Governors Asked to Support War Policy

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey called on the nation's governors today to back President Johnson's policy of halting Communist aggression in South Viet Nam. But Gov. George Romney of Michigan said he is not sure that the timing and the place are right for a showdown with Communism, if, indeed that is the administration's objective. Romney, a potential bidder for the 1968 Republican presidential nomination if he wins reelection this year, told a news conference that the 58th governors conference has no business taking a stand on Viet Nam. He said he is opposed to submission of a Democratic resolution of this nature.

Johnson Says Reds Realize Military Pight; U. S. on Way to Solving Vietnamese Problems

JOHNSON CITY, Tex. (AP) — President Johnson, declaring the Communists know they cannot win a military victory in Viet Nam, has voiced optimism that "we are on the way" to solving the Vietnamese problem. Johnson planned a series of Viet Nam conferences at his ranch home near here tonight, summoning Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara, roving Ambassador W. Averell Harriman and other military and diplomatic advisers for an overnight "business visit."

Rusk Sees Defeat of Enemy Forces

KYOTO, Japan (AP) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk told Foreign Minister Eisenshure of Japan today he is convinced the North Vietnamese military forces now in the south can be defeated and that the process is now under way.

Ten thousand Communist, Socialist and other leftist students massed a mile from Rusk's hotel to protest U. S. policy in Viet Nam. Police stood by to block any attempt to march on the hotel.

Rusk told his Japanese counterpart in the first of two policy discussions that his view of the military situation in Viet Nam does not mean the Viet Cong and other terrorists in the south will be cleared out soon.

But he said the massive manpower of the United States has poured into the south, combined with that of its allies, has guaranteed that the north cannot win.

U. S. Planes Duck Missiles Over Valley

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — American warplanes dodged a heavy onslaught of Soviet-made missiles over Viet Nam's Red River Valley Tuesday during one of the heaviest raiding days of the war.

The U. S. military command announced at a briefing today that 27 to 29 surface-to-air missiles had been fired at U. S. planes. A few hours later, however, official spokesmen reported there may have been some duplicate sightings in the accounts from pilots.

The spokesman said it probably would be at least 12 hours before intelligence reports could be sorted out and a definite figure established.

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War-Weariness Indicated by Diplomatic Reports From Hanoi

WASHINGTON (AP) — Undersecretary of State George W. Ball said today diplomatic reports from Hanoi indicated development of war-weariness. But the reports show no political decision yet to seek a peaceful settlement in South Viet Nam, he told a news conference.

"I don't want this morning to create an overly optimistic picture of North Viet Nam's attitude change," Ball said. "A prevailing attitude is one thing, and translation into political decisions is something else," he added. "It wouldn't read too much into this."

Ball, who is acting secretary of state while Secretary Dean Rusk is on a Far Eastern trip, said reports have come in over the past few days from "observers in Hanoi" who are there in different capacities and impressions that they have from conversations with people in the regime.

Ball reported the Hanoi observers — who presumably include foreign diplomats — stationed there note "a greater war-weariness among the people" and a psychological change is among government officials as well.

More Charges Filed In School Vandalism

Two misdemeanor complaints and a juvenile petition were filed in Probate Court Wednesday morning in connection with the butyric acid incident at the Twin Falls High School shortly before graduation in May.

According to James J. May, Twin Falls County attorney, one of the participants in the case made full disclosure Tuesday of his part in the vandalism and identified all others involved. The name of the youth was not disclosed. The youth gave the information to May and District Attorney.

Police late Tuesday afternoon filed two complaints. Two of the boys named in the action are Steven Klomp and Ron Wilson, both 18-years-old. Klomp is charged with petit larceny in the taking of the butyric acid from the high school and Wilson is charged with petit larceny and malicious injury to property.

One youth, Kevin Gilles, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dan Gilles, 144 Taylor St., already had been charged with malicious destruction of property in connection with the May 23 incident.

He admitted his part in the affair during a hearing last week, but refused to name any others who were involved. He also appeared during the first hearing, but he paraded in connection with the incident. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Gerald J. Klomp, 1841 Grand Ave.

D. Wilson was one of 41 persons to be subpoenaed for the July hearing. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Wilson, 144 Heyburn Ave. W.

The name of the juvenile was not disclosed, and May said that it would be the prerogative of Judge Zorn and the prosecutor to release the name after the hearing.

May said he is still going to conduct the July 19 hearing. Under the Idaho State Code, the maximum sentence for a misdemeanor is a \$200 fine and up to six months in jail.

Warsaw Pact Powers Have Final Session

BUCHAREST, Romania (AP) — The Warsaw Pact powers began the third and perhaps final day of a secret summit meeting today after the Communists signed a declaration apparently aimed at getting West Germany to renounce German territory lost in World War II.

Official spokesmen would not say when the declaration signed by representatives of Russia, Romania, Czechoslovakia, Poland, Bulgaria and Hungary would be made public. The Romanian news agency Agerpres said it was a "declaration on the strengthening of peace and security in Europe."

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Death-Claims Mrs. Boone, T. F. Pioneer

Mrs. Dorothy Boone died at her home north of Twin Falls Tuesday afternoon of a continuing illness.

Mrs. Boone, widow of the late Hugh O. Boone, was a pioneer of the Salmon and Twin Falls areas. She and her husband owned and operated the Boone Land and Title Co. until their retirement in 1963.

Funeral arrangements for Mrs. Boone are pending the arrival of her daughter who is expected to be in Twin Falls Wednesday evening.

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Rocket Fuel Is Liquid Hydrogen

CAMP KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — After years of employing headaches, it appears that U.S. scientists have harnessed liquid hydrogen as a high-energy rocket fuel for man-to-the-moon and other space missions.

The breakthrough came Tuesday when America's heaviest satellite, a 20-ton rocket stage, lifted around the globe for three orbits while ground stations monitored the behavior of 10 tons of hydrogen packed in the fuel tank.

Throughout this 45-hour period, the hydrogen performed better than expected, thanks to a unique system of small rockets and gas vents that created a low-pressure zone around the fuel tank in the bottom of the 61,000-gallon tank, at the end of the engine.

Under weightless conditions on previous tests with smaller rockets, the fuel had a tendency to curl into a ball, climb the walls of the tank or vaporize. When the thrust was removed

on command for brief periods Tuesday, the hydrogen reacted to its weightless world, forming into small globules that floated in the empty portion at the top of the tank, at times obscuring the view of a television camera that relayed pictures to the ground.

Under great acceleration by larger rockets, the liquid hydrogen in its rigid chamber, where temperatures of 423 degrees below zero were needed to

About 22,000 square-back sedans, resembling the larger American station wagon, also were recalled.

The sedans and Karmann Ghias were manufactured between Aug. 1, 1965, and mid-January of this year.

Time to Awaken

Few citizens have noticed, but Idaho's primary election is sneaking up fast. In less than four weeks voters will be marking ballots. Considering the closeness of the election, there has been remarkably little interest. Perhaps the new legislative district system can be blamed partially or perhaps the absence of controversial issues causes part of the apathy. At any rate, voters who intend to cast ballots don't have much time left in which to familiarize themselves with new features of the election or any of the candidates.

At present, there's a good possibility that many residents of Twin Falls don't know which legislative district embraces their place of residence. And it goes without saying that few qualified voters can list the candidates for the various offices. It's a particularly alarming situation this year because the 1968 elections will see Idaho's first legislature elected under state reapportionment as ordered by the U.S. Supreme Court.

As residents of some of the smaller counties are well aware, reapportionment means an entirely different complexion for the next legislature. Some of the less populous counties will have to share legislators. And some of the more populous counties will be electing more members of the legislature. In the case of Twin Falls County specifically, the county will elect two state senators, but because of reapportionment a voter will be able to vote for only one.

There are all sorts of facts with which the responsible, alert citizen is well aware. But the average voter, the person who might have to be prodded to exercise his franchise, seems to be completely oblivious.

The Times-News will be making every effort to inform voters in the next three weeks before the primary. If there's any question about legislative districts, this newspaper will attempt to make every-one aware of his district and the candidates for legislative office from that district. Even more important, however, that reapportionment isn't something dreamed up in the state; it was ordered in ALL states.

Candidates also have a certain responsibility to make themselves known to voters along with their stand on any particular issue. Admittedly, candidates normally concentrate their efforts in the last couple of weeks before an election, especially for offices on the county level. So as these candidates become active in the near future, voters should pay close attention if they expect to make intelligent choices in the primary.

Perhaps on the county level primary elections haven't been too important in the past. But that's certainly not true this year. Twin Falls voters will face primary selections for several offices, not only the county commissioner race which attracted something like a dozen candidates this year. Voters should remain aware that what they do in the primary election will determine what sort of choices they'll have in the general election in November.

Remember, no election is of no consequence.

HARDING'S PLOY

Ralph Harding may have given an insight into his campaign strategy with his statement of financial condition. It came up with a letter to the Idaho secretary of state listing assets of \$25,307, a rather modest amount for a person who has been included in the above average bracket of the public payrolls for the last six years. But Mr. Harding isn't interested in disclosing his financial status; he's interested in trying to embarrass his opponent, Sen. Len Jordan. In fact, he urged Sen. Jordan to file a similar statement.

Whether it's true or not, many Idahoans have assumed Sen. Jordan is well off financially. But he didn't get his money from riding a government payroll. Sen. Jordan, a graduate of the University of Oregon where he earned his B.S. degree, has a good business and real estate background. He has a wife and two children. He also has a lucrative auto agency at Grangeville for many years. He used his own initiative to accumulate whatever he has.

It would be a good guess that Sen. Jordan will ignore Mr. Harding's obvious attempt to goad him into disclosing his financial status. But then Mr. Harding missed the real point of any politician's statement of assets. The politician created in disclosing his financial status should include his assets. If he doesn't, he enters politics and compares the political status with current finances. The comparison is what should be of interest to voters and taxpayers. Voters should be able to see what a politician accumulates—or loses—while in public service.

NATIONAL WITTING

WASHINGTON—Medicare, whose benefits are limited to persons 65 and over, just north of the 1966 state of aid to the indigent citizens who falls ill.

This is also the year in which a majority of the states undoubtedly will go the whole hog and adopt programs to provide health care for all needy persons under 21 and over 65 as well as for all adults who are blind or disabled or members of families with "dependent" children.

In other words, by Jan. 1, 1967, state and federal moneys will be available to benefit people of all ages who are too poor to pay for their own medical needs.

While Medicare gets most of the headlines, the federal-state program is almost sure to prove the more comprehensive of the two programs—and possibly the more expensive. It is authorized under Title 19 of the Social Security Act amendments of 1965, and will be financed by regular Treasury funds, as compared with Medicare which is funded through increased social security taxes. Essentially, it is an expanded version of the old Kerr-Mills Law, providing health care to poor people through a system of matching federal and state grants.

EIGHT STATES ACT—So far, Puerto Rico and eight states have filed 19 programs in effect—Hawaii, Illinois, California, Pennsylvania, Minnesota, North Dakota, Oklahoma and Ohio. The New York state program has been delayed, and 21 other states expect to have plans in operation by year's end.

As so often happens in the glandular atmosphere of Capitol Hill, Congress underestimated the cost of the Title 19 program. It set a \$250 million figure as the tab for the first year of operation, but estimates for the first eight states and Puerto Rico reveal additional costs of about \$250 million, and New York's program will add another \$250 million to the bill.

WHO'S POOR?—Under Title 19, the definition of a poor person will vary according to the generosity of the separate legislatures. Under the New York plan, a family of four can qualify as being poor if it earns a total of \$6,000, after taxes, in Pennsylvania, the income limit is \$4,000, but in Minnesota a family of four will be considered poor only if it has an income of less than \$2,000 a year. Unlike the old Kerr-Mills program, the new act does not penalize an individual if he has relatives with the means to help pay his health bills; only his own income is considered.

Aside from the cost to the national Treasury, Title 19 is expected to have a considerable impact on the nation's hospital facilities, beds and nurses, already considered inadequate to accommodate Medicare patients. No one knows how great this impact will be, but competent professionals say Title 19 alone will result in at least a 20 percent increase in the demand for hospital care.

BEDS IN STOREROOMS—The result is expected to be an even more horrendous shortage of hospital beds. The new act is expected to increase the demand for hospital care by bringing an increase of between 15 and 50 percent in the demand for hospital care in a nation where hospitals are already overcrowded. The beds set up in corridors, storerooms and even examining rooms. Some doctors who now see 20 patients a day say they'll have to see 50 when the Medicare rush really sets in, and technicians will be on their feet all day long, working in three shifts around the clock.

There will be malingers and phones, of course. But mostly the rush will be caused by those indigent citizens who have put off medical care because they couldn't afford it. Now that it's free, they will take advantage of the opportunity to have their little aches and pains investigated. And that, of course, is as it should be. But the traffic jam and the costs apparently will be monumental.

Views of Others

RESTRICTED TRAVEL

For a dozen years the State Department has been trying to get a legislative bill passed for legislative approval for regulating travel abroad by means of passport restrictions. Now Rep. Hays of Ohio has introduced a bill that would authorize the Secretary of State to prohibit travel to certain countries.

The odd thing about this bill is that it would give the secretary authority that the Supreme Court says he already has. In a 6-3 decision last year, the court held that the 1926 Passport Act gave the secretary the right to restrict travel to certain countries, though admittedly it did not do so in many words.

So many words is what the Hays bill would provide, thereby indicating departmental doubt that the 1926 law really gives a free hand for circumventing travel. Indeed, there seems to be some doubt as to where the Supreme Court stands, or how long it may stand there. In the classic 1958 case of Kent vs. Dulles, the court said broadly of a constitutional "right to travel."

If there is such a constitutional right, the Hays bill will not survive. But even if there is not, the administration ought to consider the wisdom of telling American citizens where they can go. What affirmative bond is done by preventing travel to Cuba, for example? Or does the State Department really believe that exposure to such places and their ideas would be dangerous, and Americans must be protected from too much knowledge of them?

This would be a novel theory in American government, and it would make passports a weapon of thought control. That is, in fact, just what they are employed by the Soviet Union and other countries. A free nation has every reason to let its citizens go. St. Louis Post-Dispatch.


MUST PROTECT WATER RESOURCES

The Doctor Says

One of the most unpleasant results of the removal of a large part of the stomach is a condition called the dumping syndrome. Some persons with a surgically diminished stomach within an hour or less after eating a meal will have a draining sweat and are dizzy and nauseated. This is because the food in their stomachs is precipitously dumped into the upper small intestine (duodenum) too rapidly.

The victims are usually women with a highly sensitive nervous system. The dumping syndrome is most likely to occur when a large amount of cold liquid is introduced hurriedly. If the meal contains a large portion of sugar, the spell will come on even more quickly. The cause, therefore, appears to be in a high degree of jejunal irritability with cold, distention and sugar acting as the principal irritants.

The prevalence of this condition has discouraged many persons from removing part of the stomach if the patient has a high-stomach and if the reason for considering the operation is stomach ulcer. On the other hand, the patient has a low stomach, there is no choice but to remove it.

Those who suffer from the dumping syndrome can learn to control the attacks by using a judicious diet low in carbohydrates, avoiding cold fluids and taking methylergine or cyproheptadine. U. S. Air Force Product to Become Bolivia President

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP) — A Paz Estenssoro changed the U. S. Air Force product election to the presidency.

Waged Bolivia's first political campaign by helicopter, Paz Estenssoro's opponent, the MNR convention in January 1961 named the general to the second place on the ticket.

Labor Unit May Head Off Airline Strike

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Labor Department was anything but optimistic today over the possibility of heading off a strike against the five major airlines.

"We've got a real problem," said one source. "They're still a long way off and unless there's an agreement to postpone it, there'll be an airline strike."

The AFL-CIO International Association of Machinists has told its 35,000 member mechanics to be prepared to strike the airlines — Eastern, National, Northwest, Trans World and United—at 8 a.m. Friday if no agreement is reached by then. Top pay scale for the mechanics now is \$3.50 an hour. The union has asked for an increase of 58 cents an hour. The airlines have offered a raise of 30 cents an hour and a presidential board recommended a compromise of 48 cents.

Updating of Criminal Code Is Supported

"With crime on a steady increase, the Legislature should concern itself with the problem in Idaho."

So said Douglas Kramer, candidate for State Senate in the 24th Legislative District, in a prepared statement.

Kramer commented, "The criminal code in Idaho was adopted before the turn of the century and has not been substantially amended or studied since that time. The code is inadequate and inconsistent and it is no wonder that police officers have difficulty enforcing the law."

"For instance, prostitution and some narcotics violations are misdemeanors with a small fine and little or no jail sentence. Stealing a bottle of Coke out of an unlocked car is burglary with 15 years in the penitentiary."

"I think it time we did something instead of just talking about it. The Legislature should institute a study of the problems and modernize our criminal code."

Kramer concluded by saying, "I hope other candidates for the Legislature will join me in pleading for—and supporting—our criminal code to permit more effective and better law enforcement."

Industry's Patent Suit Is Settled

DETROIT (AP) — A federal judge settled a patent suit with multibillion-dollar implications for the steel industry today, ruling invalid a patent held by Kaiser Industries Inc. on a revolutionary steel-making process.

U.S. Dist. Judge Ralph M. Freeman said he had "reluctantly" concluded that the patent application filed with the U.S. Patent Office failed to "particularly point out and distinctly claim the subject matter which the applicants claim is their invention."

In what was regarded as a test case with industrywide implications, Kaiser sued Melott, a subsidiary of Detroit-based triple damages for all steel Melott produced under the process since 1955.

It was estimated this could have totaled \$1.5 million; and it was speculated Kaiser might make similar claims against other steel firms using the process if it won the suit against Melott.

Kaiser Attorney William H. Webb of Pittsburgh said Kaiser Industries definitely would appeal Judge Freeman's ruling.

Smith arrived Tuesday night with the body of Army Pfc. Danny L. Smith, 22. Meeting him were Mrs. Smith and her only other child, Darrell Smith, 20, who had completed his first week of Army basic training at Ft. Bliss, Tex., when he learned of his brother's death.

"I'll bring myself home," Danny had written to a friend in a letter dated the day before the young soldier was killed. "These people can't hurt me."

He would have been 23 today.

"I'll be an old gray man," he wrote.

Details of the action that killed him were not available. Services were pending today at the nearby Holloman Air Force Base chapel with burial at the Ft. Bliss cemetery.

The elder Smith, nearing retirement from the Army, went to Viet Nam last December with an Army helicopter unit. His son left Ft. Bliss for Viet Nam in January. Danny was with a combat unit.

The Smith family declined to speak to newsmen Tuesday night, but a family friend, Mrs. George Ingram, said the father was wounded twice in Viet Nam action. Danny was wounded last May but returned to his unit in June.

"My 13-year-old daughter, Belinda, was his pet," Mrs. Ingram said.

Wayne Sees Good Morale In Viet Nam

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Actor John Wayne says he found American fighting men in Viet Nam "much more alive, more on the ball" than their fathers of World War II.



Rule on Book

EXETER, England, (AP) — Prompted by the furor over the diary of Sir Winston Churchill's doctor, the British Medical Association has ruled that a patient's death "does not absolve a doctor from his obligation of secrecy."

The issue was raised by recent publication of Lord Morgan's book on Churchill. It recounted the physical and mental decline of his famed patient during his latter years.

Signing of Compensation Bill Assured

NEW YORK (AP)—Australian Prime Minister Harold E. Holt says Western European nations aren't helping the United States as much as they should to solve the problems of South Asia.

Holt, who is visiting the United States, said in New York Tuesday: "I don't think that Western Europe generally is giving the assistance it should. The major effort has been left to the United States."

"Black Power" Concept Is Seen as Fostering Hatred

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Roy Wilkins, executive director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, looks upon the concept of "black power" as "the father of hatred and the mother of violence."

Wilkins condemned the concept in these words Tuesday night as he opened the NAACP's annual convention with a keynote address on "The Negro's Search for a New Identity."

"We of the NAACP will have none of this," he said, "it should not sow poison on our forward march."

"Black power" in the quick, unreflected and highly emotional adoption it has received from some segments of a beleaguered people can mean only black death," Wilkins emphasized. "Even if it should be enshrined briefly, the human spirit would be a little bit less."

The director also criticized the adoption of a resolution by the Congress of Racial Equality calling for retaliation by Negroes against acts of violence.

While stressing that the NAACP has never "signed a pact to turn the cheek forever," Wilkins said: "It seems reasonable to assume that prolonged protective violence is as likely to encourage counter-violence as it is to discourage violent persecution."

Instead, said Wilkins, the NAACP should choose as its weapons in the fight for Negro freedom the ballot, participation in government as elected public servants, and efforts to gain increased employment, fair housing and unsegregated public education.

In New York Tuesday, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. said he understood the slogan "black power" to mean an appeal to racial pride, an appeal to the Negro not to be ashamed of being black and the transfer of the powerlessness of the Negro into positive, constructive power.



INDEPENDENCE, Mo. (AP) — Capt. Elza Hatfield, a veteran Kansas City policeman whose major-case unit gets the worst crimes, reached into his pocket and pulled out a picture of a blue-eyed girl, her mischievous, freckled face ringed with curls. "I carry that with me wherever I go," Hatfield said. "Every man in the office does." The portrait was that of Denise Sue Clinton, 9-years old and on summer vacation when she was kidnapped July 8 a year ago by a robber, who apparently took her only as an afterthought. There has been no trace of her — no torn or discarded clothing, no ransom demand, no indication whether she is dead or alive. All that police and the FBI had to go on was a picture of a 33-year-old, former medical student who believed she's still alive. Hundreds of people wish she were, of course, but I believe it. "I try to keep a level head about it, I also try to remember the anniversary of the kidnapping — true. But as long as nobody finds her—" The question, "Is she alive, is she dead?" is debated agonizingly by Mrs. Clinton and her husband. "There are times when my enthusiasm builds up," says Clinton, service manager for a new-car dealer. "There are times when it fades some. Until they prove to me with some evidence that she is not alive, I won't believe she is dead. But I don't understand how she could disappear from the face-of-the-earth without some clue."



"Black Power" Concept Is Seen as Fathering Hatred

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Roy Wilkins, executive director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, looks upon the concept of "black power" as "the father of hatred and the mother of violence."

Wilkins condemned the concept in these words Tuesday night as he opened the NAACP's annual convention with a keynote address to 2,000 delegates. "We of the NAACP will have none of this," he said. "It shall not now poison our forward march."

"Black power" in the quick, unreflected and highly emotional adoption it has received from some segments of a beleaguered people can mean only black hatred," Wilkins emphasized. "Even if it should be enthroned briefly, the human spirit would die a little."

The speaker also criticized the adoption of the concept by the Congress of Racial Equality calling for retaliation by Negroes against acts of violence.

While stressing that the NAACP has never "signed a pact to turn the cheek forever," Wilkins said: "It seems reasonable to assume that premeditated, protective violence is as likely to encourage counter-violence as it is to discourage violent persecution."

Instead, said Wilkins, the NAACP should choose as its weapons in the fight for Negro freedom the ballot participation in government as elected public servants, and efforts to gain increased employment, fair housing and unsegregated public education.

The New York Times, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. said, understood the slogan "black power" to mean "an appeal to racial pride, an appeal to the Negro not to be ashamed of being black and the transfer of the powerlessness of the Negro into positive, constructive power."

"I don't think that Western Europe generally is giving the assistance it should. The major effort has been left to the United States."

"Black power has not been clearly defined. It's still ambiguous," he said. "Until there is a definite program, one must raise the question of whether it will get off the ground even in countries (in the South) where Negroes are in the majority."

"It gives the impression that we want to substitute one form of tyranny for another," King said.

"I have not lost faith in non-violence."





All that police and the FBI had to go on was a picture of a 12-year-old former mental patient that the girl's grandparents said resembled the robber. The man, identified as Robert Lee Hays, was arrested Monday night — four days short of the anniversary of the kidnapping — in Oklahoma City on a warrant charging unlawful flight. He had been sought on robbery warrants issued in Topeka, Kan., in September 1963 and in Kansas City.

He was arraigned in Oklahoma City Tuesday before U.S. Commissioner Jim Gillett and held under \$2,000 bond.

Both the FBI and Kansas City police said they wanted to question Hays about the kidnapping — to eliminate him as a suspect. He probably will be returned to Topeka on the warrant charging him with robbing the Peacock laundry there. The grandparents will be taken to view him.

Hays denied in Oklahoma City Tuesday night that he kidnapped Denise. He also denied robbing the Peacock laundry.

Denise's mother, Mrs. Russell Clinton, says: "I believe I'm the only one who believes she's still alive. Hundreds of people wish she were, of course, but I believe it."

"I try to keep a level head about it. I also try to remember to realize that it might not be true. But as long as nobody finds her —"

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Berlin Wall Torn Down by East Germans

BERLIN (AP) — East German soldiers started tearing down the Berlin wall today where it runs through the Reichstag building, apparently as a first step toward replacing it with a fence.

A detail of soldiers, guarded against escape to West Berlin by others who had submachine guns and dogs, started smashing a hole in the wall at 6:50 a.m.

An hour and a half later, portable barbed-wire fences had been carried through the 10-foot gap and set up about four yards in front of the wall. The official border between East and West Berlin often is in front of the wall.

Weeks ago the East Germans threatened to move the wall forward so that it would be flush with the Emperor's Gate of the Reichstag, which is just inside West Berlin. But the fences were curved back from the gate

Loveland, Martin Seeking Cassia GOP Senate Bid

BURLEY — The Republican nomination for state senator from Cassia County, which comprises legislative District 25, is being sought by two experienced candidates, Donald Loveland, the incumbent, and James G. Martin.
