Viet Cong to Give 4-Day Cease-Fire To Note Holiday

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—The Viet Cong today announced a four-day cease-fire in its war against the South Vietnamese forces during the lunar New Year celebration next month. Meanwhile, the United States extended the moratorium on its air war against North Viet Nam for a fourth day. A broadcast of the Communist Liberation Front radio said the Viet Cong would stop attacking the puppet armed forces and government "from 12:01 a.m. Jan. 20 to midnight Jan. 23." The four-day festival, known as Tet, is celebrated as a national holiday in Viet Nam.

Vatican Has Wait-and-See Attitude

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Vatican officials today toward the first announcement came from the Vatican today that the pope would not mark the lunar New Year. Sources here said that since the lunar New Year is a religious holiday, the Vatican would wait for a more definitive announcement before making a statement.

The pope was reported to be directing new African diplomatic efforts to achieve a New Year's cease-fire as the next step in his peace campaign. The clandestine radio broadcast said the Viet Cong would be fighting South Vietnamese forces during the Jan. 20-23 celebration of the lunar New Year.

Defectors Tell Of Cuba Aid In Viet Nam

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Four Cuban defectors, all merchant seamen, gave U.S. officials accounts today of how their nation's ships carry Chinese arms to North Viet Nam. The defectors said they were put on business at sea, walked ashore from the 7-ton freighter Aracelio in the Gulf of Tonkin and went into the U.S. consulate where they quickly were taken to the U.S. Embassy. After a brief visit with U.S. police to show the defectors were voluntary, the men issued a statement. They were flown to Tokyo and sent to San Francisco where two Defense Department agents took them to New York after a short news conference.

Heavy Rain, Snow And Strong Winds Strike Northwest

Strong winds, heavy rain and snow struck sections of the Pacific Northwest today. Below-zero temperatures were reported in many areas, mostly along the northern border states. Cape Blanco, in southern Oregon, reported nearly seven inches of rain in the last 24 hours, and at Brookings, Ore., the rainfall during the same period totaled nearly six inches. At Crescent City on California's northern coast line, more than 24 inches of rain fell in six hours. The northern California and southern Oregon areas were the scene of damaging floods a year ago.

West End Roads Closed by Snow

Some east-west roads in western Twin Falls county still were closed Tuesday morning, but highway 30, which was closed for more than an hour Monday night during a heavy blizzard, was reported open. State Patrolman Richard Burns said high wind Monday night whipped snow from fields onto the stretch of Highway 30 from Deadman's Corner for some six miles west into Buhl. "Snow kept us stuck open for one-way traffic for a few hours, but by 11 p.m. all traffic was halted. One snowplow became stuck at the Cedar Crossing, two and one-half miles east of Buhl, and a larger plow had to be sent out, Burns said. Officers finally found a county road to the north which was passable and guided cars to a detour. The Buhl-Cedarford road also was closed by the heavy drifts and several cars had to be pulled out of the snow. Highway 30 traffic was resumed about 2:30 a.m. Wind still was blowing in the area Tuesday morning. Humphrey Makes Appeal to Japan

TOKYO (AP)—U. S. Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey arrived in Tokyo tonight on the first leg of a brief Asian tour and appealed to Japan for help and advice in "our common endeavors." Humphrey planned an 18-hour stopover en route to the inauguration of Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos. During his Asian swing he will talk to leaders about Viet Nam, but will not meet with Prime Minister Eisaku Sato and Foreign Minister Etsusubo Shima, the vice president delivered an arrival statement which appeared to anticipate a meeting with Sato. Humphrey's appeal was made in a speech before a group of U. S. policy in Viet Nam, a touchy subject in Japan. "The brevity of my stay here, however, does not mean that I am not deeply interested in the United States' attachment to frequent and frank consultation with your leaders," he said.

NEW YORK (AP)—President Johnson's administration is counting on U. S. industry to chop \$1 billion from the nation's budget during the two-year 1966-67 period to 90 percent of the level of investments in the three-year period. Corporations also have been asked to boost exports and report quarterly on foreign transactions. The number of corporations to report quarterly will be more than 900, compared with 400 in 1964. Q In 1962 I bought two Litton debentures convertible into common stock. This company has since added its stock twice. How does this affect the debentures? How many shares of Litton common stock would I receive if I convert my debentures?

A Your letter gives me just a little bit in the dark as to the amount of debentures you hold. You say "two debentures." In Wall Street terminology, that means \$2,000 par value of debentures. "A" bond or "a" debenture is usually taken to mean \$1,000 par value.

But because the Litton debentures, like many others, come in denominations of \$100 par value and up, you may be talking about \$200 par value or some other amount of debentures.

When these debentures were issued, they were convertible "at 100," meaning that \$100 par value of debentures could be exchanged for one share of Litton common stock.

As a result of the two-for-one split of Litton stock in July, 1962, the conversion terms were changed to "at 80." And, after the next split to be effected, the two-for-one stock split the conversion terms will be "at 40."

In other words, if you own \$200 par value of these debentures you will then be able to exchange them for five shares of Litton common stock.

These changes in the conversion terms result from "protection against dilution" of convertible security is entitled to be exchanged for shares of stock that represent a fixed percentage of ownership of the debentures. NEW YORK (AP)—Home builders are hoping that the 1965 construction industry will survive a private recession. A marked pickup is reported in contracts for residential units. The construction industry information specialists put the 1965 figure at \$19,866,649,000, up from \$19,387,763,000 in the first 11 months of 1964.

Builders note happily that a 14.5 per cent improvement was reported in November. Residential building contracts rose to \$1.7 billion in this latest report, from \$1.5 billion in November 1964.

The lending fraternity also has cheerful news this week. Although fretting over the general rise in interest rates triggered by Federal Reserve Board action, savings and loan associations report mortgage lending at the year-end was on the uptick, 7.6 per cent over savings inflow into these institutions after a period of sluggishness.

The United States Savings and Loan League reports that member associations closed \$1.9 billion in mortgage loans this November, up 4 per cent from last year. But for the first 11 months of 1965 the total of \$1.9 billion trailed 1964 by \$500 million.

Savers added \$7.5 billion to their accounts last month without withdrawing \$1.7 billion. Both figures topped November 1964 when the inflow was \$2.4 billion and withdrawals \$1.5 billion.

WASHINGTON — I am bemused by the pronouncedly anti-Bundy attitude of the press. George Bundy is departing the White House because (1) he couldn't stand Lyndon Johnson any longer, or (2) he was a former member of the Eisenhower administration who had to give up the role of foreign policy adviser to a man who had no interest in foreign policy. In point of fact, Bundy was not a member of the Eisenhower administration. He was a kind of super secretary of state to whom Rusk owed his job.

Andrew Tully's Confirmation is now at hand July that Rusk protested to President Johnson about what he called Bundy's interference in matters which are properly the prerogative of the State Department. One of Rusk's closest advisers, who had a showdown with the President in July and stated in blunt terms that if the interference continued Johnson would have to shoo for a new Secretary of State.

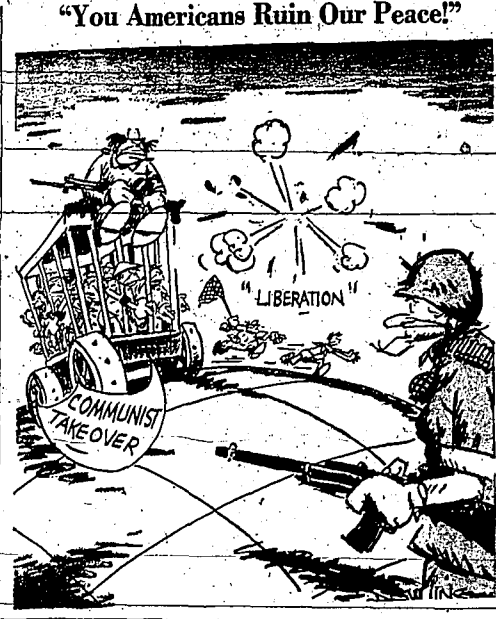

Interpreting The News

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hu-will mayors, dashed to Paris with Gemini astronauts, preceded at a rare moment by Lyndon B. Johnson was—but in very unseasonal way, which the way President Johnson wants it.

This is a switch from those days 16 years ago when Humphrey first arrived in the Senate, a noisy, controversial liberal who talked too much and antagonized the old-timers.

Now after Christmas Johnson is sending Humphrey to South Korea, to oversee the Philippines on a goodwill mission, which makes him the highest U.S. official to visit South Korea since Kennedy sent Johnson there in 1961.

And before either of them back in his first year in office in 1953, President Dwight D. Eisenhower sent his vice president, Richard M. Good, to the grand tour of Asia.

Through it all Humphrey has been his bouncy, cheerful self, and he keeps his own back. He will back him for the presidency in 1972. This is assuming Johnson runs and a reelection in 1968, which is likely, say the best.

Capital Report

The shape of Soviet world policy in 1966 will have important bearing on chances for negotiation in Viet Nam. By spring, the world may have a better idea of these chances.

The congress theoretically is the ruling body which meets in Washington to approve guidelines for the next year. It likely will reaffirm policies laid down by the 20th congress in 1956 and the 21st in 1962. These two were the foundations of the Soviet-Chinese dispute. A meeting of the Soviet Politburo in Moscow will discuss the matter in regard to Viet Nam. If the Russian establish a strong presence there, it will be a major step in the development of which their weight could contribute to isolating the Chinese. This will create conditions for negotiations.

MARQUIS CHILDS WRITES ON WASHINGTON

Many of them, however, are being tricked into seeming to support the war. They are asked to sign resolutions saying that they support our fighting men in Viet Nam.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Young men who join the Peace Corps or sign on as volunteers in the war on poverty are eligible for occupational deferment from the draft, a Selective Service official said today.

But youths on the receiving end of federal job-training programs are eligible for induction, if they meet the physical and mental standards set for draftees.

"As far as we are concerned," said Capt. William S. Pascoe, public information officer for the Selective Service System, "if a person is in the Job Corps, there is no reason for us to defer them."

Peace Corps volunteers are considered to be in an occupation vital to the national interest. The same is true of young

men who join the Volunteers in Service to America — VISTA, domestic counterparts of the Peace Corps.

Deferments are granted on a year-to-year basis. The young man involved would be deferred only during the period of his service with the Peace Corps or with VISTA.

Once a man has been deferred, his draft liability is extended until he is 35.

Queen Opens Celebration of Britain's Premier Church

LONDON (AP)—Queen Elizabeth II placed a bouquet of red roses on a small altar in Westminster Abbey today to inaugurate the year-long celebration of the 900th anniversary of Britain's premier church.

The abbey was consecrated on Dec. 28, 1065, Holy Innocent's Day. Edward the Confessor, who had ordered it built, died before it was completed. Since its consecration as a Benedictine monastery, the abbey has been the family church of all of England's monarchs but two. Elizabeth was crowned there in 1952. Thirteen British kings and five queens are buried there.

It was to honor the abbey's builder that the queen took the roses today from a cushion carried by the abbey's senior choirster and laid them on the altar near the marble tomb of King Edward.

At the queen arrived with her husband, Prince Philip, her sisters, Princess Margaret, and other members of the royal family. A ceremonial prelude was played on the great organ organ. It was composed by the organist, Sir Arthur Bliss, master of the queen's music.

Bliss' grandly garbed officials took part in a stately ceremonial. The Archbishops of Canterbury, York, Wales and London were on hand with their wives. The Primus of Scotland and representatives of other churches in Britain and overseas.

Also attending were the speaker of the House of Commons, the Lord Chancellor and other members of the government.

SAIGON (UPI)—The year 1966 is likely to be the bloodiest yet for Americans in South Viet Nam. The U.S. death toll was heading towards 2,000 as 1966 wound. It will double the total if the year-end casualty rates continue.

At a military level, the odds look good for the United States. Allied strength consists of almost 200,000 Allied soldiers. The Communists have nothing like the Americans' artillery, airplanes and helicopters.

But good as they are, these odds may still not be enough to win. They outnumber the Communists by about four to one, and hope to win. They outnumber the Communists by about five to one, in early 1965, when they were obviously losing.

American strategy in 1966 is to attack the Viet Cong's major hideouts with U.S. troops and the army's "main force" units of the Communist army.

With the main force thrown on the defensive, Vietnamese government troops may be able to rout out the guerrillas from the villages and build local militia units to keep them out.

The Communists had served notice that they intended an escalation of their own—the pouring of thousands of fresh, regular troops into the struggle for South Viet Nam.

The war was taking on the aspects of a bigger and more international conflict as autumn drew in. South Korea sent a division which took over guard duties of the strategic central port of Qui Nhon.

"Australia sent an infantry battalion, and New Zealand an artillery battery to support it. Both participated in heavy battle near Saigon.

As the war ended were leading toward a showdown between the armed might of the free world and that of the pro-Communist government of the Communist bloc.

That showdown could come in the next 12 months, although whether the Communists nor the Americans were talking. Americans, of a decision in anything like so short a time.

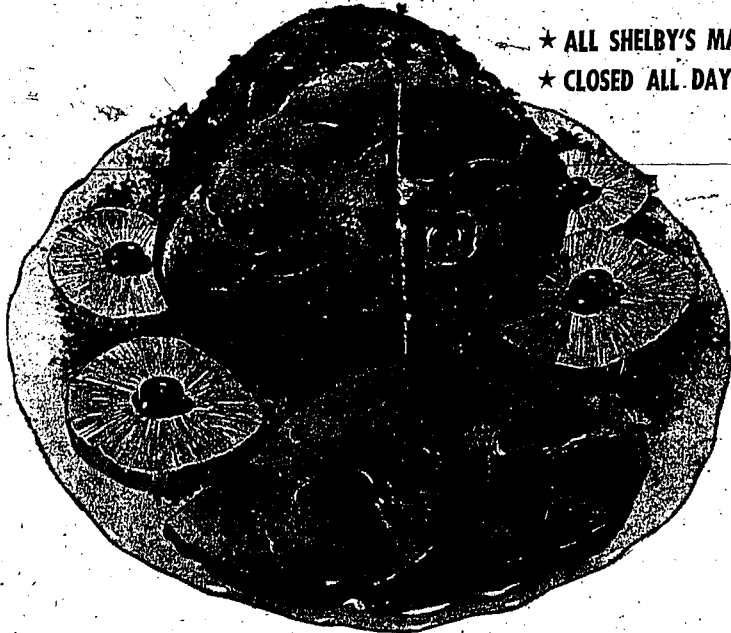

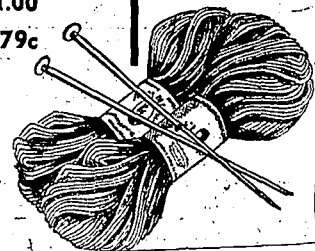
