

County Zoning Ordinance Faces More Revisions

"We don't feel any overwhelming county-wide disapproval of the revised Twin Falls County Zoning Ordinance has been shown," said County Commissioners Morris Carlson and Maurice Klaus following a public hearing Tuesday night on the ordinance. A large group of interested county residents attended the two-hour hearing in the county courthouse and opinions, both favorable and unfavorable, were submitted to the commissioners and zoning board for consideration. Klaus and Carlson agreed further changes may be made in the revised ordinance before it is adopted, adding testimony taken Tuesday night will be considered when making the changes.

They said they did not know how soon the ordinance would come into effect, and that the zoning commission, Herb Loughmiller, who was unable to attend the hearing, would have to wait the recorded testimony before any action could be taken.

The two commissioners said they felt some good, constructive criticism of the ordinance was brought out during the hearing—some which had not been brought to the attention of the zoning commission or the county-commissioners previously.

The first ordinance was submitted to the public for approval early this year and after extensive hearings it was revised. See ZONING, Page 2, Col. 4.

T.F. County Coroner Claude Wiley Dies

Claude F. Wiley, 66, 490 Filer Ave., Twin Falls County coroner and a veteran of law enforcement in this area, died at his home at 1:50 a.m. Wednesday of a short illness. He was born Dec. 7, 1899, at Hannibal, Mo., and attended schools in Kansas. He came to Twin Falls in 1913 from Missouri and served in World War I as a first sergeant in France. During the war he saw action and was wounded. He first joined the Twin Falls police force on May 1, 1933, where he remained for 10 months. He worked for a time as shop foreman at Union Motors and Barnard Auto in Twin Falls and then joined the Navy as a boatman's mate and served in the short patrol and in the mines in the Navy's 12th District Naval headquarters in San Francisco.

He was Jerome police chief in 1941 and joined the Twin Falls police force again in 1945. He was a chief deputy sheriff and chief of detectives on the police force until retirement Jan. 1, 1964.

He was elected Twin Falls County coroner in 1958 and served in this capacity until his death.

He was a member of the Methodist Church, Twin Falls, a member of BPOE Lodge No. 1494 and Twin Falls Legion and Disabled American Veterans.

He married Isabelle Dobbs besides his widow, he is survived by his mother, Mrs. Wiley, and three grandchildren, Mrs. Freda Funkhouser, Mrs. John Wiley, in 1962.

Funeral services will be conducted at 2:30 p.m. Saturday in Sunset Memorial Park.

Cremation will be made to the Elks Rehabilitation Center, Boise.

Some of the money will go to the industrial development Bank of India to refinance loans given by other banks for industrial development.

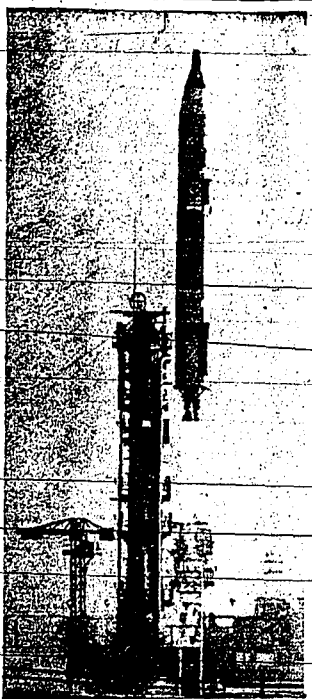

Isolated Electric Systems Wouldn't End Widescale Power Failures

WASHINGTON (AP)—The chairman of the Federal Power Commission, Joseph C. Swidler, said today that isolating electric systems would not end widespread power failures such as the big blackouts in the Northeast last week.

"Isolated electric systems are unworkable in a modern industrial economy," Swidler told the House Interstate Commerce committee. The group is looking into the cause and effects of the power failures in the Northeast and other areas in other parts of the country.

Progress In Jailbreak Left in Utah

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Treasury report is making substantial progress in its campaign to ease the nation's coin shortage.

As of last Friday, there were more than one billion coins in Federal Reserve branch banks, compared with about 300 million at the corresponding date last year. Demand for coins annually reaches a peak during the Christmas shopping season.

There is still a shortage of half-dollars, but the Treasury said there have been relatively few complaints because of the increased number of quarters available.

Jerome Firm, Labor Talks Are Advised

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—A National Labor Relations Board examiner said Tuesday Idaho Electric Co. of Jerome, Ind., should be directed to bargain with the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers.

He recommended to the board that the retail appliance store be closed from refusing to bargain with the union as its representative of its employees and to stop questioning employees as to union activities and sympathies.

The unfair-labor-practices complaint was filed by Local 442 of the electrical brotherhood. It concerned efforts to organize the employees. The trial examiner advised automatically to go to the board, said Howard Myer.

Joe Hall and Bert Hartwell, co-owners of the firm located at 318 S. Lincoln St., died Tuesday night. Idaho Electric is not ready at this time to make any comment.

Satellite Launch Is Set Thursday

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—The sun-orbiting satellite is to ride into space early Thursday, after waiting in line for 24 hours behind Gemini 6 and 7.

The Pioneer 3 satellite is to be launched on the nose of a mighty Delta rocket between 1:05 a.m. and 3:31 a.m. (EST).

Gemini 6, 7 Astronauts Conduct World's First Rendezvous in Space

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—The Gemini 6 and 7 astronauts conducted the world's first rendezvous in space today, marking a great space feat and one of mankind's greatest adventures. The successful flight formation of the two craft, slightly more than 100 feet apart, pushed the United States past a major milestone on the road to the moon.

Word of the spine-tingling feat came in a calm voice from astronaut Walter Schirra aboard Gemini 6.

"We're at 120 feet and sitting," he reported.

The historic moment took place about 185 miles above the Philippine Islands as the two astronauts aboard each twin spacecraft circled the earth nose to nose at more than 17,500 miles an hour.

At the moment of Stafford's announcement, the 40-man team in the mission control center in Houston stood up, smiled and waved American flags.

With Stafford aboard Gemini 6, Schirra Jr. reported.

Manning Gemini 7 were astronauts Frank Borman and James A. Lovell, who earlier this afternoon completed the 11th of their planned 14 days in orbit.

Gemini 6 was launched from Cape Kennedy at 8:37 a.m. EST. The two spacecraft's successful pursuit that covered more than 100,000 miles over more than 3½ orbits.

The rendezvous occurred as Schirra's Gemini 6 passed under and in front of Gemini 7. Then he turned around to pass alongside nose to nose, with Schirra and Stafford flying backward.

Then he applied the brakes, slowing his speed to match that of Gemini 7.

Borman reported to the Houston station that the two spacecraft were in a "win-win" situation, the Gemini constellation, Castor and Pollux, were in the background.

The initial rendezvous started with Gemini 6 at 1212 feet apart. Later, asked what the range was, Stafford replied, "Twenty feet we did it."

They were to perform various rendezvous maneuvers for six days. Mission control later said the spacecraft were flying only 70 feet apart.

Gemini 6 initially was in orbit ranging from 100 to 160 miles. The two spacecraft were in a "win-win" situation, the Gemini constellation, Castor and Pollux, were in the background.

The escalation of the air war against the Communist North came as U.S. military spokesmen announced that U.S. troops had killed 100 North Vietnamese in the second highest weekly toll of the Vietnamese fighting.

"We want to know if the lay public has any objections which have been outlined by teachers and scholars are important for our children to know."

Tyler said a comprehensive assessment of this type has never been attempted in education.

Anderson said Tuesday, "In general, the people attending the Dallas meeting are very fine. Their concern, if any, would be on how people giving the test might be qualified or not."

They also might be concerned about the possibility of the test being used for political purposes. It was felt it should be kept strictly under control of private enterprise.

Major Red Power Plant Is Blasted in Industrial Center

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—U.S. Air Force F105 Thunderchief jets blasted a major power plant today 14 miles northeast of Hanoi, North Viet Nam's major port. It was the first American strike in the Communist foe's industrial heartland in the Red River delta.

Pilots reported that they had hit the heart of the Long Bi steam power plant and many secondary explosions followed. A U.S. spokesman said the raid knocked out the plant, which he said supplies 15 per cent of North Viet Nam's electric power.

The plant is the primary source for the Hanoi-Halong area. One plane was shot down but the pilot, Capt. Harry D. DeLoach, was rescued.

WASHINGTON—That report of the United Nations Permanent Central Narcotics Board, is typical of the U.N.'s inability, because of unwillingness to say anything naughty about Communist China, led Mao-Tse-Tung to go to a bulk. Against the U.N.'s pleas that he only know about Peking's official version of the world's biggest drug business.

At least, there is no mention of Red China in the U.N. report which says that drug handling over the world is increased all over the world. Instead, it points a finger at the 1,200 tons of illegally diverted opium grown in the Middle East and Southeast Asia.

1000 TONS A YEAR—Unfortunately, this supply is insignificant when compared to Peking's contribution. Narcotics experts here and in various European capitals estimate that in 1953, Europe imported 10,000 tons of this opium. In the form of heroin, it is being sent to the United States every year.

Even the U.N. should be aware of this smuggling, because no attempt is made to conceal it. The stuff I've seen in such quantities are being sent to Hong Kong and Red China firms as Red Lion and Crown, and the Crown Junk also carries a message to its customers.

Always look for the Crown-trademark. Customers, please beware of imitations. Yunnan, of course, is in South China.

In Red China, the narcotic racket is tightly kept under the Special Trade Bureau of the Ministry of Finance. This is the outfit that shipped sheep-heroin into Korea in 1953.

As reported here last Aug. 13, is now pouring heroin into South Viet Nam for the same purpose. The U.N. is not showing any interest in this. Independent African countries whose politicians make a fast buck by wangling deals.

HERE'S AN EXPERT—The U.N. has always claimed that it is unable to obtain authentic information about Peking narcotics. Such information, of course, is available from the U.S. Bureau of Narcotics, but if the U.N. is shy of doing business with Washington, the name of a guy it can hire to do the job.

This would be Charlie Siragusa, presently employed as director of the Illinois Crime Commission. He is a former head of the Chicago Police Department and so goes as Uncle Sam's one-man narcotics squad. Siragusa, a Narcotics Bureau agent, operated out of the Illinois Police force, consisting only of himself and two assistants. But from 1951 to 1953, the Siragusa team cut dope traffic from Europe to the U.S. by 40 per cent.

TRAPPED LUCKY LUCIANO—Siragusa achieved a major triumph when he tracked down a Sicilian junk pusher from Marseille to Beirut, some of whom he met during a wartime stint with the Bush-Hughes Office. Siragusa's monthly supply of cash—Siragusa set up a vast network of agents and contacts in Europe, and that's the finger on such notorious American hoodlums as Lucky Luciano, Frank (Three Finger) Coppola, Luis Joe Peaches, and Nick Genovese, who had expanded their dope operations abroad.

Charlie Siragusa's finest testimonial came one Christmas. Siragusa was in Rome when he was asked, "Siragusa in a block of concrete," growled Luciano. That's our boy, Charlie Siragusa, who knows more about Red Lion heroin than Mao does.

By far the largest number of students are sitting off steam or exercising their right to protest. These demonstrations have a way of catching the interest of students who have no firm convictions of their own but go along in a follow-the-leader situation.

Many collect students, including a fair representation of students at the Pocatello University, signed petitions and created something of a stir. This organization was Communist-infiltrated. By the time most of the "Future Veterans" were aware of the organization's nature, they were in uniform and engaged in combat on the various fronts. It's always wise to be sure you have no one who has been trained into a Communist-front organization with a catchy name.

His attorney, Allen Derr, said he would appeal the decision. Sentencing was set for Dec. 20 before Judge Merlin Young.

PLANNED
BOISE (AP)—The Idaho Power Co. plans further discussions with federal officials on transmission of Bonneville Power Administration power into Eastern Idaho over Idaho power company lines.

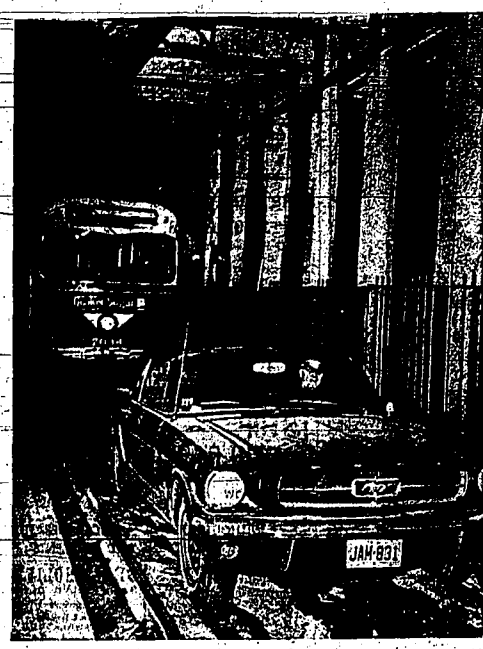

Scientists Dismantle Atom Splitter

NEW YORK (AP)—The dawn of the nuclear age slips a little further into history today with the dismantling of the cyclotron which split a uranium atom for the first time in America.

The atom smasher, designed and built 23 years ago at Columbia University, will be tossed with champagne and then crated and sent to the Smithsonian Institution in Washington.

At the institution, the smasher will join machines which were used to usher in the aviation, automobile, railroad and horse-and-buggy ages.

The cyclotron was used in January, 1939, in the experiment that split the uranium atom and recorded the release of tremendous energy for the first time in America.

Later, the same atom smasher was used to establish the first proof that the rare Uranium 235 isotope, not the other more common isotope, was the fissionable material.

Much of the work with the cyclotron was done under a cloak of rigid security imposed by government officials in charge of Manhattan Project during World War II—the development of the atomic bomb.

By establishing Uranium 235 isotopes as the fissionable material, a spokesman said, "the internal structure of the nuclei in various materials was revealed to scientists—and the basic knowledge for future nuclear research was provided."

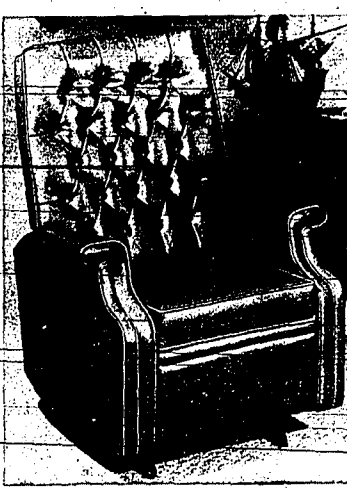

Woman Wins Damages for Parking Bill

BOSTON (AP) Theresa Fanczy, a determined housewife, won a Massachusetts state suit on a result she says she had to pay a \$200 parking bill.

Actually, she was awarded \$1 in damages for her trouble over the bill, presented to her when her car was located in a state parking garage 73 days after it had been stolen.

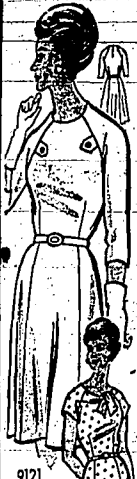

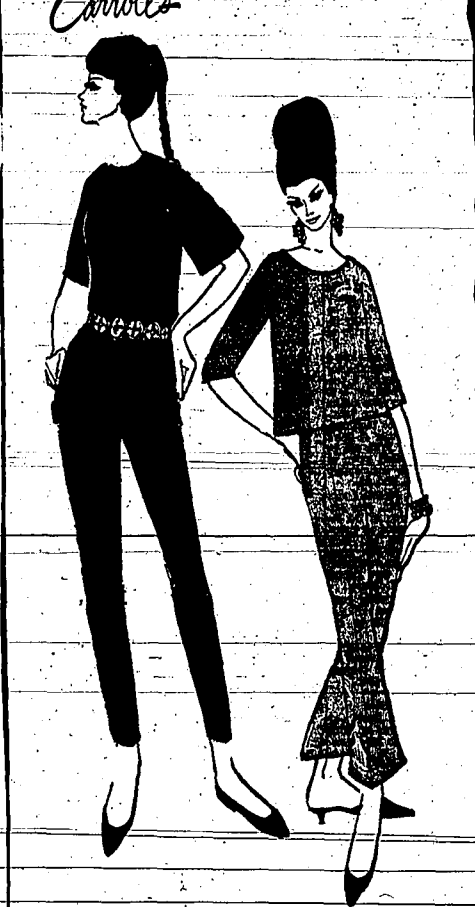

But the spirit of giving and receiving is evidently too strong for Communist leaders to abolish. But they've regulated along with almost everything else in daily life.
