## Hospital at Jerome to Seek Funds

JEROME — St. Benedict's Hospital officials announce a portion of a three-phase modernization, improvement and expansion program will be launched immediately.

Sister Mary Lucille, sister superior at the hospital, and president of the facility's board of directors, said that application for federal funds to finance the project would be made as soon as possible.

The Idaho Corporation of Benedictine Sisters, the organization which owns and manages the Jerome hospital, recently voted approval of the entire plan as outlined in a special feasibility study done by Robert L. Hamill, Jr., Boise architect.

Hamill was hired to make the report after the Idaho Department of Health last fall had indicated several deficiencies existed at the Jerome facility.

Sister Lucille said that the hospital and Long Term Care Unit (Nursing Home) both are fully accredited institutions.

"However, to continue to maintain this accreditation and to provide for future needs, a comprehensive study was necessary," she pointed out.

The feasibility study covers three principal areas: Taking care of deficiencies listed by the state which are based on federal standards; internal modernization for more efficient operation and improvement of service; long range planning for future expansion.

Estimated cost of the first two phases is \$200,000. There is as yet no estimate on the cost of overall expansion.

Sister Lucille said that funds will be requested under provisions of the Hill-Burton Act, from which source funds had previously been obtained for construction of the Long Term Care Unit.

Under terms of the act, the federal government will pay half the cost of the program.

Sister Lucille said "We intend to make application for the federal money as soon as possible."

"The directors of both the hospital and the Benedictine Order have under consideration the expansion portion of the study, and have informally agreed that this phase of the report will be implemented at a later date, if the need arises."

She added that the proposed expansion concerns principally the Long Term Care Unit.

**Senate Votes 'No' On Mohole Funds**

A full page advertisement on an inside page tells of the amazing bargains available at the Idaho Department Store, "the only department store on the tract."

The drawing's caption describes the hotel as "the most pretentious business in Twin Falls." The building was constructed by Rogerson, Bonham and Peters Co. at a cost of \$70,000.

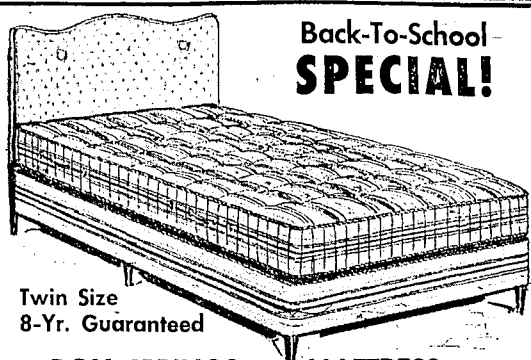

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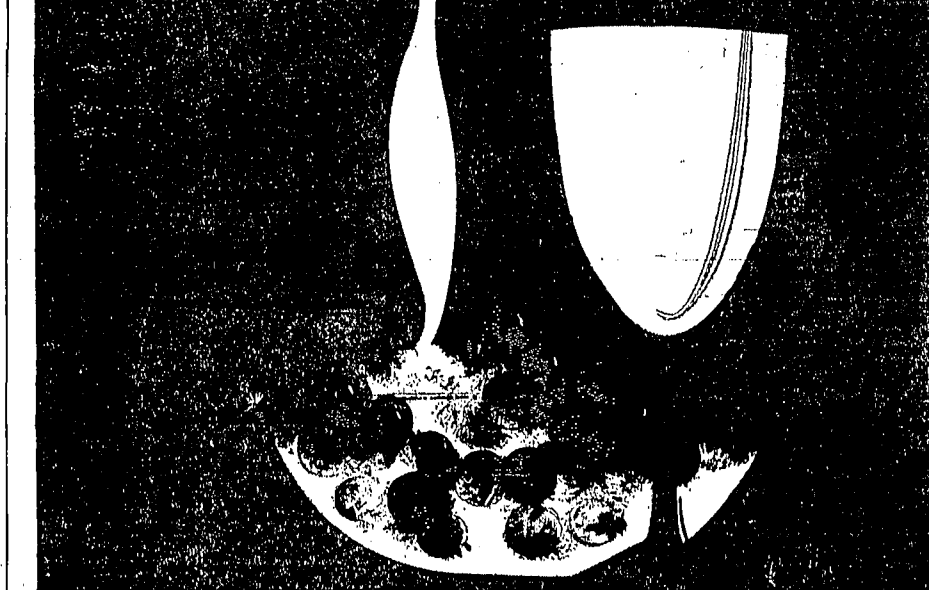

**DEATH TOLL RISES**  
**BLACKFOOT** (AP) — Idaho's 1966 traffic death toll rose to 171 Wednesday when a freak accident took the life of a 13-year-old Blackfoot girl.

Janine Lou Patterson died from head injuries she received when the horse she was riding along Idaho Highway 39 shed at the approach of a road grader and threw her against the machine, according to Bingham County sheriff's officers.

Another girl on the same horse escaped serious injury.

**JUDGES SUPPORT**

He said gaming laws would be enacted at the state level, but each community would choose whether or not it wanted gaming.

**FLOW TO CHANGE**  
**BOISE** (AP) — Power generation schedules will change the flow of the Boise River's South Fork below Anderson Ranch Dam beginning Thursday, the U.S. Reclamation Bureau said Wednesday.

D. W. Applegate said the flow has been constant at 1,600 cubic feet per second for several months but now will fluctuate from 200 to 2,000 feet to a high of 1,600.

Applegate warned the fluctuating flow would be sudden in narrow canyons although it will be gradual at the dam's powerplant.

## Africans Work to Remold Justice Court in Hague

**UNITED NATIONS**, N.Y. — South Africa has violated its League of Nations mandate over South-West Africa by introducing racial segregation there, the African group of 35 U.N. delegates, in the General Assembly, convened Sept. 20, will aim to prevent election of unsympathetic judges to five permanent vacancies on the present 15-judge court and to enlarge the court by U.N. Charter amendment so that Africa and Asia will have more representation on it.

The big Western powers can stop any such amendment if they do not mind antagonizing the Africans — and they may choose not to.

No charter amendment can take effect without a two-thirds vote in the assembly and ratification by two-thirds of the 117 U.N. members including all five permanent members of the Security Council — the United States, Britain, France, Nationalist China and the Soviet Union.

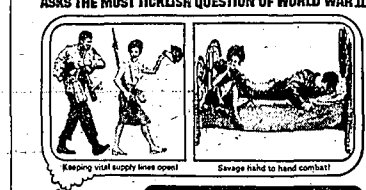

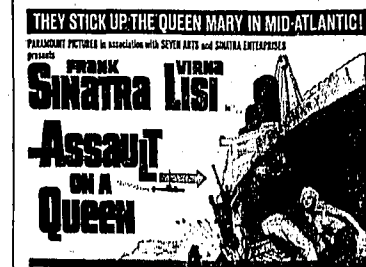

# Mao Tze-tung Has Masses Working for Him

"Dare to organize the masses," said a Chinese Communist party directive issued several weeks ago. Now the "masses" are organized and in full cry, and those who dared are becoming the masters of what begins to look like a Fascist China. Indocinated to a new era, the masses are glorifying in a license for mass cruelty, are potent weapons in the hands of a dictator. Today they roam the streets of Chinese cities inflicting outlandish humiliations on random victims who have suddenly become "enemies of the people."

Evidently the stage is being set for a climactic act of the purge the party calls "the great proletarian cultural revolution," and evidently some men in high—perhaps very high—places are about to fall. Those who have things according to Mao Tze-tung's thinking should have his erroneous views boycotted and a determined struggle should be waged against him until he is dismissed from his official posts.

The impression left by the

spectacle going on in Red China is that within a short time Peking will make known to the world the more important results of the purge. Whatever opposition existed to the current line of policy is being remorselessly crushed under the mass attack of the mobs of youngsters.

What is relatively certain already is that China has a military dictator masquerading as a proletarian. Defense Minister Lin Biao, a marshal when the army had ranks, is the emerging boss, and the great

proletarian cultural revolution. Their sin, nicely prefabricated, was "loosing touch with the masses." The winners got to the masses first.

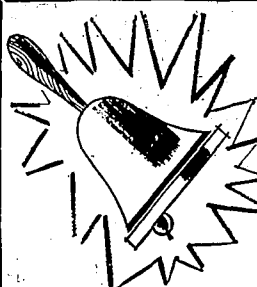
Rampaging teen-age students on a wild hunt have both the sanction and inspiration of those now in control. Did not Mao wear the red armband of the young Red guards in his latest appearance?

When the dust clears, probably a half-dozen new faces will appear on the Politburo, which holds total power over the nation. Prominent names will be missing, and other prominent

men—probably including President Liu Shao-chi—will be downgraded.

Few, pondering the spectacle, would doubt Peking's words that the revolution "has reached a new stage." This stage appears to be one which brings China the prospect of total regimentation, total subservience to the state, total conformity to the notions of those who run the party, and, in the bargain, total isolation from the outside world.

# "Black Power" Slogan Fascinates Young Negroes

NEW YORK (AP) — The fascination of some young, city-bred Negroes with the slogan "black power" was evident Wednesday night as 300 teenagers and young adults gathered to shout their approval of its more militant advocates.

Half a dozen speakers at Harlem's First Corinthian Baptist Church were greeted by cheers whenever they praised "black power" or urged Negroes to unite.

The loudest shouts, most piercing whistles and longest applause were reserved for Stokely Carmichael, 25, chairman of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee, who had canceled a scheduled appearance in Chicago to come to Harlem.

A few persons leaped to their feet to cheer when he was announced as the second speaker at a forum sponsored by IAR-You-Act, Harlem's anti-poverty agency.

"It's almost impossible to speak the truth in this country," he began, and was forced to pause for a wave of applause. The clapping became more frequent and louder as Carmichael warmed to his 15-minute speech.

He gave several definitions of black power, calling it love at one point.

At another he said, "If they (whites) mess with a man in Los Angeles driving his wife to the hospital or a man walking down a highway in Mississippi, they'll have to mess with all of us."

Negroes will have to come together, Carmichael said, so that "we can move to disrupt this entire country."

Again and again, both in his discussion of black power and his criticism of the U.S. role abroad, past and present, the slim, neatly dressed Negro was interrupted by applause and shouted approval.

He and all the other speakers avoided using the word "Negro," which is "shunned by the more militant leaders as having been invented by the white man."

Only once did a speaker, Floyd McKissick, national director of the Congress of Racial Equality, use the word. He caught himself immediately. "Er, maybe the black men would be better," he said. And there were cries of "Yes," and "That's right," from the audience, along with a smattering of laughter and applause.

Audience response also indicated that the idea of Negroes concentrating on helping themselves had wide appeal.

"We have to move to the position where we support our own movement," Carmichael said, and paused for applause.

"We have to move to make communities of love out of ghettos," he paused again.

Carmichael saved his harshest words to criticize the U.S. role in Viet Nam.

Saying that a disproportionate number of Negroes serve in Viet Nam, he shouted: "We have got to wake up. We have got to realize they are out to exterminate us. We got to realize this country exploits people the world over."

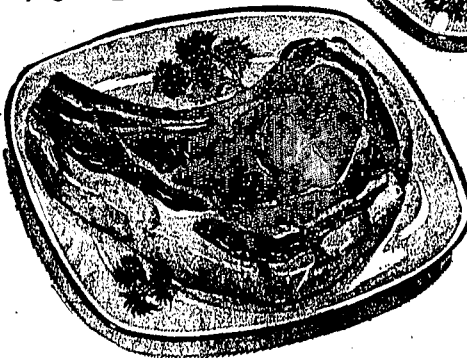
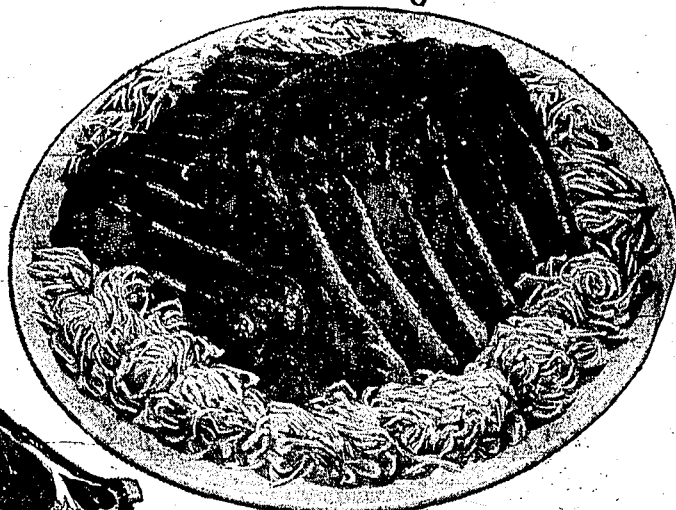

# Humphrey Defends War Expenditures

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey defended today American expenditures in Viet Nam as a wedge against a wider war and warned of a resurgence of isolationism in the nation.

At the same time he chided administration critics who say the war effort is impeding domestic programs.

He said he has heard recently "otherwise responsible Americans" declare the nation ought to take the money and resources being spent in Viet Nam and transfer them to domestic programs.

"I say that to do so would require, in a few months or years, the investment of far more money, men and resources to Southeast Asia — and possibly to other parts of the world — than we have committed today and at a far greater danger to all of us," Humphrey said in a speech prepared for delivery to the 71st national convention of the Jewish War Veterans.

The 2,000 delegates attending the sessions Wednesday declared their support of President Johnson's Viet Nam policies.

## Woman's Tight Clothes Set Off Strike at Plywood Plant

GARDINER, Ore. (AP) — "At first you laugh about it, then you get mad," says a waitress whose husband is among more than 300 workers who have struck the International Paper Co.'s plywood plant in this Southwest Oregon coastal community.

The strike began Tuesday when Miss Pat Morris, 35, was suspended from her job at the plant because she wore tightly fitting clothes.

Miss Morris, whose vital statistics are 39-27-33, says she is "heartbroken about so much trouble it has caused."

Miss Morris works the overnight shift with six other women who, like her, wear stretch jeans and sweaters. She is not a union member.

She was suspended by the plant foreman on the grounds that her tight sweaters and tight jeans were distracting to other workers.

"I don't know why they singled me out," she said. "The

other women wore the same type of clothes. I told them I would buy other clothes on payday. They said something about being too stacked and sent me home."

Miss Morris says she works behind a pile of equipment and wears a "huge leather apron."

The company said she refused to change her attire after being warned.

POST FALLS, Idaho (AP) — Kootenai County Republican Chairman Gary Ingram said today a public explanation should be demanded of President Johnson on why Chinese Communists have been invited to a conference on high energy physics in the U. S.

Ingram said Gov. Robert E. Smylie should demand the explanation when the President arrives in Idaho Friday for an address at the National Reactor Testing Station near Idaho Falls.

The Republican county chairman said the Atomic Energy Commission had confirmed three Communist scientists have been invited to the conference Aug. 31 through Sept. 1, which will include tours of four laboratories along the East Coast.

"How do we explain to the American boys dying on foreign soil," said Ingram, "that their country is giving the Communists so-called non-strategic nuclear information?"

A tiny microphone is attached to the talker's throat. Wired to the mike is an electric clock, or meter, which fits into the pocket. It totes up the time spent in talking.

First object of the professor's chatterbox is to aid psychiatric research.

## Johnson Inks Bill Against Dognaping

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson has signed into law a bill aimed at curbing what some have called a multimillion-dollar racket — the theft of pets for sale to scientific laboratories.

The measure, which received final congressional approval last week, also requires humane care and treatment for animals to be used in medical research.

During a signing ceremony in the White House Wednesday, Johnson said progress in science and medicine requires the use of animals for research but added that the measure would not interfere with that.

The U.S. Humane Society has estimated that the nationwide traffic in stolen dogs alone brings in at least \$50 million annually.

The new legislation provides for licensing of animal dealers and empowers the secretary of agriculture to regulate the handling of animals.

During House and Senate hearings, stories were told of animals starved, abused and kept under filthy conditions by unscrupulous dealers.

Violators of the legislation could be punished by fines up to \$1,000 and up to one year imprisonment.

## No Tremors Felt

ERZURUM, Turkey (AP) — For the first time in almost a week, there were no earth tremors reported Wednesday in quake-hit eastern Turkey.

A killer earthquake struck the region last Friday and took some 2,400 lives.

## Red Guards Demonstrate At School

TOKYO (AP) — A mob of teen-age Red Guards today broke into Peking's Sacred Heart Academy, a Roman Catholic school run by French nuns, and hoisted a red flag over it.

Japanese correspondents in the Communist Chinese capital reported they also put a bust of Mao Tse-tung in the school and plastered its walls with signs reading "Get out, foreign devils," and "Chase out the running dogs of imperialism."

The Red Guards and adults backing them blocked the school doors and made it impossible to hold classes.

The Sacred Heart Academy, almost 100 years old, has not been under the jurisdiction of the Chinese Communist government.

The teen-agers continued to surge through the streets howling for reforms which ranged from renaming Peking "The East is Red" — Tung Fang Hung — to the abolition of Chinese checkers and Western chess.

The Catholic school, said to be one of the few remaining still run by foreigners, is attended by children of foreign residents in Peking.

The newspaper Yomiuri said students, their parents and foreign diplomats who tried to protest against the demonstration by Red Guard youths were helpless.

Yomiuri also reported three members of a family, believed to be well-to-do, were forced to wear red clothing and forced to stand outside the front gate of their home while being jeered by the crowd.

## Hailey Chamber Fetes Mississippi Couple

HAILEY — As Mr. and Mrs. Reginald D. Butler, Hattiesburg, Miss., drove north on U.S. Highway 53, just south of Hailey city limits Wednesday morning, they were stopped by Blaine County Sheriff Orville Drexler and Deputy Ira Hoffman, and for a moment were apprehensive.

But when Russell Horn, president of the Hailey Chamber of Commerce, drove up and invited them to attend lunch at noon at the Star Cafe, they relaxed.

The Butlers are the first motorists to participate in a new advertising program instigated by the Hailey Chamber of Commerce, to advertise the Big Wood River Valley and Idaho.

At the dinner meeting they were welcomed and presented with Forest Service maps, informative pamphlets and brightly printed litter bags. Horn gave them chamber brochures and maps of Idaho. They were advised that a tour to points of interest in the immediate vicinity had been arranged for them.

They were also taken to the Federal Resources mill and Silver Star-Queens mine at Bradford before continuing on their way to Sun Valley.

When stopped they had been en route from Oregon to Yellowstone National Park, via Sun Valley.

In asking questions of their guests, members learned that the population of Hattiesburg is some 40,000 persons, that it has four railroads, manufactures explosives, fertilizers, lumber, clothing and food products. 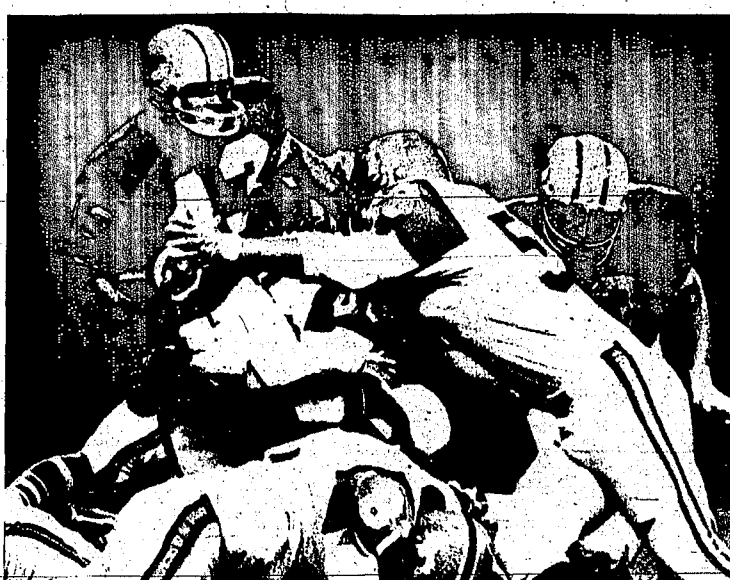
