

Negro Man Shot In Detroit's Racial Violence

A Negro man was shot, and fire bombs and other missiles were thrown at store windows and passing cars as violence broke out for the second straight night in a racially mixed neighborhood on the East Side of Detroit. There also was violence in New York's Brooklyn and in Grenada, Miss. The battle lines were being drawn in Washington over the new civil rights bill which has passed the House and now goes to the Senate. Tyrone Powers, 26, Negro, was wounded in the shoulder, he said, when he was shot from a passing car in Detroit. He said three white men were in the car.

Nixon Says War May End In Two Years

TOKYO (AP)—Former Vice President Richard M. Nixon predicted tonight that the Vietnam war may end in two years if continued on its present scale.

But in talking with reporters on his arrival from Hong Kong he repeated his stand, first made in Saigon, for 25 percent more troops than are now scheduled to go to Viet Nam. "Maximum force" can end the war quicker and with less casualties, he said.

Vietnamese Are Pursued Near Da Nang

SAIGON (AP)—U.S. Marines pursued an estimated 6,000 North Vietnamese troops in bloody fire riddled near Da Nang today, the U.S. military said. The Marines fought off enemy attacks by twice their number through the night.

Action Date Foreseen on Rights Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana said today he will call for Senate action on the civil rights bill Sept. 6, the day after Labor Day.

The House-passed measure faces even rougher going in the Senate than it did in the House, partly because of the opposition of Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois to its open housing provision.

Bus-Truck Collision Injures 14

SPALDING, Idaho (AP) — A Northwestern Stage Lines bus with 22 passengers collided with a pickup truck 1 1/2 miles south of here Wednesday and then overturned, injuring 14 persons.

Five of the injured were admitted to a Lewiston hospital, but only one was considered to be in serious condition.

The bus was only 10 miles from Lewiston on U.S. Highway 95 when the collision occurred at 5:45 p.m. It had left Boise earlier in the day and was to have ended its run at Lewiston.

The driver, Golden R. Reese, 56, Boise, told state police he was passing the pickup truck carrying three Lapwai, Idaho, women when the truck turned left in front of him. The two vehicles collided. The bus remained upright as it went over a 15-foot embankment at the side of the highway but then overturned on its top and then rolled back to its side.

Two of the three women admitted to observation.

Birch Society Move Hit By Swisher

POCATELLO (AP) — The John Birch Society regards Idaho as fertile ground for "campaign fear and distrust, but it has seriously misread the Idaho voter," State Sen. Perry Swisher, R-Bannock, said Wednesday.

He said the most deplorable aspect of Birch activity in this region is the publicity given to any society coordinator who is a member of the Mormon Church (Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints).

"Tens of thousands of Latter-day Saints have no interest in this secret society which does its best to imply church support. The Birchers use this same tactic wherever they go, trying themselves to the most prevalent religion—Baptists in Oklahoma, to Catholics in Boston," Swisher charged.

The veteran legislator, in consultation with the society since the 1963 legislature when extremist proposals were a major

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issue in the Senate, said Birch Society organizers appeared in Idaho as soon as State Sen. Don Samuelson, R — Bonner, was nominated for governor.

Swisher made his comments in a statement. "But the people who voted for Samuelson were voting to change governors," Swisher claimed. "They know almost nothing about Samuelson. They did not realize he would seek Birch support. Very few would know of his legislative support for the society's policies."

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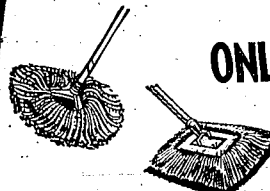


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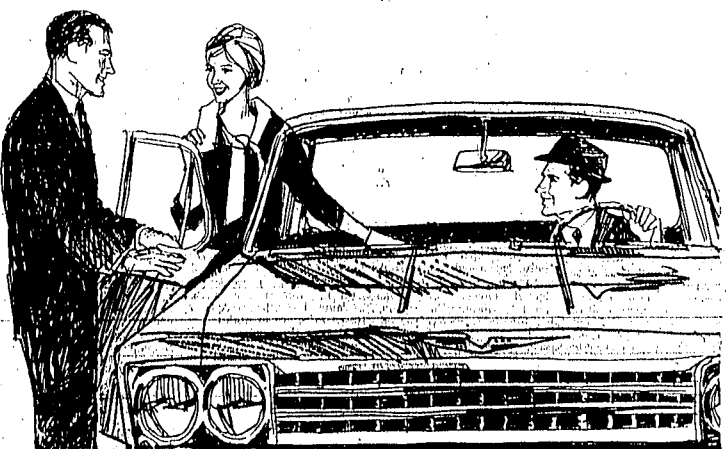

Katzenbach Scores Win At Meeting

MONTREAL (AP) — Atty. Gen. Nicholas Katzenbach scored a major personal victory Wednesday when the American Bar Association's House of Delegates quashed a proposal to have it condemn the juror selection provision of the 1966 civil rights bill.

"It would have been lost but for your statement," Dean Erwin N. Griswold of the Harvard Law School told Katzenbach.

The proposal, sponsored by delegates from Maryland, had plenty of support among the 275 members of the House of Delegates, a group not noted for liberal inclinations. It had cleared a drafting committee, and an attempt to bury it in a committee was defeated 103-88.

Katzenbach flew from Washington to Montreal in the morning, apologized to the lawyers because congressional consideration of the civil rights bill forced him to cancel a speaking appearance before them Tuesday, and then made an impassioned plea that they reject the proposal.

When the final vote was taken only 55 delegates supported the proposal. The number who stood in opposition was so overwhelming no one bothered to count.

Forger

Among the prominent politicians who showed up Wednesday night at the Dorchester Hotel was Edward Heath, leader of the Conservative opposition.

Heath and the others were stopped by embarrassed security officers who explained that it was a private party and the invitations were forgeries.

Johnson Gets Award for Aiding Peace

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson said today that it has been his greatest desire to "be a president of peace."

But he added that "so long as aggression continues in South Viet Nam, he will turn it back."

The President spoke at a White House ceremony in which he received an award from the 8th Armored Division Association, a group of World War II veterans, as "the American who has contributed most toward the cause of peace" this year.

In talking about his yearning for peace, he said "there is so much to be done throughout the world, so many children to be educated, so many to be cured, so many hungry to be fed, so

many hopeless people to be given a helping hand.

"We have no greater ambition," he continued, "than to be a partner to all those throughout the world who aspire for a better way of life."

"I hope that someday, the leaders in Hanoi and Peking will understand that desire."

Oily Waters Not Soothing At Long Beach

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP) — Whoever said pouring oil on troubled waters helps calm things is all wet.

Oily waters hereabouts are making people, beaches and boats black — not soothing. They leave an oily residue. "It's like tiny globes of tar, all over everything," said lifeguard Mark Monfort at Bolsa Chica Beach State Park.

"There's a lot on the beach making little kids greasy and there's more out in the water getting the surfers. It seems to make their boards slippery and it sticks to swimmers," he said.

The muck — thick, frothy crude oil — has spread across 20 square miles of the blue Pacific along the coast since Sunday, officials said.

Where does it come from? Officials aren't sure, but they're looking hard at several offshore oil wells.

A spokesman for oil companies operating offshore and on nearby Terminal Island said about 750,000 gallons of dark brown crude oil has seeped into the water.

Coast Guard officials said it's possible that water pumped underground to maintain pressure in oil fields has pushed crude oil up through a fissure.

Scientists Hope Some Day to End Disease Through Control of Genes

"You say you're sick, friend? You say you've got cancer, and your kidneys won't function and your heart beats only half the time? Tell you what I'm going to do. I'm going to let you have for a small fraction of a dollar a box of these pills absolutely guaranteed to make you into a new man."

—That spiel of the oldtime medical quack is laughed at these days, but actually he may have

more optimistic are certain they are on the right track.

This confidence stems from recent gains in genetics, a comparatively new science that probes the molecular makeup of the living cell.

Geneticists are beginning to crack the great mysteries of how cells pass on information that insures children will resemble parents, and why it is that some cells turn into flesh and others into bone.

Accidental changes in the cell frequently result in deformation or disease. The goal of man-made mutations is to correct defects and cure disease.

Eventually this new skill may be used to grow better brains and stronger hearts, but first it will be employed in efforts to make the bodies we have function with less trouble.

Subject of this research is the gene, an intricately fashioned molecule in the heart of the cell which has two vital functions: to control the heredity of the species and to direct the growth of the individual.

Every human body cell has an estimated 150,000 genes, enough that any cell, properly activated, can grow into a completed individual. It all depends on which genes are activated and which are repressed.

Just how a cell knows which genes to activate and which to repress is not fully known, but apparently the instructions are chemically encoded "in" the genes. Geneticists are busy cracking this code and many believe that the ability to turn any gene on or off is not far distant.

Since genes are made up of chemicals, they can be altered by adding or removing chemicals or by changing the arrangement of chemicals in their structure. The instructions they carry can be changed. By learning the genetic code — the language of the genes — scientists hope to control their functions.

One of the genes' tasks is to direct the manufacture of proteins, the stuff of which living tissue is made. Some cells are directed to make muscle, others to make bone, nerve or hair.

Some cells make proteins for use elsewhere in the body. Among the transported proteins are substances called antibodies. Antibodies react against invading bacteria and viruses and the poisons they produce.

Once formed, antibodies tend to persist in the body, providing an immunity against the disease caused by the invader.

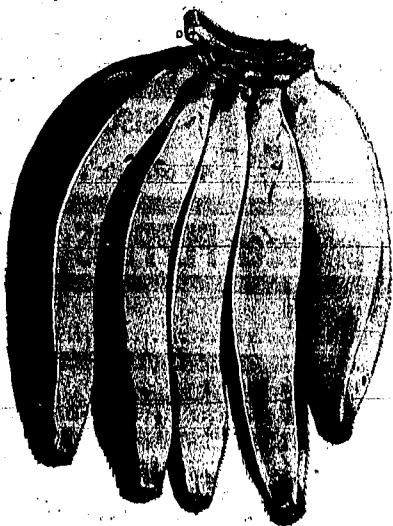

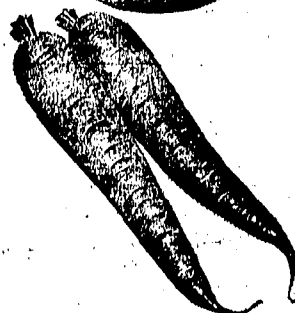

Young Communists Present Problems to Their Elders

According to Komsomolskaya Pravda, official newspaper of Russia's Young Communist League, "young vulgar cynics" write letters to the editor in which they express sympathy for the United States and declare "that they have no intention of killing American soldiers" who have done them no harm.

There even exist young people, and Russia's youth was always the mainstay and backbone of opposition to autocracy and tyranny.

Alexander Kerensky was 38 when he became premier of the government that forced the tsar to abdicate in 1917. His democratic regime, in turn, was overthrown by a band of extreme revolutionists of whom Lenin, the oldest, was 47. Leon Trotsky and Joseph Stalin were in their 30s.

But almost 50 years after the Communists created their dictatorship little remains of their revolutionary zeal. What revolutionary sentiment is left in Russia is likely to be directed against and not for the Communist regime.

The problem of the rebellious young generation behind the Iron Curtain has a different dimension and a vastly different significance than in the West. For this is the generation born and reared under communism, that was supposed to build the new classless society.

Instead it is more influenced by the "decadent" life of capitalist society than by the arid doctrine of Marxism-Leninism. Every regime in East Europe has been forced to come to some sort of terms with youth's desire to follow Western, especially American, trends in art, dress and entertainment.

Gone are the days when wearing "American" blue jeans could mean a summons to police headquarters. The twist and frug are at least tolerated. No less an authority than Russia's famous ballet impresario Igor Moiseyev warned in an interview in Moscow's Literary Gazette that "the only way to stop the invasion of the twist and frug" is to invent a new lively Communist dance.

He was commenting on a letter to the editor by a group of Russian girls who complained, "One can't dance the waltz in the age of Sputniks and electronic brains."

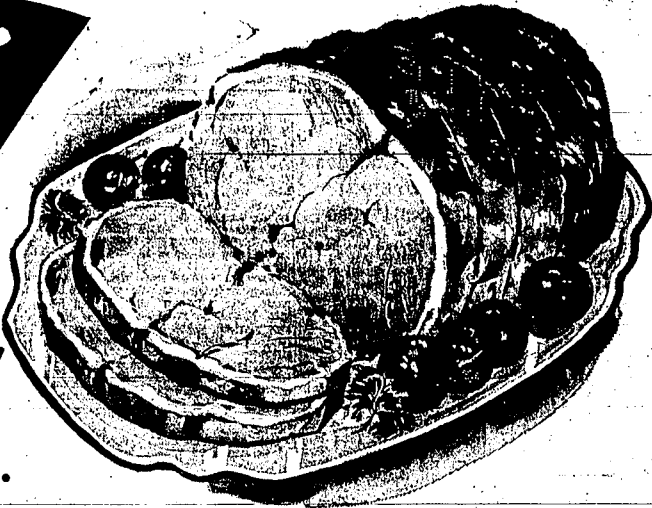

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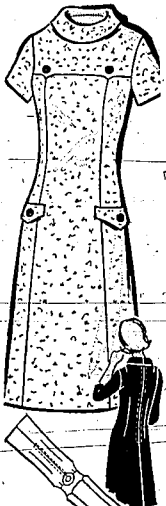

German Trial Scheduled for Burley Man

NUERNBERG, Germany (AP) — U.S. Army Pfc. Ray Martindale, of Burley, Idaho, will go on trial Sept. 26 in a Nuernberg youth court on charges of murdering a six-year-old girl, his lawyer said today.

The lawyer, Rolf Boss of Munich, said Martindale would be tried as a youthful offender because he was under 21 at the time of the slaying on May 15, 1945.

Under German law, a youth offender faces a maximum term of 10 years in prison for capital crimes.

Martindale is accused of sexually molesting and then strangling Beata Aganovic, daughter of a Yugoslavian couple living in nearby Schwabach. Her body was found in the basement of an army enlisted men's service club in Schwabach, where Martindale was stationed with a 4th Armored Division unit.

The girl disappeared after attending a German-American friendship party at the U.S. Army barracks.

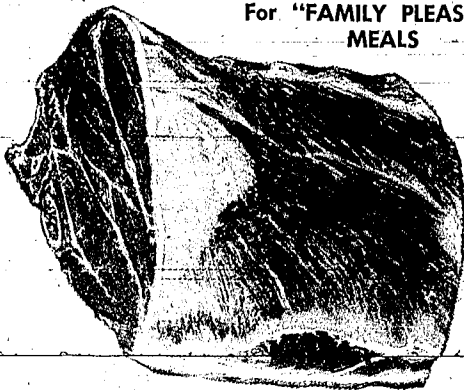

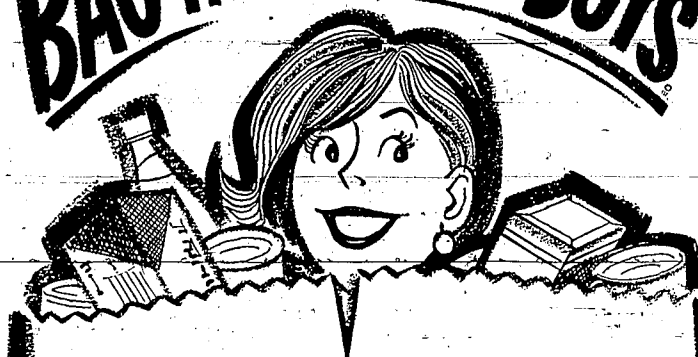

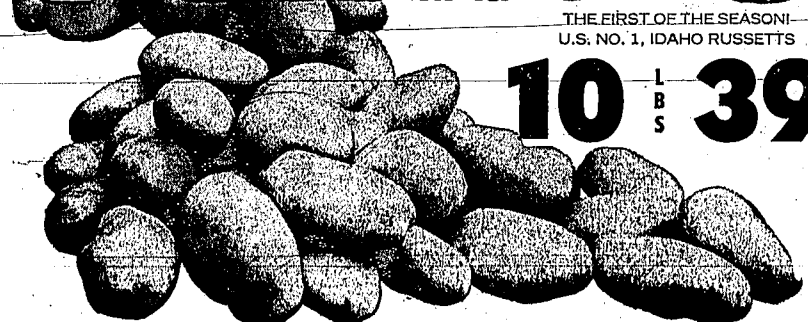

Graduate Students Aid Negro Colleges

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — About 150 students from some of the country's best graduate schools are taking part in a summer program aimed at bringing small, Southern Negro colleges into America's mainstream of education.

These young men and women, mostly future college teachers, are taking part in the Southern Teaching Program (STP), a movement begun two years ago at Yale.

At that time a group of Yale Law School students decided to assist small, predominantly Negro colleges acquire first-rate faculties.

"Many Southern Negro colleges are so far out of the mainstream they don't know how to recruit good teachers," says Fred Schulze, the program's executive director. "Begin on a volunteer basis with graduate students accepting as little as \$50 for a summer's work, the program has evolved into a combination placement service for graduate students who want to teach and a clearinghouse of qualified teachers for small, less privileged schools."

Now, instead of token salaries, teachers placed by STP are paid the same as any teacher with a similar background. Schulze said that although the program had more teachers, the number of colleges being assisted had declined.

He says this was because more schools knew how to recruit qualified teachers.

"One of the many values of the program," said Schulze, "is that it is bringing Negro colleges into regular academic life. Our people keep them in touch with what is happening at the larger Northern schools."

News of the program and its goals has spread, mainly by word-of-mouth, to graduate

schools throughout the country. Bishop school in Dallas, a Negro Baptist school in Dallas, time, being organized on a permanent basis," says Schulze.

Schulze, a native of Philadelphia, was on a Woodrow Wilson Fellowship. He was assigned to full time help. The original handful of Yale students had grown to 53 graduate and professional school students from several schools. They were teaching at 13 Southern institutions.

"When I returned home from Dallas, I received a call from New Haven, and it was suggested that I work full time for the STP, which was, at that

With Schulze spending most of his time on the program, it has

With Schulze spending most of his time on the program, it has

\$2-Bill Soon To Fade Into Oblivion

WASHINGTON (AP)—The \$2 bill—long a black sheep of the American money system—will soon fade into the past.

The Treasury Department announced Wednesday that no more \$2 bills will be printed because of a lack of public demand for the note which is as old as the country itself. It has generally been rejected by most Americans and shunned by businessmen.

Existing stocks of the bill will be placed in circulation, the department said, and \$2 bills will continue to be recirculated by the Federal Reserve banks as long as the supply lasts.

The average life of the two is about six years, a period which reflects its lack of use. The \$1 and \$5 bills wear out in 18 to 20 months.

Why is the \$2 bill so little used?

The Treasury has many theories — superstition; possible confusion with other popular denominations; the lack of room in the businessman's cash register where \$1, \$5, \$10 and \$20 bills are normally found. Some \$2 bills are even hoarded, one official theorized, because they are oddities.

Two Nations To End Their 3-Year War

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP)—Indonesia and Malaysia are to sign a formal peace agreement Thursday to end their three-year-old undeclared war. There were fears President Sukarno, although now only a figurehead, might try some last-minute sabotage.

Malaysia's Deputy Premier Abdul Razak was flying here with a "special gold pen" to sign the document, but was scheduled to meet Sukarno first.

Some officials were worried that Sukarno, who started the confrontation in 1963, might insult Razak and cause him to walk out. They hoped Razak would ignore any outburst as he and other Malaysian leaders ignored Sukarno's anti-Malaysian tirade late last month.

Confrontation was the name given Sukarno's policy of trying to smash the British-backed Federation of Malaysia on the grounds that it was a form of colonialism. The new government of Indonesia is determined to end the expensive and potentially explosive conflict.

To show enthusiasm, Indonesian Foreign Minister Adam Malik was scheduled to fly to Kuala Lumpur with Razak for further celebrations there of the peace agreement.

Indonesia's Nationalist party, one of the most powerful political groups in the country, renewed its support of Sukarno and his policies Wednesday. The party, dominated by the 65-year-old president for 38 years, is strongest in central Java.

Food Prices Soar to Highest Level in Last Dozen Years

NEW YORK (AP)—Food prices soared this week to their highest level in a dozen years. Meat prices zoomed last winter, vegetables and fruits this summer. Now it is bread and milk—butter and eggs—foods everyone buys.

Fresh pork cuts, ham and bacon are headed down in the Northwest. But in California, ham and bacon are higher. Pork is generally higher in the Midwest, reflecting the seasonally smaller supplies. In some areas, the prices are the highest since last winter.

The beef situation, however, is better. Steaks and roasts are featured in the Midwest, Southwest and Northeast.

Fryers and turkeys also are plentiful.

A major supermarket chain in the New York area cut fryer prices 16 cents a pound this week, to 29 cents — the lowest since April. It raised egg prices

1 to 2 cents.

Canned tuna fish is back. Prices last winter soared with the short catches. Now the catches have improved, and there is a big-run of albacore off the Oregon coast.

Fruit and vegetable supplies are improving, as more local supplies move to market. They've been delayed by bad weather.

Children's Books Are Big, Big Business

By AILEEN SNODDY

NEW YORK (NEA)—The grandmothers who housed briefly in the Hilton here spoke gently of love and brotherhood and the social, imaginative world of children.

Meanwhile, people in the book world who know her name spoke aggressively of sales. Her publisher, Farrar, Straus and Giroux, and others were getting their fingers ready to reap a windfall from the stimulus of her writing accomplishment.

For Elizabeth Borton de Trevino had just received the John Newbery medal, called by an editor of *Athenaeum* whose children's book won the award last year, "more important than the Pulitzer or even the Nobel."

The Newbery, given since 1922 for the most distinguished children's book, and its companion, the Caldecott medal for distinguished illustration, "probably sell more books in the United States than any other book award."

In the \$125 million market of "juveniles," as children's books are called in the publishing trade, the book awards this year perhaps are more important than ever before. And their influence will continue to gain for at least another five years.

The juvenile sales potential has been primed by the Elementary and Secondary Education Act in which \$100 million a year was appropriated specifically for school and public library materials. Already, according to

one of the giants in publishing \$75 to \$80 million has gone for juvenile titles.

Publishers admit to printing backlists of books to meet the demand from libraries now that there is more money to help librarians fill their bookshelves. The added importance to children's book publishers stems from the fact that book stores are a small facet of sales. It's the library that counts.

The appropriation of federal funds to hypo interest and sales in the juvenile field is only one factor.

"Children are getting away from the all-seeing eye of television," another book editor explained. "They are reading more and the increased demand for books definitely is not due merely to the population explosion."

He cites the greater interest of parents in books as they become more educated as a prime factor.

tor. Juvenile books, too, took on a new look in drawings and story material in the last 10 years. "We are creating more readers, better readers as we make better books."

Mrs. Trevino's award-winning story, "I, Juan de Pareja," reflects the change in content. It is the biography of Pareja, a Negro slave who became the apprentice of the Spanish painter Velasquez, was freed and became a noted artist. She is fond of the story of Juan because of the idealism it engenders. "If youths learn to live together and be affectionate, then this will inspire them to love," she believes.

The story touches her personal life since she went to Mexico on assignment from the *Boston Herald* 32 years ago, met a Mexican businessman and married.

When first in Mexico she said it was difficult for her to adjust

to the different social attitudes and language. Now she counsels others who come to her for advice with, "Nobody can adjust to social patterns intellectually. It is like falling in love. Do it emotionally. Then find out why afterwards."

She relates this to racial problems with "be neighbors first and the rest will come."
