Unruly Hearings Near End

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Committee on Un-American Activities wound up its questioning of witnesses identified as representing anti-Viet Nam war groups, after tossing out two witnesses and a dozen spectators today.

"I see no need to continue the investigation further," said the acting chairman, Joe R. Pool, D-Tex.

"These hearings," he continued, "have fully revealed the nature of the groups and individuals. It is clear the key leadership of these groups is made up of hard-core Communists acting in behalf of foreign powers."

He dismissed all remaining witnesses who had been called to testify.

"I object," shouted Jerry Clyde Rubin of Berkeley, Calif., who had sat in the hearing room for three days wearing U.S. Revolutionary War-type uniform.

"I want to be heard," Rubin shouted. I came all the way from California and I want to make a statement."

Rubin was escorted from the room when he continued protesting after Pool ruled that he had been dismissed.

Pool indicated the committee will turn next to hearing witnesses in support of pending bills to punish those who attempt to interfere with movement of men or material to Viet Nam.

He said he hoped to get approval of the bills by the committee next week.

The two witnesses ejected from the hearing earlier today were Steven Cherkess and Steven C. Hamilton, both of Berkeley, Calif. They were ordered from the room when they refused to leave the witness stand after testifying.

Cherkess was arrested, Hamilton merely escorted to the committee's courtroom, where he sought to wind up questioning of members of groups fighting what they term U.S. aggression in Viet Nam.

Both Cherkess and Hamilton denounced the committee as "racist, cowardly yellow-bellied reactionaries," kept repeating. Cherkess, the committee chairman, had used the term "yellow-bellied cowards" to describe some of the subpoenaed witnesses.

Hamilton was led from the room after he insisted on introducing a "people's exhibits" figures on the cost of profits of big corporations.

BURLEY — Horse fitting and showing and home economics demonstrations were under way Friday as the Cassia fair and rodeo went into its second day. Next year's fair queen will be announced at the final rodeo Saturday night. There are nine contestants.

Australian Troops Battle Viet Cong

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — While American troops searched with little luck for the elusive Communist enemy, Australian and South Vietnamese troops fought pitched battles Thursday with the Viet Cong and killed 324, military spokesmen said today.

The Aussies killed 193 Viet Cong during a four-hour engagement in drenching monsoon downpours. 42 military personnel were killed. It was their biggest battle of the war.

The Vietnamese claimed 131 enemy dead in three encounters.

In the air war over the North, American forces bagged their fourth Communist MIG in a dogfight air battle 25 miles north of Hanoi, a spokesman reported. Air Force jets ran into MIGs on two other occasions Thursday but no further losses were reported for either side.

A missile launched and near Hanoi was destroyed and two others damaged in other air activity, the spokesman said.

On the ground, U.S. forces reported little contact with the enemy.

The Australians, supported by New Zealand and American artillery units as well as their own, reported moderate casualties, an indication they were hit hard.

Tax Collection Report for July Is Made Public

BOISE (AP) — General tax collections in July, the first month of the new fiscal year, amounted to \$3,968,888, Tax Collector Floyd West reported today.

That was nearly \$3 million in excess of collections a year earlier, when the effect of the new sales tax had not yet been felt. Sales tax collections in July were \$2,684,784 compared with only \$1,610 in July last year.

Income tax collections in July, year to date totaled \$3,377,731, he said.

Orbiter Is Troubled With Camera Problems

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — America's Lunar Orbiter, still troubled with camera problems, was ordered today to take its first pictures of the far back side of the moon.

U.S. space agency officials said the back-side pictures snapped at an altitude of 830 miles as the craft swings behind the moon in its egg-shaped orbit, probably will not be released for several weeks.

They also disclosed that the last four of five high-resolution pictures sent back Thursday appeared sharp except for a broad plain on the far right edge of the lunar disc.

Officials said that if trouble with the high resolution, sharper, photographs continued, the mission would seriously limit the ability to take close-up pictures of the moon's surface next week of possible astronaut landing sites.

The problem showed up Thursday in pictures taken by the high resolution lens as the 550-pound orbiter appeared to be in ground equipment which contained camera pictures into television images. He had described the trouble was in the spacecraft, any technical problems had told him pictures received at a nearby tracking station were excellent.

The space agency early today released a medium resolution picture from the third frame of the high resolution lens. The picture showed a part of the flat mare and some of the highlands, showing it both the mare and the highlands were pocked with craters and appeared much like terrain from Ranger spacecraft.

The pictures came in strips which were paused up to assemble a complete photograph.

Chicago Files Suit to Regulate Marches of Housing Advocates

CHICAGO (AP) — The City of Chicago filed a suit in Circuit Court today seeking to regulate the riot-sparking marches of open housing advocates. Earl Bush, press secretary to Mayor Richard J. Daley, said the action does not seek to prohibit the parades, but does seek to regulate them. He told newsmen that the suit seeks: —To limit the marchers to no more than 500. —To provide for one march in an area a day. —To keep the marches on daylight hours and during nonrush hours. —To give the police superintendent 24-hour notice of such marches.

Nationwide Strike Vote Is Taken

WASHINGTON (AP) — A nationwide strike vote among some 20,000 Western Electric Co. telephone installers is being taken today.

The AFL-CIO Communications Workers of America said the results of the vote on whether to authorize the strike would be known some time late Saturday.

The telephone installers have been working on a day-to-day basis since their contract expired July 28.

A union spokesman said new contract demands include "a substantial wage increase" over the \$3.21 hourly rate now.

"We want to shatter the 3.2 guidelines," a union spokesman said in referring to the old White House guideline that sought to limit wage hikes to 3.2 percent a year as a means of averting inflation.

Farm Electric Systems Seek Legislation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Farm electric systems appealed to Congress Friday to approve legislation to establish a federal bank for the systems.

Clyde T. Ellis, general manager of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association, said without this legislation, blackouts will come to rural America because the facilities to provide adequate electric energy would not be available.

"If this happens," Ellis added, "those responsible in Congress are going to feel the bitter reaction of millions of people across our land."

NEW YORK (AP) — Union locals representing 1,700 striking machinists were reported today to have voted almost 4 to 1 in favor of accepting a contract agreement that would end the six-week-old airline strike.

Housing Legislation Approved by Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate today passed a \$1,264,000,000 bill designed to provide improved housing and services in blighted areas of the nation's cities. The 53-22 vote, after a spirited floor fight, sent the demonstration cities bill to the House where the Banking Committee has approved a similar measure. President Johnson has repeatedly pointed to the bill as the administration's answer to many of the economic and social problems plaguing large and small cities in all parts of the country.

CSI Trustee Petitions Are Available

Nominating petitions for the College of Southern Idaho Board of Trustees election are available at the CSI office, 149 3rd Ave. E.

The trustee election will be held Dec. 20, and the petitions must be returned to the CSI office no later than 10 days before the election.

This year there are no hold-over board members, and voters will elect two trustees for two-year terms, two trustees for four-year terms and one trustee for a six-year term.

To be eligible as a candidate in the election, the statute requires that each petitioner have at least five signatures of qualified school electors. Each petition also must set out the term for which the nomination is made.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Frank Church, D-Idaho, said today he is hopeful President Johnson will visit Idaho Aug. 26. Johnson has been invited to join in the dedication of a historical monument at the Idaho Falls National Reactor Test Station.

"The President is favorably disposed to coming to Idaho but cannot make any commitment until almost the last minute, because of his heavy schedule," Church said. "I am very hopeful that he can be there."

Atomic Energy Commission officials, members of the Joint Congressional Atomic Energy Committee, the Idaho congressional delegation and others will attend the ceremony.

Draft Call May Place 280,000 in Military Service

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon is counting on substantially higher draft calls to bring perhaps 280,000 new men into military service by next spring.

\$58 Billion "Peacetime" Defense Budget Approved

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate has approved a record \$58-billion "peacetime" defense budget through Thursday, June 30, 1967.

During three days of debate, the senators agreed to a record \$58-billion defense budget, which would be the largest ever. The House has approved a similar measure.

The \$58-plus-billion package is the largest ever voted when the nation was not in a formal state of war. The record of \$81 billion was set in fiscal 1945, in the closing days of World War II.

The peak for the undeclared Korean War was \$50-plus billion in fiscal 1953, which contrasted with a postwar low of \$11.7 billion in 1949.

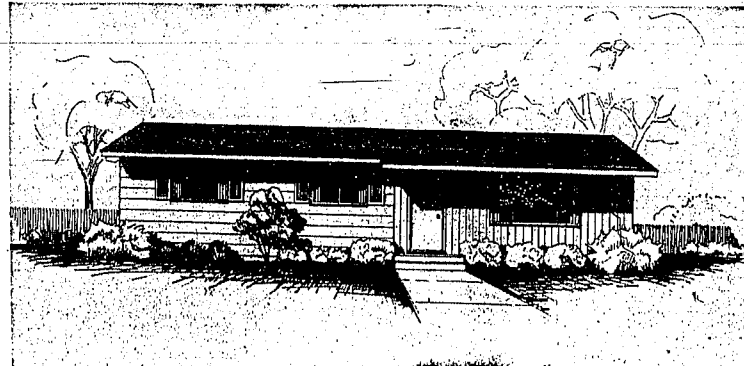

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market closed lower today for the fifth straight session.

Late news that rejection of the newest proposed settlement of the airline strike was recommended by the executive board of the largest local of the striking machinists brought renewed selling to airlines.

The airlines were higher at the start in expectation of a strike settlement. With the issue remaining in doubt through the morning session many airline stocks took losses.

Eastern, United and National Airlines were sold in a flurry near the end.

Glaxo stocks were pounced once again. Among the sufferers were Xerox, Itek and Polaroid.

Some issues rallied in late dealings but the market closed lower and high interest rates.

Volume for the day was estimated at 7.1 million shares, compared with 7.5 million Thursday.

The loss on average was not even half of Thursday's and selected stocks bucked the trend.

American Airlines and Consolidated Traction were down 1 1/2, Northwest Airlines about 1 1/2, Texaco a point or better.

The higher-priced glamor stocks were down sharply. Xerox lost an entire point and down about 4. Polaroid also was down 4, Itek 8.

Losses of about 2 were taken by Mobil Oil, Corning Glass, Northrop, Associated Scientific Data, KLM Airlines.

Sperdy Rand, down 1, looked like the most active issue.

Losses of about a point were shown by Chrysler, Zenith, American Smelting, Phelps Dodge, U.S. Smelting, Jersey Standard, Motorola and Ampex.

New York Central lost 1 1/2, 60¢ on a block of 15,000 shares.

Prices fell sharply on the American Stock Exchange.

Hot, Dry Growing Season Aids Mite Development

The current hot and dry growing season in Magic Valley is not effective. The way we grow beans in Magic Valley is just what the mites ordered. Douglass declared. The mites in this area are commonly known as red spider mites. There are six to eight species and are difficult to tell apart. They can live on approximately 200 different species of plants.

Douglass is recognized as an authority on the mites and has written several scientific papers about them. He declared that deposit of the mites by aircraft is not practical because the mites feed and live on the underside of the plants and such treatment does not reach them.

He added that the "bounce" of mites to the underside of the plants is a myth. Trained and experienced entomologists, he said, have examined fields year after year and have come up with the opinion that aerial treatment will not work.

Mites can be controlled, he said, by applying miticides to the lower surface of the leaves with ground equipment "but the grower has to decide whether to take the loss caused by mites or by mechanical equipment."

He declared that the canopy of foliage at this season of the year protects the mites from aerial assault. Therefore, he

1967 Wheat Crop to Have No Diversion Program

Wheat farmers were reminded that no diversion program will be in effect for the 1967 wheat crop. Local Herd Has New Milk Average

BATTLEBORO, Vt. — A new annual herd production average for milk and butterfat has been announced for the registered Holstein herd owned by Louis Rott and Sons, Robert.

As reported by Holstein-Friesian Association of America, the herd has completed its latest testing year with an official per-cow average of 15,190 pounds of milk and 547 pounds of butterfat based on 38 completed lactations.

The University of Idaho supervised the weighing and production testing procedure in cooperation with this breed improvement program of the Holstein organization.

The results of participation in official production testing are useful to herd owners in measuring breeding progress, analyzing herd management and the development of outstanding cow families.

This herd's performance level compares favorably to the average U.S. cow's annual output of 7,500 pounds of milk and 255 pounds of butterfat. Production averages are calculated on the commonly employed, two milkings per day, 305-day, mature equivalent basis to provide a comparison standard.

Small Area Was Favorite In Old Days

BOISE — For many years one of the favorite winter ranges of early stockmen who brought their herds to Idaho, Jerome County is a small, irregularly shaped area lying entirely in the Snake River plain.

In the southwestern corner, surrounded by the deep walls of the Snake River Canyon, are the Blue Lakes, three small brilliant lakes reflecting sapphire in deep setting, with no visible outlet or inlet.

The Snake River on the southern boundary makes this a country of shimmering waterfalls. Angler falls slipping over a series of ledges. Perrine Coulee rises 17 feet high, mature aspens taller than Niagara, and the delicate misty Bridal Veil Falls.

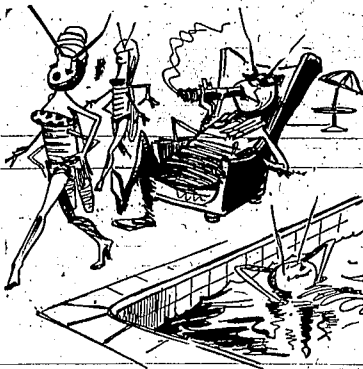
With the completion of the Twin Falls North Side Irrigation system in 1909 the value of the land became evident and Jerome County developed rapidly. According to the 1955 Federal Farm Census, the average value per acre of farm and ranch land and buildings in Jerome County was higher than in any other county of Idaho.

By and large here is a good four-season climate. The winters are not severe and summers are not so warm as in the lower elevations.

The bill, which has a bipartisan group of senators as co-sponsors, would require the

Cockroach Finds Some Homes Luxurious Resorts

BOISE — To man's most unloved and unpalatable friend, the cockroach, summering in a discarded tin can, the American roach shares the Oriental's enthusiasm for unappetizing leftovers, but its tastes are wider: it can happily make do on book bindings, manuscripts, clothing and paper with starchy sizing, and as to most Americans, sweets and syrups are high in attractiveness.

Wood roaches, an outdoor variety, are gluttons for sweets and their favorite haunt is an abandoned beehive. Unlike most roaches, they're strong fliers. Although some varieties of roach can live as long as two months without water, most roaches die of dehydration or lack of food. In all varieties, adequate moisture is essential to rapid breeding.

To keep the average household from becoming a luxury summer resort for cockroaches, the trick is to take away the available food and moisture sources. Prompt disposal of discarded and spoiled foods, scrupulous kitchen cleanliness, and drying up of damp and wet spots in kitchens, cellars and bathrooms are key points in cockroach control.

Heavy infestations of roaches can be dealt with by a professional pest control specialist, but complete control is growing more difficult and time consuming because many roach varieties acquire inherent resistance to some control chemicals. Resistant roaches require more complicated and sophisticated control methods and a wider choice of chemical control agents than ever before. The job is difficult but by no means impossible for the pest control man, but the phenomenon of resistance has made control of a really heavy infestation by the home owner almost impossible.

The professional has the skills to identify the offending variety of pest and the knowledge of which control chemical is most likely to overcome the resistance problem.

The Oriental roach, another agriculture department budget buster, once showing expenditures aimed at strengthening and protecting farm income, the other would show expenditures benefiting consumers, businessmen and others.

BOISE — Dry bean production in Idaho is expected to total 2,524,000 hundredweight (clean basis), according to the USDA crop reporting service for Idaho.

If realized this would be the fifth largest crop on record dating back to 1909, 20 per cent above last year's output and 15 per cent above the 1960-64 average.

The per acre output is forecast at 1,650 pounds, 150 pounds above last year, but 120 pounds below average and the third lowest yield since 1954.

Beans made good growth under favorable weather during July, but varying degrees of frost slowed crop development from a reported 10 to 30 days.

Some growers are experiencing difficulty keeping up with irrigation because of high daytime temperatures, warm winds, low humidity and lack of vine cover resulting from the late frost. This lack of vine cover has also caused more weed problems in the crop. Irrigation water appears adequate in most areas.

Acresages of all classes of beans are expected to be above a year earlier except pinto, small flat whites and red kidney, which show decreases.

Private Label Findings, Regulations Included in Food Commission's Study

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Three special studies completed for the National Commission on Food Marketing are included in its technical study number 10 which became available recently.

The volume contains "Private Label Products in Food Retailing," "Retail Food Prices in Low and Higher-Income Areas," and "Notes on Economic Regulation."

For the 11 chains as a group, however, one type of brand was about as profitable as another in terms of shelf space used and the gross profit dollars per square foot for all brands displayed.

Although practices varied among retailers, the study notes, private labels and advertised brands generally had equally favorable shelf position.

The second study—a comparison of food prices in low and higher income areas in six widely separated U.S. cities—was done under contract for the commission by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The study on economic regulation was prepared by the commission's legal staff. It summarizes food-related regulatory activities of the Department of Justice, the Federal Trade Commission and the Department of Agriculture and reviews state regulations relating to transac-

tions in foods. Pointing out that almost all food industry actions initiated by the Justice Department charged violations of the Sherman act, it reports more such actions taken against the dairy industry than any other part of the food field.

Most Federal Trade Commission food industry actions were brought under section five of the Federal Trade Commission act and the Clayton act, as amended by the Robinson-Patman act, according to this study which lists all food cases handled by both agencies from 1959 to 1964.

It also describes the Department of Agriculture's regulatory activities under the Packers and Stockyards Act and outlines all regulatory statutes administered by that agency.

A general review of state regulatory activities reveals the wide variations among them and the similarities and differences between state statutes and federal regulations.

Prospects of Crops About Same as July

BOISE — Aug. 1 prospects for Idaho for most crops were unchanged or lower than a month ago, according to the USDA crop reporting service for Idaho.

Prospective production was higher than on July 1 for only dry beans, hops, sweet cherries and prunes. Output per acre for all crops except dry beans is expected to be considerably lower than a year ago, reflecting the damage caused by dry weather and late frosts.

The first forecast of fall potato production was made on Aug. 1. The Idaho crop is expected to total 50,000,000 bushels, down from 52,000,000 in 1955 and 50,000,000 in 1954.

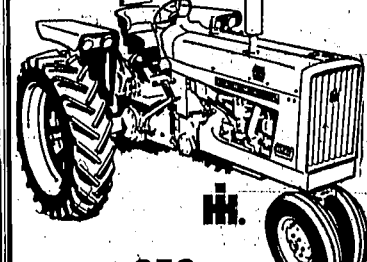

Idaho's Dry Pea Production to Be Below 1965

BOISE — Dry pea production in Idaho is forecast at 1,200,000 hundredweight (c, clean basis), according to the USDA crop reporting service for Idaho.

The 1966 expected production is 14 per cent below last year and 14 per cent below the 1960-64 average and the lowest production since 1961 when a total of 1,071,000 hundredweight was produced.

While July temperatures generally favored growth, the short moisture supply, hail in a few local areas of Lewis and Latah County and the June 25 frost in south Idaho caused varying degrees of damage and slowed crop development.

Frost caused damage to a first bloom set resulting in a later expected harvest date. Yield per acre is expected to average 1,400 pounds. This is 230 pounds under last year but 82 pounds above the five-year average.

Final Potato Irrigation Most Critical of Season

The final irrigation of the potato crop is probably the most important of the season, Don Youz, county agent, reminded growers this week.

Timing is the critical factor. Irrigate the last time, the agent recommends, so the water is in the field two weeks before vines are killed by frost or by a man-made vine-destroying operation.

The recommendation comes from Dorrell Larson, irrigator specialist, and Dick Ohms, potato specialist, of the University of Idaho extension service. Experience demonstrates that it pays, they said.

Potatoes harvested from fields that had the correct final irrigation are consistently of higher quality and better able to stand the knocks of digging and storage. Yield is also increased.

In the Upper Snake River country, the date for the final irrigation is between Aug. 10 and 28. In Magic Valley it is roots will continue to absorb water, resulting in lower specific gravity. Timely termination of irrigation helps to mature the potatoes and decreases the danger of water rot.

Production of Potatoes in Idaho to Be Down in 1966

BOISE — Production of fall potatoes in Idaho is forecast at 41,850,000 hundredweight—20 per cent smaller than the 1965 output and seven per cent below the 1960-64 average.

Although most acreages in this area were planted by June 1, development of the 1966 crop is three weeks or more later than usual. Stands are also well below normal due to low soil temperatures at time of planting and emergence.

In addition to seedpiece decay, stands were further reduced by the hard freeze the morning of June 25. Hot, windy weather during July made it difficult for growers to keep up with evaporation on fields with inadequate foliage cover.

Plants are smaller than normal due to the delayed development this year and fewer than usual fields had "closed rows" by Aug. 1. Yield per harvested acre this year is expected to be 159 hundredweight, compared with 210 hundredweight last year and the 188 hundredweight 1960-64 average.

The 1964 yield was 155 hundredweight per acre. This forecast, as of Aug. 1, assumes as usual that growing conditions will be normal for the remainder of the season which takes into consideration the first killing frost—usually mid-September for the area as a whole.

But the first frost came later than that date, yields could be higher. A freeze late in August (as during the past two years) could result in unprecedented abandonment.

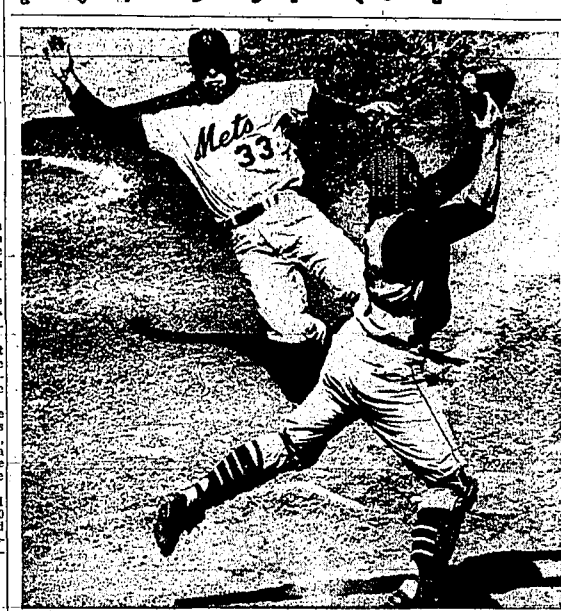

BOCA RATON, Fla. (AP) — "We'll be competitive," George Wilson, coach of the new Miami Dolphins, will say no more about the club's chances in the Eastern Division of the American Football League. But he can't. "How we can do I really can't say," the former Detroit coach explained. "I don't know enough about our own personnel, let alone the rest of the league. 'The biggest thing so far as I can see is the spirit and morale.'"

Presumably, so are some talented players. In what has been considered one of the most generous expansion drafts in pro sports history, the Dolphins wound up with 32 veteran players, including 19 who had been first-stringers last season.

Six, however, for various reasons — retirement, trades, injuries — no longer are with the club. Tackle Jim Davidson, fullback Jack Spikes, guard Ken Rice, defensive tackle Howard Simpson, linebacker Ron Caveness and defensive end Mel Branch.

Still there is strength among the veterans with such standouts as Frank Jackson and Bob Robertson, starting flankers with Kansas City and Buffalo, respectively, last year quarterbacks Dick Wood of Oakland, defensive backs Dick West, cornerback and Jim Warren of San Diego and guard Billy Neighbors of Boston.

As a matter of fact the Dolphins can field a team with very few rookies at all positions. But rookies such as receivers John Roderick of SMU and Howard Twilley of Tulsa, linebacker Ernest Engram of Tennessee, halfback Sam Price of Illinois and defensive back Joe Petrella of Tennessee figure to push their way in.

As things now stand, the quarterback job might fall to either the coach's son, George Wilson Jr., or rookie Rick Norton of Kentucky as Wood has not been happy.

The receiving crew should be outstanding with tight end Dave Kocurek acquired from San Diego, Jackson and Robertson, flanker and Roderick at split end along with Twilley, who is recovering from a knee injury.

The defensive front four is manned by Ed Cooke and Roy Ernie Torrance at end and Tom Nomina and Rich Zecher at tackle. Outside linebackers are Tom Erdmann and Jack Rudolph, with Walter McDaniel battling Engram for the middle spot.
