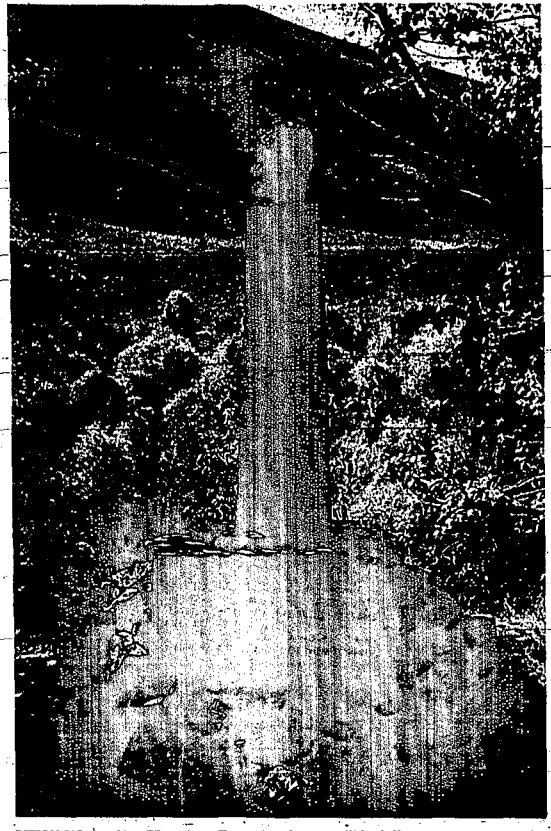

Astronaut Gets Green Light For Late Afternoon Space Walk

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—After a space suit test produced no new eye irritation, astronaut Michael Collins received a green light today for a late afternoon space walk as Gemini 10 closed in for a rendezvous with an old Agena satellite. The Mission Control Center gave a firm go-ahead early this afternoon for the hour long stroll, scheduled to start about 6 p.m. The test was added to the flight plan to make certain there was no recurrence of a chemical fume problem that caused the astronauts' eyes to smart Tuesday and cut short a "space stand" by Collins.

One of two suit fans that circulate oxygen was turned off. This reduced the possibility that lithium hydroxide—believed to be the cause of the irritation—would seep into the system. As the test was conducted, command pilot John W. Young and Collins, an Air Force major, were told to use a secondary propulsion system in the Agena to change their orbital plane and adjust their height so they could jockey into a position to rendezvous with the old satellite. Flight officials on the ground continued studying the problems of low fuel and smarting eyes as the astronauts spun 240 miles above the earth.

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP)—Fighting between supporters and opponents of President Sukarno in central Java occurred today as flames of violence and represents no serious resistance to the government, diplomatic and military sources said today.

T. F. Boy, 8, Rescues His Young Brother From Canal
Diane Mitchell McFarland, 8-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Lynn McFarland, 650 Madison St., Twin Falls, is credited with saving the life of Tracy McFarland, his 3-year-old brother, by pulling him from the Harmon Park canal about 11 a.m. Tuesday.

Mrs. McFarland said the children were walking along the edge of the canal when the younger boy fell into the water. Dale then jumped into the canal and grabbed the younger boy before he sank below the surface of the water, she said. Both were fully dressed. Tracy was uninjured after the incident and did not require medical treatment.

Dirksen Says Americans Will Want to Go "Whole Hog" If U.S. Pilots Are Put on Trial

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Everett M. Dirksen says that even if no executions are ordered, "The American people will want to go whole hog" against North Viet Nam if Hanoi puts captured U.S. pilots on trial. Views similar to that expressed by the Senate Republican leader at a news conference Tuesday were reflected in statements by Senate Democratic Leader Mansfield and Sens. Thomas H. Kuchel, R-Calif., and John Sherman Cooper, R-Ind., who said any violation of the Geneva Convention by North Viet Nam "could provide a precedent which would increase and increase into total barbarism." Hanoi signed the convention in 1957.

Guardsmen Patrol Hough Section Under State of Emergency Order

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP)—National Guardsmen armed with machine guns today patrolled the battered and smoldering Hough section under a state of emergency order after two Negroes died in riots. One Negro man was shot to death Tuesday night amid wild disorders. Widespread shooting, looting, and firebombing by Negroes raged for four hours in the slums where a woman was killed by gunfire Monday night. Violence eased about midnight. Gov. James A. Rhodes called out 1,500 troops and declared Tuesday night that a state of tumult, riot and other emergency prevailed in Cleveland. Only a few hundred soldiers had reached the area by midnight. They patrolled in jeeps carrying machine guns. In a proclamation signed in Columbus, Rhodes commanded lawless elements to halt the rioting. He said more guardsmen would be sent in if needed — on request of authorities here.

The grim tally after the second night of wanton destruction: Two killed by gunfire. At least 24 injured, including 12 policemen, a fireman and five persons with gunshot wounds. Uncounted property damage from burning and looting. More than 100 arrests. Ruined, blackened hulks of buildings, smashed store windows, heaps of tangled rubble—these were the ugly remains. The target of rocks, got 52 calls. City Safety Director John N. McCormick said there were 37 or 38 fires Tuesday night.

Three Negroes, including two wounded by gunfire, were taken to a hospital Tuesday night. A white man was admitted with an eye injury. A Negro youth was treated for a forehead cut from a flying brick. "It's just black against black — that's all," a police officer moaned. A Negro soldier sitting guard at his place. But it also was Negro against policeman much of the time.

At an intersection in the worst trouble spot, Percy Gibbs, 36, of a suburban Cleveland Heights fell at 8:55 with a bullet in the back of his head. There was no official report of who shot Gibbs. A Negro man at the scene said the shooting came after bottles were hurled at police cars. A crowd of Negroes milled around. Policemen fired their weapons. "They shot him! They shot him!" cried some of the Negroes. "This is too much!"

Policemen and firemen raced from one building to another, chasing looters, exchanging fire with snipers and trying to douse the fires, igniting in building after building. "They was fired into the building near the spot where the bullet struck to flush out a sniper," an official said. Rifles were posted on buildings. A police helicopter with its lights off circled overhead in the night. The air was filled with screaming sirens.

Skelton Hides Sorrow for Wife in Show
LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP)—The riotous fun masking his grief, Red Skelton clowned before a delighted audience Tuesday night as his wife lay seriously wounded in a Las Vegas hospital. Skelton, 44, was declared in satisfactory condition at Sunrise Hospital following treatment for a chest wound which was inflicted with a pistol early Tuesday morning.

The accident took place in the Skelton suite in the Sands Hotel as he was performing in the supper club below. "I was in the middle of a song when I was shot," Skelton said.

Utah Man, 33, Drowns in Snake River
HAGERMAN — Arnold Dean McKinley, 33, of Emery, Utah, drowned about 2:45 p.m. Tuesday afternoon while swimming in the old Owsley bridge on the south side of the Snake River, according to Gooding County Sheriff's office.

McKinley was swimming out to a boat dock about 300 feet away from the shore. He was wearing a life preserver and was seen by a neighbor who called the sheriff's office. Several people were swimming in the river at the time.

Plans Ahead
WASHINGTON (AP)—Rep. Wayne L. Hays, D-Ohio, has introduced a bill designed to prevent picketing of the immediate Communist concentration camp when Luce Johnson is married Aug. 6.

Hays' bill would ban picketing within 500 feet of any church building in the District of Columbia. A group opposed to the Viet Nam war has announced plans to picket the church on the wedding day.

Surgery Done on Injured Youth
RUPERT — The Rupert youth injured in a dynamite explosion northwest of Paul Tuesday was treated Tuesday afternoon at Mindoka Memorial Hospital.

Surgery was performed Tuesday afternoon on Luce Johnson, 17, to amputate one leg and the foot on the other leg. Family members said it is hoped the remaining leg can be saved.

The explosion occurred on the property of Mrs. and Mr. William Nichols, Route 3, Rupert, the youth was using a jack hammer while clearing debris from an area where a house had been placed Monday night.

Only one charge had exploded and the second went off as Nichols began using the jack hammer.

Possible Execution of U.S. Pilots in Viet Nam Brings Angry Statements
North Viet Nam's recent announcement stating it will try American pilots shot down over its territory as war criminals brought statements of anger from the Twin Falls County Commissioners and residents of Twin Falls Tuesday afternoon.

In a joint release issued by the Twin Falls County commissioners, they said "Because of recent developments in Viet Nam concerning American prisoners of war, we, as the Twin Falls County Commissioners, have decided to act with all the authority in our power to demand swift retaliation if these threats are carried out."

The commissioners said if American pilots and other servicemen are executed, they will apply all the pressure they can, as representatives of Twin Falls County, to the national government demanding they seek vindication for the proposed mock trials.

The commissioners said, "We feel it is time, if these people are tried as war criminals and executed, for us to act as a county, state and nation and rise up and demand retaliation."

"These good men are fighting for us and our freedom, and we owe them an obligation as fellow Americans to support those who are fighting and dying to preserve our way of life."

The commissioners said, although they said the retaliatory strikes should be immediate and severe, didn't state just what they thought the blow should be, but many other persons in Twin Falls did.

The Archbishop of Wroclaw last Sunday called it a government attempt to split the Polish church.

LDS Start Days of '47 Celebration

SALT LAKE CITY (AP)—The Days of '47 celebration, marking the anniversary of the arrival of the first Mormon pioneers on July 24, 1847, has started in Salt Lake City.

A children's parade down Salt Lake City's Main Street Tuesday marked the first of several parades.

A horse parade followed Tuesday night.

President Joseph Fielding Smith, a member of the First Presidency of the LDS Church and president of the Council of Twelve Apostles, was grand marshal of the youth parade.

It was his 90th birthday and later members of his family were on hand for a quiet celebration.

Because Pioneer Day, July 24, falls on Sunday this year, the

main parade is scheduled for Monday, July 25.

And an era not long gone was revived as part of the celebration today.

The old Saltair train, discontinued nearly 20 years ago, began runs from Salt Lake City to Great Salt Lake. The train will run four times daily through Monday.

Burglary Probed

An undetermined amount of cash and cigarettes were taken at a Monday night break-in at Joe Mendiola's Texaco Station, 203 Main Ave. E., state Twin Falls Police.

Police said entry to the building was gained by breaking out a window on the southeast side of the building.

Drawers inside the station had been ransacked, but police said nothing was taken from them. The money and cigarettes were taken from a cigarette machine in the building.

Investigation is continuing.

Records Set By Burroughs

Burroughs Corp. reported Tuesday that new all-time records were established for orders, revenues and earnings during the first six months of this year.

Revenue for the period was \$29,600,000, up 13 per cent from the previous record of \$209,145,000 last year.

Net earnings for the six months were \$11,743,000, compared with \$5,889,000 in 1965. Per share earnings, including

a non-recurring capital gain of 13 cents, were \$1.48 based on an average of 7,939,124 shares versus 80 cents in the first six months of 1965 based on average shares of 7,388,755.

Second quarter revenues were \$122,216,000, exceeding last year's revenue of \$108,300,000 by 13 per cent. Net earnings for the quarter were \$6,434,000 or 80 cents per share versus \$3,111,000 or 42 cents per share in 1965.

Ray R. Eppert, chairman, said more new and very significant products have been released in the first six months of 1966 than in any full year of the company's history.

Protestant Leader Takes Jail Term

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — Protestant extremist leader the Rev. Ian Paisley today chose three months in jail rather than pay a 30 - pound (\$54) fine and promise to keep the peace for two years.

He stood singing a hymn before more than 1,000 of his supporters in Belfast's Ulster Hall and invited the police to step forward and arrest him. None did.

Paisley, with two other clergymen from his own Free Presbyterian Church, and two lay supporters, were found guilty by Belfast magistrates Tuesday of unlawful assembly last month. That was when Paisley led a Protestant procession through the heart of one of the city's Roman Catholic districts, touching off a bloody riot.

Paisley, 40, and the others were offered the choice of paying up or going to jail. They had until noon today to make up their minds.

The three lay supporters paid their fines.

Court officials said the next step would be to issue arrest warrants for the three ministers, which would be served on them at their homes. This process might take several days.

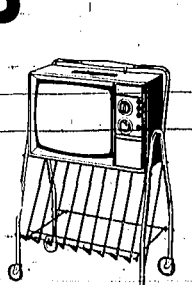
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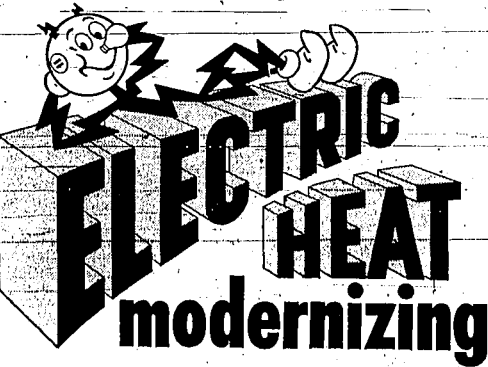
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R. O. Maughn Gets 5-Year Prison Term

Raymond O. Maughn, Twin Falls, was sentenced to five years in the Idaho State Penitentiary in 11th District Court Monday afternoon after pleading guilty to a charge of repeated drunken driving.

Maughn had entered a plea of guilty to a like charge April 15 this year, and Judge Theron B. Ward withheld sentence and placed him on a 12-month probation for the offense. On April 28, Maughn again appeared in District Court with his attorney on another charge of repeated drunken driving.

At this time his probation was revoked, and he was sentenced to five years in jail, but Judge Ward suspended his sentence and once again placed him on a 12-month probation period. Less than two months later, Maughn was charged for violating his probation on a like charge, and once again was ordered to appear in District Court.

Monday he entered a plea of guilty to the charge. Judge Ward then ordered his probation revoked, and Maughn was committed to prison.

Kimberly Man Enters Plea In Fraud Case

Leon Urie, 24, Kimberly, charged in connection with a \$25,000 insurance fraud, entered a plea of not guilty to obtaining money under false pretenses in District Court Monday, and will be tried by jury at a later date.

Urie, currently serving a sentence in the Idaho State Penitentiary for first degree burglary, was charged after he took the fifth amendment at a preliminary hearing for James M. Fraley, Boise, held earlier this spring. Because Urie declined to testify, Fraley, originally charged in connection with the incident, was consequently dismissed for lack of evidence, but James J. May, prosecuting attorney for Twin Falls County, said he could be re-charged if new evidence should arise.

About two years ago, Fraley filed a claim with the Fireman's Fund for \$25,000 after he reportedly fell into a grain elevator at Magic Valley Bean Co., Kimberly. Fraley said he sustained permanent injuries in the fall, and Urie, in a statement, supported Fraley's claim.

The fund later presented Fraley with a check for \$25,000. At a later date, Urie, according to statements made by himself, came to the prosecutor's office and said the entire incident was a hoax, and in reality it had been a scheme to obtain the money. Charges were then filed against Fraley, and when the incident came to Probate Court for preliminary hearing, Urie declined to testify, and requested to withdraw his statements which, according to May, can't be done.

Charges were then dismissed against Fraley, and Urie was charged in connection with the incident.

RUPERT — A special bond election for the proposed city-county law enforcement building, which is to be built on the north side of the Rupert jail, is scheduled for the last week in August.

County commissioners approved holding the vote after the city council previously agreed to hold an election on the same date as the county. The final date will be announced later.

The cost sharing on the new building, approved, is apportioned on a square footage basis and the city-county portion of the building will require a \$100,000 bond issue. Of this amount, approximately \$57,000 will be for the building and the rest for equipment, according to County Clerk August Bethke.

The proposed one-story building is to be 122 by 48 feet and will be constructed with a lobby for the city and county offices. It will include offices for the sheriff's department, an interrogation room and a dark room, a security cell and office for the chief of police and patrolmen.

The police offices also will include an interrogation room, a 17 by 18 foot courtroom and an office for the police judge, office for the state police and civil defense director, and a communications center, where all messages will be taken and relayed to the proper law officials.

According to present plans, if the building is constructed, the driveway behind the courthouse will be eliminated and drive ways from the north and south sides of the courthouse will lead into a parking lot and new facility.

Oiling Set For Streets At Richfield

RICHFIELD—Oiling of some of Richfield's streets and nine miles of rural road seal coating started Tuesday, announces James R. Brown, supervisor of highway district No. 2.

The street in front of the Richfield schools will be closed for several days and others off and on at various times.

Town streets to be oiled include the two blocks in front of the schools and another block north, the entire third street beginning at the Richfield elevator, one block east of the high school, and one block between the two cheese plant buildings.

The North End state road will be sealed coated for six miles, and one half mile will be seal coated two miles north of town on the west road, and one and one half miles seal coated on the west road six miles north of Richfield.

Expense of the road seal coating will be shared by the three county highway districts. The village of Richfield will pay costs of oiling within the town limits.

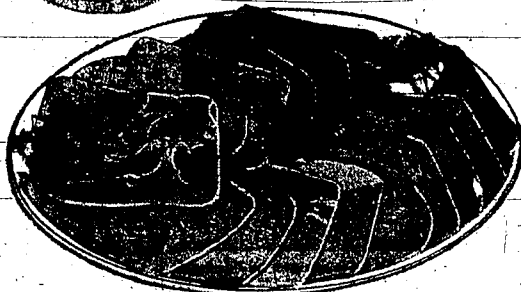

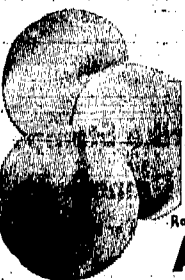

Australian Task Force Sets up Secret Camp to Try Out Tactics

PHUOC TUY PROVINCE, South Viet Nam (AP) — In a rubber plantation southeast of Saigon—the exact spot, still in secret—a 3,000-man Australian task force has set up camp.

The Australians have their own ideas how to fight the Viet Cong and they have the whole province of Phuoc Tuy to try them out.

Many of these men have fought and won a similar guerrilla war in the jungles and plantations of Malaya. About one-third are draftees, new to war like most of the Americans in Viet Nam.

Their mission—as described by their commander, Brig. Oliver David Jackson—is to break up, scatter and destroy the hardcore Viet Cong units in Phuoc Tuy Province; destroy the Viet Cong political apparatus; and then hunt down every Communist terrorist one by one.

Once an area has been freed of Communist domination, the Australians will help the Vietnamese protect it and resettle refugees into it.

It will be a big job. “In the Malaya war we didn’t worry about time,” says Lt. Col. John Armpit, War. “This same attitude will be necessary in Viet Nam.”

“We have to realize that it will take years to complete our mission and simply accept the fact and stay until it is done.”

In making this comparison, War also recognizes differences in the Malaya and Viet Nam wars.

“The Chinese Communists in Malaya were much less active than the Viet Cong,” he said. “The Viet Cong is better armed, has greater dedication and discipline, and is operating in much larger units.”

“Only after we have broken up the enemy regiments and battalions can we fight a Malayan-type campaign.”

Other advantages mentioned by War were better information about the enemy in Malaya and better links between the local government—then British—and the fighting units.

But Viet Nam has some advantages, too. All the Australian company commanders and most of the noncommissioned officers of the task force are veterans of the Vietnam campaign.

Many of these men say the weather and terrain in Phuoc Tuy Province are easier to cope with. It is not so hot and the jungle is not so thick.

Phuoc Tuy is a coastal province, a rough rectangle about 30 by 40 miles. It stretches from the South China Sea northeast to the Saigon River delta up to D Zone. Hundreds of trails wind through the province, offering routes for the Viet Cong from the ocean up to D Zone and Cambodia.

It is believed that two hard-core Viet Cong regiments—about 4,000 men—are based in the province. In addition, to hundreds of local guerrillas. The majority of the 105,000 inhabitants have lived for years under Communist domination.

The province was the scene of one of the Viet Cong’s most spectacular victories 18 months ago. Two government battalions were knocked out of action near the village of Binh Gia.

Since then Viet Cong forces have eluded both Vietnamese and American attempts to run them down. Large areas of the province became a free bombing zone—planes and artillery were allowed to blast at will.

The cycle of Viet Cong take-overs and government counterattacks, of troop assaults and bombardments was too much for the farm people. They abandoned their farms, orchards and plantations. Thousands of refugees now crowd the provincial capital, Ba M.

This is the situation confronting the Australians.

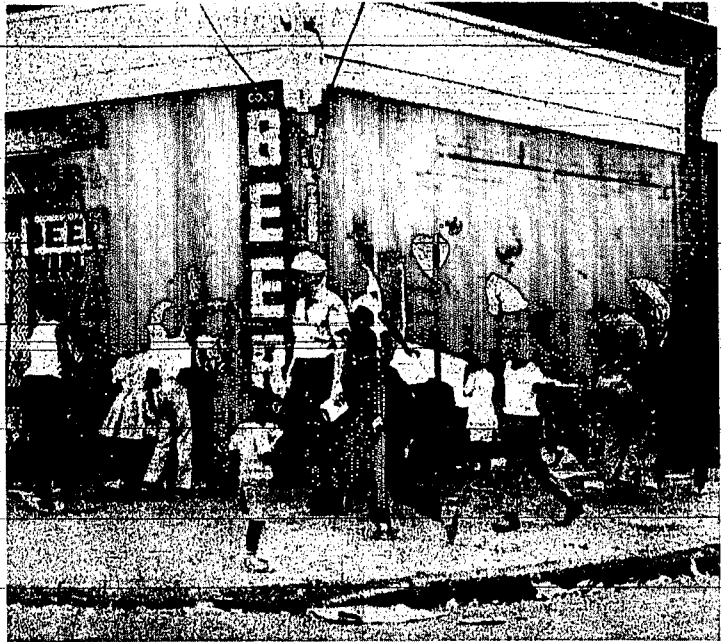

Only Eight Out of Every Thousand Men in Army Will Be Killed in Action

By JOHN T. WHEELER
WASHINGTON (AP) — Mounting Viet Nam casualty figures mask an essential fact: The average GI's chances of leaving Viet Nam alive are five times better than during the Korean War.

Of the next 1,000 men inducted into the Army, only eight probably will be killed in action, current official figures show.

"Thousands of men are poured into the Army every month and must pass through a great series of manpower filters before a relatively few will wind up in Viet Nam assigned to rifle companies, troops where they are likely to see heavy action," an Army source says.

Of the hypothetical 1,000 draftees, about 40 will be wounded, but their chances of dying later are far reduced from Korea or World War II because of helicopter medical evacuation, vastly improved hospital systems and the absence of enemy artillery and airpower.

A significant number of those who do become casualties, including draftees, will be in Viet Nam because they volunteered. More than 4,000 men asked for Viet Nam assignments in the last reporting month.

About 300,000 men will be drafted into the Army under current plans for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1967. And based

on current strength requirements for Viet Nam, a Pentagon spokesman estimated one-third of the total will see service in the war zone.

Army officials are quick to add that any radical change in the Viet Nam situation could rapidly alter such figures but barring some unforeseen turn such as the emergency of Communist China into the conflict, percentage figures are expected to remain about the same.

Salmon Chamber Is Critical of Fishing Closure

SALMON—Salmon Chamber of Commerce board director members, critical of the Idaho Fish and Game Department's handling of the closure of fishing for summer run chinook salmon, have asked that better contact be established between the department and the chamber.

Jack Cook, chairman of the chamber, said the closure had been ordered without any prior consultation with the chamber.

Building Permits for 6 Area Cities Valued at \$2,489,183

Building permits for six Magic Valley cities during the first six months of 1966 totaled \$2,489,183, according to James Phelps, senior vice president, First Security Bank of Idaho, Twin Falls.

A bank report showed permit totals for 27 leading Idaho cities and two unincorporated areas surrounding Boise and Idaho Falls were valued at \$2,489,183. The report said this is an increase of one-tenth of one percent over the same six-month period in 1965.

According to the report, residential construction value totaled \$1,511,145, and was one and four-tenths per cent below the same period a year ago. Commercial and industrial construction for \$9,653,626 was 24.3 per cent behind last year's. On the other hand, according to the report, alterations and repairs totaled \$5,731,850 and were 50 per cent above last year's sum of \$5,556,765.

The report said the estimated value of all construction throughout Idaho for the first five months of 1966 showed a decrease of \$38.4 million over a year ago.

The breakdown for six Magic Valley cities will be by city, number of dwelling units, total permits, money spent by new residents, building money spent by nonresidents, money spent for alterations, additions, repairs, and by total construction in monetary values.
