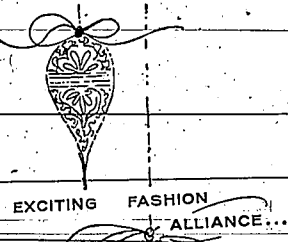

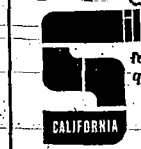

The performance in the auditorium at MVCC is a benefit for the music department toward the purchase of a harp solo for the college.

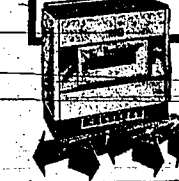
Buhl Highway District to Elect Aides

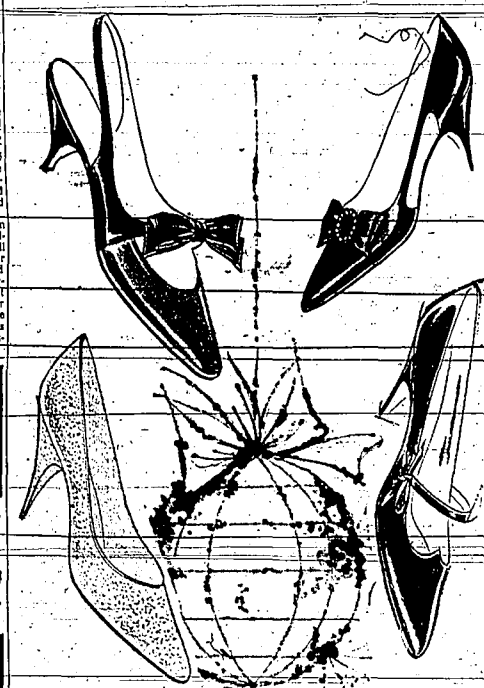

Idaho Offered as Salmon Pact Member

BOISE (AP)—Membership of Idaho in the Columbia River Fisheries Compact was announced today by the state commission as a way to ease conflicts in the pact and steelhead fishing management. Additional terms of the Oregon-Washington compact that regulates commercial fishing on the Columbia River was adopted by the Pacific Marine Fisheries Commission in Boise at an annual meeting.

Oregon officials said the pact was introduced by the state but agreed a solution is needed to the conflict between commercial fisheries and sports fishermen.

The conflict was heated last summer when Chinook salmon was scarce commercially in the Lower Columbia and sportfishing was halted in all three states.

The resolution urging that Idaho join the compact or "other appropriate means" was introduced by Idaho delegates and seconded by those from Washington.

A member of the Oregon Fish Commission, Leonard N. Hall, said more study was needed because of the proposal's "legal and biological implications."

He indicated Idaho's sportsmen would be a complication to the compact that is not now a problem.

The proposed act designed to keep Chinook salmon in their natural, free-flowing state and would prohibit dams and other projects on them.

The commission urged adequate protection for fish and wildlife populations in any future transfer of water from one river basin to another.

It urged a study into the possibility of damming salmon and steelhead fish runs between Bonneville Dam near Portland and the Idaho border.

Wash. was selected for the commission's 1956 meeting to be held May 15-18.

John H. West of Seattle, editor of the weekly Fisherman's News, was elected chairman.

Other officers elected were U. Pat Meike of the Oregon Game Commission, vice chairman; Walter C. Galt of the California Fish and Game Department, second vice chairman; and J. H. West of Seattle, director of the Idaho Fish and Game Department, secretary.

Steelhead Fishing Tops Expectations

SALMON—Despite a sharp drop in the number of steelhead expected over Ice Harbor Dam, Idaho's steelhead fishing this fall has been good. Don Corley, fishery biologist for the Idaho Fish and Game Department, said today.

"Since the count was low over Ice Harbor we had expected a drop in steelhead fishing this fall," he biologist said.

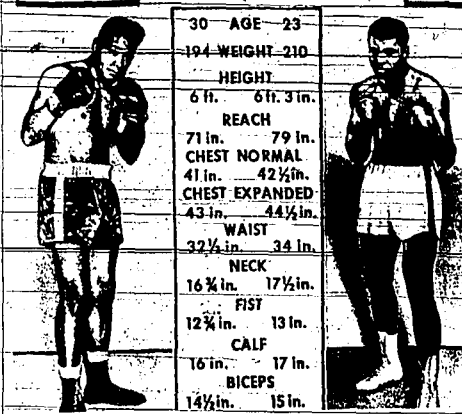
Some 150,000 steelhead trout passed through the counting station at Bonneville Dam this summer, he said.

The number coming to Idaho via the Snake River was about \$3,000, he said.

Corley noted that during the period Nov. 1 through Nov. 14, 35 steelhead. The anglers had spent 355 hours per angler. The Idaho Fish and Game Department is needed to learn what happens to chinook salmon and steelhead trout spawning runs.

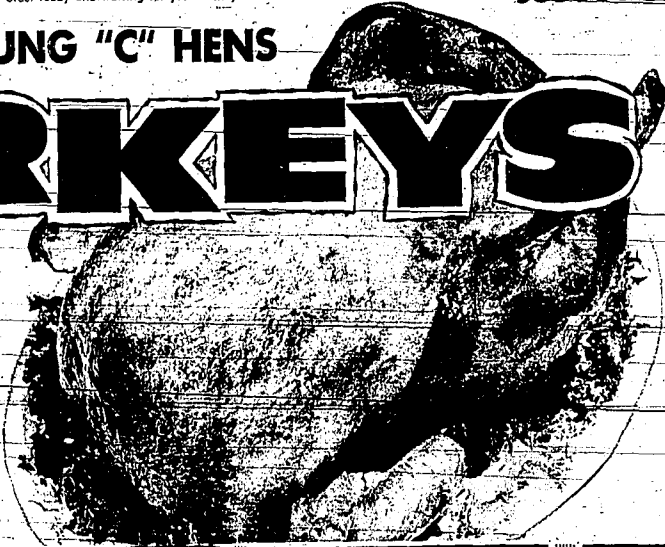

A group of youngsters in Twin Falls are finding out it is sometimes hard to make a profit in business—yet easy to go broke. In Twin Falls there are three student-companies in operation. One, known as the Jayco Co., is concerned with manufacturing a letter holder. Another, known as the SICO Co., manufactures a headquarter of the Junior Achievement organization in New York City. In Twin Falls the adult officers offering advice and counsel include Hugh Coates, president; Don Jackson, vice president; William Manger, secretary; James Winteholzer Jr., treasurer; Dale Patterson, program manager; John Roper, Harold Stearley, Vern Harmer and Richard Shaw. Complete plans call for 20 to 25 youngsters in each company. These make up the board of directors, the working force and the sales staff. They elect their own officers, capitalize their business through public sale of stock at \$1 a share, set up production lines and distribution, decide on sales commissions and pay themselves salaries like a regular manufacturing business. They keep company records, buy taxes and pay dividends to the stockholders. Their enterprise is profitable.

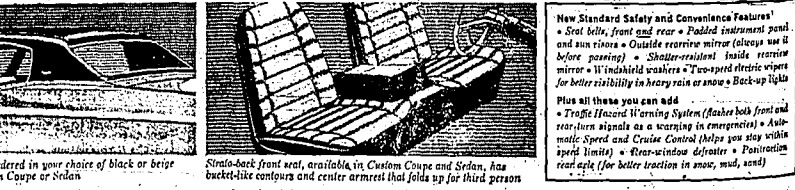

The pole shelter we cut back the top back of every one of them. We keep them from pecking each other. This job alone took about 12 hours, but we finally

just it done.
"About this time we thought we had it made, but we were sure wrong. The turkeys began roosting on the automatic feeder and with 2,000 birds, flight-

ing to get on, the thing just wouldn't stand the strain."
"So for days and days, it seemed, we three hauled poles to make something for the turkeys to roost on."
"The turkeys are easier to take care of when they are old-timers except they eat more. The water troughs had to be cleaned every two or three days, grit and gravel had to be changed all the time and mash had to be mixed every four days."
"When they were small it was hard to mix the mash because there were a lot of different ingredients in it, like cod liver oil that was hand-mixed into the soy beans and extra minerals and vitamins added. But then it didn't have to be done so often, either."
"When they got big their feed was mostly mixed grain. We mixed up tons of feed at a time and 3,200 pounds of it is hand-scooping."
"It takes 160 scoops of about 10 pounds apiece. Then you add a few 100 pound bags of meat scraps and some 50 pound bags of alfalfa. You also put in salt and minerals and, you know, the turkeys like it!"
"Now that the job is about over we are looking forward with anticipation because every day now means that many less turkeys to take care of. These will be no more getting up at six in the morning to feed the grain and fix the feeder and we won't have to rush home from school to mix feed and clean the water before we can do anything else."
"It took us a long time to get the dressing room in order. That seemed to have been a room where you would put anything into your didn't know what else to do with and there was a couple of inches of dust and grime on everything."
"We kind of hate to see our family leaving, but we will still be too busy to grieve too much. After Thanksgiving we will have to clean out all the straw from the pole shelter, we will have to take down the feeder and put all the water troughs away."

The Money Box

BY FRANK SCHELL

First question this week comes from D.S.W. Hull, and concerns a tracing of a copper piece which he describes as a "little larger than a penny."
The tracing shows one side inscribed with the letters "DIS" and around this word, the caption "If anybody attempts to start it down, shoot him on the spot." On the reverse is the inscription "The Flag of the Union" and thirteen stars around a flag, with the date 1776.
Answer: Sorry—this is not a coin. At the beginning of the Civil War there was a terrible shortage of small coinage, and some of the merchants of the time were forced to issue tokens to replace the small coins so that they could do business. A great many of these tokens were inscribed with the merchant's name and place of business, and were redeemable for merchandise at the store.
However, many more of them were only inscribed with patriotic slogans, and yours is in this category. Incidentally, this particular token was inscribed with the word "spot" misspelled as "Spout" (making it read "shoot him on the spot"). You might check yours and see if the word is misspelled. Most of the Civil War Tokens (the official name for them) are worth somewhere around a dollar apiece.
A number of questions have come to us concerning foreign coins. There are so many foreign coins—some of them being first of all never either the need nuts to dry out after you dabber them. Drying kills the turkey. Also, most nuts need a special oil treatment known as stratification. All this means is that you must store the nuts in a cold frame or in the ground during the winter.
First you shuck the nuts, place them in a container of sand and peat-moss, then sink the container in the ground level with the top. It's a good idea to place a screen over them to keep out squirrels and other rodents during the winter.
Or, if you feel that rodents won't be a problem, plant the

nuts in a row in the garden spaced 10 inches apart and about three inches deep. Nuts kept in a container in winter can be planted in the garden in spring.
This cold storage period is necessary as it brings about chemical changes inside the nut and enables them to germinate. While deep cold will not harm the nut, you can get the same effect by placing the moist nut in a sealed tin can and keeping it at 22 degrees in a refrigerator until spring. The Persian Walnut does not need the cold storage treatment and will germinate without it.
S. C. OF MINIDOKA: "Our outdoor coles were nice until we brought them indoors this fall. The leaves started to wither and the edges turned black. We wanted the plants in a large planter but we're doing something wrong as they don't do well there."
I think your main trouble is poor drainage. We let coles colous to wilt and turn black around the edges. Minkler sure has a plan. Drain the bottom of the planter. Use a loose soil mixture, one-third sand, one-third loam and one-third peat, and add pieces of pots, charcoal, gravel, cinders or similar materials in the bottom to improve drainage.
Coles makes a striking foliage plant indoors, even in a single-paned window. Avoid direct sun. In fact, coles develop their best colors in the shade of bright light.
RUBEN MOUNTAIN-HOUSE: "Our arbutus evergreens have brown foliage, mainly on the inside. Is this natural or has something been bothering the trees?" It's natural. Most evergreens show brown needles or foliage on the inside now and it's nothing to worry about. These will drop to the ground to leave a good mulch.
When brown is on both inside and outside, something's wrong. Keep all newly planted evergreens on their right side until the ground freezes and they'll come through the winter better. A good rule of thumb is to use (thick) sawdust or peatmoss is helpful.

Conservative Buckley Says He Would Rather Be Right-Wing Than Mayor

NEW YORK (UPI)—Conservative William F. Buckley Jr. would be taken from "betweens" who says he would rather be right-wing than mayor, vowed today he would never, never enter politics again—no matter how a direct communication from my maker and it says "no!"

But he's not sorry he ran for mayor of New York, and he says he's not so sorry that he did not bring about the defeat of Republican John V. Lindsay.

"I'm just human enough so that I would have been a little depressed by three million New Yorkers refusing to speak to me for the rest of my life," he said. "Every time the electricity failed in New York, they would have blamed me."

Buckley, 58, editor of the National Review, a conservative magazine, analyzed his own race in an interview with UPI, the first since the election. He won 239,000 votes, 13.4 per cent of the total and acknowledged that he may have helped Lindsay, the winner, more than he hurt him.

Gov. Rockefeller, the 1974 presidential candidate of 1974 and a friend of Buckley, twitted him "last week was the Warren Way-Corrigian" of politics, who set out to defeat Lindsay and ended defeating Abraham D. Beame, the Democratic candidate.

But Buckley, lean and trim, hitching his thumbs into the belt of his herringbone-tweed trousers and packing his crowded office at National Review, denied that Lindsay's defeat was his intent. He said the purpose of his campaign was to win as many votes as he could for the Conservative cause.

He reiterated his thin cigar and offered this argument to prove his point: Back in early October, the polls showed him with 10 per cent of the vote. He said he knew this was a normally Republican vote and it his per-

Grannies, Tombstones Are Help to Medical Sleuths

NEW YORK (UPI) — Researchers probing mysteries about birth defects sleuth in cemeteries and in the parlors of great-grandmothers—as well as in laboratories—the medical detectives study tombstones. They record names, dates and other data chiseled into the cold granite.

The researchers "interview" the living and "inter-view" the dead. The purpose: to gain information enabling them to calculate the risks for a defect to occur in a new baby.

The National Foundation-March of Dimes, engaged in the war on birth defects on many fronts, reports that if the risks are great enough, the facts should be given to a couple—additional information about the birth and death records of a family tree.

They want facts about the diseases and worrisome experience. The disastrous experience occurs when a baby is born defective and dead.

The worrisome experience: When the baby is born to live with a serious birth defect—a heartbreak—that occurs one of every six or seven times a year across the nation.

Lettie Wilflee, the social worker who said that, is a member of the medical genetics department at the University of Wisconsin in Madison.

She is going to take a look backward in order to help medical research go forward.

Miss Wilflee and her colleagues are providing families reliable information about congenital and hereditary defective children's physical health.

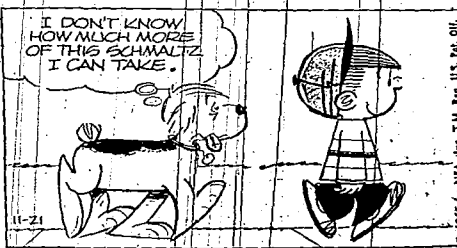
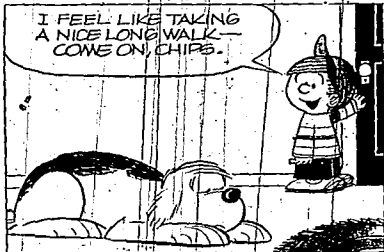
