

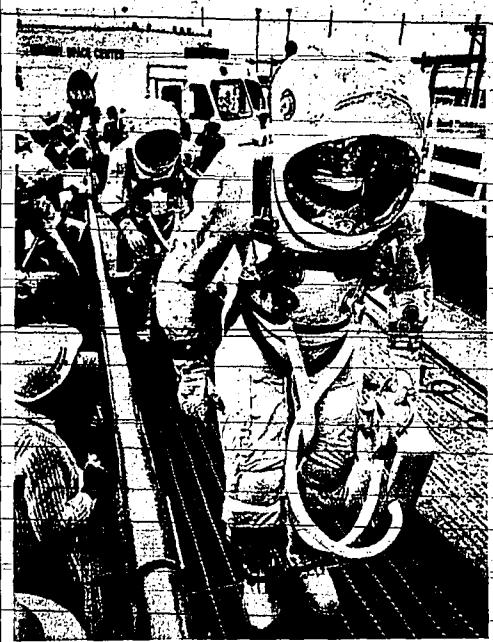
2 Planes Collide, 6 Killed

NORTH SALEM, N. Y.—Two incoming airplanes collided Saturday in a gray autumn sky 11 miles east of New York City's Eastern suburbs. One plane crashed but the other stayed aloft, and the death toll was surprisingly high. Of 110 persons aboard the two aircraft, only six were known dead, according to police officials on the scene.

The emergency was reminiscent of aviation's worst disaster—the 1959 collision of two jets over New York which claimed 134 lives.

The skipper of an Eastern Airlines jetliner, Douglas Constellation, on route to Newark, N. J., from Boston, took off a spin, crashing into an uninhabited hillside. The jetliner was packed into the hillside, and its fuselage escaped with their lives. The EAL plane was flight 533.

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Security men expressed fear Saturday the bombing of the Hotel Metropole, a U.S. enlisted men's barracks in downtown Saigon, is but the beginning of a Viet Cong campaign of terror and sabotage to mark a Red anniversary. 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State to Spend U.S. Funds Without Strings

BOISE, (AP) — More than \$5 million in federal money is flowing into Idaho in the current school year and state educators are determined to spend it with the few federal administrative strings. They think they can do it for two reasons: —The money for almost all the projects is committed through the state department of education, not directly to the school districts, putting state officials in the middle. —Virtually all the federal aid programs are on a voluntary basis; the final decision whether they are used should be the decision of the local school board. The \$5 million adds to greatly increased funds made available by the 1965 Idaho legislature, giving public schools in the current two-year period approximately \$2 million more than they had just one biennial earlier. —In the state department of education, said administrative assistant Harold Farley, "are very firm in our belief that the federal funds made available for the schools should be used for specific programs and when they are used should be the decision of the local school board. The biggest of the new programs involves allocation of federal money to local school districts in the specific amount required in any project. The federal money is not to be used to receive the federal money. If the districts disagree with the conditions they are to take part in the project. In such cases, of course, they don't get the federal money. For the current school year separate programs are in operation. Under them Idaho is allocated about \$2 million in the

children program. That program will make available about \$2.5 million to Idaho schools in the current school year. Other new programs include one to improve library and text books, with \$70,000 allocated to Idaho; one to expand supplementary education centers, \$30,000; and one making available additional personnel and services, \$161,000. Of all the programs only that one providing aid for district agencies and installations is administered directly by the federal government.

Nothing to Offer

It is becoming increasingly obvious that the organization calling itself Greater Idaho, Inc., has nothing to offer anyone. It is Greater Idaho, Inc., the successor to Tourists Unlimited and the gimmick to the name-casino-gambling. Idaho has been down that road before and the Democratic Party is forced to respond to memorial campaigns on that dead issue. Many Democrats have recoiled already that the party won't be trapped again.

The latest blip from Greater Idaho contended that Idaho should abandon liquor monopoly and permit package liquor sales by private stores and restaurants. Philip Jungert, Lewiston, who heads Greater Idaho, said the state would derive considerably more revenue by licensing private sales. It's a little difficult to follow his line of reasoning. Right now, the state gets all the profit from liquor sales. If Idaho were to let more money by licensing private sales, it means only that the pricing would have to increase considerably. Private liquor sales would have to raise prices to pay high license fees.

It's just another example of the pie-in-the-sky approach that has been all too frequent in Idaho politics in the past years. The technique is to hold out the promise of greatly increased public revenue while implying that the individual would pay a considerably lower tax. Perhaps the most recent example is the State's proposal to increase the liquor sales proposal in its proper perspective. The governor said backers of Greater Idaho "have liquefied the funny money theory."

Greater Idaho has publicized plans to elect its candidate for governor in the 1968 elections. Voters can ignore the Greater Idaho candidate, thus giving a definite indication that no one's silly enough to be taken in by such a scheme.

All the Greater Idaho strategy is to find one good point, no matter how minor, in the programs suggested by Greater Idaho.

WASHINGTON—Turn to my more scholarly colleagues for the main analysis of the second inter-American conference at Rio was a flop because of the Latin American delegates' lack of horse sense.

The concept of a permanent inter-American conference is the Organization of American States' chief of state, Goldwater's chances of winning the White House. It is hardly for many reasons, chief among which are two: Any genuine peace treaty would be a threat to the neurotic political parties. And it would divert American aid dollars from the pocket-books of the politicians.

WHAT KIND OF PEACE?—It seems not to have occurred to our allies south of the border that their opponents are far more interested in money than in peace. When President Johnson sent American troops to the Dominican Republic, they went into a mouth-drooping tizzy about unilateral intervention. Obviously, they were not interested in a problem, not an opportunity for the exercise of American imperialism. Yet they reject a proposition which would make such unilateral action impossible.

In this connection, I am fascinated by Latin America's sudden discovery that internal economic and social reform is the best way to stop Communism. Chile's delegate went so far as to accuse the U. S. of using the OAS to strengthen its own security at the expense of the rest of the continent. But the \$20 billion Alliance for Progress has never got off the ground because Washington's \$10 billion contribution was predated on the countries before benefiting from this giveaway.

HELP FOR SELVES FIRST—These high-stakes gamblers are more interested in relieving the poverty and misery of their countries except on a basis whereby they get a lion's share of the American handout. The strategy is to obtain more concessions from Washington. America is a greedy beast whenever it suggests that the rich ruling class should distribute a few dollars of land to their peasants.

But the hour is late down there. There's already been an attempt to take over Venezuela (directed by either Moscow or Peking or both). The situation in Dominica remains completely unresolvable. Castro's Cuba stands as an example of what happens to rich politicians and landowners when the red flag is hoisted.



WASHINGTON—Reports from the ranch in Texas have President Johnson wanting to change the new federal budget. He must submit to Congress. But the decisions on the budget will be made by a far larger decision-making body that cannot be overruled by the president. 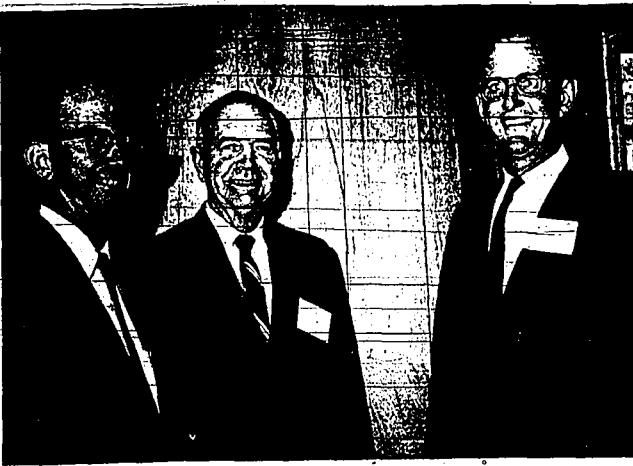

Persons who vote for the commissioner office must be qualified electors of the state and resident of Minidoka County Highway District.

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

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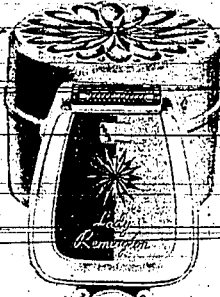

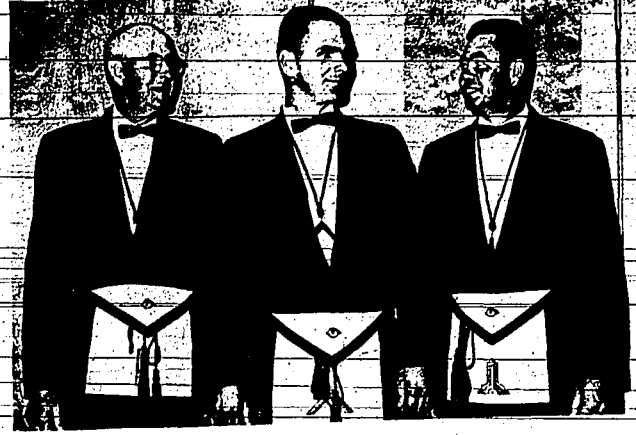

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Blame Demos Hear Speech By Sen. Dee

KILLEY — Sen. William Dee, Republican, Idaho, speaking at a gubernatorial nomination, said here Friday morning during a coffee hour at the Star Hotel, sponsored by the Blaine County Democratic Central Club.

Approximately 60 persons heard Sen. Dee score the sales tax as "the most vicious tax there is."

"The man with \$5,000 a year income and a woman living on welfare," he said, "must pay the same tax as the man with \$50,000 yearly income."

"Our government was built on ability to pay taxes," he said. "The history of this state in 49 states where taxes have been paid (1) exempted, (2) reduced, (3) increased, (4) multiplied, (5) changed, and (6) changed, and (7) changed, and (8) changed, and (9) changed, and (10) changed."

The Idaho County senator will debate sales tax with anyone, anywhere and any time, he said.

"If you raise the sales tax, you raise the cost of living," he said. "It also raises the cost of property tax on autos."

"Propositions of sales tax raised people by the man and woman who are unable to pay," he said. "The only way they could get money for education," he said, "is to raise the sales tax."

Sen. Dee said that the sales tax will go to education in 1966. "If it is being dumped into agencies," he said.

A brief question-and-answer period was conducted after his speech.

Rupert Telephone Firm Goes to One-Party System

RUPERT—Construction on the new rural one-party telephone system is under way, according to Donald Dickson, manager of the Project Mutual Telephone Cooperative.

The installation will make the company an "entire one-party system," the first in the entire western area.

Construction was delayed because of shortage of copper, which made delivery of cable late. He said work was suspended here under Oct. 14, but did not get under way until last week.

Installation will continue in Long Valley.

Contractor for the work is Helmerich and Payne, Inc., Tulsa, Okla., whose bid of \$561,280.00 was accepted by the telephone company's board of directors in April. It is estimated that approximately \$500,000 of this contract price will go for cable.

Nearly 400 miles of cable will be buried in the five counties, including Mindokla, and portions of Cassia, Jerome, Lincoln and Blaine counties.

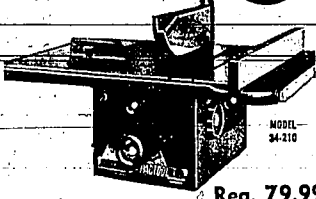

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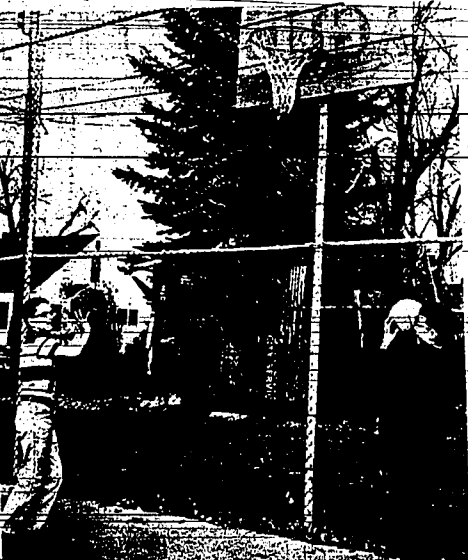

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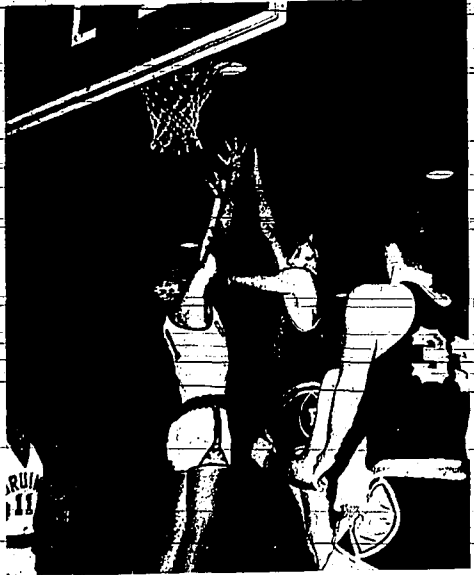
Williams Hits 27 Points To Lead Twin Falls to 64-58 Victory Over Buhl

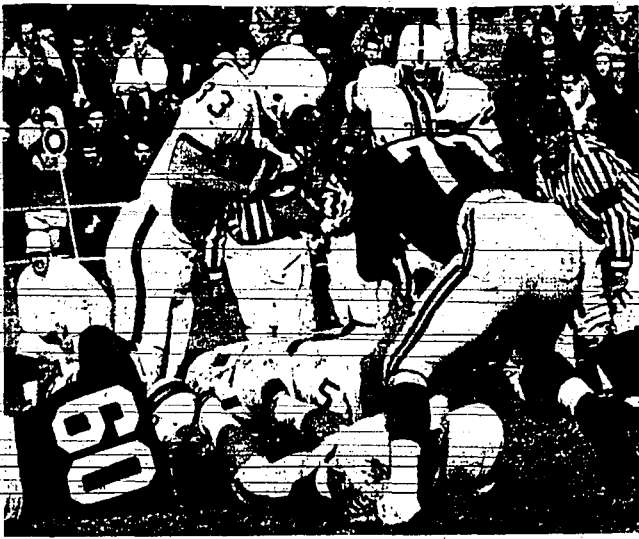

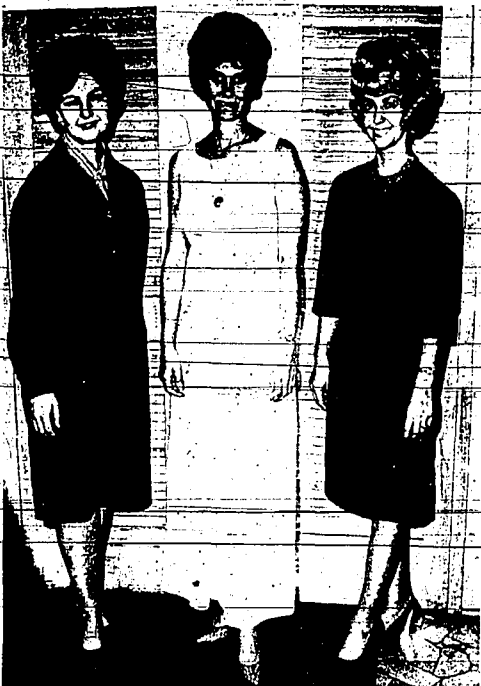

Biggest Poinsettia Crop in History of Magic Valley Grown by Area Florist

GOODING — There has never been anything like it in Magic Valley before. The 1,200 poinsettia plants grown at the Gooding Floral Co. plant here are the greatest number ever grown in one location at one time in the area.

Myron Knight Jr., owner of the floral concern, said that growing of the 1,200 plants was started last June from cuttings of the plants in the manner that geraniums are grown.

Actually the plants grown here for distribution throughout Magic Valley are patented. They are known as the Paul Mikkelson poinsettia and asexual reproduction is prohibited.

The plant is a new red hybrid resulting from crossing a red seedling with a white type. Selection was made to give the greatest satisfaction to the buying public.

The plants are grown in a greenhouse in which the temperature is thermostatically controlled to remain between 55 and 70 degrees throughout the growing period. About Thanksgiving this temperature was lowered to 60 degrees to get the plants in a "hardy" condition for moves to various floral parlors and ultimately private homes.

Actually poinsettia crops are raised in the area. Despite the fact the 1,200 grown here this year is the greatest crop in history and Knight has been growing the plants for 20 years.

Some of the plants are difficult for homeowners but certain "rules" are suggested which are designed to keep them around for a longer period of time, in some cases for several months. Room temperature during the day of around 70 degrees with a south window exposure and a night temperature of between 55 and 60 degrees is ideal.

The originator of this particular poinsettia was J. C. Mikkelson, ahababala, Okla., but plants grown in Gooding were sent here air express from California.

He survived two campaigns in Europe, was in on the capture of Frankfurt, Germany, by the allied forces and received two decorations for bravery in action.

"Drawn as head basketball coach is different from having to wear the team's uniform. There is a similarity, but in one case you are only dodging bullets and this is relatively easy."

Actually, being a head coach and rolling with the team in the crowd, the opposition and the officials is nothing new for Farmer.

For six years, before coming to Twin Falls, he was varsity coach at Meyer, Minn., in the sport of basketball, football and track. During those years he taught two subjects on the side.

When he came to Twin Falls several years ago he joined the high school staff to teach mechanical drawing and was working. He soon was given the added duty, however, of sophomore basketball coach and under his direction there were many more wins than losses.

His first year was the worst in the history of the school. He lost a total of five games out of an 18 game schedule. From then on, however, the team was frequent and the best season of all was the 1956-57 year, when they won the 20 game schedule were in the win column.

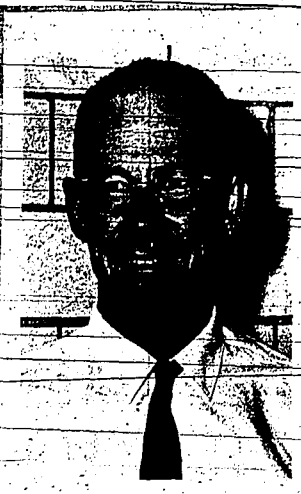
After high school graduation he went to the first summer for a construction company. By then World War II was "hot" and he was called on Nov. 5, 1942.

Project Head Start Has Won Ardent Public Support According to Survey

BY LOUIS CASSELS
 WASHINGTON (UPI) — One of the most successful of anti-poverty programs is the Project Head Start, a purpose is to give a better start to children who are at risk of school failure and handicaps.

UPI reporters conducting a nationwide survey of the year-long project have heard high praise for Head Start in nearly every corner of the country. The only exceptions were some areas of the South, where the project has been criticized for segregationist policies.

Head Start is a federal program that provides day care and health care for 3-year-old children who are at risk of school failure and handicaps.

Most of them came from homes so blighted by poverty that they were considered "at risk" of school failure and handicaps. In some instances, the growth of the program has been limited by a shortage of trained teachers and a lack of space in day care centers.

For the most part, the program has been well received. In many areas, it has been hailed as a "miracle" that has given children a better start in life.

for each month of the year. The only problem is that there aren't enough of them. Communities all across the country are asking for more of these self-educating groups.

VISTA has originally hoped to have 5,000 volunteers in the field by this time. But it has so far managed to enroll and train only about 2,000. It is now looking for a strength of 4,000 by next June.

There are several other anti-poverty programs which have not yet progressed to the point where they are having any noticeable impact on stirring up such reaction, pro or con.

In this category is the new program of free legal services for the poor, dispensed through neighborhood law offices; the "Foster Grandparents Program" under which men and women are hired to work in hospitals, orphanages, receiving homes and other institutions where children are apt to be deprived of parental love and companionship; the work-study program known as the Peace Corps, which sends young people to work in undeveloped countries abroad; and "Project Upward Bound" under which 17,000 college students are experimenting with a variety of approaches to the problem of stimulating poor young people to finish high school and go on to college.

The UPI survey was deliberately focused on the grass roots neighborhood. He lives there. It was not designed to find out what's being said for or against the program in Washington.
