential danger in mounting despair with democratic processes when Negroes see federal laws, regulations, and court orders flagrantly or subtly violated and observe federal officials too timid, unwilling or powerless to enforce them, the memorandum said.

LeMay Reviews Bombing Method

NEW YORK (UPI)—Gen. Curtis E. LeMay, retired Air Force chief of staff, said United States bombing strategy in the West was wrong but should be extended to include industrial complexes near Hanoi.

LeMay, also a former commander of the Strategic Air Command, said bombing North Viet Nam would make it too expensive for the Communists to carry on a war against South Viet Nam.

Third Engineer of Cruise Ship Has Sleepless Nights

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Third engineer Harry Spirio of the cruise ship Yarmouth Castle "didn't sleep for two nights—and he is wondering if he will be checked aboard."

His new assignment: crew member on the Yarmouth, sister ship of the Yarmouth Castle. "I don't know if I will ever erase the memory of those flames," he said.

Spirio, 42, interviewed in the Bahamas today aboard the Yarmouth. Eighty-one passengers and two crewmen are believed to have perished when the Yarmouth Castle went down Saturday off Great Stirrup Cay, about 60 miles northwest of Nassau.

Passenger Norman Lehr of Miami Beach died of burns in a Nassau hospital. His body will be flown to Miami in a private plane.

Many survivors said there was no warning as fire swept the ship—the water-spinkler system didn't work, fire hoses lay unused on the deck and that only 4 of 14 lifeboats were lowered.

But a Coast Guard investigator said Monday the Yarmouth Castle passed a Coast Guard safety check three weeks before the sailing.

Third engineer Spirio said the alarm went off in the forward section and he spread the alarm to the crew sleeping below deck.

"The fire never reached the engine room or the crew's quarters," he explained. "I think it started somewhere in one of the more expensive forward cabins."

He said hose pipes and lifeboats in the forward section were burned.

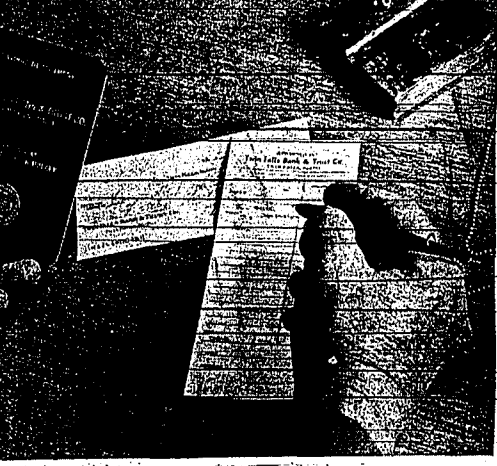

Negligence Charged in Wolf Case

IDAHO FALLS (AP)—A \$70,000 law suit against the city of Idaho Falls has been filed in Ninth District Court here in behalf of 9-year-old DeVonna Higbee of Pocatello.

The little girl was bit by wolves last March when she reached into a cage at the Tautphaus Park Zoo.

The suit charges the city with negligence under the so-called "attractive nuisance" law. The plaintiffs claim it is natural for a child to attempt to pat or feed animals in a zoo.

The suit says the city is negligent in placing such vicious animals as wild wolves in a pen next to one of the zoo's walkways.

The same two wolves that bit her had to be exterminated after the June 6 attack on 6-year-old Stephen Daniel of Idaho Falls, who lost the lower part of her right arm in the mauling.

A \$300,000 claim for her was rejected last week by the city council and is being negotiated by her attorney and the city insurance firm. The city has also rejected a claim by the Higbee girl.

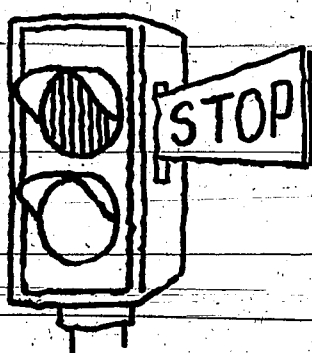

Demand to Decry Reds Is Rebuffed

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The Vatican Ecumenical Council today rebuffed a conservative demand that it denounce communism. Then it approved a strong statement against racial discrimination and accepted a declaration on birth control.

The three votes were sections of the council on modern world problems which will enter scrutiny in the assembly in St. Peter's Basilica.

More than two-thirds of the council fathers voted approval of the schema chapter on atheism in its current form, which does not specifically mention communism. This majority was big enough to block a last-minute conservative effort to insert a detailed denunciation of communism by name.

The document's section on racial discrimination was adopted by a vote of 2,015 to 33. This section recently was strengthened to say that all forms of "discrimination must be created and removed."

Birth control is treated in two sections, one on conjugal love and another on fecundity of marriage. The first section was approved by 2,021 to 81. The second was accepted by 2,011 to 140.

The document discusses birth control in a general way, leaving responsibility for family planning to the couples themselves, but it states that in countries, Roman Catholic couples must not use means forbidden by the Church.

While affirming the right of couples to decide the size of their families, the document is not viewed as a definitive answer to the birth control questions in the minds of millions of Roman Catholics. The answers to those questions, including the use of contraceptives, are expected to come from Pope Paul VI. He has assigned a special commission to study the questions.

Reds Launch Second Shot To Venus

MOSCOW (AP)—The Soviet Union's second space launch launched its second space probe toward the planet Venus with five days.

Tass said the launching of the unmanned automatic space station Venus 3 was similar to the launching of Venus 2 last Friday.

Tass said "Venus 3" is expected to reach Venus about the end of February, but the Russians have not said whether they expect to "crash" into the planet or by past it collecting scientific data.

The only other announced Soviet probe of Venus in 1961, failed when its radio went silent and the craft missed the planet by about 100,000 miles. Western space watchers think the Russians have tried and failed at least six other times to send probes to Venus.

America's Mariner 2 passed 21,848 miles from Venus on Dec. 14, 1962. It radioed back data on temperature, magnesium and other constituents. It is giving their clearest knowledge so far of the planet.

Tass said Venus 3, like Venus 2, was launched into a "heliocentric" orbit around the sun.

"The main purpose of the probe is to add to our knowledge of Venus and outer space," Tass said.

Venus 3 weighed 3,116 pounds, approximately the weight of Venus 2, Tass said.

Venus 2 and Venus 3 have somewhat different scientific equipment to carry out different types of investigations, the announcement said.

Venus 3 was following a course close to the planned one, the announcement said. This is the standard practice for such announcements, indicating they are going fairly well.

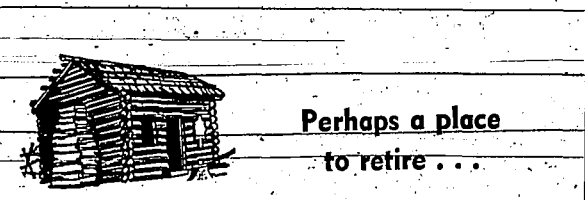

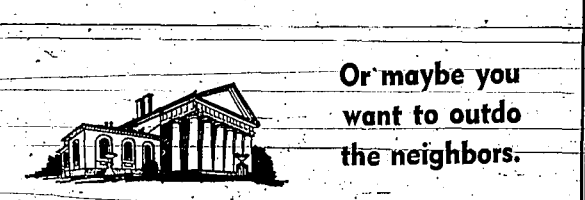

Red China Sees Dispute Unsettled

WASCO (AP)—The Soviet Union declared today that Communist China views the Moscow talks as a "dispute" and is not settling it.

Peking's organ pointed out that the Chinese government is "not prepared to accept the fall of Nikita Khrushchev in October 1964."

The article was clear in its message: whether it is a defense or whether it is the way for a new Soviet offensive that could lead to a rift with China which Westerners long have expected.

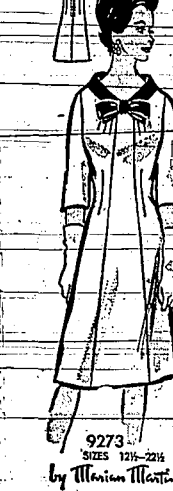

Coming back, the jet veered to the left after coming out of the measured mile and struck the concrete wall. The spectators said they feared he was out of control. But the chute popped open, and he landed safely beside his trailer-wheeled hauler.
"I wanted to park my car in the garage," he joked as he climbed to the ground.
The north-south run has had its dangers for Breedlove. Last year, his first Spirit of America went out of control and plunged into a drainage ditch. This summer he present-day faltered, swerved and almost went into the ditch again. Breedlove escaped injury both times.
"This was my greatest thrill in racing," said Breedlove when Joe Petrali, auto club chief, informed him of the record.

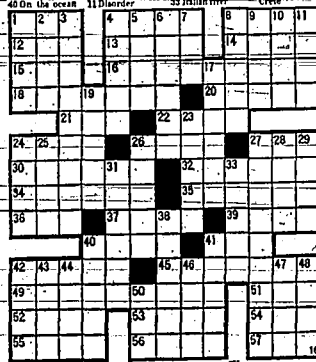

Construction of Dairy Barn Is Given Approval by Youth Ranch Officials

REPORT—Construction of a new dairy barn at the Idaho Youth Ranch and the foundation for the permanent unit which will be scheduled to begin next week. The barn will be located at the same site as the old barn during the regular meeting held Saturday afternoon at the ranch.

Final plans were approved for the new barn by the Youth Ranch officials on an estimated cost of \$30,000 including building and foundation. The Youth Ranch fund has a balance of \$2,000 contributed by Idaho State Fraternal Order of Eagles.

The barn will meet Grade "A" specifications and will include a milking room, processing room, cooling and will be capable of handling 40 cows per year. The new barn will be a professional job under the supervision of Mel Kirk, Chief Electrician and Pel Kirk, Chief Plumber.

Foundation for the third ranch building will be poured and the first excavation work was done during the single story structure with very minor changes.

During the October meeting of the board, the directors voted to have a master plan developed for the entire ranch and this was completed. The third ranch building will be completely designed and will be a single story structure rather than the original two story plan.

The new building will be of the concrete and steel type with a laundry, living room, kitchen and dining room, and extra milking room. The new plan includes a special nursing room for sick babies, parents' room, a house, parents' room.

All major reductions in the original plan have been made and as well as long-term heating and maintenance cost being met by the new structure.

A full basement will contain rooms, a hobby room, storage and laundry facilities.

Clyde Greenwell, Paul, was named as new director for the Youth Ranch, having lived 1 1/2 miles in the Paul, Burley of Rupert area.

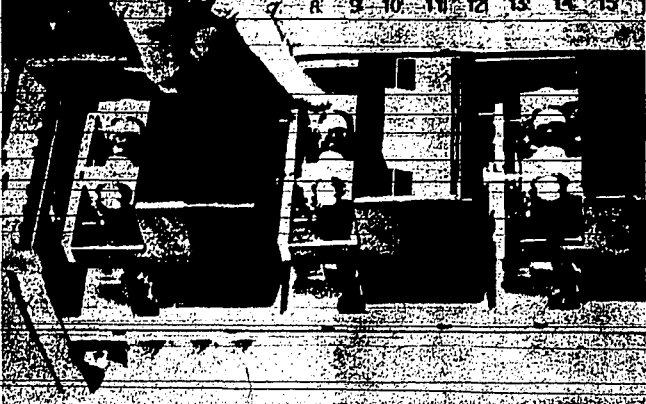
