Enroll for Medicare Aid

WASHINGTON (AP)—A total of 3,668,587 persons over 65 have enrolled in the voluntary medicare program since the program was authorized by the Social Security Administration report in 1953.

The total enrolled, 8,000,857 in 1965, is a record for the program, says a spokesman for the Social Security Administration.

Enrollment is being obtained through mail and personal contact.

There will be another mailing of enrollment cards in January or February to those who have not enrolled.

In order to obtain coverage under the effective date of the program next July 1 persons who are 65 must have enrolled by March 31.

WASHINGTON (AP)—Mrs. Dean Rusk, wife of the secretary of state, knows she is going to get a carrot Christmas Eve.

"That's been her lot for years, ever since the Rusk children came for Santa and a carrot for his reindeer on the night before Christmas."

It still is a family custom, even though the children are grown now, and one has a child of his own.

"They'll all be home for Christmas—David and his wife and their son, Gregory, who lives at Cornell University; and Peggy, a senior in high school."

Mrs. Rusk said today "Mr. and Mrs. Santa Claus"—always eat the cake and carrot, and "I get the carrot by choice."

It's a Rusk custom, too, to have their big holiday meal on Christmas Eve, usually with turkey and a cold buffet, including cold turkey, on Christmas Day.

"So I'll be free to play the newest games and don't have to spend the day in the kitchen," Mrs. Rusk explained.

It also can be made any time up to one week before Christmas, she said, because it doesn't require as long to ripen as the usual fruit cake.

Girl Goes Home After 7-Year Death Fight

NEW YORK (AP)—Stephanie Smith goes home for Christmas today, "utterly exhausted" after a seven-year battle against death.

"I'm getting out of the hospital in time for the holidays," she said the pretty, 22-year-old blonde, "just as I knew I would, but I never counted on this being the greatest Christmas present in all the world."

Hundreds of strangers have been in and out of hospitals 25 home and abroad wrote the victim of a rare blood disease at the Hospital of the Rockefeller University here. American servicemen wrote from overseas stations.

"It gives you a funny feeling, a real, warm feeling," Miss Smith said in her hospital room Monday night.

"You somehow get to thinking that people today are just taken up with themselves and worry about anyone else, much less care about a total stranger."

"People do care," she said.

Stricken at 15, Miss Smith has been in and out of hospitals 25 home and abroad wrote the victim of a rare blood disease at the Hospital of the Rockefeller University here. American servicemen wrote from overseas stations.

The blood disease, lupus erythematosus, once was considered progressively fatal but now controllable with proper medicines.

"Any courage and determination I have I owe to my mother and I'm going to be home with her and Dad for the Christmas holidays," Miss Smith told The Associated Press 12 days ago.

"You can count on that."

About half the letters came from victims of the disease or relatives of victims.

"So many of them said they never knew of anyone else suffering with the disease," Miss Smith said. "And they said it gave them added hope and encouragement to know that they are not alone—to know that there are others who have the disease but are fighting it all down the line."

"This morning I woke up feeling very sorry for myself," she wrote Bob Hacker, serving in West Germany with Company D of the Army's 9th Engineer Battalion.

"I had been thinking about home and Christmas and feeling blue because I couldn't be home with my family for the holiday season."

Her success against the disease: "I guess I'm just too stubborn to die."

Tucson Girl Sentenced in Slaying Case

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — A 17-year-old former Tucson girl accused of involvement in the apparent slaying of another teenager was sentenced to four to five years in prison Monday.

Mary Rae French, 17, of Tucson, was sentenced to the state prison. She was sentenced to the state prison. She was sentenced to the state prison.

She received two concurrent sentences on charges of kidnapping and compounding a felony and being an accessory to the murder of Aileen Rowe, 15, Tucson.

Miss Rowe disappeared after leaving her Tucson home May 1964. Miss French told authorities she was in the area of the slaying and killed.

Defense attorney Jack Redburn told Superior Court Judge Robert Reynolds that Miss French had remained silent 18 months because of the influence of "an older man who professed love for her."

Charles Howard Schmid, 23, faces first-degree murder charges in the death of Miss Rowe and in the slaying of Gretchen Fritz, 11, and Wendy Fritz, 13.

Fritz said Miss French and John Saunders, 19, told them they helped bury Miss Rowe in a desert area the night she disappeared.

Saunders pleaded guilty to first degree murder. His sentencing is set for Thursday.

GOP Senator Urges U.S. to Pursue Viet Nam Peace Feelers Diligently

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. George D. Aiken, R-Vt., said today the United States must pursue diligently any Viet Nam peace feelers — no matter how tenuous they may appear. "The alternative to negotiating may be a long war, costly in lives and national resources," Aiken said in an interview. He is a senior Republican in the Senate and a member of the Foreign Relations Committee. While the Vermont senator was emphasizing the need to pursue peace feelers, a leading house Republican, Rep. Melvin R. Laird of Wisconsin, praised the Johnson administration for stepping up bombing in Viet Nam and urged greater use of U.S. seapower in the Viet Nam war. "They've decided to escalate the war on the ground," he said in an interview. "We think greater consideration should be given to a Kennedy-type quarantine referred to the type of tight naval blockade President John F. Kennedy set up around Cuba during the missile crisis of 1962. Other Republican leaders have spoken in favor of such a technique in Viet Nam."

Teacher Says Frog Dance Boosts Ego

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) — A Columbia University faculty member suggests that many's loss of a sense of separateness might have led to the development of such dances as the frog. Gerald Sykes theorized; the emphasis is apt on sex, which implies participation with someone else, but on the ego. You do the frog by yourself perhaps as a defiant gesture of independence in an increasingly homogenized world, said Sykes, head of Columbia's liberal arts school. "It was one of a number of the world's top philosophers and scholars at a symposium on the technological society at the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions Monday."

Assembly to Close Lid Tonight

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP) — U.N. delegates pushed warmly to close the lid tonight on a General Assembly that has accumulated business and broken a few precedents. Assembly President, Amintore Fanfani was expected to gavel the evening session to a close late tonight — in the early morning hours, depending on the volume of wind-up oratory. It will mean the end of an assembly that had to take time from current business to clean up financial and housing-keeping items untouched during last year's session paralyzed by the voting deadlock over peace-keeping finances.

Portugal Train Wreck Kills 23

LISBON, Portugal (AP) — Investigation today counted 23 persons killed and approximately 70 injured as they sought an explanation for the Berlin train's third serious railroad accident in six many days. Christmas shoppers homeward bound from Lisbon, fled a six-car suburban electric train which smashed into a local freight train Monday coming toward the capital on the same track. Railway officials said they believed all the victims were Portuguese. "The trains collided at Algueirão."

Cold Weather Chills Mild Sections

Cold weather chilled some of the nation's normally mild sections today in advance of the 25th of the winter season tonight at 8:41 p.m. EST.

Freezing weather dipped into areas in the Southeast, with rain falling in parts of the Gulf states. It also was a little chilly in sections of the South-west, where the mercury fell to zero and near zero, was in northern New York State, northern New England and parts of the Great Basin region in the Far West. The mercury dropped to 35 below zero Monday at Waukena, N.Y., in Adirondacks.

The snow covering areas most of the nation was reported generally light. Heaviest amounts, up to 30 inches, were in the western Adirondacks and in New York State and in mountain areas in the West.

In the Midwest, snow measured 18 inches at Houghton, Mich., in the extreme northern Upper Peninsula. Amounts in other parts of the Midwest were generally light.

Snow fell during the night and early morning across broad areas from the Great Lakes region into the north. Adirondacks. Heaviest amounts appeared to be in West-Virginia, with two inches in a 24-hour period at Beckley, and one inch across most other areas. Washington reported light snow during the morning, the first of the season. Light snow also fell in Philadelphia.

Showers spread slowly through Washington State and into sections of Oregon during the morning. Heavy showers of the central-valley of California and the weather bureau reported visibility dropped to nearly zero in many areas, disrupting air travel and slowing auto traffic.

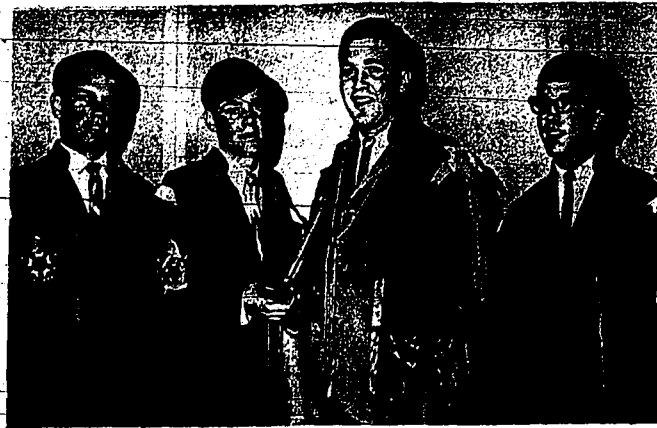
Criminal Anarchy Brings Sentence

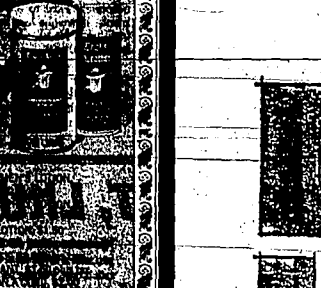

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Reactor Site Eligible for Designation

WASHINGTON (AP) — A reactor at the National Reactor Testing Station in eastern Idaho was listed today as one of 65 sites throughout the nation eligible for designation as a national historic landmark.

The Idaho nominee is the Experimental Breeder Reactor No. 1.

The announcement by Secretary of the Interior Stewart L. Udall described the reactor as "a historic-making facility... which demonstrated that workable uranium can be transformed into fissionable uranium in a process producing more fissionable material than it consumes. It also produced the first sizable amounts of electricity created by nuclear means and achieved a self-sustaining chain reaction using plutonium instead of uranium as the fuel."

The reactor construction which began in 1949, "was discontinued in 1954."

The list announced includes museums, libraries, scientific laboratories, colleges and industrial college buildings, a battlefield, and the homes and studios of educators, artists, and authors.

The National Parks Service does not administer these landmarks but recognizes them by presenting their owners a certificate and a bronze plaque if the designations are accepted. Designations are made by the secretary upon recommendations of the Advisory Board on National Parks.

Woman Says Carols Played Too Slow

LONDON (AP) — Take a recording of "God King Wenceslas" made at 33 1/3 revolutions per minute, play it at 78 rpm's and enjoy a good live.

That's just about the way it should sound, according to Miss Elizabeth Poston, a British composer and expert on medieval music.

Miss Poston has strong views on "things that have happened to carols in their way down the centuries. Especially 'Wenceslas'."

Carols, according to Miss Poston, were originally intended for dancing. They were folk songs and not necessarily religious.

The medieval clergy decided that dancing in church would not do. So carols went underground. They survived precariously for hundreds of years in remote villages.

Then under Victorian revivalism — only a whisper — they were whistled. They took the tunes, wrote their own words and loaded down the result with church harmonies.

This is what happened to "Wenceslas." The tune, once a splendidly gay and virile dance measure, dates from the 13th century, Miss Poston says.

The words were written in 1833 by Dr. John Mason Neale. Miss Poston, in a foreword to the "Penguin Book of Christmas Carols," describes his grating operation as "the dreariest of travesties."

She says that "Wenceslas" should be sung in unison, nearly twice as fast as most people do these days, "with clapping, drum and plucked instruments — which sounds like a beat group backing."

"Danced as a twist with modern rhythm accompaniment it would be nearer its authentic style," Miss Poston writes.

She prints her version in the book, minus harmonies but with indications for drum taps and drone bass, plus several other unconventional arrangements.

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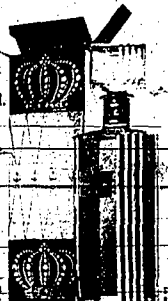

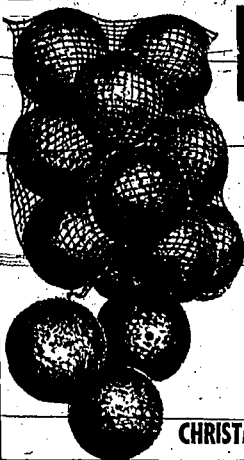

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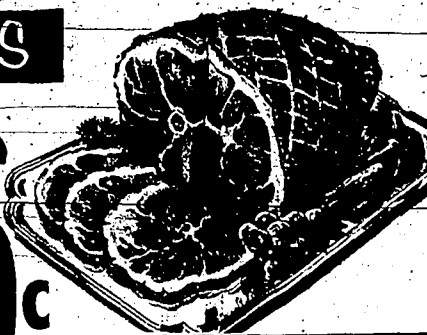

BOISE (AP) — Election candidates and issues normally do not start emerging until early in the election year — but some of the 1966 election campaigns have been under way for months. Undersecretary of the Interior John Carner and State Rep. Don Pieper also have been named as possible Democratic candidates. The only Republican to announce his gubernatorial candidacy is Charles H. Aeronautics Board to Urge Steps in Airplane Safety

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Civil Aeronautics Board is about to propose major steps to improve the chances of surviving an air crash and the techniques of finding the causes of accidents.

Some of the CAB's suggestions, to be submitted to the Federal Aviation Agency, stem from two recent crashes of Boeing 727 jets at Cincinnati and Salt Lake City. But they go far beyond the scope of these two accidents and will involve all jets, not just the three-engine 727.

Three specific recommendations already have gone to the FAA. They include:

- Early research into the materials used in airliner cabins, specifically plastic linings and soundproofing padding, to determine whether they give off toxic fumes while burning and whether a fire affecting both the plastic and insulating material destroys their individual flame-resistant qualities. Separately, they resist fire. The CAB is concerned that there may be a combination that may be a combustion combination that is deadlier than anyone supposed.
- A thorough government-industry look at ways to better educate passengers on how to operate emergency window exits. The CAB is thinking about using a "mockup" of such exits to be demonstrated before each takeoff. There is evidence that many passengers, especially those who have panicked through unfamiliarity with the exits, and tried to push them out instead of pulling them in.

...Possible relocation of the belly fuel lines in the 727, whose three engines are rear-mounted, in the United Air Lines crash at Salt Lake City Nov. 11, in which 43 died, it is known that the collapsing main gear in a hard landing 300 feet short of the runway ruptured a fuel line leading to the center engine and caused a fire. Madame Chiang Kai-Shek Has Long And Quiet Visit in United States

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Madame Chiang Kai-shek is expected to the fourth month of her visit to the United States but there are week-long periods without public reminders of her presence.

Nationalist China's first lady has followed a low-key policy since arriving in Washington in early September. This is in contrast to her trip from Taiwan last year.

She met and talked with reporters at various airports en route to New York. There, she also talked freely during tours of China town and at a formal news conference.

In Washington, however, she has avoided contact with newsmen except for one nationally televised interview with a panel of reporters.

U.S. officials see in this a measure of Madame Chiang's "soft sell" technique. On the one hand, she has been busy meeting privately with government, congressional and military leaders.

On the other, she has avoided the public statements which might irritate Washington officials already busy and tense with an encroaching Southeast Asia.

The formal request for her visit, approved by Madame Chiang and Chinese officials, is that she be invited by her many friends to see them and make some speeches, and to visit relatives.

The only public speeches to date, however, have been the folksy dialogue of reminiscences at Wesleyan College, Mass., which she attended last week, and another to her alma mater, Wellesley College, Wellesley, Mass.

In the last talk, she warned the college girls that the free world will be imperiled if the search for truth is abandoned.

"Assuming the role of a 'Duchess aunt,' she said she wanted to 'talk unashamedly of what is only too obvious but never admitted, openly and alone finding an antidote for the mortal peril that faces the free world, and ironically enough, also Soviet Russia.'"

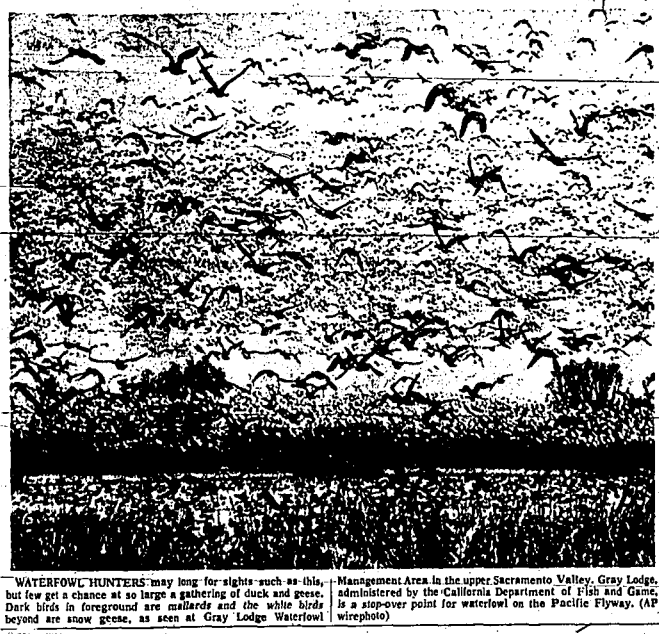

Breathitt talked with Northington privately at the luncheon, after which they set out for the university, 32 miles away at Lexington.
 Northington signed at Lexington in the presence of Kentucky coach Charlie Brody, athletic and staff and university President John Oswald.

"This is a great and historic day for the University of Kentucky," Oswald said, "and for its athletic program and for the Southeastern Conference."
 From Lexington, Breathitt, Northington and Kentucky assistant coach George Boone drove 70 miles to Louisville to get the signature of Northington's mother on the scholarship.

Breathitt, also chairman of the board of trustees, called last week for increased efforts for the university to sign a Negro to a grant-in-aid.

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Creation of Sales Tax Is Rated Top Idaho Story in 1965

BOISE (AP)—Creation of Idaho's 1965 sales tax was the top story in the annual poll of Twin Falls newspaper editors and readers. The poll, conducted by the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce, ranked the creation of the sales tax as the most important story in 1965.

The sales tax, which took effect on Jan. 1, 1965, was the second most important story in the poll, receiving 149 points, receiving first place in the poll.

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Creation of the State Water Resources Board and the Idaho Department of Parks and Recreation were also top stories in the poll.

The 1965 Senior Girl Scout Roundup that brought some 11,000 girls and their leaders from around the country to Idaho's Farragut State Park was voted third best story with 129 points.

Gov. Robert F. Smylie's emergence in 1965 as a leader of Republican moderates was voted fourth.

Most recently, Smylie sponsored a resolution adopted by the National Republican Coordinating Committee disassociating the Republican party from extremist groups.

The head-on collision near American Falls that killed 10 members of two religious families and left only one survivor was voted fifth.

The sales tax repeal referendum was voted sixth and an appeal to a federal court to overturn the Legislature's reapportionment plans was voted seventh.

Sports fishermen protests to close of salmon fishing was voted eighth. At one point fishermen in the Salmon, Idaho, area threatened to defy the ban if commercial salmon fishing was resumed near Portland.

The death of Virgil Wayne Miller, 29, in a shootout with FBI agents on a mountain ridge near the Continental Divide north of Salmon was voted ninth. The shootout ended a manhunt through at least two states.

And the tenth top story was December flooding that caused extensive damage to small towns and farms near Layman.

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Dope Seized At Home of Army Officer

COLUMBUS, Ga. (AP)—Government officers seized more than \$100 million worth of narcotics at the home of an Army officer.

Officers labeled the seizure the largest ever in the United States as they moved quickly into this base city and arrested Warrant Officer Herman Gorder, 35.

Five other persons, government officials announced in New York, had been arrested in Manhattan in connection with the seizure of narcotics.

In Washington, Commissioner Henry L. Giordano of the U.S. Bureau of Narcotics said "this case involves the largest single seizure of heroin ever made in the United States."

Officials in Columbus said Gorder was placed under \$100,000 bond and a hearing was set for Dec. 23.

In New York, U.S. Atty. Robert M. Morgenthau said the heroin had been seized from a home freezer, which had been transported here from Europe among Gorder's personal property.

Morgenthau also announced the arrest of four French nationals and a Brazilian.

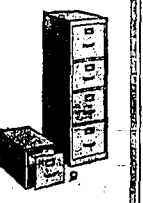
Morgenthau said the heroin was seized in a shack behind Gorder's trailer. Gorder was released with the 37th Army Engineers at nearby Ft. Benning.

The U.S. attorney said Gorder was the courier employed to smuggle the heroin into the United States in connection with its return from Europe.

Gorder was transferred to the United States last September. Morgenthau said the heroin arrived with Gorder's belongings in October.

Morgenthau said the five persons arrested in Manhattan had been in this country for three days to two weeks, and all had participated in the arrangement to support the heroin and sell it.

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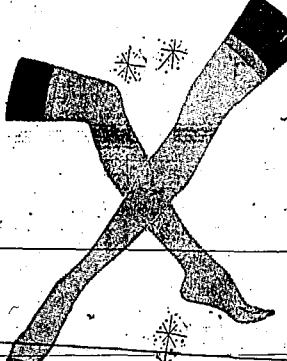

70-Year-Old Man Plans Kayak Trip

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — It's a tall 70-year-old Luther (Loo) Meyer he ought to retire and take it easy.

He's planning his next solo kayak trip down northern Canada's rugged Mackenzie River.

"Wood sides, folks have more steam in their boilers than they know," says Meyer, who scrolls at the image of himself sitting on a porch in a rocking chair.

Meyer, on the staff of the San Francisco Examiner and News Call Bulletin, is the dean of San Francisco's newspaper reporters, but during his vacations he is off to some far-away spot for a bit of rugged adventure.

How does a man of 71 decide to make a 1,000-mile kayak trip, as Meyer first did three years ago.

"Well," said the grizzled Meyer, his eyes sparkling behind rimless glasses—"I was—just ready to leave on a 1,000-mile motorcycle trip from Portland, Ore., to Mexico in 1963 when I visited the annual boat show here. I saw a kayak like the one Dr. Hoag Lindemann used to cross the North Atlantic in 1956—and bought it."

He went on to Mexico, but when he returned he began making plans for his first trip down the Mackenzie.

When summer came he traveled to the end of the road at Fort Providence in the Northwest Territories, then set off alone in his craft with a tent, food supplies, hatchet, hunting knife, flares and soap. One thousand miles later he reached the mouth of the river at Beauport Bay.

Meyer has gone back every year since. Happily admitting "I'm hooked," he is planning his fourth expedition for next summer.

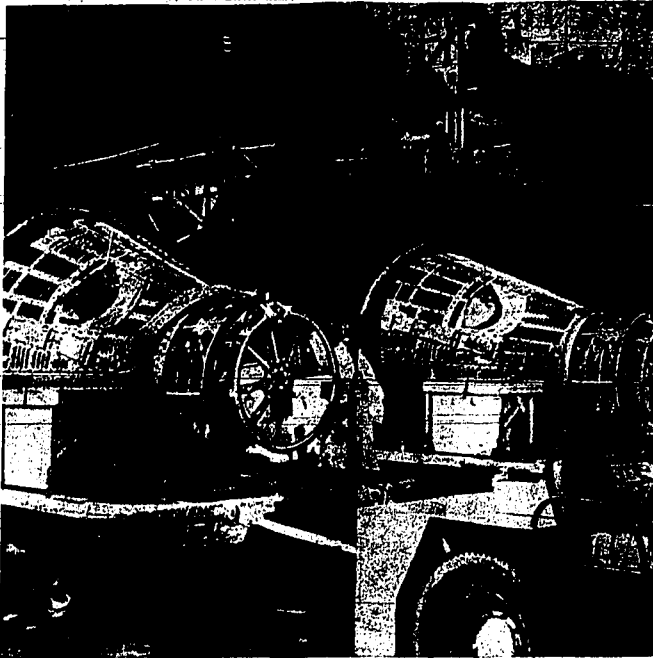
With all their perils, these trips leave you feeling more competent," he says. "Life is do-it-yourself job up there. There's no A.A.A. to call if you're in trouble."

Lady Bird Notes 53rd Anniversary

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Johnson family pauses Wednesday in the midst of Christmas preparations to observe the First Lady's 53rd birthday.

Born Claudia Alta Taylor on Dec. 22, 1912, in the little town of Karnack in East Texas, she never uses the formal name her parents gave her. She's known now throughout the world by the name of Lady Bird, given her by a childhood nursemaid.

There's no formal party planned for Mrs. Johnson. As usual, the family will give her personal gifts, not usually disclosed to the public.

At 53, Mrs. Johnson is 5 feet 4, and still maintains a trim size 10 figure.

As First Lady, she presides at numerous White House social events and now devotes considerable time to the beautifying of the nation's capital and a campaign to make American more beautiful.

Last month, President and Mrs. Johnson observed the 31st wedding anniversary. The date — Nov. 17 — coincided with a formal White House dinner for Britain's visiting Princess Margaret and her husband, Lord Snowdon. President Johnson, in a champagne after-dinner toast, proclaimed he was married to "the most wonderful woman in the world."

Their partnership in marriage and in politics is well-known. The President frequently tells how his wife loaned him money to get started in politics, campaigns for him, and backs him at every turn.

In the President's most recent personal crisis — his gall bladder operation — Mrs. Johnson moved into the hospital.

Johnson's recuperation period at the LBJ Ranch in Texas gave his wife her first long rest and respite from public duties this year.

Until then, she had traveled

almost 14,000 miles and made 33 speeches in behalf of beautification projects and some anti-poverty causes.

Her press secretary, Elizabeth Caperton, said Mrs. Johnson reported the two months at the ranch had given her "a wonderful respite with her family — to walk, think, talk with her husband, and to read."

Wreaths to Join Ghosts Of Yule Past

FRUITLAND, Md. (AP) — Like strawberry chains and popcorn balls, the holly wreath may soon join the ghosts of Christmas past.

At least that's the opinion of many in this Maryland Eastern Shore community where the making and sale of holly wreaths is a 50-year tradition.

Etta Carey Bloom, a veteran wreath buyer who used to send as many as four or five trucks to city markets, says she may send one this year. She blames artificial wreaths for the industry's decline.

"They make them look so natural that there isn't much demand now for the real ones," she said.

LOUIE W. Carey, another buyer, says good holly is scarce. There's too much cutting of the woods, especially in the lowlands where you find good holly," he said. "Besides, the winters are getting warmer all the time, and the wreaths don't keep as well."

For years, farm families in this area began cutting holly shortly after Thanksgiving. Then, they sit around the fire in the winter evenings stripping the berries, bunching them into bouquets and weaving berries and holly twigs around hoops made from maple switches.

It has been a way to make Christmas money.

But the wreath makers are disappearing, and many believe this is another reason behind the declining industry.

"The old people are going and the young ones are away from home or they can make money easier in other ways," said Carey.

Gifts Gladden Farmer After Large Blaze

LANCASTER, Va. (AP) — Willing T. Gill Jr., 65, says in his scorched home this Christmas season "reading the children's letters with tears streaming down his face."

His wife says his shedding tears of joy, although his mood could have been as black as the fields of his farm flames last month consumed 40 years' accumulation of surrounding buildings and equipment and wiped out his crops and livestock.

The wind-blown fire caused \$10,000 damage.

But now he has new friends, a start toward a new farm — and abundant evidence of his fellow man's generosity.

Shortly after the Richmond (Va.) Times-Dispatch carried the story on the Gill farm fire,

the paper published a letter to the editor suggesting that readers send \$1 to Mr. and Mrs. Gill at this Chesapeake Bay community.

The suggestion came from G. W. Glascock of Virginia, a man the Gills had never met, and the envelope contained a dollar bill.

One child sent a letter, enclosing a dollar for "a hen or two chickens."

A small Richmond church sent its \$2 Sunday School collection contributed by children.

But adults have responded, too. An anonymous donor last week purchased a used tractor and ordered it delivered to Gill.

"I feel the people are right around me," Gill says. "I used to think they were interested only in themselves. Now I know they are ready to give a hand any time."
