

Spacemen Head For Earth After Reaching Goals

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—In good spirits, the Gemini 10 astronauts headed for a fiery dive through the atmosphere late today, bringing back to earth a bundle of space achievements. Command pilot John W. Young, a Navy commander, and space-walker Michael Collins, an Air Force major, were to fire the retro-rockets on their last moving spacecraft at 3:30 p.m. EST. They were to drop to a parachute landing in the western Atlantic at 4:07 p.m. A recovery force of ships and planes headed by the helicopter aircraft carrier *Gundakanal* was stationed in the planned landing zone, where weather-conditions were reported good.

Until the re-entry, the astronauts were to drift through space, conducting their precious remaining fuel and conducting whatever photographic and scientific experiments they could. They were ready to come home after three days aloft. In that period they had had the hatch open three times—twice for Collins' business outside and once to jettison items no longer needed.

Discussing that Wednesday night, Young commented: "We'd like to try for five—on the water. One on the left side, one on the right—no more, thank you."

Despite problems that forced Collins to cut short two space excursions, the flight of Gemini 10 was rated one of the best U.S. man-in-space trips yet.

"This mission is one of the most rewarding we've ever flown," commented Flight Director Glynn Lunney.

"John and Mike performed magnificently."

Lunney said Gemini 10 proved the feasibility of rendezvous with both an active and a passive satellite—the Agena 8, which the Agena 8, that man can survive outside a spacecraft, and that a manned satellite can dock with a fuel tanker in space for long periods and use its engine for maneuvering.

"I've should do that," he said in a statement, instead of "making generalized, misleading statements to the public."

Smylie said all four—three Democrats and one Republican—either are now state senators or have served in that capacity during the 12 years he has been governor.

In that time, Smylie said, records provided by the U.S. Department of Commerce show that Idaho's economic growth has exceeded that of neighboring states.

Astronauts Are Celestial Litterbugs

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP)—Astronauts' many achievements in space include the distinction of being the world's foremost celestial litterbugs.

A thermal glove, an exposed roll of color movie film and an expensive 70mm camera are now earth satellites as a result of "misplacements" while astronauts were outside their spacecrafts.

In addition, there is a collection of other orbiting junk discarded intentionally by astronauts to save the trouble of stowing.

Gemini 10 pilots John W. Young and Michael Collins threw away about 14 items Wednesday as they prepared their cabin for re-entry.

Most of these went into the bag that had contained the life-line Collins used for his walk in space. What didn't go into the bag—was just tossed out the hatch, like the life-line itself.

Eventually, all of this space garbage will turn to cinders as gravity pulls it into the dense atmosphere.

"Detained"

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—The U.S. military command today changed its terminology for pilots held in North Viet Nam in an apparent move to discredit Hanoi's efforts to label them war criminals.

Pilots and other military prisoners will be officially listed as "captured" or "detained," the command said, and not as "prisoners" as Hanoi has been listing as "detained."

The change was announced in a memorandum to the press by the command, which said that 45 Americans have been listed as held by the north, almost all of them pilots.

Gun Wound Hospitalizes T.F. Boy, 12

Robert McRill, 12, is listed in fair condition Thursday afternoon at the Magic Valley Memorial Hospital of a gunshot wound.

Police said they were summoned to the Pepsi-Cola plant on Third Avenue West by John McRill, an employee of the plant. The boy, son of Mr. and Mrs. John McRill, was at the plant bleeding profusely from a wound in the left leg.

The boy was taken by ambulance to the hospital about 7:30 p.m. There he told officers something struck him and knocked him to the ground as he was walking on the soft drink plant. The boy, at first, maintained he had been struck by glass.

At the hospital emergency room, officers asked the attending physician what could have caused such a massive wound. The doctor said it appeared to be a gunshot wound, and later sustained this theory when X-rays showed a piece of shot still lodged in McRill's leg.

A hospital source said most of the damage was to muscles, and there didn't appear to be any bone damage.

Further inspection of the injury disclosed buckshot wounds on the torn flesh, and when questioned further by officers, McRill said he was walking in the Pepsi-Cola plant.

Gunfire Ends Night of Bombing, Vandalism in Cleveland Area

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP)—Police and National Guardsmen opened fire on a car early today, wounding a 16-year-old Negro mother and her two small children at the scene of a fire. The blazing guns injured five persons, including a National Guard captain hit by a ricocheting bullet. One of the wounded was a 7-month-old baby. The shooting started when the driver of the car tried to speed off.

A guard spokesman said the gunfire climaxed a night of widely scattered firebombings and vandalism—sporadic disorders following the rioting Monday and Tuesday night that left two Negroes shot to death.

Wounded seriously was Christopher Green, 2, shot in the back of the head, and his mother, Mrs. Diane Towns, 16, hit in the face and shoulder. The boy was in surgery.

The hospital reported another shot in the right leg was Ernest Williams, 12, brother of Mrs. Towns.

A ricochet wounded Capt. James Pletcher, a National Guard officer. He was hit in the right leg.

The gunfire started after a policeman tried to pull the driver from the car. The man clung to the wheel.

"You bastards leave me alone," he growled, cursing the officer. More policemen and National Guardsmen rushed up. The driver was shot in the leg, fighting a \$100,000 fire at a dance hall and skating rink.

Four policemen rushing to the fire were injured when two cruisers collided. Eight hundred National Guardsmen backed up policemen kept down major trouble during the night, but firemen were plagued by 110 calls, including 13 false alarms.

Firebombs were hurled at numerous buildings, setting off small fires. Police reported widespread smashing and looting on some streets.

The combined force of policemen and policemen hit down a major outbreak in the night. (Pronounced "huff") along where rioting Monday and Tuesday nights left two Negroes killed by gunfire and 20 persons injured.

Johnson Predicts U.S. Reaction If Airmen Are Tried

WASHINGTON, (AP)—President Johnson, while carefully avoiding retaliation threats that such trials will be launched "react accordingly," should Hanoi try downed U.S. pilots on charges of war crimes. Asked about North Vietnamese threats that such trials will be launched, Johnson responded at a news conference Wednesday by saying: "I think the people of this country and the peaceful people of the world would find this a very revolting and repulsive, and would react accordingly."

Mansfield Fears Aid Program Hurt

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield expressed concern today the Senate may be damaging the administration's foreign aid program. The senators—Wednesday—cut \$250 million from the proposed development loan program for this year and the \$2.4-billion terms on what was left. "I think the cut was too steep," Mansfield told newsmen at an informal news conference before the Senate convened. Further, he said, "the increase in interest rates during the grace period may have an adverse effect on the All-India Progress which I think is of vital interest to this country."

Mansfield said earlier there was a general feeling of disenchantment in the Senate about the foreign aid bill. "You can cover it up all you want, but the feeling is still there," Mansfield said today in an interview.

Officials of the Agency for International Development solemnly watched from the gallery as the Senate, seemingly in a mutinous mood, took the ax to the \$2.4-billion economic assistance bill.

Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen pointed first to the need for Uncle Sam to save money and then to the spectre of inflation.

Dirksen offered a list of whole wheat bread he likes for sandwiches cost 25 cents last week but when he bought it this week it was 30 cents.

"The people are beginning to get just a little excited, and just a little concerned," he said. "Now, if the economy could change the soldiers in Viet Nam, so he proposed cutting \$250 million from the \$620-million tagged for development loans."

The Senate voted 59 to 34 to make the cut. Chairman J. W. Fulbright of the Foreign Relations Committee—the bill's sponsor—was among the yeas.

"This has been building up for years," said Mansfield. "Now, as we all know, it is complicated by the war, worries about the economy, pinched domestic programs and high interest rates."

5 Found Dead In New Jersey Apartment

NEWARK, N.J. (AP)—Five persons were found dead in a fourth-floor flat this afternoon, Newark police reported. Found with the 30-year-old woman was her 13-year-old son.

A woman, Rosa Gonzalez, 25, and two children, about 2 and 6 years old, and an 8-year-old girl lived in a nearby apartment. They were found with Vargas, police said.

There were no visible marks on the woman and children, police said.

Sen. Brooks Scores Criticism Of Drought Relief Position

ROBERT—Emergency drought relief does mean bringing surplus feed grains into Magic Valley, Sen. Mark Brooks said Wednesday in point-of-reference to criticism from Otell Smith Jr., Democratic candidate for the House of Representatives.

"Before Mr. Smith speaks up, he'd do well to know what he's talking about," Sen. Brooks declared. "In the first place, he should go back and read my statement on drought relief."

Sen. Brooks said the only use of surplus feed grains in Magic Valley, of which he is aware, occurred in Lincoln County back in 1961. Some corn and sorghum were brought into the area but made no impression on local prices.

"Neither, former-districted ASC committees make the decision about surplus feed grains and they're not going to do something that would depress local prices," he declared.

Askus Cut

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—A special U.N. committee that studied the international organization's troubled financial situation recommended a sharp cut in the number of conferences sponsored.

The committee noted that there are about 7,200 such meetings a year now.

Monk Sets Self Afire After Meeting

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP)—An 18-year-old Buddhist monk set himself afire today after South Viet Nam's most militant monk, Thich Quang Duc, told a religious meeting he would continue his 44-day anti-government fast.

The young monk, identified as Quang Thuan, was rushed to a hospital in critical condition but was still alive two hours after he doused himself with gasoline and squatted in the quiet street outside Buddhist Youth Institute headquarters.

It was not immediately known if Quang Thuan was a follower of the Premier Nguyen Cao Ky resign.

People at the scene said Quang Thuan's attempted self-immolation was thwarted when he fell backward into a puddle of water after burning for about 10 minutes.

Quang Thuan told the meeting at the Buddhist Youth Institute that he had been asked to end his fast, but declared he would not do so.

He said he had been asked to end the meeting and was escorted into and out of the building on the arms of two monks.

That put the price for regular grade at 31 to 32 cents a gallon. Operators said the price cutting resulted from establishment of a coin-operated self-service station in East Caldwell.

Exchangites Hear Talk By Candidate

"The right of privacy or, in other words, the right to be let alone, is not a right guaranteed by either the United States Constitution or the Constitution of the State of Idaho."

This is a comment of Douglas D. Kramer, a member of Idaho's Constitutional Revision Commission while speaking before the Twin Falls Exchange Club Tuesday.

"The Courts of this land are in disagreement as to whether or not an individual has a right of privacy, and because of this fact I have recommended to the Idaho Constitutional Revision Commission that this right be added to the rights already stated to the citizens of this state."

Kramer said, "I believe this right is necessary to protect the average citizen from abuses of his personal rights. A citizen should not have to fear about his phone being tapped or his private conversations recorded. By the same token citizens who have chosen to become public figures cannot insist upon a privacy which destroys freedom of press or speech. Every citizen, however, should have the right to be let alone in his personal life."

Kramer, who is also a candidate for State Senator in District No. 24, commented, "When I am elected to the State Senate, I will vote to recommend this Constitutional change to the people."

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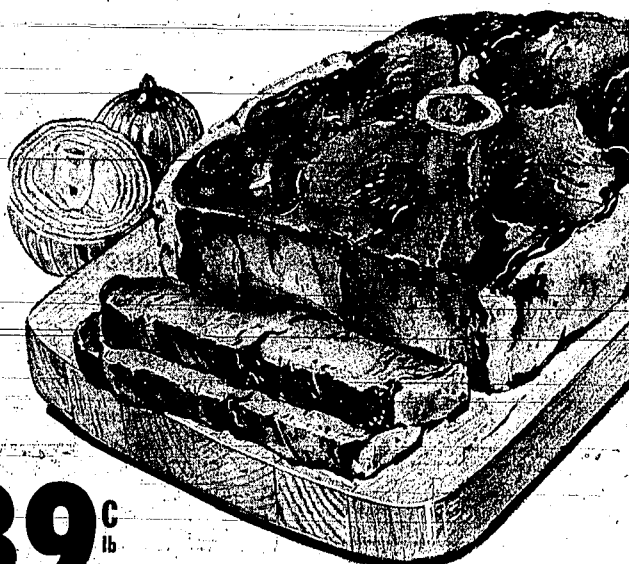
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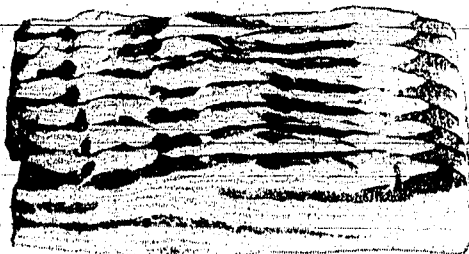


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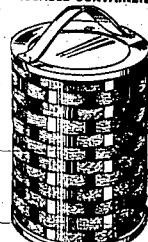
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Plans for Music Camp Concert Noted

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Johnson Appears to Enjoy Screaming, Mobbing of 3,086 Foreign Students

WASHINGTON (AP)—Running, screaming students from overseas pursued President Johnson around his back yard. With a caggy detour he outwitted them, then returned for more.

Shrubs were flattened. Cedar limbs were broken. Flowers were smashed.

Johnson strolled to the south lawn of the White House Wednesday to greet 3,086 American Field Service students from 39 countries. The teenagers return home this weekend after a year in the United States.

The students were ready. Cameras were up, pencils out. The President, Lady Bird and daughter Lynda walked to a makeshift bandstand amid clapping, cheers and wolf whistles.

He spoke briefly, urging the young people to seek peace, fight poverty, ignorance and disease and work toward world understanding.

"I have been assured that you are future leaders of your countries—future prime ministers and lawmakers and First Ladies," he said. He left the platform amid more cheers.

Ropes holding back the students sagged and Secret Servicemen closed in around the President as the future prime ministers surged forward.

"Steel Here!" they shouted, reaching for his hands, showing cameras toward his face. White

House police tried to push the crowd back and student chaplains appealed for order. It was too late.

The President and his party made their way across a vine-covered hillside, apparently headed for his office. Hundreds of the teenagers followed in hot pursuit. Two students lost shoes. One was knocked off her feet.

Police pushed the students back toward the south lawn, behind ropes. Turning unexpectedly, Johnson headed back toward another segment of his 3,086 young visitors.

This sent the rear detachment of the first onslaught running breathlessly toward him. Security lightened. One officer wiped his brow. Another refused to let those with passes into normally approved areas, shouting, "This is an emergency!"

The President seemed to relish the attention. He nodded, grabbed hands and smiled in the bright-afternoon sunshine.

He walked alone down the driveway toward his office as police held the students behind the ropes. Halfway there, he turned toward the still cheering young people and watched them a moment as if contemplating victory.

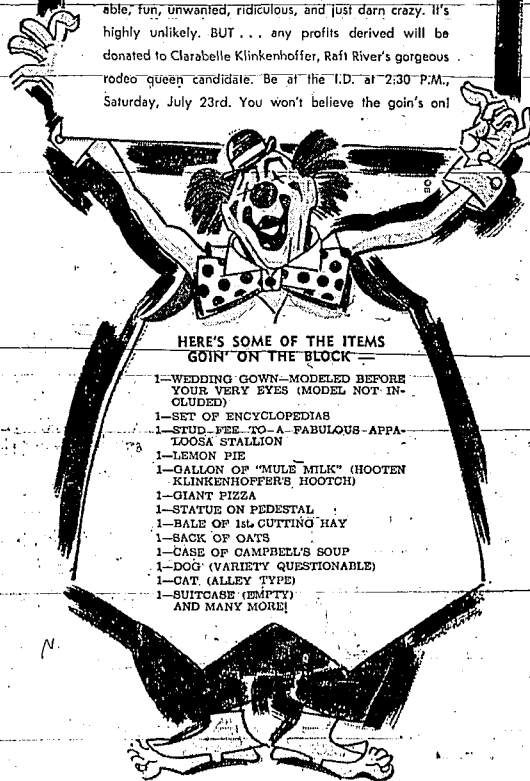

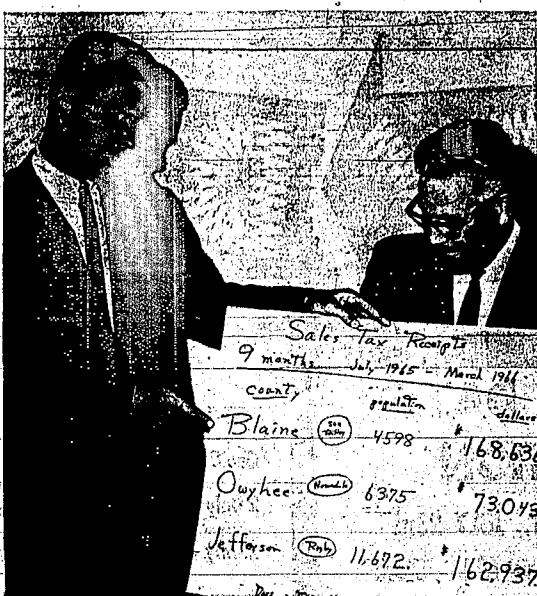



The stocky, 47-year-old Romanian native lost both hands last Nov. 18 when he tried to free a piece of meat stuck in a steel meat press. He had returned in March after doctors fitted him with hooklike devices. Then a fellow employee gave Seiz a New York newspaper

story about the electronic hands. He entered the Montreal Institute of Rehabilitation, the nearest place where the hands, made in Russia, are available. He returned to his job as a meat cutting supervisor Wednesday.

The hands are made of plastic and are operated by a small motor attached to arm transistors. Movement of the arm muscles sets off the mechanism, which is powered by batteries hooked to a belt.

Jungert May Be Candidate for Governor

Philip Jungert of Lewiston, who favors legalized gambling in Idaho, said Wednesday he may announce his candidacy for the governorship Monday.

Jungert said if polls now being conducted to determine the popularity of his platform with Idaho voters brought favorable results, he would run as an independent candidate for governor.

Jungert was president of the pro-gambling group, Greater Idaho, Inc., but he announced Wednesday he would take a six-month leave of absence from his position.

Greater Idaho advocates legalized gambling as a revenue-raising and tourist-attracting device. Jungert said his canvas workers were asking Idahoans what they think of a program of tourism and gaming as a replacement for the sales tax, head tax, personal property tax, livestock and inventory tax, and if they would support me if I ran on this plan.

U. S. Rep. George Hansen, R-Idaho, said Wednesday he has been taking a poll, too. The Republican said results of questionnaires he had sent to residents of his district showed they did not favor expansion of the anti-poverty program but wanted increased military pressure on North Viet Nam.

He said 11 per cent of those sent questionnaires answered

Andrus spoke to the Ada County Democratic Women's Club, suggesting merchants be per-

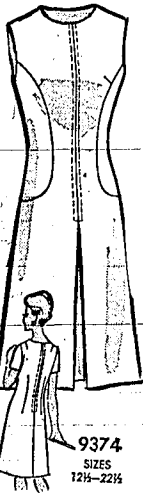

Banking Unit Will Try to End Rate War

End Rate War

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Banking Committee, in the face of another heavy drop in deposits at savings and loan associations, will try next week to draft a cease-fire in the not interest rate war for savings.

Facing the committee will be figures expected to show a drop in savings and loan associations unparalleled in the current tight money market of high interest rates and scarcity of loan money.

Net withdrawals from associations are expected to total about \$1 billion during July.

Requests for committee action have come within the past week from the Johnson administration, the Federal Reserve Board and the Federal Home Loan Bank Board which regulates the savings and loan industry.

Rep. William D. Saxton, D-N.J., the committee chairman, has expressed hope that a bill will be approved by the committee on Monday to halt the competition for savings. He prefers a temporary 4.5 per cent ceiling on interest rates.

The next move was left up to Congress after the Federal Reserve and the Home Loan Bank boards approved revisions to their regulations designed to ease some of the pressure on the savings and loan industry.

The war formally began last December when the Federal Reserve Board raised from 4.5 to 5.5 per cent the interest rate banks may pay on time deposits.

Jury Lists To Represent Population

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — A U.S. appeals court has held that both federal grand jury and trial jury lists must be made up from a pool of persons broadly representative of the community.

"A person need only be able to read, write, speak, and understand English, he need not enjoy that degree of excellence found only among the more fortunate classes of our society," the fifth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals ruled Wednesday.

The court said in effect that Negroes must be represented on jury lists at least in their proportion to the population.

The court nullified the convictions in two cases involving civil rights workers at Albany, Ga. in 1963.

The cases were among seven involving the question of the racial makeup of both state and federal juries studied by the court last December in a two-day hearing in which all nine justices took part.

The reversal of the convictions was unanimous. The panel also ruled 5-4 that the indictments against the defendants be dismissed.

RECEIVE CONTRACT
SEATTLE (AP) — The Boeing Co. has received a government contract to look into ways of making the sun shine at night.

The \$24,000 award is for a study of the feasibility of reflecting a huge satellite to reflect light from the sun on to the dark side of the earth.

Plane Makes Dramatic Landing

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) — A detoured airliner carrying 38 persons made a dramatic emergency landing in a shower of sparks early today on a foam-covered runway.

Fire engines, ambulances and crash vehicles raced down the runway as the Braniff turbojet skidded in the foam and spun into a grassy field at Carswell Air Force Base.

Alpine officials said the 33 passengers and five crew members on Flight 133 from Chicago to Houston, all escaped injury.

A landing gear problem developed just before the airliner was due to land at Houston. It circled several times before the pilot, Capt. James O. Thompson of Farmers Branch, Tex., north to Love Field in Dallas.

The left main landing gear could not be lowered. The right gear and nosewheel descended normally but jammed.

Thompson was ordered to take the crippled airliner to Carswell, a base with long runway and extensive crash equipment.

Utah Tourist Travel Shows Big Increase

Utah's tourist travel in June was 72 per cent higher than during June last year according to a state survey.

The University of Utah's Bureau of Economic and Business Research in a report for the state figured slightly more than a million tourists were in Utah in June this year and spent \$34 million.

California tourists amounted to 27.7 per cent of the total, the report issued Wednesday indicated. The university bureau makes checks at points where highways enter Utah and computes estimates under an agreement with the state.

Monarch Paper Halted in Spain

MADRID, Spain (AP) — The Franco government today halted distribution of an issue of the monarchist paper ABC, Spain's leading paper, which carried an editorial supporting the claim of Don Juan de Borbon to the Spanish throne.

France is sympathetic to restoration of the monarchy in Spain but is grooming Prince Juan-Carlos, son of Don Juan, for the throne.

Candidate Backs U.S. War Policies

A. W. (Bill) Brunt, Democratic candidate from the Second Congressional District, expressed his approval of President Johnson's conduct of the Vietnam War in a speech Tuesday night before a meeting of the Twin Falls Democratic Central Committee.

Brunt said, "Critics of President Johnson by some magic would turn back the clock and the calendar and start over. They fail to realize that President Johnson had to make his decision on foreign policy from the moment he became President, taking into consideration all that had gone before, and how it stood then."

Brunt said, "The President has a grave responsibility, knowing that the final decision rests with him on many things, affecting the lives and futures of so many people."

Brunt continued, "The bombing of the oil reserves and the possible future use of blockades moves us closer to the day when we can sit down at the peace table, because the North Vietnamese will only be willing to talk peace when they realize there is no hope of winning."

Rights Leader Visits Viet Nam

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — Whitney Young, the first U.S. civil rights leader to visit Viet Nam, began a tour today to "examine the needs and problems" of the estimated 40,000 Negroes serving here.

Young, executive secretary of the National Urban League, arrived Wednesday, lunched with Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge and was briefed by U.S. military officials.

FIRE CONTROLLED
BRIDGEWATER, England (AP) — Fire broke out today in Britain's newest nuclear power station but the blaze was quickly checked. Officials said there was no nuclear danger to workmen in the plant or to people living in the vicinity.

Doomed Dogs Used to Train Army Medics for War Cases

FT. BRAGG, N.C. (AP) — Under anaesthetic, a dog is taken to a ballistics chamber and placed in a sling 15 feet from a mounted 30 caliber rifle.

An instructor shoots the dog in the thigh. The animal then is taken to an operating room where a U.S. Army Special Forces medic begins a three-hour operation on the wound.

After surgery, the medic must nurse the dog back to health. This normally takes several weeks.

When fully recovered, the dog is returned to surgery where the medic amputates a leg — again while the animal is under anaesthetic. The dog then is put to death. It has been the medic's "patient" for about three weeks.

The sacrifice of animals has one purpose — to save human lives in places like Viet Nam, says Lt. Col. Richard L. Coppage, chief of the office of the surgeon branch of the John F. Kennedy Center for Special Warfare at Ft. Bragg.

The experiments on the dogs give the medic trainees an opportunity to treat wounds, observe the effects of shock and deal with other medical problems.

The training program is considered one of the toughest in the Army. It takes 40 weeks to complete, with training ranging from a basic aid course to a month of surgical instruction.

The medic, says Special Forces Capt. Barton D. Urbauer, head of the laboratory division, has five jobs.

He cares for his own soldiers, and assists civic action programs to improve the environment of a particular area.

The dogs, say Special Forces officials, are obtained from county kennels around North Carolina and already have been apparently had been made from the contents of 15 or 20 dynamite sticks.

Bomb Found At Utah LDS Stake Farm

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A homemade bomb was found Wednesday in the driveway of the Stake Farm of the Cannon Pioneer Stake of the LDS Church.

Salt Lake County sheriff's deputies said the bomb, a plastic bag containing a liquid explosive and sawdust, was found by the caretaker, Merlin Morill. They said the bomb's fuse had burned but the detonating cap had failed to explode.

Demolition experts from Hill Air Force Base were called to dispose of the bomb. Deputy Daryl Robertson said the bomb

I am in favor of airport districts in the state of Idaho because air transportation is so important to our economy."

Larsen continued, "I feel the office of county commissioner is very important because it is the only grass roots government we have left—the county government. I feel a person should not run for political office unless he can win like a gentleman and lose like a man."

Larsen, who calls himself a Jefferson Democrat, was a Democratic precinct committeeman and also served for 15 years on the BLM board of directors. He was chairman of a State of Idaho Forest Advisory Board and past director of the Idaho Cattlemen's Association. He was president of the Western Stockgrowers Association and of the Salmon River Cattlemen's Association.

Larsen said, "I am a strong booster of the junior college system in Idaho. I think it is a fine move and it will be quite a strong factor in the building of our community."

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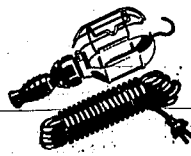

Negro GIs Dislike Segregation at Leesville

—LEESVILLE, La. (NEA)—This small logging community, snuggled on the fringe of the Fort Polk Army installation, is a temporary home town for some 1,500 soldiers a month who train to wage the war in South, east Asia.

There is a municipal golf course here, a skating rink, a lovely lake nearby, public gardens, three movie theaters and a 25,000 volume library.

A pleasant enough place for servicemen, really.

Except—Negro servicemen. Leesville is segregated.

Color is color here, uniformed or not. Some eateries will not serve the black man and some theaters will not welcome his ticket. Some barkeepers ignore his orders and some shopkeepers are not interested in his money. He feels uncomfortable swimming at the lake, drinking at the public fountains and walking in the nicer parts of town.

It hurts, of course. Especially now. Especially training for Viet Nam.

"I don't mind going to war," one Negro recruit explains. "But I do dislike going there by way of Leesville, Louisiana."

This feeling is widespread throughout Fort Polk's colored population. Those who have come here from other southern cities are generally used to it but expect something better so near a government compound.

And those who have come here from the North are, in the words of one, "simply shocked."

Says he: "I've never been treated like this before."

"Where are you from?" he is asked.

"New Jersey, originally."

"And you never experienced this before?"

"Oh, sure, but nothing so open."

"How do you mean?"

"Nigger, for instance, is proper pronunciation in this place."

"And?"

"And they act like you're leaving germs in your footprints."

So embittered are some Negroes, in fact, that they simply refuse to stray from the post. Those who do go tend to stick together, avoid the popular spots and settle for recreation provided by the area's Negro community.

This grouped, these soldiers also remain in cliques back in

the barracks instead of mixing with the same whites they will live and die with in the war.

"I've no Caucasian friends here at all," one of them says flatly.

And why?

"Because if I can't have a sandwich with a white fellow downtown at a cafe, I don't care to have one with him in camp at the post exchange."

Leesville, of course, is not the only segregated military town in the South. Several others are even more so. But what makes the situation especially pregnant here is that Fort Polk trains soldiers for 12 months of war. Designated Negroes know during nine weeks of classwork that they will ship out to fight when school is over.

"So," says a student, "this is hardly a warm send-off."

"I hate to think," adds another, "that this may be the last American town I ever see."

But, though the social predicament is unfortunate, it is by no means unique for colored GIs. It has been the same in many military hamlets since American fighting forces were established late in the 1700s.

And perhaps this is the big-

gest rub of all.

Because the young Negro trooper no longer expects it. He is tutored on enlightenment and law. And, with another chapter being added to 200 years of black-white participation in war, he is stunned that it has had so little effect on racial progress.

As one youngster puts it:

"If I can fight for this town's freedom, why can't it do the same for mine?"

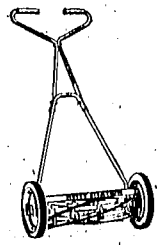

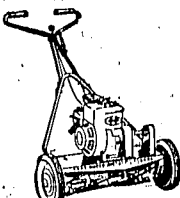

Foreign Students Choose Unusual Souvenirs of U. S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two Del Plata, Argentina: "We have no drinking age (limit) in Argentina. Nobody can drink any amount of alcohol. Playboy magazine, and about 15 tons of excess fat."

That may not sound like a list of tourist souvenirs of a trip to the United States, but for 3,000 youngsters, it was.

There was, of course, a smattering of models of the Statue of Liberty, picture post cards of the White House at night and a few Indian blankets.

But after living in this country for nearly a year under "typical American home" conditions, 3,088 teenagers from 59 foreign countries were far more interested in returning home with, as one put it, "the little things we can't get or can't afford in our own countries."

The teenagers arrived late last summer to live and study in the United States under the auspices of the American Field Service. They stayed with American families and many who were high school seniors when they arrived, were returning home with diplomas from American schools.

As they gathered here during their last week in this country they had curious souvenir lists and some frank comments about the American way of life.

Most startling for many of the students was Americans' strange drinking habits. Some sample comments:

Stella de la Garma, 18, of Mar

Del Plata, Argentina: "We have no drinking age (limit) in Argentina. Nobody can drink any amount of alcohol. Playboy magazine, and about 15 tons of excess fat."

Hans Joerg Niebergall, 18, of Bremen, Germany: "American beer tastes like soapy water. And Americans pour beer down the side of glasses to keep foam down. That's just making bad beer worse."

Jose Filomino, 19, of Sao Paulo, Brazil: "In my country, if you can reach the bar, you can order a beer."

But, apparently in Brazil, he can't get old Confederate flags because they number among Jose's souvenirs, as does a set of Ohio license plates.

"There's no particular reason for them," he said. "I just like them."

WILL GET AWARD
NEW ORLEANS, La. (AP) — Dr. Roberto de Oliveira Campos, Brazilian economist and diplomat, will receive the Theodore Brien Inter-American Award in October from International House.

One rather universal souvenir among the students was excess personal poundage.

Nearly all of them gained weight, they said, in amounts varying from 8 to 35 pounds.

If conservatively averaged at 10 pounds per student, this totals more than 15 tons.

"It's not surprising," said Antonio Ringot, 19, of Paris. "American take cars everywhere they go. When I went to the mall, I took a car."

Housewife's Budget Hit by Hot Weather

NEW YORK (AP)—Chickens have turned lazy in the hot summer weather and are laying fewer eggs. The result: wholesale prices of a dozen eggs rose as much as seven cents in the past week.

The heat in much of the country continued to hit the housewife's pocketbook.

Wholesale food prices climbed again.

The sun shriveled snap beans in Maryland and Pennsylvania and peas in Wisconsin.

Cherry yield in the Great Lakes area is estimated at half of last year's crop, and higher prices are forecast for peaches, plums, and apples in all but Southwestern areas.

But that favorite American pastime, the great barbecue, goes on.

Broilers, beef cuts, and turkey are featured in many supermarkets this week. Hamburger and steak lovers can find good buys in many areas.

Salads can still be made at

reasonably low cost, with a heavy harvest of tomatoes in California offsetting adverse weather in the rest of the country. Lettuce, radishes, green peppers, and onions are moderately plentiful.

That scorching weather that plagues the bean grower is a blessing to the corn farmer. An estimated 59 per cent increase in this year's harvest will mean lower corn prices.

While milk-lovers pay more for their favorite beverage, black-coffee addicts have rarely had it so good. Coffee prices are down.

Other buys include potatoes, carrots, grapes, raisins, and pears.
