The court said senators must instead represent people on an equal basis. It was "a rotten deal," said James Ellsworth-Ross, one of the ruling's outspoken critics.

These youngsters, coming from needy families, were taken through about seven stores and were provided money to buy presents by the groups. The money was derived from the Christmas sale held last week.

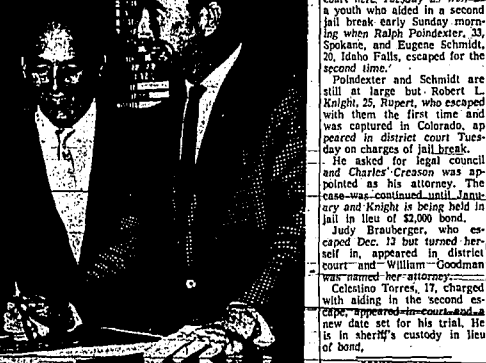

No Inquest Planned in Man's Death

GOODING—No inquest will be held into the death of Jonathan Embrie Barnes, 25, King Hill, Sheriff Verne Royce said Wednesday.

The body of Mr. Barnes, a student at Idaho State University, Poestello, was found about 5 p. m. Tuesday near and one-half mile west of here along the edge of the Malad River.

Gooding county officers said Barnes was of an apparently self-inflicted gun-shot wound in the head.

Barnes, who had been missing for some time Sunday afternoon, was found by his father, Rev. R. J. Barnes, pastor of the King Hill Baptist Church. Glenn Mills, who was searching for him.

Barnes had parked his car, according to County Sheriff Verne Royce, near the side of the old Bliss Highway and walked to the edge of the Malad River where his body was found with the .32-gauge shotgun alongside.

Rev. Barnes and Mills spotted the body about 10:30 a. m. Tuesday. Mills was with the body and found the shotgun.

The two men drove back to Gooding where they notified the sheriff's office. County Coroner E. J. Timmerman viewed the scene and reported Wednesday that the youth had been dead for at least 48 hours.

Boycott Is Stiffened on White Stores

FAYETTE, Miss. (AP)—Civil rights forces have stiffened their support of a boycott against white merchants here in hopes the lack of Christmas shoppers will show a need to meet their desegregation demands. State, county and federal law officers watched Tuesday while 40 pickets, backing a "Black Christmas" march through near-deserted streets—a proof of the economic pinch caused by the boycott.

Field director Charles Evers of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People said he formed patrols to keep Negroes out of town and to watch for Ku Klux Klan attacks on pickets.

Evers said picketing would continue until Friday when the group would stage a demonstration.

Mayor R. J. Allen said the town was quiet and the streets remained open. He declined comment on a charge by Evers that someone had aimed a shotgun at a picket Monday.

Authorities slapped a holiday ban on beer sales in this southwest Mississippi town Monday to head off any prospect of racial violence in Jefferson County. The county is more than 70 percent Negro.

Evers has called a campaign of no buying or Christmas decorating until demands are met. In full, Negroes want desegregation of all public facilities, including public schools. They also want the police force and use of courtesy titles — Mr., Mrs. or Miss.

A group called Americans for the Preservation of the White Race has urged a "buying" to counter the boycott. Rowland Scott of Natchez, president, asked shoppers in a six-county area to patronize white Fayette merchants.

Evers said the countermove had produced few results.

BOSTON (AP)—Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., says President Johnson should consult with Congress before there is any further commitment of American forces in Viet Nam. Kennedy said in an interview with Boston radio station WJZ he would have "serious reservations" about bombing Viet Cong infiltration routes in Cambodia or Laos.

But he said, "the U.S. should destroy any supporting groups, transportation, logistical depots in North Viet Nam where they are helping the Viet Cong."

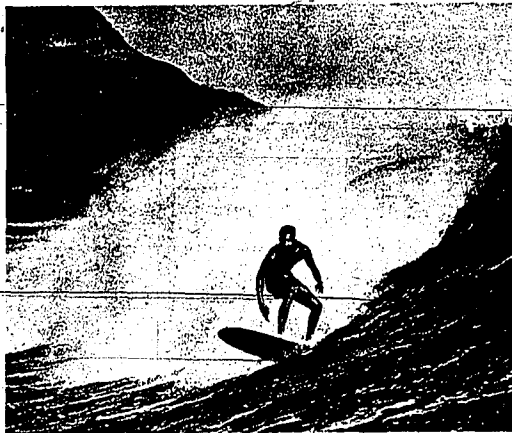

2 Sentenced For Aiding In Escapes

BERLIN (AP) — Two American men today were reported sentenced to eight years in an East German prison for helping refugees escape to West Berlin. A Tennessee girl is being held in East Berlin apparently on the same charge.

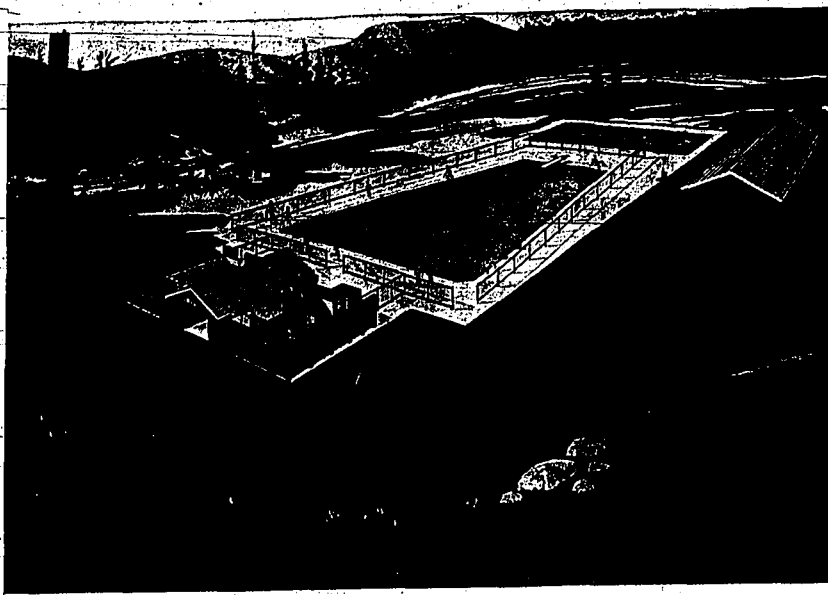
Moses Reese Herrin, 24, of Akron, Ohio, and Frederick Matthews, 21, of Ellwood City, Pa., were convicted Tuesday in a Potsdam district court on nine counts of helping East Germans flee to West Berlin. Their West Berlin lawyer, Jürgen Stange, told newsmen.

A U.S. spokesman announced Tuesday night that Mary Helen Battle, 24, of Oak Ridge, Tenn., was arrested in East Berlin Nov. 24. Stange said she was being held on suspicion of "aiding flight from the (East German) republic."

Stange said that five of the escape incidents of which the two men were accused were successful but the other four were not.

The pair was arrested at midnight Sept. 19 by East German border guards as they tried to return to West Berlin. They were reportedly trying to bring a 13-year-old East Berlin girl, hidden in their car, to her parents in West Berlin.

Stange said the sentences of the two men were expected as having started on Sept. 20.

Huge Raft Will Assist Scientists In Drilling Hole in Earth's Crust

WASHINGTON (UPI) — In 1965, a huge 21,500-ton raft, riding high in the water on two pontoon-like hulls, will propel itself into swirling tides and stop at a point 125 miles north-east of Honolulu.

Without the aid of an anchor, the raft will be in place for three years while the scientists attempt to drill a hole six miles deep into the crust of the earth.

Keeping the steel island in place, despite the buffeting of the nine-foot waves and 30-foot waves which often sweep through that part of the Pacific Ocean, is one of the technological miracles that must be achieved to assure the success of a controversial scientific experiment known as Project Mohole.

It will take nearly eight miles of drill pipe to reach the ocean floor and penetrate it to the scientist's goal—the mysterious "mantle" of the earth. Any movement of the raft outside a 500-foot circle could snap the drill string or tie it in knots. And the deeper the raft, the more sensitive the thin string of pipe will become to surface movements.

To keep the platform from sloshing up and down in the water and smashing the sensitive diamond bit on hard rock in the bottom of the hole, engineers designed the platform so it would sit about 60 feet above the waves on columns attached to pontoons. The pontoons will be flooded and submerged during drilling.

More difficult is the problem of keeping the platform from drifting away.

Six right-angle propellers will be located just below each of the stabilizing columns. A water can on each of the propellers to increase or decrease thrust.

Two underwater sonar systems will feed data to the computer on deep ocean movements. The computer will translate this information into orders for the stabilizing propellers.

Working drawings for the raft are nearing completion at the National Steel and Shipbuilding Co. of San Diego, Calif. The shipyard expects to start moulding steel in January.

Engineers are confident the platform will be stable enough. They are more concerned about trouble that may develop in the drilling process.

No one is certain what kind of rock will have to be penetrated in the mantle and in the deep-crust.

Mohole's engineers have designed a diamond bit that can run 120 hours in tough basaltic rock without replacement.

A reliable turbocore has been developed to supplant the conventional rotary method, in which the entire drill string had to turn. With the turbocore, salt water or drilling mud is pumped down the hole for power and only the bit turns. This saves wear and tear on the drill string.

In addition, a retractable drill bit is being explored. From all this, it is easy to see the Mohole project is a lot of trouble. But there does not appear to be any other way to find out what is inside the earth reach the earth's mantle before he can begin to understand the universe.

Nonetheless, the attempt to drill the mantle has stirred a bitter feud among scientists and politicians over the expense, and purpose of the project.

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War Could Cause Cut in Clothing

NEW YORK (AP) — American clothing next year because of increased military buying for the war, industry executives said Tuesday.

Both men's and women's buying supplies may be affected. "We are working at capacity all over time now," said Joseph D. Duffell, president of H. J. Duffell and Sons Inc., New York City.

Industry clothing must come out of civilian orders. The federal government last week ordered 1 million pairs of men's khaki trousers directly from clothing manufacturers because it had not received enough bids from companies willing to supply the garments in accelerated schedule.

The men's clothing manufacturers were operating close to capacity just filling civilian orders and generally were reluctant to get into the military market.

Orders of various textiles for the first three months of 1968 are expected to run about six percent above the September estimates, based on 40.5 million yards, Defense Supply Agency officials in New York said.

Cotton poplin cloth orders have been tripled to 6 million yards. A total of 15.4 million yards of rayon cloth orders have been added to the list.

Some buying offices in New York already have ordered 700,000 yards of fabric for the first three months of 1968.

That war-time comes when some deliveries already are more than one month behind schedule.
