Doctors Study Glands of Utah Children

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The director of the Utah State Health Department, Dr. G. D. Carly Thompson, said Wednesday about nine school children from the St. George area would be hospitalized next week for further study of their thyroid glands.

Their glands have abnormal growth, he said. The Utah State Public Health Service is trying to determine if there is any connection between the children and the heavy radioactive fallout that hit the St. George area during Nevada nuclear bomb tests in the 1950's.

A panel of experts has examined 70 of the St. George children. Dr. Thompson said 43 were found to be normal as far as their thyroid glands were concerned. All had previously been suspected of having the growths.

He said about nine would go to the University of Utah Medical Center for the most detailed diagnostic studies. The other 18 of the 70, he said, would be examined again in six months, because last week's examinations on them did not indicate any immediate necessity for further study.

2 Suits Are Filed in Ship Sinking

MIAMI (UPI) — Two court suits seeking a total of \$3.23 million in damages from the makers of the ship Yarmouth owners of the ship Yarmouth filed today there were filed. The suits charged that the failure of equipment and crew failures on the cruise liner burned and sank off the Florida coast with a loss of 83 lives.

The suits were filed Wednesday by survivors of the Saturday disaster, one of them critically burned in a Miami hospital, as the Coast Guard sought to convene a board of inquiry to formally investigate the sinking.

The 366-foot liner, bound from Miami to Nassau with 550 passengers and crewmen aboard, went down about 125 miles east of Miami, about 100 miles from Miami. A freighter and another cruise ship rescued 426 survivors.

One suit for \$2.23 million was filed in the New York State Supreme Court by Harry Elmer New York City on behalf of himself and his wife, Sylvana, listed among the missing passengers.

Anne Martin Jackson, 82, critically burned in the fire and killed by Miami's Jackson Memorial Hospital, filed the other suit for \$1 million. Her mother Louise Jackson of Vero Beach, Fla., was a victim of the disaster.

Failure Began With Small Bit of Equipment

NEW YORK (AP) — History's worst power failure apparently began in a piece of equipment the size of a household electric meter. But the larger question is what to prevent it from happening again — according to power engineers.

Immediate cause beyond the immediate cause of the recent massive blackout.

It is troubling defense planners, government officials, and power company executives, and has caused at least the 30 million persons whose utter dependence on electricity became dramatically clear Nov. 9-10 to wonder about the very nature of a power grid, the distribution system which enabled the failure to "zip across the Northeast in a run of a week."

Power grids are interlocking networks of utility company lines which now extend to the Rockies and in a few years are expected to link 48 contiguous states in one big party line.

"The electrical engineer Lawrence J. Hollander, "There is nothing wrong with the theory," Hollander is assistant to the dean of New York University's School of Engineering and Science, and is one of a few academic men in the United States whose scholarship field is power generation, transmission, and distribution. When the lights went out last week Hollander was the middle of a lecture on the effects of lightning striking transmission lines.

The power grid theory, in broad terms, involves companies with power to spare sending it quickly on interconnecting electric lines to companies with temporary shortages.

Years ago, each company operated independently. Each had to have what was called spinning reserve — spare generators rotating but not producing electricity — in case of an emergency.

But now, to make sense, then, for two companies to agree to keep a single spinning reserve to supply both. The more companies that agree, the better. In the Northeast, United States, 42 companies are thus interlocking.

Among them are more than 400 generators, all linked together. Another advantage of such a network is that electricity can be delivered to customers more economically.

But generators tend to be inefficient, producing electricity at a high cost — 6.5 cents a kilowatt hour. Newer ones can do it for as low as three-tenths of a cent. A kilowatt hour is the amount of electricity that will light ten 60-watt bulbs for an hour.

Many times it's cheaper for a company to buy extra electricity for demanding customers from another company, which has efficient generators operating — than to produce its own with only tired old machines on hand.

Electricity, when stored, it must be produced the instant demanded. Computers tell companies at a moment when the cheapest electricity is available within the network.

These networks have been formed throughout the country, and all of them are connected with neighboring networks. But at present the inter-network connections are generally weak.

Thus trouble in one network usually stays there. They're much like big water systems, connected only with good hoses. The eventual plan is to replace the weak connections with strong ones, thus expanding the company's buddy system between networks.

And thus also expanding the area vulnerable to a house-of-cards power failure.

"Not necessarily," said engineer Hollander. "Time zones

and seasonal differences can save us."

But how vulnerable is a network to — dare anyone mention a sabotage?

"I wanted to knock out the entire Northeastern United States, just as happened here," said Hollander. "I would pick a Thursday or Friday night just before Christmas — that would be a time of enormous load — lots of lights, stores open for shoppers, cold weather. That would be the time to do it. And it would simply cause some damage to the backbone line."

The backbone line is the extra high voltage — 24V — wire running from the big plants at Niagara Falls through Buffalo, Rochester, Syracuse, Utica, Albany and Poughkeepsie to New York City. At some points, it's the route, but not all, there are more backup systems, more redundancy.

Hollander said when the backbone line is heavily loaded the generators are extremely sensitive, subject to the slightest disturbance.

That was exactly the situation the evening of the big blackout, Hollander said. "Sometimes the New York City at that time was drawing enormous amounts of power from the huge Niagara sources."

Something caused — a disturbance — nobody wanted to know what — and the little relay box signaled a circuit breaker to

open near the giant plant at Niagara Falls.

Instead of isolating the troubled line, the breaker sent its message to other lines, already loaded. They couldn't handle the excess.

The current flowing to New York reversed itself, like a big bit in a punctured tire, rushed to the point-of-least-resistance, draining the power from the city.

At a different time of day, under a lesser load, generators throughout the system, might have met the sudden demand.

But generators, like donkeys, will do only as much as they are capable and no more. When they sensed electrically that they couldn't meet the demand they cut themselves off to protect their own wiring, click, click, click, and 60,000 square miles went dark.

Yes, Hollander said, it could happen again. But in his view expanding the grid system would do more to reduce that chance than increase it.

Sen. Kennedy Threatened On Telephone

LYNN, Mass. (UPI)—A threat was made on the life of Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., Wednesday, five days before the second anniversary of the assassination of his brother,

President John F. Kennedy, police disclosed today. Lynn Police Chief George Donnelly said he received an anonymous telephone call from a man who said Sen. Kennedy will not reach City Hall alive. The man hung up. Police were unable to trace the call. Donnelly quickly assigned extra police to help those already guarding the senator during his speaking tour here. The threat was not made known to the senator. There was no incident and no Kennedy's program was canceled as he visited City Hall and other areas in this city 11 miles north of Boston.

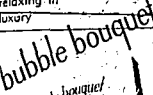

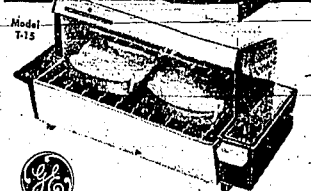

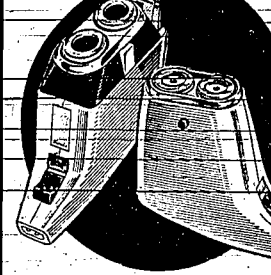

Tax Applies To Personal Property

(BOISE AP)—The Idaho Tax Collector's Office said today the 1952 Sales Tax Law applies to sale of personal property included in the sale of a business.

The 3 per cent tax Collector Floyd West said, must be applied to tangible personal property not held for resale. Property purchased for resale is subject to tax on its final sale but not as part of a transaction involving sale of a business.

West said forms are available from the tax collector's office on which to report the sale of a business.

West listed this example: Seller sells a grocery business for \$20,000. The purchase price is allocable as follows: \$10,000 to inventory, \$3,000 to accounts receivable, \$3,000 to a delivery truck used in the business and \$4,000 to fixtures such as display counters, cash registers, freezers, etc.

The inventory is purchased for resale and is not subject to tax. The accounts receivable are intangibles and not subject to tax.

The part of the price allocable to the purchase of the truck and fixtures is taxable. Thus, the seller will collect in tax of \$200 computed at 2 per cent on \$1,000 which would be in this example, \$1,000 for the fixtures and \$3,000 for the delivery truck.

Microfilm Machine Bought For Use by Minidoka County

RUPERT—A new microfilm machine costing about \$3,500 has been added to the county recorder's office, to provide better service, August Betke, county clerk, reports.

The machine will facilitate recording of legal documents, and will save space and time, he notes.

The new microfilm is capable of filming both sides of a legal instrument in less than a minute and ejects the finished film encased in a card, ready for filing.

Each legal instrument filmed for the county is filmed on three cards, one of which is kept on file in the recorder's office, one to be placed in security and one for the Rupert Abstract Co.

Some 5,000 legal instruments go through the recorder's office each year, according to Betke, and with the new service, one small box is capable of holding 1,000 of the film cards, saving a good deal of space.

Public service will be speeded up by the machine also, he added.

In addition to the new machine, an old microfilm used in the office for many years will be made to film old court records to make room in the vault as "time permits," he said.

With the old machine it was necessary to send the films to Salt Lake City for processing, but the new machine will produce a completed copy in the county office—in less than a minute.

The new system will be completed over a five-year period, for old files will be gone through when time permits, to pick up old records for filming and filing.

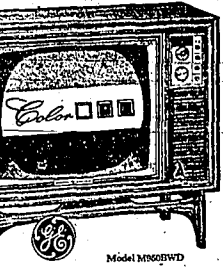

NEW YORK (AP)—The armistice in the aluminum war still leaves a parcel of problems hanging fire in the government's stockpiling of materials for defense.

Even the tentative agreement between the Johnson administration and the Aluminum producers on disposing of surplus metal in government storage will be subject to congressional approval, it might also be wiped by future turns in the course of the economy and the cold war.

The surplus of aluminum has caused battles between industry and government before, and doubtless will again.

In 1962, President John F. Kennedy charged that excessive quantities had been bought. Disputes broke out over how to dispose of surplus without the disrupting current industry.

But the Johnson administration can dispose of only 500,000 tons on its own, says one source. It will require congressional action to release the other 20,000 tons.

And since the armistice calls for gradual sale of government stocks over a long period of years, the price the government will be getting will vary from time to time.

The armistice doesn't guarantee that the market price always will be 2 1/2 cents a pound, and market prices vary up or down as the market dictates.

Right now the aluminum industry can absorb the government surplus without losing. Supplies are tight, and demand is increasing if the economy's pace slackens later on, and if the demand for the

al activity or giving some unlearned windfalls to individual companies or industries.

The aluminum war centered on the threatened use of the government stockpile to scotch a price rise announced early this month by the big producers.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—From all available evidence, the American Negro is making the progress in overcoming one of the last—and perhaps the toughest, big areas of racial discrimination: housing.

On Nov. 20, 1962, President John F. Kennedy, with much fanfare, issued an executive order to end discrimination in housing, built with government help.

Three years later, the order was supposed to have had little effect in mixing Negroes and whites in the same neighborhoods, colonies, and ranch houses being built by the thousands in suburbia are not for the Negro.

The record is somewhat better in public housing. And it's still too early to say how it will go on urban renewal. But even in the urban centers, what starts out as open housing to all races often ends up all-Negro.

Few Negroes have managed to join the flight to suburbia. The barriers are too high for the Negro to surmount in any substantial numbers.

Talk to civil rights people, government officials and builders and you'll find remarkable agreement on the reasons for the meager progress.

Reason one—The Kennedy order is anemic at best.

Reason two: Efforts to enlarge it strike close to home, literally and figuratively. Many qualified Negro but resent living next door in him.

Congress recognized the sensitivity of the housing field by exempting it from the 1964 civil rights bill. It covered everything from public accommodations to jobs. That measure directed the government to cut off federal funds being used to maintain racial discrimination. But it specifically exempted new housing being built under Federal Housing Agency (FHA) guarantees; the largest single segment of housing under the presidential order.

The Kennedy order was something for the future. When issued in 1962, it exempted existing commitments to builders. It was recognized that there was enough work outstanding to keep builders going for perhaps two years. The real testing period would come in the third year.

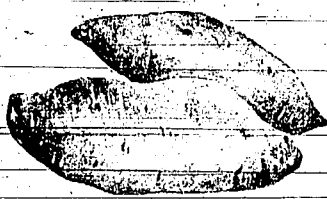

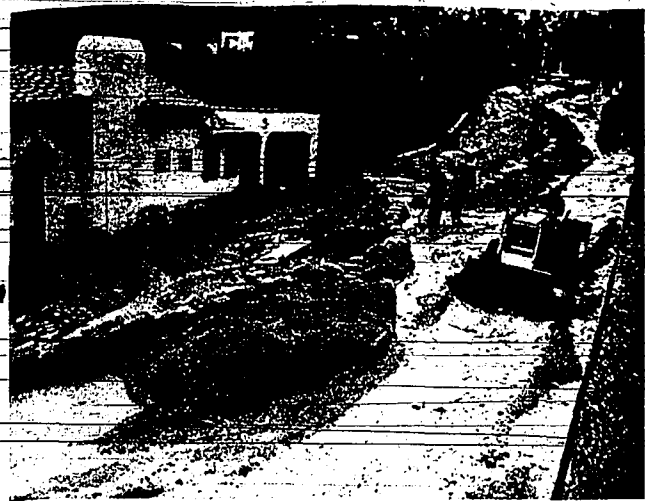

Pakistan

Agrees to Talk in Russia

MOSCOW (UPI) — President Mohammed Ayub Khan of Pakistan has agreed to meet Prime Minister Lal Bahadur Shastri of India in the Soviet Union to discuss the India-Pakistan situation, it was announced today.

(New Delhi by the Soviet government an Indian answer is now awaited.)

The finance minister of India, T. T. Krishnamachari, announced this today at a news conference. He has held talks in the last few days with Premier Alexei N. Kosygin and Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko.

During the India-Pakistan fighting in September, Kosygin invited the two leaders to meet in the Soviet Union.

India accepted unconditionally, as spokesman said Sept. 23, Pakistan neither accepted nor rejected—the message—because of the unstable conditions over-ruled.

Minister Zulfikar Ali Bhutto wrote about 10 days ago that Ayub Khan was willing to accept the message described in this as a clarification of the September reply which was made to convince the Russians of a genuine Pakistan desire to accept.

The Pakistan sources said Bhutto tentatively is scheduled to come here next Tuesday on his way to the United Nations. Bhutto said in Pakistan last week he would complain about Soviet arms shipments to India.

Thanksgiving shoppers can reap a bountiful harvest at the food markets across the land this weekend.

The traditional turkey will be featured at most stores, but will cost more in Los Angeles. Elsewhere, prices have changed little. The number of turkeys available is up 5 per cent from last year, and there is everything from 30-pound birds to cut-up ones and turkey rolls.

There is little of the corn that played such a big part in the first Thanksgiving, but there are heavy supplies of pecans, nuts, oranges, grapefruit, apples and bananas, with prices down. Cranberry prices are edging upward on holiday buying increases.

In most areas, beef is a good buy, with roasts and steaks favorably priced. Pork chops, roasts and hams are available, and there may be bargain tags on lamb chops and roasts.

\$5 Billion Unclaimed by Lost Heirs

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Meet Larry Craig, tracer of lost heirs. He may be looking for you.

Craig, a private investigator, has been hired by a network television show to search for missing heirs to estates that will otherwise revert to the states as unclaimed.

Craig said the total monetary value of unclaimed estates has been estimated at \$5 billion.

Why are you unclaimed? The heirs are unaware they are heirs, perhaps because their relationship to the deceased was not close or because the estate became an increasingly transient nation, relatives lose track of one another.

Craig cites the case of a Seattle woman who died, leaving an estate in excess of \$1 million. Her will left one-third of it to a son, but he died before she had two daughters, one by a first marriage and one by a second, each of whom would receive one-half of her father's share of the estate.

However, the daughter of the first marriage was last heard of 20 years ago, and her inheritance waits to be claimed. If she does not claim it within the 90-day period, it will go to a state, which varies from state to state. The money will go to the state treasury. For obvious reasons, authorities generally make only a perfunctory effort to locate the heirs.

Craig has a considerable advantage in finding the missing heirs — a nationwide television audience numbering in the millions.

After his first appearance on the Art Linkletter "Howdy Do!" show during which he described these cases, he immediately received about 50 telegrams, telephone calls and letters, three of which were promising.

Craig, whose agency does general investigating for law firms and industry, was hired on a fee basis by the Linkletter show to dig up the missing heirs and try to locate the lost beneficiaries.

His only remuneration will be the flat fee paid by the television show.

He said finding a missing person is not as difficult as might be supposed.

"It is very difficult to disappear," he said. "If a

U.S. Warned on Rhodesia Travel

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department served notice Wednesday that American citizens should be careful about traveling to Rhodesia, where a new government has been proclaimed which the United States does not recognize.

"It will no longer be able to provide full protective services to those citizens who travel in Rhodesia," a State Department spokesman said.

The new government, which is headed by Ian Smith, a Rhodesian, is a white-minority government. It is a member of the Commonwealth of Nations, but the United States does not recognize it.

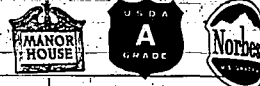

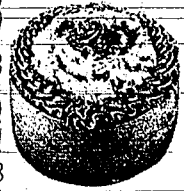

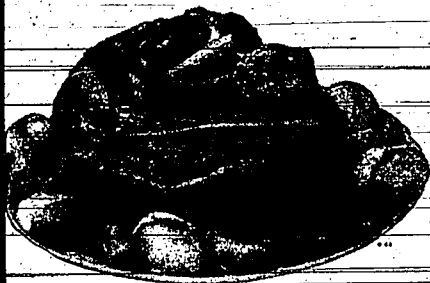

Guerrilla Doesn't Know Location of U.S.

CAN THO, Viet Nam (NEA) — This is the enemy. Nguyen Van Xe, 34 years old, 5 feet, 110 pounds, is a member of a Viet Cong guerrilla force which he estimates has nearly a dozen encounters with American troops. He doesn't know if he personally killed any. He thinks so.

Now he begs forgiveness because he's a prisoner of war. He held no rank with the V.C. His title was "fighter." He fought from rice paddy and pagoda, usually in the dark of night.

He lives in holes, for the most part. Don't yourself graves, the girls call them—while he is piled into mounds and mounds because the V.C. leaders said they would afford protection against bombs.

A returned, they call them. Name, rank and serial number and more. He tells of watching V.C. bury village people alive when they refuse to pay taxes of rice. He tells of hearing, but not seeing, that team—China has attacked and that the tide of the war would soon turn against America—tells of an army that fought with five or six weapons for every dozen men. Those unarmed would get a hand grenade piece. Those armed, rounds of ammunition. When it ran out, throw rocks. There was no resupply.

Nor was there medical aid. Wounded soldiers in pain would be shot to keep them silent. Amputation was the cure-all. Many maimages, there were some from hand-dropped U.S. supplies that fell short.

No food. No arms. No aid. No hope.

"Thousands like me want to quit," the POW says. "They do not believe the V.C. any more. But still they stay because they are afraid. They do not want the Americans to throw them into the sea."

One hundred twenty pounds. Rolling teeth. Skin and bones. And afraid of both sides. This is the enemy.

His wife and three children became strangers in the V.C. Months would pass before he would hear if they still lived—and that the news was then outdated and unreliable.

He would travel with little sleep and sun with little food he could (under 1,000 calories a day) to stay alive.

And with the hunger, melancholia.

He lost weight which he had little to lose. He grew old. He became ill. He lived in fear each night and the days were even worse.

For then the planes came. The terrible bombings wherever and whenever he stopped to rest.

"The planes," he says, "were the worst thing. Many V.C. die. Everyday they come and there was no escape, only the jungle to hide in."

"They tell us they are American planes, killing women and children—and we believe because we are soldiers. But what is this America? None of us know. I know about China and Canada, nothing more. America? Where is it?"

"But they don't tell us. They just say to shoot or kill and we are soldiers. But then we think we are not killing only Americans. We are killing Vietnamese. Our brothers."

"Many of us wonder. And at night we hear voices from the planes saying give up. Saying come back to your families. Saying the V.C. do not really care or tell the truth."

"But they hear. They say 'no. They will kill any who leave, and some are killed. They say anyway the Americans will kill us if we leave, that it is a trick, that they will rape our wives and throw us into the sea."

"But it is too late. Some of us do not believe any more." And so Xe deserted.

Most Viet Nam Students Have Never Seen Peace in Country

SAIGON—South Viet Nam (AP)—Most of the college students in Viet Nam have never known their country at peace. They have been instrumental in bringing down two governments, and they are a factor any regime has to reckon with. Some are draft dodgers, and there often is the feeling that many come under the influence of subversive movements, but the constructive views of others cannot be dismissed.

Thousands of restless students staged an antigovernment demonstration last August in Hue. For four successive days about 3,000 students held meetings. They denounced the chief of state, Nguyen Van Thieu, as an incompetent and called for a return to civilian rule.

The demonstrations ended peacefully. In November 1963, students staged an anti-Buddhist demonstration that led to the death of President Ngo Dinh Diem.

Last February, they took to the streets again and helped topple the government of Khanh.

The students charged that Diem and his governments did not represent the people. The students were criticized by many as being a disruptive influence whose actions had set back the war against the Viet Cong.

To this day, however, many of the nation's 20,000 college students feel they were justified in riding the nation of Diem and Khanh.

"In South Viet Nam," said one activist, "we are involved in a very complicated war. It is not only a military war but also a cultural, social and economic war. We have to go to other frontiers — those of poverty, ignorance and disease. And it is this prospect that Vietnamese youth have to struggle to find a meaning for their lives."

Yet the feeling persists among many that the students are more concerned with their own security than with the welfare of their country.

Last summer, however, more than 2,000 youth and student volunteers went out into the country and built new roads, houses, schools, dug wells and built health centers in 300 hamlets. In another social service program endorsed by Premier Nguyen Qun Ky, they are helping government develop one of Saigon's poorest slum districts.

While many students remain apathetic toward Ky — they feel the youthful flier is the wrong man for the job — they appear more interested in channeling their energies toward improving rather than ousting the government.

Most students probably would support views of the chairman of the General Association of Saigon Students, the largest student organization in the country.

"We are intensely anti-Communist but also, intensely nationalistic," says this man, Tran Quang Tri, 26. "We support the U.S. involvement in Viet Nam, but we would prefer a civilian government, and we are looking forward to the day when the ends and your troops go home."

When the wave of noisy student demonstrations against U.S. involvement in Viet Nam broke out in the United States, the organization mildly reprimanded U.S. students in an open letter that said:

"Fast America, in which you live, and while you are in it, which we still struggle to win

the right to live free; are already soaked with the blood of our ancestors. It seems, however, that those who live in happiness now and enjoy unbounded freedom do not realize what it takes to maintain it. Freedom can be obtained only through hard fighting."

Some of the young people favor a more vigorous military offensive against the Communists. They have called for a step-up bombing in North Viet Nam. A few who have had relatives killed by the Viet Cong would like to see the Allies launch a ground attack against North Viet Nam.

These are the students most likely to dissent against demonstrators in the United States as draft-dodgers, cowards, persons under Communist influence, or young persons who are misinformed.

A relatively small number of students have called for a neutralized settlement of the war and have urged a coalition government with the Communists. The majority of these attend the state-operated university in Hue, a traditional hotbed of agitation.

While students accept the presence of U.S. forces as necessary, they are sharply critical of many aspects of the U.S. military buildup.

For example, student papers have complained about the relations of U.S. troops with Vietnamese women and the lack of a status-of-forces agreement between South Viet Nam and the United States.

On the theory that the student movement needs no other leadership, the nation's leaders have given them more freedom of expression than they probably have ever enjoyed. On the other hand, Ky has charged that intellectuals spend too much time talking about political abstractions.

There is some evidence that the Viet Cong has attempted to infiltrate student rings in Hue but apparently with little success.

Students insist that their military record is comparable to any other nation when converted to military training in a free country.

One U.S. observer who has worked closely with Vietnamese students feels the mix of them has been wrongly accused of being troublemakers because of the irresponsible actions of a few.

"The great majority of university students do not care about politics," he says, "and who do are politically ambitious themselves, but the bulk of them are motivated by a sense of national service and humanitarianism."

Texas Airline Cuts Fares for First-Timers

WASHINGTON (AP)—Persons who have never ridden on a commercial airliner can now receive discounts of as much as 25 percent on flights of Trans-Texas Airways Inc.

The Civil Aeronautics Board approved Wednesday a flat 25 percent "first-time" fare on any Trans-Texas flight for persons over 21 who have never before taken a commercial flight.

Regular roundtrip fares on some Trans-Texas flights run as high as \$150.

The passenger will have to file a statement saying he has not previously ridden on an airliner in order to be eligible for the reduced fare.

State Officials May Pass Opportunity for Taxpayers

By RICHARD CHARNOCK... BOISE (UPI)—State officials may be passing up a million-dollar opportunity for the taxpayers.

That's the amount of money Auditor Joe R. Williams estimates the state could save each biennium through creation of a motor pool for its vehicles.

Until recently, Williams and others believed his plan would require special legislation. Now it appears it may be feasible under existing laws if department heads and other officials are willing to get together.

A 1939 law setting forth the duties of the state purchasing agent delegates to that appointed official power to provide and supply "such motor vehicles and under such conditions as may be deemed necessary by the officers, departments, bureaus and institutions of the state."

Another statute, one relating to bookkeeping authority of the auditor, gives Williams power to create a centralized system for all state property, require keeping of records and making of reports.

Some legal sources believe the combination of these two statutes provide the necessary authority for creation of a motor pool.

Russia Makes Sales Pitch In Brazil

SAO PAULO, Brazil (UPI)—Russia is making its first intensive sales campaign in Brazil's largest consumer market.

The goods are mainly smart-looking but cheaply-priced luxury items such as watches and cameras. Perfumes and caviar also are on sale.

A typical advertisement in a sports newspaper with high readership among the working class shows a neatly-dressed, smiling man wearing a "Polish" wrist watch.

The products are being handled by a Russian wholesale firm called "Arbiter Importing and Commerce Ltd." located at the busiest shopping street in this city of five million.

The staff speaks both Russian and Portuguese.

The sales campaign got under way just before a recent trade mission was sent to Moscow under the leadership of Planning minister Roberto Campos. The mission spent two weeks in Russia without reaching any agreements.

The first moves designed to spur Soviet-Brazilian trade came during the Janio-Quadros administration in 1961 before diplomatic relations had been resumed after being severed for several years. Negotiations continued under the presidency of Joao Goulart, lasted last year on the grounds that Brazil was drifting towards Communism.

Couple Has 600 Foster Children

NORTH BEND, Ore. (UPI)—Nobody in this coastal town expects Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Wilches to achieve a family reunion. It would be difficult to do, for in the past 16 years the Wilches have provided a home for more than 600 foster children.

Raymond Riese, child welfare director of the Oregon Public Welfare Commission, says the number sets a record.

In opening their hearts to 678 or 680 homeless children through the years, Riese said, "the Wilches have... given of themselves in a way that the people of Oregon and the entire nation can view with deep appreciation."

Married 30 years, the Wilches have four children — Donald, with the U.S. Navy in Guam; Marilyn, Helicity of VISTA; Mrs. Betty English of Mountain View, Calif.; and Richard, a senior at North Bend High School.

Mrs. Wilches believes her own children "are better able to meet life and handle whatever cause their home has been a home for so many others."

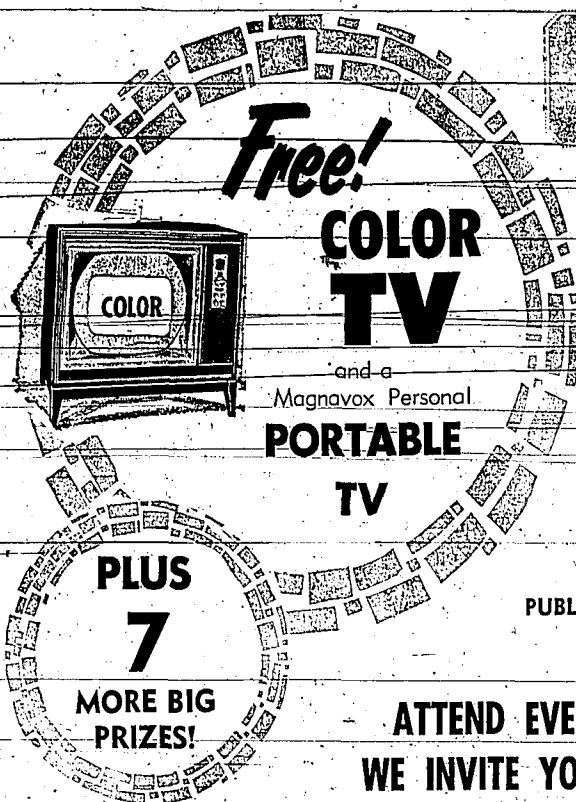
