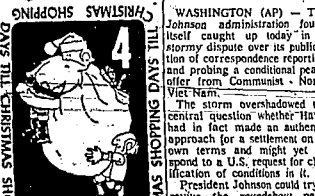

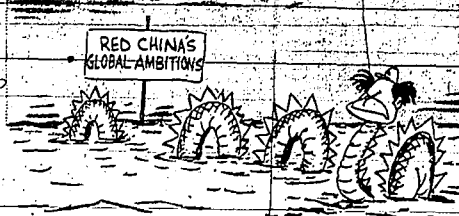

### City Leaders Disagree With Charge On Increasing Rate of Crime

NEW YORK (AP)—Leaders of some of the nation's largest cities disagreed today with a Republican charge that increasing crime rates can be traced to a surrender to criminals by big-city political machines.

A panel of top Republicans, in a report issued Sunday night in Washington, said municipal leaders "have, in effect, confessed that criminals, not the law, are in control."

The report, prepared by a 500-member committee—task force headed by Robert Taft Jr., a former Ohio congressman, said in part:

"There are sectors in most of our large cities where crime is so rampant that citizens are forced to stay away. Administrators in some cities have really ceased to make an adequate effort to prevent crime in these sectors... that some of the present difficulties are related to the development of large urban political machines. Citizens feel no sense of loyalty to governments dominated by such machines."

Minor Wilson, chief administrative aide to Police Supt. Orlando W. Wilson of Chicago, said: "It seems hard for me to believe that they really arrived at that conclusion. It seems almost absurd."

WASHINGTON (AP)—Harold Howe II, has been named the new U.S. commissioner of education.

He'll take over in January from Francis Keppel who then will be able to devote full time to his other job of assistant secretary of health, education and welfare.

President Johnson announced the selection of Howe on Saturday.

Howe, 47, has been director of the Learning Institute of North Carolina, a center for education research, since May 1964.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Hunger in the world by 1970 is expected to reflect a food-supply deficit of around \$6.8 billion.

Measured in another way, the calorie gap is being forecast as the equivalent of nearly 2 billion bushels of wheat—a quantity about 60 per cent larger than the average annual production in the United States.

### FARM CORPS PROPOSED

BOISE (AP)—A U.S. Farm Corps is planning to use modern methods for higher food production in being proposed by a group of Democratic legislators.

Only a few editors failed to list the war in Viet Nam in first place. A year ago it ranked fourth in interest.

The 1965 civil rights category included the Selma Montgomery march and passage of the voting rights bill by Congress.

U.S. editors specifically voted on Maj. Edward W. White's historic "walk" in space, and a UPI board of editors broadened the category to include last week's rendezvous of Gemini 6 and Gemini 7.

## Nike X Antimissile Decision Can Be Postponed for Year

WASHINGTON (AP)—U.S. officials believe a decision whether to produce the Nike X antimissile missile could be postponed for at least another year.

This suggests that once again the Johnson administration may postpone that key decision in connection with the new defense budget which will go to Congress next month.

Weighing heavily against changes for an early go-ahead on the multibillion-dollar project are spiraling costs in Viet Nam.

New attention was focused on the antimissile question this week when Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara told NATO ministers in Paris that the Chinese Communists could have intercontinental ballistic missiles by 1975 and might have them by 1970.

## Segregation Suits Planned For Schools

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Justice Department is planning court suits against some school districts which maintains segregation policies.

Assistant Gen. John Doar said Sunday the list of potential defendants includes some districts which have rejected federal funds in an effort to preserve segregation.

Doar, speaking on the CBS radio-television program "Face the Nation," said: "If they don't do it voluntarily, we'll have to turn the courts to require them to desegregate."

The Supreme Court in 1954 ordered an end to school segregation policies, and in 1956 Congress ordered a withholding of federal funds if segregation is practiced.

Doar didn't say how many districts would be involved nor did he specify the suits.

Not everybody agrees with the Pentagon's civilian leaders that there is still time to ponder. The Joint Chiefs of Staff have recommended production of the Nike X as soon as possible.

The question could involve as much as a \$20 billion expenditure.

The United States has spent so far about \$2 billion on development of the Nike X and its less sophisticated predecessor, the Nike Zeus, over the past 10 years.

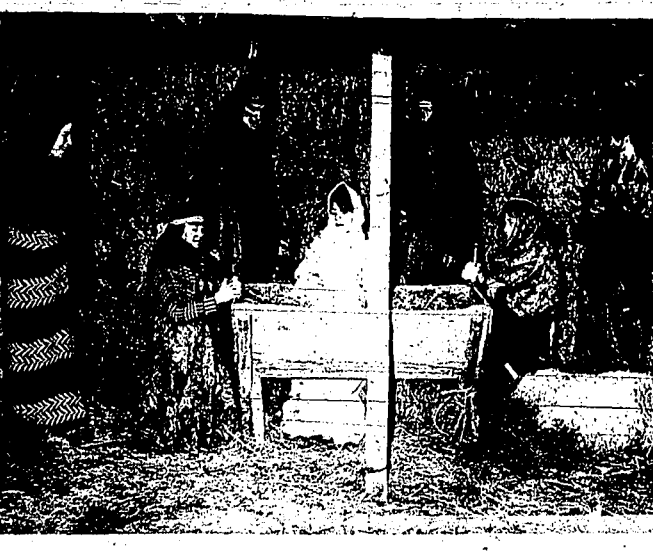

### GOP Appears To Have Left Faith Article

**WASHINGTON (UPI)** — The top-drawer Republican Coordinating Committee appears to have ditched what once was a GOP article of faith—that the federal government should get out of certain fields and leave them to the states. GOP leaders warned the states Sunday that they must meet public demands for increased government services or recognize that those demands would be met by the federal government. The warning was contained in the third and last of three reports, approved last Monday by the Republican Coordinating Committee. The panel includes former presidential nominees, congressional leaders, governors and representatives of the GOP National Committee. All three reports deal with relations between federal, state and local governments. Taken together they represented abandonment of what used to be GOP dogma—that the federal government should withdraw from some fields of activity and the states take them over together with the tax sources to pay for them. The report released Sunday said the need for efficient and better service grows with an expanding population. It added: "No challenge facing the American federal system is as clear as this: If our states cannot meet this increased demand for services, then the national government will..."

### Great Lakes Region Has Snowfall

The first significant snowfall of the season whirled through the Great Lakes region today, Chicago got its first snowfall of consequence when two inches spread over the city. "Remedial" warnings were in effect across the lower lakes from Wisconsin to Ohio. Through most of Florida cold fronts fell, while unseasonably low temperatures chilled the desert Southwest. Chincos moved down the eastern slope of the Rocky Mountains from Wyoming through Montana. A chinook or warm wind often results in spectacular mid-winter temperature rises. Subzero readings were common across New England. Flurries slowly ended from northeastern Ohio to Vermont after considerable accumulations were deposited in upper New York State.

But little Jack kept pestering so his father got up to take a look. There in the middle of the family pool was a 17-foot long plastic cow. When Racja called police, the desk sergeant thought it was a gag but agreed to send a patrol car. Patrolman Joseph Egg verified that a 175-pound imitation cow was floating in the pool. Police, after checking further, found that the cow had been stolen from a nearby dairy company where it had been on display.

### Genius, 17, Ends 12 Years In School for Retarded

**TULSA, Okla. (UPI)** — The story of how a 17-year-old boy with the IQ of a genius spent 12 years in a school for mentally retarded unfolded here Sunday. Doctors discovered there was nothing wrong with the boy's mind. He was deaf. As a result, he will start a new life in a school for the deaf, where he will begin instruction at the primer level. Case records show the deaf genius was admitted to the End, Okla., State School for Mentally Retarded when he was transferred to the Hissom Memorial Center near here, a modern new school that emphasizes remedial rather than custodial care. At the former school, doctors said, apparently because he was so bright he was supposed to be just like mentally retarded children around him. But frustration kept breaking through and he became a behavior problem. He couldn't yell to make himself understood, so his only alternative was physical action. This simply solidified the attitude of most of his attendants—that his was a hopeless case of retardation. The Hissom Center gives all patients a series of screening tests on admission, but the boy's ability came in light suddenly through a chance incident. An employee left a transistor radio lit on a table, thinking the boy might like to play with it. The deaf genius looked at the intricate wiring system and assembled the radio. It played perfectly. Teachers searched the boy's records. They noticed he had taught himself to swim a few years earlier simply by watching a big swimming exhibition on television. Earphones were placed over his ears. And the sound was received up past the normal level of physical pain. He showed no response. He was deaf. Evicted students then started giving the boy a series of sophisticated intelligence tests. The normal tests for a boy that age would not apply since he could not read. One of them had the subject duplicate designs by putting colored shapes on a white card after observing them on a flash card. One test was so difficult it takes a normal person five minutes. The boy did it in one minute. Dr. N. C. Gaddis, Hissom's medical director, took some of the same tests given the boy. "The boy beat me," Gaddis said. "The boy has been transferred to the state school for the deaf at Sulphur, Okla., where he will soon discover a new world of learning."

### Old Army Lore Helping In Viet Nam

**PEDRU** — South Viet Nam (AP) — Guerrilla lore that Capt. Robert Rogers imparted to his Rangers in the flintlock musket era is helping American GIs cope with the Red enemy in Viet Nam. The U.S. Army is passing out orders Rogers issued in 1759. Rogers led one of the most famous—and most effective—long-range penetration forces in American history. His Ranger outfit, made up of native Americans, fought on the side of the English in the French and Indian Wars before the revolution. He had a set of standing orders to his men that were practical for the war in South Viet Nam and they have been printed on cards and handed out to American troops. "The first order is blunt and is constantly being repeated by noncommissioned officers to their troops here: 'Don't forget nothing.' Another is self-explanatory and also applies to South Viet Nam. If you update the weapons: 'Have your musket clean as a whistle... sixty rounds of powder and ball and be ready to march at a moment's notice.' Men of the U.S. 1st Air Cavalry Division generally carry a couple of hundred rounds of ammunition and they are ready to move at a minute's warning. Rogers went on to say: 'When you're on the march, act the way you would if you were sneaking up on a deer. See the enemy first.' The Americans in Viet Nam haven't been noted for their ability to spot the enemy first, but they are learning. Another of Rogers' orders has considerable emphasis in Viet Nam: 'Don't never take a chance you don't have to.' Montagnard tribesmen of Viet Nam's central highlands are frequent practitioners of another Rogers order: 'If somebody's trailing you, make a circle, come back onto your own tracks and ambush the folks that aim to ambush you.' And circles come full swing with Rogers' order No. 18, the last: 'Let the enemy come till he's almost close enough to touch. Then let him have it and jump out and finish him up with your hatchet.'"

### Red China Leader Slams Johnson

TOKYO (UPI)—One of Communist China's top leaders accused President Johnson Sunday of "talking about peace while brandishing a butcher's knife" in Viet Nam.

Peng Chen, mayor of Peking and a member of the ruling Communist Party Politburo, reiterated Red China's long standing position that a settlement of the Vietnam war could come only through the complete withdrawal of U.S. troops.

The Red Chinese leader delivered a hard line speech in Peking on the eve of the fifth anniversary of the South Viet Nam National Liberation Front, political arm of the Viet Cong. His remarks were broadcast for worldwide distribution by the New China News Agency.

Peng made no mention of previous Chinese promises to send troops into Viet Nam if they were called for by the Vietnamese Communists. But, a vice chairman of Red China's National Defense Council, Yeh Chien Ying, renewed the threat by saying that the Chinese were "ready at all times to fight shoulder to shoulder" with the Vietnamese Reds.

Peng had harsh words for Russia as well as America. He said the Russian Communists—peking's pet term for the Russians and their followers—were "scared out of their wits by the military strength" of the United States.

Speaking to a crowd of 10,000 at Peking's Great Hall of the People, Peng said the Russians were afraid that revolutionary wars would "shatter their fond dream of Soviet-U.S. collaboration for world domination . . . . He accused the Russians of "dirty political bargaining" with the United States.

### Wreckage of U.S. Plane Is Found

ISTANBUL, Turkey (AP)—The wreckage of a U.S. Air Force B57 missing since Dec. 14 has been found in the Black Sea off the Turkish coast.

There was no sign of the pilot or copilot, who are presumed dead.

They were Capt. Lester L. Lackey of Lubbock, Tex., the pilot, and Lt. Robert A. States of Ridgewood, N.Y., the copilot.

### Error

### Farmer Sues

#### In Death of 500 Hogs

MUSKEGON, Mich. (UPI)—The strange case of 500 little pigs who never made it to market because science overlooked a small detail, is nearing conclusion in circuit court here.

Caryl G. Johnson, a Fruitport, Mich., farmer and hog raiser, is suing for \$15,000.

According to Johnson, here's what happened:

He was raising his hogs under a new scientific method which has proven efficient. But somebody goofed at the start.

The method involves construction of a huge blacklock barn with a feeder conveyor inside. There were no windows, and fresh air is supplied by

huge ground-level fans. This, said Johnson, is where the developers blew it.

The hogs—mostly inside the building—suffocated because the building wasn't big enough to market. A 200-pound weight can be reached within 90 to 100 days, if everything works okay.

But, Johnson said, fans located under the feeder belt became clogged with small grains of food, causing the fans to stop down and shut off fresh air to the animals.

He said nearly 500 of his hogs died or became ill and never made it to market last year.

Since then the fans have been sealed, have worked fine, and

his hogs are gaining weight in comfort.

Johnson is suing the Chelton Building Co., Inc., of New Jersey and some local contractors associated with the installation of the fans.

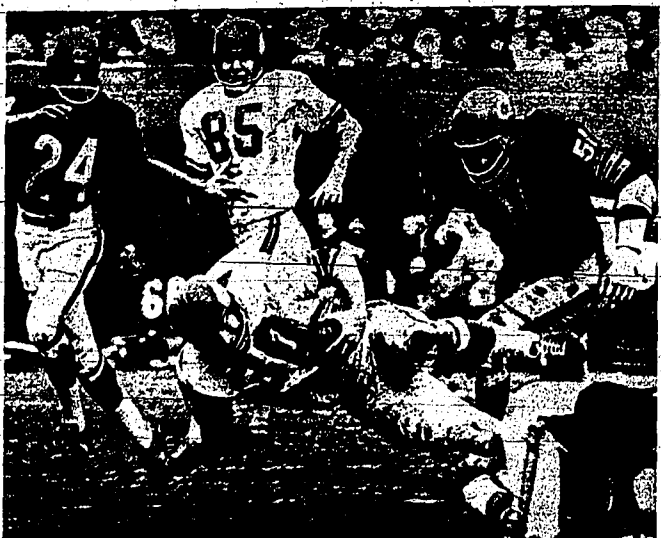

## Construction Executives Are Kidnaped

NEW YORK (AP) — The Columbia Broadcasting System reported from Saigon today that it had learned three American construction executives apparently have been kidnaped by the Viet Cong.

A broadcast gave this account: The three are missing from Bien Hoa, a big American military installation, 20 miles north-west of Saigon. All three are employees of the R.M.K. International Combine, which does most of South Viet Nam's construction work.

The three were at a company rock quarry near Bien Hoa with a Vietnamese driver. A Vietnamese reported to the company he saw the construction men and their trucks taken away by Viet Cong and their automobile was found abandoned.

The missing men were identified as Henry M. Hudson, construction manager for the R.M.K. Co.; Speed Jones, rock quarry superintendent; and Otto Shulton, rock quarry manager. R.M.K. officials say they expect the Viet Cong to ask ransom.

## 4 Satellites Will Climax Space Feat

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — A triple-barreled Air Force Titan 3 is scheduled to blast four separate satellites into an orbit more than 20,000 miles above the equator Tuesday to climax one of the most complex unmanned space missions ever planned.

Riding on the nose of the three-legged booster, the nation's most powerful rocket now in use, will be two experimental communications satellites, one of which will study activities of the sun and a fourth satellite for ham radio operators. The first is scheduled for 8 a.m. (EST).

The amateur radio satellite, called Oscar 4, is the postman's Telex. Like three other Oscar satellites which preceded it, Oscar 4 will be carried by a group of space engineers whose hobby is ham radio.

Oscar 4 is a complete radio transmitter and receiver, and simultaneously receiving voices and telegraph signals at 144 megacycles and retransmitting them at 432 megacycles.

The two communications satellites, developed by the Lincoln Laboratory, Massachusetts, and the University of Michigan, are named Les 3 and Les 4. They are used to test the nation's military defense communications satellite systems.

The sun-studying satellite, called OASAT, will carry 13 experiments, the Air Force said, including various tests of the effects of cosmic radiation on living tissue.

The mission will be one of the most complex ever undertaken, lasting some six hours and involving over 150 events.

The four satellites — which weigh the entire payload at 811 pounds — will be placed in space so they hover above the equator 20,000 miles west of Galapagos Island, west of Peru.

## Mansfield Reports on World Tour

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate Democratic leader Mike Mansfield, Mont., reported to Secretary of State Dean Rusk and Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara today on his 30,000-mile tour of the world trouble spot.

Mansfield conferred with President Johnson Sunday, less than a week after his return from the globe-girdling trip. According to White House Press Secretary Bill D. Moyers, he submitted "a number of recommendations" to the President.

Moyers said the chief executive found the long report from Mansfield "constructive, very helpful and knowledgeable." On his return Saturday night, Mansfield said the Viet Nam crisis was the major topic of concern among the world statesmen he met. He cautioned there

was no easy or simple solution to the problem, added that ultimately it would have to be "resolved at the conference table... and the sooner the better."

"The longer the solution is delayed," Mansfield added, "the more difficult it will be to achieve it and restore peace in Southeast Asia."

Mansfield and four other senators, including George D. Aiken, Vt., ranking Republican on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, left five weeks ago and visited many world capitals in Europe, the Middle East

and Asia. Although the group had no official status except for the senatorial posts of its members, there was little doubt it had at least the unofficial status of a presidential fact-finding mission. The mission had the chief executive's endorsement and was provided Air Force transportation.

## Study Promised For Government

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Republican Leader Gerald R. Ford has promised to push for a new study of the executive branch.

Ford said in a Sunday statement that since the last Hoover Commission closed shop 10 years ago, federal employment has risen by more than 100,000 and "vast new agencies and functions have come into being."

In a letter to a lunch group called "Friends of Freeman," Johnson said it was fitting that Freeman's friends pause to praise him for a job well done.

The President noted that it was in mid-December five years ago that Freeman, about to wind up six years as Minne-

sota's governor, accepted an invitation to become secretary of agriculture. He said Freeman "approached his tremendous task with integrity and imagination."

Another Johnson statement was that Freeman's "understanding of the problems that face the producers of America has benefited an entire nation."

The Judiciary lunch for Freeman was held the week the Farm Bureau held its annual convention at Chicago. The bureau has fought every omnibus farm bill sponsored by Freeman.

The farm group handed Freeman and the Kennedy administration a major defeat in 1963 over tight supply-management of wheat production. But in other jousts with the bureau,

**Urged To Save Fish From Dams**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Conservationists are being urged to fight to protect migratory fish from being destroyed by the construction of high dams.

W. A. Douglas, executive director of the Sport Fishing Society, at a recent conservation conference called also for expanded federal assistance to find ways to protect the fish over the dams.

He said the dams threaten to destroy valuable fish resources in the Pacific Northwest.

The dam building projects in the Columbia River system have not only grossly affect the anadromous fishery, if not altogether eliminate it very shortly, but also prevent the fish from returning to their spawning grounds and other fish which migrate from oceans to fresh water spawning beds.

There are over 300 dams on the Columbia watershed. The dam project is a low dam used for irrigation diversions that are planned fishways are serious threat.

The Columbia itself has 11 dams that practically block stream migration of anadromous fish.

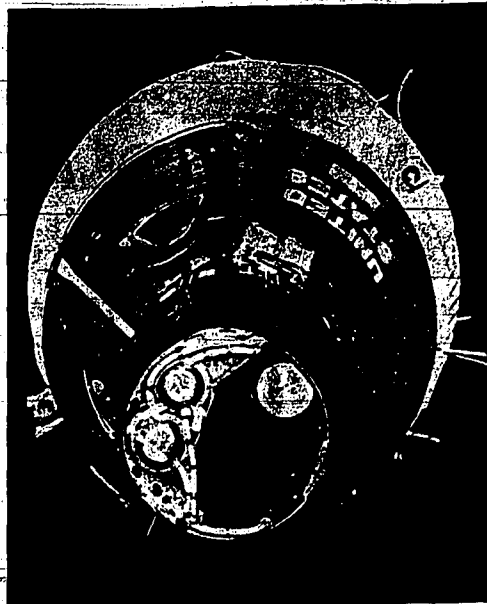

### Glass Jar of Pickled Pigs Feet Raises Havoc With Mail

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — In the mass of mail pouring in from the states to the U.S. servicemen in South Viet Nam was this three-gallon glass jar of pickled pigs feet.

To the two men who shoulder the daily responsibility of getting the mail through to the soldiers, this ordinarily would be no problem.

But let one of them, M. Sgt. James V. Adams of Pendfield, Ill., tell what happened. "The glass jar broke and there was a real mess. It took us some time to pick out the broken glass and sort out the sodden letters from the big metal container we use for the mail."

The other man responsible for the mail getting through is Capt. Gerald C. Aker of Bellevue, Wash., a former Air Force navigator and airline teacher. The Aker-Adams team directs the handling of about 270,000 pounds of mail daily at the aerial mail terminal at Saigon's airport. About 30,000 pigs make up the letters and packages being sent back home.

The other 12 tons is mail addressed to U.S. troops on duty in South Viet Nam.

Three months ago the daily volume of service mail handled here was about 50,000 pounds, says Adams, the noncommissioned officer in charge of the aerial-mail terminal.

Aker, 37, is a veteran who served in the Pacific as a navigator for the Military Air Transport Service. He took time off for schooling and teaching but the Cuban crisis in October, 1962, called him back into service.

He now plans to make the service his career. The leopard tattooed on his right arm tells of a hitch in the U.S. Coast and Geodetic Survey.

Problems? To keep the soldiers' mail moving so there will be no undue delay. "I never allow the mail to pile up here," Aker says. "Now with the Christmas crush on, we have to make an extra effort to get the mail on its way."

"Every now and then a military situation will have priority on all military airmail, but the minute planes are available, we start the mails moving. Our aim is to let no letter or parcel remain on our hands for more than 24 hours."

In almost all normal cases, Aker says, the mail moves out the day it comes in.

Adams, Aker says. "That man is tops in getting the soldier mail moved."

"Too many men over here are sending fresh fruit and vegetables home by mail," Adams said. "They get crushed and

they spoil. They are rough on the mail. Most of it just can't get through."

Few letters and parcels are delivered — less than about one-half of one per cent, Adams estimates. Insufficient address is the main reason; troop movements are the next.

Working under Aker and Adams is a staff of 17 U.S. military personnel and 25 Vietnamese.

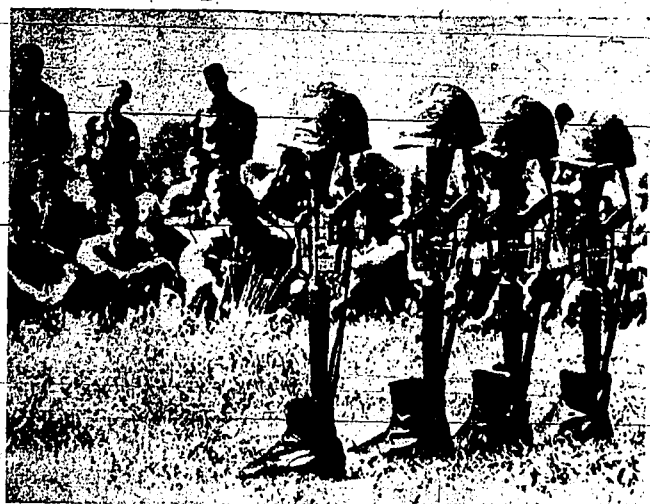
