

Autopsy of Sniper Who Shot Down 15 in Austin Reveals Brain Tumor

AUSTIN, Tex. (AP)—An autopsy on the body of Charles Joseph Whitman, the campus sniper who killed 15 persons Monday, revealed a brain tumor which could have caused intense headaches that may have indirectly contributed to his shooting rampage, Justice of the Peace Jerry Dellana said today. The autopsy was performed by Dr. C. DeChenar. Dellana said DeChenar is performing further tests to find out if the tumor is cancerous. "He found a small brain tumor close to the brain stem, about the size of a pecan—this is the term he gave me," Dellana said.

Johnson Presses For Gun Control

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Johnson, deploring the "shocking tragedy" on the University of Texas campus, said today, "We must press urgently" for a federal gun control law. In a statement, Johnson said Congress has been considering such legislation for many months. "The time has come for action," he said. Johnson, who personally knew one of the victims of the campus sniper, joined Mrs. Johnson in sending a telegram to the university's chancellor, H. Ransom Rouse, saying: "We want to assure you of my personal or official assistance that would in any way be helpful."

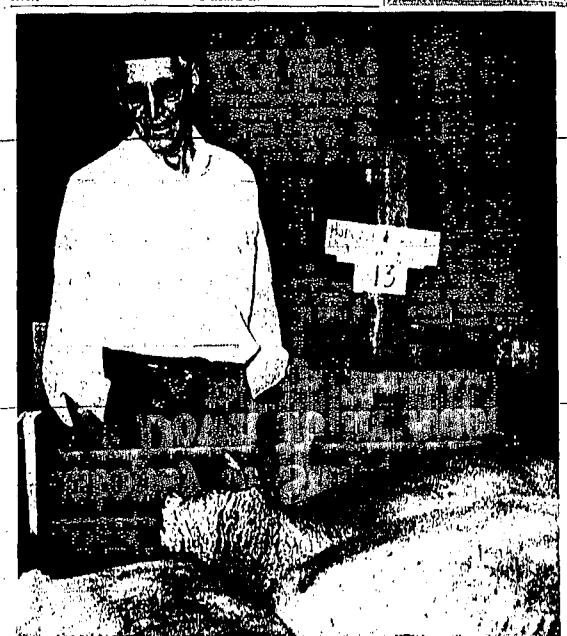
Bill D. Moyers, White House press secretary, said the administration will push for a gun control law stronger than one approved in March by a Senate Judiciary subcommittee. Moyers said the President wants the legislation to encompass controls on rifles and shotguns as well as hand guns. The President knew Paul Sonntag, 18, grandson of Paul Bolton, news editor of Austin television-radio station KTVB, which is owned by the Johnson family. The President phoned Bolton Monday to express his sorrow.

The President said he knew many in Congress share his view that a gun control law should be enacted promptly "before the loss of life that might be prevented by its passage."

Introduction of gun control bills in Congress was spurred by the 1963 assassination of President John F. Kennedy with a mail order rifle. The chief Senate sponsor of gun legislation was out ahead of Johnson's statement with an expression of hope that the Austin shooting would push the measure to passage.

Nixon Talks With Israel Premier

JERUSALEM (AP)—Former U.S. Vice President Richard Nixon and Premier Levi Eshkol had a long talk today on relations and other international matters. Nixon, on a round-the-world tour, arrived in Israel Monday night and shortly after called on former Premier David Ben-Gurion at his residence in Tel Aviv.

Governor Race Catches Eye as Smylie Submits Re-Election Bid

BOISE (AP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie submitted to Idaho voters today his bid for re-election to a fourth four-year term. If he wins the nomination and the election in November he will serve as governor more than twice as long as any other Idahoan. Polls in the biennial primary election opened at noon and will close at 8 p.m.

Mansfield Opposes "Dictatorial Power"

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield said today Congress will be handing dictatorial powers to President Johnson if it approves legislation authorizing him to order an end to the airline strike. "I haven't yet reached the state in my legislative life where I want to give the President powers which would in effect make him a dictator," the Montana senator told newsmen. Mansfield, urging enactment of a formula under which Congress itself would order a six-month halt in the strike, now 26 days old, said Johnson does not want the authority.

2 Bogalusa Men Charged With Slaying

BOGALUSA, La. (AP)—Two white men were charged today with murder in the slaying of a Negro.

Charged Monday were Homer R. Seale and John W. Copling Jr., both 36.

Police said they were accused of killing Clarence Triggs, 21, a construction worker, whose body was found last Saturday beside the wrecked car registered in the name of Seale's wife. Triggs had been shot in the head.

Police Chief Claxton Knight said there were no racial implications in the death but added that authorities were "conducting an intensive investigation."

All rams for consignment are in their pens at the fairgrounds so prospective buyers may look them over. The animals will be inspected by Dr. Robert E. Stommon, inspector in charge of the state sheep commission.

U.S. Hit for Bombing of Haiphong

TOKYO (AP)—North Viet Nam charged that U.S. planes bombed the port of Haiphong today, hitting factories and residences. In a protest message to the International Control Commission, the army high command charged that many U.S. planes "attacked Haiphong city, indiscriminately bombing residential quarters and factories, thus adding to their extremely savage crimes against the Vietnamese people." The report of this was broadcast from Hanoi. "This is the third time," the protest said, "that U.S. aggressors launched an air raid on Haiphong, a populous city and the greatest port of North Viet Nam."

Ball, U Thant Discuss Ways To Cut War

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (AP)—U.S. Undersecretary of State George W. Ball talked privately today with Secretary General U Thant on possible steps that might lead to a reduction in military activity and an ultimate solution of the Viet Nam situation.

Ball met for an hour and 10 minutes with Thant, who has just returned from talks in Moscow on Viet Nam.

Ball said the United States requested the meeting with the secretary general.

There was no immediate comment from the secretary general. U.S. planes were shot down, five over Haiphong and one over adjacent Hai Duong Province.

There had been no announcement from Saigon of such a raid.

Traffic Toll Climbs With 2 More Deaths

Magic Valley's traffic death toll continued to climb Tuesday with the deaths of a Buhl youth Monday night when the gas truck he was driving overturned and caught fire and an Indiana woman from injuries received July 14 in a one-vehicle accident 11 miles south of Malta in Cassia County. Officers identified the Monday night victim as Anthony, 19, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank T. Giese, Route 1, Buhl, who was trapped in the flaming truck when it went off Highway 25 six miles west of Bliss.

The death of Mrs. Katherine Dail, 63, Anderson, Ind., in Cassia Memorial Hospital, Bliss, Monday, was attributed to injuries received when the 1965 Ford three quarter ton truck in which she was riding went out of control and overturned on Highway 305.

Officers said the Sinclair gas truck was driving west on Highway 25 west of the right side of the road where it rolled over, then rolled back to injure the driver when it burst into flames.

Officers said Giese was trapped in the flaming truck. The Bliss Fire Department was called to put out the flames. Officers were driving west on Highway 25 when they spotted the truck to get the youth's body out.

Officers said the truck, which was carrying a load of hay, was traveling east, headed on the driver's side, trapping the youth.

The owner of the 1962 International truck, Clarence McNelly, 46, Buhl, was thrown from the truck. He was reported in good condition Tuesday with a broken back and broken shoulder.

He was taken by ambulance to Gooding Memorial Hospital. Investigating officers were Gooding County Sheriff Vern Ruyse, deputy Dal Muir and Idaho State Patrolman Harold Morales.

John Anthony Giese was born Feb. 16, 1947, at Gooding and moved to Buhl with his parents in June, 1959.

He attended Buhl schools, graduating from the Buhl High School in 1965. Last year he attended Idaho State University.

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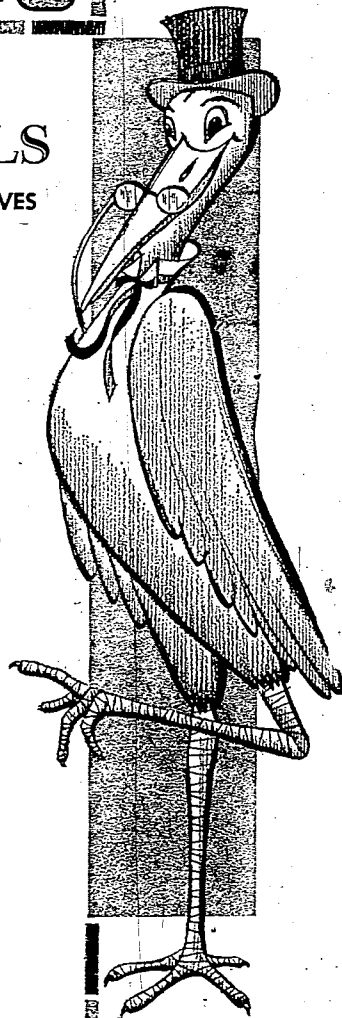

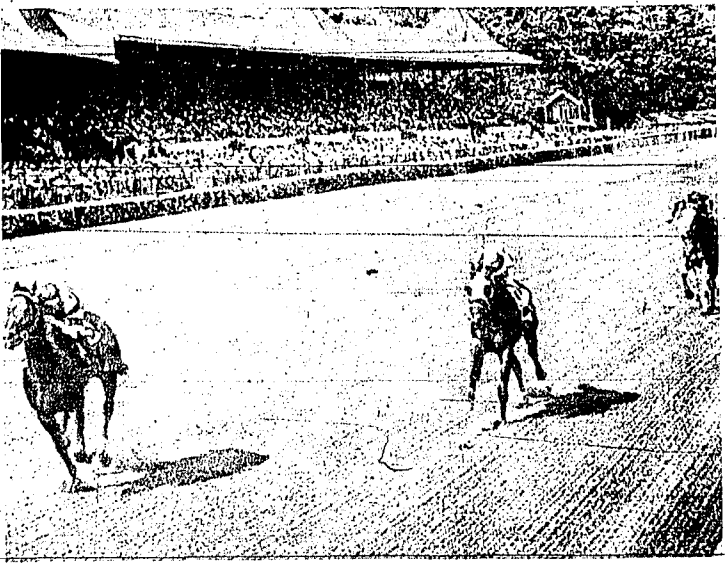

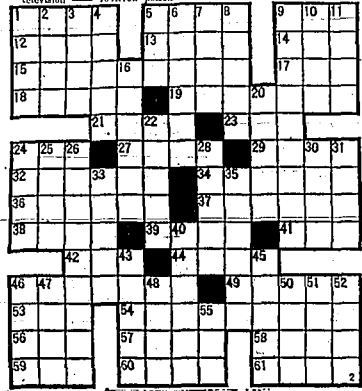

TIME DOESN'T SPOIL ACES
North had quite a rebuilding problem. He could jump to three spades but did not like that with only three-card support. Finally he decided that, if his partner could not act over two clubs, there would be no game for his side. When South found a second bid, North jumped right to the spade game.

West came up with the inspired opening lead of the eight of clubs. If South were looking at all the cards, he would have

loser and was looking at two potential diamond losers. Theoretically he could ruff them out but in practice it would not work. He would run out of trumps in the process.

He could ruff one diamond without much trouble and set up a diamond discard on one of dummy's hearts if East held the ace of hearts. South planned to fall back on that play but looked around for an extra chance first.

He decided that East's play had marked West with the last two trumps. In that case, South could afford to play a club right away. He did so and West was in with the king.

West could not stand prosperity. It never occurred to West that his ace of hearts could never run way from him. Instead, West asked, "Do we have three tricks left?" Then he slapped his ace of hearts on the table.

South ruffed, drew trumps and claimed the rest of the tricks.

Vigorous Doctor Takes Hard New Look Inside Medicine Cabinet of Nation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Early this year a lean and vigorous doctor yanked the door open to take a hard new look inside the nation's medicine cabinet.

Dr. James Lee Goddard—soon to win the nickname "Go Go Goddard"—was disenchanted with a good deal of what he saw as new commissioner of the Food and Drug Administration, and as the first medical doctor to hold that office.

In a country highly conscious about drugs, he quickly and forcefully made his views known.

He ordered half a dozen or so prescription drugs off the market on grounds they were mislabeled or didn't live up to claims.

He accused drug manufacturers of often being irresponsible, and lashed out at what he saw as faults in drug advertising.

The Goddard approach has spurred some protests from pharmaceutical leaders and some doctors as well.

They object that his accusations and some actions are too sweeping, too abrupt, undemocratic, unfair.

Some accuse him of slowing the progress of medical research, and of interfering with the practice of medicine.

None of which bothers the 43-year-old Goddard, says a close aide.

His critics generally do not argue with his objectives—but with his methods. Says Dr. Goddard: "The optimum degree of public protection is our goal."

Since taking office Jan. 17, Dr. Goddard's whirlwind of activity has put the FDA smack in

front of the public eye.

Some drug industry leaders say they hope Goddard's moves were designed primarily to give the FDA a new image, and that now or soon he may adopt a more moderate course.

A Goddard aide implies that creating a "new image" was part of the new commissioner's plans, saying:

"Until recently, the FDA was a much-underrated agency. In its drug responsibilities."

Amendments to the food and drug law, passed in 1962, gave FDA the task of seeing to it that new drugs—and old ones as well, in FDA's interpretation—were not only safe but also effective. And they greatly tightened requirements for animal and human testing before a potential new drug could be approved for wider scale human testing—or before it could enter the market for general distribution.

These changes followed congressional hearings that aired—among other things—the tragedy of a sleeping pill, thalidomide, which horribly deformed babies born to some women taking the pills during pregnancy. Developed in Germany, thalidomide had not been approved for marketing in this country.

Dr. Goddard is heaping up the FDA medical and scientific staff, and is heaving to the new amendments, with which "I am in strong agreement." For about two years he practiced medicine in his native Ohio, and has served in public health posts for more than a dozen years, the last three as director of the Communicable Disease

Five of the 15 council members have pledged to vote for the resolution. They are Jordan and Mali, the sponsors; Nigeria, the Soviet Union and Bulgaria.

Joseph Kennedy Has Checkup

BOSTON (AP) — Former Ambassador Joseph P. Kennedy has been admitted to New England Baptist Hospital for what was described as a medical checkup.

The 77-year-old patriarch of the Kennedy family entered the hospital Monday. His personal physician, Dr. Russell S. Bates, said his condition was good.

Kennedy suffered a mild heart attack July 18 at his home in Hyannis Port.



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
