

Needlework Contest Rules Listed

FILER — Rules for the 1968 National Wool Knitting and Crochet Contest have been published and potential contestants may obtain entry blanks from Mrs. W. W. Reed, Filer; Mrs. Joseph Kucera, Ruhle or Tom Shouse, Twin Falls County Fair secretary.

The contest is open to all non-professional knitters and crocheters in the area and judging will be done at the Twin Falls County Fair Sept. 7-10.

This is the fourth successive year for the contest and the second year it has been held in conjunction with the Twin Falls County Fair. It is sponsored by the National Hand Knitting Yarn Association and the American Wool Council.

Participants in the local contest will be offered six different categories, three each for knitting and crocheting. A blue ribbon award in any of these six classes will make the winner eligible to enter the national finals to be held in December in New York.

The grand national champion, who will be chosen by a judging board of art needlework and fashion authorities, will receive a grand-national prize of \$1,000, a trip to New York for two, including a three-day stay, and a special engraved trophy. Other winners will receive cash awards and ribbons.

The three classes include afghans, sweaters and three-piece baby sets for both knitting and crocheting. All entries must be knitted or crocheted of 100 percent wool or mohair yarn purchased in the United States, must have been completed since Jan. 1, 1968, and must carry one label of the yarn used.

A first-place blue ribbon award will be made by the fair's judges in each of the six classes. In addition, one of the blue ribbon winners at the fair will be judged "Best of Fair" and will also receive a special engraved trophy.

The names of the six first-place winners will be sent to the National Hand Knitting Yarn Association who will supply the winners with complete information on entering the national finals.

Young Widow To Contest Spouse's Will

SHERIDAN, Wyo. (AP) — Zarif Khan died three years ago, leaving an estate of about \$1 million. He left his widow, Bibi Fatima Khan, \$10,000.

She says she did not contest the will when it was probated because she thought it would be a sin against the Moslem faith.

Now she has changed her mind and will file suit in a Sheridan, Wyo., court. After Khan's death, and while his widow was in Pakistan, Sheridan District Judge John P. Isley wrote her of the terms in her husband's will but told her she was entitled to half the estate if she wished to contest.

Zarif Khan came to the United States in 1957. He worked in the mines, opened a cafe, and was a shrewd stock market investor.

He married Mrs. Khan, now 28, in 1963 when he was 60 years old. She bore him six children.

Khan was stabbed to death in a family feud during a visit to Pakistan in 1963.

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Merger of 2 Truck Firms Is Reported

Interstate Commerce Commission approval has been granted for a merger of Pacific Intermountain Express Co., Oakland, Calif., and All States Freight Inc., Akron, Ohio, it was announced in Twin Falls Saturday by Howard E. Kelso, PIE branch manager.

The combined corporation, which will retain the name Pacific Intermountain Express Co., will be the nation's second largest trucking firm. The two companies had gross revenues of \$134 million in 1965. Container coast service will be provided by the combined's 6,000 trucks.

Kelso said it is anticipated that the merger will be legally consummated as soon as certain SEC and Tariff requirements are complied with.

But the real eye-popper is a curvaceous go-go girl who traveled with a rock and roll band to assemble the crowds for Democrat attorney Sherman Powell.

The office seeker may or may not tell the people what they want to hear, but in one — the male audience — at least — complains about the white-clad figure of Jackie Whitfield and the skin-tight slacks and sweater she often wears.

Former Congressman Carl Elliott, another of the 10 candidates, has alternated with Hank Williams Jr., one of the hottest numbers in the country music fraternity... and the Statemans Quintet, one of the South's best-known gospel singing groups.


In the closing days of the campaign, Elliott has used both young Williams and the Statemans at a cost which may run well into four figures a week.

Gov. George Wallace's wife, Lurleen, also has turned to the Grand Old Opry for some of its top recording stars — the Wilburn Brothers, George Morgan, Hank Thompson. When the big-name entertainers are not around, she has a guitar-strumming Alabama group.

Former Gov. James E. Folsom, who started the hill-billy band technique of campaigning 20 years ago, still has some of his original musicians. They call themselves the Red Raiders in tribute to the Alabama volunteers who fought in the war against Mexico.

Man Admits Killing Youth In England

CHESTER, England (AP) — Ian Brady today admitted killing a 17-year-old youth and told a hubbed court his ash-blond mistress helped him in a carefully planned plot to bury the body.

The 28-year-old stock clerk, denied, however, that he had anything to do with the murder of two children whose bodies were found in shallow graves in the bleak Yorkshire moors.

The "Murder of the Moors" trial went into its 10th day. There are indications the case will wind up this week.

Brady and his mistress, Myra Hindley, 23-year-old typist, have pleaded innocent. They are being tried before an all-male jury for three murders. Conviction could mean life imprisonment. The death penalty has been abolished in Britain.

Brady, under cross-examination, described the plan to get rid of the body of Edward Evans, 17, whom he called a homosexual and admitted murdering with an ax in a robbery attempt.

Brady said the plan was not carried out because David

Smith had testified earlier he had seen Brady beat young Evans to death. Brady had claimed Smith had helped him. The body of the Evans youth was found in the house where the two defendants lived.



Elliott, a Cincinnati attorney who was appointed by President Johnson to succeed Fred Ioh, who died last December, says he prefers to "minimize racial things."

"I like the opportunity to serve as a human being," he said. "I don't want to be given anything because I'm a Negro. I don't want to be denied anything because I'm a Negro."

Demonstration Presented for Women's Club





Pilot Outruns Red Pursuers, Is Rescued by Helicopter

SAIGON (AP) — A U.S. Air Force pilot outran Communist pursuers in the mountains of North Viet Nam Sunday night and rescue helicopters plucked him to safety at dawn today. Three helicopter attempts late Sunday afternoon to rescue Capt. James M. Ingalls of Palo

Alto, Calif., were driven off by Communist ground fire. Ingalls had parachuted into the mountain at 3:45 p.m. after ground fire shot down his A1E Skyraider while he was flying a forward air control mission over North Viet Nam.

He was the 49th pilot brought out of North Viet Nam by the U.S. Air Force's 3rd Aerospace Recovery Group since Jan. 1. The group rescued 120 downed pilots in the last three months of 1965.

Ingalls made immediate radio contact with search Skypaiders who flew overhead after he went down along the North Viet Nam-Lao border. They were led to him by the radio "beeper" that all pilots carry in their survival kits.

The rescue ship was piloted by Maj. Galmon L. Stearns, from Sulphur Springs, Tex., and Capt. David C. Henry of Philadelphia, Pa. The crew chief was Staff Sgt. Theodore H. Hough, of Skidmore, Mo., and the pararescue crowman was Air-craftman William D. Broten of Scotland Neck, N.C.

Chicago Ends Selection Of Players; Will Rely On Youth in NBA Action

NEW YORK (AP) — Chicago is taking another flyer into pro basketball, and counting on youth to get the venture off the ground. Jerry Sloan, Nat Bowman and Jim Washington were among the young players drafted over the weekend by the Bulls, newest team in the National Basketball Association and the third Chicago club to try to make a go of it in the NBA. Over-all the Bulls selected 18 players from the nine established NBA teams, two from each. They paid \$1.6 million for the talent and the franchise, with no breakdown on how much went for what.

Sloan, a 6-foot-7 guard-forward taken from Baltimore; Bowman, a 6-10 center from Cincinnati, and Washington, a 6-7 forward from St. Louis, were first-round draft choices last year. Other first-year men picked were Keith Erickson, 6-6 forward-guard from San Francisco, and Barry Clemens, 6-7 forward taken from New York.

The Bulls, who will begin play this season as a member of the Western Division, also drafted four men with two years experience, four with three seasons, and two with four.

Veterans taken were Johnny Kerr, a 33-year-old forward with 12 seasons experience; Al Blanck, 34, a guard who has been a pro 10 years, and Bob Bozoer, a forward who has been in the NBA six seasons.

Dick Klein, 30, of the new club, and Sunday he might announce his coach in Chicago Tuesday and definitely would have him picked by May 11, when the college draft will be held in New York.

Kerr was taken off the Baltimore roster, Bianchi from Philadelphia and Boozer from Los Angeles.

Each of the nine established teams was allowed to protect seven players, leaving a total of 40 from which the Bulls could take 18. They named 10 from the Eastern Conference Saturday and eight from the Western Division Sunday.

Others drafted were Jim King from Los Angeles, Jeff Mullins from St. Louis, McLoy McLe more from San Francisco, John Barnhill and Don Kojis from Detroit, John Thompson and Ron Bonham from Boston, Ian Chappell from New York, Gerry Ward from Philadelphia and Tom Thacker from Cincinnati.

The Bulls aren't likely to profit much in the college draft. They will pick last on the first round, third and fourth on the second, and last the rest of the way.

Baltimore shifts from West to East next season and will be in the division with Boston, Philadelphia, Cincinnati and New York. Chicago will be in the Western with Los Angeles, San Francisco, St. Louis and Detroit.



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Salmon Season to Be Opened

BOISE (AP) — Sportfishing for the giant chinook salmon in Idaho will be open again this year, the State Fish and Game Department said Sunday.

Some 15,000 spring-chinook already have been counted entering the state, and Director John R. Woodward said the number should exceed 32,000 by mid-June.

"We must have 32,000," Woodward said "or allow sportfishing for salmon while leaving enough to escape to the spawning beds."

Sportfishing for three-foot spring-chinook was canceled last year when only 11,000 were counted over the Harbor Dam, the last counting station before the fish reach Idaho from the Pacific Ocean.

At the time, Idaho officials said salmon had been overfished commercially near the mouth of the Columbia River.

At one point they asked Oregon and Washington to restrict commercial fishing this year, but withdrew the request due to the high counts.



LOUISVILLE, KY. (AP) — Graustark, the outstanding favorite, was declared out of the Kentucky Derby Sunday by his trainer and the 92nd running of the 1½-mile classic for 3-year-olds Saturday was turned into a wide-open race. "He has a fractured wing on the outside of the small bone just above his left front hoof," said 41-year-old Loyd Gentry after going over the X-ray with Dr. Alex Hartill, a veterinarian who has treated the ace of John Galbreath's Derby Dan Farm for several leg ailments since bursting on the scene last year. "He will not race any more this season. And I might as well retire to stud. But that decision is up to Galbreath," said Gentry.

Both Gentry and Hartill expressed the opinion the speedy son of the Italian sire, Ribot, broke the bone during the running of Inst. Thursday's Blue Grass Stakes at Keeneland, which he lost by a nose to Abe's Hope after piling up seven easy victories — three last year and four this season.

At first, it was thought Graustark had picked up a piece of gravel and that it was working in the hoof.

Parents of Kidnaped Boy Make Appeal

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Aaron Goldman, wealthy Miami contractor, said today, "A man who may have been the kidnaper of his 18-year-old son, Daniel, has contacted a rabbi in New York."

Goldman appealed to the abductor to contact the rabbi again for "an important message from us" or to get in touch with a clergyman of any faith anywhere in the world.

"We are certain, and have been promised," Goldman said in a statement addressed to the kidnaper, "that you could do so in safety and security."

"Once the clergyman has been able to identify our son, the ransom will be paid through the church in any manner you direct. It will be sent to any clergyman you have designated and he will deliver the \$25,000 in return for our son."

Daniel was taken from his parents' luxurious home in suburban Sunnyside before dawn on March 28.

The kidnapper bound Goldman and his wife with gauze and blindfold after demanding \$25,000 and led the boy away.

The 300-foot Goldman, sitting with his wife in a television station and reading from a prepared statement, disclosed for the first time that "we have been contacted many times."

"But it was obvious," he said, "that some people were taking advantage of our grief. They have tortured us and have tried to extort money from us. Whether we have had a legitimate contract is impossible to say."

Goldman said the plan he was offering to the kidnaper is "a simple and safe plan to receive his money."
