

Interest Raise Is Backed

WASHINGTON (AP)—William McChesney Martin Jr., chairman of the Federal Reserve Board, said today his interest-raising policy will help the U.S. economy and any delay would probably have required stronger measures. Martin also told the Senate Economic Committee that his independent agency had recommended a 1/2 percent rate increase continuously in 1965.

There has been a continuing exchange of views between the Federal Reserve and Administration officials in the past few days, but Martin said the board's action, taken by a 5-4 vote, is based on the rate that determines the cost of borrowing money. It was endorsed by President Johnson and others and there was special criticism of the Federal Reserve Board's action.

Astronauts Hurl Toward New Endurance Records, Anticipate Rendezvous

SPACE CENTER, Houston, Tex. (AP)—The Gemini 7 astronauts, still vigorous and mentally alert in the ninth day of the marathon space voyage, hurried on toward new endurance records today and looked forward eagerly to a Wednesday rendezvous with Gemini 6. Frank Borman and James Lovell have shown no evidence of weariness despite the long, grinding exposure to their strange world of space. Dr. D. Owen Coons, a flight surgeon said today: "They woke up sharp," he said, "responding quickly to ground commands, and make no error in copying information relayed to them from earth stations. They know what they had to do, and they are going to do it. We expect them to be as good as the best."

Gemini 7 entered its 133rd orbit at 10 a.m. (EST). Borman, an Air Force lieutenant colonel, and Lovell, a Navy commander, woke up this morning after a period of light sleep. Arson, Bert denied bail and postponed a hearing until Jan. 6 pending a grand jury investigation.

Thompson said Lassiter admitted setting the fire because he was beaten in a fight with another man. Lassiter was arrested at 2026 W. Madison St., a few blocks west of Midway.

Lenny Joyce, who said he was participating in the demonstration, said it was "an indefinite fast. We don't know when we stop."

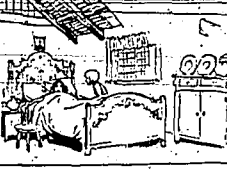
He said 15 to 20 students, all Catholics, were taking part in the fast and that they represent the entire group.

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Real Penalty

Increasingly, there is criticism that court decisions too often don't fit the crime. Jurists are criticized for sentences that amount to little more than a tap on the wrist and an admonition to behave. There's a good deal of criticism at 50 years and a life in prison. On the other side of the coin, some judges make every effort to be certain their courts are known for toughness, for extreme sentences. Neither course is right, there can be no better guide to justice than to let the penalty fit the crime.

Speaking Justice of the Peace Ben McNiff imposed such a sentence the other day on Wilburn A. Kay who pleaded guilty of malicious destruction of property, namely, shooting a hunting dog. Kay shot a vengeful dog that had mistaken the dog for a deer. The judge ordered Kay to pay \$500 within one year, turn over his rifle to authorities and never hunt "for the rest of your life."

Some people would contend the sentence is unnecessarily rough. They would have the hunter reimburse the dog owner for his animal and feel justice had been done. But others, including a good number of hunters, would argue that the judge's sentence was completely justified.

Justice of the Peace McNiff made a ruling that is the best interests of everyone, including the man who was sentenced. For action, action was taken to avert a possible tragedy. More judges should make an effort to revoke hunting privileges of those who shouldn't carry firearms or are criminally careless with them. Hunting offers considerable recreation and enjoyment, but fire arms are dangerous, they definitely aren't toys.

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Klansman's Death May Be Suicide

GRANTIE QUARRY, N.C. (AP) — The Rowan County coroner said today the death of Grantie Quarry, 33, a Klansman linked with the assassination of a congressman, may have been suicide.

Mrs. (I. died of a gunshot wound in the head in his bed room Saturday night.

Quarry's wife Jean, 35, was reported to have been in the house since refusing to testify before the House Committee on Un-American Activities while investigating the Klan in North Carolina.

He said an official ruling on the cause of death will be made Tuesday, "after we get certain reports back from the State Bureau of Investigation lab in Raleigh."

"I'm pretty sure it was suicide but it won't be official until Tuesday," Honeycutt said. Donald T. Appell, chief counsel for the House Committee on Un-American Activities, identified Quarry as a Klansman and organizer for the United Klans of America.

Mrs. Quarry pleaded the Fifth Amendment when asked about Klan activities at a Committee hearing.

J. Robert Jones, North Carolina grand dragon of the Klan, said he would not confirm that he belonged to the organization. "You won't find out from me and you won't find out from my brother-in-law, who is a member of the Klan," Jones said, who also lives in Grantie Quarry.

Mrs. Quarry moved to the U.S. Air Force after 20 years as a military policeman.

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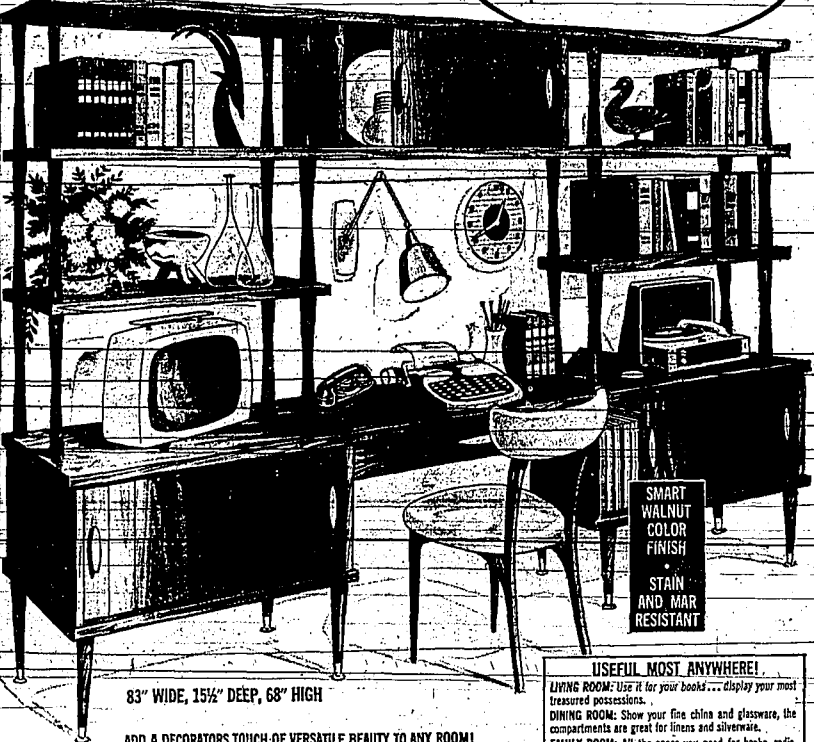

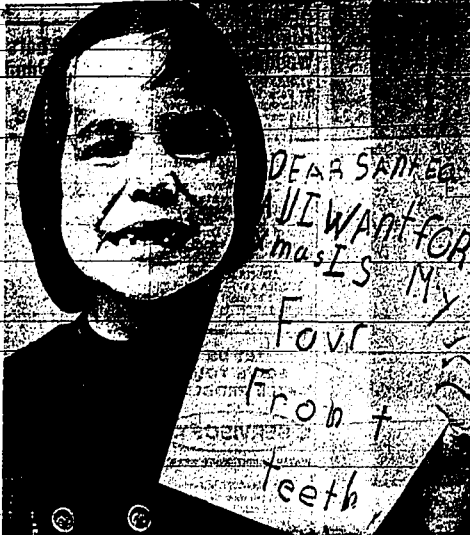

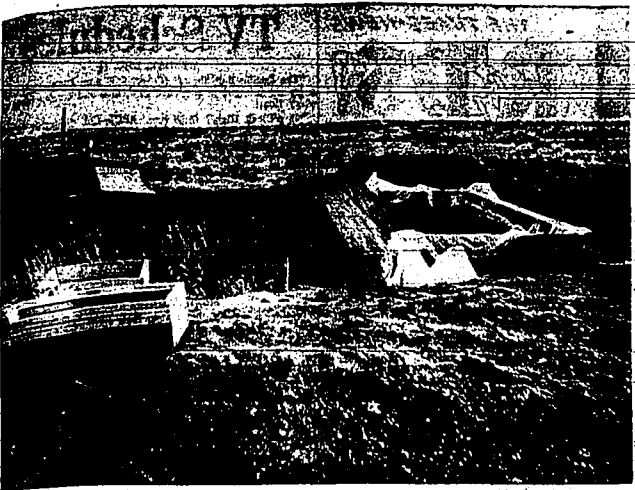

Construction Under Way on Idaho Youth Ranch Lodge

RUPERT—Construction on a 14-by-14 lodge at the Idaho Youth Ranch, with foundations and cement work contracted by Ralph Johnson, Plans for four of the lodges for the new dairy farm will be done in connection with the new unit.

The construction costs of the lodge permanent unit is estimated at \$50,000, but directors hope to cut the cost by at least half through donations. The lodge is being constructed on a cash basis, and completion day cannot be determined. This will be the third boy's unit at the ranch; the first frame house is temporary and will be replaced eventually.

Wlad Johnson, architect, used the master plan for future development at the ranch. Plans for the new unit were discussed recently by the board with the recommendations of the present board.

A letter from the state chairman of the Order of Eagles, pledging continued support of the ranch, was read. The letter also asked that a member of the Board of Directors of the Youth Ranch plan to attend the state meet in June at Lewiston of the Fraternal Order of the Eagles and give a report.

A motion was also made and carried that a member of the Order be appointed to the Youth Ranch Board. Espiration of members of various civic clubs for potential board members was discussed.

Vernon Heidenreich, a retired employee of the Soil Conservation Service for more than 20 years, met with the boys at the ranch. He discussed the necessity of conservation and offered his services to the ranch.

An application for house parents was read and the board agreed to make application forms available at the Youth Ranch office.

John McCullum, boy's director at the ranch, reported the Camp Fire girls had presented the ranch with a new power generator unit which was greatly appreciated and would be installed with a gas driven motor. He said when the electricity was out at the ranch, the work on boys at the ranch is paralyzed.

He reported that Dr. H. O. Toews, a local dentist, agreed to keep up the maintenance work on boys at the ranch if the judicial dental work was completed. DeWan Clark, a local barber, has been furnishing his services at the ranch for some time and both the professional services asked for a room at the ranch where their services could be rendered more conveniently. Both services reported they would temporarily furnish the offices.

The board asked McCullum to work with the architect and discuss the possibility of installing the necessary rooms in the basement of the new unit, if possible. Construction of a unit for professional services.

McCullum reported 21 boys are presently living at the ranch, with two applications pending. The state licensing of the ranch was pending following the fire inspection due to the type of doors now installed in the units at the ranch.

In other business it was announced that additional space had been acquired for the Youth Ranch office in town on Fifth Street.

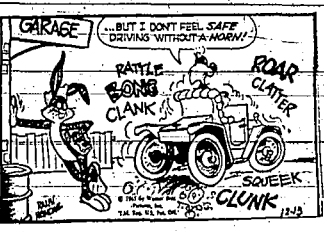
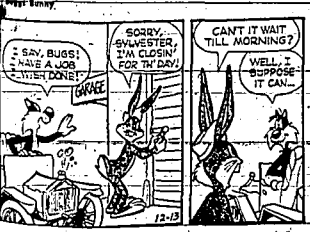
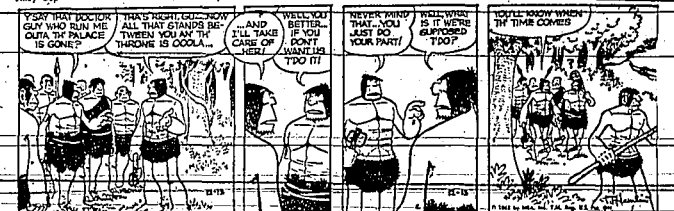

Temple Is Named Manager Of Rupert Irrigation Unit

RUPERT—Virgil D. Temple, pumping plant maintenance superintendent of the Bureau of Reclamation for the Northside project the past four year, has been named manager for the A and B Irrigation District, effective March 1.

The announcement was made by Fred P. Kasworm, president of the board of directors of the A and B district, who added that operation and maintenance of the North Side Pumping division of the Mindoka Project, will be transferred over to the A and B Irrigation from the Bureau of Reclamation, also on March 1.

The Irrigation district was formed in 1959, after the completion of all statutory proceedings for organizing an irrigation district in Idaho. The formation of the district was contingent on the authorization of the reclamation project, was provided for in the interim contracts signed by settlers and landowners and approved by settlers in an election. It is the second of only two in Minnoka County.

This district includes the entire 76,802 acres of irrigable land of both units, A and B of the Mindoka Project pumping division, and this is the reason for the name "A and B Irrigation District."

The North Side Pumping Division of the Mindoka Project is unusual in two respects: Kasworm said, because every gallon of water used for irrigation has to first pass through either deep wells, relict ponds, or the Snake River and it is the largest homestead project in the United States.

The project was authorized as a federal reclamation project by congress in 1950. Construction started soon after that and proceeded in blocks over the next 12-year period with the first block coming under irrigation during the 1962 irrigation season.

The North Side Project is the home of more than 600 farm families.

The project irrigation system was built by the Bureau of Reclamation and has been operated by them from 1954.

The irrigation district is a political subdivision of the state of Idaho and is governed by a five-member board of directors representing five district director divisions, some of which were members of the Homesteaders' Committee which was the forerunner of the board and the major collective body in charge of the district's water users during the earlier years of settlement and development, who are landowners and residents of the district, include: Harold P. Ingram, Edward E. Smith, and Richmond A. Burke. Herb Van Slyke is the district secretary-treasurer.

The district opened its office in Rupert Aug. 1, 1961, in the old original bureau office quarters, and moved to its present location at 11th and E Streets in February, 1962.

The North Side Pumping Division was one of the first major Bureau of Reclamation projects to use deep wells as a primary source of irrigation water, Kasworm noted.

Temple joined the Bureau in 1959 as plant manager and was soon advanced to a turbine-pump-mechanic, foreman position, he said Sunday.

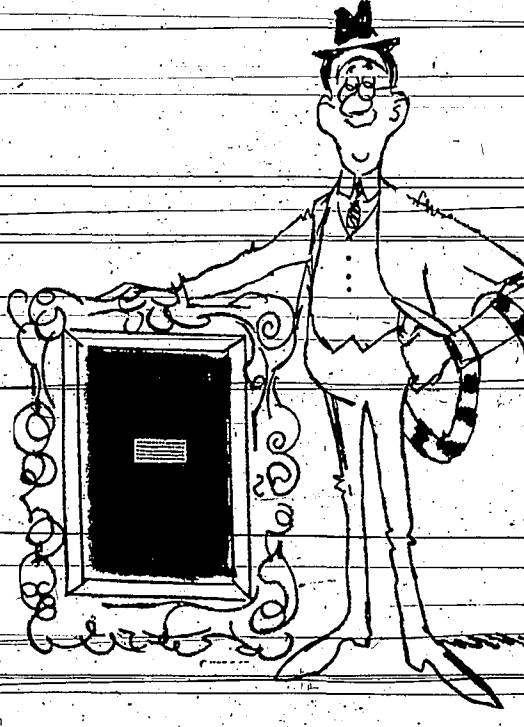

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
