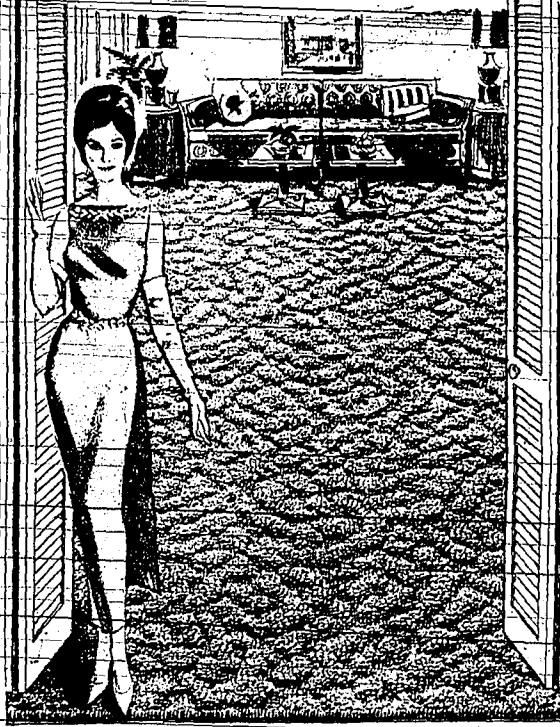

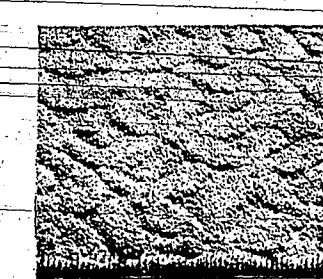

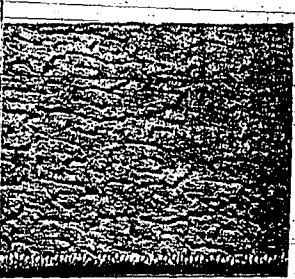

# NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—The American judicial process, for so long dominated by bland disorders of the mind, is now being shaken by a whirligig of events. Which is to say that a federal court here has ruled unconstitutionally a provision of the Voting Rights Act which would permit citizens to vote even if they can't speak or write English.

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# MARQUIS CHILDS WRITES ON WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON—The more sensitive thermometers that register the emotional climate are showing overheat. Those who study the political scene believe this could mean trouble for the future in the form of a new McGovern.

The cause of the overheat is the rapidly escalating war in Viet Nam and the reaction against the demonstrations by groups opposing the war. What with an anti-war demonstration here this week, and a pro-Viet Nam demonstration the following day, there is every indication the temperature is likely to continue to rise.

The Johnson administration bases its opposition to the anti-war demonstrators on the grounds that the progress of the North Viet Nam will take the protests as evidence the United States will pull out of Viet Nam only the war goes on long enough. Certainly the Communist regimes in both Peking and Hanoi make no secret of dissenting views in the West, however minor.

But seasoned diplomats both in Europe and in Asia doubt the anti-war demonstrators' doubts about the significance of the small minority that continues to protest against the war. They can read the meaning of the rapid buildup of American forces and the tactical force in the firepower the Air Force is bringing to bear and this signals intentions more than the words of protest students marches. The protests as relayed by radio and film to the communists and to be useful in stirring them to greater sacrifice. A second suggestion from Rev. Mr. Ellett is that urban churches revamp their programs to put more emphasis on activities—such as musical concerts, films, literary discussions or even a series of couples without children. At present, he points out, most of the churches are slanted toward the family.

He also recommends that the Washington area churches "prioritize" the use of mass media—newspapers, radio and television—as a means of communication. The Washington area army of city dwellers who have no personal contact with any religious body.

## 2.2 Million Get Pay Hike In 9 Months

WASHINGTON (AP)—The labor Department said today some 2.2 million workers under major collective bargaining agreements saw wage increases averaging 4.2 per cent the first nine months of this year. The average pay hike, amounting to 11 cents per hour, was about double the comparable periods of 1953 and 1954, when wage hikes were 3.1 per cent and 3.2 per cent, respectively.

Arthur M. Ross, commissioner of the Bureau of Labor Statistics, said the 4.2 per cent increase cannot be directly compared with White House guidelines suggesting manufacturing wage increases of 3.2 per cent a year.

Ross said this was because the nine-month figures showed only first year wage gains in the labor contract, some of which extend over as much as five years.

Also, he said, the figures do not include the value of fringe benefits, which could make the overall average higher or lower.

Ross said a special study grouping wage increases will cover the length of all contracts covering 10,000 workers or more during the 9-12 month period of the first nine months of 1955.

He said this figure more accurately reflects wage increases in terms of the purchasing power of the dollar.

### Veteran's Letter Gives Inspiration

**SALON (UPI)**—Open letters to Tommie, Tommie, Tommie, age seven, of 8 Holliday Road Englishtown, N.J.

What a lucky fellow you are, Tommie. You wonder around your neighborhood playing baseball, catching grasshoppers and being a general all-around 100 per cent boy.

Maybe you don't know it, but your influence extends far beyond Holliday Road and the big world that it must seem to be in the eyes of a seven year old. Halfway around the world in the country of Viet Nam you are a celebrity and a very important person in the fighting line of the U.S. 1st Infantry Division. They are men who march and fight the enemy in the steaming jungles. But sometimes thinking of why they must fight and die so far away from home they think of you, Tommie.

They think of you because you represent for them the unknown. They think of you because you don't know and hopefully never will know about the horrors of war and the loss of soldiers far from home.

They know about you, Tommie, because of a letter you wrote. Don't think you are the only one of them. It was a letter that tugged at their heartstrings. Your dad's letter told these tired soldiers not to worry about all the demonstrations and noise back home because someone did care and know what they are going through.

"Many years ago I, too, was a soldier in the same Army you're in and I look out on the other side of an ocean and wondered—the same things you wonder," your father wrote. His letter added:

"My thoughts were that I'd rather be here than have my son here. My father probably thought the same thing in 1918 when he was over there. "We do the best we can do so our kids don't have to go through the same anguish. To-day my little boy is seven years old. His turn may come, but if it doesn't, it is because you are doing the job now."

The garbage trucks, providing accommodations for large, bulky items, etc., that cannot be carried in the other trucks, the company also has a D-7 Caterpillar hand-lifted and unladen vehicles, spilling over their slightly and germ-laden debris wherever they went. The three new sanitation trucks recently purchased by the Elden Corp., Twin Falls garbage collection firm, are a boon to the once distasteful job of collecting and disposing of the city's waste material. The new trucks, each of which has a gross weight of 20,000 pounds, are manufactured by the International Harvester Co. and the bed is made by the Hydrin E-Z Truck Co., Gallon, Ohio. The cab of each truck is a special-walk-through design built in Portland. In addition to the three new sanitation trucks, a five-ton open-bed truck is employed to

### Woman Says She Drowned 5 Children

HONOLULU (UPI)—The 37-year-old wife of a U.S. Air Force captain who police say admitted drowning her five children in a bathtub in Honolulu city-county jail today, awaiting arraignment on a first-degree murder charge.

Maggie Young, quizzed by detective John Dickson as saying, "I killed my children. The family had lived in Hawaii about a year, Mrs. Young, an ash blonde, spent from July to September in Tripler Army Hospital as a result of a nervous breakdown. She was still being treated as an outpatient, Air Force authorities said.
