



## Indonesia Is Taking Steps To Join U.N.

JAKARTA, Indonesia (AP) — Indonesia, which withdrew from the United Nations more than a year ago, is actively taking steps to rejoin the world organization now that its confrontation policy against Malaysia is at an end.

The Indonesian Parliament, in a day-long session Saturday, recommended that the government seek to have the nation fully reinstated in the United Nations, if possible, before the General Assembly convenes Sept. 21.

President Sukarno pulled Indonesia out of the world body in February 1965, after Malaysia had been elected to the U.N. Security Council.

Now largely a figurehead in the Indonesian government, Sukarno has never accepted the decisions of the Borneo states of Sabah and Sarawak to join Malaysia. In 1963, he launched an undeclared war against Malaysia, vowing to crush it.

But the confrontation policy was disavowed last week when representatives of the two nations signed a peace accord and decided to establish diplomatic relations.

Still obviously fighting the peace agreement, Sukarno declared Friday that Indonesia would not formally recognize Malaysia until new elections have been held in the two Borneo states.

Two weeks ago Sukarno also tried to disrupt the peace movement by calling Malaysia a neo-colonialist project and declaring the confrontation would continue.

Some diplomats feel Sukarno's drive against a quick settlement with Malaysia could pick up support from military leaders who want the confrontation policy to continue. Others, however, feel the matter is dead.

"It is a matter of history that the Malaysian flag was flown here. That cannot be erased," said one diplomat.

## Food Prices Predicted to Drop by 1967

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Agriculture Department predicts that rising food prices reached their peak last month and will drop by 1 to 2 per cent by the end of the year.

"Prices received by farmers and wholesale prices of food products on the average are expected to decline during the last half of the year despite prospects for strong demand for certain products," the department said Sunday night.

It explained that lower prices would result from increases in food supplies after this summer and fall harvests. Funds in increased supply, it said, are expected to include meat, milk, potatoes, processed fruits and vegetables.

In the second quarter of this year, the department said, food prices were 5 per cent above those of the same period last year and 1 per cent above prices of the first quarter of 1966.

## Home Nursing Course Given At Gooding

GOODING — Lowell Jeffries, chairman of the Gooding County chapter of American Red Cross, reports that School District 231 and the Gooding chapter of American Red Cross recently cooperated in instructing home economics teachers and nurses as authorized Red Cross home nursing instructors.

The teachers are now prepared to offer Red Cross home nursing as a semester class to students in grades 10, 11 and 12 who have completed the basic freshman year in home economics.

The three-day course, held at the local high school Thursday, Friday and Saturday, was conducted by Mrs. Zara Lund, Red Cross nursing representative, San Francisco. This is one of five courses being offered to teachers in the state of Idaho during August.

Deductions More Than Allowed NEW YORK (AP)—The Tax Foundation, Inc., said Sunday that in 44 years the payments taken from an employee's checks for old-age benefits will be \$12,000 more than he could withdraw during retirement.

The foundation is a private, non-profit organization which examines the fiscal aspects of government. It said that anyone who retires at age 65 in the year 2010 will have paid approximately \$12,500 in old-age taxes during his working life.

But during the average number of years one can expect to live after retirement, one could anticipate receiving only \$10,000 in Social Security after 44 years of working life, the foundation added.

## Girl Saved by Operation on Hospital Ship

**ABOARD THE U.S.S. REPOSE** (AP) — An unprecedented open heart operation performed aboard an American hospital ship in a zone has saved the life of a Vietnamese girl, U.S. Navy doctors said Sunday.

A team of four American physicians accomplished the feat last week aboard the U.S.S. Repose, lying off the South Vietnamese coast near Da Nang. Their patient was Phan Thi Truong, 16, a Da Nang resident suffering from a serious heart ailment which probably would have taken her life within a year.

Dr. M. Kenneth Neugebauer, 40, of the University of Iowa, led the team of surgeons in the operation.

The others were Dr. Mitchell Mills, 35, of San Diego, Calif.; Dr. John Dennis Noonan, 27, of Covington, Ky.; and Dr. Theodore H. Wilson, Jr., 44, of Bethesda, Md.

"We felt a great deal of triumph when it was over," Neugebauer told newsmen. "We were a little scared."

The girl appeared to be recovering. She will remain aboard the Repose about two weeks before returning home.

The young patient — her black hair, rumpled down the back of her blue hospital gown — smiled broadly and answered "Nubie's one," when asked how her heart is now.

"She's right, too," Mills said. "She doesn't even have a murmur."

Mills said that before surgery the girl had two heart murmurs which, through a stethoscope, "sounded like a boiler factory."

## Nixon Ends Trip, Heads for Home

**TOKYO (AP)** — Former U.S. vice President Richard Nixon left for home Monday after a three-week swing through Europe and Asia to prepare for speaking here to make during the fall election.

Nixon will make a final stopover in Honolulu to get a briefing from the commander of U.S. forces in the Pacific.

In Saigon, Tokyo and Seoul, Nixon has told newsmen he believes the United States must commit more troops to South Vietnam to shorten the war.

**INMATE IS APPREHENDED** (AP) — An inmate of the Idaho State Penitentiary was back in custody Monday after a few hours of freedom.

Warden Mark Maxwell said James Doty, 29, serving a term for burglary in Canyon county, was missing when a work crew was checked back into the dormitory at the Eagle Island prison farm Sunday evening.

The crew had been working during the day at the new prison site south of Boise.

## Sen. Jordan Receives Blast From Harding

BOISE (AP)—Ralph R. Harding, Democratic nominee for United States senator, asserted Monday the man he seeks to displace is an "election year liberal."

## Nebraska Is Hit by Flood, Damage Noted

COLUMBUS, Neb. (AP)—Angry Loup River flood waters receded from Columbus on Sunday, leaving behind millions of dollars of property damage, and headed into the larger Platte River, thought more capable of carrying the load.

Civil Defense officials, however, alerted towns along the stream, including Schuyler, North Bend and Fremont, and ordered evacuation of the Two Rivers recreation area, about 20 miles southwest of Omaha.

Gov. Frank Morrison, who made an aerial survey of the central Nebraska area hit by up to a foot of rain Friday, said damage to highways, bridges and other public property would total "many millions" of dollars.

He described crop damage as "very extensive," and said he was asking the federal government to help appraise the damage. The area flooded is one of the most fertile in Nebraska, primarily planted to small grains.

A survey of towns and rural areas inundated indicated livestock losses would run into the thousands of head. The sudden range of rivers and their tributaries caught farmers unaware.

The Loup, normally a lazy stream this time of year, ranged from 25 to four miles wide when the crest rode down it early Sunday near Columbus. It was 3.5 feet over flood stage of 9 feet.

## World War II Bomb Is Found

TOKYO (AP)—A live, one-ton World War II bomb was dug out Sunday from beneath a Tokyo high school where it had lain unnoticed for 21 years.

The bomb, said to have been dropped by a U.S. plane in April 1945, was discovered more than 30 feet underground by a work crew renovating a high school. Japanese bomb experts defused it while police roped off the area. It will be dumped at sea.

## Commander Dies

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic (AP)—Ramon Emilio Mejia Pichirilo, a commander of the rebel forces in last year's Dominican Republic revolution, died Sunday in a clinic here.

Mejia Pichirilo was shot in the back Friday night in a street in downtown Santo Domingo. Mejia Pichirilo, who was a commanding officer in the forces headed by Col. Francisco Caamaño Duen during the Dominican revolution in April 1965, was shot three times.

FTON, N.J. (AP) — Mason Rudolph, a bookish Tennesseean who hasn't won in two years, re-tooled in a head-to-head duel with Jack Nicklaus to win the Golden Bear by a stroke-Sunday for \$100,000 top prize in the \$100,000 Thunderbird Golf Classic.
