

# Negotiations in Aircraft Strike Open in Capital

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP) — Machinists union members walked orderly picket lines in front of McDonnell Aircraft Corp. here today and at one time the U. S. space complex at Cape Kennedy, Fla. Union and McDonnell negotiators met in Washington with the Federal Mediation-Conciliation Service in an attempt to settle the strike that began Thursday night. Production of 50 Phantom jet fighter planes used in Viet Nam and Gemini space capsules was stopped.

The impact of the strike at Cape Kennedy was reported to be small. Director of the Air International Association of Machinists is bargaining agent for 235 McDonnell employees here as well as the 17,000 in St. Louis.

The National Aeronautics and Space Administration said some McDonnell technicians showed up for work today despite the strike, enabling setting of a work schedule to carry the workload through the week and without delaying the launch of Gemini 7. A final systems test was set to start on the spacecraft today.

# Vietnamese Relief Troops Run Into Battle With Red Forces

PLEIKU, South Viet Nam (AP) — Vietnamese government paratroopers rushing to link up with battle-worn U. S. air cavalrymen in the Ia-Drang valley Friday night near the Cambodian frontier. A U. S. spokesman said Communist North Vietnamese troops put up stiff resistance to a southward march of the paratroopers near the frontier and inflicted light casualties. Heavy fire held up the paratroopers, part of a South Vietnamese regiment being committed to the valley battle.

# Idaho News

**ARRESTS CONTINUE**  
**BOISE (AP)** — State Police Superintendent A. E. Perkins said Thursday officers are continuing to enforce posted high speed limits despite an Idaho Supreme Court ruling. The court earlier this year ruled that a "showing" of excessive speed alone is not sufficient to justify a conviction.

The speed must be shown to be unusual under existing conditions, the court said. Perkins said state police would continue arrests of motorists exceeding posted limits.

**MAKING PROGRESS**  
**BOISE (UPI)** — The Intermountain Forest Pest Action Council has been told that for the first time foresters appear to be making progress in the battle to control bark beetles in the Intermountain area. Joel Frykman, Ogden, Utah, forest pest control officer, Thursday said funds now are available for the program to combat the pest in central Idaho and Wyoming.

Seventeen persons representing private industry, forestry agencies and the fish and game departments met at the state forester's office to review strategies of insect infestations and plot for their control.

**SOIL MEET HELD**  
**SALMON (UPI)** — Les T. Morgan, Boise, Idaho's state conservationist, has said soil districts will have to adjust to the "challenge of the times" if they are to stay healthy. He spoke Thursday at the annual convention of the Idaho Association of Soil Conservation Districts. He said the districts "can and are ready to assume a leading role in bringing a new era of opportunity to rural Idaho."

Association President La Mar Whyte, Springfield, told the 2nd annual meeting soil conservation districts have been farmer oriented but that with increasing urbanization and increasing interest in it will become obvious that urban people need to take part in soil conservation work.

**OFFICIALS ASK RELIEF**  
**COBUR D'ALENE (UPI)** — North Idaho elected officials went on record Thursday asking relief from new assessment values placed on forest lands by the State Tax Commission. The officials, in a day-long meeting, voted to work for repeal of the 1963 law under which the assessments were made if they find such action necessary in gain relief. Owners of forest lands supported the officials in their stand. Several officials suggested that the county officers ignore the state set assessment values and determine for themselves a fair level.

## Strike Against Newspaper Ends

**LOS ANGELES (AP)** — The American Newspaper Guild's strike against the Los Angeles Herald-Examiner was ended today, newspaper and union representatives announced. Pickets, who had been parading at all entrances since the strike was called at 12:01 a.m. Thursday, were withdrawn. The terms of the newspaper's offer were not disclosed, but the Guild's executive committee phoned publisher George R. Hearst Jr., that it would recommend acceptance of it. Guild and other workers began returning to the newspaper plant. No papers were printed Thursday.

## Cows Average 34.7 Pounds Of Butterfat

Dairy cows on production testing in Unit 2 of the Twin Falls County Dairy Herd Improvement Association, during the October average 34.7 pounds of butterfat per cow and 925 pounds of milk, reports county agent Donald Young.

Production figures include all cows on test in the units, including the record of 1,350 in the Supervisor Virgil Worcester, Twin Falls, showed that 1,370 cows were on test, with 1,350 in the large herds of over 50 cows. Alvin and J. Stan Smith, Twin Falls, had the highest production average of 45.0 pounds of butterfat, 1,280 pounds of milk, with 107 cows milking.

Other high producing herds with butterfat, milk, total cows, average in production are: Irvn Ebers, Twin Falls, 40.0, 1,100, 39 and 47; W. T. Lamers, Burley, 39.7, 1,130, 130 and 106; S. D. 48; Walter Mathison, Elyria, 35.0, 690, 91 and 78; and W. Richmond, Burley, 35.0, 62, 88 and 47.

## Card Burned

NEW YORK — Even the Society for the Preservation of the Crock has been plagued by card burnings. Dr. Horace Clifford, executive director of the society, reports.

The society's "national headquarters" has just received a card from the director of an official membership card, he said. The ashes were accompanied by a note from a fraternal person who wrote, "right now I am fighting the Black Devils, and I will burn out of my card tree here in the front yard with a double-barreled .12-gauge shotgun."

The note was signed, "The bitterness-of-the-crow."

## Northwest Wheat Shipments Recorded Sharply Higher

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Agriculture Department has announced the sale of 415,000 more than two million bushels of wheat to Italy, primarily for use in school-lunch programs for needy children. The wheat was sold at \$1.13 per bushel.

The \$2.3 million sale was made under a provision in law which provides for sales, at less than export prices, of agricultural commodities for specified purposes such as feeding needy children or starting and maintaining school lunch programs in foreign countries.

Weather conditions have been good throughout the country's wheat-growing territories since the harvesting operations began in late September. Although the unusually early freeze in mid-September which was particularly severe in south central Idaho curtailed the crop's development, the surplus content still appears to be about equal or better than usual levels throughout the country's growing areas, he reported.

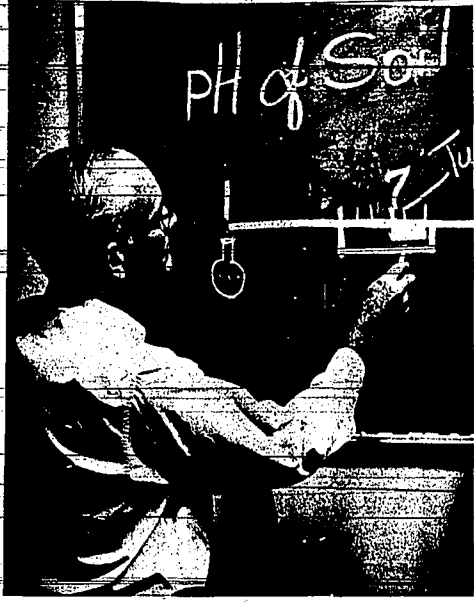

## Use of Soil Tests to Aid Fertilizer Recommendation Skyrockets in Area

Use of soil testing by Magic Valley farmers is skyrocketing, according to Olan Gunn, Twin Falls county agent.

This year more than 200 soil tests have been processed through the Twin Falls County Agent's Office, a number that is expected to reach 1,000 by the end of the year. This is about four times the number of tests taken a year ago.

"According to the extension agent, soil testing is indispensable for the modern farmer, who cannot afford to risk improper plant nutrition."

"Let's face it," he said, "there is no point in buying fertilizer except to make money. The surprising thing is that we often make recommendations that will cut fertilizer costs."

"An extreme example was a man who was applying too much phosphate and not enough nitrogen. He saved \$100 on fertilizer costs and increased his yield from 42 to 85 bushels."

"The next year he was in here with a soil sample from every one of his fields," Gunn recalled.

"But," he said, "there is no such thing as an exact science in agriculture. Soil testing is an educated guess. We try to make our fertilization recommendations within 10 per cent of what is needed."

The soil testing service is operated by the University of Idaho. Both individual farm operators and commercial fertilizer dealers use the university service.

"A large number of fertilizer companies are carrying on soil testing programs. They send a great many samples through our office," Gunn continued.

Both farmers and dealers can collect samples to be turned in to the county extension office. The samples are mailed from the office to the university laboratories on the same day they are received.

Results of the soil test analysis and accompanying fertilizer recommendations are returned directly to the farmer from seven to 10 days later, Gunn reported.

"When the soil samples reach the University of Idaho they are chemically analyzed by graduate students under the supervision of Professor Oren E. Baker. The analysis is not profit-making operation, the fee covering only the cost of chemical reagents and mailing expenses."

When the results of the chem-

ical analysis are received, the farmer is notified by mail. (Continued on Page 11)

## "Farm-City Week" Is Proclaimed for Idaho

The week of Nov. 19-23 has been designated "Farm-City Week" in Idaho, Joe McCollum, Twin Falls, state chairman for the event, announced. Lt. Gov. William E. Drew made the gubernatorial proclamation on Thursday in Boise.

McCollum said the week is intended to provide a means of bringing farm- and city groups together for event cooperation.

"This area certainly has a lot to gain from this type of cooperation," he said. "We see the benefits everywhere—with our junior college and similar activities groups in Twin Falls. According to Horn, much of the common winter damage from extreme cold is caused by dry winds.

Moscow — Tony Horn, University of Idaho extension horticulturist, reports it is a good practice to water trees and shrubs after they are dormant and before the ground freezes in the winter season of 1965.

Production of fall potatoes is placed at 215.5 million hundredweight, down 25.5 percent from the Oct. 1 forecast, but 25 percent above the 1964 crop. A slightly larger crop in October, a month ago, in the Eastern States was more than offset by declines in the Central and Western States.

The crop in eight Eastern States is expected to total 63.9 million cwt. in the nine Central States—the crop is up 28 percent from last year to 46.39 million cwt. Production in the nine Western States is placed at 215.5 million hundredweight.

## Idaho Potato Production Estimate Is Reduced 1.24 Million Hundredweight

BOISE — The estimated production of fall potatoes in Idaho is expected to total 215.5 million cwt., unchanged from the two previous forecasts. Weather conditions during most of October were ideal for harvesting operations.

"Digging of the 1965 crop was largely completed by late September in the earlier areas, but continued well into November in some new development areas."

Production in the other counties is now estimated at 53.10 million cwt., three per cent below the record crop of 55.02 million cwt. for this area in 1961. Yield per acre now estimated at 215 cwt., is down slightly from the previous record high of 220 cwt. made in the long growing season of 1963.

## \$10.4 Million Payment Mailed to Beet Growers

OGDEN — A. E. Benning, falling short of earlier expectations, announced an initial payment of \$10.4 million has been mailed to growers in the Twin Falls and Burley-Rupert areas. The payment was part of more than \$21 million paid by the Idaho Beet Growers' Union for more than 2,010 million tons of sugar beets received before Oct. 31.

Although the unusually early freeze in mid-September which was particularly severe in south central Idaho curtailed the crop's development, the surplus content still appears to be about equal or better than usual levels throughout the country's growing areas, he reported.

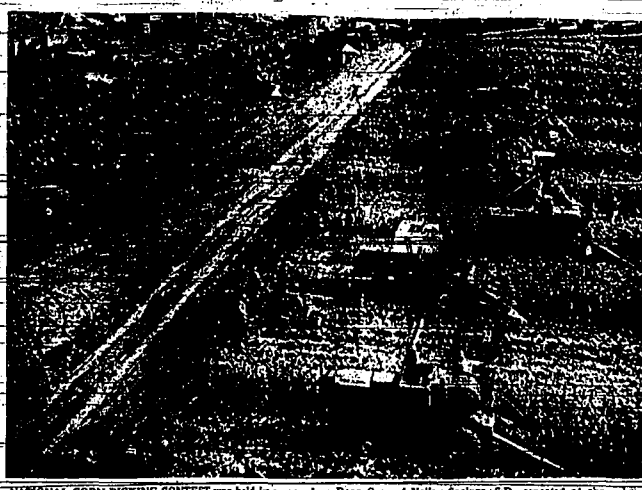

### Investment In Supports Is Reduced

### Condition of Ranges Said Declining

BOISE — Condition of Idaho ranges fed on Nov. 1 was three points below a month earlier, according to the USDA reporting service for Idaho. The current condition of 77 range points below the 1959-64 average for the Nov. 1 date.

Although range growth was generally good, weather conditions and water stress caused earlier cured range feed earlier than usual. The result: quality and palatability of the feed has been deteriorating.

Ranges in all areas of the state remained snow-free on Nov. 1, and should provide adequate grazing for the remainder of the season. Soil moisture supplies were being short in many areas by Nov. 1.

The condition of Idaho cattle declined one point during October. The reported condition of 87 is two points above the five-year average for this date.

Sheep condition at 80 is two points below a month earlier, but still above the Nov. 1 average. Both cattle and sheep are in good condition and carrying good flesh from the abundant summer feed.

Most livestock are now on lower elevation ranges and crop residues. MATKOWSKI of both classes of livestock remained moderately improved during October with progress to date about normal.

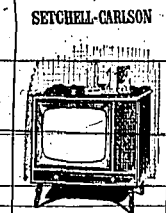

# California Says Underworld Still Controls Terrell

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)—The California Athletic Commission charged Thursday that World Boxing Association heavyweight champion Ernie Terrell is controlled by the underworld. Dr. Dan P. Kilroy, commission chairman, issued a statement urging all jurisdictions to refrain from permitting Terrell to box until he can demonstrate he is free from "undesirable influences."

The California commission is appalled at the suggestion that Ernest Terrell would be permitted to box for any title so long as Bernard Glickman remains his manager, Kilroy said.

It has been proposed that Terrell fight the winner of the 200-pound class fight between Frankie Carbo and Frank (Blinky) Palermo on March 15 at the Municipal Auditorium. The fight is being promoted by Don Jordan after he had won the world welterweight title from Virgil Akers.

"The California commission played a leading role in bringing these matters to the attention of proper authorities for prosecution," said Kilroy.

California is not a member of the World Boxing Association. After questioning the promotion of the approaching Clay-Patterson bout, the statement declared that the commission is even more concerned in the ownership of the so-called WBA heavyweight title held by Terrell. Until recently Ernest Terrell was managed by Julius Isaacson. However, after Terrell was thrown out and Bernard Glickman appeared as his manager, Isaacson was expelled.

"The California commission remembers Bernard Glickman as co-manager of Akers, Glickman is a member of the underworld," said Kilroy. "Glickman, who is now managed by Frank Carbo, loaned Carbo money as one of the reasons for consulting with Carbo on hundreds of occasions in regard to fights, made bets with Carbo on fights, and called Carbo a 'good' gambler and 'wise' bossing before the Referee committee investigating boxing."

In summation, Kilroy said, "The commission has received information the WBA has had with mob-controlled figures, the California commission would urge all jurisdictions to refrain from permitting Terrell to box until he can demonstrate he is free from 'undesirable influences.'"

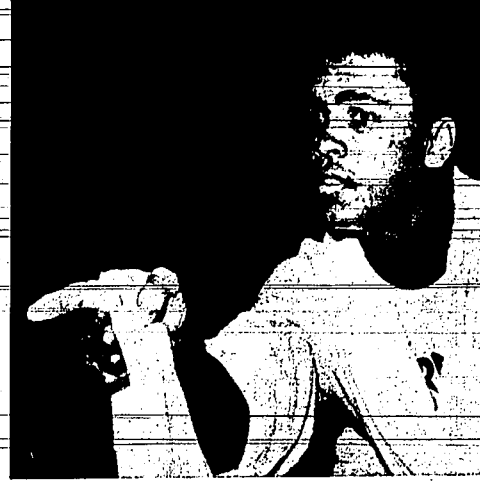

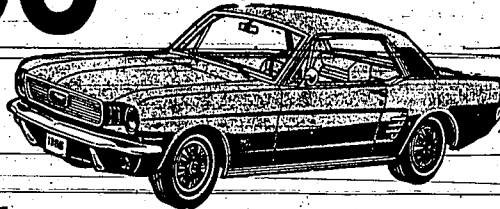

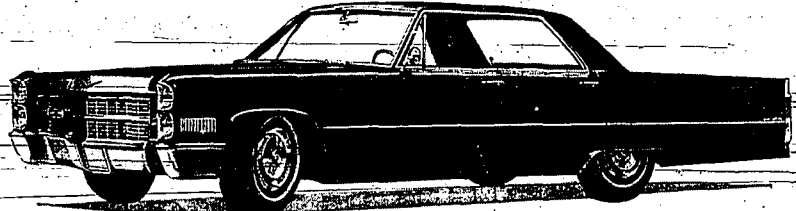

CAN HIO, Viet Nam—(NEA)—There are five of them, all copped in the blood-rededness of the same bed. A father, mother and three kids. "This fellow's whole family is hit," says the doctor. "How?" someone asks him. "Is a bombing raid," he answers. "Yet Camp?" "Yet Camp?" "Explosives don't discriminate." From the rear of the long, dimly lit, dirty corridor, a man groans loudly. She is a bullet wound in the neck. He baby is dying because of malnutrition. A young child plays with stars in an empty playmate. A startled chicken scurries under the supplies table. A mountain fies feasts on a spilled bowl of rice. There is a grim look among the peasants that if you hurt, pray for death. Otherwise you must go to the hospital. The civilian hospital in this Delta community is as full as that. Filthy, food-smelling, certain to be staffed, of course. But no one dies here. Only about 30 or 40 per cent. "Well, I'm not entirely sure the percentage," says Capt. zero Hayes of New Haven, one of several U.S. troops who assist Vietnamese peasants here. "But I'd guess probably close to that many." In the eight months I've been here, anyway.

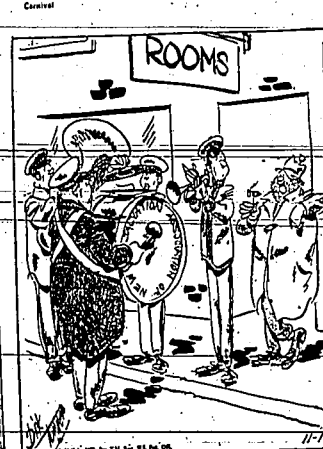

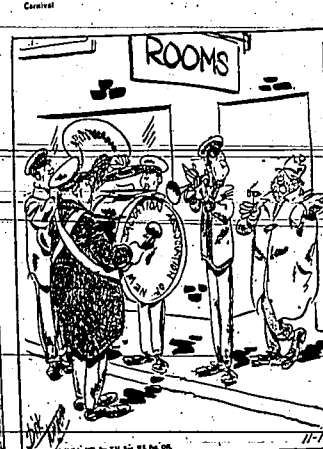

HERMITT ISLAND, Fla. (UPI)—The biggest building in the world is being erected on the world's largest artificial island to protect the U.S. astronauts from the sally Atlantic air forces will be assembling.

The structure, the NASA Apollo-Saturn Center's \$150 million Vehicle Assembly Building, which towers 560 feet high, is being built on Merritt Island, Fla., east of Cape Canaveral.

Completion is early next year. The 10-story, 11-million-sq-ft structure will be disassembled and shipped by rail to the heart of the launch complex. It is 10-1/2 miles long and will be built by water chills and concrete. It will be the "work-dome" of the plant, using enough concrete to supply all the requirements in Salt Lake City.

Contractors, under direction of the Naval Air Station, are now erecting the structure. The U.S. Army is erecting the building's pipe and walling in the chills water.

The completed structure will be used to store, assemble and launch the Apollo-Saturn rocket. It will be the largest structure ever built.

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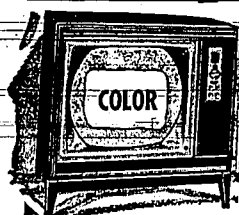
