Thorium Deposits in Lemhi Draw Interest

SALMON—Lemhi County's largest known thorium deposit in Idaho with the remains of a developing thorium mine in Montana.

Since the area first came to the attention of prospectors looking for uranium in 1954, an estimated thousand claims have been staked.

Kane said that two years ago very little was heard about thorium but today many publications are discussing the metal and its potential as a success-ful uranium.

Companies which have been formed to prospect and develop claims in the area include the Lemhi Pass Corp. of which Kane is president. It has 186 claims plus two school sections leased. Sampling work was undertaken this fall preliminary to making a complete report on the area.

Another is Nitberg Fuels and Rare Metals, Inc. headed by D. B. Lewis, Los Angeles, which has 400 claims. Kane said the firm has done more work in the area than anyone else and has spent in excess of one million dollars in Lemhi County the past 10 years in developing thorium.

At least two men have been on the firm's payroll here all the time with more at other times.

Kane said Rare Metals has had considerable equipment working and has stockpiled several hundred tons of high grade ore in Idaho and Montana. Some of the stockpiled ore has been shipped to Murray, Utah for processing into fertilizer.

Long Bangs Get Girl Expelled

IRVING, Tex. (AP)—A donnybrook over the appropriate length for a teen-age girl's tresses Monday was building toward a showdown in Irving's MacArthur High School.

The tresses in question belong to 15-year-old Vicki Norman, a high school senior who figures she is the only girl ever booted out of school because she refused to trim her bangs.

Vicki was suspended for three days beginning last Friday. "That was one very costly haircut," she said.

Principal Arthur Casey said he had no alternative but suspension. "I bent over backward, but Vicki's mother wouldn't have it any other way," he said.

"The principal told me that either the bangs or Vicki had to go," her mother, Mrs. Nell Norman, said.

Trouble began developing last week when Casey called a half dozen young girls in to "suggest" that they trim their bangs above eyebrow level.

"The teachers said they couldn't see the kids' eyes," Casey said.

Mrs. Norman agreed that her daughter's forelocks were longer than ordinarily seen on the street. "They hang down to her eyelashes," she said.

According to the principal, the other girls complied with his suggestion, and there was no problem.

"But Vicki refused to go along," Casey said. "Then her mother came to my office on Friday and told me either to suspend the girl or forget the whole idea."

Thorium Deposits in Lemhi Draw Interest

SALMON—Lemhi County's interest in Idaho has been centered in the thorium deposits described as the largest known on the North American Continent, is attracting an increasing amount of interest.

Two Atomic Energy Commission geologists spent the summer here with the primary object to find out the quality, quantity and location of all the thorium in the Lemhi pass area.

No report on the findings has been made public but several large firms have shown interest in developing the area.

Charles Kane, chairman of the Lemhi County Commission, said that activities in the area appear to be leading up to developments on a larger scale.

To date, one small mill has been established to refine the ore here and some thorite ore has been shipped to Utah for use in making fertilizer.

Kane said that an established market still is lacking, but he pointed out that the thorium deposits have not been developed.

He said that interest both of the government and private firms is not only for the thorium but for the other rare metals the deposits contain.

The commission chairman said a tremendous amount of money has been put into the area to try to develop the thorium deposits.

Kane said the main body of ore is perhaps 20 miles long with most of the veins running north-south and northwest. The area is in Idaho and Montana in the Lemhi Pass Area. The deposits are approximately 75 per-

cent in developing thorium. At least two men have been on the firm's payroll here all the time with more at other times.

Kane said Rare Metals has had considerable equipment working and has stockpiled several hundred tons of high grade ore in Idaho and Montana. Some of the stockpiled ore has been shipped to Murray, Utah, for processing into fertilizer.

Harry Katesman of Blackfoot and Harvey Bell of Teton HIO-2 Corp., headed by Carroll Wells, Salmon, Wells leased 100 acres in the area to Dow Chemical Corp., which has representatives here the past summer prospecting and developing the claims.

Britain to Get First Pay Television

LONDON (AP) — Britain's first pay-television system, will begin operation Jan. 7 showing many feature films and sports events such as a professional wrestling program from Chicago.

"An evening with the Royal Ballet" starring Margot Fonteyn and Rudolf Nureyev, also is scheduled.

Pay-television will cover 10 miles in the London boroughs of Westminster and Southwark with 2,000 to 3,000 subscribers. By late summer, Pay-TV, Ltd., hopes to have 10,000. Its chairman, Lord Brasenourne, said there is a sound basis for a pay-television system in Britain since it has the biggest television relay system by wire outside the Soviet Union.

More than 100,000 homes in London are connected to television relay services and wires carrying the programs run near 500,000 homes. In the country as a whole more than a million homes receive television by relay services.

Subscribers will have a small gray box into which they will insert two-shilling coins — 25 cents. A feature film will cost six shillings.

"We will be very happy if the average subscriber spends

about \$1.40 a week," said Lord Brasenourne. "We shall be putting out 50 hours of programs a week but we expect our subscribers to be selective viewers."

Each feature film will be shown at four different times in a two-week period.

STUDENT FOUND
MOSCOW, Idaho (AP)—Kenneth Culverson, 24, a University of Idaho student from Hills City, Mont., was found safe and unharmed Monday after being missing at a remote area 40 miles east of here.

Culverson was reported missing Sunday when he failed to show up for two companions with whom he was hunting.

Temperatures in the Meadow Ridge area of the mountain drainage where Culverson was missing dropped well below freezing Sunday night. There was a skill of snow on the ground when Latah County Sheriff's officers and 20 members of a search and rescue started looking for the missing student. The search was aided by 14 students from the university's Naval ROTC unit.

PRIORITY QUESTIONED
ST. MARIES (AP)—Sen. C. Chase, D-Beneath, said Monday he would question the priority of Idaho corporations in the official soliciting funds from other corporations to support the sales tax campaign.

Chase said he had in his possession a letter signed by William D. Chapman, an official of Boise Cascade Corp., addressed to another corporation asking the latter to donate a specific amount to the sales tax fund.

Chase said he was informed in letters written to two firms "telling them exactly how much money to send in to build up a credit which the firm is to keep the sales tax in."

The sales tax law enacted by the 1961 legislature was subjected to a referendum by voters in the 1964 general election.

Probable Campsite of Chief Joseph Found Near Leadore
SALMON—What is believed to be a campsite of Chief Joseph, the Nez Perce Indian leader, has been located near Leadore, Orlo Johnson, Leaders' District 4, announced today.

Chief Joseph and his party on Aug. 13 passed through Leadore, then called Junction, to the campsite near Leadore. The pits were built of stones placed in a circle about a pig dug out to the ground.

Johnson said the construction appeared to be a breastworks fortification and was in an area where the Indians still had a route to escape behind them and at that time there probably were only a half dozen or so trees to obstruct their view into the valley. A stream runs nearby.

"Young trees have since filled in the area and logging and cattle use has disturbed the location, Johnson said.

Johnson said he has been looking for the campsite for three years and from information supplied by old timers located the area last spring.

The area contains some 30 individual pits ringed by stones. Johnson said the pits undoubtedly were built during the flight when they are today, having filled in after nearly 90 years. The pits covered a three-acre area.

Johnson said he proposed to have a rustic fence placed to enclose the present campsite and a stream.

Britain and Ireland Agree On Trade Pact
LONDON (AP)—Britain and Ireland reached agreement in principle early today on a free trade pact, British sources reported. The signing would be a landmark in three bitter centuries of Irish-British history.

The sources said the agreement was reached after midnight by Prime Minister Sean Lemass and British Prime Minister Harold Wilson. It came after a year of undersecretary negotiations from which few details have emerged.

The main lines of the pact are: "The agreement represents both achievement and political hazard."

Lemass was a messenger boy in the 1916 uprising that led eventually to the republic's independence. The extremist critic once said that free trade represents a "surrender to the old English enemy."

Lemass' slogan: "hanged to be the British statesman who finally solved the 'Irish question'—a history of feuding and fighting that dates from the 17th century.

Slums Blamed For Northern Negro Woes

CHICAGO (AP) — The Northern Negro's problem is a social and economic one and will not be solved until slums are eliminated, a civil rights leader says.

"The problem in the urban North is not a civil rights problem at all," the Rev. James Bevel said in an interview. "It is a socio-economic problem. And if you try to deal with it as a civil rights problem, you'd be making a terrible mistake."

The Rev. Mr. Bevel, 29, said the Southern Christian Leadership Council has established a pilot project in Chicago aimed at eliminating slums.

"We could solve the problem if the country ever decided to get rid of the slums in a mass movement. We have to overcome the ghetto pathology," he said.

"In the South, the problem is political," he added. "In the North, it is economic. Northern Negroes, for the most part, have their civil rights."

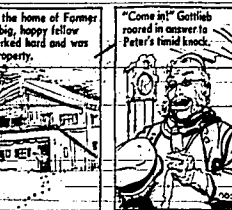
The Rev. Mr. Bevel, a Baptist minister, said that if slums were replaced with good housing, it would mean higher morale for Negroes and a more settled and stable community. He said isolated disorders were less likely to erupt in an orderly, community-conscious neighborhood.

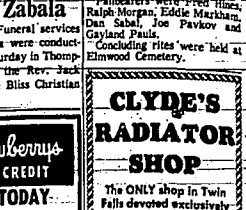

Tax Board Member Shot By Taxpayer

WATERBURY, Conn. (UPI) — Armed with shotguns, police today guarded the homes of two members of Waterbury's tax review board after the third member of the board was shot and critically wounded by an irate taxpayer.

In grave condition at St. Mary's Hospital was board member George Macary, 55, who was shot in the lower back late Monday afternoon by a bespectacled gunman as he stood in the doorway of his home.

Police believe the gunman was a taxpayer angered over his recent property revaluation in Waterbury. The tax review board has been swamped with some 6,700 appeals involving 10,000 pieces of reappraised property.

Surgeons removed a slug which punctured Macary's liver. Before he opened fire, the thin gunman was quoted as saying, "he was going to get Macary" and the other two guys on the board of tax review."

While Police Superintendent Joseph Guilleme presented an all-out search for Macary's assailant, police stood guard at the homes of other officials involved in the tax crisis, including Henry Chestone and John Martell, the other two members of the tax review board. A guard also was posted at the hospital to protect Macary.

Property owners contended the new revaluation, set by the N. Yoh Co. of Philadelphia, was too high and was inequitable.

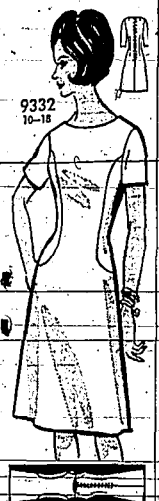

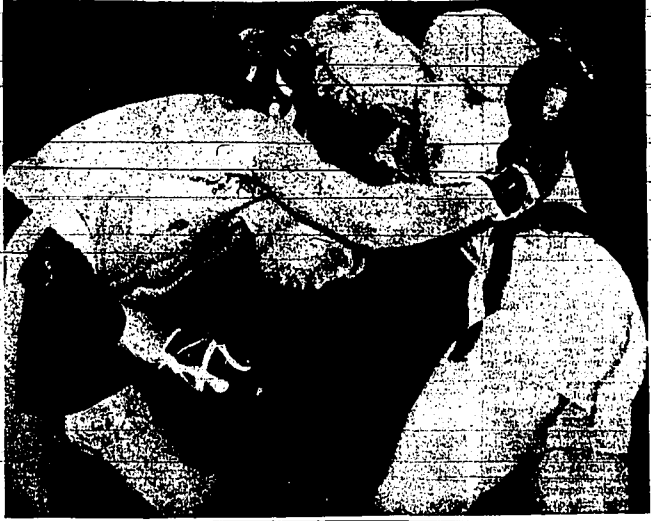

The Blue Devils rode the tide of two smashing victories over UCLA last weekend to surge from fourth to the top with eight first-place votes and 277 points.

St. Joseph's Hawks drew the most first-place ballots from the 35 coaches of the UPI rating board — 11 — but their point total was 274. The Hawks have trounced Hofstra, Fairfield, Belknap and Bowling Green in their first four games. UCLA, the National Collegiate Athletic Association champion for the past two seasons, tumbled from the lead to eighth place after being crushed by Duke 82-65 on Friday at Durham, N.C., and 94-75 on Saturday at Charlotte, N.C.

Brigham Young remained the No. 9 team and Wichita, unranked previously this season, was one point behind the Cougars in 10th place.

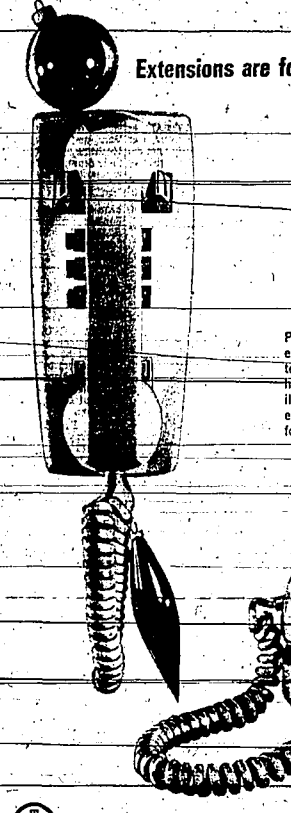

Rickey Eulogized as Man Who Made Baseball National Sport

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Branch Rickey, one of baseball's dominant figures for a half century, was eulogized Monday at his funeral as the man who made baseball truly a national sport by opening it to players of all colors and creeds.

In the crowd of almost 500 persons in Grace Methodist Church was Jackie Robinson, the first Negro to play in the major leagues. Rickey brought him up to the old Brooklyn Dodgers when Rickey was general manager of that team in 1947.

Rickey died last Thursday at the age of 83 in Columbia, Mo. He suffered a heart attack Nov. 13 in Columbia while accepting membership in the Missouri Sports Hall of Fame.

The body was taken to Lucasville, Ohio, near Portsmouth, for burial in the Rickey family plot Tuesday.

Dr. Ralph Sockman, retired pastor of Christ Church Methodist in New York and an old friend of Rickey's, gave the eulogy.

"Branch Rickey was a man of vision who became a pioneer and made trails that other men could follow," Dr. Sockman said. "His life has become an American saga. He is one we shall never forget."

"He had an eye to the future and it never faltered. He was able to see the undeveloped potential of baseball. He helped right the wrongs of a whole sport by opening the game to all colors and races. He made baseball more worthy of being called a national sport."

Red Regime Seeks Marts And Supplies

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Czechoslovakia's Communist regime is scouting Western Europe in search of new markets and supplies as it enters a new era of "flexibility" and economic decentralization.

The Prague government also is seeking to stem a wave of panic buying touched off by rumors that under the economic reform plan prices of such basic foods as sugar, flour and potatoes are earmarked for sharp increases and that the currency will be devalued.

Called the "New Economic Model," the scheme has been propagated for two years by the Communist party as a long-overdue remedy for faulty planning, lack of consumer goods, and poor quality of export products which even the Soviet Union and other European Communist countries have refused to buy.

The plan virtually abolished two traditional pillars of Communist ideology — rigid government control over the economic process from top to bottom, and government-subsidized prices in certain key sectors.

Many Communist officials have long opposed these methods as unrealistic leftovers from Stalinist times. Many others are reluctant to see them disappear.

Like neighboring East Germany and Hungary, the Czechoslovak regime has decided to pay attention to quality rather than emphasize quantitative output as the yardstick of economic development.

But, as the January deadline for the reforms draws near, the Czechs are making their plans better known.

The reform scheme, to be launched parallel to a new five-year economic development plan, calls for rapid expansion of foreign trade with the West, to now comprise only 15 percent of the annual total.

15 Men Will Climb Peak on New Year's

JACKSON, Wyo. (UPI) — Most New Year celebrants in the United States will welcome in 1966 around a warm fireplace or at a party, but about 15 men from throughout the nation plan to spend New Year's Eve in a snowstorm atop 13,766-foot high Grand Teton peak.

The group will be headed by Director Paul Petzholdt of the National Outdoors Leadership school at Lander, Wyo., first to arrive at the mountain. All will be graduates of the school.

Petzholdt said Monday, Grand Teton National Park officials had granted permission for the climb.

"Standards for such a climb are very high," Petzholdt said. "Peak officials are reluctant to let anyone go into the mountains in the wintertime."

But he said the climb is "not a tremendously dangerous undertaking if you know what you are doing, although it would be for those less experienced."

He said no agency had rescue facilities capable of rescuing a 15-man group such as will make the climb.

"We are set up to handle our own rescues," Petzholdt said.

Petzholdt led the first winter climb up the Grand Teton Peak in December, 1956. He said a group of climbers from Lander made it up in the spring of 1963, when snow depth also was at its maximum.

Asked whether the group would hold a New Year's celebration atop the peak similar to those held on Colorado's Pikes Peak, Petzholdt said he doubted it.

"You don't fool around up there," he said. "We might be able to hold some observance in the daytime, but it would be too dangerous at night."

He said the 15-man party would be the largest group to make the hazardous winter climb.
