



## Large Forest Fire Noted in Washington

COLVILLE, Wash. (AP) — A forest fire said to be the largest in the Colville Forest since 1934 was reported out of control by the U.S. Forest Service Thursday.

The 1,000-acre fire was burning in heavy slash, standing timber and thick dry brush, according to Forest Service spokesman Elmer Luch.

Over 300 men were fighting the fire, with more scheduled to arrive. Luch said the fire fighters included 10 youth from the Curlew Job Corps Center, 25 Indians from the Spokane Indian Reservation and blaster rust crews from the Kanitus and Cocur d'Alene forests.

Five airplanes shuttled from Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, to the fire to drop chemical retardants. Three helicopters also were used. Luch said a C-130 Hercules, an aircraft made the retardant drops difficult.

Children of Maple Valley who will enter school for the first time this fall are being offered free vision readiness tests under a statewide program sponsored by the Idaho Optometric Association, reported Dr. Arthur K. Bonde, Rupert, president.

This service will be offered from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday in Twin Falls, Jerome, Buhl, Coeur d'Alene, and Burley.

The readiness tests provide only a "screening" to determine if the child is visually ready for school tasks, but it will be sufficiently thorough to locate severe vision problems.

Previous readiness tests in Idaho have indicated that one out of 10 children have vision problems before they enter school. This program is intended to help these children avoid the loss of a valuable year of schooling, Dr. Bonde concluded.

## Maintenance On Gardens Is Important

A little garden maintenance can pay big dividends.

"Putting off" garden care chores means the work load mounts up until it's truly awesome. The garden suffers, too, and quite looks its best, and some favored, but neglected, plantings may die out altogether.

A wiser course of frequent attention, at regular intervals, to lawn and garden needs, gardening is no longer a chore but a joy. And the results are more rewarding.

As a part of the schedule, protect health and appearance of the garden by proper pruning. Learn pruning rules, and follow them.

Know that certain flowering bushes must be pruned after flowering — including Forsythia, honeysuckle, climbing roses, shrub roses, camellia, poinciana. Others may be pruned while the plant is still dormant in winter weather. They include holly, red fruited barberry, dogwood, lilac, hydrangea.

Spring into summer pruning is recommended for rose of Sharon, boxwood, dogwood (shrub), overblooming roses, azaleas.

The clipping of hedges should be scheduled once monthly. Use hedge shears with superior balance and a "cushion" or "comfort" grips, to avoid strain and callouses.

Lawn care plays a vital role in the maintenance schedule. How often to water depends to a great extent on geographic location. But the general rule is from seven to 10 days, if no rainfall has occurred.

Keep in mind that overwatering can be at least as harmful as under-watering.

With an established lawn, the rule is "water deep" — from six to eight inches. Helpful might be a water timer, which can be set at either light, average or heavy, to be certain sufficient penetration is achieved. The timer may be attached to either faucet or sprinkler.

Big, healthy trees are nice to have around the home. But when their roots find their way into underground waste and sewage piping, the home owner has a genuine problem.

Only sure way to avoid a root problem in waste lines is to make certain the lines are of top quality, watertight, permanent material. Once there is a leak or break in inferior piping, moisture-seeking tree roots will find it, reports the Plumbing - Heating - Cooling Information Bureau.

## Cape Kennedy Can't Be Reached by Commercial Airliner Due to Strike

The Cape Kennedy space center and 24 middle-sized cities across the country, including a state capital, have become places you can't get to by commercial airliner.

As a result of the airline strike, no regularly scheduled flights are serving the Florida space complex or the 24 cities that stretch from Pennsylvania to California.

And some 70 more cities, including Milwaukee, Wis.; Akron, Ohio; Richmond, Va., and Spokane, Wash., are having to make do with small feeder lines and charter service.

The effect has been a jarring one at Cape Kennedy, disrupting the travel schedules of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration to the point where it has asked the Civil Aeronautics Board to authorize special commercial airline flights between Cocoa, Fla., Houston and New Orleans for the duration of the strike.

Businessmen in some of the other cities reported lost prospects, dwindling revenues and getting replacement parts for broken machinery.

At the space center, Jim Herring, chief of transportation, said, "The airline strike has been an inconvenience for our people. They've been losing valuable time."

He told of NASA being forced to charter six planes to move personnel from the space center in Houston to the Cape.

Private NASA planes normally based in Washington have been diverted to catch the overflow.

Major aerospace companies are resorting to company and charter planes to carry equipment and personnel to Cape Kennedy. The nearest airport to the center, at Melbourne, Fla., is closed down.

Among cities without any air service are Allentown, Pa.; Dayton, Ohio; and Tallahassee, Fla.; Elko, Nev.; Modesto, Calif.; Rome, Ga., and Milwaukee, Mont.

In Tallahassee, the state capital, business has been hurt, but the greatest problems are being confronted by the state government. Officials have used state planes in some instances, but more often have done their traveling by car.

In Spokane, the Chamber of Commerce said the strike has cut sharply into the local economy. Air freight traffic was down to a third of what it was in June, with many businesses unable to replace worn parts.

No major problems or inconvenience to the public were reported in Akron or Harrisburg, Pa.

These cities are also without trunk line service of any kind: Huntsville, Ala.; Lansing, Mich.; Lincoln, Neb.; Madison, Wis.; Norfolk, Va., and Youngstown, Ohio.

## Funds for Housing Loan Are Eyed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sponsors say they hope to get before the Senate promptly a bill approved by the Senate Banking Committee designed to make another \$3 billion available for housing loans.

The measure would increase from \$10 to \$15 the ratio of Federal National Mortgage Administration lending which it may obtain from investors for each \$1 of its capital stock with Treasury backing. This would make the \$2 billion available for housing financing.

Another \$1 billion would be earmarked for financing mortgages of up to \$15,000 on homes.

## Comedian Dies From Narcotic Use

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Hip-talking, irreverent comedian Leslie Bruce, often charged with on-stage obscenity and off-stage use of narcotics, has been found dead in his Hollywood Boulevard apartment.

Bruce, 40, was found Wednesday in his bathroom. On the sink nearby, officers said, was a syringe, a blackened bottle cap and burnt matches. The cap contained a white crystalline residue.

The Los Angeles County coroner's office listed an overdose of narcotics as the probable cause of death. An autopsy has been ordered.

Bruce once said: "People should be taught what is, not what should be."

With that premise and a glossary of hip and four-letter words, he sallied forth into saloons, offbeat clubs and the recording world, bringing a humor branded as "sick."

His brushes with the law included: arrests on a battery charge in 1962; narcotics arrests in January, February, October and November of 1962, and October 1963; obscenity arrests in 1962, twice in 1963, and again in 1964. He was sued by his mother, striptease choreographer Sally Marr, and his stepfather in 1963 for \$50,000 for injuries allegedly suffered while entering Bruce's house; and in September 1963 he was banned from England.

"I don't have agents, just lawyers," he said. A California Supreme Court decision reversed one conviction, saying Bruce was not a narcotics addict.

Bruce was born Leonard Alfred Schneider on Oct. 13, 1925, in Mineola, N.Y. Last October, the U.S. District Court in San Francisco, in support of a bankruptcy action, declared him a pauper.

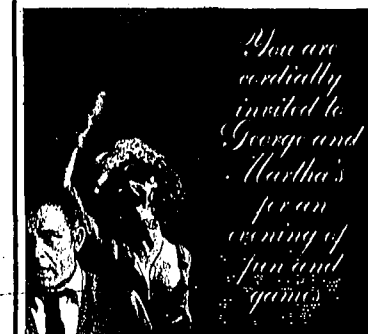

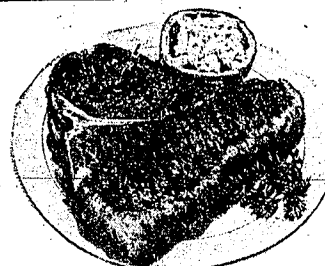

I would like to make a gift of some stock to my infant grandson. I would name myself as the donor, and the stock would be registered in the name of the child.

I am retired and have found the buying and selling of stocks to be an interesting and exciting hobby. Any comments?

That's a flat and loud answer. Gifts made under the Gifts to Minors Act are irrevocable. They cannot be taken back.

You may be making the mistake of thinking that the gift is not actually made until the child reaches age 21. That's not true.

The stock belongs to the child from the moment it is given to Minors Act (for a full discussion of the law, see the book "Gifts to Minors Act").

When the child reaches 21, the registration should then be changed to his name. At that point, he's an adult. He has complete control of the stock.

What he does with the stock is his decision. There are no restrictions on what he can do with it. He can sell it, or he can hold it.

## Veale Hurls Pirates Past Dodgers 3-1

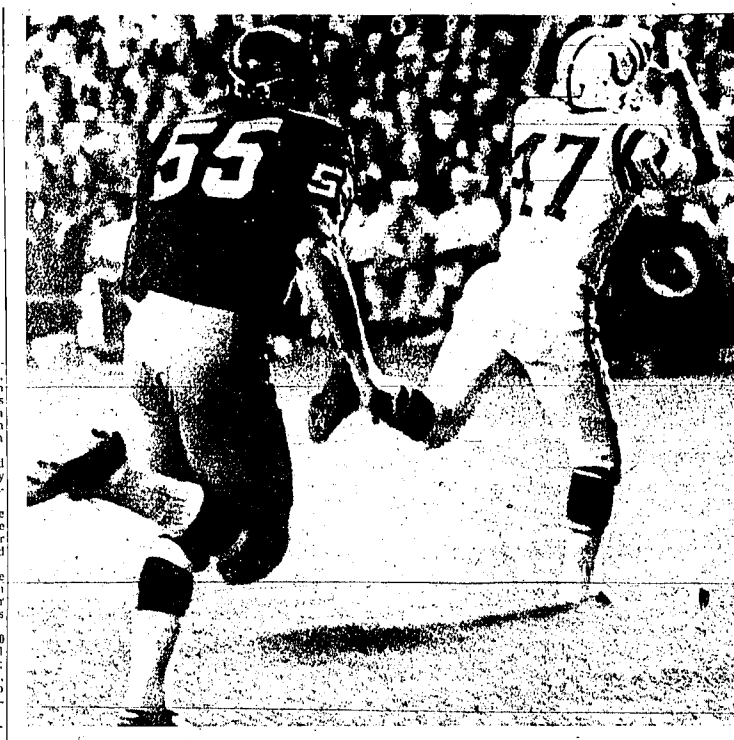

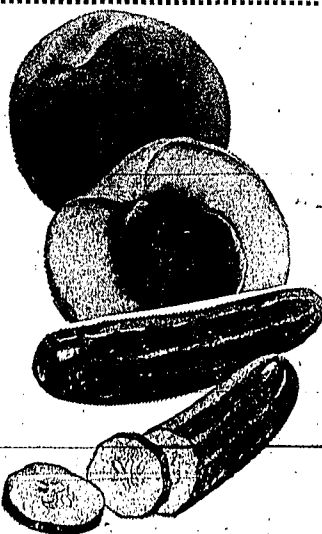

## Nicaraguan President Stricken

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — President Rene Schick Guiterrez, 56, died Wednesday. The National Congress elected Lorenzo Guerrero, one of the three vice presidents to fill out the term.

Schick visited Washington in June for talks with President Johnson. When he suffered a heart attack Tuesday, Johnson dispatched two U.S. doctors. They arrived too late.

Johnson cabled Mrs. Schick: "The hemisphere will miss him."

Schick possibly was Latin America's most outspoken foe of Cuba's Fidel Castro. He offered Nicaragua as a base for a Cuban invasion to overthrow Castro.

Guerrero is a member of the nationalist Liberal party, the party of the Somozas and Schick. A physician, the 66-year-old Guerrero is a former ambassador to Mexico, former educational minister, and was minister of interior in Schick's Cabinet as well as vice president.

One of Schick's last acts before he was stricken was presiding at a Liberal party convention Saturday that picked Gen. Anastasio Somoza to be the presidential candidate in the 1967 elections. Presidents in Nicaragua cannot succeed themselves.

Somoza is a brother of strong man ex-President Luis Somoza, whose backing made Schick president. Both are sons of Gen. Anastasio Somoza, the dictator fatally shot by an assassin in 1956.

When Schick was stricken early Tuesday, the presidential palace described it as a mild heart attack.

In Luis Somoza's government, Schick was foreign minister. Before that he served as education minister.

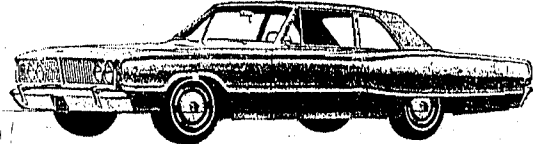

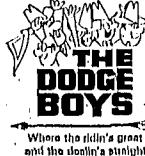

## Williams Gets Bid In Michigan

Michigan chose G. Mennen Williams over Jerome P. Cavanagh for the Democratic Senate nomination Tuesday in a primary testing also the current political power of labor union leaders.

For this first step effort at a return to elective office, former Gov. Williams, 55, had reformed his old alliance with union leaders who helped him win the governorship six terms.

But Cavanagh, 38, has been a popular mayor of Detroit and whether union rank-and-file members would go along heavily with their leaders' endorsement of Williams was a question he answered in ballot boxes.

Voting was heavy in Detroit and the statewide total was expected to run to a million votes. Williams' last year as governor of Michigan was 1960. In recent years, he has been an assistant secretary of state, resigning to make the Senate try.

In other Tuesday primaries, Sen. James B. Pearson of Kansas was being challenged for Republican renomination by Rep. Robert F. Ellsworth, a six-year House member.

Missouri voters picked House and local candidates.

Although Williams had the support of most labor union leaders, Cavanagh was backed by James A. Hoffa, president of the Teamsters Union.

Cavanagh's strategy camp included William Haudt and Robert Clamplitt of New York who describe themselves as research specialists.

This pair worked last year for Sargent Shriver, a brother-in-law of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y., in the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Last spring they were in Florida helping Miami Mayor Robert King High who wrested the Democratic nomination for governor from Gov. Haydon Burns. Their presence figured in charges by Burns of "Bobby Kennedy influence" behind his opponent.

The Michigan campaign, however, never developed any significant "Kennedy angle" as did many of the earlier primaries in other states.

No major, sharply-defined issues developed. The nearest thing to one was differences over Viet Nam. Broadly, Williams supported the policies the Johnson administration has followed. Cavanagh opposed escalation of the war and called for a greater nonmilitary effort in Viet Nam.

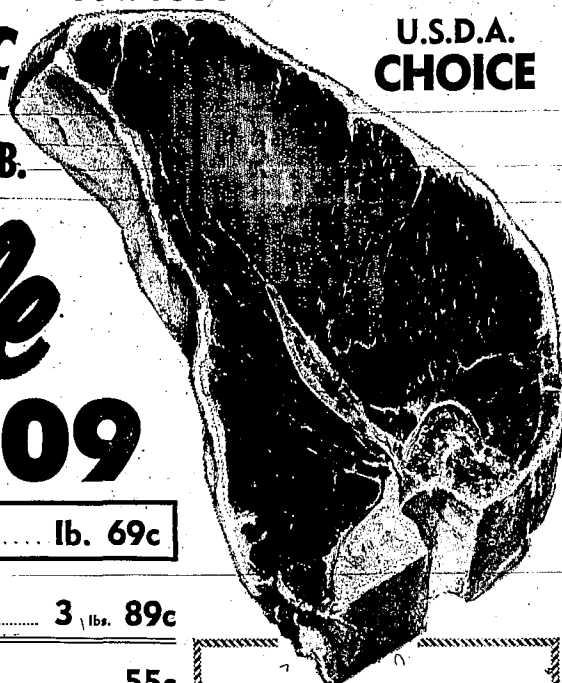

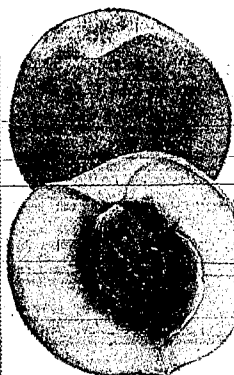

## Squadron From France Moved to Area

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States will pull out its six Air Force reconnaissance squadrons, now based in France, beginning this month, the Pentagon said today.

A Defense Department announcement said three of the six squadrons will be moved to bases in Britain, a fourth will be inactivated, "as was previously scheduled," and the other two will be returned to the United States.

The withdrawal is a continuation of American moves required by French withdrawal from the NATO military structure.

Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara announced June 15 that the squadrons would be relocated, but did not give details.

The Pentagon said relocation of the reconnaissance squadrons will be completed by October.

Of the two squadrons returning to the United States, one will be located at Mountain Home Air Force Base, Idaho, and kept in combat readiness status for any needed deployment in Europe in an emergency. In this case it would use facilities at Ramstein, Germany, under what the Pentagon calls a dual-basing concept.

The second squadron is being assigned to Shaw Air Force Base, S.C., and given a training role.

## U.S. Soldiers Train for Today's War, Not Yesterday or Future

FORT BRAGG, N.C. (NEA)—The company of soldiers was double-timing through an immaculate battalion area. They wore fatigue pants and tee shirts. And over the steady fumbling of combat boots they chanted:

"Gotta go."

"Gotta flury."

"Win the war."

"In a hurry."

The setting, the atmosphere, even the uniformed cut of the troopers are no different than past years of military training. But the war they chant about is

the "krawl." In 1952 it was "the gook." But now:

"Work hard."

"No play."

"Bang the Cong."

"Right away."

Not China, nor Russia, nor even communism as a whole. It is the Viet Cong who is the GI's enemy today and he is reminded of it in every waking moment.

Slogan signs ("Whip the Dip in Southeast Asia") are displayed on every military post in the nation. Jungle combat photos are tacked to every barracks wall. Maps of the battlefield are in every orderly room. Commanders stress it; instructors stress it; sergeants and team leaders stress it. Viet Nam, Viet Nam, VIET NAM!

So much is it stressed, in fact, that many observers, including privately speaking combat veterans, believe that such a big push is widely unrealistic.

Those opposed to the trend,

point out that Viet Nam is only one of the 43 foreign nations the United States is pledged to defend . . . and that nation's 15 million people are only a fraction of the 862 million in the world who rely on our combat power.

Says one: "Remember, Germany and Korea are still boiling."

Adds another: "What good will jungle training do if Russia drops the bomb?"

Yet despite such opinions, the armed forces in general and the Army in particular are emphasizing Viet Nam to a degree unknown in the history of limited warfare.

Entire enemy villages, for example, have been constructed at several stateside bases. These hamlets are impossible to determine from the real thing. Booby traps, underground tunnels, even the pig pens and wading

dering cattle of Southeast Asia have been included in the "on the scene" training.

Viet Nam movies are being shown in the classrooms. Viet Nam weapons are on display in the bondocks. Viet Nam languages are being taught. Viet Nam customs being explained.

And Viet Nam thinking is being pounded home hard:

"Sir, what are my chances of going to the war?"

"Well, I'm afraid it won't help at all."

"Do you pray, com?"

"Yessir, I do."

Even weapons planning is being affected. Viet Nam vets are dissatisfied with the standard M-14 rifle and are pumping for more of the lighter, shorter shooting M-16. As a result, 302,000 more of the latter have been ordered (for a total of 488,000) and thinking is it may soon phase out the other.

But, in final analysis, all of this is quite understandable. Because of Viet Nam the Army has lost by 185,000 men in the past year. Because of Viet Nam, the military is receiving several billions more spending dollars than ever before. And because of Viet Nam, the armed forces of the United States have grown to over three million strong.

Clearly, Viet Nam's what's men in the past year. Because happening right now. Not Germany, not Korea.

As one GI put it the other day: "Why do you think they're feeding us all this rice?"
