U.S., Vietnamese Troops Look Forward to Christmas Truce; Air, Ground Combat Continue

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — U. S. troops and South Vietnamese troops looked ahead today to a 30-hour Christmas truce. But the fighting continued in the air with a 30th Air Force plane and ground forces in which 90 Viet Cong were claimed killed. A U. S. spokesman said the power plant 14 miles northeast of Hai Phong, which supplied 15 per cent of North Viet Nam's electricity, was "completely knocked out."

War Prisoner Camps May Be Necessary

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon is considering the possibility that at some point the United States may be compelled to operate its own system of prisoner-of-war camps in Viet Nam as the war grows bigger. Thus far, all Viet Cong and North Vietnamese captured by American units was turned over to the custody of the South Vietnamese forces. The total of POWs captured by U. S. units is small compared with the total taken by South Vietnamese units, probably no more than a few hundred. Saigon government officials would like to see that about 15,000 POWs have been taken since the beginning of 1962.

85 Believed Dead In Plane Wreckage

SAIGON (UPI) — Search planes have found the wreckage of two U. S. Air Force transport planes missing since earlier this month, American military spokesmen reported today. One plane carried 81 Vietnamese paratroopers and a four-man American crew. The spokesman said the wreckage of a U. S. Air Force C-124 carrying the Vietnamese air borne troops and U. S. crew was discovered on a mountainside 40 miles north of Nha-Trang. There appeared to be no survivors.

U. S. Should Stay at Odds With Soviets

BOON, Germany (AP) — Former Chancellor Konrad Adenauer says the United States should remain at odds with the Soviet Union but should not go to war with it. "And that's not a prediction," said Truman. Mars Flight Postponed Until 1973

WASHINGTON (AP) — The space agency Wednesday postponed until 1973 the first unmanned Voyager flight to Mars and planned for 1971, and added three new Mariner flights scheduled for 1967 and two to 1969.

The first Voyager mission had been scheduled to orbit Mars in 1967 and instrumented capsules had been planned for landing in 1968. No more missions had been scheduled for the Mariner, which made a successful flight to Mars this year and came within 21,000 miles of Venus in 1967.

Walker said local leaders discussed the situation with a representative of Gov. Johnson Wednesday.

WHEELING

WASHINGTON—Anybody mind if I shove in here a couple of lines about Santa Claus? I am tired of people kicking him around and poking fun at him and sneering that, anyway, he ain't, 'cause he's just a toy. The idea is to get one of the real nice guys never to appear in a fairy tale. Santa Claus is needed for Christmas. He is unique. He's the only guy in human history who ever came along and gave us a new name. When I was a boy, this all-merciful animal who was always looking for the catch when anything is held out to them for free. They take it, of course, but all the time they're saying to themselves "Now I suppose I'll have to go to bed tonight without kicking up a fuss."

Everyone Helps

All Idahoans should have experienced a feeling of pride when the Idaho Department of Commerce and Development received an award of merit for outstanding achievement in travel and tourist promotion. The award was presented at the 23rd annual United States Travel Conference of the National Association of Travel Organizations. Louise Shaddock, director of the Idaho Department of Commerce and Development, accepted the award. Although Miss Shaddock works hard at her task, she didn't hesitate to share the credit with others in her department, the quality of the product (Idaho) she sells and all the organizations and individuals who also help sell Idaho in the nation.

Officially, the award said, "To the Idaho Department of Commerce and Development for its promotional efforts in the state's sharpshooting tradition, to make a little budget do a big job, multiplying its tourist income fourfold in 10 years by careful selective planning." As Miss Shaddock was quick to point out, there are many reasons for the big growth in Idaho tourism and there's no intent to detract from Miss Shaddock and her splendid department in pointing to a few of them. First and foremost is Idaho itself. It's a wonderful vacationland offering the visitor a choice of many outdoor recreations in all seasons. Idaho has a way of impressing visitors who tell their friends about the Gem State. Then there are such sessions as the National Girl Scout Senior Roundup held last year in Idaho. This round-up is bound to increase travel to Idaho.

Getting down to the role of the individual Idahoan, the state's drawing points are publicized widely by such seemingly small items as sending a gift package of Idaho bakera to friends. Or perhaps the individual sends trout or apples or some other item to relatives elsewhere. Never underestimate the importance of such small gifts. It's impossible to know the number or the places they cover, but it could be considerable, especially at this time of year.

Then there are Idahoans who attend national conventions or conferences all around the nation. All their efforts on behalf of Idaho add up to a considerable and impressive factor in increasing the tourist trade.

It's possible to go on and on listing the many factors that have contributed to the increase in tourism. At some point in time in the future, a combined effort of all the state agencies, organizations and private individuals will bring more than just tourists to Idaho. Already considerable numbers of persons have been coming here for leisure or business. A study by California, which is noted for its livability. Accelerated industrial growth shouldn't be too far away.

Everyone living in Idaho can share in the credit for the selling job that's being done for the state. Of course, the lion's share of credit will have to go to Miss Shaddock and her crew of professionals. They've earned it.

USUAL HASSLE

The same old hassle over deer is raging in Utah now. In the wake of a season that was something less than sensational, sportsmen in some parts of Utah are screaming that deer herds have been reduced to "almost nothing." On the other hand, big game biologists are contending that Utah is getting close to the point where deer numbers come within "carrying capacity" winter ranges. There's never an common ground between this sort of uproar and neither does either manages to convince the other.

Magic Valley goes through that sort of thing all the time where the South Hills deer herd is concerned. Circumstances have proved both sides right at times. Once, the South Hills deer herd was touted as the largest in the nation for such a small area. Obviously, winter range was heavily overbowed. So the Fish and Game Department set about reducing the size of the herd. Only the experts missed and the herd was reduced more than anyone had anticipated.

Unfortunately, too many hunters recall the days-of-the-huge-deer-herd, regarding it as the ideal condition. Perhaps the South Hills could support a big herd of deer in open winter range, there can be only one result—starvation. A snow forces the animals to the low foothills. can't problem is to maintain a herd that available most of the winter range that browse plants year-round and not damaging hunting. So far, no one's come up with a formula that works all the time.

PARENTS? OK TOO

The point hereby is granted that parents generally have pretty clean records. Most of them do nice things for their children. They're not the kind of people who've just hooked a fancy jewelry to buy goldpans, or a pack of Melanchtrons. But even the most tolerant parent figures a kid gets a little less kind after getting a new set of trains or a doll that speaks three languages.

My male parent was mostly a good egg and he was a little back when I was a kid, such as the need for an Eddie Roth fielder's mit or a copy of "Tom Swift and His Flying Machine." But he was not without certain Macchavelian plans. He always managed to make it clear that it would be good business if that kindling wood got stacked or the cellar pipes before he went shopping. Or he would mutter velled thrice: "I don't see how a boy who can't pass arithmetic can expect anybody to give him a new fishing pole."

NO QUESTIONS ASKED This always made me loved me, because I liked to figure my kids out for myself and not for a lot of superficially being able to drive a lawnmower or do long division. Didn't my big brown eyes count for anything?

But Santa Claus is different. He put the stuff around the tree and then got lost; he never stuck around waiting for thanks or to make me promise to stop dipping Helena Rowley's pajamas in ink after she'd been told to bring gifts to school. He knew they had to have them or they would go into a decline and maybe run away from home and get a job killing lions.

THE GREAT FORGIVER Naturally, Pa talked a lot about the good things he did for me, and sometimes it got me worried and, even, resentful toward a parent who seemed a little too perfectly. After the first year I started to make up my mind about Santa Claus showed up on schedule and delivered the goods.

In short, Santa Claus was the only adult in my life who didn't demand on me. He didn't even seem to give a damn whether I washed my neck every morning. In a world so full of demands, he was the only one who didn't seem to care. He knew we'd get everything else, but it would be "out of the way" could also construct a guy without a gimmick.

Views of Others

OFFENSIVE CALLS
The telephone has provided an easy way to invade the privacy of a person's home. Although the phone has been around for a long time, it's only today that we are encouraged by the growing awareness of the problem and the resulting legislation that something can be done about it. There is a readiness to develop technological and legal countermeasures.

A new telephone threat to privacy is a mechanical device capable of tapping a telephone line in the unattended call, and even of calling back to complete its intended message.

E. William Hensley, chairman of the Federal Communications Commission (FCC), has called this a "mechanized invasion of privacy." So many commercial calls into the home have been thwarted.

We believe the American people would find "junk phone calls" more offensive than "junk mail" because the latter can be ignored, the sponsors might well be surprised at the adverse public reaction.

If this threatened invasion of privacy cannot be contained by the telephone companies, the FCC or Congress should act to protect private homes from what would be an intolerable nuisance.

Another telephone annoyance has been the anonymous caller with a distorted sense of humor and morality or with an intent to threaten others. In the face of technological advances, the FCC is beginning to take an interest in this section. The National Observer reports that the phone companies now have, and are successfully using, two different electronic call-tracing devices.

With these devices investigators can zero in on habitual offenders. Such offenders are being contacted by the FBI. Intimidation by telephone is a growing problem. Victims will request help. And the risk of apprehension will discourage potential offenders.

Another emphasis in the campaign for telephone privacy are encouraging. We believe the battle will ultimately be won.—Christian Science Monitor.

One of Man's Greater Works, Hoover Dam, Has 30th Year

Las Vegas, Nev. (AP)—In an area sometimes called the "Great Valley," Hoover Dam when completed, and plastic clothes are possible, Hoover Dam seems like pretty tame stuff. But the dam is one of man's greater achievements and its story marks its 30th anniversary of bringing order to the rambling Colorado River, maker of the Grand Canyon and lifeline of the desert Southwest. Until Hoover Dam, the 1,600-mile long river flowed through seven states, sometimes barely, other times causing floods such as in 1905 when the river sunk the entire rich Imperial Valley of Southern California. Now the dam's reservoir, Lake Mead, holds two years' river flow. Colorado water irrigates most southwestern crops and its energy lights millions of homes. And the Bureau of Reclamation says, the Colorado will flood no more.

The problem of making the Colorado respond to rein for the first time was fantastic. The dam, built as one of the seven engineering wonders of America, according to the American Society of Civil Engineers. Basically, the builders — six giant Western construction companies — hacked three miles of diversion tunnels through the steep, solid-rock sides of Boulder Canyon, built one earthen dam to divert the waters into the tunnels around the dam site, built another dam to stop the water from backing up, then built Hoover itself.

Some uncommon logistics were involved. Some 5,000 depression-era workers were hired and brought through Las Vegas. Boulder City was built near the dam to house them. A railroad and highway were built as were two concrete-making plants, a gravel-screeding machine, an aerial tramway between the canyon walls, and power lines strung from San Bernardino, Calif., 200 miles away.

When all was done, the highest dam in the world stood 60 stories high, 665 feet thick at the base, 45 at the crest, holding back Lake Mead which could cover all New York State with water one foot deep.

Hoover was the first of many great dams along the Colorado and forerunner of higher dams in Switzerland, Rhodesia and India. The dam itself was finished in two years — two years ahead of schedule — at a cost of \$81 million.

President Franklin D. Roosevelt dedicated the dam in May of 1935, opening new vistas for

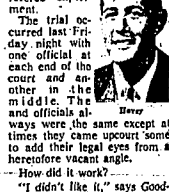

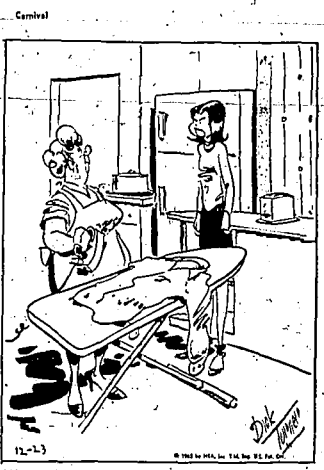

Riding Gemini Spacecraft Like Living in Oxygen Tent

Riding a Gemini spacecraft through space is like living in an oxygen tent without daring to raise the flap.

Outside, there is nothing. Inside, there is a strange atmosphere of some 93 per cent oxygen, 5 per cent water vapor. But for the astronaut, "it is his own portable world."

He inhales and exhales 12 times a minute. Each breath brings his lungs 30½ cubic inches of oxygen. He uses some two pounds worth of oxygen a day — just to breathe.

The atmospheric pressure is five pounds per square inch, about one-third of what it is on earth.

But it works. It keeps him alive for up to 14 days, witness Gemini 7 astronauts Frank Borman, an Army lieutenant colonel, and James A. Lovell, Jr., a Navy lieutenant commander. They lived those 14 days in space on the nearly perfect oxygen atmosphere.

It filled their space cabin, and it circulated through their suits, when they were wearing them. It was precious — and escapable.

If they opened their hatches, it would have all escaped in one-gasp-into-the-emptiness. They could still have lived, if they had their own oxygen tanks.

That's why any flame in the spacecraft cabin could be especially dangerous. You could get it out of control, by opening the hatches on the cabin, and without oxygen; there would be no fire.

There are drawbacks to a totally pure oxygen atmosphere. You can smoke in an airplane when it flies clear of its own engine fumes. You can't smoke in an oxygen-filled spacecraft cabin, if you value your skin.

Burning is, of course, the combining of certain fuels with oxygen at usually high temperatures. The more oxygen, the faster the burning. Light a match, and it would flare-down to your fingertips in an oxygen-pure atmosphere. Light a cigarette, and you might as well be smoking an explosive fuse.

Smith, Salt Lake City. They are part of a group of 90 serving in West Berlin for about two years as door-to-door missionaries for the LDS Church.

The group has appeared on West Berlin radio and television as well as performing primarily along the fashionable Kurfurstendamm Boulevard. The Mormons also have directed a street nativity scene with which to draw attention to their faith.

Tim Bronnahn, 21, Pico Rivera, Calif., acts as spokesman for the group. After a recent street session by the carol singers, Bronnahn gave an interviewer a rundown of the Mormon program in West Berlin.

He said there are about 2,500 Mormons in the Communist-Isolated city served by six churches.

NEW YORK (UPI) — Each holiday season brings in a crop of new toys, but the old favorites continue to rack up the higher-sales total.

Scholar Had Doubts on Famous Poem

"Twas the night before Christmas, when all through the house,

No creature was stirring, not even a mouse."

With these lines begins the familiar poem, "A visit from St. Nicholas." Today, this poem is a treasured part of the lore of Christmas, often quoted and published at the Yuletide season.

Surprisingly, the poet who created it was far from proud of his work.

A distinguished Biblical scholar and professor of divinity, Dr. Clement Clark Moore wrote the poem for the amusement of his children at Christmas in 1822. A visitor in the home at the time copied it and had it published a year later in the Troy, N.Y., Sentinel.

The poem appeared anonymously, because Dr. Moore felt that he, as a professor of divinity, should not be associated with such "undignified" work.

For more than 20 years, he refused to take credit for the poem. In 1844 the poem was published and for the first time credited to its creator, Clement Clark Moore.

Venezuelan Yule Recipe Is Varied

CARACAS (UPI) — Ask 15 Venezuelan families for their recipes for hallacas and you'll get a dozen different recipes.

No two families make this traditional Christmas food exactly the same way, says Ana Cresca Cifuentes, who has conducted a daily cooking show on Radio Caracas Television since 1954.

Hallacas vaguely resemble tamales, in that fillings are enclosed in a corn-meat crust, wrapped in banana leaves and boiled. But they are not highly spiced. The fillings are made with meat or poultry or both, said Mrs. Cifuentes.

She added that every recipe uses such basic ingredients as corn meal, tomatoes, onions and green olives, but some cooks in the Andes region add potatoes and beans to the filling and Caraqueños residents of Caracas sometimes add nuts and grapes.

Mrs. Cifuentes said the hallacas always are served for Christmas Eve dinner, usually as part of a buffet. But they're also exchanged like Christmas gifts throughout the holiday season, so that friends and relatives get a chance to sample each others' recipes, which have been handed down from generation to generation.

Other elements of a traditional Christmas dinner in Venezuela include roast stuffed turkey or ham cooked in dark beer or both, salads including a fruit salad called Corona do Navidad (Christmas crown), French style bread containing cut-up ham and olives, papaya slices in heavy syrup, dark fruit cake containing chocolate, dried fruit and nuts.

BERLIN (UPI)—Christmas reunions here are hampered by the ugly Communist Wall which divides two worlds.

The Communists added a new tradition to Christmas here in 1953 when they allowed West Berliners for the first time in more than two years to make one-day visits to their relatives in East Berlin.

The West Berliners went through the Wall by the hundreds of thousands, starting in the bone-chilling darkness of 7 a. m. and not returning until the Communist midnight curfew.

The reunions went on for two weeks through the Christmas season. They were repeated in 1954.

The Communists, seeking political capital, made it doubtful almost until the last minute this year whether Business East and West could have the only Christmas gift they really wanted.

But an agreement finally was reached on Nov. 24 after talks that had dragged on since June.

One question the Communists had never left in doubt—East Berliners, except for the aged and infirm, would not be allowed to go to West Berlin.

It was in tribute to the 17 million East Berliners locked in their Communist satellite that other unique West Berlin Christmas customs started.

On Christmas Eve the 26-mile barbed wire perimeter between West Berlin and surrounding East Germany twinkled with the light of thousands of candles.

Practically every home and shop along the border, and many deeper inside the city, has at least one candle in the window as a symbol to the fellow-

Island Young Believe Santa Uses Boat

SEATTLE, Wash. (UPI)—Generations of kids have known Santa Claus as an air traveler but youngsters on the lonely Pribilof Islands, Santa's own backyard, would scoff at that. They know he comes by boat.

And it's no easy journey for man of his years? The trip actually starts here in late November when the MV motor vessel Pribilof loads up with goods and gifts, bought by catalog.

It's a mean trip in the winter, according to Capt. Fred Langheim, skipper of the vessel which makes four trips a year to the islands of St. George and St. Paul.

The Pribilofs are located in the Bering Sea, about 250 miles off the coast of Alaska. The birds "Alzums" who "live" there rely on the ship to supply most of their needs.

The Pribilof left here for the islands late in November and was expected back by Christmas.

Among the items aboard this trip were fireworks. The inhabitants of the desolate islands set off their fireworks on New Year's Eve since the Fourth of July falls during the long Arctic "day" when the sun never really sets for months on end.

Old Beliefs Often Dimmed Yule Spirit

"Merry" Christmas? Not always, according to some ancient beliefs once associated with the day.

Take, for instance, the old belief that cattle and other stable animals were given the power of speech on Christmas Eve. Any person who heard the animals speak would die within a year, so superstition said.

Somber omens of death were read into still other Yuletide legends. When the Yule log burned, bystanders were told to watch the shadows on the walls. If the shadows of any person appeared to be headless, this supposedly meant death for those persons, again within a year.


Salt was also said to have the power of forecasting life or death when used in connection with Christmas. The text could mean death within 12 months, be made by leaving a spoonful of salt on the table on Christmas Eve. If the salt melted, it was for a long and healthy life.

A warm hearth... a big outburst... the scampering... the duties to do... a scolding... a dependable father... a tender mother... as they were to Jesus.

He always cherished the perspective of childhood... To belong the kingdom of God... He later described it... after being harassed by a mob... his family... for at least the first three years of his life... gravitated back to tribal territory... the northern upland of Galilee.

There, as he related in primitive Christian writings not accepted in the Church's later compilation of the Gospels, the boy Jesus roamed the hills and wooded draws, gathered firewood, drew water, squatted by a brook and moulded toys of wet clay, romped in the pastures when he learned that Archelaus, a rapacious son of Herod, was Rome's new ruler in southern Israel. "He was afraid to go there," as scripture notes.

Turmoil raged in that region with peasant-occupation-leagues executing rebellious Jewish throngs en masse, including 3,000 at a riot in the Jerusalem temple. Resistance also smoldered in Galilee, but it was more remote from reprisals.

This was particularly so of Nazareth, a bucolic little town of plowmen, shopkeepers, field-hirelings and sheep raisers, situated on a curving mountain-side overlooking the Plain of Esdraelon to the south.

Exchange Club Has Talk on Filing Income Tax Returns

Elden Evans, local certified public accountant, gave pointers on how to save on income tax during a meeting of the Twin Falls Exchange Club Tuesday noon at Wray's Cafe.

He emphasized that his pointers were meant to help prepare returns and avoid paying excessive income tax, not evade tax. "There's a world of difference,"

First, Evans noted, level out your income. If you operate on a cash basis, you can adjust the date of billing for December.

If your income already is running higher this year, wait and send out the bills so the income will be in next year's tax period. If the income is lower, send them out now so most payments will be made before the end of the year.

Commenting on how to handle stocks and bonds, Evans pointed out that the business interest loss by selling some stocks, then using this loss as a deduction. He added that any loss in excess of \$2,000 can be spread out over future years and that the same stocks can be repurchased after 30 days.

In discussing expenses and deductions, Evans used fertilizer as an example. The cash-basis farmer can, in effect, accrue expenses. Fertilizer on the ground can be listed either as an expense in the current year or for next year.

Depending on the taxpayer's situation, deductions can be bunches together one year, then itemized the next year.

"Sales tax is deductible," said Evans, adding that the Internal Revenue Service has a table of guidelines for use in estimating how much sales tax most families would deduct. The table is based on average salaries and for different sizes of families. Evans noted the guide does not take large purchases into consideration and they must be added to those listed in the table.

Other deductions, he said, include travel expenses incurred in receiving medical treatment, and expenses paid out of the volunteer's own pocket while working for a charity organization.

In conclusion, Evans noted about five per cent of all returns filed are pulled for more detailed examination—usually those of professional men, businessmen, farmers or those claiming extraordinary deductions.

He added there currently is a two-year delay in trying tax cases in court.

Evans was introduced by Francis Egbert, program chairman, who said next week's guest speaker will be Capt. Ray Young, who recently returned from duty in Viet Nam as a helicopter pilot.

Evergreen Is Favorite Yule Tree

In Christmas trees, it's the spirit that counts.

"Almost anything can be made into a Christmas tree. In Minneapolis, Minn., they even made a tree out of water pipes, fastened like spokes to a telephone pole, and appropriately decorated."

In Wilmington, N.C., a live oak more than 300 years old is adorned at the Yuletide with colorful ornaments and electric lights. In Indianapolis, Ind., they decorate the 216-foot Soldiers and Sailors Monument with electric candles and stars.

The U.S. National Christmas Tree, officially designated in 1926, is not an evergreen but a giant redwood, located in Kings Canyon National Park, Calif. This unusual Christmas tree, called the "General Grant," is 3,500 years old.

"Many families prefer the 'permanent' Christmas tree,"

often made of aluminum. Despite all this, the time-tested favorite tree is still the evergreen. Most people, if asked, would probably vote for the "fir tree."

Actually, there are nearly 40 species of the popular "fir tree" found in the mountains of our region (Central and Southern Europe, Asia north of the Himalayas and North America).

A frequently-seen Christmas tree variety is the "balsam fir," also called "Canada balsam" or "Balm of Gilead," according to the Encyclopedia Americana. This is one of the most common trees of eastern North America, extending from Virginia and West Virginia to the United States to Labrador and Newfoundland.

The balsam fir may grow to 40 or 50 feet tall. The southern fir is of about the same height and is found in the mountains of Virginia, North Carolina and Tennessee.

Other American firs are essentially Western. They include

the grand fir, the Alpine fir, the red fir, the Shasta red fir and the noble fir. These firs may attain 250 feet in height.

In Canada, the exporting of Christmas trees, including fir, pine and spruce, is important business. Seven provinces export trees, to countries as far away as Venezuela.

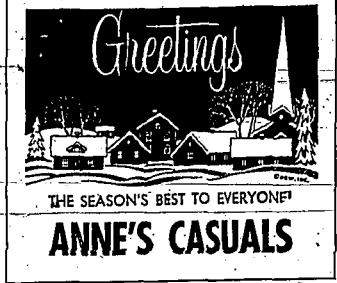

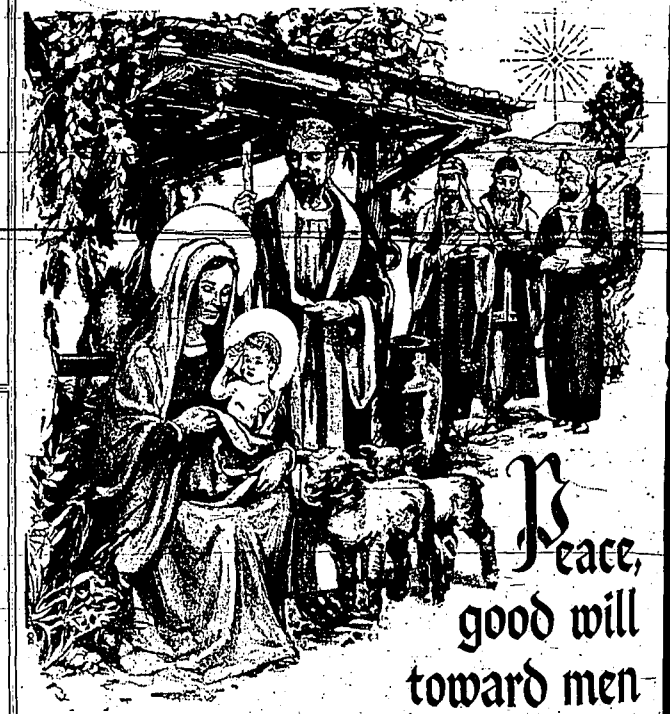

Deserts consisted of cakes of maple sugar or sunflower seeds and nuts, topped with a sauce of boiled dried berries.

Since the Star shines on Bethlehem, lights have been a part of Christmas celebrations. Today, candlelight services are traditionally held by many churches at Christmas.


