

Sleeping Gas Cause of Fiery Death of Seven

KEOKUK, Iowa (AP) — Officials agree that sleeping gas was the cause of a fiery explosion that killed seven people but they don't know if it got into the building or what touched it off. The fire turned a lighthearted Thanksgiving Eve square dance into a nightmare of death and pain. A survivor said it was "like a bomb going off." Forty-two persons were killed and 30 of them were in critical condition. The victims were attending the weekly meeting of the Saints Eve club a square dance group with most of its members from Keokuk and surrounding communities in Iowa, Illinois and Missouri.

Iowa Adjutant General John Miller and State Fire Marshal William Johnson explored the wrecked building Thursday. They said they agreed with local officials that an accumulation of gas had burst the building with terrific force and searing heat.

An investigation is under way to determine how the gas leaked into the building and what set it off.

"We were dancing to 'King of the Road,'" Alfred McConell, 28, of Keokuk, who with his wife and daughter, Connie, 12, was among those who escaped serious injury.

"We were about half-way," he recalled, "and then came this explosion like a bomb going off."

Sixty to 70 people like at the night dance when the blast tore the building apart Wednesday night. Most suffered burns and injuries.

The dead had been severely burned, one so badly that officials had difficulty determining whether the body was that of a woman or a child.

The names and ages of the slain were Billy Bennett of Keokuk and his son, Tony; Mrs. Louis Besser, Mrs. Roy Sumner, Mrs. Leonard Bryant and Mrs. Leo May, all of Keokuk; and Carol Goodrich of Carleton.

Chester Sturg of Keokuk, one of those critically burned, said the roof of the combination ballroom and ball floor rose into the air, then fell on the dancers.

Pomerelle Opens, Others Await Snow

Pomerelle ski area, near Albion, opened at 11 a.m. and will operate from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. through Sunday. There are about six and one-half feet of snow on top of the mountain and two feet at the bottom, with six inches of packed snow.

Other ski areas are waiting for snow. Officials say there are 18 inches on top of Baldy Mountain, Rotarian ski area at Halley, and 12 inches at the other two.

Owners of the Soldier Mountain ski area near Fairfield said they hope to open Dec. 11 or 12 if there is enough snow by then.

No opening date was given by the Magic Valley area near Mountain Mountain south of Harts. There are about eight inches of snow at Magic and it snowed there all day Thursday.

Problems Are Aired During London Talks

LONDON (AP) — Robert S. McNamara, U.S. secretary of defense, and nuclear problems were discussed at luncheon today with Prime Minister Harold Wilson and top figures of the British government.

Among other things, McNamara was investigating the prospects for reaching agreements with the Russians to halt the spread of nuclear weapons without antagonizing the West German government.

McNamara arrived here from Washington early today. He will hasten to Paris later in the day to attend the meeting there tomorrow of NATO defense ministers.

Informal sources said McNamara's luncheon at No. 10 Downing Street were in the context of a European defense and disarmament conference.

McNamara was accompanied by Gen. Earle G. Wheeler, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Undersecretary of State George W. Ball and John T. Augustine, director of international security affairs. Before luncheon, Foreign Secretary Michael Stewart and Defense Minister Denis Healey.

French Satellite Is Put in Orbit

PARIS (AP) — France sent a satellite orbiting around the earth and joined the United States and Russia in the space race.

The satellite, called the Arielle, is expected to relay radio signals on temperature and other atmospheric conditions for two weeks.

The space vehicle was launched by a three-stage rocket under development for next year.

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Highway Fatalities Exceeding Average

Thanksgiving period traffic deaths increased slowly today—a day of dismal, dangerous driving weather in many sections of the country. The toll reached 184 on the second full day of the tally period that began at 6 p.m. Wednesday and will end at midnight Sunday.

Motor vehicle fatalities around midmorning were exceeding the average of about 110 a day recorded during the first nine months of this year. This was a buck-off from the job day for many Americans. But many others were in the midst of a four-day holiday week-end.

Most of the motor vehicle deaths occurred singly. However, 11 persons were killed in three separate crashes. Eight children ranging in age from 10 to 16 years were orphaned last night when their parents and grandmother were killed in a crash near Kenosha, Wis.

Earlier, three persons died in a head-on crash of two cars near Punta Gorda, Fla., and five others lost their lives in a head-on collision of two cars near Dayton, Tenn.

Rain and snow in wide areas in Western and Midwest areas made driving conditions hazardous on many highways and also may have resulted in higher traffic.

The National Safety Council, which regards Thanksgiving as largely a home holiday that involves little long distance driving, did not estimate the number of traffic deaths for the 102-hour period.

For comparative purposes, The Associated Press made a survey of traffic fatalities in the month-long period of 6 1/2 days Wednesday Nov. 10 to midnight Sunday Nov. 14, also a 102-hour period. The toll was 184.

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Idaho Has No Deaths, Four Are Injured

No fatalities were reported to mar Thanksgiving Day in Idaho, but four persons were seriously injured in an accident west of Mountain Home.

Reported in serious condition at Boise hospital were John Pfeiffer III, 25, of Buhl, his wife, Gladys, 22, a daughter, Celeste, 22, and a son Jeffrey, 10.

State police said the accident occurred about 9 p.m. on a two-lane highway near the town of Mountain Home. Pfeiffer was driving a 1964 Buick Wildcat when it crashed into Pfeiffer's car, which went off the road and rolled three or four times.

Police said another accident near Payette demolished two cars which he heard.

One of the cars was driven by Warren R. Jensen, 26, of Boise, and contained his wife and two children. The other was driven by Gerald Stein, 42, of Payette.

Reported in satisfactory condition were the two men in the hospital where they were taken for treatment were Mrs. Jensen and Pfeiffer. The others were treated and released.

Wilson Asks For World Nuclear Pact

LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Harold Wilson urged today ahead today with a concerted diplomatic drive for a world nuclear pact to end the arms race and the war in Viet Nam.

Foreign Secretary, Michael Stewart flew to Moscow Monday to discuss the Soviet-Libyan terms for a world pact to halt the spread of nuclear weapons.

At the same time Stewart will seek the Soviet-Libyan to join Britain and reconvene the 1954 Geneva Conference which divided the French colony into Cambodia, Laos and North and South Vietnam. Britain and the Soviet Union were co-chairmen of the conference.

Wilson's aims in the field of nuclear weapons were disclosed Thursday night by British sources. His preparations for the Geneva conference were announced by the prime minister in the House of Commons.

When Wilson poses the Geneva conference, he hopes to be able to put before the president the results of British proposals for Moscow's views.

Wilson, however, will have an earlier opportunity to talk over the situation both in the nuclear field and in Viet Nam.

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Widows Get Wood On Thanksgiving

Hermit Plans To Stay Put Despite Dam

MARIPOSA, Calif. (AP) — A hermit who lives on a tiny farm perched on a hillside in the rugged Sierra Nevada foothills says he is happy where he is and plans to stay.

However, in a few months the Eschschuer Dam project will be completed and the old gold prospector's farm will be covered by 12 feet of water.

He refuses all attempts to persuade him to move to town.

The hermit is Pedro Arato, who says he is 82 years old. His last trip to Mariposa was in 1942. He has no knowledge of any president since Franklin D. Roosevelt.

The authorities are in a quandary. The Merced Irrigation District says it has no legal right to enter Arato's property.

And bureau officials say it would take months of legal wrangling to force him off.

The old man, thin and in failing health, says he doesn't need money.

"Once I work hard for food and I save money, then it comes to me I work only for money, money which soon disappears. Here I don't need any."

Arato has been supplied with food by the State Welfare Department. The only way to reach his one-acre farm is by mule pack train and next week 400 pounds of food for the winter will be packed in to him.

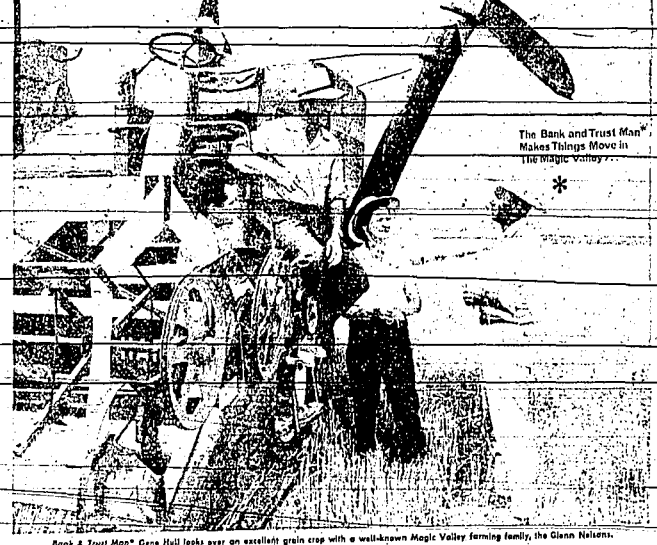

Tooth Decay Is Disease, Contagious

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Scientists have discovered that tooth decay is a highly contagious disease, not a defective tooth, as many people believe.

That means if you have a cavity, you are imperiling your own smile.

This is not going to stop kissing, said the researcher, Dr. Dana D. Zinner, in a bit of understatement.

"But it does mean we have made a good step forward in stopping tooth decay," he said.

"For many years we thought of tooth decay as hereditary," Zinner said in an interview.

"You can't know that if an individual does not have a certain type of bacteria in his mouth, he will not get it."

"You can eat all the candy, cake and soda pop you want if you don't have the bacteria," he said—and your teeth won't decay.

"Of course, if you do have the bacteria, every time you eat something with sugar in it, you are giving the bacteria food along which to destroy your teeth."

The bacteria are transmitted by direct contact, said Zinner, a University of Florida researcher who is studying tooth decay with her colleagues for the past five years under a Public Health Service grant.

About 95 per cent of the population of the world has tooth decay, Zinner said.

"The biggest majority have the slow acting type," she said.

"You might catch a faster, more virulent brand from your girl friend, or even a kiss on the cheek," he said.

The bacteria discovered so far is *Streptococcus sobrius*, Zinner said.

It is the most persistent bacteria, but they also become part of the crystal surface of the teeth and act as a wall against other bacteria, he said.

Defector Says Group Plans Takeover

WASHINGTON (AP)—A defector from the rebel forces in Santo Domingo says the group has plans to assassinate U.S. Ambassador Taylor Bennett Jr., "sabotage the whole Dominican Republic and take over the country."

Jaun Isidro Tapin, 24, said in testimony released today by the state intelligence department that some of the rebel leaders were carried out after a new government took office last September.

The defector said he served the rebels as a commando captain and decided to defect when he became convinced the rebels were seeking a return to constitutional government, but Communist takeover of the country.

The plan to kill Bennett, he said, involves putting a time bomb in the ambassador's automobile. Rebel plotters, he added, have expert technicians—some of them trained in guerrilla warfare at the training camp of Communist Cuba—to carry out such an assignment.

Irishman Has Faith in Gold Mine

GOLDFIELD, Nev. (AP)—Among determined Irishmen, gold-digging Martin Duffly perhaps the most persistent in pampering, polishing and putting around his own nonpolluting hole in the ground.

Duffly, 67, has been working his old Florence Mine for 26 years—hoping for the day the price of gold goes up, making mining pay again.

Duffly has his mine in top condition, even though it hasn't produced any since 1932. He said the Florence produced \$3 million in gold in its heyday.

Duffly admits a helluva lot more where that came from. He told Los Angeles Times reporter Charles Hillinger, "I've been waiting a long time for the price to go up."

Duffly's mine is in the semi-desert town of Goldfield, a mining camp that boomed furiously from 1904 to 1918. Today it is the site of a small town of about 100 people, 180 miles north of Las Vegas.

Duffly said that more than 20,000 miners, their families and others lived here. Now there are only more than 100. Duffly said this town and never left. Duffly said he first went to work in the Florence in 1927, but he had been in 1923 and has been the owner since 1960.

He said he also served as Esmeralda County commissioner for 12 years, then served in the state senate from 1959 to 1962.

Duffly admits it sometimes seems like a waste of time working in shafts as deep as 120 feet underground, having track pulling mining carts and working with pick and shovel.

His wife, Ruth, a former teacher at the high school, commented: "no one can say Duffly's not a determined Irishman."

Wounded GI Tells of Eight Days in Viet Nam Jungle

PLEIKU, South Viet Nam (AP)—Tommy Braveboy told in detail Thursday of the eight days he lay wounded in the la Drang Valley jungle, often no more than a stone's throw from the enemy.

The 24-year-old American soldier, married Creek Indian, from Coward, S.C., was wounded in the recent bloody battle in which 1,000 North Vietnamese troops fought North Vietnamese regiments in the central highlands along the Cambodian border.

A helicopter Wednesday plucked him from the battlefield.

Despite his long exposure to the elements and multiple wounds, the young private first class of the 7th Cavalry Regiment was reported in satisfactory condition at a field hospital.

"I heard footsteps," Braveboy was quoted as saying of one close brush with the enemy.

"Then four North Vietnamese passed me. The first three didn't see me, but the fourth looked straight in the eye."

"He stopped and pointed his rifle at me. I raised my wounded hand and shook my head. I don't know why, but he lowered his gun and walked away. He was so young, just a boy, no more than 16 or 17 years old."

The enemy were so close to him, Braveboy said, that he could have picked up a rock and hit the young soldier.

"I realized there were no medicines around," Braveboy was quoted as saying. "There were no GI's anywhere."

"The enemy took all the food around there. They even broke into my C rations and took the chewing gum."

"I had a lot of blood from my hand wound, and even on the first day I was becoming weak."

"Then the Air Force began to eliminate small enemy units. I don't know how they did it, but they were landing all around me. All I could do was stay flat on the ground and pray that they wouldn't hit me."

Braveboy related how he crawled into some bushes for protection against the night's cold and dampness.

"The mosquitoes and bugs were terrible," he said at the end of his story.

"On the seventh day I nearly gave up hope."

"I was bloody, but it was all I had to signal with."

There are some whose men will not come home. For them, it also is a time to give thanks. They tell you they still have many blessings.

Mrs. Imogene Ferrell, wife of a former platoon sergeant, gathered her four children about the dining room table.

Other women whose husbands have been killed in Viet Nam took part in similar scenes. There have been 29 men from Columbus, home of Ft. Benning, who have been killed in Viet Nam in two years—20 within a week.

Mrs. Ferrell, a native of Brownsville, Tenn., said, "I feel I was never more blessed than at this moment. I am more fortunate than I ever was, because I have my family and so many friends. I had my husband for more than 20 years and I love so many memories."

She was notified of his death less than a week ago.

Some families shared their holiday fare. Mrs. Laura Farnes and Mrs. Ann Blue have two children each.

Mrs. Farnes' husband is a helicopter pilot and Mrs. Blue's is an infantry captain.

As they gathered their children about them, they talked about the future.

Cause of the fire was not determined.

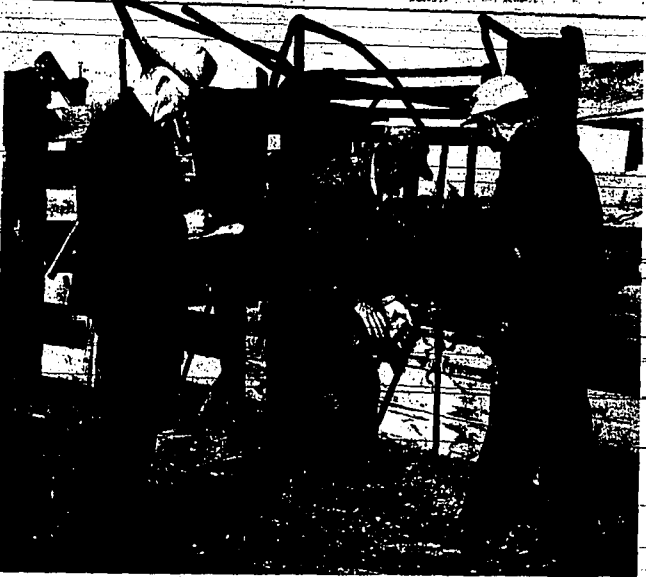

Predicted Idaho All-Crop Production Is Said Lower

BOISE—Prospective all-crop production in Idaho declined two points during October to 174 per cent of the 1947-49 average, reports the USDA Crop Reporting Service for Idaho. Production was below Oct. 1 indications for apples, peaches, corn and grain and potatoes. Estimates for the other crops were unchanged from a month ago. The Idaho all-crop production index is 174-100 for this Nov. 1 compared with 176 last month and 159 for 1954.

Harvest of late season crops progressed rapidly during October under favorable weather conditions. Temperatures for the month were above normal in all areas while precipitation was below normal in most localities. By Nov. 1, potato harvest was well advanced and completion and harvest of winter crops was delayed in some areas of north Idaho by short moisture supply.

Emergence was good except in the drier localities of north Idaho. Generally favorable stands were reported in most areas. Harvested yields from Idaho's corn for grain averages average and higher than those expected a month ago. The 1965 crop is now estimated at 1.58 million bushels, would be five per cent below last year but 10 per cent above the 1953-54 average. U.S. corn and grain prospects were down one per cent from Oct. 1, but still a record high, 16 per cent more than the 1964 crop and eight per cent above average.

Little change was noted during October for Idaho's sugar beets and the 1965 crop remains forecast at 2,860 million tons. Harvest progressed rapidly under favorable weather conditions and was well over half completed by Nov. 1. Sugarbeet content is reported to be higher than a year earlier.

U.S. sugar beet prospects declined one per cent during October and a crop of 21.46 million tons is now estimated. This is eight per cent below the record high 1955 crop but 16 per cent larger than average. Prospects for the Idaho commercial apple crop declined slightly during October and the 1965 crop is now estimated at 1.35 million bushels. A crop of this size would be seven per cent below 1964 but 24 per cent above average. This year's crop was of exceptionally good quality and color.

dam, sire, and miscellaneous notes such as calving difficulty were recorded.
Baughman began the second part of his record keeping Monday. With the help of the extension agents he first weighed the calves. The actual wean weights for calves 115 to 285 days old were adjusted for a standard age of 200 days.
The weights were adjusted further to compensate for the age of the dam; up to 70 pounds in the case of a two-year-old heifer. Finally, adjustments were made for the sex of the calf.
After each calf was weighed, Baughman, husbandman Wells and a neighbor, Leon Morris, Buhl, judged its grade. Numerical scores were given ranging from 18 for "Average Good." The average score was recorded for each calf.
When the calves are a yearling, Baughman will again weigh and grade the animals. He expects the progress of each calf to be highly visible from a comparison of wean weights and grades with yearling weights and grades.
More important for a breeder than the progress of each calf is the detection of inherited traits. Clear correspondences between the traits among generations will appear only after several years of record-keeping. However, a few inherited characteristics were clear from the outset.
For example, when Baughman plotted the grades and weights of the calves on a graph, there appeared a cluster of low-grade, small calves. Baughman's suspicion, most of the calves in this group were closely related. In this case poor grade and size were related to the sire.
Baughman indicated he had considered several of the poor producing dams before he began production testing. Now, with the confirmation of the ad-

1965 Food Bill Estimated - Six Per Cent Above 1964's

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Agriculture Department estimated the 1965 food bill will be around \$89 billion, exclusive of alcoholic beverages.
This is about six per cent above the 1964 consumer-food bill of \$83 billion, which did not include the alcohol excise tax.
In a review of the demand and price situation, the department said the food bill is likely to go even higher in 1966.
The department's Economic Research Service said the above-average gain in 1965 was spurred by rapidly rising alternative incomes and was characterized by growing demand for consumer services, such as eating away from home.
ERS said food consumption per capita in 1965 is slightly lower than the high level of a year earlier. The use of crop production is running about 10 per cent higher than that of livestock

products, especially pork, it lower.
ERS said prospects for 1966 include continued increases in per capita outlays by consumers for food; increased food services—a slower rise in retail food prices than this year; and a slight decline in per capita food consumption.
Among the non-foods, domestic use of cotton is expanding slightly this year, ERS said. This is also partly for 1965 legislation which permitted reduced prices to mills.
The agency said total cigarette consumption this year is rebounding from the reduced rates early last year and is expected to continue record-high in 1966.

New "Self-Service" Hog Feeding Method Devised

Albion, Ga. — What may be through all of the pens, will supply the hog with his own feeding of hogs was described by Carl Van Gilt, research agricultural engineer of Ft. Belknap, Wisconsin, and Robert M. Peart, associate professor of agricultural engineering at Purdue University, Lafayette, Indiana.

The two specialists designed a self-service system which will automatically mix a slurry, a liquid mixture of feed and water, and inject it directly into the hog's mouth.
Having determined the average hog's eating rate and mouth feeding nozzle which delivers a measured amount of slurry each time the hog bites on the nozzle and depresses an actuator. The hogs learned to use this nozzle quite readily with practically no feed wastage, Van Gilt and Peart said.

"It was found that a hog could consume 0.15 pounds of nozzle when it was mixed with water at a 3.0 water to dry feed ratio," the agricultural engineers reported. "This is one and a half times as fast as he could consume feed from a conventional self feeder."

Van Gilt said the nozzle could be incorporated into a complete feeding system in which a single pipe with a number of nozzles, passing through the pens, would supply the hogs with their own feeding of hogs was described by Carl Van Gilt, research agricultural engineer of Ft. 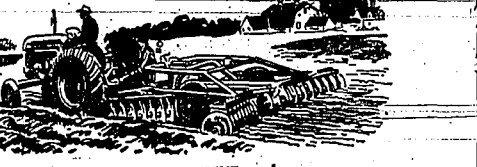

Women, Children Crowd Hospital at Da Nang, Hospital Chief Declares

DA-NANG (UPI) — "As you know, the Da Nang hospital is crowded with women and children." Hospital Chief Declares.

And Tung admits that even for those who reach his hospital, the care is not good, because of the shortages. We need everything: nurses, beds, drugs."

Moreover, many of the wounded need specialized treatment for which the Da Nang hospital doctors have been trained.

Most from artillery, most of them come from shells, says Tung. When asked what was the principle type of injury among the civilian casualties, "And at least 10 per cent from napalm alone."

To heal and repair a limb disabled by napalm burns requires a skilled plastic surgeon. In all of Viet Nam, there is but one resident plastic surgeon, he is in the city of Da Nang.

At Tung, conducting a visitor's tour of his crowded wards, he says, "The young men have gone to the front. They don't stay in villages. They only receive medical attention in the small area of the compound and the civilians who manage to reach the hospital are perhaps only half of those who are injured."

As many as four patients were crowded into a single bed. "The small wounds we spend less time on," said the doctor.
