

## Record Christmas Death Toll Is Set on U.S. Roads

The nation's three-day Christmas traffic death toll set all records for holiday fatalities on the highways. The death toll reached 707 today as the figures were verified. The previous record traffic toll was 706 a four-day Christmas weekend in 1956. Before that day, the National Safety Council had estimated this would run between 560 and 650. The toll included records in a number of individual states. In

the state safety director, Warren C. Nelson, said the 49 deaths made the highest toll for any single day in 1965 and the highest in any state to be kept. Louisiana's superintendent of public safety, James Burdette, said that state police began keeping records 25 years ago. Snow and freezing temperatures over much of the country added to the expected and long-distance travel. In daylight and roads were closed with care.

The Safety Council said 68 percent of the deaths occurred during the 78-hour period, starting at 8 p.m. Thursday and ending at midnight Sunday.

Several accidents accounted for the total. A truck overturned at the start of the holiday period, a bus traveling to a convention in Oregon lost control, crashed and turned over. The accident five-look-12 lives.

Five persons were in a car skidded out of control on an ice-covered bridge in Oklahoma. Five people died Sunday on a highway near Buffalo, Minn. Seven persons were killed in a collision at Subletia, Kan. Six

total dead had exceeded the toll for the 1964 Christmas weekend and the 428 deaths during a recent non-holiday weekend. That weekend, December 26 to 28, was reported by the Associated Press as the deadliest in its history.

### Drilling Rig Collapses in North Sea

GRIMSBY, England (UPI) — An oil-rig drilling for gas and petroleum 30 miles off shore in the North Sea was reported to have collapsed today.

First reports said some 40 crewmen, believed to include some American technicians, were aboard.

The big drilling apparatus, mounted on stilts above the choppy sea, recently brought in a big natural gas strike and still had its "flamer" of gas spouting into the sky.

A radio message from the rig, asked for urgent help.

The Humber coast guard life boat was dispatched to the aid of Sea Gem, the name of the oil rig operated by British Petroleum.

The Royal Air Force station at Leconfield also sent helicopters.

The British ship Volava already was on the scene and reported that four life rafts had been launched from the rig.

### Downtown Rome Bans Automobiles

ROME (UPI) — The Eternal City today virtually banned automobiles from downtown Rome.

The first result, most observers agreed, was a weird silence in the resulting "pedestrian island" as traffic jammed bigger than ever—piled up on its fringes.

The "pedestrian island" is an experiment running until Jan. 5.

Traffic officials picked the post-Christmas week, which generally brings lighter traffic, and blared warnings to motorists by press, radio and television for days in advance.

But thousands of private motorists and truckers who tried to penetrate the forbidden zone this morning still seemed shocked to be shunted around the fringes of the trapezoidal area by hundreds of traffic policemen.

Massive snarls of twisting, turning vehicles burgeoned at the shut-off points and in Piazza San Silvestro and other squares which the traffic planners set aside for motorists to sort themselves out.

Angry drivers cursed and pounded on their horns—legitimately illegal except in emergencies—and cacophonies of protest reverberated to the suburbs.

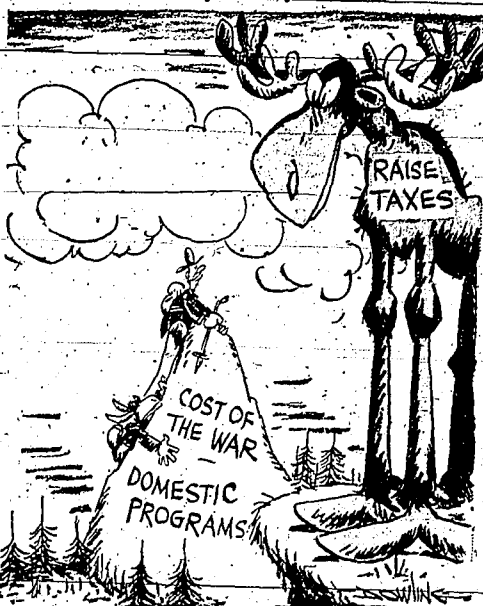

Retires After 53 Years

WASHINGTON (AP) — A financial expert who has handled federal government appropriations totaling more than \$3 trillion retires Thursday after 53 years of service at the Capitol.

Everard H. Smith, 75, is stepping down as chief clerk of the Senate Appropriations Committee, from what he calls "the most wonderful job in the world."

"You couldn't find a university anywhere where you could hear as many top people on as many different subjects as come before our committee every year," he said.

Smith went to work for the Senate committee April 1, 1912, at the outset of the Woodrow Wilson administration.

That first year the congressional appropriations to run the government totaled \$1,028,000,000 (7). In the 1965 session

He was there partly because of his knowledge of shorthand and was told only, "We want you to do some little odds and ends around the office."

World War I, World War II and the Korean War put the greatest strain on the Appropriations Committee during Smith's career.

He recalls that he stayed at the Capitol until 2 or 3 a.m., many nights during World War II to get emergency money bills ready for quick action by senators on the committee the next morning.

In recent years he has been slowed by failing eyesight and a hip ailment. But, even as retirement nears, he's in his office every working day.

Does he expect to enjoy retirement?

"I hope so," Smith said. "But I don't know. Sometimes on the weekends, I used to get jumpy because I didn't have anything to do."

BERKELEY, Calif. (AP) — Two prominent scientists clashed today over the value of proposals to spend billions on antimissile systems and fallout shelters.

"Reliance upon a defense system of such extraordinary complexity may bring more risk than safety," said Dr. Barry Commoner, head of the Department of Botany at Washington University, St. Louis, Mo.

Dr. Edward Teller, University of California physicist and one of the inventors of the atomic bomb, countered: "A strong civil defense is our best hope of preventing nuclear attack."

The two were scheduled speakers in a symposium on civil defense at the annual meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science — the largest scientific convention of the year, attended by more than 6,000.

The difference of opinion came at a meeting prior to the symposium.

Commoner, an authority on the effects of radiation on man's environment, accused Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara of giving a "hopelessly inadequate" picture of the immediate and eventual damage from nuclear war.

He predicted "epidemics of human and animal diseases, crop destruction by radiation, erosion and sterilization of land resulting from missile destruction of vegetation, and the triggering of possibly catastrophic climatic changes."

These, as well as immediate destruction from blast heat and radiation, he said, "lead me to conclude that this nation, its population, its economic wealth, its social fabric — all that we speak of as our civilization — should be irrevocably lost following a nuclear nuclear war."

He conceded that some scientists would disagree with him but insisted "there can be no disagreement that it is absolutely impossible to be certain of our own survival."

Teller said strong civil defense measures are vital as a deterrent.

"The Russians characteristically avoid taking risks," Teller said. "If we have no shelters or antimissile system they may

feel they can defeat us. But if we put up a strong civil defense I believe we will prevent attack by the Russians and the Chinese are not mad, as Hitler was. It is fortunate that we are now faced by reasonable opponents. I don't think they will want to start a war unless they are sure they can defeat us, and they can't be sure if we have a strong civil defense."

Commoner pointed out that the Johnson administration is considering a combined antimissile-shelter system, expected to cost several billions.

He said he believed the money a strong civil defense system would cost might be better spent on a research and education to prevent war but that in any case no decision should be made without informing the public of potential dangers.

### Employment Has Seasonal Drop in Area

The Idaho Department of Employment, in its December bulletin, reports that Southern Idaho employment has continued to decline from the summer high reached in September. But substantial year-over-year gains also reflect expansion in most of the state's major industries, causing Idaho unemployment to remain below the U.S. average in November.

During November unemployment in Magic Valley was at the lowest level in five years. Exceptionally good weather allowed nearly all forms of outdoor work to continue well past the usual period. Nonfarm work is still at a peak, but farming is nearly at a standstill.

The influx of banking facilities, potato processing plant employment and retail stores should create some new employment.

In Burley, residential and commercial construction continues and will do so until stopped by the weather. Recruitment of new employees for jobs in the potato processing plants has been difficult but was met with fairly good results. Employment there is expected to remain at a five-year high.

In Gooding and Rupert, agricultural and nonagricultural employment has been steady through seasonal factors. However, nonfarm employment in Gooding during November was high.

In Jerome, cold weather and frequent rain and snow storms brought construction to a halt. Some potato sorting is being done but the market for fresh potatoes is down from last year. Retail business is good.

A new banking establishment began operation.

In Twin Falls, mild weather provided full field work and agricultural warehouse work during November. Retail sales are reported as exceptionally good after an unexplained October-November slump.

### City Growth Is Foreseen By Architect

NEW YORK (AP) — A renowned Greek architect predicted Sunday that the day will come when cities will have populations of tens and hundreds of millions.

"But we must be sure that these cities do not lose the human characteristics which make towns of under-10,000 population," Constantine A. Doxiades said on NBC's "Meet the Press."

Doxiades, who often has warned that today's cities are choking at their centers, drafted some suggestions for the metropolises of tomorrow.

"How do you repel the invasion of the automobile," he asked. "Well, we can gradually take major highways underground. And we might even have multi-level streets, parking side-walks at the higher level, leaving the cars to the lower level."

Asked which city he thought was the most "livable" today, Doxiades replied: "Venice, because it is the city that has not been invaded by the speed. Also, it has not lost its human scale."

Doxiades also had praise for ancient Athens for being able to maintain a "small town" atmosphere within the larger society.

He has been a consultant to many governments and former chairman of the U.N. Working Group on Housing Policies. He also has helped renovate old cities or build new ones in 15 countries.

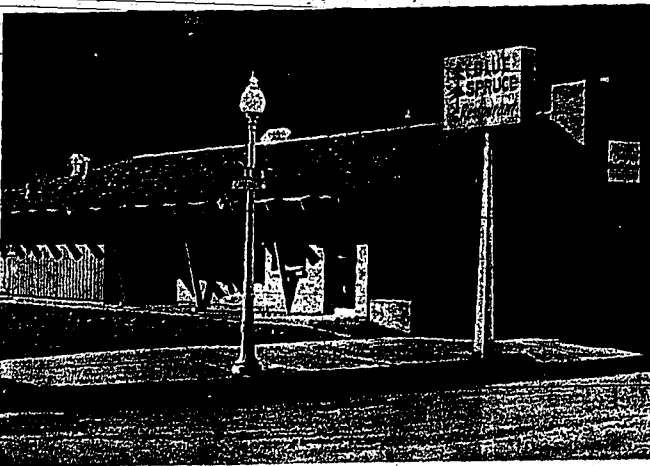

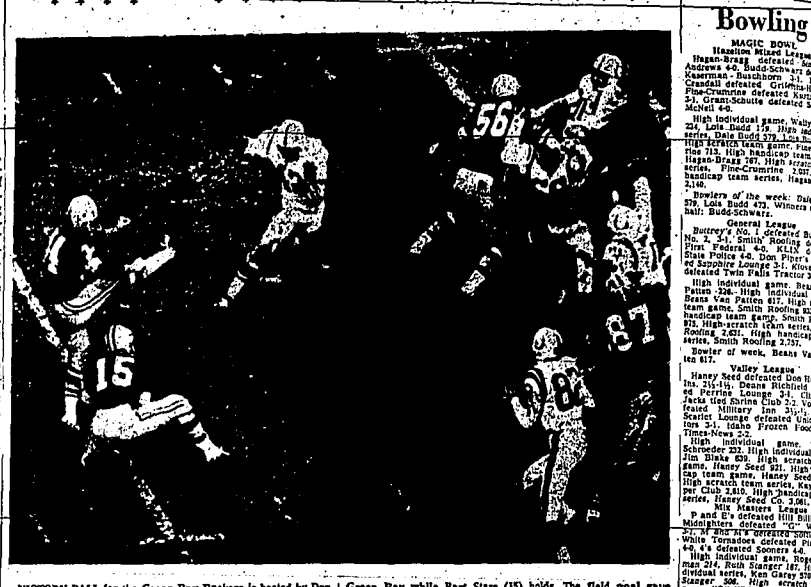
