Area Taxpayers Vote Tuesday For \$3 Million CSI Bond Issue

Backers of the \$3 million bond issue for the College of Southern Idaho will see the result of their activities Tuesday as taxpayers throughout the district go to the polls. Activities during the past month have been centered around drive to get all eligible voters to the polls. Students have organized calling committees and have contacted eligible voters reminding them of the election. In addition to the calling committees, stu-

dents and the college have mailed out more than 13,000 brochures containing information as to what will take place once the bond issue is placed.

Coordinating committees also have been formed in the Junior College District and area. Students have given of their time and money in publicizing the bond election.

To be eligible to vote on the bond issue residents must be property owners in either Twin Falls or Jerome counties and be over the age of 21.

There will be no precincts in this election and voters are to go to the nearest polling place.

In Twin Falls, polling places are the Morning Grade School, Robert Stuart Junior High School, Twin Falls High School, Wills Motor Co., Twin Falls County Courthouse, CSI Area Vocational School and the Twin Falls City Hall.

Jerome taxpayers will vote at the Jerome High School and residents of Celina and Hazelton will cast their ballots at the Valley High School. The Muntz High School will be the polling place for that area, and the Hansen High School will receive their area's ballots.

In Kimberly, voters will go to the Kimberly High School, and voters in Castlewood are asked to go to the old gymnasium at the Castlewood High School.

Property owners in Buhl may vote at either the Buhl High School or at the City Hall. In Pocatello the High School will be the polling place and in Holt, voters will go to the Holt High Grade School.

All polling places will open at noon and will remain open until 8 p.m. Tuesday.

Voters needing rides to the polls in the Buhl area are asked to call 843-4352, 843-4200 or 843-4368. People at these numbers will see that all voters calling will receive rides to and from the polling places.

In Twin Falls, voters may call the College of Southern Idaho office at 733-9884 for rides to the polls.

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Reports Are Given at Rupert Meet

RUPERT - Reports were given on the various chamber projects during a luncheon meeting Thursday at the Hirling Cafeteria.

Fred Fricke reported on action now being taken on the recent investigation into the site of the Employment Security Agency building being constructed in North Burley.

Forrest Blake, of the Heyburn Chamber; Oliver Hanzel, Rupert Chamber; and Loy Knodel, Minidoka county commissioner, have been named as a committee to secure facts concerning the construction of a combined Employment Security Agency building for the Rupert, Burley area.

Decision came after receipt of a telegram from Gov. Robert Smiley informing the Rupert Chamber that the contract for construction on the combined agency was valid. The chamber had asked for a stop work order and investigation into the site purchase.

The committee was introduced in correspondence from the various persons concerned regarding investigation of the ESA site now under construction.

John Trevino, chairman of the Rupert Rodeo, reported on plans for the annual July 4th Rodeo and celebration scheduled for July 14, at the Minidoka County Fairgrounds.

Trevino noted a new producer has been acquired for the coltation. Dell Haslam, Richfield, will produce the show and John Jackson, Wood Lake, Calif., will announce.

Clowns will include Frank Michaelvane and Wight Howington. Specialty act will include a trained brahma bull and horse act by Cecil Cornish.

The chairman also noted various riding clubs throughout the valley will ride each night of the rodeo.

The Chuckwagon Jamboree which is slated for June 25 at the civic building will include Alan Devries and his orchestra and Holland (Happy Holly) Houghberg as master of ceremonies.

Rox Rasmussen, chairman of the Rodeo Queen committee, noted only two girls have filed for application in the annual contest.

He noted five more applicants are needed to make a good show and riding practice will begin May 17 and every Tuesday and Thursday until June 12, when the Rodeo Queen Riding competition will take place at the county fairgrounds.

The Silver Sage Riders, Pocatello, have been contacted to ride during the event, which will be free to the public.

Plans also are being made by the merchants to give prizes during the jamboree and bicyclists the first night of the rodeo.

Western wear will be the order of the day beginning June 23 and plans are being made to enforce the theme.

The annual Fourth of July Parade theme will be centered around the commemoration of the 60th year of irrigation on the Minidoka project. A \$25 prize will be awarded the winning theme.

Bob Carlson is chairman of the pari-mutuel racing scheduled for July 4 at the fairgrounds.

Richard Bohle reported on the Industrial Development committee.

Rev. A. M. Thomas gave the invocation and Bob Clark, of the C and B Oil Co., was welcomed as a new member.

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400 Friends Wish Truman Happy 82nd Anniversary

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — Harry S. Truman, more than 13 years out of the White House, was presented with a miniature of the seal of the United States of America in Jerusalem.

Truman gave a brief talk after he was presented with a miniature of the seal of the United States which is on the "peace" today at more than 400 friends gathered to wish him a happy 82nd birthday.

President Johnson and other Justice Earl Warren plan to telephone their congratulations.

Truman's birthday actually was Sunday, and he celebrated it by dedicating a federal office building in his home town of Independence, a structure he worked hard to obtain for the city. The building is only a few blocks from the square where Truman got his political start 44 years ago.

He said, with a grin, "I just tried to prod them along a little when they got a little slow."

Centerpiece for the birthday luncheon today was a huge cake, decorated with a frosted picture of the proposed Truman Center for the Advancement of Peace, to be built at Hebrew

University in Jerusalem. President Johnson, in one of his two visits to the Truman Library in Independence last year, visited the center as a fitting memorial to Truman who had much to do with the recognition by the United States of the new state of Israel.

The guest list for the annual luncheon included the governors of Kansas, Missouri, Nebraska and Arkansas and many dignitaries from the Truman administration.

For Truman, the highlight at those birthday luncheons always is the "happy birthday" said-in-his-native tongue by students from dozens of foreign countries.

Rupert Man Injured in Area Mishap

HEYBURN — Kenneth Hawk, 24, Rupert, was listed in good condition Monday in Cassia Memorial Hospital, after being injured late Friday afternoon in a motorcycle-car accident at the intersection of U. S. Highway 30N and J Street.

Officers said he was riding a 1964 Honda motorcycle, owned by Wallace Walker, Rupert, and was traveling toward Burley when a 1959 Ford driven by Jimmy Lee Jose, 24, Heyburn, pulled onto the highway after stopping for another vehicle.

The cycle struck the Ford, slid for 85 feet down the center line of traffic, flipped onto its side and slid for another 15 feet. It then struck the Ford again and slid for seven more feet.

State Patrolman Roy Thomas said Hawk was beside the cycle when he and the ambulance arrived. Thomas did not know the extent of injuries but said Hawk appeared to be suffering from shock.

Hawk was cited for failure to yield the right of way. Damage to the cycle was estimated at \$250 and \$150 to the Ford.



Viet Cong to Come Out of Hiding Soon

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — There is growing belief that the Viet Cong and more than 20,000 recent reinforcements from North Viet Nam will come out of hiding soon and fight.

They have been lying low for weeks. One reason, American military men say, is that the Communists have been critically short of supplies. They have been hurt by the repeated search-and-destroy sweeps by allied ground forces and incessant U.S. air strikes.

The Reds are thought to be regrouping and resupplying to take the initiative with the onset of the monsoon rains, when the weather prevents the Americans from providing ground forces with full-scale air cover and support.

The monsoon season, just beginning, runs into August. Some military men argue that instead of a single massive offensive, the Communists will make many small-scale attacks.

The most probable targets are allied outposts along the Daotan and Cambodian frontiers.

Military sources say, that Cambodia is where some of the infiltrating North Vietnamese have joined Viet Cong units and sought sanctuary from American gun.

Some branches of the Ho Chi Minh Trail from the north end there.

In recent weeks, however, the United States has ruled out Cambodia as a sanctuary. Artillery and infantrymen have fired across the border when attacked from Cambodia.

To counter this, intelligence reports say, the Communists have pulled back into Cambodia about 20 miles. The monsoon drives are expected from these new sanctuaries.

One particularly sensitive spot, long a Viet Cong stronghold, is the French-named C Zone just inside South Viet Nam along the Cambodian border.

American infantrymen have repeatedly swept through this area and destroyed huge caches of supplies but have made only minor contact with the enemy. The glide B-52 bombers also have subjected the area to incessant heavy bombing.

Search for Crash Victim Stopped


TOKYO (AP) — A day after a search for a passenger on Japanese Airlines which plunged into Tokyo Bay with 131 aboard was called off today at the request of the widow of the last missing passenger.

Haru Shimoda, widow of a Tokyo printing firm executive whose body could not be found, told the transportation minister she is certain her husband would not have wished to cause more trouble to so many people.

He was aboard the All Nippon Airways Boeing 727 which crashed into Tokyo Bay Feb. 4.

100th Anniversary of Nickel Is Celebrated This Month

NEW YORK (AP) — In your pocket or purse you probably are carrying one of the most enduring—and widespread—relics of the Civil War—the five-cent piece.

The nickel, celebrating its 100th birthday this month, was born as a result of the war's economic chaos. Silver coins had all but vanished from sight as people hoarded them or shipped them abroad.

It also came about because a Pennsylvania miner, Joseph Wharton, needed a new market for his nickel—and he had two powerful friends in Congress, Thaddeus Stevens and William D. Kelly.

And though the nickel has come out of the mints by the billions, the U.S. government has never officially recognized its name as the "nickel." To the Treasury it is simply the "five-cent piece."

The Chase-Manhattan Bank money museum at 1254 Avenue of the Americas marks the nickel's centennial with a special exhibit opening today. The museum curator, Don Taxay, said it will be the most important numismatic event the museum has ever put on.

What has the nickel wrought in those 100 years? It has saved many a lad from having to walk around with an empty pocket. It has kept generations of youngsters supplied with ice cream cones, candy floss, and so forth.

Bone Cancer Patient Was Optimistic

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — "Up to the end he had a hopeful, optimistic attitude."

This was how Dr. T.E.A. von Dedenroth recalled the optimism of Robert Allen, who died Sunday, ending his fight against a rare form of bone cancer.

Allen, suffering from a genetic sarcoma, underwent a transfer of cancerous tissue with Harry T. Griffith, 63, of Ploutown, Pa., about eight weeks ago at Roswell Park Memorial Institute, Buffalo, N.Y.

Allen never knew that Griffith, a former minor league baseball player, died April 2.

Allen was admitted to a Tucson hospital Friday. Dr. Von Dedenroth said the cancer had spread too far through Allen's spine area.

"He was here under hypnotherapy treatment," Von Dedenroth said. "I am afraid that he had this thing ticked."

The doctor said that Allen, who returned from Buffalo 12 days ago, had been under a hypnosis treatment which enabled him to develop a positive outlook toward his disease.

Even when Allen's condition worsened last week, requiring his hospitalization, he "feels he was merely recuperating from the operation," Von Dedenroth said.

Thursday, when Von Dedenroth realized "only a miracle" would save Allen's life, the doctor broke the news to the stricken man's wife, Anita. She has been in seclusion and under a doctor's care since.

Doctors at the Roswell Park Institute said they did not know the two men had died in vain.

The deaths of Mr. Allen and Mr. Griffith are regretted here," a spokesman at the institute said. "Both men knew that the method, at best, was highly experimental—and unproven. Apparently, in these two cases, the procedure was of little value."

The spokesman said the knowledge gained from the experiments "has been beneficial" to cancer research.

Specialists hoped the transfer of cancer tissue would produce antibodies in the blood of both men and help stop the spread of cancer.

"Apparently the surgery was performed too late. There is a possibility that if they had gotten to him sooner, something might have been worked out," Von Dedenroth said.

Allen, who lost a leg last fall because of cancer, was a former football player for the University of Illinois and an award-winning insurance man.

Besides his widow, he is survived by two sons and a daughter.

Negro Vote Could Be Pivotal for Trenton Mayor Arthur J. Holland

TRENTON, N.J. (AP) — Mayor Arthur J. Holland — who made headlines by moving to a racially mixed neighborhood — expects a new form of office Tuesday in an election in which the Negro vote could be pivotal.

The 47-year-old mayor says he might lose votes among "some white people" who consider him an integrationist, but he insists his record is the key issue and will withstand any "white backlash."

Holland also said he has heard rumors that some Negroes would oppose him because they regard his change in residence as a grandstand play to gain Negro votes. He discounted this as "illogical and unrealistic."

"There are some Negro leaders who oppose me because I'm too independent," he said in an interview, but he expressed confidence the majority of Negroes would support him.

Apart from the racial question, campaign issues have included birth control, urban renewal and management of the antipoverty program.

Polls indicate Holland's opponent, Carmen J. Armento, 37, a city councilman the past four years, has made inroads into the Negro and Italian vote.

Population of Future Is Estimated

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. —

(AP) — Population experts are raising the flag on long-range estimates of how many people will inhabit the earth after the turn of the century.

This is reported in a new United Nations booklet on population problems prepared by T.E. Smith of the Institute of Commonwealth Studies at the University of London.

A U.N. report in 1963 said the world's population, estimated at three billion in 1960, might double to six billion by the year 2000.

Government and international agencies have been using the U.N. estimates as a framework for assessments of future social and economic needs.

In summing up the findings of the second U.N. world population conference, Smith said the participants stressed that it was unwise to take long-range estimates literally because of the many uncertainties that lie ahead.

One of the handicaps faced by population analysts is the lack of data from Communist China.

The weak-hitting Cardinals were known to have been searching for a player to bolster their attack. San Francisco General Manager Chub Feeney said the Giants were in need of a left-hander pitcher and felt that Sadecki, 26, can help. He said the Giants looked forward to Sadecki being with them quite awhile.

Cepeda has been bothered with knee trouble, but Feeney said he had been checked carefully.

Sadecki could give the Giants the added pitching help they need. He was a 20-game winner in 1964 when the Cardinals won the National League pennant and World Series but had a disastrous 1965 season, slipping to 6-15.

Sadecki, however, has pitched well in the early weeks of the season, compiling a 2-1 record in five games with a solid 2.75 earned run average.

Cepeda has supplied power for the Giants with three homers and 13 runs batted in. The 20-year-old right-hander swinger led the league in homers, with 16, and runs batted in, with 142, while hitting .311 in 1961. But he has failed off each year since.

He underwent an operation for removal of cartilage following the 1964 season but was constantly plagued last year and appeared in only 33 games, hitting a woeful .176 with just one homer and five RBI.

But with sheets of water over the course and the greens water-logged, officials decided to call it off. This meant the first round was wiped out and the tournament will have a fresh start in November.

"We are canceling the entire tournament since the course is in no condition to play," said Bob Rule, executive secretary of the Houston Golf Association.

The decision was reached at a conference of the Houston Golf Association, the Tournament Players' Committee headed by Tommy Jacobs and Jack Tull, PGA tournament supervisor.

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It rained six days before the first round was started. It did not rain Saturday when the field of 100 finally got started, but there was heavy downpour Saturday night that set water on the fairways.
