

## Plane Crash Kills John Mattmiller, Idaho Politician

KELLOGG, Idaho (AP)—John N. Mattmiller, an unsuccessful congressional candidate in the last general election, and an unidentified companion were killed today when Mattmiller's light plane struck a power line and crashed four miles east of here. Mattmiller, 44, was returning from a business trip to Washington, D.C., when he crashed barely five miles short of the Smelterville airport, his apparent destination. He apparently was having difficulty navigating through a heavy overcast, and narrowly missed a radio transmission tower at Osburn. As he tried to drop down through the mist and land near the South Fork of the Coeur d'Alene River his four-place plane struck a power line, cartwheeling and broke in half on the livebank.

## Pope Ponders Steps to End Viet Nam War

VATICAN CITY (AP)—Pope Paul VI was reported today considering dramatic steps to try to end the Viet Nam war—perhaps even making a new peace trip outside Italy.

Sources said these new steps could include another series of public appeals to leaders of the involved nations and accelerated diplomatic contacts.

The sources said they did not exclude the Pope might go to Geneva or wherever else he felt his intervention might help end the conflict.

Pope Paul has pledged himself to serve wherever and however he can to resolve conflicts. He made an unprecedented peace pilgrimage to the United States last year.

## Reds Lose 1,100 in Operation Masher

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—Communist losses were reckoned today at more than 1,100 killed or captured in Operation Masher, the big Allied drive in the central coastal plains. U.S. military spokesmen reported. They called it one of the bloodiest fights of the Vietnamese war. U.S. fighter-bombers continued the renewed air war against North Viet Nam for the third consecutive day, hitting mainly at bridges, railroad tracks, truck convoys and storage areas. Bad weather again hampered assessment of damage. Jets from the 1st Central Air Force combat missions and Air Force planes hit Ben Thu, the port on the Viet Nam coast for the city of Vinh, 150 miles south of Hanoi, for the second day in a row, spokesmen said.

## Four Perish In Idaho 2-Car Wreck

IDAHO FALLS (AP)—A head-on Idaho two-car wreck today killed a mother, her two daughters and an Idaho Falls man and raised Idaho's record for traffic toll for the day.

Dead are Mrs. Joyce Johnson, 42, Idaho Falls, her daughters, Lori Ann, 3, and Linda Joyce, 5, and Anthony Joseph Duane, 10, Idaho Falls.

The accident happened on a highway near the Idaho Falls area. The car was carrying a heavy load of furniture. The car was traveling south on Highway 20 when it was struck by a northbound car.

## U.S. Embassy Has Bomb Threats

MADRID, Spain (AP)—Special security measures were placed in effect at the U.S. Embassy here following telephoned threats that the building would be blown up. U.S. officials said today.

They said the first threats were received on Monday. Additional threats were received and embassy security personnel took special precautions.

## Weather Satellite Launch Delayed

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—High-altitude winds are delaying postponement of the launching of the world's first operational weather satellite today.

The launching of the first satellite was delayed at least 24 hours because of strong winds were recorded at about 150 miles an hour at an altitude of 40,000 feet.

## Critics Can't Reopen Attacks On Administration War Policy

WASHINGTON (AP)—Critics lost a fight in the Senate today to reopen before the Foreign Relations Committee their attacks on administration policy in Viet Nam. Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois blocked a request by Chairman J. W. Fulbright, D-Ark., that the committee be excepted from the rule which prevents all except the appropriations group from meeting while the Senate is in session.

Fulbright, who opposed President Johnson's decision to resume North Viet Nam bombing, said he had been urged by administration officials to speed up consideration of an authorization bill for additional economic assistance to Viet Nam.

Dirksen said he was insisting on enforcement of the rule as part of his effort to prevent a vote on a House-passed bill which would eliminate the authority of states to ban the importation of nuclear weapons.

## Farm Bureau Seeks Contract Price Hikes

A Magic Valley Crop Association is being studied by a committee representing farm bureaus of Twin Falls, Jerome, Gooding and Cassia Counties, states Charles Harris, Twin Falls, chairman. Harris said emphasis will be placed on growing corn and garden beans and pea seed production. Inquiries in contracts offered to growers and a need for higher prices to producers have caused increasing interest in a grower organization to negotiate with contracting firms.

## Pope Declines Comment on Divorce Case

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The Vatican had no comment Tuesday night on the divorce of Patricia Lewis, sister of the late President John F. Kennedy, from actor Peter Lawford.

Cardinal Coggian was appointed delegate to the United States for 15 years assigned in Washington. He is personally acquainted with the members of the Kennedy family.

## Groundhog Day Blizzard Hits Illinois, Ohio

## Soviets, Red China May Be Preparing For Formal Split

MOSCOW (AP)—The Kremlin may be preparing the Soviet Communist Party for a formal split with Red China. It may come at the party congress next month. Soviet Communist sources said a long letter from the Kremlin detailing the charges against Peking had been circulated to party groups during the past two weeks.

Party Presidium members, including First Secretary Leonid I. Brezhnev, have spoken at meetings where the letter was read, the sources said.

The purpose of the letter, the sources said, is to prepare the party members for a formal declaration that a reconciliation with Peking is impossible. It may come at the party congress opening March 29 in Moscow, the informants added.

The letter reportedly accuses China of hindering Soviet aid to North Viet Nam, attempting to subvert areas like Mongolia, instigating border incidents, flooding the Soviet Union with anti-Soviet leaflets and falsely proclaiming that the Soviet Union cooperates with the United States on international problems.

Some sources said the letter must file 1965 income tax returns, including party members, but the informants said the letter is meant to be a basic document for creating party members, but circulation has been so wide that many ordinary Soviet citizens have heard about it.

The letter follows a renewal of attacks on the Chinese leadership in the Soviet press. After Nikita Khrushchev in October 1964, he tried to patch-up the quarrel with the Chinese, but swearing the continuing Chinese criticism for more than a year.

The Chinese Communist party, which has been expelled from the King People's Daily, accused the Soviet leaders today of helping China's economic collapse.

The cause taken by Soviet leaders on the Viet Nam, the informants said, has completely conforms with the requirements of U.S. anti-communism, but like an American newspaper, the newspaper said in an article signed by "Oscar Williams." The signature usually means a senior official of the Chinese Communist party.

On the Viet Nam question, the article said, "the Soviet leaders have been steadily handing in step with the U.S. imperialists."

## AEC Site Is In Running For Reactor

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senator Edward J. Brooke today said that the National Reactor Testing Station in Idaho is among sites being considered for a new \$75 million nuclear reactor.

Brooke said the reactor would be built at the Idaho site, which is being developed by the Battelle Memorial Institute. The design work is expected to be completed by next July and a decision on the matter will be made on the location of the reactor.

Church said Phillips Petroleum Co. is being awarded a \$200,000 contract to assist in designing the new reactor, called a fast flux test facility.

Phillips will do the work in Idaho. The overall design contract will go to the Pacific Northwest Laboratory at Richland, Wash., operated by the Battelle Memorial Institute.

The design work is expected to be completed by next July and a decision on the matter will be made on the location of the reactor.

## Groundhog Sees Shadow But Winter Hasn't Been Bad

Magic Valley residents can expect six more weeks of winter precipitation, according to the legend of the weather-predicting groundhog. The legend says that if the sun shines on Feb. 2 there will be six more weeks of winter. In Twin Falls, the average snowfall was 12 inches on Feb. 2.

However, if the six weeks are no worse than the winter has been so far, the weather bureau officials of the Magic Valley are predicting a milder winter. The lowest temperature was 21.5 degrees above zero, recorded Jan. 2. The total monthly precipitation was 6.8 inches.

## Expanded Education, Health Aid Asked

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson asked Congress today to authorize \$520 million for expanded programs to promote education and health on a global scale. He challenged "all nations, friend and foe alike, to join this battle."

In the education field, the President called for strengthened international cooperation to promote learning, expanded exchange of students and teachers and concrete steps to build and staff schools abroad.

One innovation would be a Peace Corps-in-reverse, with 5,000 volunteers from other countries to be sent to teach in the United States and serve community programs alongside the American volunteers of the Peace Corps.

As for health, Johnson proposed creation of an international health organization to coordinate the assignment of health experts to diplomatic missions. And he called for training more manpower to meet the health needs of developing nations, programs to combat malaria, tuberculosis and cooperation in solving problems of overpopulation which he said threaten "the dignity of the individual and the security of the family."

## Florida Crash Of Train, Bus

MIAMI, Fla. (AP)—Nineteen young Puerto Ricans, who came to Florida's fields to earn some extra dollars, were killed in a head-on collision with a diesel engine.

Fifteen others were badly injured in the engine crash. The train was carrying 100 tons of coal and was traveling at 432 feet per hour.

It was the second-worst traffic accident in Florida's history and another in a long series of accidents involving vehicles that carry Florida's field hands.

The accident occurred on a road where the bus was bound following a day in a pole-barn.

"Did these men have families," a man asked one of the "they were Puerto Ricans," was the reply. "In Puerto Rico everybody has a family."

Jordan said a provision for financing the project would be included in the legislation. He said the Idaho project's power sales are not as profitable as the Bonneville Power Administration's power rates increase.

## Modern Day Paul Revere Reveals Dislike of Horses

BOSTON (AP) — "Listen my children and you shall hear... about the Paul Revere who hates horses."

Paul Revere Jr., great-great-grandson of the midnight rider, travels by automobile about 150 miles a day — in his job as a salesman.

The 34-year-old descendant of the man who warned the patriots at Lexington in 1775 that the British were coming to destroy their supplies at Concord says there always is skepticism when he's introduced to someone.

"They say, 'Are you kidding?' when they hear the name and then ask, 'Where's your horse?' That may account for my dislike of horses," Revere said good humoredly in an interview. He is proud of the Revere tradition, however.

Revere, a sales engineer with a degree from Bowdoin College in Maine, thinks of his famous forebear as "quite a character, a very industrious man. His industry has been passed on in the family."

Revere lives in suburban Acton, near Concord, with his wife

and two children, a son, Paul III, 4, and daughter, Avery, 6.

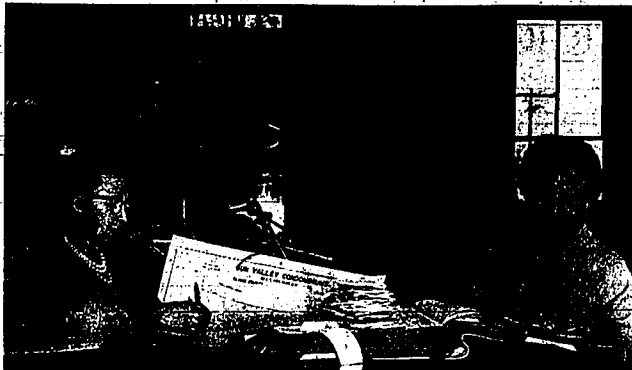
Paul Jr. travels extensively in eastern New England, selling fabricated copper, brass and aluminum to industries.

He is employed by Revere Copper & Brass Co., a firm the first Paul Revere founded in 1801.

"The ownership has gone from the family, but the memory lingers on," he says. The midnight rider was skillfully by trade and his skilled craftsmanship became widely recognized.

He also cast bronze cannon for the Colonial army and was the first to introduce copper rolling in this country.

Paul Revere Jr. acknowledges that a good deal of what people know of his forebear's ride to Concord on "the 18th of April in '75" was the result of Henry Wadsworth Longfellow's famous poem.





### Flamboyant Hats Were Trademark of Movie Gossip Queen, Hedda Hopper

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—Movie gossip queen Hedda Hopper, stern mother to filmdom's brightest and brashest stars, once reminisced about her first store-bought hat:

"It was a thing of beauty. Of bright green straw, trimmed with red velvet geraniums. It made me feel rich as a queen."

"That hat was a greater attraction on Easter morning than the choir of the preacher's sermon. I said if a hat can get the attention of this many people, I'll never go bareheaded."

She kept her word. Flamboyant, enormous and often outrageous hats remained a trademark of the Chicago Tribune-New York News syndicate columnist until her death Tuesday at 75.

Miss Hopper died at Cedars of Lebanon hospital of pneumonia, complicated by heart trouble. At the hospital when she died Hopper, who plays Paul Drake on the Perry Mason television series.

Miss Hopper's death, and the recent retirement of her arch rival, the Hearst Newspapers' Louella O. Parsons, ended a flamboyant period in Hollywood.

"She was more than just a columnist to me," said comedian Bob Hope. "Dolores (Mrs. Hope) and I have known her intimately for the past 25 years."

Born Elda Furry in Hollidaysburg, Pa., one of nine children in a Quaker family, Hedda ran away to New York City when she was 18 and joined a chorus line.

At 23, she married actor William DeWolfe Hopper, 55, a popular performer four years older than her father. They were divorced in 1922.

Miss Hopper then came to Hollywood and portrayed society women in silent and talking films.

Her entry into journalism came in 1936. Before long she was a threat to Miss Parsons' role as the town's gossip queen.

Both had radio shows. Their feud—a Hollywood legend in itself—developed from there.

Despite the fame of their public battle, they occasionally made up and would then say nice things for a while about each other's show business children.

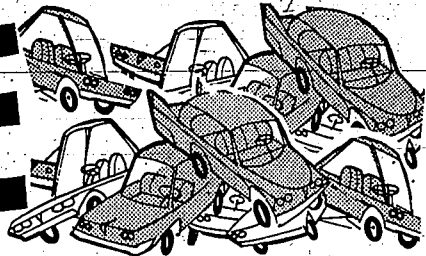

**\$1.4 Million Covered Mail Gets Hearty Okay in Provo**

**PROVO (AP)** — Provo's 1.4 million dollar covered mail terminal shopping street received enthusiastic approval from a panel of speakers at a public hearing sponsored by the pro-position backers Tuesday night.

Next move is the incorporation of a mail authority, J. Hamilton Calder, chairman of the West Center Street Development Committee, told the group of about 50 persons in attendance.

A meeting for this purpose is scheduled for Feb. 8, he said.

The project, which involves putting a roof over the street between existing buildings on a three-block span, received enthusiastic approval from the area and outside of it, plus from interested citizens.

Opposition was voiced by only one property owner, Vern Jones, who said he owns 1 1/2 feet of frontage, estimated to be worth \$25,000 at this time.

Jones, in a prepared statement, said "the mail would cost the property owners too much money for the gamble they will be taking."

My share of the cost will be between \$30,000 and \$25,000, he said. In addition, parking will cost more than the mail itself. Fronts, backs and black-clopping in the rear will be added expense, he said.

Furthermore, Jones said, the new shops down the center of the street will get the best property available for a mere \$200,000. He referred to an offer by Sid Harmon, Salt Lake Developer who had proposed the mail idea, to take the center of the street shops for a \$200,000 reduction in the mall's cost.

Calder said it is the belief of the mall backers that these shops should be controlled by the mail authority and rented to tenants.

Victor Bird, of the development committee, reported that 65 per cent of the owners of the property included in the proposal are favorable.

I. Dale Despain, planning consultant reviewed parking requirements and possibilities, estimating there will be approximately 2,000 parking spaces required for the mall.

## Budapest Lives Like Other Cities, Forgets Wounds

BUDAPEST, Hungary — (AP) — They were dancing the twist in a dingy bar on the outskirts of Budapest and a drunken fellow shouted to a forlorn: "Look at the face of new Hungary!" The plans playing sang by English into a microphone. Men in dark suits and women with tired faces moved rhythmically on the tiled floor.

Ten years after the ill-fated 1956 revolt, Budapest lives like any other city, making the most of it. It does not like to talk of its scars.

Black smoke billows against a gray winter sky over Danubiaros, the new Communist-built steel city with its giant factory complex and gray, yellow apartment houses lining living avenues.

"I admit," said a Hungarian

who stubbornly repeated the name of a song. The band did not know the song and the violinist hopelessly tried one tune after the other.

In the gilded Budapest Opera House, a Barok ballet was being shown. Some Hungarian women had come in business suits; others had bare arms, décolleté dresses and glittering jewelry.

"Look, at those women, someone whispered. "You cannot imagine how tired Hungarian women are. They work at home, they work in offices, take care of children and husbands and still have energy to go out at night."

There are new, bold trends everywhere — in art, literature, sculpture, in a political cabaret. An entertainer tried to laugh about new economic reforms, price increases and higher taxes. The audience applauded — there was little else to do but laugh.

The hotel restaurant listed French brandies and English whiskies — at the equivalent of \$1.50 a glass.

The hotel restaurant listed wind-whipped snow blew across the wide Hungarian plain. In Szekesfehervar, Soviet soldiers stationed in Hungary walked in groups, looking at shop windows.

Near Lake Balaton, Hungarians' favorite center, deserted bungalows, hotels and summer houses waited for better weather.

Workers can come here for as little as 50 cents a day," said the guide.

In the lobbies of Budapest hotels, voices in all languages of the West spoke loud, demanding services. 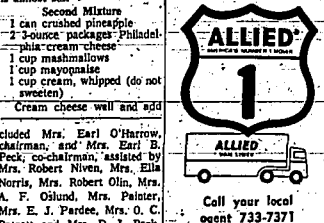

# Hearing Is Set Feb. 14 on Jerome Budget

**JEROME**—Public hearing on the proposed Jerome county budget has been set for 3 p.m. Feb. 14 in the county commissioners room in the courthouse according to Mrs. Ella McVey, Jerome county auditor.

The commissioners have approved a tentative budget of \$373,539 for 1966 which is an increase of \$42,689 over the 1965 budget.

Increases are caused in part by the creation of a new department, the county zoning commission, general elections, legislative directive for county and other major increases were used for several years.

Other major increases were figured as the election accounts from \$11,705 to \$12,213 for roads and bridges for 1965 where none has been received to be paid for out of the 1966 budget.

Major increases are in the assessor's department which will be raised from \$17,900 to \$23,500 allotted to the zoning commission which was created this year and \$2,113 for roads and bridges and \$2,113 for necessary mileage and expenses for the director.

Small decreases are shown in the clerk, auditor and recorder's office dropping from \$18,675 to \$17,880 because less help will be needed with the new microfilm equipment; board of health dropped from \$11,760 to \$10,322.17 per 1965.

Other than a tax cut in 1965 amounted to \$10,359.74 from the various departments. This was an approximate increase of \$12,391.57 from \$1,200 to nothing for the 1966 year; county fair dropped from \$29,500 to \$27,500 and weed eradication dropped from \$70,640 to \$70,915 for 1966.

## Laughter Dies As Cancer Takes Keaton

**HOLLYWOOD (AP)**—The granite-faced, little man-in-the-shapeless suit and flat hat dived off the springboard, missed the pool and drilled a hole through the concrete embankment.

After a subtitle, "Years later," he emerged from the shaft, dressed in Oriental clothes and accompanied by a Chinese wife and two children.

The audience roared.

But the laughter died Tuesday when Buster Keaton, who had entertained audiences since he was 4, died of lung cancer at the suburban Woodland Hills home where he and his wife lived. He was 70.

Keaton was stricken three months ago. His wife, Eleanor, a tall, blonde dancer he married in 1910, was with him when he died.

Keaton's star rose in the heyday of silent screen comedy, fell with the advent of talkies, then rose again during the last 10 years.

Buster was born John Joseph Keaton Oct. 4, 1895, in Piqua, Kan., where his acrobat parents, Joseph and Myra, were playing a one-night stand with escape artist Harry Houdini.

He often related that when he was one day old, his father carried him on stage. By the time he could walk he was one of the "Three Keatons" act.

He was thrown between his father and uncle, with such seeming ferocity he was called "Buster." The nickname stuck.

In 1917, Fatty Arbuckle convinced Keaton to try his luck in Hollywood, where he became an almost immediate two-reel comedy favorite. Whether he was going down with a newly launched ship, being swatted with a broom, or being chased by a locomotive, his antics retained its sorrowful, immobile stare.

He married Natalie Talmadge, a reigning screen star, in 1921. She bore him two sons, Joseph and Robert. Eleven years later they were divorced.

In 1932 he married Mae Scribbins, a nurse. They were divorced in 1932.

Funeral services will be held at 1:30 p.m. Friday in the Church of the Hills at Forest

## Minico Pat On "Advised" School List

**RUPERT**—Mindoka County High School has been placed on the "advised" list for the third consecutive year by the Northwest Accrediting Association, according to Doyle Lowder, assistant superintendent of schools for the county.

"This will be the last year the school can be listed as 'advised' before being placed on the 'warned' list only one year before accreditation is lost.

Three major deficiencies at Minico were listed by accreditation officials, with the primary deficiency being in the guidance program. In order to meet accreditation standards, a high school must maintain a guidance-staff ratio of two guidance directors per 400 students, and Minico has two for every 550 students.

The second deficiency listed is lack of adequate facilities in the field of industrial arts, science, physical education and music, and the third was noted in the teaching load, where four teachers are teaching more than the recommended 150 students per day.

Teachers with the heavier loads are primarily in the social studies and English classes, according to Lowder.

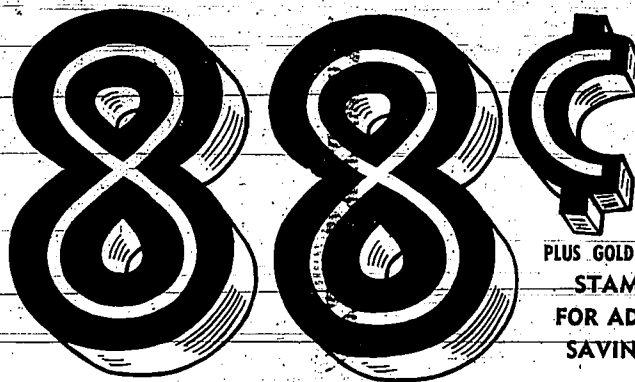

### GOP Official Wants More Discipline at Conventions

WASHINGTON (AP) — "I'm not so sure that people don't like the noise and the confusion and the flags and the whole works," he said. But enough is enough, he said, and more discipline is in order. "There's plenty of room for improvement in the operation of the convention floor itself," he said.

It is normally a scene of milling delegates, newsmen, lookers who talk, clog the aisles and keep convention chairman slandering their rivals.

Pierce said there would be more order if national committees gave up their convention patronage — the authority to nominate some 1,500 honorary sergeants at arms and 450 assistant doorkeepers.

Eisenhower suggested that convention chairmen be given dictatorial powers to keep order — backed up by burly sergeants at arms. He also said newsmen should be barred from the convention floor, and alternate delegates should be relegated to the galleries. In addition, he said there should be fewer delegates. There were 1,300 at the last GOP convention.

Pierce said he doesn't want to keep all reporters and photographers barred from the convention floor. He does not think alternate delegates should be expelled, and doesn't advocate smaller delegations.

RUPERT—Quota for the regular February visit of the Red Cross Bloodmobile, has been set at 125 pints for Minidoka County according to Mrs. Robert Snapp, Minidoka County Bloodmobile chairman. The drawing will take place at the Rupert, Civic building from 2 to 5 p.m. Tuesday.

The chairman reported that 82 pints of blood were used by county residents over the last four months with 33 pints used at Minidoka Memorial Hospital and 49 pints at other hospitals. Numerous amounts of blood were used for gamma globulin patients.

According to Mrs. Snapp, a large number of children in the county are receiving regular gamma globulin shots, which is the infection-fighting ingredient of blood plasma.

Many children have blood that is deficient or entirely lacking in the blood fraction and the lack of it makes them especially susceptible to infectious disease. Regular shots are used to counteract the deficiency.

Gamma globulin also is being used in modifying measles and infectious hepatitis. Blood which has become outdated, about 20 days, or is otherwise unsuitable for whole blood transfusion is returned by the hospital to the Boise blood center and several types of blood derivatives are produced.

Mrs. Snapp pointed out it is the direct responsibility of the recipients or their families to recruit blood donors to repay blood used.

All blood is collected by specially trained registered nurses and pre-donation histories are performed by local volunteer registered nurses. A physician is in attendance at all blood drawings which is also on a voluntary basis.

She explained that when the blood is collected it is immediately refrigerated and stored at 33 degrees to 40 degrees Fahrenheit until transfused.

When the blood is delivered to the hospital, a sample of the donor's blood is carefully cross-matched with a sample of the recipient's blood to make sure they are compatible.

At the hospital, careful attention is given to the donor's health. The staff of the hospital ensures the best use of the blood, Mrs. Snapp said.

Because of the high standard of donor criteria and the careful selection of donors, only non-polluted is necessary.

# Depression Begins at Tender Age

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Depression and anxiety may both be you, and there may be nothing to be done about it, a California study has found some way to start life over—beginning at six months.

That's when infants may begin to suffer mental depression severe enough to scar their lives, explained Dr. Carl Stern, a psychiatrist from the Universities of Montreal and Ottawa.

The danger period, he said Tuesday, is between the ages of 6 and 18 months.

Children then can be emotionally contaminated by their mother's moods, or by her absence, he said.

Many people have pooh-poohed this idea, but studies have shown there finally is a 'grief parallel' in infancy that goes far to explain depressions and anxieties in adulthood, he said.

Dr. Stern, visiting Los Angeles for a series of lectures, stated studies using pictures of infants' faces proved they have the same look of melancholy often seen on the faces of disturbed adults.

He said the most frequent cause of infant depression is the physical absence of the mother, often occurring because of her death or the breakup of a marriage.

But, he said, it isn't necessary for the mother to be absent for the infant to experience depression.

She can merely be distracted, worried and inattentive and the infant will react almost as if she were gone, he said.

# Aerialist Is Critical From 45-Foot Fall

DETROIT (AP)—The Great Murillo, an aerialist with the Ringling Brothers Circus, never used a balancing pole or a safety net—a feat which "separates the boys from the men," a circus official said.

Luis Murillo, 32, was hospitalized in critical condition with a fractured pelvis and head injuries received Tuesday when he fell 45 feet to the sawdust floor of Detroit's State Fair Coliseum.

Murillo, of Hollywood, Calif., was performing at the annual Shrine Circus. He was walking up a 45-degree slanted wire toward his main performing wire when he fell.

Some 8,000 persons saw him fall.

Murillo's fall occurred just a few feet from the spot where the Flying Wallendas' high wire act, the "human pyramid" crashes to the ground in 1922. Two of the seven-man balancing act were killed.

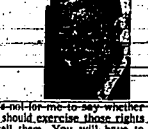

# Trade of Grazing Rights To Improve Game Forage

BOISE (AP)—Trading of grazing rights on a wildlife management area for similar rights on privately owned land was described Tuesday as a possible means of improving big game forage conditions.

The Idaho Fish and Game Department said it authorized livestock grazing on portions of wildlife management areas in Fremont County. In exchange, the department will keep off a portion of sections of privately owned or controlled lands in the area.

"If these exchanges work as well as we believe they will," said Dick Wilson, department refuge manager, "it is hoped that similar agreements can be made in other areas of the state."

"This could be a partial solution to the few problems where big game and livestock are competing for browse on private lands."

In cooperation with the land owners, the department is fencing the area in size or fencing. "Washington has had very good success with similar programs and it appears we should have no trouble," Simpson said.

"The adults should return to the Lemhi ponds as steelhead are more plentiful in return to their place of planting than the salmon. Salmon almost have come back to their spawning beds."

Simpson also cited the Idaho Power for outstanding cooperation. He said Wendell Smith, company biologist, and Richard Moore, vice president in charge of the fish passage program, have done everything possible to preserve the run. He added the company will bear the expense of the program with the department providing the technical assistance.

The natty attired Owens, 42, was arrested in Berlin in 1938 when he refused Adolf Hitler by winning four Olympic gold medals, had entered a plea of no contest to charges that he failed to file income tax returns on \$25,130 for the years of 1937 through 1942. 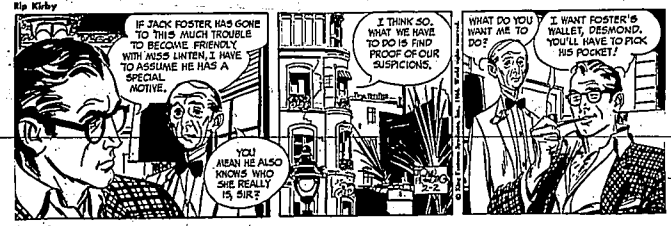

### Ex-Klansman Testifies for Committee

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former Klansman testified today he got out of the Klan because he didn't want people to think he had anything to do with church burnings.

John E. Thornhill, 57, a farmer and oil man who said he made "millions of dollars" leasing oil rights from white and colored persons in the area, answered almost all questions of the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

Chairman Edwin W. Willis, D-Ia., was preparing to ask the House to vote contempt of Congress citations against Imperial Wizard Robert H. Shelton and six other Klan officials who had refused to furnish subpoenaed documents. The committee has recommended the citations.
