

Dissenters March On Washington To Protest War

WASHINGTON (AP)—An army of dissenters marched at the White House and rallied in the shadow of the Washington Monument Saturday in a massive protest against the United States role in Viet Nam. Peace placards glistering in a warm November sun, they paraded a slow-moving, circles on sidewalks around the White House, then marched to their headquarters.

Suspension Of Bombing Is Pondered

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Johnson administration is holding a meeting today to consider the possibility of a suspension in the bombing of North Viet Nam if it is ever perceived that such a move would lead to a Vietnamese peace talks.

At the moment administration officials say they see no reason to change their policy. Under field North Vietnamese agents for talks and the expectation here is that the war will end over the next few weeks.

Both sides, in fact, are in a tactical military stalemate. The United States is sending 100,000 men—a decline from 200,000 men—a move to an expansion beyond that of 25,000 or more. They also report that North Viet Nam's military production is increasing and that as many as four North Vietnamese divisions may be thrown into the fight by early next year.

Nevertheless, peace probes are continuing, despite the refusal of Gen. Dean Rusk's refusal to discuss current diplomatic activity. And in these contacts between United States and Communist leaders, the talk of continuing the war is being avoided.

Most recently it is understood that the continuing of a bombing was raised by the Senate Majority Leader, Sen. Mike Mansfield in a 10-day tour. With four days, Mansfield is on a 10-day tour with President Johnson's evident blessing.

Uncle Sam to Spend Over \$100 Billion

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (AP)—The federal government will spend well over \$100 billion for the first time in history during the present fiscal year. Administration officials disclosed for the first time Saturday night expenditures now are estimated at between \$105 billion and \$107 billion and income at more than \$95.5 billion. This would indicate a deficit of \$8.5 billion to \$10 billion. But sources close to President Johnson expect it to be smaller than that, perhaps \$7 billion to \$8 billion. Their explanation is that the revenue estimate is on the conservative side.

Army Blast Death Toll Rises to 10

KEOKUK, Iowa (UPI)—The death toll rose to 10 Saturday in an explosion and fire which ripped apart the National Guard armory Thanksgiving Eve. Three persons died in town hospitals Friday night and Saturday from burns and injuries they sustained when the explosion during the holiday square dance collapsed the walls of the armory and sent the roof crashing down on the dancers below.

Six persons were dead on arrival at local hospitals immediately after the tragedy and another died the next day. Thirty-eight survivors of the explosion and fire were still hospitalized in low and mild conditions, with 23 of them listed in critical condition. The four in Mercy Hospital in Burlington were termed "very critical."

Utah Worker Is Killed by Falling Limb

RUPERT—A Utah construction worker was killed Saturday afternoon when a 52-foot tree limb fell and hit him on the back of the head and neck. Carl Wallace Ashaker, 53, Clearfield, Utah, was operating an international TP-18 crawler tractor with a hand blade on the front, on a logging job on the east side of the town, 425 East and 200 North of Rupert.

Soldiers Killed in Rawalpindi, Pakistan

RAWALPINDI, Pakistan (AP)—Five Indian soldiers were killed as a result of "friendly fire" by Pakistani troops in clashes in the Wagah, Hussainpur and Indian sectors, 200 miles east of Rawalpindi, a government spokesman announced Saturday. Pakistani troops suffered one casualty, he added.

13 Utahans Killed in Plane Crash

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah (AP)—A two-engine football charter plane groping its way through a snowstorm struck a hillside and crashed into another southwest of Salt Lake City on Saturday. Terrorists Strike in Salisbury

SALISBURY, Rhodesia (UPI)—American terrorists Saturday night bombed houses in Salisbury, Rhodesia, which sent five to a tobacco warehouse. The terrorists were thrown at the bus in the suburbs of Highfield.

Ground-War Surges As Regiments Battle

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Viet Cong and South Vietnamese regiments battled Saturday night on an abandoned rubber plantation in a thunderous upsurge of the ground war after a two-day lull. U.S. planes blasted at Red positions in the area—45 miles northeast of Saigon. A U.S. spokesman said no American combat troops were committed, but some Americans were killed and others wounded. These protesters were advisers to the South Vietnamese army's 7th Infantry Regiment, whose command post was overrun early in the fight.

Holiday Road Death Toll Reaches 384

The traffic death toll rose Saturday to 384, the highest for the total for the long Thanksgiving period. The annual weekend loss of life—often high—apparently lifted the death rate as motorists shifted into their Saturday and Sunday driving patterns. During the compilation period that began at 6 p.m. (local time) Wednesday and ending at midnight Sunday, the count was running ahead of the 1965 average of about 100 motor vehicle fatalities a day.

The bulk of the deaths on the streets and highways were occurring singly or in pairs. But there has been a threat of multiple-death accidents. In recent years, the tally of traffic deaths during the Thanksgiving period has all but doubled—ranging from 442 in 1960 to 531 in 1964.

Red China Loses Friend In Africa

TUNIS (AP)—Communist China's heavy-handed diplomat has lost her number one African ally and helped defeat the latest move to bring Peking into the United Nations. A serious crisis in China's relations with Tunisia has brought the two countries to the verge of a diplomatic break and has caused China to withdraw its recognition by a simple majority of the U.N. General Assembly.

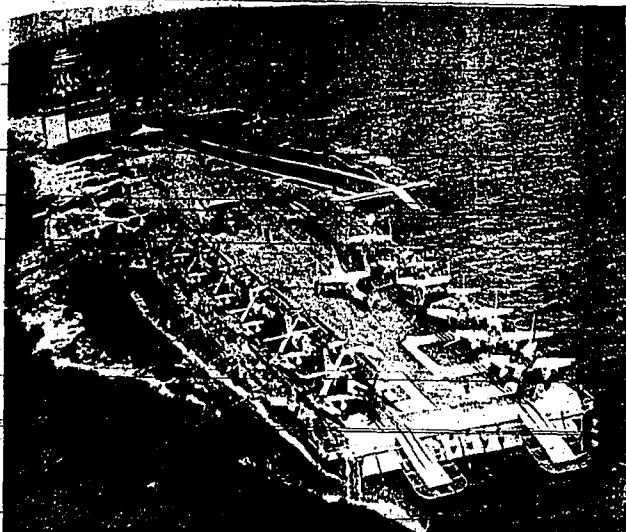

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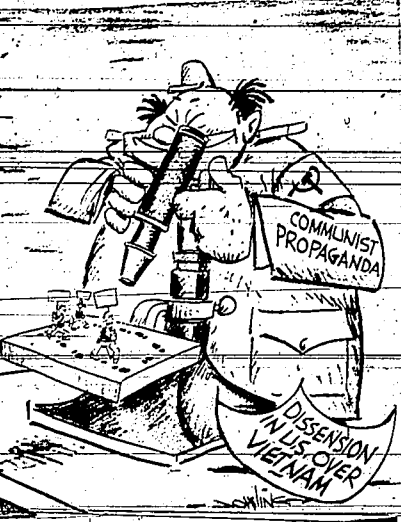

Pilots Hunt For Missing Boise Pair

BOISE (AP)—Twenty-seven pilots made another futile search Saturday for a missing twin-engine airplane that disappeared over backcountry Northwest of Boise.

One week ago Saturday night, Dan Roberts, a Forest Service pilot, and Judy Newhart, a Boise pilot, left Boise just before dark for a mountainous area 50 air miles from Boise.

They have been unreported ever and no one has reported seeing a white Navion single-engine craft.

Search efforts were held up about 2 p.m. Saturday because of poor flying weather. Then it cleared and search planes went up again for the fourth straight day.

Det. Moulton, State Aeronautics Director, said the search would resume Sunday morning as soon as the fog is out of the valley. "We'll plan it an early day," he said.

The highway was hindered by snow on the terrain despite improved weather in the afternoon.

Moulton explained that the missing plane had a white body with yellow-orange wings which were difficult to spot in the snow.

He said the snow was getting deep due to the storm Friday and pilots could not see trying to find the plane.

Moulton said two hunters reported hearing a plane circling the backcountry area. "I don't know if it was a plane or a hawk," he said.

But he said the search was because there had been no actual sighting of the plane.

"Pilots seem lead comes out," Moulton said, "we'll stop and let the people go back to work."

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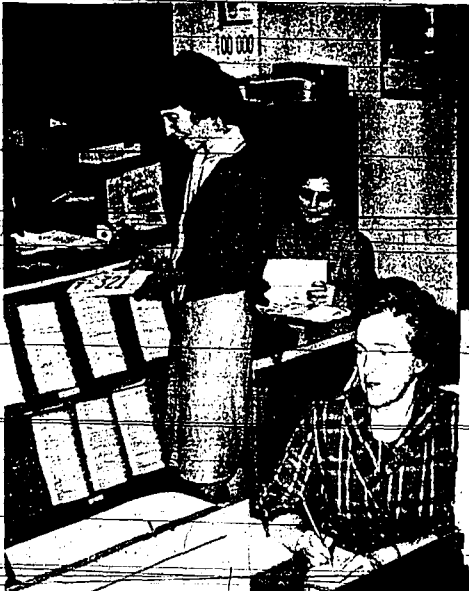

Fortas Uses Illustration to Show Counsel Necessary for Fair Trial

WASHINGTON (AP)—"I believe," Abe Fortas told the nine justices of the Supreme Court today, "that this case dramatically illustrates the point that you cannot have a fair trial without counsel."

The time: January 1964. The case: That of Clarence Earl Gideon, an indigent inhabitant of a Florida jail serving a five-year term on conviction of breaking into a pool room.

Fortas, a well-known attorney and long-time friend and adviser to Lyndon B. Johnson, was asking the court to rule Gideon had been tried unfairly because the judge turned down his request for a lawyer.

Fortas won his case, Gideon's conviction was overturned and the Supreme Court laid down the principle that defendants on trial in state courts for a serious offense have the fundamental right to have a lawyer.

Now Fortas is a Supreme Court Justice. The court announced this week that it will decide how the right to a lawyer applies during police investigations.

The Sixth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, ratified in 1791, says "In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall have the right... to have the assistance of counsel for his defense."

And yet this right was slow in seeping down to the state level. With his landmark Gideon ruling, the Supreme Court riveted the guarantee into state courtrooms. But what about the important period prior to trial? Particularly what about interrogation of a suspect in a police station?

The court's view on this matter is less clear.

In 1964, the Supreme Court in the first time extended the right to counsel to the station house. But the unanimity of the Gideon ruling gave way to a 5-4 verdict

marked by bitter dissent. Danny Escobedo, an Illinois man, had been arrested on suspicion of murdering his brother-in-law. While he was being questioned, in handcuffs, his lawyer came to headquarters and tried to see him.

Escobedo, in turn, tried to see his lawyer. After several futile requests, and after not being advised by police of his right to remain silent, Escobedo confessed and the confession led to his conviction.

The court's majority found a violation of the Sixth Amendment, barred the confession as valid evidence and upset the conviction.

Justice Arthur J. Goldberg delivered the court's opinion. "We hold only," it said, "that when the process shifts from investigation to accusatory—when its focus is on the accused and its purpose is to elicit a confession—our adversary system begins to operate and, under the circumstances here, the accused must be permitted to consult with his lawyer."

Confusion followed in the wake of this decision. The court was flooded with confession cases charging violation of the Sixth Amendment. Lower courts fed the confusion and state and federal courts came up with conflicting answers. Attorneys were puzzled.

The confusion and conflict stem, in part, from uncertainty over how narrowly or broadly the Supreme Court's Escobedo decision is to be read.

Goldberg's opinion spoke of "the circumstances here"—the case. Would his ruling apply to the suspect did not ask to see a lawyer before making a damaging statement?

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Temporary Camps Along Salmon River Are Ordered

SALMON — Outfitters and guides who have established camps along the Salmon River in Idaho's Primitve Area have been notified by the Forest Service that their camps must be of a temporary nature.

The Forest Service said that permanent structures which have been set up in the area are in violation of wilderness regulations.

Those involved, he said, have been given 30 days to meet the requirements.

Howard said there is a specific need for commercial people in the primitive area to make it possible for people to harvest wildlife. Where special use is an individual who is not granted commercial purposes, but is allowed in the area for hunting and fishing purposes, Powers said.

The forest official said the decision to enforce the regulations came at a meeting of the Salmon, Huerfano, Havasupai and Nezperce river superintendents.

Howard said that if the operator exceeds his camp plan, the Salmon River in the Salmon River Breaks Primitve Area on a seasonal basis the camp will have to be of a temporary nature and will need to be taken down when not in use.

The Forest Service has issued specifications for a limited type of construction on the Salmon River.

Camp sites be screened from view of other recreationalists and off the trails.

Storage structure — not over six feet in size and of durable native material will be the only permanent structure that will be allowed.

Tent frames of native material or saved dimension lumber—must be constructed so that the frame can be readily dismantled when not covered by tent. Walls of lumber not over two-foot high and section of lumber are authorized but not mandatory.

Garbage pits must be covered and Hyprox-Corrals must be of post construction using posts. Trees not to be used as posts.

Use of smooth wire electric fences for stock holding is authorized.

Requirement of dismantling camps at the end of each season's use will depend upon the period of non-occupancy and the length of use. Each permit will be considered individually.

Toilet must be of lumber or native construction, Hyprol and located away from the river bank and main trails.

Powers said that operators who use their camps most of the year except for during high water, periods of ice during January and February and during the ice break-up probably will not be required to take down temporary structures.

Powers said that operators who maintain camps in the area below the Salmon River Road between Corn Creek and Salmon Falls are Joe Scoble, Wayne England and Don Smith.

The Forest Service has noted that the Salmon-Breaks Primitve Area is managed under the provision of the Secretary of Agriculture regulation which defines in part: "primitive areas... shall be administered in the same manner as wilderness areas and camps be of a temporary nature and have been in effect since establishment of the primitive area."

The Forest Service also noted that permanent structures which have been set up in the Salmon-Breaks Primitve Area are in violation of wilderness regulations.

To comply with the act and the secretary's regulations, the Forest Service has told the operators that it is necessary that they convert their improvements to a temporary type of improvement that could be dismantled at the end of each season of use, if required.

All structures are to be constructed to a temporary type of construction at the time account in 1967.

Family Worship, Festive Foods Highlight Holiday

Thanksgiving, 1965, was a day of festive food, family fun and family worship, a traditional celebration of our age-old harvest ceremony.

As the Thanksgiving season swept the country, a delightful blend of the old with the new gave the day an up-to-date spirit without sacrificing any of the cherished old traditions.

Elaborate dinners and community festivities dominated the day's activities in Magic Valley, but there was a solemn realization that the observance originated as an expression of gratitude to God for the many blessings bestowed upon all and proper tribute was paid, either during church services or a family gathering.

From that first Thanksgiving Day celebration in October, 1621, families and friends have convened to give thanks in traditional manner. The first Thanksgiving was observed by 50 colonists and 90 Massasoit Indians, a harvest celebration complete with feasts and games that lasted for three days.

More than two centuries later President Abraham Lincoln proclaimed the last Thursday in November as a national day of thanksgiving.

When the Pilgrim fathers gathered to give thanks for the spoils of their first harvest, they gave New World treatment to thanksgiving rituals of ancient legend and lore.

Wild flowers, wheat sheaves and autumn leaves were the Pilgrims' choice for table decorations. Today's decorations were not much different, except perhaps for the wild flowers. Chrysanthemums are usually substituted, since the chrysanthemum is the official flower of November.

Centuries ago in Greece and Rome, abundant harvests were a signal for joy and merriment. Demeter, the Greek goddess of plenty, was honored in a three-day celebration each November. She received fruit, corn and poppies as gifts of gratitude for beautiful crops.

In Rome, maidens wore garlands of flowers during the harvest celebration, and fresh blossoms are still a symbol of bounty and beauty on the traditional day of thanks.

Today, modern people in modern times gave thanks in various ways but all in the spirit of Thanksgiving.

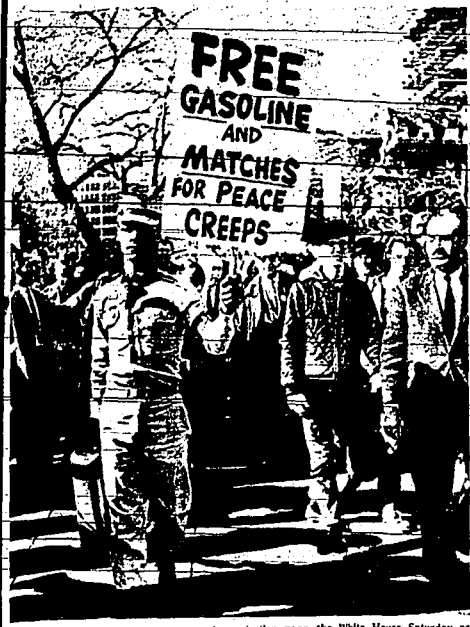

The most frustrating chapter in Ron Adelman's athletic career has just started and it will be called "the tournament."

The 64, 125-pound Gooding athlete already has heard from colleges that probably don't even know who he is. (Maybe they just put that on the crystal ball, and leave the rest up to the man's nerves.) This corner has seen the work of an army of college recruiters, but Adelman can expect double of anything this year because he has the name in two sports—the big sports—basketball and football.

Starting pretty suddenly, "big boys" as Coach Jim Wallace likes to call him, will live his classroom time. Everytime he settles down an assistant coach from another college will knock on his door brought out for an interview.

Not the least of Adelman's problems is the honor brought forth by the Dell Publishing Company which listed him as one of the top 100 high school basketball players in America. An honor indeed, but it makes him a target on the floor and in the stands.

"So far he's received letters from Davidson, Duke, most of the Southeastern conference schools," Dave Stryker at Wichita, Kan. "West Texas State is one of our schedules so they can send you a coach to scout you."

Coach Wallace never has had a boy who drew this much phone, he doesn't know what he is for either.

"I can crush these guys off," he says matter-of-factly. "They'll only want to talk to me this year. The choice is going to have to be Ron."

"We're trying to develop a system," says Wallace. "It's a living him a chance to enjoy his last year" in high school. Ron pretty much accepts

TCU a tie with Texas Tech for second place in the Southwest Conference race with a 5-2 record. Another incident recalled comes at the night Doug Schatz was in quad, he didn't want to go home. Ray Nagel of Utah was there. A coach from Utah State was staking the halls looking for him. Schatz took refuge in Paul Ostyn's office. Ostyn was the phone talking to a Notre Dame coach.

Adelman who has been to Washington State and Idaho in the past couple of weeks in the first of many such trips, will be seeing the nation from the air this winter and spring. It is a great opportunity. A great honor. But it is a great relief, too. 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Army, Navy Trade Scores in First Half, Grapple to 7-7 Deadlock

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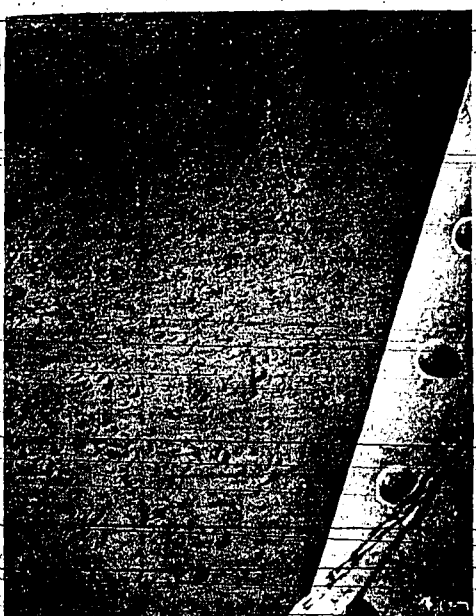

RECHANNELING RUINS 16 PER CENT OF BIG LOST RIVER



HEAVY SILTATION, which has covered over this usually pebbled portion of Big Lost River, is prevalent throughout the stream since a flood-control project conducted by the Army Engineers. Such siltation hit the stream just after the fall spawn of Eastern Brook Trout, indicating there will be little natural reproduction in Big Lost River this year. Idaho has no way of preventing rechanneling and altering of streams, regardless of effect on other interests. The work was done in the past six weeks.

Big Wood River May Be Next

At least 16 per cent — fearfully more — of Big Lost River has been removed from Idaho's trout fishery due to flood control measures described as necessary by the Army Engineers. But the Idaho Fish and Game Department, while admitting the controls were necessary, does not believe the work done offers anything more than temporary relief, does irreparable damage and has destroyed this year's Brook trout crop. In addition, and possibly of even more concern to area anglers is the engineer's decision that similar is needed and will be done on Wood River.

The department received word from the Army Engineers on Sept. 14 that the work was going to be done before Nov. 14 and solicited recommendations for protecting the fishery. The department offered many but so far as can be determined nothing was done.

The original prospectus called for channel widening and straightening in 15 sections for 5,800 feet or 1.3 miles. Some of the sites were slated for two miles.

Stanley Gebhardt, state biologist supervisor, reports that on two of those checked, the distance cleared was five times longer than the distance mentioned. With what we've checked at least 16 per cent of the stream has been rendered entirely unusable for fish. And if the ratio holds true for all of them as it did for the first two, we might find ourselves with one-third of the stream gone.

The immediate result will be loss of the fall spawn of Brook Trout. For even in areas that were chopped up by bulldozers siltation has completely covered the usually pebbled stream. Any survivors of eggs under that siltation will be negligible compared to what the crop should have been.

"It doesn't take a trained engineer to see that even if only 16 per cent of the stream has been removed, the effect is such that it will eventually involve the whole stream. The original work was done to clear out restrictions in the natural channel that were impeding the flow of flood waters and causing the siltation to deposit. Removal of these natural barriers is desirable from a standpoint of flood control, but these same things, we must remember, make ideal conditions for trout.

Continuing, Gebhardt said "the work was done in such a manner that wash and siltation has to continue. Everything carried downstream will eventually lodge against other restrictions in the natural channel—small islands—and there will be a duplication of what we had last spring... places where siltation will cause restriction of water and more floods. Logically another project a few years will clear these barriers and we'll have lost two-thirds with the final third just waiting another build up.

Fish biologists have found in studies that fish in natural channels will have nine times the weight of fish in man-made stream beds. Siltation and bulldozer blades destroy riparian life, both vegetable and animal. So the overall result of this year's work will carry into the next year's season.

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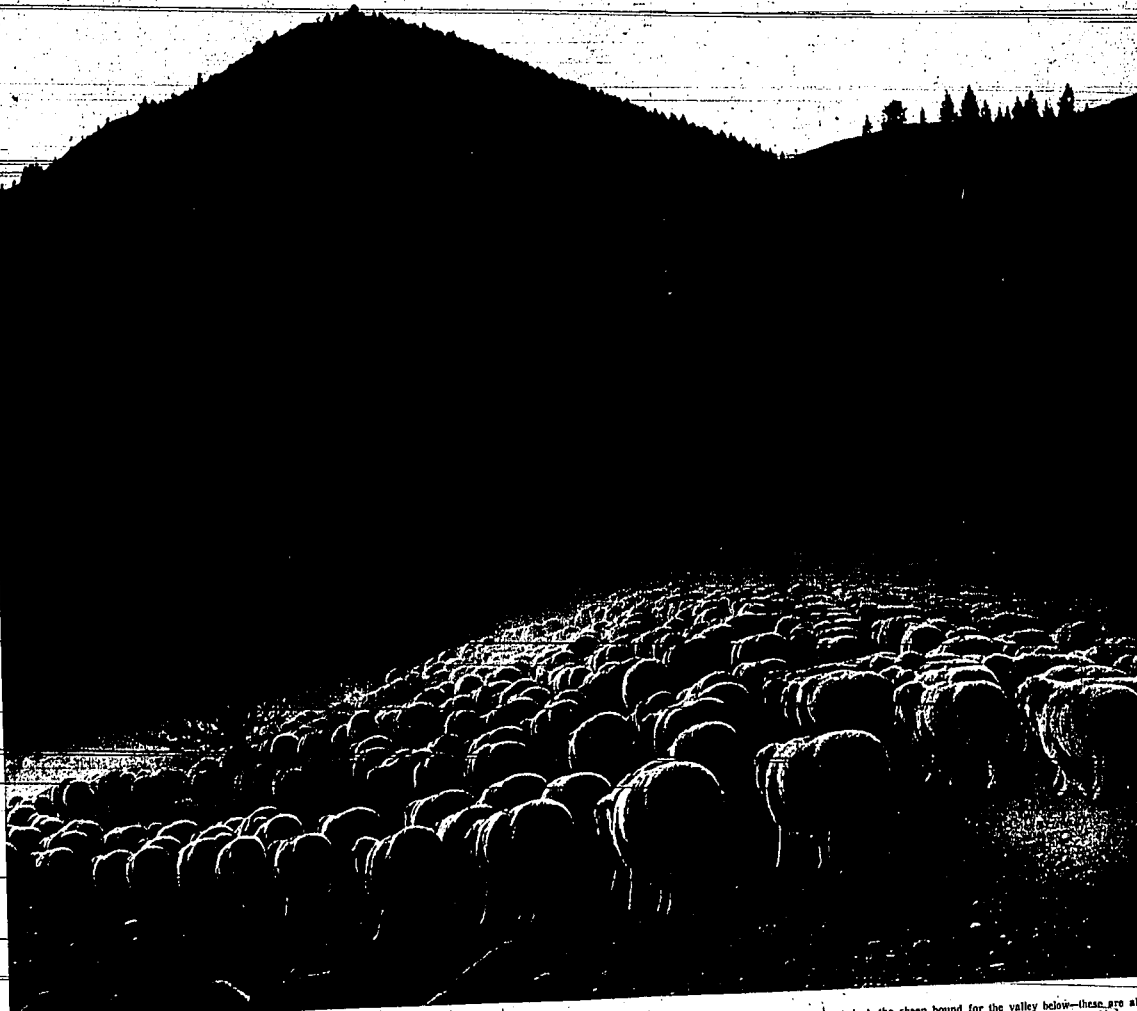

Persistent Autumn Finally Gives Up in Age Old Battle With Winter

The migration just ended will be one of the last for the walking herdsman. Faced with the spread of civilization and the threat of erosion, forest officials have closed many of the old sheep trails and limited use of others. A way of life in the west is near an end because the sheep are being crowded out by the people.

In the high mountain valleys of the area the white mantle of snow is growing deep. The sun-rounder peaks have taken on a winter coat which will last until well into summer of 1937.

The noise of the tourists, the hikers and the wanderers who traversed the peaks and the valleys during the summer and fall has subsided. The quiet of winter is on the land. Only the wind cutting through the pines or around the exposed rocks will disturb the stillness.

Down in the low valleys where the might of the farmers is located, autumn has held on until the last possible moment. Now, though, winter is asserting the role which will result in new life next spring and a resurgence of the old.

Those who live for the springs, the summers and the falls will be gathering around the stove

for a period of months. Those who live for the snow—the skiers and the bundlers—will be in their element. For them the snows of winter will last too short a time.

For many, winter marks the start of a migration to warmer climes, for vacation trips to sandy beaches, splashed by a warm sun and lapped by blue waters. In Magic Valley, scores of permanent residents change their addresses for a period of months and those addresses usually tend Arizona, Southern California, Mexico or Hawaii.

Others come from the warm climes to the snow-covered mountains to get a taste of winter, unknown in their home areas.

It is the "deep snow" winters which are attractive to those who move with the seasons. In the Ketchum area the weekend visitors are becoming the seasonal residents.

New homes are going up; old ones are being repaired and accommodations of all types are being made ready for the winter visitors. Where winter in days past marked an end of most activity it now marks the start of a population growth.

The heavy, cumbersome clothing of years past has given way to lightweight outfits which permit greater activity in lower temperatures.

The activity no longer ends at the fence in the front yard. It extends in the horizon and beyond.

The chill of the air, the crispness of the white cover, the blue of the sky and the rays of a luke-warm sun are sought by many.

During a lifespan some 70 winters come and go. The one just completed always seems worse, the snow seems deeper, the wind greater and the winds higher than the one before it.

But down through the years the hard winters in Magic Valley forest lush harvests to come, the following autumn.

Last winter the snow—in many places, were the deepest on record. They came the earliest and stayed around the longest—this winter which is about to start is expected to be another "deep snow" proposition.

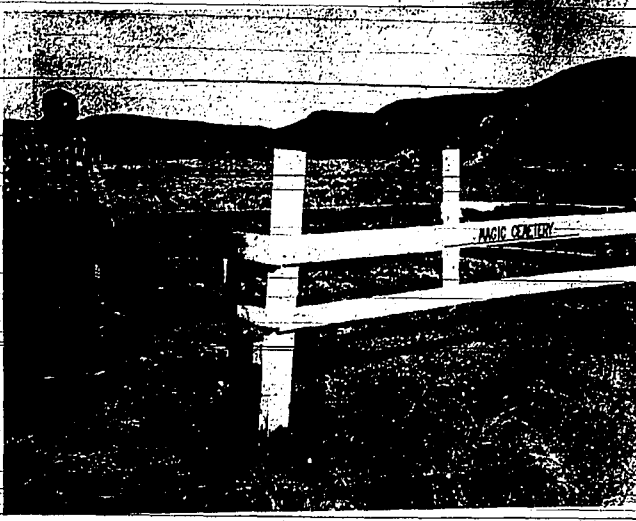

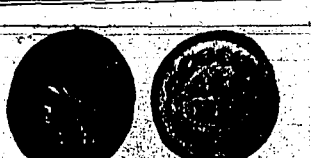

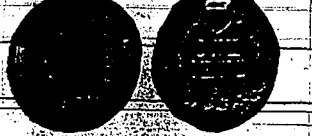

The United States of America has never issued a "penny" striking of half dollars. There are the best of the mint. All of the coins called "pennies" are actually "cents." The term "penny" came from the early colonial use of English money, which was "indented, a penny, and still is."

The dies were made for a three-penny stamp? And yet it seems quite right to say "give me three pennies." Maybe, by usage, the word penny is acceptable although collectors shudder at the word. In conjunction with the above explanation, we have a letter from a reader in Burley, which says, in part, "I am a collector of Indian Head pennies and I would sell for whatever price you would bring at auction a different back on it than the 1859. 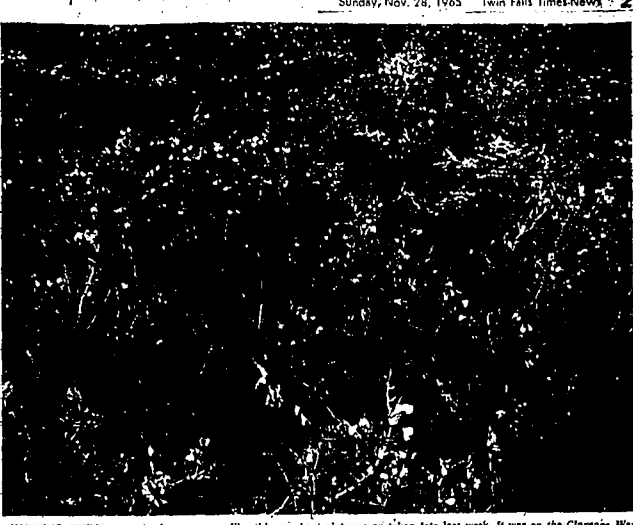

THE HOME LAWN: A reader writes me: "There's not much dried foliage that which pulls up easily as if the roots were dead. At the urging of a specialist, I had the spots sprayed with a 'fungicide' because the man said the dead grass was due to a fungus. Should I dig the lawn up and reseed it?"

I'd like to cite the causes for lawns in such conditions: (1) Dry weather. A benevolent "fertilizer" through which fertilizer bounces back following a rain. (2) Insect damage. Grabbing the lawn with dieting or chloride-baiting is good, and it protects up to five years. (3) Fungus disease.

It's not necessary to remove all the grass seed, but if you're in a hurry, apply a pesticide now or in spring. If fungus is present, dig up the dead spots and level off the soil and reseed now. 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Castro Spys May Slip Into Florida

MIAMI (UPI) — No one here is "discussing" the possibility that Fidel Castro will try to infiltrate a few subversives among the thousands of Cubans who soon will be leaving Miami for the state of 4,000 a month.

The danger that Castro would be sandwiched in among the anti-Castro Cubans is considered a "very real" one by leaders of the Cuban exiles who are already here. Among them is Castro's own sister, Juanita.

But federal authorities, while reluctant to tell how they checked out arriving refugees, stressed that the forthcoming Cuban exodus will be "damn well controlled." Reliable sources claim an elaborate "screening" process will begin before the Cubans even leave the island.

Advance lists of outgoing Cubans are to be in the hands of U. S. authorities long before they are "flown" to Miami; according to these sources.

Once they land in Miami the Cubans will be taken to the U. S. Immigration Center at nearby Opa-Locka, a former Navy airfield, for "detailed processing."

How this processing is conducted remains an official secret. According to authoritative reports, specialists from a number of other federal agencies will participate in it with immigration officials.

These reportedly include FBI agents, Army and Navy intelligence officers, and CIA men. The Cuban Refugee Center in Miami now has on hand requests from exiles already in this country for the admission of 150,000 of their relatives on the island. How many of these Castro will permit to leave
