## Raging Fire Guts Shop at Self Manufacturing Co.

Investigation continued Thursday into the cause of a raging fire, apparently aided by explosions from fuel oil and oxygen tanks, which gutted the annex of Self Manufacturing Co., Inc., 251 Third Ave. S., Wednesday night. The fire was first noticed about 9:30 p.m. Wednesday by employees of the welding and steel fabricating firm, who were returning to work after a lunch break in main building across the street. They said the entire north end of the unoccupied building was in flames at that time. The Twin Falls Fire Department was summoned and firemen had by the time they arrived started the building was in flames.

Shortly after noticing the fire, employees said, fuel oil in the main shop recently exploded, spreading fire to the south end where oxygen tanks, exploded, adding flames throughout the corrugated aluminum and wooden structure.

Some concern was noted by firemen that an air compressor on the back of the blasting building would explode. It was believed to be damaged, but did not explode. Firefighters were watching the fire but did not back and police routed traffic along other streets.

The fire had started in the paint shop earlier in the evening from sparks from a grinder, workers said, but was quickly extinguished. It was in this same section of building the second destructive blaze is believed to have started.

W. G. Koch, president of the firm, said the Self family, who started the business, still owned the building. He said all machinery in the building, however, was owned by the company. He said some of the steel probably would be salvagable, but an estimate of damage could be determined only if insurance authorities had viewed the skeletal remains of the building and its contents.

Assistant Fire Chief Bobby Epp said three fire trucks were sent to fight the blaze, a scant block from the fire station. Part of the 15 fire fighters who brought the blaze under control

## Gemini 6 to Be Launched Day Early

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP)—The Gemini 6 launch crew received orders today to prepare for a Sunday morning firing and completion of the first U.S. space rendezvous one day ahead of schedule.

Preparations at Cape Kennedy were 24 hours ahead for the blastoff of a Titan 2 rocket in pursuit of astronaut Frank Borman and James Lovell in the Gemini 6 spaceship.

Borman and Lovell will prepare for the space chase today by maneuvering their craft into a circular orbit 185 miles above the earth. This is desired position for the rendezvous mission in the sky. If there are no hitch, and complete a space first by flying in formation.

Other than a few spacesuits, Borman and Lovell were in good luck. The Gemini 7 launch crew was hurrying along toward a 14-day endurance record.

## Britain Proposes Appeal for Peace

LONDON (AP)—Britain today proposed a 12-nation appeal to Communist North Viet Nam to quit fighting and negotiate a peace. The British move was contained in a draft message sent to the Soviet government. It called upon the Russians to join in signing and circulating the message among the nine countries which attended the 1954 Indochinese peace parity and the Indochina, Canadian and Polish governments, which form the Viet Nam Control Commission.

In the message, the British government accused the North Vietnamese of stepping up intervention in South Viet Nam. The British charged, too, that North Viet Nam also has lately been speeding and increasing the flow of military equipment to the Viet Nam.

## Mission Explodes Into Large Battle

SAIGON, South-Viet Nam (AP)—A search-and-destroy mission by South Vietnamese troops in the coastal rice paddies of central Viet Nam exploded into a swirling, king-sized battle with a hard-core Viet Cong regiment today. Heavy casualties on both sides bloodied the lowlands as U. S. Artillery and jets joined the savage fight to dislodge the strong Communist force from positions halfway between the two big U. S. Marine beachheads in central Viet Nam. All reports indicated the hit-run Viet Cong had turned the fight into a prestige battle for ground they have zealously defended for years.

## 67 Are Killed In Burma Tram Crash

RANGOON, Burma (AP)—The Rangoon-Mandalay Express crashed today in a freight train 165 miles north of Rangoon today, killing 67 persons and injuring more than 100, railway officials announced. It was Burma's worst rail disaster.

## Investigation Under Way in Rupert Death

RUPERT—Investigation is continuing into the death of an 8-month-old Rupert baby, Guy Robert R. Walk, said Thursday. He said he will confer with sheriff's officers and firemen before deciding whether to call an inquest into the death of Robert Wayne Carrel, son of Mrs. Margaret Carrel, who died Wednesday morning.

Walk said Wednesday night the child's body was found on the floor near the crib. The crib had been burned away in the fire and masonry and other debris had fallen on the bed. Firemen had to use oxygen tanks and were unable to enter the room until the fire was out.

Two other children, Raymond, 3, and Ronald, 2, escaped unharmed in the fire. The children were being cared for by Mrs. Gertrude, 21, while their mother was at work.

Mrs. Carrel is separated from her husband, Guy, and is a former Twin Falls resident. Official said the fire, which completely damaged the interior of the rental house owned by Mrs. T. V. Van Eave, apparently started in the bedroom where the infant was sleeping.

The child was born April 8, 1965, at Sandy, Ore., and in an addition to his parents and two brothers is survived by paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Herman Carrel, and maternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ray Simpson, all of Rupert.

Funeral services are pending at Walk mortuary.

## Russia Mounts Major Propaganda Offensive Against United States

WASHINGTON (AP)—Russia appears to be mounting a major propaganda offensive against the United States by charging that this country is becoming a militaristic power increasingly resorting to strong-arm methods to achieve its aims in the world. The charge was made during the interview which Premier Alexei N. Kosygin gave to the United States press Tuesday to explain an increase in Russia's military budget.

Brezhnev, chief of the government, remained members of the 12-man party presidium which makes the policy created by the party secretariat.

Mikoyan also was elected, following his resignation from the presidency to a Supreme Soviet role corresponding to one of many parliamentary Vice Presidiums. Mikoyan, who marked his 70th birthday Nov. 25, was the last of the Old Bolsheviks in the upper reaches of the Soviet party and government. He was a revolutionary in the Caucasus as a young man at the time of the great Russian upheavals toward the end of World War II.

A Russian Armenian with a genius for staying out of trouble, Mikoyan survived Stalin purges and innumerable assignments. He closed the top of the hierarchy but never seemed to apply for the top job. He was a brilliant, energetic man in the past year in the neighborhood of Nikita S. Khrushchev.

Mikoyan's retirement had been rumored for some time. Podgorny, a powerful official in the ruling party presidium and secretary of the Supreme Soviet or presidency, Podgorny's career has been associated with engineering—large-scale projects. He worked many years at party duties—in the Soviet Union and in the United States. He was a member of the party leadership.

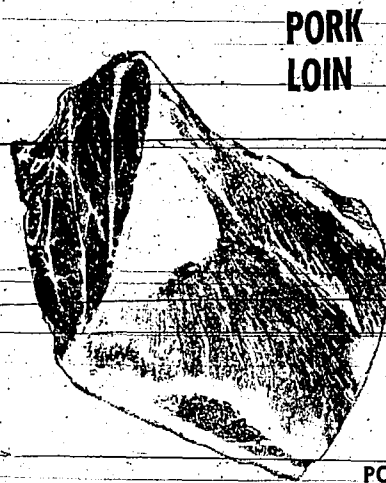

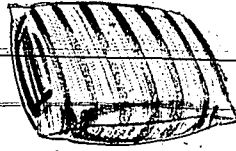

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# Water Famine Is Shortage Of Knowledge

WASHINGTON (AP)—A consulting sanitary engineer said today that more than 10 million people in the United States are in a state of water famine and that more than 10 million people are in a state of knowledge famine.

Joseph E. Kinney of Ann Arbor, Mich., made the statement in an address prepared for a national water conference sponsored by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce. It is apparent, Kinney said, that water development, or so-called water management, "has been characterized by shortsightedness without the knowledge, understanding or data" required to make sound decisions. "It is a waste of money and energy to build more dams and reservoirs unless the results of better management are known to us."

"Our underground water supplies are not being protected and are being used in a wasteful manner," he said. "This should be a sobering and restraining factor but it gets lost in the excitement of the dam project. Rather than manage surface and underground waters jointly, we rely on one or the other."

Kinney said the limitations on the amount of water available are being evidenced in other ways, too.

"In some areas, transfer of water from one drainage basin to another is not acceptable even when it could pay long-term benefits," he continued. "Other areas rely solely on impounded water and under-protect or another, make no effort to utilize or reuse waters within the area."

## Woman With Blood Disease Plans Christmas at Home

**NEW YORK (AP)** — When Miss Sylvia Golden of the Stephens' Youth Association recently that she would be well enough to go home for Christmas, no one at the Hospital of the Rockefeller University doubted her word.

"We've learned that what Stephanie wants, she usually gets."

Since 1958, the pretty, 23-year-old blonde had had her mind set on one thing — to live. And she's done just that despite a rare blood disease that has carried her to the brink of death at least 10 times.

"I guess I'm just too stubborn to die," she says. "When my case was first diagnosed as fatal, I was just a 15-year-old kid and I was just too stubborn to die."

"But—upon the shock wore off and I said to myself: 'Stephanie, you're not going to die no matter what they say.'"

"And here I am."

During those seven years, Miss Smith has been in and out of hospitals 25 times for her disease. She was given the last rites of the Catholic Church, she recalled. "And last year, after other times I was put on the critical list."

Stephanie said she never once believed she would die.

"I found her doctors, relatives and friends thought differently. There I would live with people crying all around me, and doctors and nurses tiptoeing around with long faces," she said.

"I hated that. I figured it was my life and if they wanted to cry, they could cry. I let them do it on their own time."

Miss Smith currently is recovering from the effects of an emergency operation to correct an infection brought about by her condition.

She describes her illness as "a case of being allergic to myself, a case where parts of my blood destroy the whole."

Medically, her illness is known as juvenile erythroblastosis, a disease once viewed as progressively fatal. However, a spokesman at the hospital, which has done research on it, said it is now regarded as chronic, but controllable with medication.

**Veteran Salmon River Guide Protests U.S. Regulations**

SALMON — Forest Service regulations covering outitters and guides camps on the Salmon River in the Idaho Breaks Primitive Area have drawn the ire of a veteran Salmon River operator, Don Smith, of North Fork.

The Forest Service has told camp operators who hold special use permits that their camps must be of a temporary nature as provided under primitive area regulations.

Smith said that in the 33 years he has been operating on the river he has spent some \$30,000 in advertising the Salmon River Country.

He said, "Now that I have brought the area to the attention of the tourist the Forest Service wants us to hide behind a bush as the tourists by."

Smith said that the group of recreationists which is protesting the camps set up along the river are only about 10 per cent of the people the outitters take down the river and that they make the trip in July when a tent camp would be fine.

The Forest Service has said that camps must be screened from the view of other recreationists and off the trails; storage structures, not over six or six feet in size will be the only permanent structure allowed; tent frames must be constructed so the frame can be dismantled when not covered by a tent; garbage bins must be covered and flyroofs must be of pole construction using posts.

Smith said the Forest Service is "throwing July and August regulations at us. We live down there five to six months in the winter as well."

"Why should we tear our camps down for three months in the winter when there is no one going by on the river?"

"We don't figure the present camp we have is anything but a temporary camp and these modern times we don't figure we can feed 30 to 50 people without refrigeration. We have to have a screened machine to take care of eight or nine clients' gear."

Smith said it was the advertising dollar of the outitter which brought the Salmon River to the attention of the people in all parts of the country.

"I think we are entitled to a piece of ground down there for a certain number of years so we can spend a certain amount of dollars and have a decent camp," Smith said.

Smith's camp is at the mouth of Big Squaw Creek, 24 miles below Corn Creek and above Salmon Falls a mile and a half. It is in the Idaho Breaks Primitive Area and the Bitterroot National Forest.

Smith said, "What good is the Salmon River country if the people of Lemhi County who pioneered it can't get any revenue out of it. Why tie it up in a bag for the Eastern people?"

Notices of the camp regulations were sent to Smith and other operating on the river under special use permits. They include Joe Scobie, Salmon, and Wayne England, North Fork.

The Forest Service has noted that permanent structures which have been set up in the Salmon River Breaks Primitive Area are in violation of wilderness regulations.

To comply with the regulations, the Forest Service has told the operators that it is necessary that they convert their improvements to temporary structures of improvement which could be dismantled at the end of each season of use, if required.

# Labor Department Makes New Approach to Unemployment

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Labor Department taking a new tack in its attack on unemployment is putting more emphasis on increasing the supply of hireable workers for their services.

Government manpower departments look at the job market to see why they have not been able to find work even though business is booming and employment is at a record peak.

They discovered what Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz calls "the rule of two and three." Briefly, this means that unemployment among Negroes is twice as high as it is among whites and teen-age joblessness

is triple the national average. On the other hand, the jobless rate for married men has dipped to 2.1 per cent for the first time since the Korean war era a dozen years ago.

This is virtually a labor shortage level and there have been scattered reports of companies searching for workers especially in engineering, construction and other skilled occupations.

Wirtz believes that emphasis on the over-all unemployment rate—figures at 4.3 per cent in October—is sure to distort the real picture. He said this figure includes an "irreducible minimum" of

unemployment—about 2 or 2.5 per cent—that occurs when new comers enter the labor force and others shift jobs. Another five-tenths of one per cent, Wirtz said, simply "sticks what is taken to be hired."

Full employment will be a reality when the jobless rate goes down to 4.0 per cent, he said. The battle is half over because the figure has dropped from around 7 per cent in 1950-51 to the present 4.3 per cent.

"Another net gain of about a million jobs—over and above the increase in the work force—will bring us over the target," he declares.

The question: How to get

those million jobs. The answer from liberal economists "would be to put a little more steam into the economy to soak up 1 million more unemployed. Conservatives might reply that only additional training and education should be provided to help these jobless find a niche that is not only quality, but also leads to inflation.

Wirtz's approach borrows a bit from each camp. There is no question, he says, that the principle full employment policy is to have a strong economy to produce the maximum number of jobs.

"But more jobs—important as they are—won't be enough," he adds. "Meeting the unem-

ployment problems which exist today is going to require labor supply as well as labor demand measures."

Economic expansion, Wirtz predicts bluntly, is not likely to cut into the jobless ranks in any substantial way. Left unsaid is the administration's fear that too much expansion would lead to inflation.

"The necessary improvement will have to come from measures aimed directly at these areas of concentrated unemployment," he said in referring to jobless Negroes and youths.

Specifically, Wirtz has in mind the antipoverity program run by the Labor Department's Neighborhood Youth Corps. Congress earmarked \$24 million during the current fiscal year to set up projects for helping needy youngsters find part-time jobs so they can finish school. Since it was started earlier this year, federal funds totaling \$245 million have been allocated for 1,423 such projects. They have provided 434,023 jobs—principally in welfare agencies, hospitals or local government agencies.

He also is referring to the Manpower Development Program which has \$441 million to spend this year on training projects. This provides funds for schooling of jobless workers and on-the-job training under federal auspices.

Gonzalez has only a fair 37-12 record. The secret is in deceiving. He was won 12 straight fights in the last 2½ years and is undefeated as a professional.

 Dollars will be wasted on gifts for children during the next two weeks unless the parents are careful in choosing their gifts. Gifts that are carefully chosen are usually appreciated and provide greater enjoyment.

An ideal gift should be chosen with careful consideration of the child's age, ability, interests and personality. The gift is to become a favorite possession.

You have heard of the expensive doll that has been discarded and an old one replaced. A toy of the same kind is not a gift. It shouldn't be. Do similar things. There is a certain security in the gift.

A gift is more appropriate if it is proper for the age and reasonably for the family income. A toy of the same kind is too difficult for the child to understand or too simple to hold his interest. Will it be to hold his interest?

Many people feel that a gift should be useful. They realize that a pull toy can be most useful for a child learning to walk. A model kit which is not a child's muscle control as well as his ability to follow instructions.

## U.S. Accused Of Stirring War Tensions

MOSCOW (AP)—Premier Alexei N. Kosygin has accused the United States of whipping up war tensions, arming West Germany against the Soviet Union and killing defenseless people in Viet Nam.

In a restatement of recent Soviet comments on foreign affairs, Kosygin said Soviet leaders could not meet with President Johnson so long as the war in Viet Nam continues. Kosygin's remarks, reported today by the official Soviet news agency Tass, were made Monday in an interview with James Reston, an associate editor.

States is the principal barrier. It was the third interview Kosygin has given to a foreign journalist since he succeeded Premier Nikita Khrushchev in October 1964. A Turkish journalist and a British newspaper owner saw him earlier.

Kosygin concluded the interview with an expression of hope that war would not hang over the world — after earlier accusing the United States of "creating an atmosphere conducive to war" in Europe.

"We do not want tension built up in any part of the world," Kosygin said. "We want to bend every effort in every part of the world to achieve these ends. To this effort, the United States is the principal barrier."

"We could have the best possible relations with the American people. We value the American people's wisdom, talents and abilities — all their achievements. We are ready to learn from them to develop technology and science, and to organize production."

### Labor Chiefs Fear Results Of Drive

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Despite assurances from President Johnson, organized labor leaders say they are running scared in their drive in Congress to wipe out state laws that ban union-shop contracts.

Top AFL-CIO officers publicly voice no doubts that Johnson will live up to his pledge to push for repeal of Section 14B of the Taft-Hartley Act.

But privately they are worried that lukewarm administration support may mean defeat of the repeal fight for the foreseeable future.

Section 14B permits the states to outlaw union-shop contracts under which all employees must join the union. Nineteen states have such laws. The union shop is legal under the federal labor law in 31 other states which do not specifically prohibit it.

With Congress due to convene next month, labor leaders say they still have no firm commitment from administration leaders on when the repeal bill will be brought up in the Senate or how hard Democratic leaders will fight to crush a renewed Republican filibuster that side-tracked the bill this year.

"It's just not there," one labor spokesman said when asked whether union leaders had such a commitment.

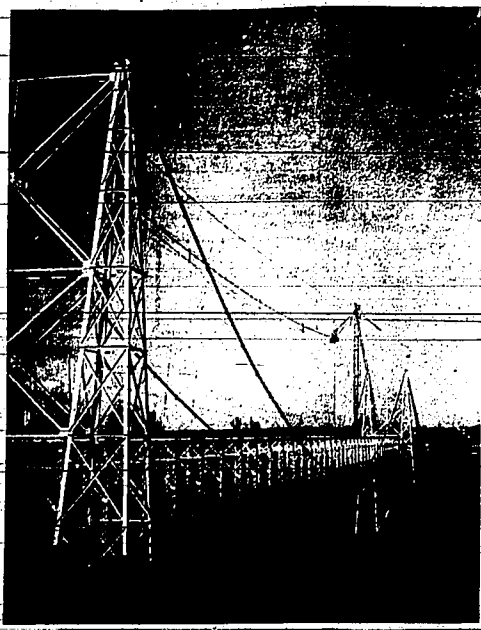
The AFL-CIO Executive Council was to discuss this and other matters today in setting the schedule for its biennial convention opening Thursday.

One member of the council plans to propose that the AFL-CIO "demand responsibility from labor," said an aide, and "the Senate failed to live up to its responsibility."

### New Toys Are Thought Successful

CHICAGO (UPI)—Each year 2,000 new toys are introduced to the trade, but only about 200 of them ever make it into stores, says Jack Wright, director of design for Tinkertoys.

Of the 200 toys in stores, only 20 will make money, and only two will be around after five years, Wright said, because "the toy based on fad is outdated very quickly."

There are many approaches to toy design, he said. Some companies "buy into" the market that can make a certain type of object. To utilize their investment, they decide to make an object into a toy. The toy may be cute, but "it's a back door approach that doesn't necessarily benefit the child," Wright said.

Another approach is to take something from the past and create a modern material. A good example of this technique is the periodic changes made in dolls and bicycles.

Wright said the proper approach to toy design is to determine the prime market needs. This can be done by finding out what parents want for their children or what educators recommend.

A toy should be fun but it also should enhance the child's creative ability and teach him something while he plays with it. Consequently, the toy must not do all the work—for the child. A toy that is wound up to do all the work is not fun, he said, because it can't create new interest.

**States Urged To Unite for Water Search**  
LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI) — Flood E. Donny, U.S. congressman, is recommending that Wednesday the Colorado River Basin states must unite in the search for water or else face restricted growth and eventual decline.

"Only by a united effort led by the people of the Pacific Southwest who have the vast and immediate personal stake in the Lower Colorado River Basin project can it be brought to fruition," Donny told the Investigations Districts Association of California.

Donny said the wild Pacific Southwest must first utilize its share of the Colorado River. This will widen the thin margin of water between water needs and water supply. It is also a prerequisite to heroic steps which must be taken to secure the long pull to enhance the total water supply," he said.

He called for a realistic approach to authorization of appropriations and for the state to undertake immediately in their relationship to the national budget.

Donny said federal construction of the Marble Canyon unit was of paramount importance. He said there was no strong desire to develop the Marble Canyon unit "unless absolutely necessary."

Donny pointed out that neither Arizona nor Southern California would have water needs fully supplied from the natural flows of the Colorado River.

Colored slides of the Oregon and California Trails were shown during the Twin Falls County Historical Society meeting Tuesday night at the Robert Stuart Junior High School. 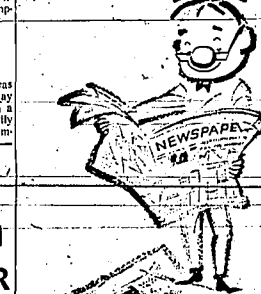

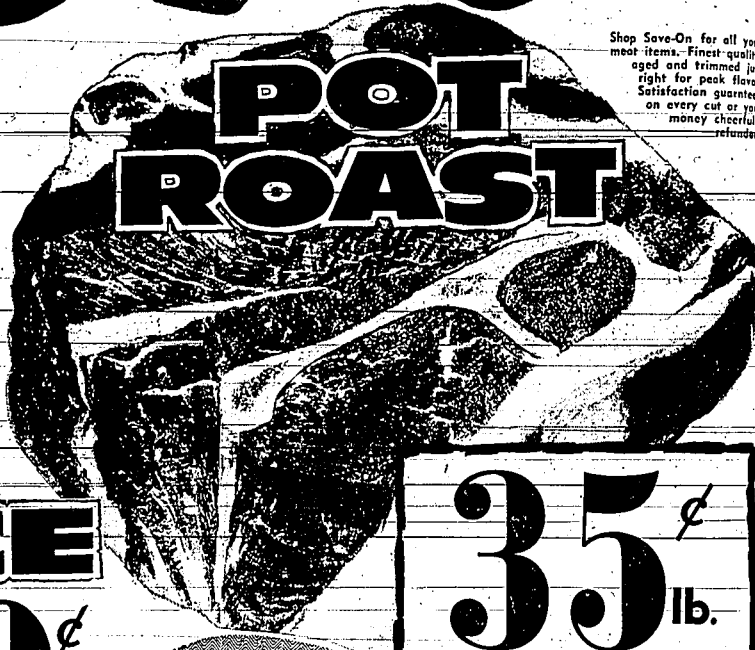
