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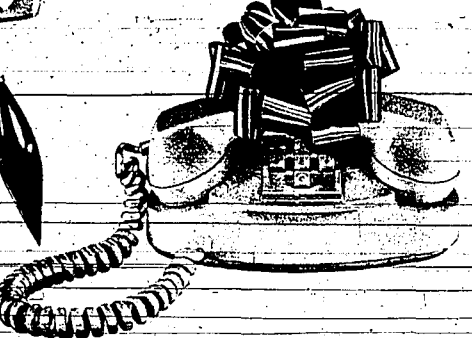

Fate of Man Is in Hands Of Governor
RAWLINS, Wyo. (AP)—Wyo. Gov. Cliff Hansen today apparently held the life or death of the alleged killer Andrew Piatley in his hands.

The 21-year-old dishwasher from Dallas, Ore., is scheduled to stand trial in the state gas chamber. The governor appeared to be the last hope for retaining the sentence-to-life-in-prison.

C. F. Pixley of Dallas, Ore., stepfather of the younger Piatley, pleaded mercy and his attorney with the governor Saturday for about 45 minutes.

It was believed that the sentence would be commuted to life in prison. Piatley had asked for clemency, although a governor's aide said later he did not believe such a request had been made.

Piatley, whose death would be the first state execution in 20 years in Wyoming, was hospitalized Saturday by the Rev. Gary Griffin of the Rawlins Trinity Assembly Church.

The hapless took place in the prison hospital, one floor above where the gas chamber is located.

Piatley was convicted and sentenced to die for the Aug. 7, 1964, murder of 12-year-old Deborah McAlliff of Maywood, Ill. He was tried only for her death, although her sister, Cynthia, also was killed. Their bodies were discovered in a Jackson, Wyo., hotel room.

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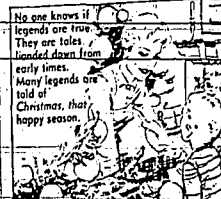
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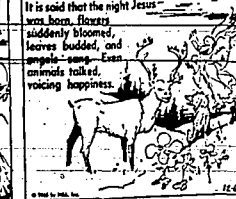

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University of Utah Starts Indian Self-Help Project

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI)—The latest in a long string of projects to help the Indian, who originally was robbed, cheated, killed and sold west out by the white man, has been started at the University of Utah.

The project is called the Community Action Program and is designed to make it possible for Indians in the West to improve their economic and educational status. The project is divided into two sections. Witherspoon reported \$138,000 was provided for the project and \$20,000 for technical assistance.

The project is entirely voluntary, said Witherspoon. The Indian tribal leaders are encouraged to evaluate their situation themselves, decide what action to take, and then consult the university.

The university will act as a provider of research and trained personnel. Witherspoon said experts will consult with the Indians and make recommendations. The university already has received requests for information from many of the 44 tribes in the area.

The university programs have been started and are at Rocky-Bay Indian reservation in northern Montana, is in its nature step-by-step.

Five Years Would Be Needed To Develop Project, and Continuing Grants Are Anticipated

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Man Searches For New Life Of His Own

COSTA MESA, Calif. (AP) — Donald Dawson is again in search of a new life. Dawson, who at 23 already has gone in quest of his father lost in the jungles of South Viet Nam, now searches for a new life of his own.

Still weakened by malaria contracted during four months he was held prisoner by the Viet Cong, Dawson set out this week for Oregon and what he hopes is a chance to find his old and lost health.

The search in Viet Nam set him back quite a bit, financially and physically. Dawson told a "Newman" amid the confusion attendant to moving a family of six.

"There's a farm up there in Oregon where we can live off the land," he said. "I know I can't do it on the season of deer and elk, and we'll live on what." The fare will be heartier than anything he has eaten since he was released from a jungle prison camp after telling him his brother Don "was" dead.

Don's search for Dan, a U. S. Army spotter plane pilot who disappeared in Red Territory, Nov. 6, 1964, became one of the legends of the jungle war.

But it also left Don a shadow of his former self. Since he returned home he has been able to eat little more than prepared baby foods and liquids.

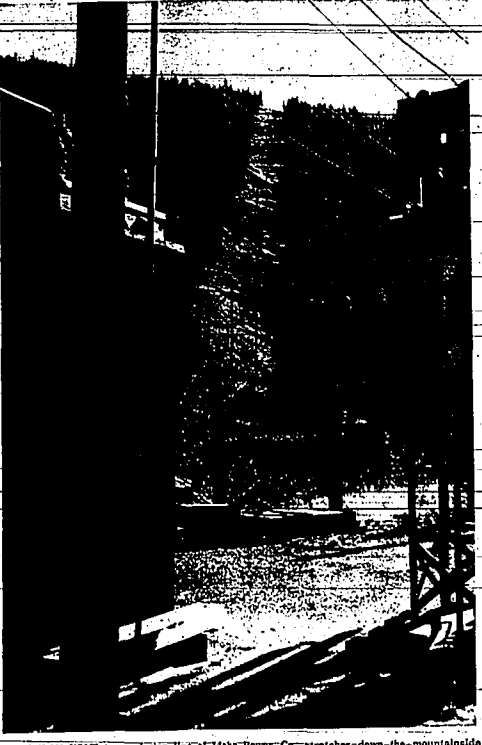

Idaho Power Firm Building Additional Lines at Salmon

SALMON—Evermore takes for seven diesel generators which can open and close any switch on the transmission line.

But behind the switch is a hand and Cobalt, and Intermountain vast network of power lines. Lumber Co. are the firm's largest stretches a cross a countless users control. Employees of Idaho Power and millions of dollars invested keep a constant patrol of its in-equipment-and-facilities—service facilities and in winter.

The firm came to Salmon about 1953 and took over the Salmon River Power and Light Co. which had installed a generating plant here.

The service at first was limited. There was a 100-horse power diesel generator located by the old railroad tracks which ran north of Main Street.

Primary source of power was two hydro units which utilized water of the Lemhi River. The units are no longer in existence.

During periods of low water there were times when there was not enough power to operate the plant. And in the winter when the Lemhi River froze the water flooded over the fields leaving the plant almost inoperable.

Because of these factors the company started studying generation of power using the diesel units that are still put to use today in case of emergencies.

Power demand in the community built to such a point that a 69,000-volt transmission line was constructed in 1949 from Bannock, Mont. The line is connected with the northwest power pool substation at Dillon, Mont., owned jointly by Montana, Idaho and Utah Power.

Biggest factor in installing the 69,000 volt transmission line to Lemhi County was development of the Coeur d'Alene Gas, Cobalt and Blackbird areas.

Serving the rural areas are 12,500-volt lines and salmon city lines.

Now it's in the process of building an additional distribution feeder line to the Bar area in the city.

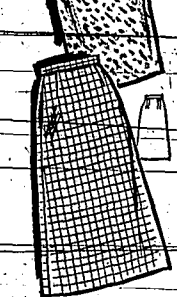

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Supreme Court ruled today that a jury trial is required before a man can be sent to jail for criminal contempt before a grand jury.

The 5-4 decision set aside the contempt conviction of a man in a bid for refusing to testify in a federal grand jury investigation in New York City after being granted immunity from prosecution.

"Our point is that a hearing and only a hearing will disclose all the facts and assure the administration of justice," Justice William O. Douglas said.

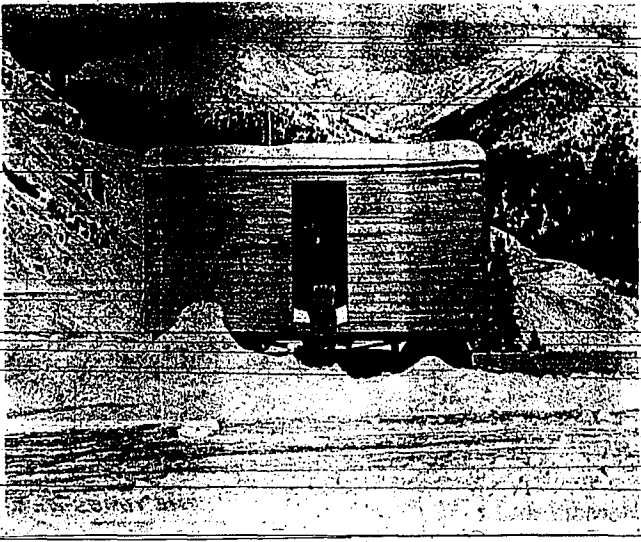

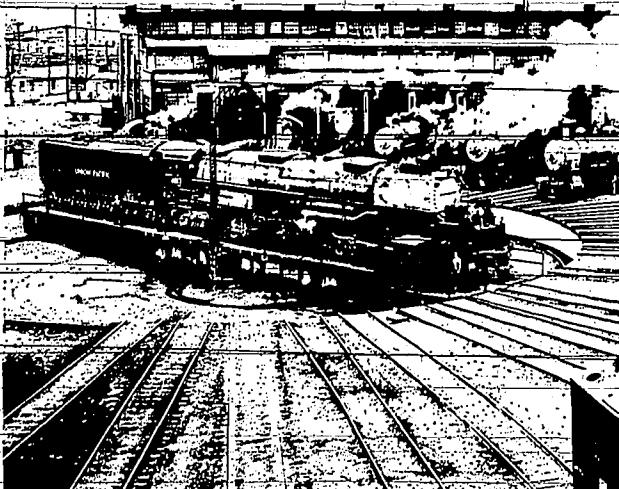
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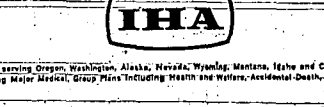
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Sayers, Fierce Defense Carry Bears 13-0 Over Division-Leading Colts

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Final Deer, Elk Hunts to Finish Soon

Most Idaho big game hunting ended Sunday or earlier, but some management units continue regular and post-season hunts for deer and elk. Some species hunt later in the month. The Idaho Fish and Game Department reminded hunters to day.

Post-season hunt for 625 elk and deer will run through December 19. In the southern part of unit 6, according to Ernest Nielson, state big game supervisor.

Fly-in hunting in unit 27, the Middle Fork of the Salmon River, will remain open for 10 days and as a two-day area through December 12. Deer still are scattered in unit 27, high in the mountains will bring them down along the narrow canyon floor.

Private hunters are cautioned to check weather and snow depth conditions before strapping to Middle Fork landing strips, preferably with the State Department of Aeronautics. Nielson listed deer only hunting units that will remain open through December 12 as follows: Units 31 and 32 (unit 31 quota of 1,500 deer has been checked out earlier), unit 33 (54, 66, 67, 74 and 75). Deer may be bagged through December 12, but regular and Middle Fork tags, other two-day units, calling for regular and deer tags, are units 64, 66, 67 and 76.

Nielson said that general snow storms around the state have improved hunting conditions.

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


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
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
