U.S. Death Toll Raised by Battle In Ia Drang

SIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — The battle of the Ia Drang Valley pushed American casualties in Viet Nam last week to 240 killed in action, the U.S. military announced today. It was not only three times as high as announced for any previous week. The U.S. command also reported 470 Americans were wounded during the week ending at midnight Nov. 20 and 6 were missing in action. A record number of Communist soldiers also were reported killed.

The report today brought the total U.S. casualties reported in nearly five years of fighting in Viet Nam to about 130,000 dead and 100,000 wounded. Half of the 240 and a third of the 470 were cut down in the Ia Drang valley in February. The Ia Drang valley was a larger and bigger part of the Ia Drang valley than the American role in Viet Nam was an early one, coupled with the use of helicopters and other air support for South Vietnamese troops.

The highest previous total of American casualties was reported for the week ending Nov. 13. It was 85 killed and 200 wounded. The week before, the total was 73 killed and 237 wounded.

The jump in American and Communist casualties last week was primarily due to the Ia Drang valley. Three Guards Killed In Prison Riot

CHESTER, Ill. (AP)—Minor complaints about prison conditions apparently caused the bloody four-hour convict riot at Menard State Prison Tuesday night in which three guards were killed and six others were injured. Menard warden who went to the prison to talk convicts into releasing three guard-hostages and surrendering started an investigation into the cause of the riot. He said four "madmen" convicts had investigated the uprising, making knives out of steel bars and throwing a fire bomb into a guard cage in the dining hall at dinner. They said they wanted better food, more radios and more recreation.

The four convicts were talked into submission by Randolph and Menard Warden Max Frye and about 12 persons have been surrounded the prison kitchen in which the rioters had barricaded themselves with three guard hostages.

The "cingleaders" permitted a doctor to give one guard, Tom Gross, 24, of Chester, Ill., a blood transfusion through prison bars. Then they released Gross while his convicts became obviously nervous. Gross had been stabbed.

Robling, 30, and Arthur Gene Bierman, 37, both of Sparan, Ill., were released Saturday when the men surrendered. California Floods Take 12 Lives

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Southern California, flash floods in which at least 12 persons have died, are expected to bring heavy downpours.

Rescue workers and cleanup crews feared new mud slides and torrents of water tonight and hoped for a respite Tuesday, when only light rains were predicted.

In the heaviest November rains ever recorded in Southern California, flash floods in highways, arroyos, canals and ditches in at least 12 persons have died, are expected to bring heavy downpours.

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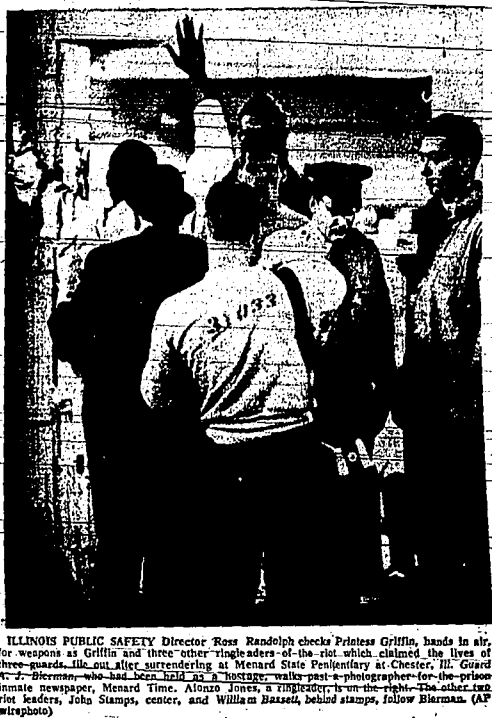

USC's Mike Garrett Is Heisman Trophy Winner; Twilley Places Second

NEW YORK (AP)—Mike Garrett, Southern California's stocky, swivel-jointed back who has thundered his way to the forefront of college football's great game by the 1965 Heisman Memorial trophy Tuesday as player of the year.

Garrett, 20, 185-pound senior, easily outdistanced his opposition in a year-long, 100-odd-vote contest sponsored by the Downtown Athletic Club of New York. Last year's winner was Notre Dame's John Huarte, now of the professional New York Jets.

Garrett got 179 first place votes and a total of 928 points. Howard Twilley, Tulsa's 5-foot-10-inch, wiry, wizard, edged out Garrett for second place, tallying 146 first place votes and 528 points to 481.

Garrett, leading major college footballers in rushing, finished fourth and Floyd Little, Syracuse's "mercenary" runner, was fifth.

"I am overpowered," the soft-spoken Garrett said in a telephone interview to newsmen at the club where the award was announced.

He has gained 3,109 yards in three varsity years compared to San Francisco's Otis Houston, who led in rushing with 1,949 through 1964. Alan Achenbach of Arizona and Alan Ameche of Wisconsin ranked next.

Despite his impressive credentials, Garrett possibly could wind up in professional baseball instead of football.

An outfielder, he hit .308 with 20 home runs last year and was drafted 11th by the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Garrett is a sociology major whose grades are "about as average as you can get."

Others named in this year's balloting, in the order of points received, were: Steve Judy, Michigan State; Tom Nish, Texas; Bob Griese, Purdue; Steve Spurrier, Florida; Steve Sloan, Alabama; Bill Wingo, Notre Dame; Clinton Jones, Michigan State; and Bill Anderson, Tulsa.
