

Heavy Snowfall Treats Area to White Christmas

The whitest Christmas in years greeted Magic Valley Sunday morning, with the entire area reporting two or more inches of snow on the ground at 8 a.m.—and in most of the area it kept snowing throughout the day. Roads were slick and snow-covered throughout Magic Valley and kept drivers wary and travel at a minimum. As a result, no great increase in traffic accidents was noted. Happiest of all at the seasonal snowfall were operators of ski resorts and their clientele.

Hilo Crater Stages Yule Eruption

HILO, Hawaii (AP)—Kilauea volcano erupted in a surprise Christmas Eve eruption Friday night, but most of the colorful activity occurred before anyone could see it. However, earthquake activity was so severe that observers were apprehensive about whether the eruption was over. The brief eruption, caught them by surprise.

The series of earthquakes which followed the eruption were continuing with one strong quake to be felt every three to four minutes.

Several eruptions in Kilauea, Alohi crater spewed hot fountains of lava without the usual warning. Ordinarily there are several earthquakes prior to an eruption.

Alohi crater—where the last eruption was December 19, 1964—erupted suddenly at 9:30 p.m. Friday and ejected lava down the 4,000-foot crater.

The fountains of red and orange lava lit up the skies, but for more than an hour.

Pope Appeals to Leaders for Peace

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Taking a dramatic step in personal diplomacy, Pope Paul VI appealed directly to the leaders of North and South Viet Nam Saturday to turn the Christmas cease-fire into a permanent peace.

In a Christmas without precedent in Vatican annals, a papal official announced Saturday morning that the spiritual leader of Roman Catholicism had messengered his appeal directly to North Vietnamese President Ho Chi Minh in Hanoi and to South Viet Nam President Nguyen Van Thieu in Saigon.

SAIGON (AP)—The Viet Cong carried out "several low level attacks" against U.S. and Vietnamese forces before the end of a 30-hour Christmas cease-fire period, a U.S. military spokesman said Sunday. There had been rumors and speculation that the cease-fire, which was scheduled to expire at midnight Christmas night, might be extended, but the widely scattered Communist actions appeared to mean that the war was on again.

NEWARK, N.J. (AP)—Christmas Eve turned into a day of tragedy when two fires claimed the lives of 11 persons and injured 30 others.

Three persons, apparently attending Christmas parties, died Friday when holiday decorations in the lobby of the Military Park Hotel ignited a Christmas tree fire. Two hundred persons were evacuated as thousands of Christmas shoppers watched the spectacle in the city.

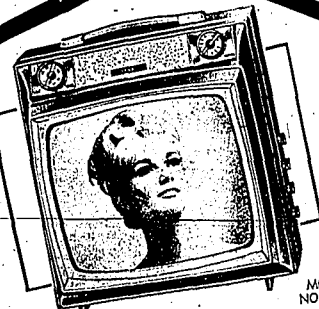

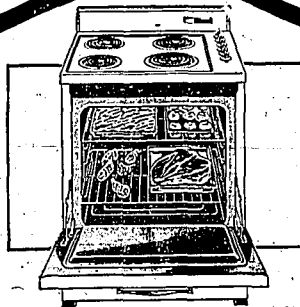

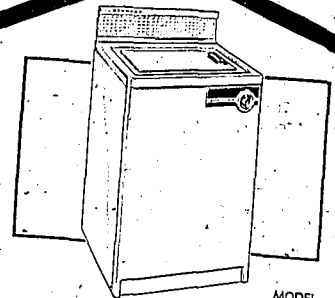

ORDER-SIGNED
REXBURG (AP)—Judge Willard C. Burton, 12th Judicial District, Friday signed an order committing Duane Martineau, 26-year-old Idaho Falls man, to the Idaho State Hospital, South for treatment and evaluation, before taking any further court action.

Martineau had pleaded innocent Wednesday to a charge of second degree kidnaping and at that time his court-appointed attorney, W. B. Kennedy, Rexburg, had been granted a request that his client be sent to the Blackfoot institution for observation. The judge said that Martineau should be given ample time for treatment and observation, even as much as six months if necessary.

Martineau is accused of kidnaping Kathleen Trout, 19, a Ricks College coed from Arvada, Colo., and holding her overnight last Nov. 11.

POPULATION UP
BOISE (UPI)—An increase in population for Ammon in Bonneville County was certified Friday by Secretary of State Arnold Williams.

Williams said the Census Bureau after a special survey listed the population of the town as 2,438, compared with the 1960 Census figure of 1,832. The town will receive additional state funds because of its larger population.

DISCONTINUATION OKAYED
BOISE (AP)—The Union Pacific Railroad has been authorized to discontinue operation of its agency at Frankfort in Southern Idaho, said the Public Utilities Commission said Friday.

Since H&H the agency has operated only from June 1 through Oct. 31, the PUC said, but revenue has been insufficient to justify even that limited operation.

HONORS PLANNED
BOISE (AP)—The State Aeronautics Department again in 1966 will honor fliers with good safety records, Director Chet Moulton said Friday.

He said a series of award dinners will be held over the state during February and March.

TRUSTY CAUGHT
BOISE (UPI)—Kenneth Clarence Davis, 32, a trusty who escaped from Idaho State prison Oct. 8, has been nabbed at Cheyenne, Wyo. Warden L. E. Clapp reported Friday.

Davis was working at an outside heating plant when he walked away. He was serving a sentence for larceny in absentia without funds in Twin Falls County.

NEGOTIATIONS COMPLETED
FORT HALL (UPI)—Bureau of Indian Affairs officials said Saturday negotiations have been completed for a development lease covering 2,300 acres on the Fort Hall Indian Reservation. The land will be leased by Harry Katzeanes, Blackfoot, for a term of 10 years. Katzeanes will pay \$2 per acre per year.

Fort Hall Supt. John L. Pappan said the land now returns about 21 cents an acre per year to its Indian owners. He said Katzeanes agreed to develop the land so it may be adapted to sprinkler irrigation. Improvements will be on the property of the Fort Hall Irrigation Project upon installation.

DEADLINE GIVEN
BOISE (AP)—The last day of the year, Dec. 31, was listed today as the deadline for registering for the State Aeronautics Department-sponsored tour of Mexico.

Aeronautics Director Chel Moulton said pilots must register by that time if they expect to have brief reservations. The 15th annual Mexican tour is scheduled Feb. 9-26.

SPEAKERS SCHEDULED
IDAH0 FALLS (AP)—Leading political speakers have been lined up for the Idaho Jaycee convention to take place in Idaho Falls the week of April 13. Monte Howell, state convention chairman, announced at the Jaycee meeting.

Howell said the U.S. Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, has accepted the speaking invitation but that former Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona had declined.

PETITION DENIED
BOISE (UPI)—Idaho's Supreme Court Friday denied a petition for rehearing of its decision declaring the Warped Road in Nez Perce County private property.

On Nov. 24, the high court overturned a district court ruling that declared the road to be public property. The Supreme Court said the county had abandoned the road.

Prosecutor Roy E. Mosman of Lewiston sought the rehearing.

MAN KILLED
LEWISTON (UPI)—Idaho had recorded its first traffic fatality of the Christmas holiday Saturday after the finding of a wrecked car off the Webb Ridge near Lewiston.

Killed when his car plunged down a 400-foot embankment was Floyd E. Strenten, Lewiston. The spot is about 2.5 miles south of Lewiston.

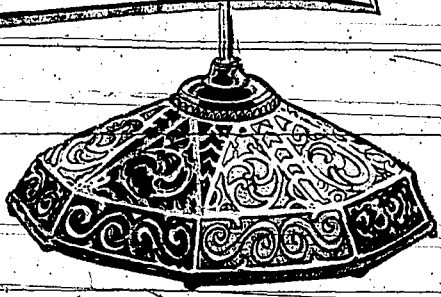

Government Experts Think Economy Will Grow \$40 Billion in 1966

WASHINGTON (AP)—Government experts believe the nation's economy will expand by another \$40 billion in 1966.

They are confident of continued prosperity — so confident that the most pressing worry is the rapid military build-up in Vietnam and the momentum of living prices resulting from the rise in prices of steadily rising business activity.

In contrast, economists a year ago expressed some concern about a dip in business activity during 1965.

Even the higher interest rates applied by the Federal Reserve Board are not likely to stop the economic boom.

The four members of the board who voted for the move believe the only effect will be to contain the fast-moving express from jumping the track.

At least some administration officials share this view, even though they — and President Johnson — criticized the board for acting in early December.

Some six or seven weeks before the annual announcement of the federal budget and its probable impact on the economy.

By a 4-3 vote, the board raised the discount rate — the interest paid by banks when they borrow from the Federal Reserve — from 4 to 4.5 per cent. The rate is the highest in nearly three decades. It was designed as a checkrein on an economy that has shown more sustained growth than any previous peacetime boom.

The gross national product — the total of all goods and services produced during the year — is expected to be \$672 billion for 1965 compared to \$623.7 billion in 1964.

The GNP should be running at an annual rate of more than \$70 billion within two or three months and the 1966 total is estimated at \$710 billion to \$715 billion.

This forecast by government officials could be easily surpassed if spending for the Vietnam war continues to mushroom and if the higher rates on credit fail to dampen business enthusiasm.

As in the past several years, government officials say the line for balancing the national accounts is just around the corner. However, they now have set a definite target for 1966 — a deficit of \$2.8 billion — the balance of payments of not more than \$250 million.

The deficit — more dollars going overseas than returning — probably will run about \$1.5 billion for 1965. It was \$2.8 billion in 1964.

Last February the government persuaded banks and business to impose limits on their loans and investments in other countries. The bank program was highly successful and accounted for a large proportion of the balance of payments improvement in 1965.

However, corporations continued to build-plants overseas at an expanding rate of investment. The administration in early December asked the internationally minded companies to set more definite goals.

No action is contemplated, officials said, in regard to the last remaining large dollar gap: the dollars carried overseas by record numbers of American tourists.

The balance of payments has been in deficit for 11 of the past 15 years because payments to foreigners exceed payments from foreigners.

If large amounts of dollars collect in official foreign government vaults, they frequently swap them for U.S. gold. This resulted in a loss of some \$1.3 billion in 1965 from the U.S. gold

stock, which now stands at about \$13.8 billion.

The domestic economy's performance in 1965 set a record for next year would establish another one. However, records of this sort are automatic if the economic system is in good condition. In fact, a \$40-billion gain in 1966 still would be slightly below the percentage increase in GNP in 1965.

One economist said: "We need another \$40-billion advance next year just to absorb the additions to the labor force next year — in other words, to keep unemployment close to 4 per cent."

A year ago administration economists were worried about a letdown in the latter half of 1965. A multistage excise tax and a 1 per cent increase in Social Security pensioners' benefits were put into effect.

Even with these stimulants, there was some concern that heavy steel inventories following the May-to-September labor crisis and the increase in Social Security taxes next year might be enough to cause a down-spiral.

Now, the economic doctors believe the scales may have been tipped the other way.

They are concerned about holding business on a controllable course in order to avert inflation. Prices of industrial commodities started moving upward after remaining virtually unchanged for 4 1/2 years, and the rate of increase in consumer prices rose after holding at 1.5 per cent or less for several years.

The administration started two years ago exhorting business and labor to exercise restraint on price and wage increases, and it has recubed its

efforts in the past few months. Aluminum and copper was released from government stockpiles to head off price increases. Johnson used his persuasive technique — help bring about wage settlements in the steel and maritime industries.

Mid-October spending scheduled to rise as much as \$4 billion and total federal spending by \$7 billion to \$8 billion in the current fiscal year, a slight easing of consumer enthusiasm might be welcome.

However, consumer surveys indicate continued strong demand in key areas. There seems to be no end in sight to the booming automobile sales and the steady upward trend in purchases of color television sets and other household goods.

Housing continues in the doldrums in comparison to some good years in the past.

Businessmen also are in a free-spending mood. They scheduled a 13 per cent increase in investment in plant and equipment — the fourth straight substantial rise. Higher interest

rates would cause a cutback in some projects.

The higher Social Security taxes which take effect January 1 will help slightly in dampening consumer buying pressure since take-home pay will be lowered for most employees. There will be no offsetting government expenditures — immediately since the program of medical care for the aged does not get under way until July 1.

However, the higher payroll taxes to finance the new program also will cut another way: the matching portion paid by businessmen means an additional cost of doing business and therefore an argument for raising prices.

Although federal administrative budget spending — which does not include Social Security and other trust funds — is scheduled to rise to perhaps as much as \$18 billion, this will be partly offset by rising revenues. The official forecast still stands at \$65.5 billion, but there seems little doubt that the actual figure will be higher.

Even with lower income tax rates and the excise tax cuts this past year, tax receipts are probably higher than the previous year and they may top \$100 billion for the fiscal year which ends next June 30.

The reason for the continued rise in tax revenues, despite income and excise rate cuts, is simple: there is more income to be taxed. Corporate profits have reached an annual rate of \$25 billion in 1965. After taxes, corporate profits amount to more than \$45 billion, a rise of more than 80 per cent since early 1961.

Personal income — which includes all types of payments to individuals — has grown from \$116 billion in 1961 to more than \$540 billion. The average weekly wage for a factory worker has increased from \$55 to \$105 in six years.

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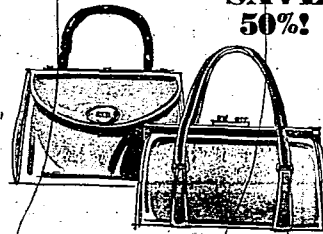

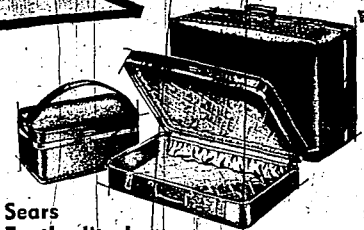

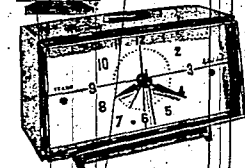

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Chileans-Bid Farewell to Old Year and Siesta System

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP)—Chileans will bid farewell to more than the old year next week—the siesta also will be departing.

Gone, or at least going from the major cities, will be the stop-and-go system under which a typical office or store opens at 9:30 a.m., closes at 1 p.m., re-opens at 3 or 4 p.m., and closes for the day at 7 or 7:30.

In its place will come a routine under which the office would open at 9 a.m. and close at 5 p.m., with employees taking staggered half-hour lunch breaks.

All this promises a revolution in everything from drinking habits to family life.

"It's the greatest thing that ever has happened to Chilean wives," one woman said. "At least our husbands will be com-

ing home in the evenings to help with the children instead of showing up after we have put them to bed."

The government seems in sympathy. The decree on the new system of hours specifies that bars and restaurants must close 4 1/2 p.m.

But the mandatory 3 p.m. closing, the abbreviated lunch period and the earlier starting time add up to disaster for the restaurant business, in the opinion of one owner.

"What can we serve in a half hour?" he asked. "A sandwich isn't a Chilean meal. That's an American meal, and the Americans can live on it because they eat breakfast. We Chileans don't eat breakfast. We need a real lunch."

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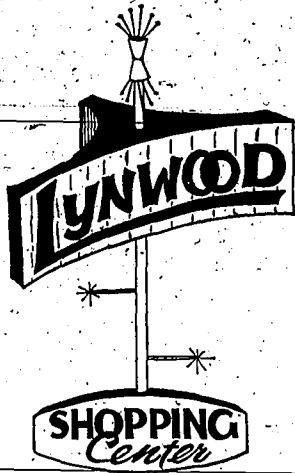

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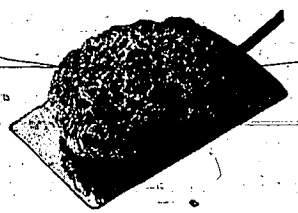

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Politics, Education Seen As Top 1966 News Matter

BOISE (AP)—As Idaho heads toward the new year, politics and education—as one subject—are bound to emerge as top stories in 1966, all because of the sales tax enacted by the last legislature.

Coming up will be the referendum on the tax and political races from the governor's office on down. The two are inseparably bound in the view of the Idaho Education Assn.

The IEA's position on the tax is well-known. Politics, however, enters the picture because the IEA says it will not support a gubernatorial candidate who is opposed to the tax.

"We're going to work for and support the candidate who supports the sales tax," Wayne York, executive secretary, said in an interview.

Asked if this would mean a public endorsement, York indicated this would not be made. But he added, the public and Idaho's teachers would "get the point" on where the IEA stands with regard to the candidates and the tax.

The IEA position is understandable because of the great increase in appropriations the tax has produced this biennium. For the 1963-65 biennium,

York said, the Idaho Legislature appropriated \$40 million for education.

This went up to \$37.3 million in the 1963 session, he said, noting more than 40 per cent of sales tax revenue was earmarked for Idaho education.

The groundwork for the program campaign has already begun. York forecasts acceleration and accentuation of the drive next year after the delegate assembly meets March 25-26.

Working closely with Forward Idaho and the Idaho Unified Education Council, the IEA plans to bring its campaign all the way down to local school districts.

"We must be concerned, we think, with showing what changes, what new innovations, what's happened because of the tax and additional appropriations on the local level," York said.

The campaign so far includes distribution of thousands of pamphlets and coordination with the other two organizations involved.

"We're going to produce a 15-minute color film, set up signs at the two state fairs and... set up a peaking bureau to break this down on a school district level to show what the sales tax has done for the local district," York said.

Some city residents, however, have expressed opposition to the tax law because it provided extra exemptions for the state's cattlemen, ranchers, sheepmen and farmers.

York acknowledged expression of these sentiments. But he described the exemptions as "political expediency" to get the proposal through the legislature.

Many of the state's lawmakers are farmers and ranchers when the family moved to Filer where he operated a trucking business with his son, Bill, until his health caused his retirement.

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

 "Go get 'em, Snake!"
 That was the last thing Floyd Patterson heard before he and heavyweight champion Cassius Clay crossed gloves in a 15-minute bout in Las Vegas. It was the last of a week-long psychological preparation course that Patterson took with hypnotherapist Johnny Aladdin, 61, currently showing at Cactus Pete's in Jackpot. Aladdin, who is the first to admit he is still an entertainer and was invited on this offbeat ride, used his hypnosis to relax Patterson and help clear his troubled mind.
 "I was working at the Thunderbird, the same place Patterson was working out," Aladdin says. "Some of the boys in his camp saw me and then Floyd came down to see my act. He thought perhaps I could help him and contacted me on the possibility. I was interested."
 But Aladdin wants this strictly understood. He's an entertainer without pretense to psychological education. "The only things I could call on were my hypnosis and a general background coming from knocking around the world," he says.
 Patterson's biggest trouble, as anyone who's read anything about him in the past few years would know, was insidious self-doubt which cost him peace of mind and inability to relax. He confided to Aladdin that he could sleep but obtain little rest in about the last week before a fight. This was one area that Aladdin was confident.

"Patterson is a very intelligent man," he reports. "So when I started I expected he would take 30 minutes to put him (Patterson) in a deeply relaxed state. The first session lasted 20 minutes but I couldn't get him to go all the way. Still he said afterward he believed it had helped and he invited me back. We set it up on a close-work basis, every night at 6. The second session he wasn't fighting anymore and I called him very well. That night he slept well and did so every night thereafter."
 Aladdin went to a three-ring attack on the post-of-mind bit. "We all know about the beard (the night after a defeat Patterson disguised himself and fled), and the two bad showings against Liston. He didn't want another of these. He was afraid of physical punishment, but was afraid to let anyone down again."
 "This was all a week before the fight and he was already starting to wonder about what he'd be doing the day after the fight," Aladdin continued. "Aladdin, who spent several years in the Orient, switched to a Zen theory on this matter."
 "We talked Floyd into thinking the fight and he was already starting to wonder about what he'd be doing the day after the fight," Aladdin continued. "Aladdin, who spent several years in the Orient, switched to a Zen theory on this matter."
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"We figured Clay's five per cent came from the faith of millions of Moslems throughout the world. There are millions of them and he is their gladiator. We told Patterson he had a similar army, the millions of others who were against the beliefs of Clay and sympathetic to him."
 "So we talked the extra five per cent into his fist. He worked on the bag and each time he'd hit it, he'd think 'five per cent, forcing the fist to exert that extra bit, that sudden explosion."
 The third thing was mind pictures.
 "All the things being said about the invincibility of Clay, his own memory of the quick knockouts by Liston and other things tended to put negative thinking in Patterson's mind. Unless you can visually see yourself dominating a foe, there's little chance it will happen. So we talked Patterson into seeing mental pictures of himself standing over a prone Clay. And we added what we called 'cold, controlled fury' in which everything went in keeping the man on the ropes. We didn't mean a sudden impassioned, flailing attack, but a devastating one that was planned punch by punch."
 But Aladdin also went one step farther, although he didn't consider this part of the three-part phase preparation.
 He reminded Patterson that Clay's action showed the champ to be anything but a stable, confident, invincible fighter.
 "You remember he wanted to quit against Liston when he got some lint in his eyes. They forced him back out into the ring and minutes later he was the champion of the world. Clay has anything but controlled,

cold fury. They have trouble getting him to a neutral corner after he gets knocked down. He can't control himself. We suggested the possibility that Clay might do anything including running out of the ring."
 "We had Floyd prepared for anything at the weigh-in. A bunch of carrots, Clay tossing a live rabbit—you know Clay called Patterson 'Rabbit'—at him, anything to upset him. At our last session, just as an afterthought before bringing Patterson back, I said 'and be ready if he does nothing. That can be most upsetting if you're prepared for anything else.' And that, if you'll recall, is exactly what Clay did—nothing. Later we learned he did have a rabbit in his car but decided not to use it."
 The "snake" reference to Patterson at fight time followed the pattern established early by Clay.
 "He compares everything with animals. Liston was the bear, Patterson the rabbit. He sees himself as a floating butterfly with a sting of a bee. One night I touched on these similes and told Patterson he was like a great, well-conditioned snake that appeared asleep but in reality was alert and ready to strike. Floyd later said he liked that comparison very much."
 After the session his handler asked how I had happened to mention snake since Floyd has had reptiles as pets and is more or less fascinated by them. "Then after the last session the handler said 'I'm going to be the last man in the ring with him. Give me something to say. One line that'll set him up,'

suggested go get 'em, snake and the handler said 'that's it, I'll do it.'"
 "But Aladdin wants little credit for Patterson's showing that night."
 "Physically he is intelligent. I know he would have prepared himself by the time of the fight. I was brought in to help—that would be a good word—his thoughts. In the first session I specified that he had the prerogative to accept or reject any of my ideas. He is too smart to go any other way. If he had been forced to retain anything that he didn't want, he would have been a different person. I was merely have upset him more."
 "There was nothing mentioned about his supposedly 'glass jaw.' Physically he hasn't one. Mentally perhaps he did. There is a split second when a man on the verge of being knocked out either fights back or decides to let go. Perhaps our sessions did help Floyd's 'glass jaw' in this way." Aladdin continued.
 "Physically, Clay didn't hurt him. Clay's knuckles were bruised and showed bumps after the fight but the 'glass jaw' didn't break."
 Aladdin said nothing was mentioned about the back problem that eventually proved Patterson's undoing. "This was never mentioned, so we never touched on it. Perhaps we could have helped. But I believe this was a sudden, unforeseen thing."
 "The last time I saw Patterson was the morning after the fight. I walked him out to his car. On the way he put his arm around me and said 'Well, you fixed my mind, baby, but you couldn't fix my back.' I haven't heard from him since and there was never any agreement that

any relationship would follow." Aladdin said.
 So what did Aladdin get out of all this?
 "Well," he says with a smile, "if Patterson had won I was lined up to sell this story to Life for \$5,000. But it didn't work out that way and it doesn't particularly bother me. As the story got around of what I was doing, people started looking at me a

little differently. Not as just an entertainer but as a man whose talent could be used by a world champion. Even now I get letters from people all over the world asking me to help them with their problems. I'm an entertainer. I plan to remain one. It was a great week in my life. I met and became friends with a great man. Maybe it will help my life and career in entertain-

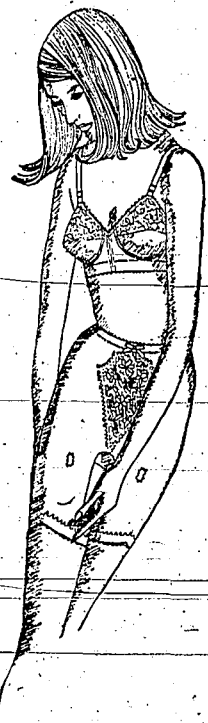

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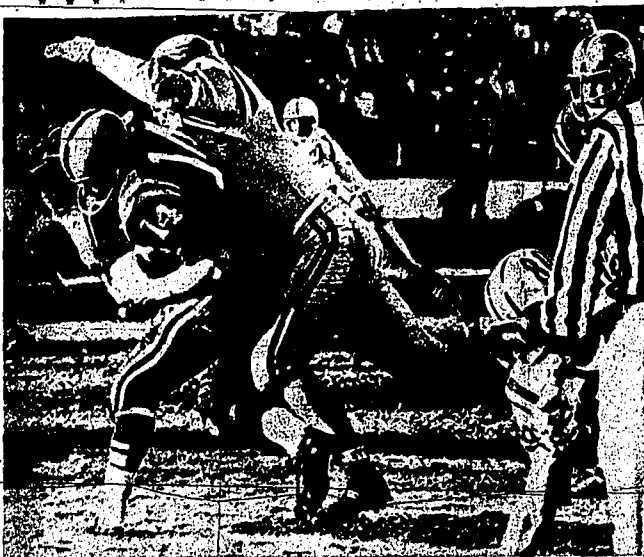

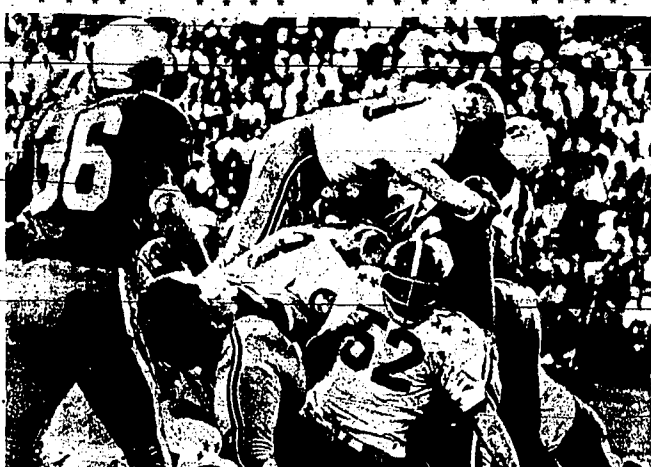

Basement Excavation Near Jerome May Shed Light on Ancient Tragedy

When the tenant house is moved atop the basement dug for it, and Lester (Les) Hills' hired man moves in, he may not realize he is living on the site of a prehistoric tragedy.

Lester Hills is a farmer on Route 3, Jerome, and the basement which will be under the tenant house is one he hired dug — and helped dig — a few days ago. His sharp eyes caused the digging to come to a somewhat sudden halt.

His shovel had struck something that looked like a rock — and yet it didn't look like one. On his knees for a closer inspection, Hills discovered this "dibbel" was right — it was the end of a bone.

It was seven and one-half feet from where the end of the bone lay exposed to the top of the level ground. Surley no pioneer party would go to so much trouble as to bury a body that deep. It was certain that no human would have gone to that much effort to bury an animal there.

That bone, he mused, is not an ordinary bone. He should tell someone about it before he did another thing. Remembering that the Times-News was always interested in things unusual, he visited the feature editor. A few explanations led to an appointment to meet at the site the next day.

Hills had another believer. The object was a bone. It was not just an ordinary bone. It looked awfully odd and it crumbled easily.

Returning to Twin Falls, the editor called Don Crabtree, who would know about these things. He is a research associate in geology and technology with Idaho State University.

Once more a journey to Hills' Northside farm, more chipping and digging and a section of bone nearly a foot in length, and two to three inches in diameter, ending in a joint, was in Crabtree's hand.

It will be sent to — Dr. Earl Swanson, Idaho State University museum director and professor of anthropology for study and classification. Dr. Swanson will also get a sample of the soil in which the bone had rested.

It is just supposition at this point but Crabtree knows a lot about these things and so he spoke his thoughts out loud. Here could be the site of a prehistoric tragedy. A grass eating animal, probably a camel, had been killed by a carnivorous animal and torn apart. The remains of the camel were scattered.

Part of one of the limbs of this grass eater — the bone

found by Hills — had survived, Crabtree pointed out. The thousands of years it had lain in the modern world that was buried — and contained because Hills wanted a basement under the tenant house. Above that was still another. The bone was found in fossiliferous soil and even above.

Attitude of Some Citizen Groups Disturbing to U.S. Fighting Men

W. L. (Steve) Manker, who is home for Christmas for the first time in 10 years and who is senior chief quartermaster in the Navy, is just a little bit bothered.

Two things, individually or in combination, upset him, and although he cannot do much about it personally, he believes it is something everyone should be concerned about.

Upset number one is the attitude of some individuals in the United States that the war in Viet Nam is really no concern of theirs.

Members of this group include draft card burners, some sign marchers and also those who express the opinion they should be able to say whether or not they want to serve their country, and when.

Upset number two, according to Manker, is instances of what he terms "biased" reporting blowing-up incidents in which American troops might shoot Viet Nam citizens, those who are purported to be citizens or even children.

One case in point, Manker declared, was a story which came out of the war zone and which stated that an American serviceman had used a sub-machine gun to kill an 8-year-old child.

"What the story failed to mention," Manker said, "was that the child carried two grenades as he ran toward the American."

So far as the "card burners" and "protest marchers" are concerned, the visiting serviceman said that "guys over in Viet Nam are not overjoyed with being there, but as long as they are, they realize they have a job to do."

"I talked with a lot of them and I know how they feel. They are disgusted with the demonstrations in the United States which show the backing of all the citizens is not present."

He continued, "The fellows (Continued on Page 2)

Naturally there is a saloon and another cafe and then the harness shop of "C. Kinney".

Idaho's Fall Migratory Waterfowl Count Reported Lowest in Seven Years

Idaho's fall population of migratory waterfowl has been the lowest in the past seven years, judging from weekly reports from 19 regular counting stations across the state, but taking an inventory of a quarter million ducks or so is no easier than doing the same job on downy that number.

Some 40 Idaho observers will count Idaho's part of the continent-wide annual winter migratory waterfowl inventory, beginning next week.

The canvass of ducks and geese is slated for Jan. 2-5 before the curtain comes down on the 1955-56 shooting season. Normally about a half million ducks and 11,000 geese, along with sundry bald eagles and 200-300 trumpeter swans, are estimated by aerial and ground crews.

Last year, 176 eagles were sighted during the inventory work. Fifty-seven of these were positively identified as bald eagles, the completely protected bird which has long been our national emblem.

The Idaho waterfowl inventory starts in the Island Park county of the Henry's Fork or Upper Snake River, where an intensive count of trumpeter swans is taken each year to learn whether their numbers are up or down.

The census, which actually gives only a good estimate of waterfowl remaining near the end of the hunting season rather than a duck-by-duck count, is made at a time when there is little day-to-day shifting of waterfowl between areas. Other states and Canada complete the work within the same time period.

The Mexican waterfowl inventory is made a week or two later by a special task force of airplanes piloted by personnel of the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife.

State and federal workers try to coordinate activities so that the continental inventory will be completed toward the end of the hunting season.

The reason the count is made is because waterfowl are still

MAGIC VALLEY PORTRAIT Recollections of George R. Hartley Sound Like Page From Area History

George R. Hartley has been a part of this section of Idaho since almost the day it started and his recollections of the "early days" sound like a reading from a page right out of the history book.

He was born just at the close of the last century—Jan. 30, 1899, to be exact—and it was in 1902 that he landed—with other members of his family, in an isolated area northeast of Murtaugh on the north side of the Snake River.

A year previous his father had attended the Northside Land and Water Co., drawing at Jerome and, according to him, his choice had been the acreage on which he brought his family to live.

Previously, by immigrant railroad car, they were transported from the East to Great Falls where his father worked as a laborer to supplement his income while awaiting water distribution at Milner.

"The older Hartley had been a school superintendent at Willow River, Minn., but the call of farm work was too strong. As his year previous his father had attended the Northside Land and Water Co., drawing at Jerome and, according to him, his choice had been the acreage on which he brought his family to live.

On the return trip from Great Falls the family stopped at Blackfoot where a wagon, plow, a team of colts and fowling gear were purchased. The family—father, mother, two sisters and George—headed out for Milner.

The long trip, which took over two weeks, saw them bedding down in whatever area night caught them, or as guests of the very few who lived along the primitive and usually muddy route on the north side of the canyon.

"For we kids it was great fun," Hartley recalls, "but for our parents it must have been hard work. I can remember one night when the coyotes were howling so much that mother thought they were wolves like we had in Minnesota. She wouldn't let us stop so we continued in the dark, finally observing a lone light in the distance.

"It turned out to be a place where three bachelors were living. They were brothers and insisted we move right in. They gave mother and father the bed and they slept on the floor.

"The next morning when I woke up these three men had taken two parts of big, fluffy biscuits and they had cooked lots of eggs and bacon. It was a breakfast I'll remember as long as I live.

"It was on Feb. 17, 1906 that we arrived at the north end of this suspension bridge that led to the town of Milner. It was a great town then, too, with about 1,500 people living there and with a hotel, two saloons a depot and everything else that goes to make up a community.

"It would have cost 75 cents for us to take across the old bridge but father wanted to save all the money he could so he walked across for nothing while we waited on the other side."

"They drove on and finally reached the 60-acre site which was to be their home. They lived in a tent the first two years and young George—at eight years of age—did a man's work as the land was cleared of sagebrush and made ready for farming.

As yet the water was not available but on March 22 the first head of water came down the canal.

"It was a great sight," Hartley said, "and it also meant that we didn't have to carry drinking water up from the river. The river must have been clean then, because we drank from it and we noted no ill effects. Another summer and winter was to be spent in the tent before the house was completed."

"The first crop consisted of oats, onions and beans and marketing was difficult. There was one of the very first bean crops in the entire area.

"Work was hard and his mother often held the plow and walked along as George drove, for the horses.

"It was several months after we put up that tent before mother saw another woman. Hartley recalls, "We stayed pretty close to home." In those days, though, everyone was everyone else's neighbor."

Going some place was an

event well remembered. There was the time when grandmother, back East, wanted a picture of the family. Decision was made to have the photo taken by C. E. Bisbee, who was a pioneer photographer in Twin Falls.

The family loaded the wagon with food and sleeping gear and started out. It took four days to drive to Twin Falls, get the picture taken, and back to Milner.

"The Hartley family had resided in the Milner area for two and one-half years and there was no school. Finally three more children moved relatively nearby and a school was started in a 10 by 12-foot granary room that had been cleaned up.

The first teacher was Rosella Board, a woman from Halley who had attended Albion State Normal School. She was a sister of Hedley Board, pioneer sawmill operator who still resides in the Halley area.

"She was a wonderful girl," Hartley said, "and we all loved her. We partitioned off a bit of our house and she lived there with us."

"Our second teacher, who was just as wonderful, was Bernadine Heffner who also taught some high school subjects. She is now in Twin Falls and is the widow of the late Carl Dudley, a photographer.

It was about this time that

Hartley decided to come to Twin Falls to go to high school.
"My first two years of school had really been a learning while the other students in the union school house recited because they were not old enough to be in school."
"I thought that perhaps would take me in Twin Falls and they did. I entered at the school although I never had really attended the first two years at all," he said.

"During that period he had mostly at the Kenyon Grove orchard ranch working for his board and room. But the job was with the Idaho Department Store, which then had a grocery department."
"That first day I picked up crates of eggs and dropped a big stay with the Idaho Department Store ended right then he smiled.

He entered the Army training corps in the fall of 1918 and when the war ended attended Cornell College, where his father had gone to school. This was followed by seven years at a lumberjack at Gros Ventre on the Pacific Coast. It was a period that he met his wife who resided in Coquille, Ore. and they were married in October, 1928.

"They came to the Milner area where they started farming 12 acres and by 1929 this spread into a half section land which he and his brother-in-law, Carroll True, operated. 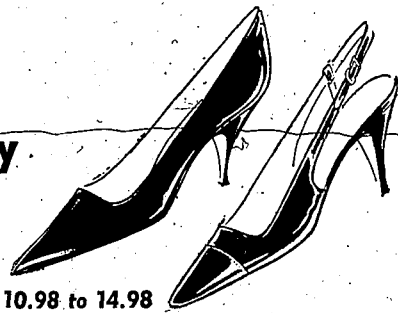
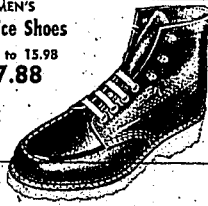

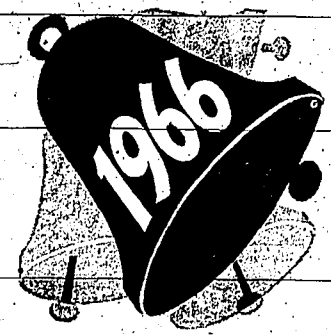

The Money Box

BY FRANK SCHELL

First question comes this week from R. L. in Burley: "I have a small piece of paper which is printed '3' in each corner and says 'Three Cents' on the face. George Washington's picture is on it, and it says 'United States of America.' Is this actually money?"

Answer: Yes — it is perfectly good money. Some time ago in this column we ran quite an article on "Fractional Currency," as it is called. Briefly — during the Civil War hard cash disappeared to the extent that merchants had no change to give customers, so they formed the habit of using postage stamps for making change.

Since the postage stamps were scarce, and became stuck together, an inventor named Gault came up with the idea of encasing them in a round metal disc with a piece of mica in it, for showing the stamp. On the back of these discs, merchants printed appropriate advertising.

This was called an "Encased Postage Stamp" and was used quite universally for a while, even finding its way into Canada as a medium of exchange.

The Treasury Department then came up with the idea of issuing paper currency in small denominations and did so, in denominations of three, five, 10, 25 and 50 cents. There are many different varieties of this small currency, and over 350 million dollars' worth is issued.

The government now estimates that about two million dollars worth of it is still unredemmed. It is not particularly scarce, although worth quite a bit over face value.

Ans. B. D. in Twin Falls asks about a coin which she describes as follows: — It has an "1864" on one side, and "Iowa Statehood Centennial, 1846-1946" on the other side is pictured a building, and around it the words "United States of America" and "Fifty Cents." Is this a real coin?

Answer: It is a real coin. Congress has from time to time issued fifty-cent pieces to celebrate such events as the Statehood of Iowa. These coins are called "Commemorative Half Dollars" and are, for the most part, quite beautiful — much

more so than our regular issue. This coin was issued to commemorate Iowa's Statehood and 100,000 of them were struck, although a scarce coin, they are obtainable in uncirculated condition unless you are more specific as to date of issue, condition, and denomination of these notes. I would be afraid to estimate the value.

Mrs. G. A. Wendell, asks about the value of paper money of the 1928 Series.

I am unable to answer your questions unless you are more specific as to date of issue, condition, and denomination of these notes. I would be afraid to assume that you are asking about one dollar notes — when you have not listed the notes you have. If you will send a complete description, I am sure we can find references on our paper money.

We have received several questions referring to money of the Romans and Greeks. This branch of numismatics is referred to as the study of "Antiquities" and it is absolutely impossible to identify these coins and year old coins unless you send a good tracing, or a photograph of the actual coins.

1965 Stock Market Advances to New Highs and Record Volume of Trading

NEW YORK (AP) — For the third straight year, the stock market in 1965 advanced to new highs and rolled up a record volume of trading.

Turnover exceeded a billion shares for the fifth year in Wall Street history, the other years being 1929, 1946, 1963 and 1964. The Dow Jones Industrial Average showed a straight-line advance. The stock that for the year looks somewhat like a lopsided 'L' with the Dow at 100, about a middle much lower than the starting point and the crest at 100.

Once more, booming profits and dividend payments as well as the boom in corporate earnings accompanied the market moves. Excitation of hostilities in Viet Nam resulted in bigger gains for the fifth year. About 100 defense stocks and all the industries that feed them.

As the year ended, prospects were for even greater defense spending for 1966. Many of the million shares were traded on the New York Stock Exchange in the first hour and the Dow Industrial Index average plummeted 17.69 points. But stocks soon began recovering. By the end of the day the loss was ended and the market was higher.

The rise in the key interest rate has led to other types of credit, however, and a debate began as to how much of the money would effect the economy and the market in '66.

Stock prices began rising almost from the start of the year but ran into a period of irregularity in February and March as the decline in Viet Nam and the decline in U.S. gold holdings. Records for production, exports and retailing gave stock prices a firm base, however, and by May 8 the
