QUITO, Ecuador (UPI)—An Ecuadorian military officer, a member of the military junta which has ruled Ecuador since the arrest Monday of other members of the junta, the colonel's private secretary disclosed.

The secretary of the army and military police reinforced the guard at the presidential palace. WASHINGTON (AP) — The incidence of violent crime remains on the rise this year, but the FBI says the emphasis is on the big ones.

The national increase during the first nine months of 1965 was 8 per cent compared with the same period last year. But the suburbs registered an 8 per cent rise, while communities with from 10,000 to 50,000 persons showed a 7 per cent gain.

Incidents with more than one victim were up 10 per cent. Rural areas reported no change in the crime level.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Job Corps expects about 80 per cent of its 16,000 members to spend this Christmas at home, with the government paying round-trip travel expenses.

EGGS NOT USED

BOISE (UPI) — The federally-distributed powdered eggs found unfit for human consumption in the state of Washington are not being used in Idaho, a state health official Monday said.

Dr. John E. Mather, director of preventive medicine, said a six-week investigation showed the eggs were not being used in Idaho schools, hospitals or welfare programs.

The eggs were found to be contaminated with salmonella bacteria that can cause a severe and sometimes fatal type of food poisoning.

AUTOPSY ORDERED

BOISE (UPI) — An autopsy was ordered by the Civil Aeronautics Board Monday on the body of a Boise pilot killed in a back-country plane crash Nov. 20.

Coroner Ralph Lansing of Boise County requested the autopsy order. However, Lansing said he did not plan any inquest into the crash that killed Don Roberts, 44, a Forest Service employee, and Judy Newman, 24, a hospital clerk, both of Boise.

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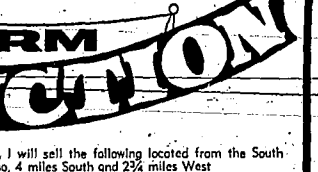

"Community Action Programs" Get \$685 Million in War on Poverty

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Nearly half the money voted by Congress for the war against poverty—\$685 million out of \$1.5 billion—will be spent in the current fiscal year—\$1.5 billion—earned for "community action programs."

A community action program can be almost any kind of project from a birth control clinic to a night school for illiterate adults. Local planners simply must feel it is of real benefit to the poor in that particular community.

Detroit provides free medical and dental treatment. Washington, D. C., offers free legal help. New Haven, Conn., operates neighborhood employment-offices. In New Haven, Conn., poverty war fund-raising being used to turn seven schools into community centers which remain open until 10:30 p.m. nightly to offer sports, game clubs, evening classes for children and adults, legal aid offices and clinics staffed by visiting nurses.

In Atlanta, Ga., a dozen neighborhood service centers are providing day care for children of working mothers, home-making lessons, family counseling, emergency food and medical assistance, employment services and a vocational training program for 2,000 unemployed men.

The Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO) has interpreted it to mean that no community may receive federal grant until it can show that the poor are well represented on the policy planning board of its anti-poverty agency.

Some people—including OEO Director Sargent Shriver—think this is a great idea, the one thing that makes the current war against poverty significantly different from earlier types of social work and public assistance.

Others—including the mayors of several big cities—think a dim view of an arrangement which threatens the municipal government's control over the golden stream of federal dollars.

Los Angeles found the whole idea so unpalatable that he refused to take the steps necessary to qualify for OEO grants until a bloody riot exploded last August.

Los Angeles now has a poverty board composed of 10 local government officials, four officials of private welfare agencies, and seven representatives of poor neighborhoods. It has begun to receive OEO grants.

But UPI correspondent Nicholas Beck reports there is still much dissension in Negro and Mexican-American neighborhoods, and a feeling that the poor do not yet have any real voice in decision-making.

In San Francisco, the anti-poverty program was stalled by a struggle between City Hall and an organization called "Citizens United Against Poverty" which includes ministers, civil rights leaders and representatives of the city's Negro sections.

The upset was a compromise under which the policy board is composed of eight-poverty area representatives and seven city appointees, with the mayor retaining a veto power over any program-involving city funds.

Chicago's Mayor Richard J. Daley also has been involved in a running feud with a militant right group, the Woodlawn Organization. It charges that the poor has been given short shrift on planning agencies and that OEO money is being used to bolster the city's Democratic political machine.

Early this month, OEO officials were advised by the Budget Bureau—which usually speaks for the White House on matters of administrative policy—that it might be a good idea to put people into policy-making positions and concentrate on giving them jobs in local anti-poverty programs.

When the news leaked out, Washington observers concluded that the sensitive ear of Lyndon B. Johnson had detected outlines of pain from the city mayors who feel that the OEO's rules are upsetting local-political relationships.

The White House promptly issued a formal denial that the Budget Bureau's suggestions to OEO were made on behalf of the President. And Shriver declared that the policy about reservations and concerns will remain exactly what it has been from the very beginning.

In New York, the nation's largest single anti-poverty project, known as "Harvey Act," has landed in trouble of another kind.

Harvey Act provides job training, counseling and other services to 15,000 Negro youngsters in Harlem. Its programs have been praised by both federal and city authorities. It has been credited in some quarters with averting serious racial disorders in Harlem during the past summer.

In Pittsburgh, some 30,000 of the city's 400,000 poor adults have been enrolled for job training, work experience, literacy classes or other programs. And UPI correspondent Gloria Wolford adds: "The freedom of the community action program from politics is little short of amazing in a city run by a firmly entrenched, patronage-minded Democratic machine."

Scandal and controversy inevitably attract more attention than quiet, successful operations. The UPI survey, conducted by reporters in all parts of the country, made clear there are numerous community action programs which fall into the latter category.
