The Chamber of Commerce hosted members of the city electrical department, water department, street department and the telephone company at the Holiday meeting.

Elmer Schuch, superintendent of the city electrical department, reported on the installation of Christmas decorations in the city and gave a report on man hour costs.

Schuch noted that some \$2,495 was involved in labor costs for installation, electricity use, repair and replacement of bulbs totaled about \$2,221.

In the breakdown he noted that the city electrical crew worked 14 working days to install the decorations, two crew days for maintenance and four days for removal of the decorations.

He reported a total of 7,500 feet of light wire string, 5,000 10-watt bulbs, 200 lamps with 60-watt bulbs operated by 12 time switches and eight photo-electric cells were checked and strung, not including garlands.

He added 25 per cent of the bulbs must be replaced each year with the Christmas lights burning nine hours a day for 38 days this season. Estimated power consumption would be 24,000 kilowatt hours.

All wiring and lights were checked individually before installation.

The water and street department reported two working days for their part of the installation and the Project Mutual reported approximately two working days for two men were involved in their part.

Clarence Birrer, chairman of the lighting committee expressed appreciation to the city crews for the beautiful decorations, emphasizing that Rupert was the best decorated small city anywhere. Birrer showed movies of the city crews installing the decorations.

Committee members assisting Birrer on the lighting crew included Donald Dickson, Bill Henschel, Lloyd Knodel and George Thompson.

Birth Control Aid Is Being Developed

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—A new one-day birth control pill that may eventually become a once-a-year injection is being developed.
Evidence and theory indicate it does not affect release of the egg from the ovary as do the commercial pills now in use.
Instead, it acts to prevent the egg and male sperm from coming together.
It will probably cost less and be easier to take since the woman will not have to take it for such-and-such a number of days before or after her menstrual period.
One of the medical research scientists from a pharmaceutical house working on it, Dr. Dorothy Ruelle, says, "It's the kind of pill we use in underdeveloped nations to help save population explosion."
Dr. Ruelle is director of the Institute of Clinical Medicine of Snyx Laboratories in Palo Alto, Calif., and is a professor at the University of Utah College of Medicine seminar Friday.
The pill is not on the commercial market and won't be for a long time, if ever. But it has been tested in human beings.

They see nothing significant, however, in the Viet Cong's broadcast offer Monday night.

Most view it as nothing more than a propaganda gesture and certainly not as an indication that the Communists are putting off any kind of peace, let alone as for a 1966 cease-fire. Practical factors must be weighed.

VITERBO, Italy (AP) — Film actresses Tina Lollobrigida and Dina Saeed and five other film personalities were indicted Saturday on obscenity charges stemming from the movie "Le Bambole" (The Dolls).

An investigating judge, acting as a one-man grand jury, ordered two Italian actresses tried along with the actors Nino Manfredi and Jean Sorel, directors Dino Risì and Mauro Bolognini, and producer Giovanni Hecht. Sorel is French. The others are Italian.

The prosecutor's charge against Miss Lollobrigida was that she appeared half-nude in one scene with Sorel. The actress has said she was wearing pink tights. Miss Lisi and Manfredi were charged with participating in another scene, showing a husband "trying to make his wife recline on a bed."

Tax Rates Are Complicated Problem, But Idaho Has Many Discrepancies

BOISE (AP) — When do property taxes become unfair?

Crumbling tax rates vary, of course, and many Idaho taxpayers undoubtedly feel they are already paying an unreasonable property tax.

But tax experts generally agree that unless the owner of property outside an incorporated city is paying more than \$1.50 a year for each \$100 of actual cash value the rate is not excessive.

For property within a city, the level is flat at about \$7.

A study by the Associated Taxpayers of Idaho shows that on an average — the \$2 per \$100 level within a municipality was reached in 1965 in only two Idaho cities, both in the north.

Taxpayers in Wallace paid an average of \$2.16 in taxes on \$100 worth of property they owned this year. In Kellogg, the average was \$2.06.

But Max Voss, executive manager of Associated Taxpayers of Idaho, said use of the average property tax rate in the picture. He said that some individuals paid as much as \$3.31 per \$100 for property outside city limits.

Assessment rates vary from county to county and at various types of property within a county.

Of the 67 cities studied in the Associated Taxpayers survey, Burley has the lowest tax rate per \$100 of cash value, \$1.09. Thirty-five others have rates between \$1.50 and \$2.00.

All the rest, except Wallace and Kellogg, range between \$2.00 and \$3.00.

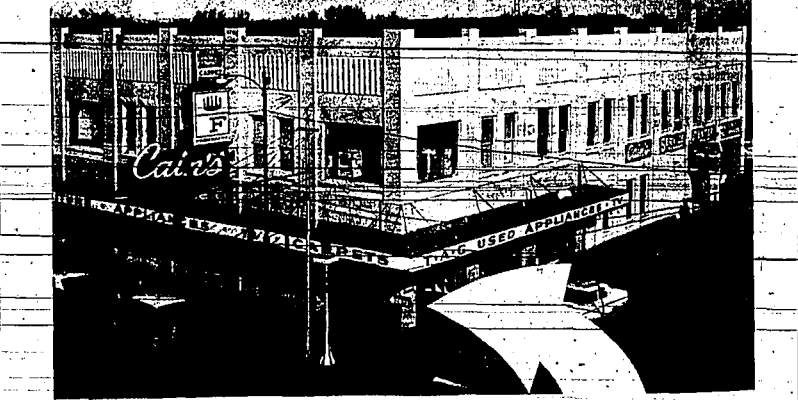

Japanese Tea Highlights Year For Jerome Hospital Guild

JEROME — A sunny winter day, congenial and authentic surroundings and a Japanese motif provided a most rewarding afternoon for the many women who attended the annual Membership Tea sponsored by the St. Benedict's Hospital Guild.

Guests and members were welcomed by Mrs. Leon Tippet, president, in the St. Benedict's Nursing Home Dining Room. Mrs. Frank Titus, program chairman, explained to the guests that the committee had decided to forego the usual low Japanese tables for the event because they felt it might be difficult for some to sit in the traditional Japanese manner. Guests and members were seated at quartet tables, centered with small Japanese fans and chrysanthemums, under Japanese lanterns hanging from the chandeliers in the dining room.

Committee members who assisted with the program

were introduced. They include Mrs. John Hayes, Mrs. Edna Burks, Mrs. Lyons Smith and Mrs. Raymond Assendrup.

Mrs. Titus gave a short resume of the origin of tea drinking, explaining that about the 12th century tea was used to keep religious men awake for their prayers.

Later, tea drinking became more of a social order and now is used for a simple work break by many people. The women were served tea at the tables and inter-enjoyed Japanese delicacies from the refreshment table, which included fortune cookies, thin wafer-like rice cookies, "sushi" which is cooked rice rolled around fish and vegetables and tied with sea-weed, resembling a small cupcake; manjuu, a cookie filled with jellied bean pulp; yokan, a gelatinized bean pulp with sugar, and a candy resembling jelly rolls wrapped in cellophane.

The small jelly candy which was wrapped had an inner wrapping, and many of the women worked delicately to remove the wrapping for a taste, only to be told the inner wrap was to be eaten, that it was also made of rice.

Mrs. Yoshio Aizawa was in charge of the refreshments and furnished the authentic Japanese decorations for the annual event.

Mrs. L. W. Sanberg displayed the guild's scrapbook which placed first at the state convention. The scrapbook is a picture book of the accomplishments of the guild during the past year. She explained that while the annual tea is for pleasure and relaxation, the purpose of the organization is "a group of women dedicated to voluntary service in the hospital."

The guild, organized in 1933, has followed through on many projects for the hospital. Included among them are "the presentation of a life-size plastic skeleton for study classes; a cart-service for patients with necessary personal items for the patients; an isolette, maintained in the west wing of the hospital, and a beauty parlor for residents of St. Benedict's Nursing Home."

During the 1963-64 year, a cake sale, sponsored by the guild, met with such enthusiasm that a check for \$1,500 was presented to the "sisters" with which they purchased an explosion-proof electro-surgical unit for use in the operating room.

The outstanding event of the 1964-65 year was the presentation of the Oklaha Baroque Dan-cers. Proceeds from this event purchased a blood bank refrigerator and special thermometer for the hospital.

The guild spearheaded the thought of a nursing home to be built adjacent to the hospital. This became a reality in 1963.

Mrs. Sanberg concluded by stating that while the guild does sponsor special teas and dinners for recreation and enjoyment, its main objective is service to the hospital.

2 pounds boneless lamb shoulder, cut in 1-inch cubes
1/2 cup flour
1 tablespoon salt
1/2 teaspoon black pepper
1 teaspoon paprika
2 tablespoons shortening
1/2 cups water
1 clove garlic, minced
1 teaspoon dried weed, optional
1 ounce can tomato paste
2/3 cup water
2 small onions
5 pound carrots, quartered
2 cups diced celery
Coat lamb pieces with a mixture of the next four ingredients: Reserve remaining flour in a Dutch oven or sauce pan; add lamb and brown well on all sides — Sprinkle remaining flour over meat. Add the one and one-half cups water and the next four ingredients. Cover and simmer for one hour.

Nagel Hired by Iowa in Effort to Improve Team

IOWA CITY (AP)—The University of Iowa hired Ray Nagel as a backfield coach, with a salary of \$10,000 a year. Nagel, 33, was picked by his head coach, Earl "Red" Sanders, after a search for a coach who could produce a winning season the past four years.

In selecting Nagel, 33, it might be a case of "if you can't beat 'em, join 'em."

Three UCLA football teams with which Nagel has been associated — two as a player and one as an assistant coach — have beaten Iowa.

Nagel, head coach at Utah for eight years, succeeds Jerry Burns, also 33, who was fired four days before the end of the 1965 season. The Hawkeyes won only one of 10 games, their worst record in 76 years.

Burns, 33 at the time and the Iowa's head coach after the 1960 season, was fired after a 1-10 record.

Burns never finished higher than fifth place in the Big Ten Conference under Burns, and in the last three years it placed eighth, ninth and 10th. This came after Evashkevski directed the Hawkeyes to two conference titles and two Rose Bowl trips.

Chairman Hugh Keio said the selection of Nagel was unanimous by the board in control of athletics. Nagel's salary was announced. Burns received \$18,500 a year.

Evashkevski, now Iowa athletic director, said of Nagel's appointment: "We need somebody young, somebody who had stood the test of time and competition. Nagel will give us the impetus and momentum to get lower back in the upper echelon of the Big Ten."

Evashkevski, who coached at Iowa 39 and tied one. His 1964 season was the best in the university's history, winning nine of 11 games, including the Liberty Bowl, and tying for the Western Athletic Conference title. He was named conference coach of the year. This past season Utah was 3-7.

A 1950 graduate of UCLA, he spent a year at the University of Utah, where he coached the Bruins on offense in 1946-47, setting a school passing record in 1947. The next season, under a new head coach, the late Red Sanders, who installed the single school passing record in 1948.

At a news conference after his appointment, Nagel said he will have six or seven assistants here.

"It is probable that some of them will be men I have worked with previously," he said. "You don't just hire a coach because it is a good recruiter. But if he can't recruit, he's not worth anything."

Extension OK'd on Plans for New Ski Area

A Soda Springs development has been granted an extension to submit final plans for financing construction of a new ski resort in the Butterfield Creek area, just north of Ketchum, Sawtooth National Forest headquarters announced Saturday.

The firm, Boulder Development Corp., was awarded the contract by the Forest Service to develop the ski area.

Max Rees, Sawtooth National Forest supervisor, said the corporation's primary aim is to apply to the Economic Development Administration for financing help.

In order for this aid to be available, Blaine County has to submit an overall economic development plan to the ECA for approval. Rees said the county is in the process of submitting such a plan and the time extension was granted to provide for this.

The ECA is set up to help develop industry and jobs in areas that qualify because of need. Rees reported plans for the ski area construction call for two chair lifts to be in operation by Dec. 1, 1967, to take skiers about half-way to the top of the mountain.

The first phase also calls for the corporation to have an access road and parking lot constructed, to clear and develop six ski trails and to construct a lodge at the base of the ski hill.

The second phase provides that by Dec. 1, 1967, the corporation will construct one more chair lift, to the top of Veterans Peak; construct a T-Bar lift at the bottom of the hill for beginners; build a restaurant; lodge; ski waxing and repair shop; and develop a mountain; construct and develop two more ski trails, and expand the parking lot.

Man-Made "Star" Twinkles High Above Sun Valley's Bald Mountain

...KETTUM - A new "star" will twinkle in the heavens over Bald Mountain at Sun Valley. It appears each night at dusk just above the top of 9,038 foot Bald Mountain and twinkles there until daylight next morning. Many have watched and admired its brightness, and wondered. ...The new star is explained by Les-Outis, mountains manager at the resort. "It's a symbol of Sun Valley," he said. "When skiers from far away places reach Twin Falls, they see the star, they see the beauty of the area within 25 miles of their destination. ...The star is really a large mercury vapor light," continued Outis, "and is located at the Warming Hut on top of Bald Mountain. ...The chairways which will carry skiers to this star are now being built. Two have been over since Sun Valley first started. The third one is the newly completed, double-chair lift on the Warm Springs side of Bald Mountain. ...Engineers from Sun Valley, the U.S. Forest Service on whose lands the lift is located, and the Riblet Co., which manufactured the tram, conducted an inspecting last week. The lift more than met all specifications prescribed by the Safety Code of American Standards for Aerial Passenger Tramways. The lift is now in readiness for operations when Sun Valley opens its 1965-1966 season on Dec. 18. ...E. F. Seagle, chief engineer at Sun Valley, under whose supervision the new two-section ski lift was built by contractor Mike Irie, said the lower section of the lift will cover more than 3,100 vertical feet. ...The upper section of the lift, starting at what has been named the Plaza, will carry skiers to the top in a 3,850-foot climb. The vertical rise on this lift is the highest in the United States, 2,241 feet. ...Seagle said the 250 horse-power motor for the lift from the Plaza to the Warming Hut is 1,200 on top is the largest ever installed on a ski lift. Well-to-Do Alcoholic Is Big Problem

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI)—The increasing rate of alcoholism can be attributed to "social alienation" caused by modern urban living, reports a University of California law professor. Dr. Bernard Diamond, chairman and professor of law on the U.C.'s Berkeley campus, noted that in cities many people have no significant role to fill or nothing to give them a sense of accomplishment. "They go to work and perform duties for the sole purpose of providing the basic needs of life. But the work is meaningless to them. It gives them no sense of belonging, no feeling of significance," he said. Diamond said the response to this is anxiety, depression and tension which the individual may attempt to blunt by using alcohol. He also noted that the majority of patients in special

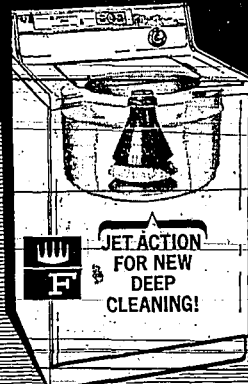

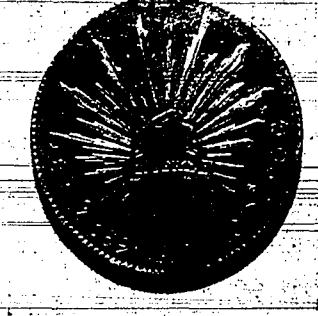

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Four Dudes Turn Back Clock in Old Tombstone

TOMBSTONE, Ariz. (UPI)—The shades of Wyatt (Elli) and other storied gunfighters of the Old Wild West still stalk the street of Tombstone. "The town too tough to die."

It was 7 miles southeast of thriving 20th-century Tucson on U.S. 89, the townpeople, aided by four dudes from back East, have succeeded in turning back the clock in this landmark of bloody Western history.

The four entrepreneurs—mine-huffers and art enthusiasts, impressed by the still-authentic appearance of the town, formed the Historic Tombstone Adventure and acquired and restored such landmarks as the Crystal Palace Saloon, Schumacher Hall and the O. K. Corral where three men died in 3 seconds in one of the West's most famous gunfights.

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Diplomatic Conflict Over Viet Nam Far Broader Than Military Struggle

By JOHN M. HIGHTOWER

WASHINGTON—The diplomatic conflict arising out of the war in Viet Nam ranges over a far broader front than the military struggle.

It extends from Peking to Washington and from Moscow to Southeast Asia, where the important capital in the world involved. It widens the split that already exists between the Communist bloc and the free world, and feeds global fear of nuclear war.

China has used the conflict to try to wrest Communist leadership away from the Soviet Union, especially in Asia and Africa. Soviet leaders have been seized on North Viet Nam's need for arms as an effort to gain more grip on the Communist leaders in Hanoi.

The United States, supported by many in the West, is opposed by France, which is fighting in Viet Nam not only for Communist but also for the United States, showing that "wars of liberation" do not pay.

The chain reaction has become endless: The East-West dispute, the split within the Western and Communist blocs, the divisions between the big powers and the newer and weaker countries are all a part of a pattern of conflict and—sometimes—contradictory interests in a sharpened struggle for power and position.

Western governments here agree that if the Vietnam war could be ended, it would create a pattern of conflict and—sometimes—contradictory interests in a sharpened struggle for power and position.

Yet the war goes on—and Johnson administration leaders expect it will go on for months. The parallel is clear: Viet Nam. Both Soviet and American officials here say, for example, that the Vietnamese crisis is not the major block to progress between the two big nuclear powers on disarmament.

Militarily, the Vietnamese war is a small war, mainly involving only the United States and the two Viet Nams. But U.S. Soviet relations and the Vietnamese war may well be the true reason why Kremlin leaders reject a settlement of Viet Nam. The war was also a major factor in the exchange of visits between the United States and the Soviet Union.

Probably the major contribution of peace in Viet Nam would be to bring a change in atmosphere and ease some of the tensions between the United States and the Soviet Union.

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

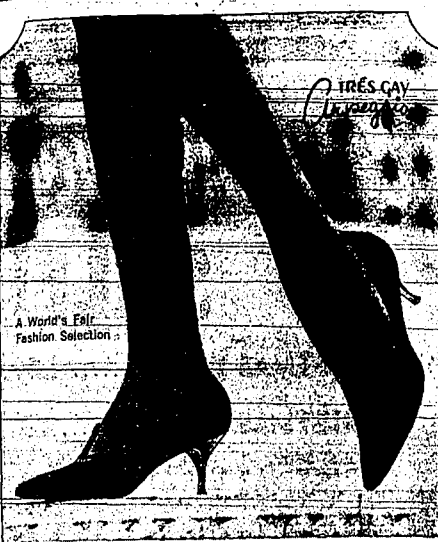

SAFEWAY
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PICK-A-CHUCK PLANT: This curious house plant has the habit of producing a baby plantlet on its own leaves, thus producing new plants without benefit of cross-pollination.

It's one of the very few plants we have which produces new plants on top of the growing leaves, instead of by runners. Known botanically as *Tillandsia menteniana*, this item does best in a north-windward where it gets plenty of light but no direct sun. Soil likes to be kept moist at all times, will tolerate almost any room temperature and it grows in a fairly rich humusy soil. You can start new plants by severing the tiny plantlet from the top of the leaves and potting them in four-inch clay pots of loam and one-third peat mixture. More plantlets will be borne on top of mature leaves.

TAPE-EM-BACKSANTHE-MUMS: Many gardeners told us that certain varieties of their chrysanthemums had a tendency to wilt and droop. The cause was blackening of the leaves. First the leaves started to blacken at the base, then the condition continued up the stem until all the leaves were affected.

This condition is known as fall nematode disease, and is the work of a tiny, cell-like pest that swims from leaf to leaf by means of spider mites.

CONTROL SUGGESTIONS: Cut the stems back close to the ground and burn them. Leaves and stems harbor this pest. Next spring you can take up cuttings rather than divide the plant, plant in a new location, also, resort to varieties which are more or less resistant to nematode attack.

Sometimes you find a variety that's extremely sensitive or susceptible and avoid them. A spray of parathion will control nematodes, but we do not advocate its use for home gardeners as it is too toxic and dangerous.

SPRAYERS: Do you have to dust or spray each type of pesticide you use in the fruit, vegetable or flower garden? The answer is no. One spray and one dust is enough to take care of all of your pesticide materials.

Never use a spray which kills the weeds in it because it's almost impossible to rinse all the spray residue from the weeds.

SPRAYER FOR WEEDS: and paint "weedkiller" on the outside. As for sprays, dusts and liquids, they will keep for another year or so without losing their effectiveness. Keep them in air-tight containers in a dry place. If moisture gets to dusts they lose their effectiveness.

STARTING MAGNOLIA: Did you know you can start a new magnolia plant just by sticking the cutting in a moist jar and covering it with a glass?

Several readers have written to tell me they've done this and they're now wondering what to do with the cuttings during winter. Leave the jars over the cutting and when spring rolls around remove them from the "greenhouse" and transplant the cutting to a permanent spot.

Of course, it's too late to try and do a cutting now but you can start new plants next spring this way. You can also start new magnolias from seed sowed now. Remove the pulp material and sow the seed in pots of sand and peat, store in a cold frame all winter. Then when spring comes the seed will be ready to germinate.

WESTERN AND-WALL-NUTS: One reader was given six chestnuts from our native American trees which have escaped the blight. They have been planted with the resulting trees being immune. The answer is no. They may now be over escape the blight for years, but sooner or later most of the nut trees which have escaped the dreaded blight will succumb to the disease. However, it's a good idea to keep on planting nuts from trees which have escaped the blight because someday we might produce a blight resistant chestnut.

Plant propagators are making crosses now and hope to come up with a blight resistant native chestnut. Keep them from drying out. In fact, pot them up and place them in a cold frame for the winter. Next spring they'll be ready to sprout. It's not necessary to remove the shrub before planting, but you should take them out of the bars. I get

Elk, Deer Kill Figures for Idaho Show Drop, Good Weather Blamed

Idaho-Fish Game Department BOISE—Shoreline weather that lingered in the hills of Idaho through October and on into November, this year, is being held as a key factor behind the downward trend now showing up in the statewide elk and deer kill figures.

Elk figures are down 14 per cent under the statewide average for all units. On the other hand, report cards received for the season through Nov. 20 show that hunters scored more than 10 per cent better in some deer units than last year.

Mid-season comparisons from year to year are risky at best because of different opening dates for the hunts. For example, a big block of units in south-central Idaho opened Oct. 2 this year and Sept. 25 last year.

The overall trends now showing up likely will remain when the calculating harvest figures are put together for the entire year — both deer and elk kills down from last year's 87,000 deer and 116,000 elk.

Exact percentages are not attempted at this stage of evaluating hunter success or the lack of it during the 1955 big game season. One reason is that hunter report cards must be collected with results from the end of the season to determine final harvest figures.

The questionnaire will be sent out in January, as usual, to a sampling of five per cent of all persons who bought Idaho hunting licenses in 1965 and the number of returned hunter report cards is expected to triple by that time.

The hunter report cards are important to game management in other ways, too. Beyond their use in estimating the number of hunters, they give detailed information about all the management units that are open at the time of the hunt. They also show how they change as seasons progress and some herds migrate as hunting pressure shifts, how sex-ratio of animals taken changes from early to late part of the season.

Now that most elk and deer hunting is over for the year, residents and nonresidents alike are expected to fill out and return their report cards promptly whether they bagged big game or not.

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Physicist Theorizes Moon's Surface May Have Diamonds

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP)—The first man to land on the moon may find the film of the Crown Diamond, a 100-carat meteorite crater in Arizona, contains small-mess-diamonds. These were created by the tremendous heat and pressure generated by the shock wave of the meteorite as it plunged into the earth's surface, he claims.

As the moon is dotted with hundreds of such craters there is every likelihood diamonds will be found on its surface. Tolansky, professor of physics at London University,

Tolansky says laboratory experiments have proved the shock wave which follows an explosion can turn carbon into artificial diamonds. This is achieved through the simultaneous combination of high pressure and temperature, he says.
