# Rep. White Says Wheat Growers' Income to Rise

BOISE (AP)—Idaho wheat growers' income should increase nearly 10 per cent next year under Congress' farm bill, according to Rep. Compton L. White Jr. He, speaking at a banquet closing the Idaho wheat conference here Tuesday night, said the total income would exceed \$53 million. The key to that increase, he said, "was the battle fought in Congress for 100 per cent parity for wheat marketed domestically." Rep. George Hansen, R-Idaho, earlier in the day had criticized the farm bill as an amalgamation of political expedient promotions attempting to give the bill enough weight for everyone to pass. White said that was a reflection of farm interests' weakened position as urbanization continues.

The act, he said, "that we are to jump all farm programs on one omnibus bill in order to secure enough interest in any commodity program to get it to the floor indicates a weakening of our strength." Hansen, Idaho's 1965 wheat czar, at the banquet was Karen Wheeler, a 17-year-old blond from Genesee. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Wheeler.

In closing business sessions, nearly 100 wheat growers closed Idaho's new sales tax provided property taxes are raised only with two dissenting votes.

# Month of Bitter Fighting Ends in Central Highlands

IN DRANG VALLEY, South-Viet-Nam (AP)—A month of bitter fighting in Viet Nam's central highlands has ended. American and South Vietnamese troops who mated four Communist North Vietnamese regiments in Drang Valley and have gone to seek their enemy elsewhere. Before they left, they reported 2,344 North Vietnamese dead. More are believed to have died in battles beneath the towering hills which mark Viet Nam's frontier with Cambodia, 200 miles north of Saigon. For days men of the 31st Cavalry, Airborne Division and a British paratrooper company paratroopers have been searching the region, trying to provoke a fight. Prisoners say that what is left of more than one division of North Vietnamese has slipped away.

### Father Has To Watch His Children Die

QUAKERTOWN, Pa. (AP) — A 52-year-old father sat in a state police car today and watched his six children die in a fire that burned where six children burned to death.

The victims were the children of foster children of Mr. and Mrs. Chester Allen Sr. The children died Tuesday night when a fire trapped them in a wooden home in a rural area near his southeastern Pennsylvania community. A seventh child was critically burned.

Allen sat in the back seat of the state police car staring ahead as investigators in the pre-dawn darkness tried to learn what caused the fire.

Allen, Jr., 19, said the victims were his brothers, Ernie, 11, and David, 11, and four foster children his parents cared for: Robin Jones, 8; Jack Jones, 6; and Ronnie Jones, 5.

The son said he left his father at the house Tuesday night and at the house Tuesday night and a sister, Elizabeth, 17, to pick up the mother at a nursing home where she worked. Chester Jr. said when they left, his father had been trying to light the furnace to ward off sub-freezing cold.

As they returned home about 11:30 p.m., Chester and Elizabeth and "we saw the flames coming by the side of the house. By the time we got there the whole place was gone."

Chester Jr. said he and his mother tried vainly to reach the trapped and screaming children but were driven back by the intense heat. Finally the mother managed to drag out one son, Alton, 12, who was taken to a Quakertown hospital in critical condition. Chester Jr. and his mother also were treated for burns.

All the victims were Negroes.

### FBI Agent Testifies in Killing Trial

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP)—A veteran FBI agent testified today that one of three men on trial for conspiracy in the death of Viola Gregg Liuzzo acknowledged when arrested that he was in the Selma-Montgomery area the night she was shot.

Special agent Lawrence G. Gettings said defendant Eugene Thomas, 42, of Bessemer, Ala., however, said "he had no knowledge of this slaying."

Thomas, along with Collie Leroy Wilkins Jr., 22, of Fairfield, Ala., and William Orville Eaton, 41, of Bessemer, are charged with conspiring to violate the civil rights of the Detroit mother of five.

Gettings, one of a number of FBI agents testifying in federal court, said prior to questioning Thomas, that the Ku Klux Klanman was advised of his constitutional rights to counsel or silence.

He said Thomas told him he had been in the Selma-Montgomery area three times recently "carrying on Klan activities."

Gettings repeated similar testimony of other agents concerning the finding of a .22-caliber bullet on the right front window ledge of Thomas' car.

Earlier testimony indicated Eaton had been sitting in the right front seat the night of Mrs. Liuzzo's killing and had fired .22-caliber shots from the car.

**City to Haul Unwanted Cars Away**

**NEW YORK (AP)**—The sanitation department has announced it will henceforth haul away unwanted automobiles free in response to a simple phone call.

The new policy was ordered by the Sanitation Commissioner Frank J. Lucas.

As matters stand, thousands of New Yorkers with used cars just walk away each year and leave the old heaps where they stand. The cars, he said, become traffic and safety hazards and unsightly, litter-producing hulks.

Essentially, the sanitation department recognizes that a car has been abandoned and towed away to a city junkyard in New York, said car owners in New York walked away from 23,386 hulks. So far this year, they have abandoned another 20,000.

**Department Inherits Investment**

**WASHINGTON (UPI)**—The Department of Housing and Urban Development has inherited a \$3 billion investment.

A look at where this money has come from and what it has bought shows that the government has deeper in the business world of supporting private housing than it is in building public housing or clearing slums.

About \$2 billion—more than two-thirds of the investment—represents money that private investors have put up to purchase their homes. The government comes into the picture through the Federal Housing Administration by insuring the mortgages.

Since its beginning in 1934, FHA mortgage insurance has been a great boon to the private home building industry.

The public Housing Administration—another agency absorbed by the new department—helps local housing authorities borrow the money to build housing for poor people. PHA then makes annual contributions to pay the rents of this low-income tenants can afford.

So far, about 72,000 units of public housing have been built with federal aid. The total cost: \$7.2 billion.

The Urban Renewal Administration lends or gives money to local communities to clear slums. URA is back of 1,500 projects at a total cost of \$2.6 billion. That's a lot of money but small compared to what has been invested in FHA-backed private housing.

**Shoplifting Reported Fastest Growing Form of Larceny**

**WASHINGTON (AP)**—With only 20 shopping days until Christmas, the FBI reported today that shoplifting is the nation's fastest-growing form of larceny, having increased 93 per cent in the past five years.

Police last year recorded 184,713 shoplifting cases involving stolen goods worth almost \$5 million.

Most shoplifters are women, the FBI said, "probably because of the ease with which the female shoplifter can conceal stolen articles on and around her person."

The FBI's legal term for shoplifting is "stealing." To fit that description, the culprit must take merchandise from a store during business hours and carry it away with the intention of stealing.

Professional shoplifters steal for profit with the intention of reselling the merchandise, the FBI said.

"Usually with little income or means of support, he or she makes it his vocation, primarily working in department stores and specialty shops, though spreading his talent around where it will do the most good."

The professional prefers suburban stores over downtown stores because there is apt to be less security in the outlying establishments.

He often trails accomplices and works in pairs or threes, assigning one to distract the attention of the salesperson while the other helps himself to loot from the counters.

Among the amateur shoplifters are housewives, persons with small incomes and juveniles.

They steal for several reasons, the FBI said, "real or

imaginary hardship, personal need, an opportunity presenting itself, inability to resist temptation, or—especially with juveniles—for the thrill involved."

Housewives, who sometimes steal because of their small budgets—often take wedding apparel and food and sometimes use their children as accomplices, having them out for dishonesty if they are caught in the act.

The 75-year-old president had planned to campaign speeches but changed his mind after public opinion polls indicated his opponents were making gains and many voters were still undecided about their choice for the election Dec. 5.

**Reforestation Project Is Completed Near Fairfield**

**FAIRFIELD**—With considerable help from the future generation, a reforestation program is being conducted by the Forest Service and the Bureau of Land Management.

A project involving about 15,000 ponderosa pine and Douglas fir trees were planted recently at the top of Powell Gulch, northeast of Fairfield, by a crew from the Bureau of Land Management.

The project was under the direction of Bob Brock, Burley, Bureau of Land Management forester, and Wadell Elliot, Shoshone, fire-control officer, for the BLM. Ten men worked on the project, many of them college students who expect to continue their education at the second semester.

Land belonging to Allen Bauer, the Forest Service and BLM was logged over during the last three years. Eighty acres of the BLM land was controlled burned to clean up the slashings and to kill the mistletoe that infests the Douglas fir trees.

Twenty acres was planted with an average of about 70 trees to the acre. The 3-year-old seedlings are about 15 inches tall and were grown at the Tackel nursery from seed furnished by the BLM.

The trees were hand-planted in about a foot of snow. One crew cut a circle, and removed the crusted snow to expose the dirt. The planting crew dug a hole with a special bar, placed the tree and then forced the soil against the roots to shut out the air pockets.

Brock states the trees are usually planted in the spring and that this is one of the first fall tree plantings in the soil until about Nov. 1.

The deep winter snow will insulate the little trees during the winter and he has hopes of 60 to 70 per cent of the trees living if favorable weather and other conditions prevail. He has staked part of the plantings for a future count.

The Forest Service planted smaller trees on its land in the vicinity last spring and there appears to be about 20

per cent of them still living. Brock is well acquainted with the Powell Gulch area having marked the trees for the logging operations and also helped lay out the access roads for the logging operation. He has also planned some trees as an experiment in an area that was always bare of trees, in hopes of getting a stand.

The crews involved in the project lived in hostlers in Fairfield and were taken to the site in four-wheel drive vehicles over the steep snow-covered roads.

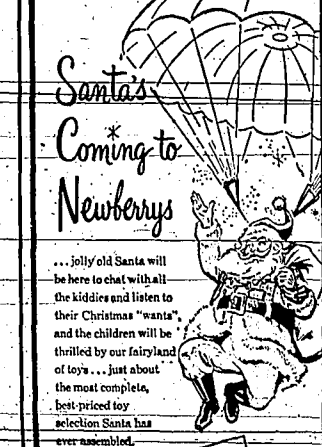

The award to the Wendell youth was the fourth national scholarship won by Idaho at the Chicago meeting of outstanding 4-H members from throughout the U.S. Scholarships of \$500 each were presented to Lynda Campbell, Nampa, for home improvement; Gregory Nelson McCall, for beef; and Donald Everingham Jr., Idaho Falls, for tractor operation.

Dr. John L.S. Holloman Jr., a Negro, said Tuesday night the AMA permits segregation by allowing its county medical societies to practice racial discrimination.

The NMA has about 4,400 members, most of whom are Negroes.

In Philadelphia, Jim Reed, a spokesman for the AMA, said the organization has 200,000 members. He declined to estimate the number of percentage of Negroes.

"We don't keep a breakdown on nationality, politics or anything like that," Reed said.

### 5 Bodies Are Recovered in Plane Wreck

BEAVER, Utah (AP) — All five bodies found Tuesday in the wreckage of a Minnesota airplane on a 12,000-foot mountain in southern Utah were recovered Tuesday afternoon.  
A helicopter from Salt Lake City picked the bodies up at the mountain's 11,100 foot level at the crash site and then transported them six miles down the mountain where sheriff's officers were waiting with four-wheel drive vehicles to take them to a Beaver mortuary.  
Ironically, search planes had flown 100 yards above the crash site late last week, but snow covered the airplane.  
Searchers dug through three feet of snow Tuesday to recover two of the bodies.  
Sheriff Ray Gillies said the plane evidently struck a redwood pine tree, sheared off parts of a wing and motor, careened another 200 feet and then crashed into pine trees, chopping it down and then crashed into the mountain.

# Censoring Ordinance Is Ruled Out

SEATTLE, Wash. (AP) — The city's movie censoring ordinance has been declared unconstitutional.

Sports Court Judge James Sullivan ruled Tuesday they were invalid because of censorship through prior restraint.

The judge said theaters still must comply with state laws against obscenity, which he said are more stringent. Judge Sullivan said the state laws are constitutional because they are enforced by issuance of a license, not by censorship.

One ordinance ruled out by the judge was showing of obscene movies. Another bars advertising such movies. A third forbids a board of theater supervisors with the power to file reports and leaves off obscenity.

The ordinances were challenged by movie distributors and exhibitors.

Twin Falls County Sheriff James H. Bringham said Mrs. Pierce was driving the 1964 Pontiac west on U.S. 30 and struck a large rear wheel on the hay chopper.

The car then ploughed off the wheel and into the path of an oncoming tractor-trailer driven by Roy W. Lee, Twin Falls. The truck pushed the car back to the front end of the car under the tractor.

# West Berlin Raises Funds For Beheaded

BERLIN (UPI) — West Berlin keeps to collect money today to give a Christmas present to the families of American soldiers killed in the Viet Nam "line of the free world."

The city's eight newspapers printed an appeal for funds which they said would be used to send replicas of the West Berlin "freedom bell" to relatives of fallen American servicemen.

"The bell in the tower of the West Berlin City Hall is a reproduction of the Liberty bell in Philadelphia presented to the city by Gen. Lucius D. Clay, post-war American military governor, as a gift of the American people."

"We feel special ties to those who were who were killed in the land or father, son or brother who fell in Viet Nam because we Berliners know that the Americans are ready to defend our freedom with the lives of their soldiers," the appeal said.

The freedom bell replicas will be five and one-half feet by three and one-half. They will bear the inscription: "From the freedom-loving Berliners who know that their city also is being defended in Viet Nam."

# Pasternak Is Slammed by Prize Winner

MOSCOW (UPI) — Nobel Prize winner Mikhail Sholokhov Tuesday attacked Nobel Prize winner Boris Pasternak as an "imperial empire" who had left Russia in spirit if not in body.

He said "the Sholokhov" was the only true Russian to have won the award for literature.

Sholokhov, peppery, crusty and pulling no punches, arrived in Moscow from his home in a small village in the Cossack country of southern Russia to face a news conference of Soviet and foreign journalists.

The writer, wearing a dark blue suit and a white shirt, said Pasternak "was a modern writer" of the Soviet Union and the news conference.

When he was asked by an American correspondent how he felt receiving the Nobel Prize, he was awarded to Pasternak who was not allowed to receive it and to Ivan Bunin, a Russian who moved to Paris after the revolution, Sholokhov replied.

"I have a natural feeling of satisfaction. After the Nobel Prize was awarded in 1933 to Bunin, written on the Nobel Prize was awarded to Pasternak, an internal emigrant, I'm proud that I am the Russian, the first Soviet writer, to receive the prize."

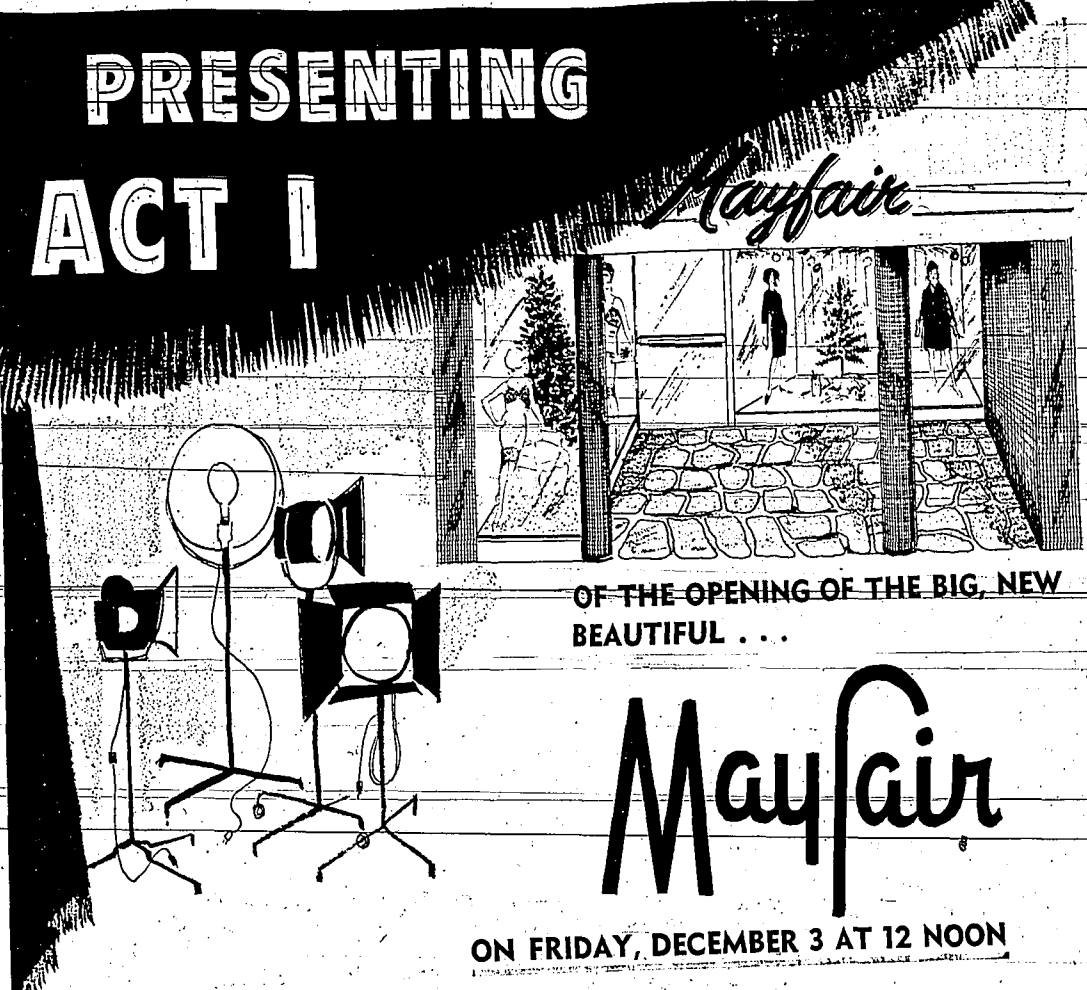

# Jurgensen Takes AP Honors for Player of Week

NEW YORK (AP) — A rich chorus of boos bounced off the eurs of Sonny Jurgensen in the second quarter of Sunday's football game at Washington. "We want Shiner" the fans chanted, calling for second-string quarterback Dick Shiner. Sonny had completed only four of 13 passes for 28 yards. One had been intercepted, he had fumbled once, setting up a Dallas touchdown and the Cowboys had thrown him three times for a loss of 22 yards.

Jurgensen turned the look-to cheerers as he rallied the Redskins from a 21-0 deficit to a 34-21 victory in the most spectacular passing show of the season. As a result of Jurgensen's 26 completions in 42 attempts for 411 yards and three touchdowns, the Associated Press named the veteran the offensive Player of the Week in the National Football League.

It was a week of sensational offensive performances by Gale Sayers of the Chicago Bears, Pete Retzlaff and Sammy Brown of Philadelphia, John Brodie of San Francisco, Jim Brown of Cleveland and Roman Gabriel of Los Angeles. "But it was Jurgensen's fourth 400-yard day of his career that was outstanding. Only 11 NFL players have passed for 400 or more in a day but nobody had done so twice except Sonny."

Jurgensen pitched two TD passes in 2 minutes 16 seconds of a 21-point fourth quarter, leading the Redskins to a 34-21 victory on a five-yard pass to Angelo Coia.

# Racing Group Says Taxes Are too Much

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The president of the Thoroughbred Racing Associations said Tuesday that if the racing industry, with \$1.5 billion in investments, is to survive, it must have relief from taxes and levies totaling \$250 million in 27 states.

"It is high time that we ceased being apologetic and took a firm stand against excessive taxation and the consequent depopulation of thoroughbred racing," Edward P. Taylor told more than 100 racing executives and officials representing the 50 Thoroughbred Racing Association members.

The revenues which most, if not all, of our tracks receive from our share of the "take" are insufficient to pay for all of our expenses of operation with the result that a portion of our maintenance and operation revenues is directed to meet such expenses."

# Knicks Belt Hawks; 76ers Fall 129-108

NEW YORK (AP) — Dick Barnett and Dick Van Arsdale powered a 13-point spurt midway through the second quarter that sent the New York Knicks embroiled to a 138-119 victory over St. Louis Tuesday night in the second game of a National Basketball Association double-header.

Baltimore topped Philadelphia 123-103 in the opener. The victory, which snapped the Knicks' five-day losing streak, came in the New York coaching debut of Dick McGuire, a former Knicks star. McGuire replaced another ex-New York player, Harry Gallatin, 24 hours before the game.

The Knicks and Hawks battled evenly until Barnett and Van Arsdale got hot. Each scored 20 points in the second period, spurs that lasted one minute, 33 seconds.

From that 61-49 lead the Knicks went on to a 77-53 halftime margin and gave McGuire a comfortable margin over his ex-teammate, St. Louis player-coach Richie Guerin.

Field goals by Johnny Kerr triggered the scoring burst that sparked Baltimore to its victory over Philadelphia.

Kerr and the Bullets went to work after Will Chamberlain's jump shot snapped a 53-53 halftime tie. Kerr tied the rapid center with a jump shot that Bullets shot to a 61-55 lead on three more field goals by Kevin Loughery, Don-Ont and Jim Barnes.

After Chamberlain hit another field goal and Billy Cunningham put in a free throw, Kerr again hit a jump shot, this time igniting a 10-point spurt. Kerr scored the other three points on a free throw and a layup on a fast break.

The 76ers never got closer than six points after that.

One reason for passing off such a conference in routine fashion — at least in advance — could be the potential impact on financial markets for stocks, bonds and, equally important, for money.

The "money markets" determine short-term borrowing costs that affect everyone from big industrialists to householders buying a new refrigerator on installment credit.

The Labor Department announced Tuesday in Washington that living costs rose by two-tenths of one per cent in October, to an historic peak. In 1955, the most rapid in some five years, nudged the upper limit of the government's price controls.

Johnson himself has been a vocal proponent of price controls. His actions, as critics have noted, have been "less official," have not been as "deeply considered."

## Early Mailing for Christmas Is Urged by T. F. Postmaster

"Last Christmas the post office handled more mail than ever before, yet the operation was the most efficient in its history," Fred Sanger, Twin Falls Postmaster, reported Tuesday.

Nationally, about 89 per cent of Christmas mails reached their destinations before Christmas Eve, he noted.

"Use of the ZIP Code and operating of the public information center were the main reasons for such success. With the same better cooperation this year, we expect to handle even greater volume of mail with less effort than during the 1964 Christmas rush," Sanger said.

Sanger's advice to help mailers prepare for the present holiday mailing season was to "correct the addresses of all your correspondents to the greatest extent possible and furnish ZIP Codes on all mail addressed out-of-town." Use of ZIP Code has become increasingly important due to expansion of sectional center operations for the Twin Falls post office and its 42 associated offices in Magic Valley.

"Outgoing mails from all the valley offices are accumulated and dispatched from Twin Falls and mail for California, Nevada, Utah, Illinois, Pennsylvania and New York is distributed by ZIP Code. The ZIP Code mails are transported directly to sectional center offices without requiring additional handling in transit."

Sanger also advised, "Prepare your gift lists as soon as possible, and shop early to take advantage of full stocks. Be sure to have on hand enough shipping materials such as boxes, twine and wrapping paper."

Sanger also urged to use first class postage on greeting cards. This assures their being forwarded — if the recipient has moved, or that undeliverable cards will be returned when the return address is furnished.

Postmaster Sanger emphasized that poorly wrapped and loosely packed cartons are the major cause of parcel post damage and loss. He urged that cartons be packed tightly by using stuffing material to fill up the empty space around mailed articles. Wadded-up newspaper is excellent for this purpose.

He also asked that all mailers make every effort to address their letters, cards and packages as clearly as possible and that they attempt to mail often, not waiting until the last minute to deposit their gifts and holiday greetings.

HUTZBACH, Germany (UPI)—Christmas tree rustlers are making Scrooge of Walter, the forest ranger.

"Stop talking to me about Christmas," he said, "I'm glad when it's all over."

Walter Bellotti, 41, is stationed at the treedged Forest House of this small-Hessian town about 35 miles north of Frankfurt. A narrow road, winding through the woods, runs by the house, leading to tiny villages hidden in the Taurus Hills, in a Christmas-tree rustler's path.

"Christmas, especially the weeks before Christmas, means plenty of work for the forest rangers," Walter complained.

"There are those thieves sneaking through the forest with their cars. They switch off the lights and cut those beautiful fir trees."

"This is the time for Walter to hop on his motorcycle and make his nightly patrol, clad in his green uniform, swinging danglers on his back.

"Boy," he said, "I have caught quite a few of 'em in the five years I have been stationed here."

"A forest ranger, Walter, is a civil servant and also has police authority for his state property as is the case with most West German woods."

"I take down their names and the rustler is a 100-mark (\$25) or more fine," said Walter, grinning. "Theft of state property is an expensive affair."

Walter is not afraid his nightly excursions can spell bodily harm for him even in the state of Hesse, where rustlers hostile to fairs.

"I get along with them. I was on the Russian battle front for three years. You understand."

Walter the ranger also must supervise cutting some Christmas trees. More trouble.

## TV Schedules

The Twin Falls Youth Corps has a paradoxical distinction of being one of the most popular in the same time the most scandalous in the phases of the war on poverty.

Its glazing successes and equally spectacular failures were reported by UPI reporters in a nationwide tour which was in every program which was entering this year.

The corps is administered by the U.S. Department with funds provided by the Office of Economic Opportunity (OEO).

Its purpose is to employ poor youths 18 to 21 to encourage them to continue their education.

It also enrolls some boys and girls who have dropped out of school, and has been successful in recruiting some employees from the community service project.

Contrary to a widespread impression, the corps is not a training for skilled occupations. But the corps does endeavor to provide jobs for the unemployed in an apprenticeship program to learn a trade.

During the current fiscal year, the OEO will spend about \$400,000 in Twin Falls to support the program. That is the total number which will be enrolled.

Various times during the year actual enrollment at any given time is not expected

to exceed 100,000.

UPI reporters found many cities in which local officials and civic leaders were proud of their pride of the Neighborhood Youth Corps.

In Oakland Calif. the juvenile crime rate dropped during the past year for the first time in 10 years, Police said it was due mainly to the success of the youth corps in taking potential delinquents off the streets.

In Seattle, Wash., Police Capt. Ray Tunkle reported a sharp reduction in shoplifting. He said Corps were from Nov. 17, after the Boston Traveler disclosed in a copyrighted story that jobs had been doled out to more than 150 youngsters who were in the corps last summer and was delighted to find in September that more than 250 of them were returned to school full-time. Nearly 100 were in class full-time and 130 had found jobs in private industry.

## North, South California Split Argued

**SACRAMENTO, Calif.**—(AP)—A state senator has renewed the old argument on splitting California into two states. This time, he says, the people want the state divided.

Republican Sen. Richard J. Dolwig, from San Mateo County, near San Francisco, says California is just too big.

"We have a population of 19 million, and this single state is now larger than about three quarters of the governments of the world," Dolwig said in an interview Tuesday.

Monday, Dolwig obtained incorporation papers for the Founders of the States of California, Inc., and said officers would be picked in January.

The organization's main purpose is to split California at the Tehachapi Mountains, about 100 miles north of Los Angeles. Southern California would have seven counties with more than 10 million permanent residents, would be in Northern California's 31 counties.

Making California into two states is a new idea. The Senate last June passed a bill proposing division of the state, but it was killed by an Assembly committee. The Senate was at the time embroiled in the reapportionment program.
