FAA Plans to Equip U.S. Airports With Special Radar

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Federal Aviation Agency is moving to equip the nation's major airports with a new radar system which will have prevented Saurdary's collision on Saturday's collision of airliners over New York's Westchester County.

An FAA official said the technique has been satisfactorily developed during the past few years in a program to establish a national air space system.

But he said the highly sophisticated, computerized system, costing in the millions of dollars, won't be introduced into the busy New York area for about two years.

The plane locator system is designed for high-altitude traffic control through what he called the FAA calls stored alpha numerics.

Under the technique, the radar blips of an approaching aircraft are electronically tagged with luminous letters and numbers. In recent months at Indianapolis and Atlanta airports at a cost of \$5 million each.

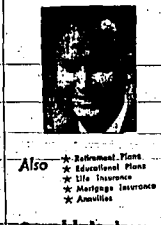
Outraged

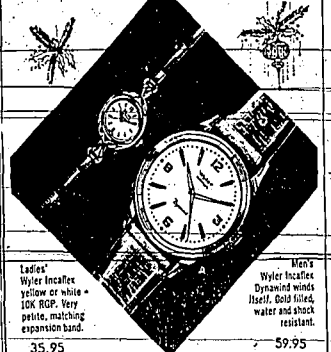

WASHINGTON—While most members of Congress are patting themselves on the back for the Capitol Hill's most successful session in the nation's history, Sen. Warren Magnuson (D., Wash.) is arguing that the 1965 session is just a prelude to a change in congressional procedure.

Magnuson once again is plugging his bill calling for a legislative session beginning on January 1, and a fiscal session opening on the second Monday of November and extending to Dec. 31.

Andrew Tully, his logic is that Congress is presently in a state of affairs that is hardly ideal. He points out that many of the bills that have been passed in the last year were done in a hurry.

He proposes the legislative session would be restricted to consideration of all non-fiscal measures which are not of a major nature. During the fiscal session, the only measures which would be introduced, reported and passed would be those which are of a major nature and which would be introduced by Congress during its legislative session.

Magnuson is an overly impressed with the bill's recent accomplishments. He points out that many of the bills that have been passed in the last year were done in a hurry.

FIRST-NO-MONEY BILLS—AS MAGNUSON proposes, the legislative session would be restricted to consideration of all non-fiscal measures which are not of a major nature. During the fiscal session, the only measures which would be introduced, reported and passed would be those which are of a major nature and which would be introduced by Congress during its legislative session.

Magnuson is an overly impressed with the bill's recent accomplishments. He points out that many of the bills that have been passed in the last year were done in a hurry.

BUDGET SUFFERS IN RUSH—Congress, after all, bears the lion's share of responsibility for spending the taxpayer's money, and yet in the past few years it has been unable to give proper consideration to a federal budget which has terrific impact on the national economy. Spending can arrest a recession or sustain a boom, and yet Congress has been unable to pass an appropriation bill in 48 weeks.

Magnuson's bill would give Congress all the most important fiscal problems in one package. Members would know what they had already authorized for the coming fiscal year during the legislative session. The White House and executive departments would tailor the budget to the needs of the country. The Budget Bureau no longer would be forced to anticipate the cost of new legislation and rush supplemental estimates to the hill to cover such legislation.

LETS THE PEOPLE SPEAK—Just as important, the two sessions would provide an immediate opportunity for the citizen to come home and report to their constituents and meet their political bosses. Under the present system, many voters just wonder when adjustment will be made. The two sessions would let legislators be irritable and lightheaded and seek only a month or two at some restful watering place.

Legislators also should welcome Magnuson's proposal to establish the calendar year as the government's fiscal year. It makes little sense to have the federal budget on a fiscal year which is out of phase with the calendar year. Under Magnuson's bill, deficits would not have to be estimated in the way we know in advance, down to the last few bucks.

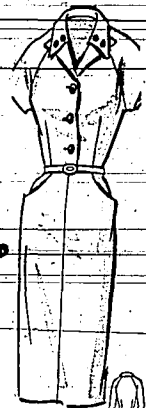

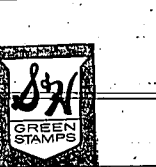

Falconry Brings Together Wealthy Sheik, Boise Man

KUWAIT, Arabia (AP) — The ancient sport of falconry has brought an Idaho conservationist and a fabulously wealthy Persian-Gulf oil sheikh together in this desert.

The conservationist, Morlan Nelson of Boise, came here with his wife, Betty Ann, at the invitation of Sheik Abdul Aziz Saud of Kuwait to compare notes on the exotic subject of hunting with falcons.

Saud owns scores of the fierce birds and his favorite pastime is acquiring more. He trains them to hunt other birds in the desert and is reputed to own one of the finest aviaries in the world.

Nelson, an Idaho snow survey supervisor with the U. S. Soil Conservation Service, is an expert on falcons who has made many movies featuring the birds.

It was one of these films that brought the two men together. Six years ago Sheik Saud saw a movie made by Nelson featuring a white gerfalcon, a very rare bird found in Greenland.

Sheik Saud obtained a copy of the film and began an exchange of correspondence with Nelson, which culminated in the two-week visit here.

Saud and Nelson exchanged information on all aspects of falconry, which has been practiced in Kuwait for hundreds of years.

Saud has spent thousands of dollars on his aviary and employs more than 40 trappers in all parts of the world to catch prize birds and add them to his collection.

"These Arab falcons represent one of the finest species I have ever come across," Nelson said. "They have enormous powers of endurance and they take only 30 days to train."

The average falcon lives about nine years but does not breed in captivity. This doesn't bother Sheik Saud. Prize falcons cost about \$400 apiece but the sheik can afford them.

Since this line communications with top American officials have improved enough it is believed this would make the difference. Changes in the machinery of communications began almost immediately after the attack. (AP wirephoto)

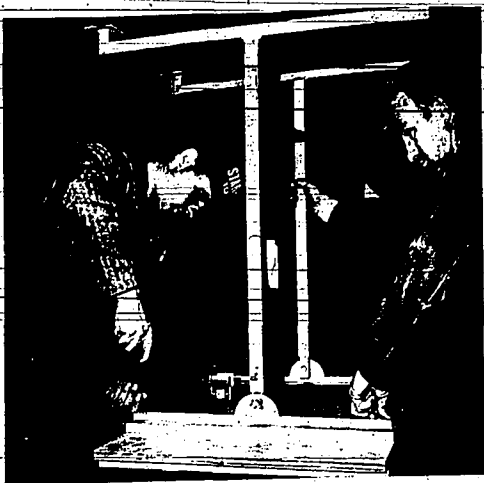
