Sales Tax Credited for Lower Taxes

BOISE (AP)—Max Yost, executive secretary of Associated Taxpayers of Idaho, credited Idaho's 2 per cent sales tax Wednesday with dropping Idaho from the top five states with the highest individual income tax. Speaking at the Idaho Branch of the Associated General Contractors' annual meeting, in Boise, Yost also warned of increased control in the nation's economy. The featured speaker Wednesday was Dr. W. Ballew Hensley, president of the California College of Medicine at Los Angeles. He said the ultimate world goal is the improvement of man as a human being. Yost said the tax would raise an estimated \$6 million in the current biennium of which \$26.2 million—approximately 48 per cent—is dedicated to property relief and repeal and income reduction. Yost also cited federal restrictions on timber sales and the control of prices in the aluminum industry as examples of increasing federal control of economy. Louise Shaddock, secretary of the State Department of Commerce and Development, told contractors Idaho is gaining in phosphate, agriculture and lumber industries, and in personal income.

NATIONAL "Good Grief, What Time Is It?" WASHINGTON

WASHINGTON—This was pretty good for the members of the House and Senate who would like to find a new commissioner who would not be a threat to them. He would have to be a strong arm. William D. Eckert, and his claim to anonymity is indisputable.

But the real test is the commission on this implausible business which insists on being in the throne and make an occasional speech to some of the members. The commission will be ruled by its hard-nosed owners in the person of one Lee MacPhail, an executive retiree from the Baltimore Orioles.

HELL JIGGLE THE STRINGS—MacPhail's new life is as a commissioner, which is like saying "I am a commissioner, which is like saying 'I am a commissioner.'"

It is to say a personage—doubtless Lee MacPhail will tell General Eckert what to do. The general admits he doesn't know anything about baseball and thus cannot be depended upon to come up with any new ideas for making the public believe that the commission has created five sub-cabinet jobs in the past. The commission's office, according to MacPhail, doesn't know how to deal with such vital issues as the color of box seat tickets.

All this would seem of interest only to the playing of Christmas carols. However, the segment of the public which is interested in the subject, except for one thing, baseball costs the taxpayers money. The favors which are given to the rich and powerful are not given to the little old lady in Buffalo who thinks baseball is a killing time.

STADIA COURTESY OF TAXPAYERS—Over the past two decades, a couple of hundred million tax dollars have gone into the construction and maintenance of stadiums and arenas. In another few years, there won't be a stadium field that wasn't subsidized by the American taxpayer. In fact, the red-blooded political agents who don't resist baseball's importation into the country are not only the taxpayers but they are also the taxpayers' private property.

Unhappily, even this knuckling-under to a mob of semi-literate speculators spent more than \$40 million to provide proper facilities for the Boston Braves in 1953 and the city-owned stadium in St. Paul. The city of Atlanta, for now, is not sure if it should build a new stadium. Similarly, Cal Griffith's escape from his Washington club to Milwaukee, where he acquired a couple of Connecticut players.

BEYOND THE LAW—Moreover, even the chess fan should be concerned with the fact that baseball may be violating the Sherman Antitrust Act. This is the "stadium" whereby a player becomes the property of the club that signs him. Views of Others
FROM RESTRAINT TO CAUTION
While proponents of "truth-in-packaging" and other consumer protection bills have generally been in the majority in Congress, they might take a look at what's going on in Britain. There, the government has passed a law to control the price of consumer products, but it is having mixed results.

After investigating rising prices of soaps and detergents sold in Britain by divisions of the major U.S. producers, the Federal Trade Commission's Price and Incomes Board concluded that unduly heavy advertising and promotional expenditures were instrumental in causing the price increases. It urged the firms to "exercise restraint" on such expenditures, which the soap makers grudgingly consented to do without any change in law.

In the board's view, although advertising and promotion "permit volume output and expansion of scale in manufacturing," the benefits of price competition could be at the expense of quality on advertising and promotion. Reasoning has implications for marketers in the U.S., where there are also those who seem to think that advertising always makes things better, even if it is a kind of reasoning that takes not a few questions.

If a governmental agency is empowered to "restrain" companies' advertising expenditures, it would be wise to look at the frequency, hours, or their size or content? Or to still more, to look at the content of the advertising.

If that becomes the trend, what are the broader economic consequences? Assuming for the moment that advertising does exert some slight influence on consumer spending, since consumer buying is a barometer of the economy, does the "restraint" approach sound practically unprofitable?

Another question is: Is it possible that the line between restraint and control is so thin that the latter is inevitable? Before the consumer protection-by-government movement gets underway, it is worth asking what needs of future control lie nestled in the package Congress is being urged to buy—Wall Street Journal.

Chain Reaction
Even the diehards find themselves now in the position of admitting that reappointment of Idaho's governor would be a change too difficult to find anyone to oppose.

When Idaho's Legislature finally comes to a vote on a reappointment bill, the change could bring many changes in the Legislature in a relatively few years.

Right now, some of the politicians are bending the terms of some formal sessions of the Legislature to fit the proposal. Sessions every two years is like asking a big corporation to have only one meeting of the board of directors every two years.

Another change that's likely to gain more attention in the near future is to coordinate the Legislature's fiscal year with the federal government's.

It may be that reappointment also will spark some sort of action to reduce the number of members of the Legislature. Eventually the majority will conclude there's no need of maintaining two houses of the Legislature when members of both houses are elected on the same basis, namely, popular election.

If such a chain reaction of changes is initiated by reappointment, all Idahoans stand to benefit, except, of course, the ones who would be deprived of public office. There's a ring to it. The Legislature's meeting once annually would be more efficient and more economical. Anything's possible once reappointment cracks the tough shell of tradition.

MAJOR PROBLEM

Everyone who will ever take a drink of an alcoholic beverage should be reminded in advance of the point where it is possible to be a victim. It's far better to prevent a case of alcoholism than to attempt treatment and questionable rehabilitation after the damage has been done.

That's the best purpose of an Alcoholism Information Week.

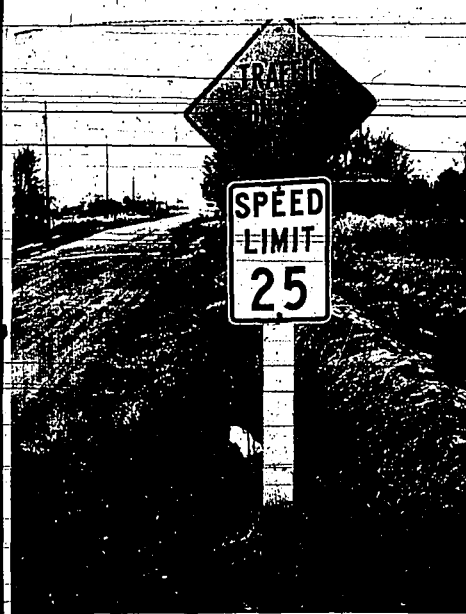

Drinking Rules Set for Air Travel

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Federal Aviation Agency has issued its drinking restrictions to helicopter airlines, in effect saying it wants no whirling passengers on the whirlybirds. Effective Dec. 31, helicopter airlines will not be allowed to serve drinks to persons who appear to be intoxicated nor permit on board any who seem to be intoxicated. Passengers also can't bring on board their own refreshments. Alcoholic beverages not served by the airline are prohibited.
The same rules already apply to trunk and regional fixed-wing airlines.

De Gaulle's Re-Election

PARIS (UPI) - For the first time, Frenchmen are talking seriously about the possibility that President Charles de Gaulle may win his bid for re-election Sunday.

That could mean the end of the "Gaullie Era," with all the implications such a development would contain for France and the rest of the world at large.
This does not mean that the 73-year-old French leader is likely to be beaten by one of his five opponents in the first try.
From a generally estimated support of about 66 per cent of the nation, the polls say he has fallen to less than 50 per cent within the last month.

Under the French voting system, in order to be elected on the first go-around, Sunday, De Gaulle or one of his five opponents must get more than half the total votes cast. If not, there will be a runoff ballot Dec. 19, between the two highest contenders.

It is generally assumed that in such a runoff De Gaulle would be an easy winner. But the big question is whether he would subject himself to one. Many of his closest aides believe he would not.
As one high official, who is very close to De Gaulle, put it, "he hasn't told anyone what he would do. But as I know De Gaulle, I simply cannot imagine it."

By projecting himself to a runoff, he almost certainly would walk out and return to Colombia (his country home).
If De Gaulle fails to get the 50 per cent, the polls say he would feel he has been "rejected" by the nation.

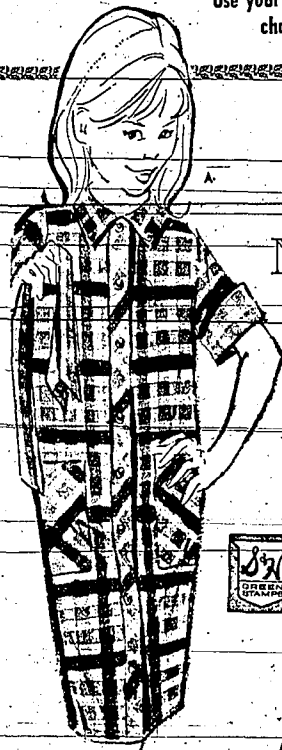

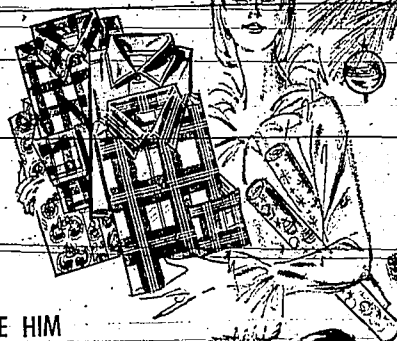

Tests to Determine Relationship of Thyroid Abnormalities and Fallout

The tests, underwritten by the U.S. Public Health Service, will be conducted at University of Utah Medical Center. Thompson said some tests will be "a first" for medical science in thyroid studies. "These children are not acutely ill," Thompson said. They are coming here for diagnostic studies at the request and with the approval of their parents and family physicians. The studies, he added, will reveal the types of abnormality found in these particular children's thyroid glands, when when physically examined it seemed abnormal. The examinations will be the latest in a series of tests which reveal a higher incidence of thyroid abnormalities among 2,600 students in the St. George area than those examined in a fallout free Arizona section. Doctors discovered 70 thyroid conditions in the St. George study as compared with only 25 among 1,406 students in Utraham County of Arizona. The Arizona county was chosen because of a Mormon Church background and other environmental factors, similar to the St. George area. In October, U.S. Surgeon General William H. Stewart appointed three thyroid experts to make further studies of the St. George children. Stewart said the study is an investigation "it was necessary to determine whether there might be a relationship between certain health defects and radiation exposure." The experts, Dr. Raymond T. Keating Jr. of the Mayo Clinic, Rochester, Minn., Brown M. Dobyns of the Cleveland, Ohio General Hospital, and Joseph E. Rall of the National Institute of Health, Bethesda, Md., are currently in the area.

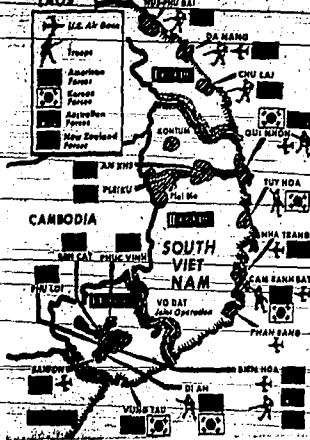

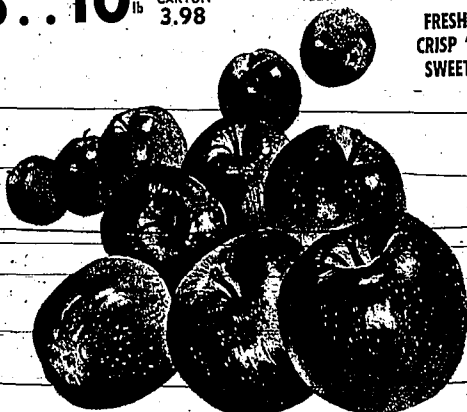

Overseas Travels Impose Large Cost on Government

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senators are warning that the government is on its way toward establishing a record for globe-circling travels during the congressional recess.

The bill for this year's overseas missions will not be known until the new Congress convenes. But it is expected to exceed by far the \$386,576.63 spent in 1964 — \$230,300.90 for travels by House members and \$157,275.73 for expenses of senators.

All are supposed to pay for entertainment, such as tickets to theaters and night clubs. In most cases they are supposed to pay for their wives if they take them along.

The bulk of the overseas spending is covered by the use of so-called counterpart funds, or U. S. owned currencies which have accumulated largely when surplus farm commodities are sold under the Food for Peace program for local currency rather than U. S. dollars.

Berlin Wall Gunplay in Deadly Intent

BERLIN (AP) — Year after year Germans have been shooting Germans along the borders of their former capital and at the wall that cuts it in two.

The gunplay has been in deadly earnest ever since the East German Communists more than four years ago built the wall to stop a flow of refugees.

But their border-baked state of badly needed manpower.

The four-year toll at the 18-mile wall and along 30 miles of fence separating West Berlin from East Germany is 54 officially confirmed deaths.

West German officials estimate at least three times that figure. Ernst Lemmer, former minister for refugee affairs, has said many more have been injured.

Some say it is the nature of the German to do blindly what he is ordered to do and thus keep up this kind of killing.

West Berlin police, however, say the East German do much more shooting to the side or in the air than shooting to kill.

Capt. Heinz Fleckner, a police specialist for the West Berlin police, comments:

"If the East German border guards always aimed to kill or maim every time they see, hear or suspect a refugee, there would be a bloodbath far worse than we have had."

Since August 1961, when the wall was built, about 3,500 persons have managed to make it across into West Berlin. Some have spectacular escape adventures, but most of the estimated 6 to 15 who daily attempt to cross are taken advantage of.

They are taken to the Reck and left standing.

Many never make it past the 300-yard "death strip" that the Communists have thrown around West Berlin.

West Berlin police list more than 2,000 persons known to have crossed the wall and 1,000 more captured along the East German "death strip."

Many others simply turned back to forget it or maybe try again another day.

To stop escapes the East German have "snatch brigades" (People's Army) brigades around West Berlin. These total 14,000 men with 3,500 always on guard.

They have 137 watch towers to aid them, plus spotlights, floodlights, flares and 21 dog stations. There are three companies of boat troops equipped with fast patrol craft.
