A panel of judges selected by the chamber will judge the four categories Dec. 19 and 20.

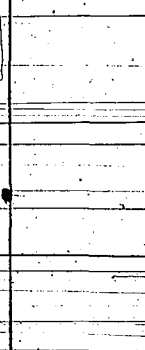

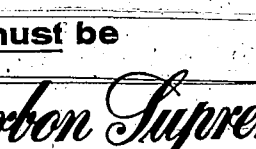
Officials identified him as Edwin Ross Armstrong, an apprentice seaman reported missing when his ship left Hong Kong Dec. 3 after a five-day visit.

40,000 Cards Being Sent to Fighting Men

HILL AIR FORCE BASE (AP) — Brigham Young University's Operation Christmas Card contribution to the fighting men in Viet Nam departs today from Hill Air Force Base.

Included are more than 40,000 Christmas cards that began arriving at BYU shortly after Thanksgiving in an organized drive to wish American servicemen merry Christmas.

Several thousand cards are expected to arrive after departure of an Air Force mail plane carrying today's load to Southeast Asia.

"All will be sent, somehow," said Daryl Harris, one of the operation's organizers.

"If the numbers are small, we'll probably have to send them parcel post," Harris said. "But if there are enough of them, I'm sure the Air Force will have other planes going that way."

About 25,000 of the cards are from BYU students. Many small colleges contributed the rest. Central College, Missouri, contributed 4,200 cards.

The drive, organized by BYU student Allan Williams, had a one million card goal.

But Harris said it failed to hit the million mark because of a late start. He blamed part of the delay on red tape which he said slowed approval of the Association of Brigham Young University Executive Council.

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High-Speed Tests Begin for Plane

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) — High-speed tests at Altitude of 10,000 feet today began for the U.S. Air Force variable-sweep fighter plane.

The tests, which began Thursday, continue through January 15. The tests will be conducted in a 100-nautical-mile air corridor 5 to 15 miles offshore and parallel to the Gulf Coast between Galveston and Galveston.

The craft will operate out of its home base at the local General Dynamics plant.

Testimony Is Expected in Murder Trial

WINNEMUCCA, Nev. (AP) — FBI Agent Marvin F. Bell was expected to testify today at Clyde George Ibsen's trial in the fatal shooting of Indian leader Delbert Howard.

Ibsen, 30, of New Jersey, has been charged with murder. Howard, a Winnemucca Shoshone Indian and vice president of the Nevada Intertribal Council, was slain last July.

District Judge Mervyn Brown overruled a motion Thursday by attorney Kenneth Blum that Bell be prevented from relating his interviews with Ibsen.

Mann said Bell's testimony should not be admitted on grounds Ibsen was denied his full rights to legal representation.

Police said Ibsen gave Bell a statement July 31 saying he had fatally struck Howard with a soda pop bottle near Truckee, Calif.

Officers quoted the statement as saying Howard's body was taken to Southern California and dumped into the Pacific Ocean.

CAMPAIGN LAUNCHED
BOISE (UPI)—A campaign against a Boise City effort to establish an urban renewal agency was launched at a public meeting Thursday night.

The meeting was called by a group known as the Boise Citizens Committee for Home Rule. It was attended by about 250 persons.

Speakers said they opposed a plan by the city government for an urban renewal agency "to keep out federal control."

The plan was passed to collect money to finance a court suit to prevent creation of an agency.

WIVES HEARING
BLACKFOOT, Idaho (AP)—Ronald Kershaw, 15, of Blackfoot, Thursday was a defendant in a hearing on four counts of involuntary manslaughter with a vehicle.

Kershaw was ordered to appear for arraignment in District Court. No date for the arraignment has been set. Kershaw was charged with being the driver of a truck which collided with a passenger car in which Mrs. J. Hammond of Blackfoot received fatal injuries.

MEETING SLATED
BOISE (UPI)—State commissioners and select staff officers of the Idaho Army National Guard will review the plan to hold a weekend meeting here, it was announced Thursday.

The meeting will discuss requirements established by the Department of the Army for all Army National Guard units under the new readiness concept, according to Col. James S. Brooks, chief of staff.

BOISE (UPI)—Wynard Peterson was declared the apparent low bidder for a Department of Public Safety warehouse building Thursday.

The Public Works Department, said Peterson received the lowest of seven bids, for \$51,400.

ASSURES CONSIDERATION
BOISE (UPI)—John (AP) Rep. Compton J. White, D-Idaho, said Thursday he is sure the House will give consideration to the proposed wild rivers legislation which he supports.

White said he is sure the wild rivers concept will win there "every safeguard for the protection of private property owners."

"Two-thirds of Idaho is already publicly owned," White said. "It is reasonable enough to move cautiously on legislation which authorizes land condemnation of law enforcement to carry out its aims."

PARTS DISCOVERED
BOISE (UPI)—A fire in a combination garage near Boise resulted in the discovery of parts for several vehicles, the Ada County sheriff's office said Friday.

The fire Thursday caused several thousand dollars worth of damage to the contents of the structure west of Boise, which was owned by Floyd Johnson.

The slot machine parts were confiscated by Sheriff Paul Thrift. He said the parts were not operative. They included three or four cases and parts for five or six lasides.

STARTS LIFE TERM
BOISE (UPI)—A life term in the State Prison has started for a man sentenced in Bonner County of being a principal law violator.

Received at the prison was Bobby Child, 44. He was before district court in Bonner County on a charge of assault with a "deadly weapon" and then was sentenced to life for being a habitual criminal.

Warden J. C. Chaves said Child had been convicted of several Montana felonies in South Dakota, grand larceny in Idaho and white slavery.

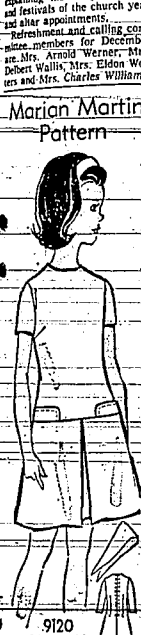

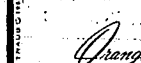

Potato Processing in State Jumps 61 Per Cent

BOISE — The total quantity of potatoes used in processing during the first four months of the 1956 marketing season was 61 per cent larger than the amount used last year during the same period.

According to the December report of the USDA Statistical Reporting Service, potato processing in Idaho (plus Idaho potatoes processed in Malheur County, Oregon) from July through October accounted for 89.1 million cwt. of raw potatoes.

Of this, 8.67 million cwt. were used in the manufacture of food products and 283,000 cwt. were used for starch, flour and alcohol. Of the processed potatoes, about 7.33 million cwt. came from the 410 southwest counties, 4.84 million from "Other Counties" and 1,833 million were shipped into Idaho from other states.

The usage for food products was increased 51 per cent, and for starch, flour and alcohol usage was 71 per cent above last year.

Farm Export Market Grows \$9.2 Billion in 10 Years

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Raymond A. Ioanes, administrator of the Foreign Agricultural Service, said that during the past 10 years, world agricultural trade increased about \$9.2 billion, reaching a total of about \$31 billion in 1954.

In fiscal 1954-55, the United States supplied a record \$6.5 billion of this trade. The U.S. total is expected to climb to another \$10 million in fiscal 1955.

Ioanes said the United States supplied 20 per cent of the total world trade in fiscal 1955, and was responsible for 37 per cent of the world increase.

For the United States itself, the trade in farm exports more than doubled during the past decade, Ioanes said practically all the increase was in dollar sales.

In his review of the farm export situation, Ioanes predicted the foreign agricultural market would keep growing, and that U.S. farm exports would grow with it. But he warned against any complacency, because "our share of the market will not come to us by default."

FILER — Howard Lappay, who had farmed near Filer 43 years, died early in December. Monday his equipment was sold. A large crowd of people gathered in the morning for the farm sale, a scene of transition.

Method Tests Cows Early In Lactation

MOSCOW (UP)—A way to estimate the value of a dairy cow early in her lactation has been developed by Dr. K. R. Johnson, dairy scientist at the University of Idaho. The method is a quick guide to a cow's total milk production by weighing only two days' output. Johnson's shortcut test isn't as precise as production testing by Dairy Herd Improvement stations. But it's much more reliable than the "by look or by guess" methods used by many dairymen to cut or select their dairy cows, he says.

Here's how the system works: Weigh the cow's milk on the 28th and 29th days of her lactation. Average the 28th production, multiply by a factor of 230 and you have an estimate of her milk production over a 305-day lactation. "You can use this estimate as a guide for culling and breeding," Johnson says. "And you can make the decision early in the cow's lactation; before the poor-producing cow has cost you much money. Set a minimum level of milk production for a lactation in your herd, then check each cow against this minimum." The dairy scientist points out that DHIA tests "provide the most complete information for selecting profitable cows. But only about 15 per cent of Idaho's dairy cows are production tested. The other 85 per cent, he says, are judged "by look or by guess, and neither is accurate."

Co-Ops Are Told To Coordinate

WASHINGTON—Food production and marketing functions are going to be much more closely coordinated in the future than ever now—and there is no reason why cooperatives cannot do the coordinating, stated H. L. Forest, director, CMS dairy division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, speaking at the recent convention of the National Milk Producers Federation.

"Cooperatives offer the means through which farmers may retain the freedom and dignity of independent enterprise in production, and also achieve a scale large enough in marketing to meet the needs of mass merchandising," he said.

Price-Index in Gem State Rises Three Points

The Nov. 15 Index of Prices Received by Idaho farmers showed an increase of three points from last month, according to the USDA. Crop Reporting Service for Idaho. The all-crops index and the livestock and livestock products index both show an increase of two points from last month.

The All-Crops Index at 199 per cent of its 1910-14 average was two points above Oct. 15, 1965, and Nov. 15, 1964. The increase from last month resulted from higher prices received for wheat, oats, barley, red clover seed, alfalfa seed and dry beans. Prices received for potatoes and apples declined slightly while alfalfa has remained unchanged.

The Livestock and Livestock products index also shows an increase of two points over last month, but is 53 points above the index of Nov. 15, 1964. The increase from last month is due mainly to higher prices received for lamb and eggs. Beef cattle and chicken prices were lower while hogs, milkfat in cream and wool remained unchanged.

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Acresage Diversion Payments Changed To Reduce Surplus Crop Production

WASHINGTON (UP)—As rate for acres averages \$46.50. Freeman has set the rates the government will pay farmers who participate in the 1966 feed grain acreage diversion and long-term cropland adjustment programs. Both programs are designed to reduce surplus crop production.

The feed grain payments were adjusted so that the 1966 loan rates for corn and grain sorghum were below those of 1965, but the payments for participating in the program were increased. In becoming a participant, and receiving a payment, the farmer becomes eligible for price support loans.

Department officials estimated the 1966 feed grain program would cost about \$400 million less than the anticipated \$1.2 billion for the 1965 program, and it would provide for a total reduction in feed grain acreage of 60 million acres.

Some of the reduction in costs, according to officials, would stem from reduced stocks and greater use of the commodities through domestic consumption and exports. Stocks in 1965 are expected to be up some 3 million tons.

Costs of the cropland adjustment program for 1966 is limited, under law, to \$225 million. The program is aimed at removing from surplus production up to 10 million acres for periods of five to 10 years.

Officials estimated about 30 million acres would be diverted from the feed grain program next year. This would be in addition to 3-5 million acres under the cropland adjustment program.

Under the feed-grain program, farmers will be asked to divert a minimum 20 per cent of the feed grain base acreage to conserving uses.

The loan rate for corn is 51 per bushel and for sorghum, maintaining payment parity for participating is 30 cents per bushel. This total of \$1.30 per 1965 corn acre with \$1.25 for 1965 which featured a loan rate of \$1.65 and a payment of 20 cents.

For grain sorghum the loan rate in 1966 will be \$1.52 per bushel and the support payment 52 cents for a total support of \$2.09. Last year the total support was \$2-\$1.65 for loans and 35 cents for participating.

For barley, the loan rate will be 80 cents per bushel and the support 30 cents for a total support of \$1.10. The total support was 96 cents—20 cents for loans and 16 cents for participating.

In addition to the price support loan and payment, a participant can get more government money by diverting acreage beyond the 20 per cent minimum up to a maximum of 50 per cent.

The diversion payment will be equal to one-half of the 1964 county price-support rate multiplied by the farm's projected yield. The farmer who diverts 50 per cent of his acreage will fare better, proportionately, in total income than the farmer who diverts less than 50 per cent.

Nationally, the 1966 acreage rate for corn averages \$46.50. In 1965, the 50 per cent payment rate average \$38.25 per acre.

Under the cropland adjustment program, payments for land that would otherwise produce the 1966 program by making their 20 per cent diversion in any of the three acreages. They also will be able to substitute wheat and feed grain acreages and may produce wheat on out-rye bases.

The national average support for 1966 crop oats will be 50 cents per bushel, and for rye, \$1.02 per bushel, unchanged from 1965.

In 1966, flaxseed will not be eligible as an alternative crop on diverted acres.

Under the cropland adjustment program, payments for land that would otherwise produce the 1966 program by making their 20 per cent diversion in any of the three acreages. They also will be able to substitute wheat and feed grain acreages and may produce wheat on out-rye bases.

The national average support for 1966 crop oats will be 50 cents per bushel, and for rye, \$1.02 per bushel, unchanged from 1965.

After placing all his acreage on one or more of the surplus crops in the program, the farmer may still offer other cropland. Rates for this cropland will range nationally from \$3 to \$7 per acre.

Apple Commission Proposed At Horticulture Meeting

BOISE (AP)—Proposed creation of a State Apple Advertising Commission was under consideration at the annual meeting of the Idaho State Horticultural Society.

At present a voluntary advertising program is in effect but Stanley Robinson of Caldwell, chairman of the apple and grades committee, said only about 50 to 60 per cent of the growers are paying the one-cent box assessment.

If a state advertising commission were set up, the assessment could be on a tax basis and growers would be required to pay.

R. C. Kelleff of Caldwell, society president, told the meeting the outlook for the future of the fruit industry is favorable.

He said expansion in Idaho is likely because of the "hundreds of thousands of tillable acres" which are expected to be brought into production in the next decade.

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New England River Basin Body Okayed

WASHINGTON — The New England River Basin Commission may be the first water commission organized under the Water Resources Planning Act of 1965.

The federal Water Resources Council has unanimously approved a resolution providing for the creation of the body to plan water development for that area.

The new regional commission will be established by President Johnson after receiving recommendations from the governors of at least four New England states. It will be the principal agency for coordinating federal, state, interstate and local water and resources development in the region.

Idaho Dairy Production Down in Year

BOISE — Total production of milk in Idaho was estimated by the Crop Reporting Service to be 110 million pounds during 1963, compared with 115 million pounds a year earlier and 122 million pounds 1959-63 average for October.

Production declined four per cent from September to October, compared with the five-year average seasonal decrease of five per cent. Milk prices were up 10 per cent in October. Ice cream was down 10 per cent.

Study Shows State Potato Grade Good

BOISE — Simple digests of potato in Southern Idaho indicate the 1963 crop is composed of 65 per cent U. S. No. 1, 25 per cent U. S. No. 2, and 10 per cent other according to a preliminary summary issued by the Idaho Crop Reporting Service.

The grades have been adjusted to reflect the potato crop as based from the Idaho potato commercial operations and are based on U. S. Grade Standards. No potatoes were sampled in the state of Nevada.

This report is based on samples digested in 268 randomly selected fields. The percentages reflect the crop as produced, not after harvesting loss. However, these percentages may change during storage.

BLM to Sell 3,135 Acres

BOISE — Each Wednesday 1:00 p.m. several parcels of public land in southern Idaho are offered for sale at public auction in the Federal Building.

According to Orval G. Hadley, land office manager of the Bureau of Land Management, 20 parcels, totaling 3,135 acres, in Blinham, Bonneville, Canyon, Lemhi and Minidoka counties, are now being offered. Individual parcels vary in size from 40 acres to 523 acres. Hadley said some of the parcels have suitability for irrigated farming but generally the lands are only suitable for dry-grass purposes. None of the parcels have water rights.

The Fort Hall boards resolution pointed out that the Fort Hall Stockmen's Association owns 1,278 producing cows, 50 bulls, with 1,200 head of additional producing cows owned by other tribal members and the Bamcock Stockmen's Association, all dependent upon the bottom land for water, feed, and wintering grounds.

Minidoka County Farmers Offered Federal Insurance

All-risk federal crop insurance on sugar beets will be available to farmers in Minidoka County for the 1964 crop year, Douglas H. Berch, Twin Falls District Crop Insurance Corp. district director reports.

The program was offered as pilot projects in Twin Falls and Canyon counties in 1963. More than 7,000 acres were covered by this self-help cooperative service. Berch reported that more than \$1.8 million in Idaho crop production expenses on more than 200,000 acres was protected by the insurance in 1963.

"This was a year of bumper crops," it was reported, "but many farmers around the county didn't share in the good fortune. This year we expect to pay nearly \$11 million to over 8,000 farmers whose crops did not return their production costs."

Farm Exports up

WASHINGTON (UPI) — U.S. exports in 1963 government-financed programs totaled \$3 billion in fiscal 1963, up five per cent from the previous year, according to the Agriculture Department.

Curtis Eaton Warns Stockmen Loss of Grazing Rights Jeopardizes Credit

Curtis T. Eaton, Twin Falls, vice president of the Twin Falls Bank and Trust Co., told the Idaho Section of the American Society of Range Management Saturday that extension of bank credit to stockmen is jeopardized by loss of grazing privileges on public lands.

"If the capacity crowd at the American Legion Hall, most of the livestock operators of our area are thoroughly dependent upon forage outside their property, and if they are forced out of this position, they would have two alternatives—One would be to liquidate the other would be to acquire enough feed land to support their operation. The latter in most cases would be an economic impossibility."

"He noted that some national banks are no longer giving credit, in statement, to the value of the livestock operations on public domain on the grounds that the future use of these rights is uncertain. He added, however, that his bank has not adopted this policy."

The banker listed considerations that should continue to be given by stockmen in the use of public lands:

A majority of the lands of the state of Idaho is public land; the multiple use principle must be stressed; the present administration of public lands should be administered for the purpose of the best economic use.

The counsel of advisory boards should be given considerable weight; economic influences on-site areas should be weighed.

Report Shows Food Firm Profits Rise

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A joint report of the Federal Trade Commission and the Securities and Exchange Commission shows that profits after taxes for leading food-bulk firms in the first half of 1963 averaged 2.8 per cent of sales compared to 2.4 per cent a year earlier.

The report said after-tax profits averaged 7.3 per cent of sales in the first half of 1963 and 6.3 per cent a year earlier.

The report also showed that average sales averaged higher in 1964 than in 1963 for a group of leading food-manufacturers. Profits as a percentage of stockholders' equity and as a percentage of sales.

Profits as a percentage of stockholders' equity increased to 11.3 per cent from 1.5 per cent in 1962. Profits as a percentage of sales increased to 2.7 per cent from 2.5 per cent.

Supermarkets Using Fewer Trade Stamps

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Agriculture Department says that recent studies indicate that trading stamps as a promotional device for food retailers may be losing their effectiveness and declining in importance.

The department said some national and regional chains have discontinued the use of stamps in their stores in some locations.

A survey by the Super Market Institute showed that the proportion of its member supermarkets issuing trading stamps declined from 77 per cent in 1962 to 70 per cent in 1964.

The department said a larger proportion of supermarkets operated by large chains issued trading stamps than those operated by small chains.

The department said more than three-fourths of the supermarkets belonging to firms with sales greater than \$100 million gave stamps, compared with about half of the supermarkets belonging to firms with sales less than \$50 million.
